Mr. Wende says his goal is to provide the best service possible. He does not intend to make changes unless they are for the betterment of service.




## Claims By **Rodriquez Family**

Roberts also said other claims may be asserted arising from other actions of individuals and organizations associated with the county and state, including the Department of Public Safety regarding conduct which took place subsequent to Rodriquez'

The attorney is recommending six million dollars as the amount for an out of court settlement.

AUSTIN - Last week the special Senate tax committee approved its version of a property tax relief plan and sent it on to the full Senate for a vote.

The tax-cutting measure may cost poor people a smaller share of their incomes than a plan passed last month by the House, but it also is less generous, the Austin American-Statesman reported.

"We have taken a moderate, balanced approach that helps every sector of the economy, said Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, vice chairman of the committee.

About \$800 million in new taxes would be raised and school property taxes would be cut by an average 17 cents per \$100 valuation under the Senate committee's plan. while the House plan would raise \$3.8 billion in new taxes to pay for school property tax cuts of 60 cents per \$100 valuation.

If the Senate passes the bill, a final version must be hashed out in a conference committee of senators and representatives.

## **Bills Target Retarded Criminals**

Rep. Pete Gallego, D-Alpine, has filed a bill that would prohibit the execution of someone deemed mentally incompetent.

His bill is pending in a House committee and has little time to pass before June 2, the end of the regular legislative session.

But it had a timely tie-in with the execution last week of Terry Washington, a retarded man who was convicted of the 1987 murder of a co-worker at a College Station

Peggy Griffey, who heads the capital punishment section of the Texas attorney general's office, said the legislation is needed to create uniform competency procedures.

Another bill that passed the House and is pending in the Senate would allow sheriffs and other law enforcement officials to order evaluations of those arrested for crimes to determine if those arrested are mentally ill or retarded, and then, to make special arrangements for their

confinement. The bill, by Rep. Allen Place, D-Gatesville, and Sen. Mike Moncrief, D-Fort Worth, would help in gauging punishment.

Concerning the execution of Washington, Place said that if an evaluation had been ordered, the prosecutor might have considered the defendant's retardation as a mitigating factor and opted for a life sentence instead of the death penalty, the Dallas Morning News reported.

#### Senate OKs Records Bill

The Senate passed a bill last week that would make criminal case records public again.

SB 1101, by Sen. Jeff Wentworth, R-San Antonio, is aimed at undoing a Texas Supreme Court decision last year that closed those records maintained by Texas district

Wentworth said his bill would: ■ Make criminal case files open to the public unless the release of the information would not interfere law enforcement investigations.

- Exempt from disclosure attorneys' working papers, including notes about witnesses.
- Exempt from disclosure information that did not lead to prose-

the House, where a similar bill was defeated in April.

Bill Expands Open Records Law Earlier, the Senate approved a bill that would subject private companies that take over government duties to the state's open records and open meetings laws.

The measure, sponsored by Sen. Ken Armbrister, D-Victoria, is aimed at ensuring that the public can monitor how tax money is being spent as more state functions are assigned to private companies.

The bill would apply to companies that are awarded contracts worth at least \$1 million to perform services that had been done by a governmental entity.

## **Governor Sent Castration Bill** The House has sent Gov. George

W. Bush a bill that would make Texas the first state to perform surgical castration on prisoners who are repeat child molestors.

The House voted 138-7 in favor of the bill to make surgical castration available on a voluntary basis to inmates who had been convicted at least twice of aggravated sexual assault of a child, indecency with a child or sexual assault of a child. The bill had previously been

approved by the Senate.

■ State Comptroller John Sharp announced last week that his world wide web site is now offering an interactive database to help Texans claim abandoned property. By viewing the web site at http://www.window.state.tx.us. anyone can look up the names of individuals or businesses reported to have abandoned property valued at \$50 or more during the past five

■ The chances of state employees receiving a pay raise improved last week when the comptroller said \$300 million more than anticipated will be available to lawmakers drafting the state budget for the next two years. Sharp said the increase comes from higher sales tax collections and increases in natural gas prices.

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
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
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

Crisp Oatmeal Wafers should be made on Fridays, she says, in case you have company.

#### **CRISP OATMEAL WAFERS**

- 3/4 c. sifted flour
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 c. rolled oats
- 1/2 c. salad oil
- 1/2 c. sugar 1 egg, beaten
- 5 tsp. milk
- 1 1/2 tsp. vanilla Sift together first three ingredients. Combine oats and sugar, salad oil and egg. Add flour alternately with milk and vanilla. Drop by teaspoonfuls on greased cookie sheet. Flatten with spatula dipped in water. Bake in

400 degree oven 8 to 10 minutes.

#### FRUIT CAKE

Line with heavy wrapping paper and grease tube pan.

- Cream together until fluffy
  - 1 c. soft shortening 2 c. brown sugar
- Beat in 4 large eggs
- Sift together 3 c. sifted flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg 1/2 tsp allspice

## **Keep A Mental** First Aid Kit

Don'thang up on a 911 dispatcher. "In a medical emergency, starting with the call to 911, there are things you can do to help the victim receive prompt and appropriate treatment," said Dr. Brian Zachariah, assistant professor of emergency medicine at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas. "Let the dispatcher hang up first. That means the dispatcher has all the necessary informa-

Zachariah, the Emergency Medical Services medical director for Dallas and a dozen suburbs, says ignore most of what you have seen on television and in the movies.

"Don't move a victim unless there's a threat from a fire or something like that," he says. "You can try to make victims more comfortable with a blanket or cover. But you can make an injury worse if you lift the victim's head to put a pillow underneath or if you give victims something to eat or drink.

Apply a clean cloth and direct pressure to a bleeding wound. If the victim does not have a pulse, begin

Cleaning And Storage Tips For Wedding Gowns And Heirloom Textiles

It's wedding season...and untold thousands of dollars are spent on that special gown to make the bride look her most beautiful. Unfortunately for those who want to keep their gown for future generations, improper cleaning and storage can cause damage beyond repair.

I receive a number of calls each year from people who want to preserve textiles--garments, quilts and other items--for posterity. This week and next week, we'll review proper cleaning and care for these items so you can keep them looking their best for the future. I know I treasure the quilts my grandmother and greatgrandmother made, but I wish my mother and I had known years ago how to keep them preserved safely! They would be much less fragile today.

Keepsakes from special occa-Local DPS Officers Part, sions provide a sense of continuity and richness to our lives. Rites of passage, by special clothing or textile items

> Wedding gowns or christening gowns, for example, may be by subsequent generations or members of the same generation. Proper care and storage of textile heirlooms can prolong their longevity in family traditions.

> No special treatments or storage procedures guarantee against textile deterioration or damage. A few simple precautions can help limit deterioration and maintain the textile for future use. Whether the expected storage period is long or short term, consider the following recommendations.

· Cleaning - After wearing for an event, the garment should be cleaned within several days or weeks at the most. The longer soil and stains remain, the more difficult they are to work with a reputable drycleaner to remove.

Many individuals quickly examine a garment and seeing no obvious stains, believe no soiling has occurred; therefore, cleaning is unnecessary.

Over time, colorless soil and County Extension Agent-Family stains can age and discolor, as well as damage fabric. Soil and grit cause abrasion and deteriorate textiles. Food stains can discolor fabrics and attract insects. Sugar stains, as might be found in soda or alcoholic beverages, dry clear but over time turn brown and are difficult to remove. Perspiration stains and body oils in fabric can oxidize, turn yellow, and cause permanent damage and deterioration.

> · Drycleaning - Most wedding gowns and some christening gowns require dry cleaning, especially garments made from silk, acetate, rayon or wool. Drycleaning removes oilbased stains including greasy foods, body oils, make-up and general soil that might collect at the hem of wed-

Drycleaning solvents alone do not remove water- and sugar-based stains. Be certain to tell dry cleaners about these stains, both type and location, so they can be pre-treated with appropriate solvents.

Tell the drycleaner that you want a fresh solvent. Soil from dirty in particular, are often characterized solvent can redeposit especially lightcolored fabrics.

Some drycleaners offer special treatments to kill fungi or bacteria. These treatments are not only unnecessary and more expensive, but may not be safe for humans wearing the garments in the future. Standard drycleaning solvents generally kill fungi and most bacteria without harm

Occasionally, wedding gowns include recommendations to send the garment away for special cleaning. Before doing so, check with your local drycleaner. The procedure may be both expensive and unnecessary. Some drycleaners offer processing that does not involve tumbling the garment. This would be a consideration for historic garments. Always discuss the possible options.

 Wet Cleaning - Some newer garments can be hand or machine washed satisfactorily at home. Christening gowns or country-style wedding gowns in cotton, linen or synthetic blend fabrics can often be laundered. Check the care label on garments and ask the salesperson at time

If garments are hand-sewn, fabrics should be pre-washed before cutting out the garment pieces. Laundering can remove water-soluble, sugar- and oil-based stains.

Some pre-treatment may be necessary for specific types of stains. Be certain to rinse fabrics thoroughly and do not starch if the item will be stored. Chlorine bleach should be avoided. It can damage fabrics and, if not thoroughly rinsed out, can cause continued deterioration over time. If bleaching is necessary, oxygen type bleaches are recommended, followed by thorough rinsing.

When handling older garments to use for a wedding or a christening, or to clean after use, do so with special care. Take them to a reputable drycleaner who has experience with historic textile fabrics.

Antique cotton or linen fabrics, such as christening gowns and some wedding gowns, can sometimes be hand-laundered at home. This can be done using special cleaning products for delicate fabrics and washing the garment(s) flat in the bathroom tub. Delicate garments should be supported by a fiberglass screen underneath. Use it to lift the wet fabric from the tub. Fiberglass screens are available from hardware stores. Wash the screen first in soap and water to remove oils, then bind edges with muslin fabric. Excessive heat and pressure can damage older textiles. Avoid ironing these items, if possible.

Next week, we'll talk about storage--what you don't know can hurt your heirloom textiles.







For Ozona High senior, Charles Villarreal, running in the 800 meters run at the 1997 Class 2-A State Track and Field Events in Austin, May 10, was one of the many highlights of a successful high school career. 



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

Shifting more responsibilities to state and local regu-

Currently, certain activities are regulated by the federal Bureau of Land Management as well as state oil and gas conservation agencies. This duplication of effort is expensive, counterproductive and unnecessary. Right now, too many producers, particularly in the natural gas industry, spend as much on regulatory compliance as they do on exploration and production. This does not make sense.

Environmentally responsible development of our domestic oil and gas resources will contribute to a freer, stronger and more economically competitive nation in the 21st century. The re-evaluation of federal environmental regulations is urgently needed.

I am particularly concerned about regulations regarding produced water discharges that clearly pose no threat to surface waters. And I am also concerned about the Environmental Protection Agency's proposed new National Ambient Air Quality Standards, which are scientifically

## **Texas A&M Scientists** Add 200,000 Years To Siberian Human History

Geological analysis of sand burying an ancient rock quarry in eastern Siberia has added more than 200,000 years to the history of humans in that far northern region, researchers say.

The new date - assigned to a site along the Lena River, about 75 miles south of Yakutsk by scientists at Texas A&M University and the University of Illinois, suggests early humans lived in that region between 250,000 and 300,000 years ago. Before this, archaeologists had estimated human occupation of the area began between 30,000 and 40,000 years ago.

The older date also suggests these early humans were more sophisticated than researchers had previously thought, says geoarchaeologist Michael Waters of Texas A&M University, who investigated the site.



## Commissioners Decline To Open Road

Opening a neighborhood road to landlocked property owned by Tommy Gibbs was denied by commissioners Monday. The decisions was reached following a hearing at which Gibbs, his attorney Gregg Gossett, and Clayton Smith and his attorney, John Hoffman, were present. Commissioners said this was the third time the matter has been brought to them.

Gibbs first bought oil and gas interests on the property with no easement and later bought the surface. Hoffman commented that Gibbs had filed and lost an easement lawsuit regarding the property. The lawyer maintained that another lawsuit is pending on the matter and that it would not be appropriate for the commissioners to rule while litigation was

Mr. Gibbs said that in 1941 the county authorized the county engineer to construct the road he wishes to use. His attorney suggested that if the road is not opened, a request might be made to remove the property from the tax rolls or reduce it to "next to noth-

Commissioner Frank Tambunga voted against the motion to not open a neighborhood road at this time, saying he believed that if Gibbs is paying taxes the county needs to provide

Geniece Childress and Crystelle Childress met with the court on behalf of the museum and Crockett County Historical Commission. The court voted to approve allowing the Historical Commission to act as a screening committee regarding items to be placed on the the town square. They also approved the appointment to the commission of Carmen Sutton, Camille Vargas. Judge Jeffrey Sutton abstained from voting.

The court voted to waive penalty and interest on a delinquent tax suit pertaining to an oil well. The new owner has agreed to pay the principal, approximately \$12,000. Tax Assessor Tom Stokes recommended the court accept the offer.

Auditor John Stokes told the court that property taxes could go down significantly next year, possibly from .75 per \$100 valuation to .59 for the county and from \$1.31 to \$1.02 for the school. Depending on the result of legislation in Austin, the school rate could change from \$1.31 to .75, Stokes said. He also cautioned that these figures could change as there has been no tax board review yet.

During his financial report to the court, Stokes said Crockett County Care Center could be over budget by \$400,000 by the end of the year and the entire health care budget for the



## Letter to The Editor

Dear Editor:

The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children, known as WIC, is regarded as the nation's premier nutrition education and preventative health program. Inadequate funding will force 180,000 low-income mothers and children off of WIC this summer. More may be refused benefits next year.

It is inconceivable that Mother's Day may come and go and Congress may fail to ensure that mothers and children on WIC are not protected! WIC targets nutrition education, medical screening and prescribed foods to pregnant and breast-feeding women, infants and children below the age of five who are at nutritional

WIC reduces infant mortality and anemia. It increases cognitive skills in children. The program is so effective it saves taxpayers \$3.50 in Medicaid and special education costs for every \$1 spent on pregnant women - by decreasing the number of babies born prematurely or with dangerously low or very-low birth weights.

In spite of its recognized successes, WIC funding is insufficient to serve all who are eligible. Without \$76 million in additional funding now, WIC caseload will be cut this summer. The same could happen in October if Congress fails to increase WIC funding by \$278 million for next fiscal



## Weekly Drilling and Completion Report

Cross Timbers Operating of Midland has staked location for a 7,000ft. developmental well in the Ozona Field 19 miles southwest of Ozona. The well is designated as the No. 4 Montgomery II. It is in a 320-acre drilling unit in Crockett County's TCRR Survey A-4899.

The Montgomery well is aimed at gas in the Canyon Sand.

Since gas first was discovered in the field in the early 1900s, the cumulative production has risen to a level approaching 740 billion CF. Current annual production is about 55 billion CF.

The Ozona Field's cumulative oil production stands at more than 2.5 million barrels. Ozona Field oil wells currently produce about 80,000 barrels

The No. 7 Moody Minerals "21D" has been completed in the Ozona Field 29.2 miles southwest of Ozona.

Union Pacific Resources is the operator. The well flowed 522,000 CF gas per day on a 1.25-in. choke and was rated

at 575,000 CFD on absolute open flow. The well went to total depth of 7,429 feet and was perforated to produce

from the Canyon Sand, 7,011 to 7,170 feet into the wellbore. The same operator has filed first production data for the No. 6 Pierce-

Henderson-State "Z" in the Ozona Field. Located 18.7 miles southwest of Ozona, the well flowed 356,000 CF gas

per day on a 1.25-in. choke. It was evaluated at 401,000 CFD on open flow. Union Pacific bottomed the hole at 7,216 feet and plugged it back to 7,143. Production is from perforations 6,882 to 6,984 feet into the wellbore.

Costilla Energy of Midland has filed for permit to drill a 3,000-ft. developmental well in the World Field, Crockett County, about 13 miles south of Big Lake. It will be known as the No. 36 Powell L.F.T. "A". Drillsite is in a 720-acre lease block in the N. A. Miller Survey A-4734.

The Howards Creek Field gained new production when the No. 48 University Lands was completed about 16 miles west of Ozona. The Harrison Interests is listed as the operator.

The well bottomed at 6,854 feet and will produce from Canyon Sand perforations 6,696 to 6,720 feet into the hole.

It potentialed at 210,000 CF gas per day on a 1.125-in. choke. The absolute open flow capacity was calculated at 225,000 CFD.

Texaco Exploration, operating out of Midland, has driven stake for two 6,600-ft. Canyon Formation tests in the Northeast Ozona Field. Both wells are about three miles southeast of Ozona. They are designated as the No. 18 A. R. Kincaid Trust and No. 28 A. R. Kincaid Trust "B". The wells are in the GC&SFRR Survey A-2308 and A-3957, respectively.

The No. 18 is in a 1,418-acre lease, while the No. 28 is in a 1,974-acre

The No. 2J. S. Pierce "16N" has been brought on line in Crockett County's Ozona Field a little more than 20 miles southwest of Ozona.

It flowed 122,000 CF gas daily on a 1-in. choke. The open flow rating came in at 169,000 CFD.

With Union Pacific Resources as the operator, the well probed was taken to total depth of 7,121 feet. After a plugback to 7,055, it was perforated for production ranging from 6,322 to 6,868 feet into the hole.
