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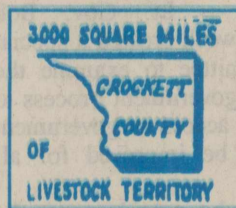

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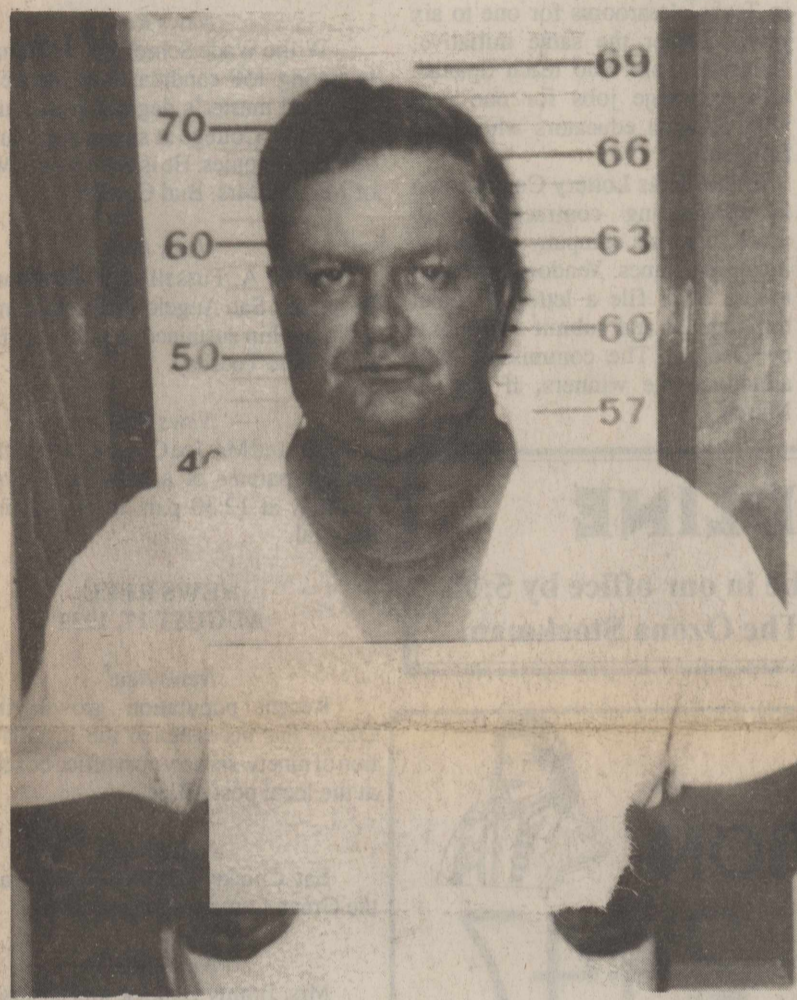

## Grand Jury indicts White



Melvin Wayne White of Ozona was indicted on six counts Aug. 15 in connection with the death of Jennifer Lee Gravell. The 9-year-old was reported missing in the early hours Aug. 5 and was found dead later that day north of Ozona. She was the daughter of Charlie and Beth Gravell of Ozona.

The indictment contains two counts of capital murder, two counts of murder and two counts of felony murder. All counts present that White intentionally caused the death of the child by striking her with an unknown blunt object.

Count One, capital murder, states that the death was intentionally caused in the course of committing and attempting to commit aggravated sexual assault and Count Two that the death was intentionally caused in the course of committing and attempting the offense of kidnapping.

Count Three, murder, presents that the child's death was intentionally caused by White striking and hitting her. Count Four says that White, while intending to cause serious bodily injury to an individual, committed an act clearly dangerous to human life, striking and hitting Jennifer Lee Gravell with a blunt object.

Count Five, felony murder, presents that Melvin Wayne White did intentionally and knowingly commit and attempt to commit the felony offense of aggravated sexual assault

directed against Jennifer and in the commission of the offense committed an act dangerous to human life, striking and hitting her and causing death.

Count Six, felony murder, presents that while in the course of committing the felony offense of kidnapping White committed an act dangerous to human life, striking and hitting the child and causing her death.

An indictment means that at least nine of 12 grand jurors believe there is cause for trial.

White, a nearby neighbor to the Gravell family, was brought in for questioning on Aug. 5 and was formally charged with capital murder in the death that afternoon. Bond was denied at the time of the arrest, and he remains in Crockett County Jail.

Capital murder charges may be filed under certain circumstances. Among them are when a death is caused in the course of committing or attempting to commit aggravated sexual assault or kidnapping.

Murder is the charge when a individual intentionally or knowingly causes the death of another.

## Lions intrasquad scrimmage productive

The 1997 Ozona Lions' football team was successful in running plays despite the hot weather. About 25 or so fans were on hand to watch the varsity line up against each other in an intrasquad scrimmage held in Lion Stadium Aug. 14.

"It was real good," said Ozona head football coach Walter Hargrove after the scrimmage. "The young guys were good along with the older guys. All of the guys have a good attitude. They all want to play football 100 percent."

A total of 29 varsity members participated in the scrimmage. Several good runs and passes were made along with good blocking and tackling. Of course, there were broken plays, blocked passes, missed tackles and fumbles, but the main point is that the Lions are coming together as a team.

The No. 1 varsity offense took the field against the No. 2 varsity defense. The offense was guided by quarterback Justin Browne. The No. 1 offense ran 12 plays, then the No. 2 offense ran 10 plays against the No. 1 defense.

"Really, it's 44 plays," said Coach Hargrove. "And really, it was our offense against our defense." Later on with complete scouting reports, the offense will work against their opponent's defense, and the Lion defense will work against some of their opponent's offensive formations.

The No. 1 offense scored twice with both scores coming on passes.

Robert Kelly, a tight end, caught one of the touchdown passes. The No. 2 offense scored once.

When asked about some strong and weak points of the Lions, Coach Hargrove said "conditioning wise, we are not where we should be. It's something that takes a while. We are in better shape than we had been in the past."

"Good things - our attitude and work habits. Every practice we have gotten better," Hargrove said.

Scrimmages are to evaluate who is qualified for what position and if any changes are needed. "We continue to evaluate people, and we will make changes to make it better," Hargrove said.

The Lions will have their hands full this Thursday evening as they face the District 15-A Rocksprings Ango-

ras starting at 6 p.m. in Rocksprings. The Angoras return from a 5-5 season and have 9-9 starters. They lost five lettermen last year.

Players to watch for are running back Johnny Flores, quarterback Will Narrell, guards Tony Ruiz and Ernie Pena, tackle Albert Navarro and strong safety Aaron Sales.

The scrimmage will start with the freshmen and junior varsity. They will probably run about 15 offensive plays. More than likely, the varsity will run 20 plays each. The main thing Ozona coaches are looking for in this scrimmage and the next one are responsibilities and technique according to Coach Hargrove.

Put on your traveling clothes, enjoy a pretty drive to Rocksprings and be ready to watch some good football.

## Trustees look toward bond election

In a special meeting of the Ozona School Board that was held on Tuesday, Aug. 12, the trustees approved an agreement for the purchase of attendance credits from the state for the 1997-98 school year. Superintendent Larry Taylor explained that the agreement had to be submitted to the Texas Education Agency before Sept. 1, and pending approval by Dr. Mike Moses, Commissioner of Education, the district will save between \$80,000 and \$100,000 by utilizing this option. Under the terms of the agreement, the district will not have to send in an

estimated lump sum payment of approximately \$2.2 million to the state for recapture in February but can pay equal installments for seven months (February to August), thus earning interest on the recaptured money.

The board also approved the district's 1997-98 Student Code of Conduct, which incorporates all of the changes in student discipline as required by the passage of Senate Bill 133 this past summer. The trustees discussed breakfast and lunch prices for the 1997-98 school year but took no action on this agenda item, thus leaving school cafeteria prices the same as last year. They did vote to increase student drivers education fees from \$125.00 to \$150.00 this year, and they approved a \$25.00 per month raise in the rental fee for school housing. The school housing raise will become effective on July 1, 1998.

The school board authorized Supt. Taylor to begin plans for a bond election to be held sometime before Jan. 31 of next year for the purpose of building a new Ozona Middle School. Following board approval Taylor said: "With this approval I can begin planning with Milton Halpern or Bob Henderson with the financial firm of RauscherPierce Refsnes, Incorporated who will then meet with the board and

the district architect at the regular board meeting in September with all of the details for board approval.

"These details will cover: proposed date of the bond election, projected costs, amount of bond proposal, interest rates, filing with the Federal Justice Department deadlines and legal requirements. The district architect will use the plans we had developed for replacing the middle school on our current site as our planning documents as the basis for all this."

Taylor went on to say that after Sept. 1 of this year, school construction bond money is no longer subject to recapture by the state; thus if the bond issue passes, all of the money will stay in the school district.

The trustees also held a review and discussion of the 1997-98 official estimated school year budget and tax rate, but no action was taken. Approval of the budget and the tax rate was on the agenda for the August regular meeting of the board that was held Aug. 14.

The board also approved the employment of new teachers Donna Wiley (Ozona Intermediate School), Kristine Lane (Ozona Middle School) and Terry Crawford (Ozona High School), and the employment of Cathy English as secretary at Ozona Intermediate School.

## First day enrollment up overall

Enrollment was up by 23 on the first day of school this year compared to 1996 figures, and more students usually come in for several days said Mae Lay of the administration office.

The 990 Aug. 14 enrollment figure is comprised of 230 primary students, 214 in intermediate, 225 at the middle school and 321 in high school.

The 230 number in primary school is up from 217 in 1996, 216 in 1995 and 212 in 1994. Ozona intermediate was down one at 214 compared to 215 in 1996. Enrollment in 1995 was 223 and in 1994 it was 196.

Middle school totals fell to 225 from 233 in 1996. The figure in 1995 was 251, up from 242 in 1994.

High school enrollment of 990 compares to 967 in 1996, 968 in 1995 and 926 in 1994.

1997 first day enrollment by class is: pre-kindergarten 27, kindergarten 72, first grade 63, second 68, third 75, fourth 69, fifth 70, sixth 70, seventh 84, eighth 71, ninth 71, tenth 102, eleventh 64 and twelfth 84. The largest increases are in the kindergarten and tenth grades.

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## State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

**AUSTIN** — Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock last week created a special Senate committee to examine the state's open government process to determine if access to government records can be improved for all Texans.

Bullock, who presides over the Senate, picked Sen. Jeff Wentworth, R-San Antonio, to chair the Senate Interim Committee.

The lieutenant governor also appointed Sen. Ken Armbrister, D-Victoria, Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston, Sen. John Carona, R-Dallas and Sen. Eliot Shapleigh, D-El Paso, to serve on the committee.

"The study is designed to explore all aspects of the Public Information Act and pinpoint areas of concern within the current framework — if they exist," Bullock said.

"The people of Texas have a genuine right to know how their government is being run. While agencies have an obligation to keep government open to public view, they also should have the opportunity to do so in a reasonable and resourceful way."

The committee will consider access to open records, roadblocks by government agencies, costs of providing information, abuses of the process, privacy issues and technological advances.

Bullock asked the committee to submit a status report by March 1, 1998 and a final report by Oct. 1, 1998. The panel is to make recommendations to the Legislature in 1999 if it is determined that problems exist in the public information process, Bullock said.

**Nursing Home Exec Punished**  
 The Texas Board of Nursing Home Administrators voted 8-0 last week to place a Rockdale nursing home administrator on probation for six months.

According to a 1994 report, state inspectors found urine and fecal odors, filthy linens and rooms; roaches in the kitchen and flies on residents; a broken emergency call button system; and bottles of prescription medication in an unlocked box on the floor of the administrator's office.

In the four years the state board has been in existence, the Rockdale case is the only one that has resulted in the punishment of a nursing home administrator.

The board, however, voted to close 109 cases of complaints against nursing home administrators.

On Sept. 1, the board's duties will transfer to and office in the Texas Department of Human Services, which licenses and inspects the nearly 1,200 nursing homes in Texas.

The Texas Legislature voted to create that office after the *Austin American-Statesman* reported on the failure of the current, industry-dominated board to punish administrators of substandard homes.

**Voters Approve Tax Break**  
 About 94 percent of those who cast ballots in the Aug. 11 constitutional amendment election voted in favor of the tripling of the homestead tax exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000.

The tax break will save the average homeowner about \$140 a year.

Gov. George W. Bush lauded

the results. "The people endorsed my efforts and the efforts of the Legislature to cut property taxes," he said.

The final count was 690,678 votes for the \$1 billion property tax cut and 41,388 against.

In November, voters will decide on 14 other proposed constitutional amendments, including whether increases in property values should be capped at 10 percent per year.

**Math Scores Up, English Down**  
 Texas students showed improved math skills on the ACT test this year, but English and reading scores dipped slightly, according to test results released last week.

Assessing the scores, Education Commissioner Mike Moses said he believes a statewide focus on reading in the early grades and new curriculum standards will help turn around the dip in English and reading scores.

On math, the average Texas score rose from 19.9 in 1996 to 20.2 this year. The national math average was 20.6.

**Other Capital Highlights**  
 ■ After Dec. 31, the public will no longer have access to audits that determine whether oil and gas companies are paying the royalty they owe the state for operating on public land in West Texas. Gov. Bush signed the audit-closing legislation into law in June.

■ Under a plan signed by Education Commissioner Mike Moses and officials from Spain, teachers from Spain will be allowed to teach in Texas classrooms for one to six years. Under the same initiative, Texas teachers who teach Spanish will exchange jobs for one year with Spanish educators who teach English.

■ The Texas Lottery Commission is considering contracting with more than one company to operate its online games. Vendors who want to bid must file a letter of intent by Aug. 22 and submit a proposal by Dec. 3. The commission will announce the winners, if any, in March.

### Snack time can be fun time

lowfat or nonfat milk products, means your kids will be off to a good start in life. Remember that making healthy food choices more available to children makes it easier to teach them good eating for a lifetime. It's important to realize that food choices made when you're young will affect food choices you make as an adult.

Here are some quick and easy recipes for homemade snacks:

#### Fruit Salad

**Ingredients:** Let kids select a combination of their favorite fruits - encourage them to try something new like kiwi, starfruit or mango if they haven't tried it.

**What to do:** Wash fruit, cut into pieces or fun shapes (try using small cookie cutters!). Place cut fruit in a bowl or plastic food bag and add a small amount of orange or lemon juice to prevent browning. Mix together with a spoon or by shaking the bag. If the salad won't be eaten immediately, place in a plastic food bag or cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate no longer than 24 hours.

#### Fruit Dip

**Ingredients:** 1 cup orange juice, 1/2 cup apple sauce, 1/4 tsp. cinnamon, dash nutmeg, 1 cup lowfat or nonfat vanilla or strawberry yogurt

**What to do:** Mix all ingredients and chill. Serve with fresh fruits of any kind.

#### Rainbow Vegetables

**Ingredients:** Tomatoes, carrots, yellow bell peppers, broccoli, purple cabbage

**What to Do:** Wash, cut up in fun shapes and arrange in rainbow shape on plate. Serve with dip made of 1 cup nonfat plain yogurt and 2-3 Tablespoons vegetable or onion soup mix (to taste)

#### Strawberry Milkshake

**Ingredients:** 3 to 5 fresh strawberries (thawed), 1/2 large banana, sliced, 1 cup skim milk

**What to do:** Combine all ingredients in a blender, process until thick and smooth. Makes two servings of one-half cup each. Try making with peaches, apricots and other favorite fruits.

Last week, I discussed the importance of breakfast for children. Also important but often forgotten is the importance of healthy snacking. Snacks are an important part of the diet for most kids - but unfortunately we parents don't always take the time to plan ahead and make sure they're healthy as well as tasty.

Children - up to the teen years - usually can't eat as much at one sitting as an adult. To get enough nutrients and calories in their diet for proper

growth and development, snacking is the best solution. Also, research tells us that it's healthier to eat several small meals during the day than to eat three large ones - the traditional breakfast, lunch and dinner.

When kids come home from a long day at school, they're usually ready for a snack - in fact, often starving! But treats shouldn't always be high in sugar like cookies, ice cream or powdered drink mix, or high in fat like chips or other popular snack items. It's up to parents to make eating healthy as well as fun - and all it takes is a little imagination and preparation.

Another important reason to think ahead about snacking is that parents can select less-expensive alternatives. Homemade snacks, fruits or juice are usually less expensive than highly processed, ready-to-eat snack foods. Again, it just takes a little thinking ahead.

It's important to involve your children in all parts of food and snack plans, including making lists, shopping and preparing. Kids will be much more likely to eat fruit salad or other healthy snacks if they helped to make them. If your children are too young to make snacks by themselves, do it together the evening before as a family activity.

Including kids in preparation is easy. It may involve cutting up fresh fruits and making a yogurt dip, or cutting foods into fun shapes like triangles or circles to make the food more appetizing. After cutting up fruits and vegetables, let the kids store them in plastic food storage bags, colored plastic wrap or plastic containers, and place in the front of the fridge where they're easily reached by the kids when they're hungry.

Encouraging kids to eat fruits and vegetables, as well as whole grains,

The summer heat has really taken a toll on our area lawns. The heat is slowing down the growth and has it looking sort of dull. St. Augustine has been hardest hit, but Bermuda grass has also been adversely affected. While being out on our mowing crew I've noticed some Bermuda-grass seems to be growing almost flat. The seed heads are standing up and makes the lawn look ragged. The Augustine is just looking kind of blah. With proper watering this will help. Also fertilizing with a product called Lawn Tonic will help. The Lawn Tonic contains 14% nitrogen, 10% iron, and 20% sulfur. This bag was tailor made for growth and color, which is just what many of us need. (Along with another good rain).

### Routine important for young people in doing homework

For young children, settling into a steady homework routine is a good lesson to learn.

The early years are the best time for parents to lay the foundation for good study habits, said Dr. Florence Eddins, a child psychiatrist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Eddins recommends teaching by example.

"When it comes time to do homework, sit nearby with some work of your own," she said. "But remember that a child's attention span is shorter; a child will need short breaks more frequently."

Some children need a play period before settling down. Eddins suggests experimenting to learn what works best for each individual child.

"If children have trouble establishing good routines, help them set limits for completion," Eddins said. "You will gradually find what works best."

Lines were staked into the Juno area in early 1947. Due to a scarcity of materials, in December of the following year there were still 195 miles of poles and hardware in the air with no wire to string on them.

The first field office opened in Ozona in 1952.

Southwest Texas Electric Cooperative, Inc. brought improvement to the lives of many rural families and also made service possible for companies with oil wells and pipe line pumps.

## Bonilla cosponsors National Right to Work bill

Texas Representative Henry Bonilla (R-23rd) has declared his support for the National Right to Work Act of 1997 (H.R. 59), joining 63 other members of Congress as cosponsors of a measure to repeal federal laws authorizing compulsory unionism.

During his 1996 campaign, Rep. Bonilla promised to "support repeal of the provisions in federal laws which authorize compulsory unionism."

"Congressman Bonilla is keeping his campaign promise to his constituents," said Reed Larson, president of the nearly two million-member National Right to Work Committee, which is leading the effort to pass the National Right to Work Act.

Larson urged House Speaker Newt Gingrich (R-GA) to join the growing ranks of National Right to Work cosponsors and fulfill his own campaign pledge to hold a roll-call vote on the National Right to Work Act as soon as possible.

"Now is the time to do what growing numbers of congressmen and nearly eight out of 10 Americans want us to do - pass a National Right to Work law and return to every American the Right to Work without having to pay dues to a union, a right the Congress should have never taken from working people in the first place."

The National Right to Work Act, sponsored by Rep. Bob Goodlatte (R-VA), will amend the 1935 national Labor Relations Act by repealing those provisions of federal law which authorize private-sector contracts forcing employees to pay union dues as a condition of employment.

"Every reputable poll shows that Americans overwhelmingly oppose forcing workers to pay union dues in order to feed their families," Larson

said.

"The leadership in Congress, which won election in part on their promise to support a National Right to Work law, owes it to the American people to hold an early vote on National Right to Work legislation. There is no excuse for inaction."

In a scientific opinion survey, conducted in August of 1995 by Political Media Research (Mason-Dixon), 76.6 percent of Americans said they supported employees' Right to Work regardless of whether or not they choose to join or pay dues to a union.

"There's no longer any serious debate about the economic benefits of Right to Work," Larson added. "States which have passed laws, overriding the federal pro-compulsion policy, are prospering."

According to the U. S. Labor Department, between 1960 and 1993,

the 29 states subject to federally-imposed forced union dues lost 10.6% - or 1.36 million - of their high-paying manufacturing jobs.

Meanwhile, in the nation's 21 states with Right to Work laws, high-wage manufacturing jobs grew 77.6 percent, or 2.68 million.

According to 1993 Labor Department figures, adjusted for cost of living, average per capita personal income is almost \$1,100 higher in the nation's 21 Right to Work states.

And a 1994 study by George Mason University economist James T. Bennett showed that a typical urban family in the nation's 21 Right to Work states earned \$2,852 more in after-tax purchasing power than a comparable family in a non-Right to Work state.

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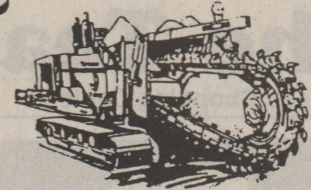

## Higher education initiative proposed for military

State Comptroller John Sharp proposed a statewide initiative to provide affordable, flexible college degree programs to military personnel stationed in Texas.

"The best way to compete for federal dollars, keep our military bases open and build a strong defense is to offer our troops the opportunity to advance throughout their careers," Sharp said. "This is especially critical as the military adopts high-tech systems for everything from warfare to base administration."

Dubbing his proposal "Operation Mortarboard", Sharp called on Texas colleges and universities to consider offering military personnel flexible course schedules, self-paced study programs and academic credit for military experience.

"Our state institutions of higher learning should be willing to cut the cost and inconvenience military personnel too often face when trying to pursue their college degrees," Sharp said.

Writing in the latest issue of his award-winning monthly publication, *Fiscal Notes*, Sharp noted that state lawmakers have in recent years taken important steps to smooth the way for military veterans, active-duty personnel and their dependents seeking higher educations.

In 1995, Sharp said, 9,600 veterans and their families took advantage of exemptions valued at more than \$5.4 million from course tuition and fees at state colleges and universities for those who were Texas residents before entering the service.

Sharp also noted that active-duty personnel and their dependents may pay lower in-state tuition rather than out-of-state tuition, saving them \$214 per hour. In 1995, 21,000 students took advantage of this benefit, valued at nearly \$15 million.

Students who participate in the Reserve Officers' Training Corps program and accept commissions in the Texas National Guard for at least four years are also exempt from tuition and fees, as well as room and

board, the Comptroller said. "We are trying to provide service men and women with tuition breaks and other opportunities," Sharp said. "But if colleges don't offer classes on or near their bases, all the tuition breaks in the world will be of little help."

Sharp also urged officials to carefully consider actions taken by state lawmakers during the recent legislative session to transfer the private University of Central Texas in Kilcenn to the Texas A&M University System next year. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, the UCT board of regents and A&M leaders must sign off on the change.

Sharp says that his "Operation Mortarboard" should address the unique needs of military students.

"These young people are highly motivated to learn," Sharp said. "But the nature of their careers means that they are also highly mobile."

"Texas colleges and universities could do more by offering them course credit based on military experience and training, as well as more flexible course schedules, distance learning and even classes over the Internet."

The Comptroller made the proposal in the pages of the current issue of *Fiscal Notes*, which is dedicated entirely to defense issues in Texas.

"As the state's chief financial officer, I understand the importance of the jobs and economic vitality the military brings to our state," Sharp said. "Along with the Texas Tomorrow Fund and other higher education opportunities, 'Operation Mortarboard' can help make the traditional Texas welcome for our troops even stronger."

## Encouragement builds writing skills

Young children love to write poems, stories, riddles and jokes. However, in school, where most writing activities take place, children have a hard time writing anything.

Children enjoy writing at home, because it is fun and they feel no pressure to receive a "good" grade on an assignment.

Because children like writing at home, parents need to encourage their children's writing skills. Once a child finds the joy in writing and practices at home, school writing exercises should become fun as well.

Parents need to provide children of all ages with the proper supplies. These include the tools of the trade: paper, pencils, pens and, if available, a computer or typewriter. A comfortable, quiet place to write and enough time to let the imagination soar also should be included. Children need this time to daydream and encourage creativity.

Children who enjoy reading and

want to make up their own stories are more eager to write on their own and for school assignments. To help prepare your children for a life-long love of reading, the Teachers & Writers Collaborative and The National Endowment for the Arts suggest trying the following steps.

- Read aloud to children, even when they are very little. Reading aloud offers a moment of intimacy with parents that brings about a good feeling for reading and books. Taking the time to read shows that you respect written words. Be sure to keep reading to your children, even after they learn to read on their own.

- Encourage children to read by taking them to the library. Even children who enjoy only simple books will move on to more advanced books as they mature. As a reward or present, give your children a book.

- Answer your children's questions and listen to their stories. If children don't think you care enough about what they say and the stories they tell, they will not feel confident enough to express themselves, either aloud or on paper.

Your response to your children's

writing is extremely important. If you are proud and praise their written work, they will be proud of it and want to continue writing. Point out what you like about their writing. Praising their strengths, instead of pointing out weaknesses, is a much more effective measure to encourage writing. Be specific and honest when praising. If you comment on everything they write with the same com-

pliments, the effect will be lost.

Once children feel confident in their ability to write on their own, writing in school will seem like less of a task — and they'll actually enjoy writing and completing assignments. Students will receive better grades and feel less pressure, which will make the school year a lot easier and more fun.

Donna Wiley enjoys her time in the classroom with kids. She previously taught kindergarten in Ropesville and one year in Muleshoe.

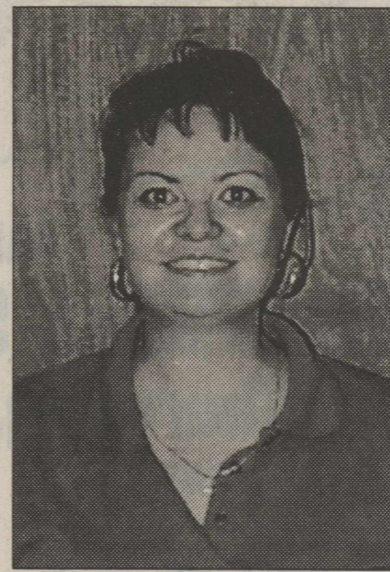

## Raising expectations for all students

On July 11, the State Board of Education cast an historic vote to approve the rewrite of our state's public school curriculum known as the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS). While much has been said about this document during its creation, now that it is final and soon to be implemented in each school, it is the final version of this document that Texans should judge. Hundreds of improvements, submitted by caring parents and teachers as well as respected experts in various fields of study, have resulted in a document which one noted scholar called, "among the best in the nation."

Creating this curriculum was not easy. Anytime an attempt is made to take all of the knowledge in the world and reduce it to a form that is manageable, there will be disagreements among those involved. This is especially true in a state such as Texas with more than 18 million citizens who often pride themselves on independence and traditional values. The views of all Texans were respected during this process, and, where possible, viewpoints from across the ideological spectrum were included. There is no doubt that this document is more conservative and rigorous than the early draft that was referred to as "mush" by Governor Bush. As a matter of fact, it was constructive criticism such as that offered by Governor Bush and others in favor of more rigorous academics that promoted numerous changes to the TEKS. In the end, those changes resulted in a document endorsed by groups of parents, professional education organizations, and some of the most esteemed scholars in the country including Dr. Diane Ravitch of New York University, Dr. Barbara Foorman of the University of Texas - Houston Health Science Center and noted historian T. R. Fehrenbach. It is also interesting to note that many of the individuals who helped draft an alternative English/language arts document known as the TAD eventually endorsed the TEKS standards for English/language arts, proving that working together in a constructive manner improved this process and strengthened our curriculum standards.

Under this curriculum, students will be asked to know, identify and list rather than simply "understand or explore" certain subjects. Students will be expected to know more, perform better, think more critically and communicate more effectively than under our current curriculum known as the "essential elements". First graders will learn more grammar and demonstrate the use of good punctuation skills. Third graders will be expected to know the planets and their relationship to the sun. Students in fourth grade will be expected to know their multiplica-

tion tables up to "12 times 12" and know about the founding fathers of our nation and the Constitution. Sixth graders will have an opportunity to read rich literature as determined by local decision-makers, such as Shakespeare's *Julius Caesar* and Dickens' *A Tale of Two Cities*. Ninth graders will be expected to understand algebraic and geometry concepts of greater rigor than before. Ultimately, high school graduates will have the opportunity to be literate, thoughtful citizens prepared for the challenges of the 21st Century. While some may still disagree, the fact remains that we are "raising the bar" on student performance every year in Texas; and this curriculum continues that goal through an ambitious set of standards which, I believe, are unmatched by

any state in the nation. The many thousands of individuals all across Texas who contributed to this process deserve our respect and gratitude for their efforts. In the end, this is not a document that belongs to the Texas Education Agency, nor the many men and women who assisted in its creation. It belongs to the citizens of this state for the benefit of all our children. As we begin the process of implementing this curriculum and our textbooks, tests and instructional strategies become more rigorous, the results will be obvious and, quite frankly, long overdue. We will have public schools that have the full confidence of the community, higher standards, and accountability to the taxpayers who make it all possible.

## Encouragement can help children have an A+ school year

Once again, it's time for children to go back to school. After a summer of fun and adventure, it may be hard for them to adjust to a new schedule of getting up early, going to school and coming home to do homework. With making new friends, working with different teachers, earning good grades, and trying out for sports teams and other groups, kids can be worn out by the end of September.

To help make the back-to-school transition easier for their children, parents can consider the following suggestions.

- To get their children excited about school, parents should be enthusiastic. They should be interested in their children's day — What did they learn today? Did they meet anyone new? How was the math test? With whom did they sit at lunch? Also, if they have the time, parents should become involved in school activities. If there is a school carnival, they should go with their children, or they should chaperone a daylong field trip. When parents are involved in school, their children are more likely to be too.

- When it comes to studying and earning good grades, parents should be supportive of their children. Instead of forcing them to do their homework, parents should encourage their children to study and help them set up an after-school schedule. Children usually respond more favorably to encouragement than force. If children come home with some bad grades on assignments, parents first should comment on the good points. Then, they should discuss the poor grades with their children — not yell at them. They should allow their children an opportunity to say why they think they got the low marks. Not only will parents be treating their children with respect, but they'll also help them become more responsible.

- When it comes to their children's friends, parents shouldn't make rash decisions before meeting them. Kids always are making new friends at school. Instead of basing their opinions of these new children on the stories they hear, parents should wait until they meet them. Parents may even want to have these kids over for dinner, so they can get to know them better. By doing this, they'll not only be making informed decisions, but they'll also be showing their children that they trust their opinion.

Support and encouragement from parents will make it easier for children to go back to school — and help them have an A+ school year.

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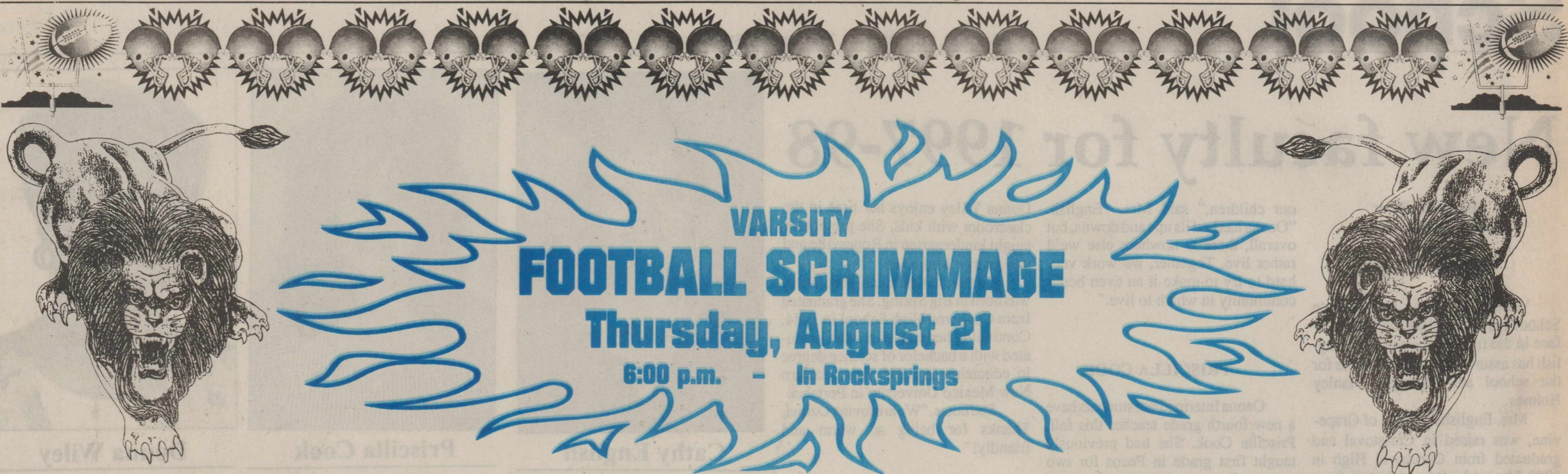

Part of the fun of the trip was traveling with friends from Big Spring who met them in Seattle. Smitty and

Mary Smith's daughter and family also joined the group.

Jim said he wanted to drive to Alaska the first time, but after traveling 11,800 miles altogether, the next trip will be by air.

## Sex offenders to be subject of senate study

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock announced on Aug. 14 the appointment of three senators to a special interim committee to study possible changes to state law concerning sex offenders.

Sen. Florence Shapiro, R-Plano, was selected by Bullock to chair the Senate Interim Committee on Sex Offenders. Sen. Eliot Shapleigh, D-El Paso, and Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston, also were named to the special panel.

"Sex offenders have unique characteristics that require specialized programs for incarceration, treatment and parole supervision," Bullock said.

"The state must be innovative in dealing with sex offenders and realize that prison time alone in many cases is not going to stop them from repeating this crime again," Bullock added.

Bullock requested the committee to study possible changes in law regarding judicial commitment to treatment facilities for both adult and juvenile offenders. He said the panel should review laws adopted by other states, such as Kansas, concerning sex offenders.

The committee has been asked to complete its final report by Oct. 1, 1998, and to issue a report on its progress before March 1, 1998.

## Bullock picks three for interim study on nursing home regulation in Texas

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock has announced three appointments to an interim committee that will focus on the state's system of regulating nursing homes and the availability of long-term care.

Bullock named Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, and Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, to the Long-Term Care Legislative Oversight Committee. Zaffirini, the author of the legislation that created the interim review, will serve as chairman when the committee begins its study.

Ken Kramer, professor emeritus at Trinity University in San Antonio, was chosen to be Bullock's public appointee to the panel.

The interim study was established this year by SB 190, which was aimed at eliminating abuse and neglect in nursing homes.

"The state has an obligation to ensure that our elderly citizens do not get tangled in a web of bureaucratic red-tape, regulatory inefficiency or a lack of access to long-term care," Bullock said.

The committee will attempt to pinpoint significant problems in nursing home regulation, determine the effectiveness of current standards and assess the general availability of long-term care.

Two House members and a public appointee by House Speaker Pete Laney also will serve on the panel. The study is due in November 1998 for recommendations to the Legislature in 1999. The committee will resume its ongoing interim study after the 1999 session.

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## 4-H exchange trip, part III . . . . Kentucky 4-H'ers amazed by Texans

We may have been a little too much at times. One of the first questions we were asked by our hosts was whether or not to believe anything Ray said. Well...

Bright and early the morning after our arrival, we formed our merry group at the Shelby County Extension Office. It was pretty obvious that most of us had bonded well with our host families. Amanda was her usual bubbly self. Jason was the center of attention in his family - even though they did have 10 children ranging in age from toddler to adult. Trey's family was adjusting to their surprise - due to a mixup, they were expecting a 10-year-old boy.

It was pretty early for those of us who stayed up late visiting with our hosts and telling wild tales about mountain lions and distances we have to drive for ball games and going to a hospital. Of course, all these stories were true - but we have the sneaking feeling they really didn't believe us!

We're off! Off to Churchill Downs, home of the Kentucky Derby. The first sight of the massive race track complex is quite awe-inspiring. It simply doesn't look that huge on television. We trooped into the Derby Museum for a short talk on the importance of horse racing - and the Derby itself - to the Kentucky economy, including what it costs to own, raise and train - let alone race - a thoroughbred horse. We then moved into the museum for a terrific 360-degree video show on the Derby experience. Imagine our surprise when famous trainer Nick Zito walked in...We got his photo with the group, then started on our tour of the facilities. We walked into the stands and were lucky enough to see a couple of horses exercising on the track. We then saw a direct descendant of Man O'War, and went back into the museum.

The high point of the museum for many of us was seeing Miles, world's biggest jockey - on the Fiberglas horse in a starting gate display. All we can tell you is - don't miss the slide show at the banquet!

We also saw the blanket of roses worn by Silver Charm this year. They're freeze-dried and kept for a year on display before being given to the owners of that year's winner. The museum features many interactive displays and absolutely the best gift shop we visited.

We were also privileged to go on a later tour which went to the saddling enclosure and down the tunnel through which the horses enter the track. It was a near-religious experience for some of us. One thing we didn't realize - the winner's circle you see on Derby day is reserved for the winner of the Kentucky Derby only - he is the only horse that gets to stand there - all others go to another spot!

After Churchill Downs, we got a real Kentucky experience - eating White Castle Hamburgers. What's so different about that, you ask? For starters, each one is only about four inches square. People order three or four at a time. They have grilled onions and cheese on them, the little buns are very soft, and they are unique. They are a tradition in that part of the country, and most people either love them or hate them.

The next stop was Kentucky Kingdom, an amusement and water park. The temperature was approximately 150 in the shade - if there had been any. Kentucky Kingdom's main attraction is the highest, fastest, longest standing roller coaster in the world, "Chang". Eventually some of us figured out we could go to the virtual reality ride inside in the air conditioning and cool off. The adults spent the hottest part of the day huddled around a little picnic table with its umbrella pulled down as low as we could get it...just picture a bunch of sheep on a hot day in a field with one little oak tree - get the idea? We were buying \$1.50 bottles of cold water and pouring them over us. The kids did enjoy the water park and the rides, and other than some adult throwing a small

stuffed animal off the Ferris wheel, we behaved pretty well. Amy really liked the splashy water ride - and especially the gallant efforts of Tedra and Ray to help her cool off afterward on the bridge.

The second day saw us starting out for a horse farm. We saw a stallion by Northern Dancer named Nureyv. He had broken his leg shortly after being retired from racing, and it cost a million dollars to put him back together, as well as the fact that he had to spend five months in a body sling. He was truly beautiful, and he is really a money-maker for the farm.

Next, we went to the Kentucky Horse Park. The only problem with this stop is that it was simply too short - there were so many things to do and see. The Museum of the Horse is incredibly good, and the exhibits were truly wonderful. It was a little shocking to realize the life-size horses were just that - stuffed horses - but it added to the realism of the exhibits. The museum features every kind of horse - you name it, you can learn about it. We enjoyed seeing the Calumet Farm trophies - the case full of triple crown trophies was unbelievable. The neatest experience, however, was the Hall of Champions. We walked up the hill and caught the afternoon show, which features real champions like thoroughbred race horse John Henry. They walk the horses out and tell about them. Most of the horses are in their 20's but still look like champions.

Next we traveled through some of the most beautiful countryside you can imagine to the Labrot and Graham Distillery. Kentucky is famous for its bourbon whiskey, and the process for making it is incredibly intricate. This isn't Snuffy Smith and his still! Every step is closely watched by experts. The inside of the historic distillery was extremely hot - but fascinating. The distillery has the largest copper pot stills used in the world, and seeing the exhibit on how the barrels are made was also very interesting. At the end of the tour we were given - fooled you! Bourbon balls and apple cider. No tasting of the product is allowed.

We were surprised to learn that KU - as it is known has only 26,000 students, compared to over 40,000 for A&M. There was nearly a riot among the Red Raiders, T-Sips and Ags in the group as we "discussed" which school is the best in Texas. That was another difference, because apparently if you're from that part of Kentucky, at least, your blood runs Wildcat Blue. No question about it.

We completed the day with a cookout by the Kentucky Contingent at tranquil Lake Shelby Park. This place looked for all the world like a jigsaw puzzle, with perfectly still water, gorgeous trees of every type, and green, green grass. Some of us visited with the Ag agent and learned which trees were hickory and other types we don't have around here.

Wednesday was to be a free day...an activity was planned, but everyone really wanted to be on their own with their host family. Some of the group got together and toured some agricultural sites, and we hear Miles never even got lost! Some of us washed clothes and visited, some went shopping in Shelbyville and other sites. Several of us, including Amy and her family, ate a real Southern meal at Claudia Sanders' Dinner House - a restaurant Colonel and Mrs. Sanders started after they became rich from Kentucky Fried Chicken. A couple of people went to Simpsonville and waterskiied - Ashlee and Laurie had a blast on the lake. It was a relaxing day - important because the next day would be tough. We would tour a whole day and start home at 5 p.m. from Louisville, trying to get Trey home for the rodeo Friday night. Would we make it? Find out next week.

Once again, 4-H'ers will be preparing their lambs, meat goats, steers and swine for another exciting year after an unbelievable 1997. Most Crockett County 4-H'ers involved in the lamb feeding program have been busy with their new projects since June. 4-H'ers had the opportunity to acquire excellent prospects during the Crockett County Club Lamb Sale and from local producers. 4-H meat goats have been the fast growing project. Members are currently busy selecting prospects in hope of a champion for the new year. There will probably be somewhere in the neighborhood of 100 goats on feed this year.

Swine projects will begin later

this fall in September and October when 4-H'ers begin to turn their piglets into hogs.

The Crockett County 4-H rabbit projects are sure to be a big hit as numerous 4-H members participate in project meetings in order to prepare their animals.

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
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

## Prize scam hitting Permian Basin

The Better Business Bureau of the Permian Basin recently received an inquiry about a company called Mega-Bucks. The caller had been told she had won \$299,000. The bureau has received similar inquiries before, but this one has a new twist.

According to the caller, the company said they had registration booths at carnivals and fairs, etc., and that her name had been entered and she was the winner. The company stated she was not to send any money to them. However, when the courier comes to her home with her cashiers check she would be responsible for a \$9,000 cashier's check, made out to J. L. Nadear, to pay taxes and other miscellaneous fees.

The BBB has learned that the Federal Bureau of Investigation has received calls from other consumers receiving the same "good news" and requests for payments. According to the FBI official, other people have been coaxed into issuing the "tax and

other miscellaneous fees" check in advance. On at least one occasion, the customer was told her check had not been received, and she sent another one. At least one individual was reported to have sent \$24,000 in advance fees to Mega-Bucks. There are apparently no records of anyone actually receiving the \$299,000.

An investigation is underway by the FBI, and Permian Basin residents are warned that the slogan of the BBB is the same as it has always been. "If it sounds too good to be true, it is!"

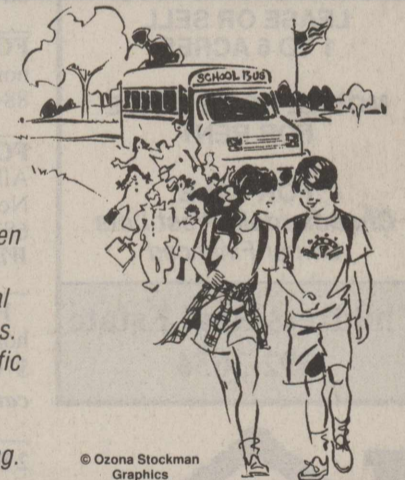

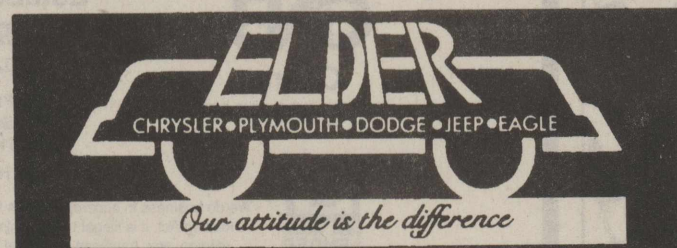
