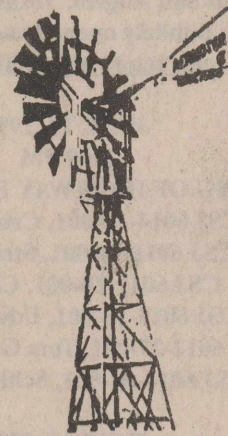
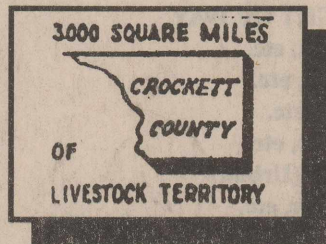

CAPTURED BEAR TAKEN WEST

A black bear captured in southwestern Crockett County May 30 seems to be adjusting to his new home in the Black Gap Wildlife Management Area south of Marathon. After being caught in a culvert trap, the bear was fitted with an electronic monitoring device and transported to Black Gap.

Mary Humphrey, Texas Parks and Wildlife biologist from Sonora, said Tuesday that when the monitor checked on the bear early last week he was in a remote mountain range near the Mexican border in Black Gap not far from where he was released.

The bear, which weighed 172 pounds, was first sighted at a ranch house on the Pecos River April 27. He returned for four consecutive nights between 5 and 7 p.m. and sometimes through the night. The bear discovered a trash can containing dog food on the porch and raided it for a meal. There was good cooperative ef-

fort between TPWD and the Texas Animal Damage Control in monitoring and evaluating the ranch site, Humphrey said. The bear was first reported to the Texas Animal Damage Control.

A culvert trap on a trailer and two barrel traps (two 500 gallon barrels welded together) were brought to the area and baited, then re-baited with dry dog food, grease and sardines. Road kill was used for the third and final baiting.

Snares were not used because there was no emergency situation in this case, Humphrey said. However, they did want to remove the bear from the area before he got in trouble.

Humphrey believes the bear was trying to develop a home range and was making another round marking his territory the night he was trapped. He was in very good shape when he was captured, probably from eating vegetation, she said. There were no

livestock deaths in the area which could be assessed as bear kills, she said.

The black bear, species *Ursus americanus*, is listed as a threatened species at the federal level and as endangered with the state. These bears are historically native to Texas and probably move in from Mexico. Although there are no definite numbers, "we have a pretty good resident number in the Big Bend," Humphrey said.

Through the monitoring device, this bear will be used to provide information to the TPWD. Personnel at Black Gap will monitor him weekly when they fly to do census research on desert big horn sheep.

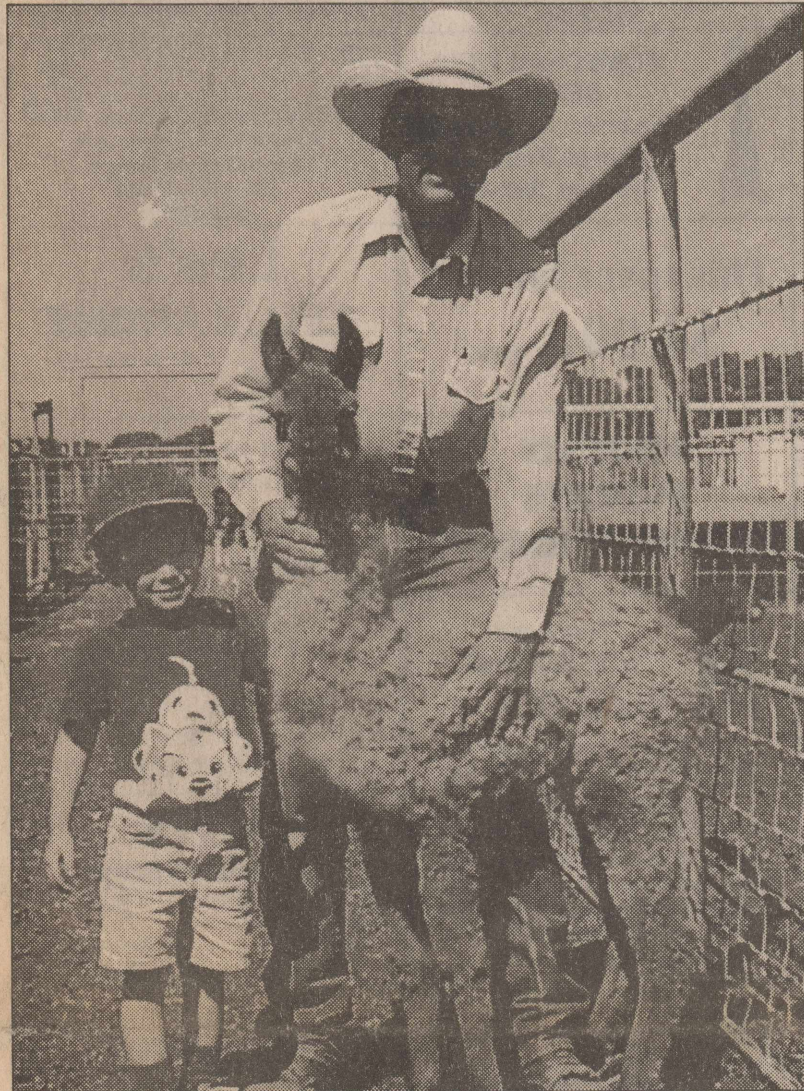
Bears are also monitored in the Big Bend, and there is a woman in Mexico who is monitoring bears as part of a research project. She reported that there are no signs of bear predation in livestock this spring be-

cause vegetation is so good.

This may keep the relocated bear where he is, Humphrey said. "He may set up a home range at Black Gap depending on how many other male bears are there." With breeding season near, bears who already have staked out their territory at Black Gap could drive him away.

This bear has not shown much aggression, either at the ranch or when he was released, Humphrey said. Landowners where he was captured said the bear came near the house while they were out on the porch barbecuing. At Black Gap on the morning after his release when his tranquilizer had worn off, the bear walked away from observers, looking back a few times, Humphrey said.

With people moving out into the brush country, there are more people out now to see these animals, she said.

Cloud Seeding Started

West Texas Weather Modification Association's cloud seeding program began its second year in this area on May 15. Crockett County's Emerald Underground Water District became a member of the association last year. That was the first of a four-year contract the association made with Pat Sweeney, owner of Weather Modification Inc. of Fargo, ND.

Two planes, a Cheyenne and a Cessna 340, are flying an area which includes Crockett, Glasscock, Sterling, Reagan, Irion, Schleicher, Sutton and eastern Tom Green counties, said Dennis Clark, EUWD manager. The area covered includes 7.2 million acres at a cost of .042 cents per acre. Funding comes from the districts involved plus \$50,000 from the University of Texas, \$40,000 from the City of San Angelo and \$169,000 from an emergency appropriation by the State Legislature.

This area of the state is not the only one operating a weather modification program this year, Clark said. The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District program includes 14 counties and 8 million acres. The Colorado River Municipal Water District at Big Spring includes six counties and 3.5 million acres. Eight counties and 5.4 million acres are in the South Texas Weather Modifica-

tion Association out of Pearsall.

Total appropriations by the state for all the associations is \$550,000. State dollars for the 1998-99 programs will include an additional four million in matching funds.

Cloud seeding will continue in this area through Sept. 15.

Vehicle Rollover Kills Big Lake Woman

Maria Antonia DeLaCruz, 42, of Big Lake died just outside of Ozona early Monday morning in a one vehicle accident.

The driver of the 1995 Chevrolet pickup involved in the accident was Israel DeLaCruz Castillo, also of Big Lake. Castillo was unable to negotiate the right-hand curve two miles north of Ozona on Hwy. 63 according to an accident report filed by Trooper Scott Frasier. The vehicle left the road and rolled approximately three times. Four persons were ejected from the pickup in the 4:05 a.m. accident.

Transported to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo were: Pablo Vasquez DeLaCruz, 31; Raymundo Villarreal, 44; Dena Castillo DeLaCruz, 17; Olga Maria Castillo, 17; and Elda Castillo DeLaCruz, 15. The driver was not injured.

Virginia Cotton Recognized For Students' Reading Improvement

Ozona Primary School teacher Virginia Cotton has been cited for outstanding performance in reading education. The Institute for Academic Excellence announced.

Mrs. Cotton, who teaches at Ozona Primary School, was awarded Reading Renaissance Model Classroom certification by the Madison, WI, based institute. Model Classroom certification indicates that Mrs. Cotton's efforts to adopt Reading Renaissance methods have resulted in measurable increases in student reading performance.

"Virginia exemplifies the kind of commitment to the success of every student that is at the heart of effective teaching," Institute President Barry Mirkin said in making the award.

To receive Reading Renaissance Model Classroom certification, teach-

ers must demonstrate that their students receive a minimum of 60 minutes of reading practice time daily. In addition, teachers must be actively working with individual students to meet institute-recommended standards for reading achievement.

In addition to national recognition, Mrs. Cotton will receive a grant of \$150 for this achievement, and Ozona Primary School will receive discounts on educational software and staff development opportunities.

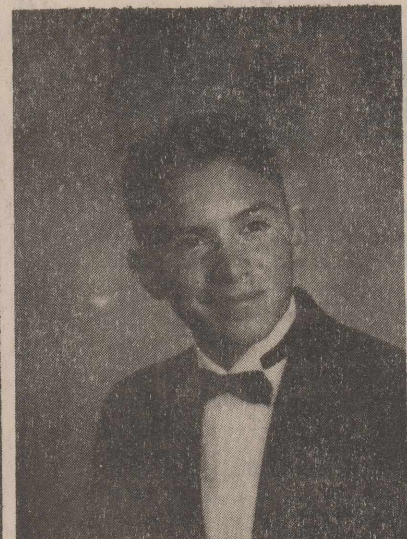

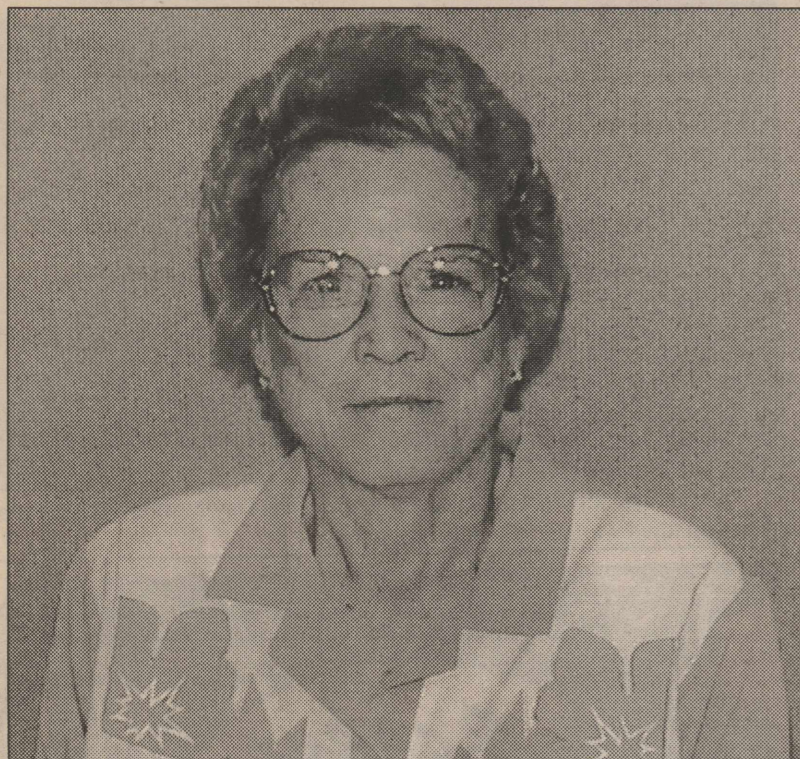

Mrs. Wilson is diabetic and controls her diabetes with diet. Two of the recipes she shares are sugarless.

Sugarless Fruit and Nut Bars

1/2 c. dates, cut in small pieces
1/2 c. raisins
1/2 c. prunes, cut in small pieces
1 stick margarine
2 eggs
1 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. vanilla
1/4 tsp. salt
1 c. flour
1/2 c. chopped nuts
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. nutmeg
Boil dates, raisins and prunes in 1 cup water for 5 minutes. Stir in margarine until melted and set aside to cool. When cool, add eggs, soda, vanilla, salt, flour, nuts and spices. Mix well. Coat a 7x11-inch pan with non-stick spray. Pour batter into pan and bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. Makes a good coffee cake.

Sugarless Apple Pie

6 med. Delicious apples, peeled and sliced
1 (6 oz.) can frozen, sugar-free apple juice
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 1/2 T cornstarch, dissolved in 1/4 c. water
3 T oleo
Place frozen juice in large pot. Add apples, bring to boil. Reduce heat and cook, covered, 5 to 10 minutes. Add comstarch-water mixture. Simmer 10 to 15 minutes. Add cinnamon. Fill unbaked pie crust with oleo. Put on top crust. Bake at 350 degrees for about 40 minutes or until brown.

Alma's Rum Cake

1 box yellow cake mix
1 small box vanilla instant pudding
4 eggs
1/2 c. cooking oil
1/2 c. water
1/2 c. rum
Mix all together and beat well. Pour in large bundt pan or two loaf pans. Cook 350 degrees for 35 to 40 minutes. Turn out as soon as it is removed from oven. Cook less time in loaf pans. Can test with toothpick.

Chop Suey Cake

2 c. flour
2 c. sugar
2 eggs
2 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt
1 c. chopped nuts
1 - 20 oz. can crushed pineapple, undrained
No oil. Mix all ingredients together. While baking at 350 degrees for 30 minutes, mix frosting:
1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
1 stick oleo
2 c. powdered sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
2 T milk
1 c. chopped pecans
Spread over hot cake.

Quick and Easy Casserole

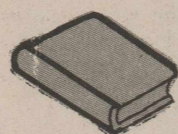
You can make any size. In baking pan, put fresh green beans in one end. Add chicken strips in middle. Cut new potatoes in fourths. Do not peel. Melt 1 stick oleo and spread over beans, chicken and potatoes. Shake one package of Good Seasons Italian Salad Dressing Mix over everything. Cover with foil and bake 1 hour, 15 minutes at 400 degrees.

Chicken Spectacular

Mix all ingredients. Pour into a 2 1/2 or 3-quart casserole. Bake 25 to 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Just before removing from oven, top with grated cheese. To freeze, do not cook prior to freezing. Serves 16.

Dirt Cake

1 pkg. Oreo Cookies, 20 oz. size
Process whole cookies until fine to look like dirt. Set aside.
1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
1/2 stick softened margarine
1 c. powdered sugar
Cream together. Set aside.
2 - 6 oz. pkgs. instant vanilla pudding
3 1/2 c. whole milk
Beat together and set aside to firm.
1 - 12 oz. carton thawed Cool Whip
Combine cream cheese mixture and pudding mixture. Fold Cool Whip into mixture.
Layer "dirt" and pudding mixture in flower pot. End with "dirt" on top. Place artificial flower in middle of pot. Place "goopy worms" throughout if desired.
Serve with garden spade or child's sand shovel.

Suchil Returns From Deployment

Navy Seaman Apprentice Rene U. Suchil, son of Manuel G. Suchil of Ozona, recently returned from a six-month deployment to the Western Pacific Ocean and Persian Gulf aboard the guided missile cruiser USS Cowpens.

Homeported in San Diego, Suchil is one of 390 sailors aboard the ship who operated with the USS Kitty Hawk Battle Group. Suchil's ship fulfilled duties as the battle group's air warfare commander, controlling the air space of all military aircraft and enforcing the U. N. imposed no-fly zone over Iraq. While patrolling in the Persian Gulf, USS Cowpens also operated as the battle group's ready strike platform, always alert for any possible tasking for Tomahawk missile strikes in support of U. S. and U.N. interests. USS Cowpens also had the opportunity to participate in a warfare-at-sea exercise with a submarine from the

Republic of Korea, as well as collaborative training with a ship from the British navy.

USS Cowpens is one of the most powerful warships ever put to sea. The computer-based AEGIS weapons system is the heart of the ship's war-fighting capability. It centers around a powerful radar that enables the crew to detect, track and fire at more than 100 targets at a time.

During the deployment, Suchil visited Australia, Bahrain, Hong Kong, Singapore and the United Arab Emirates. USS Cowpens earned distinction as the only U.S. ship to conduct a community project in Bahrain, as well as community assist projects during their other port visits. The projects ranged from yard care and painting, to renovations and upkeep of rundown shelters and churches.

The 1994 graduate of Midland Lee High School of Midland joined the Navy in April 1996.


