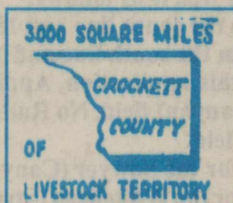

To stand trial for the 1990 murder of Dean Phillips

Taylor extradited from Utah

Paul Wesley Taylor, indicted for capital murder in the beating death of Dean Phillips in December of 1990, was brought from Utah by DPS aircraft back to Crockett County Jail for booking Wednesday, Sept. 3.

Assisting Sheriff Fenton in the extradition were Texas Ranger Jerry Byrne and Chief Deputy Alton Davis.

The 83-year-old Phillips was brutally murdered by multiple blows to the head with a blunt instrument Christmas Eve night 1990 in his laundromat. Phillips had gone to the laundromat adjacent to his home to close it for the day.

At the time of Taylor's indictment, he was an inmate at the Utah Department of Corrections in Draper, UT. He had been scheduled for a parole hearing on July 10. Prior to the grand jury indictment on June 18, 1997, and at the request of local officers, Taylor was moved from the minimum security facility to a maximum security facility.

Media present to cover the return of Taylor and the extradition team were the national television crew of *America's Most Wanted*, Bob Curry, Ron Zimmerman and Bill Riley, and a reporter from *The Ozona Stockman*. Taylor, who has a violent crime history, which includes assault charges according to Ranger Byrne, remained silent to reporters' questions after his arrival at Ozona Municipal Airport.

The film crew of *America's Most Wanted* asked him if he was proud to be returning to Ozona and Crockett County. Taylor had no response. They also asked him if he had anything to say to the Phillips family. He again remained silent.

Before coming to Ozona Wednesday, the film crew interviewed Mrs. Phillips in San Angelo. Mrs. Phillips said,

"I hope he gets what's coming to him."

After the initial investigation into the murder slowed to a halt with all possible leads checked, messages were sent to all police agencies along Interstate 10. Many suspects were reported as possibles, but all were checked and discarded. With the assistance of the Texas Rangers and FBI, a federal warrant was issued for an unknown person (John Doe) in connection with the murder. A possible suspect was developed through local witnesses recall-

ing a white male in an old blue van looking for laundromats. An image of the individual was captured on the store video at Maness Texaco. This was the prelude to having Phillips' murder broadcast on one of the nation's television series for unsolved crimes. It was eventually aired on *America's Most Wanted*.

More than 50 tips were received by the studio after the show. Texas Ranger Jerry Byrne started going through the tips in search of possible suspects. One seemed to fit the description as given by the local witnesses. The suspect was in prison, and at Ranger Byrne's request, the man's photos and fingerprint card were sent to Ozona. The fingerprint card was turned over to the Texas Department of Public Safety's lab in Austin. They confirmed that the suspect's fingerprint matched one found on one of the laundromat machine coin boxes at the murder scene.

A search was then on for a person or persons who might have been with the suspect when the crime was committed. Records received from Georgia and Florida indicated that a female may have been with the suspect during that time period. Computer searches and calls to police agencies in Georgia and Florida came up with a name. A local detective in Georgia confirmed that this person was presently paying a water bill in their town. Ranger Byrne and Sheriff Shane Fenton immediately left for Georgia.

The woman was questioned and provided officers with an account of

the crime and approximately where the suspect discarded his bloody clothing and the murder weapon.

Sheriff's Department personnel, Texas Rangers, and local Highway Patrol officers combed the area. Approximately nine items were collected for lab analysis. Among these items was a coin box resembling one that came from the machines in the laundromat. "We can't say with 100% certainty that this box came from one of the machines in Phillip's laundromat," Sheriff Fenton stated in an interview with *America's Most Wanted* film crew. "All of the machines have been sold since the murder. The building has been torn down and two of the machines were sold to a fellow in Sheffield," the sheriff said.

Sheriff Fenton was asked if any of the articles found in the search had been sent to the Texas Department of Public Safety's lab in Austin, and he replied, "All of the articles found at the scene had aged to the point that any lab tests would be futile. There would be nothing left after all these years to test. We have not found the murder weapon yet."

The sheriff further stated that his department would still be beating the bushes looking for this suspect if it had not been for the good people of the national television show *America's Most Wanted*.

Taylor was arraigned by District Judge Brock Jones Friday, Sept. 5.

America's Most Wanted will televise their Ozona segment on Sept. 13.

Killer bees confirmed

Bees which killed three dogs north of Ozona have been confirmed as Africanized, County Agent Miles Dabovich said Tuesday. A swarm of bees in Ozona Monday is not believed to be the Africanized type, however.

Court approves 1998 budget

Commissioners voted to approve the 1998 budget with no changes at the conclusion of a budget hearing Monday morning prior to their regular court meeting. The vote came after a request by Justice of the Peace Jim Hearne for a second clerk in his office. Hearne said his office handles around 5,000 cases per year now. Revenues brought in through his office for the first six months of 1997 are \$140,351 compared to \$100,024 for the same period on 1996 and \$75,000 for the first six months of 1995, Hearne said. Increases in fees and fines by the legislature have brought about an approximate 20 percent increase across the board.

Changes in plans for seal coating streets were made by Commissioners Frank Tambunga and Rudy Martinez due to water district work when Road Supt. Eddie Moore gave his report. Court members also discussed with Moore the permit fees the county charges for cutting of rural roads. Commissioners voted to have Moore meet with County Attorney Bill Mason to draw up a policy for road cuts and repairs.

NatGas owner Norman Smith and employee Ed Hale met with the commissioners to ask payment for gas used by the road barn over a three year period. The discovery was made in February of this year that a meter at the road department was not registering usage.

A vote on a motion to pay 75% of

the \$13,409.07 estimated by Smith as owed failed with Judge Sutton and Tambunga voting for and Commissioners Fred Nicks and Rudy Martinez against. Commissioner Fred Deaton was not present for the meeting. The court voted to pay half the amount, which Smith accepted.

The court voted to approve a contract with Tom Green County for detention of juveniles. A request was heard from a citizen requesting action regarding the odor caused by farm animals being kept on Largo Street. The person was told that the county attorney will take care of the problem. An alcohol and drug testing contract was reviewed and an on-line data processing service contract for the tax office was tabled until Bill Mason can see the contract.

Regular monthly reports were heard from Louise Ledoux for the library, Janet McDaniel for Helping Hands, Garland Young for the civic and youth center and Steve Kenley for the sheriff's department. Mrs. McDaniel showed 1278 meals served by Helping Hands during August. A written report from Bob Falkner, fire chief, listed 1 assistance response, 7 grass fires, 3 vehicle fires and two investigations during August.

Also on the agenda was an item to open bids for a new Senior Citizens' Center. There were no bids, and this will be re-advertised later.

Crockett County tax rates set

Tax rates for the county and school district were set by commissioners at their meeting Sept. 8. The official 1998 budget for Crockett County shows a total tax rate of .70 per \$100 valuation. Of this, .511 is earmarked for the general fund, .043 for the interest and sinking fund, .011 road and bridge special fund and .135 for the farm to market road fund. The tax rate for 1997 is .75137.

The tax rate for the school is \$1.30 per \$100, down one cent from 1997. Emerald Underground Water District's tax rate for 1998 is .0235 per \$100 valuation compared to .01427 in 1997.

The county tax rate will fund a budget which includes \$7,732,502.00 in net receipts and \$7,249,755.00 in disbursements. Disbursements include

\$3,555,075.00 general fund, \$320,000.00 interest and sinking fund, \$1,167,599.00 road and bridge fund, \$367,583.00 hospital/health center, \$1,706,498.00 care center and \$133,000.00 EMS.

The school's budget includes \$8,988,840.00 local maintenance, \$350,900.00 food service and \$28,594.00 technology.

Lightning causes grass fire, burns 7 1/2 sections

A thunderstorm Wednesday, Sept. 3, caused two fires north of Ozona which burned 7 1/2 sections across three ranches and to the Texas Experiment Station land. Lightning set two fires which burned together on the Dublin Ranch and cut a swath across the Bissett and Childress ranches before being stopped at the road going into the Experiment Station.

"This was a very difficult fire," said Bob Falkner, fire chief. "The wind changed direction at least three times." Firemen set up on Hwy. 190, and the fire stopped there and went into the corner at Midway Lane and turned north.

Firemen from Big Lake and Barnhart came to assist. The Barnhart department was called home for a grass fire, and a fire north of Big Lake was handled by North Reagan County and Sterling City firemen. Eldorado firemen started to the Crockett County location, but their truck was called

back for a fire in Schleicher County. "We ended up with everything we had out there," said Falkner. As

people got in from work and were able to go out, the Ozona trucks headed

Look who's in the kitchen

Cook of the Week Martha Gries and her husband, Terry, experienced food around the world during his career in the U. S. Air Force, but ingredients are not readily available in West Texas for some of the dishes they liked.

During their three and a half years in The Netherlands, Martha learned to cook Indonesian dishes. That food is very spicy, very good and very complicated, said Martha. Adapting the recipes to a West Texas way of cooking still allows the family to enjoy the food without having all the ingredients.

In The Netherlands you went to a separate store for everything, Martha remembers. Vegetables and milk could be brought to the house, but you went to the butcher shop for meat, the cheese store for cheese and so on. Brian at age 3, had to learn Dutch in kindergarten, and he was valuable as a translator on these shopping trips.

"The kids like Tex-Mex food, our staple," said Martha. When the Gries boys, Brian and George, come home with their families, Martha cooks a lot in town and takes the food to the ranch. "My food is exhausted from being on the road," said Martha of the trek to Pandale from Ozona. "I grew up in the Pandale area and we had no fresh vegetables or fruit."

Martha's advise to beginning cooks is to collect many recipes. "It is important to have a lot of recipes to try," she says.

The three she shares are definitely keepers.

BLACK EYED PEAS

1 lb. dried black eyed peas, sorted and washed
 1 T Season All seasoned salt
 1 tsp. black pepper
 1/2 tsp. Cayenne
 1/8 T paprika
 1 onion, chopped
 1/4 tsp. MSG
 1 c. celery, chopped
 1/2 c. sweet red pepper, chopped
 3/4 c. bell pepper, chopped
 1 tsp. cumino seed
 1/8 T garlic, fresh or powdered
 1/8 c. butter
 Tabasco Sauce to taste
 Saute onion, celery, garlic, peppers and spices in butter. In large stew pan, cover sorted and washed peas with cold water. Pour saute mixture into pan with peas. Add a piece of salt pork for flavor. Cover and simmer slowly until peas are done and soup has thickened.

CORN CASSEROLE

1 - 16 oz. can cream-style corn
 1 egg
 1 c. sharp cheddar cheese, grated
 3 T sugar (optional)
 1 - 16 oz. can whole kernel corn, drained
 2/3 c. fresh cream or condensed milk
 1 c. Ritz Crackers, crushed
 1/4 lb. butter or margarine
 1 onion, chopped
 1 can green chiles, chopped
 Salt, pepper and Tabasco to taste
 Mix all ingredients together; pour into 3-quart ovenproof casserole. Bake in 350 degree oven 50 to 60 minutes.

Dorothy's Cornbread

The cornbread recipe shared by Dorothy Montgomery last week is reprinted with instruction clarifications. Try this recipe. You'll like it.

Mix well: 1 c. cornmeal, 1/2 c. flour, 1 tsp. salt
 Add: 1 c. buttermilk, 1/2 c. sweet-milk, 1 egg, 1 T baking powder, 1/2 tsp. soda.

Melt 1/4 c. shortening in pan in which you plan to cook the cornbread. Mix the melted shortening into the batter and pour back into pan. Bake at 450 degrees. Serves 16 or 18 pieces.

This recipe may be halved. Use the whole egg, however.

FROZEN FRUIT SALAD

1 c. sugar
 1/2 c. lemon juice
 1 - 16 1/2 oz. can Royal Anne pitted cherries, drained
 2 cans Mandarin orange sections, drained
 1 - 15 1/2 oz. can and 1 small can crushed pineapple, drained (reserve juice)

1 c. mayonnaise
 1 c. whipping cream, whipped
 1/2 c. pecans
 In a large bowl, combine sugar and lemon juice, mixing well. Add fruits. Blend mayonnaise and whipped cream. Add with pecans to fruit mixture. Pour into greased 2 1/2 to 3 quart mold. Freeze (may be frozen 2 weeks in advance).

DRESSING FOR FRUIT SALAD

1 c. sugar
 2 T flour
 2 eggs
 1/2 c. lemon juice
 1/2 c. pineapple juice
 1/2 c. orange juice

In saucepan, mix sugar and flour. Add eggs and whisk. Add juices and cook slowly until thick, stirring often. Refrigerate. Serve with unmolded salad.

Doctor's discovery may end obesity

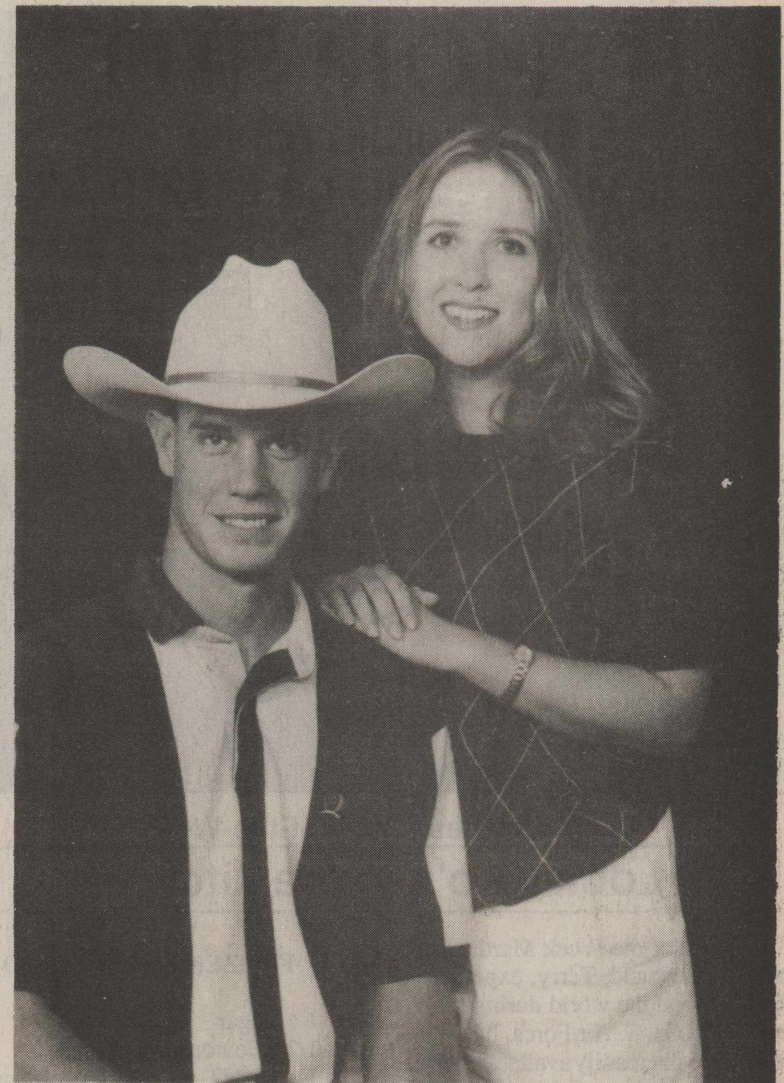

Lions overpower Owls 11-0 in season opener

Football games can get very interesting in just a short period of time. The Ozona Lions came up with two safeties and a touchdown to defeat the District 4-3A Reagan County Owls 11-0 in Big Lake last Friday night.

In his third year at Ozona High School, head coach Walter Hargrove said, "It was a great team effort both offensively and defensively and the kicking game. Overall, we played really well defensively."

About the win, he said, "It was a big win for us. We were uptight. We appreciate everyone being there, as we had a good crowd."

The Lion's defense went to work in the first quarter, as the Owls received the ball first, then several plays later they had to punt from their own 30-yard line.

Ozona received the ball on their own 44-yard line. Ozona quarterback Justin Browne scampered for a 19-yard run to the Owls' 37-yard line. Two plays later, Browne ran to the Owls' 15-yard line. The Owls dug in and held the Lions two plays along with an unfortunate Lion holding penalty. This put the ball on the Owl's 26-yard line, but a 20-yard pass play from Browne to Kenny Vargas placed the ball on the Owls' 6-yard line. In two plays Ross Crawford took the ball to the 2-yard line. On the next play with 5:12 minutes left in the first quarter, the Lions fumbled and the Owls recovered on their own 1-yard line.

With an Ozona offside penalty, the Owls got the ball out to the 6-yard line. The Owls fumbled the ball deep in their backfield, which was in the end zone and an Owl back was tackled by a Lion player for a safety with 3:18 left in the first period giving the Lions a 2-0 lead.

Ozona received the kick from the Owls on their own 36-yard line. Rick Hamon picked up nine yards on a run and Kenny Vargas caught a 4-yard pass, but in a sense it was all for naught as the Lions were penalized twice, forcing them to punt the ball.

Actually, a good defensive battle took place in the second quarter and on through the rest of the game. "Defensively, we played really well," said Coach Hargrove. "This time of the year, the defense will be ahead of the offense."

Ozona tried a field goal with 2:39 left in the second quarter. The 34-yard try by kicker Matt Galindo was no good. The Owls were once again stopped by the defense. Then the Lions took over and reached the Owls' 40-yard line when the first half ended with the score Ozona 2, Reagan County 0.

In the third quarter Ozona received the ball and moved it into Owl territory. The Ozona linemen opened up some good holes for some nice runs by Rick Hamon and Justin Browne. Ozona took the ball down to the Owls' 6-yard line, but the Owls put up a good defense. They manhandled Hamon for a 6-yard loss on a fourth-and-five play.

Reagan County took over on their own 15-yard line. This time the Lion defense got back down to business to stop the Owls. The Lions showed their fans what they are made of, by digging in and throwing the Owls for a loss on three different plays. Owl's punter and quarterback Jeremy Ramirez tried to punt the ball out of his end zone when defensive tackle Matt Galindo got in to block the punt and tackle the punter for an Ozona safety. With that score the Lions took a 4-0 lead with 1:48 left in the third quarter.

The Lions received the kick on the Owls' 48-yard line. Wesley Flores picked his way for a 12-yard run and Hamon five yards, but Browne loss yardage in scrambling with the ball on a pass.

"We had breakdowns in our routes and pass protection. They were blitzing a lot," Coach Hargrove said. "We've only had three experienced players on the offensive line. We are still learning. It's just a little different game than Thursday night."

As the quarter ended, the Lions had the ball on their own 44-yard line. A penalty moments later forced Browne to punt the ball with the Owls receiving it on their own 20-yard line.

In discussing the penalties, Coach Hargrove said, "We had some holding, blocking in the back, and off sides. All those we can fix. We had no personal foul penalties, which was a credit to our kids. We played every snap hard and didn't let that bother us. Offensively, it put us in a hole several times."

On the second play, the Owls fumbled the ball and the Lions recovered it on the Owls 23-yard line. Ross Crawford took the helm with Browne, Hamon, and Flores running the ball along with Brian Badillo. Badillo scored from one yard out with 7:28 minutes left in the final period. Galindo kicked the extra point to increase the Lions' lead to 11-0.

The Owls received the kickoff on their own 10-yard line. Two plays later, they fumbled the ball and Ozona's Anthony Ortiz recovered it on the Owls' 11-yard line. Hamon took the ball down to the 4-yard line, but a play later the Lions were called for delay of game. On a fourth-and-seven Galindo kicked a 25-yard field goal, but it was called back on a holding penalty. The next try was from the 40-yard line, but it was blocked with about 4:38 left in the game.

Coach Hargrove and his staff saw a lot of things they did well and a lot of places where they need more work. "We had a lot of bad things happen to us, we played emotionally, but it didn't bother us—we worked together," he said. "We had some opportunities early in the game, but we shot ourselves in the foot. The effort is there and the good attitude is there. You can overcome a lot of those things and have a good team."

The statistics of the game are interesting as well as how the game occurred. The Lion defense held the Owls to two first downs, a negative 19 yards rushing on 26 carries, and only two passes caught of nine thrown for only 23 yards. They had six fumbles and lost three. They were only penalized three times for 12 yards compared to the Lions' 100 yards in 12 penalties.

The Lions came up with a lot of good defensive plays. Leading that defensive effort was senior defensive end Rusty Bishop with 14 tackles. He was followed by Dustin Shaffer nine, Justin Browne eight, Tim Maldonado

five, Wesley Flores and Robert Kelly with four each, Matt Galindo, Donnie Bullard, Rick Hamon, and Michael Bullard with three each, Kenny Vargas two, and Anthony Ortiz, Brian Badillo, John Esparza, Jamie Ramos, Ty Mitchell, Will Roane, and Gabe Tambunga with one tackle each.

Browne led the Lions in rushing with 117 yards on 14 carries. Rick Hamon had 94 yards, Wesley Flores 18, Tim Maldonado 10, and Ross Crawford three yards.

Browne had trouble throwing the ball with a completion of two of nine passes for 26 yards and Crawford threw one incomplete. Kenny Vargas caught the two passes thrown by Browne for a total of 26 yards.

Coach Hargrove was impressed with the kickoff return team which is called the "Dirty 18". They held on two kickoffs—one to the 10-yard line and the other to the 14-yard line. Our goal is to keep it inside the 25-yard line. These guys take a lot of pride in that."

Looking to this week, the Lions will host the District 4-3A Sonora Broncos, starting at 8 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 12 in Lion Stadium. New head coach Dale Heath led the Broncos to a 24-8 victory over the Wall Hawks last week, so the Lions will have their hands full on Friday night.

The Broncos are learning a new system from a new coach. They will be running a Wing-T offense and a 50 or a multiple defense. "This is what they base out of," said Coach Hargrove. "They play some even defenses, too. They have some good skill people and are pretty big."

The Broncos, with 19 returning lettermen, are coming off of a 6-4 1996 season and return 5-3 starters. Players to watch are linebacker Brad Legan, linemen David Arevalo, Andy Sanchez, Nathan Avela, Chris Braly, and Scott Perez, wide receiver Kasey Wood, running back Terry Stone, and quarterback Justin Matthews.

Reserve seat tickets for the remaining four home games are \$20 and are available at the school administration office. The office is open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. This week's pep rally will be held in Davidson Gym at 12 noon on Friday, Sept. 12.

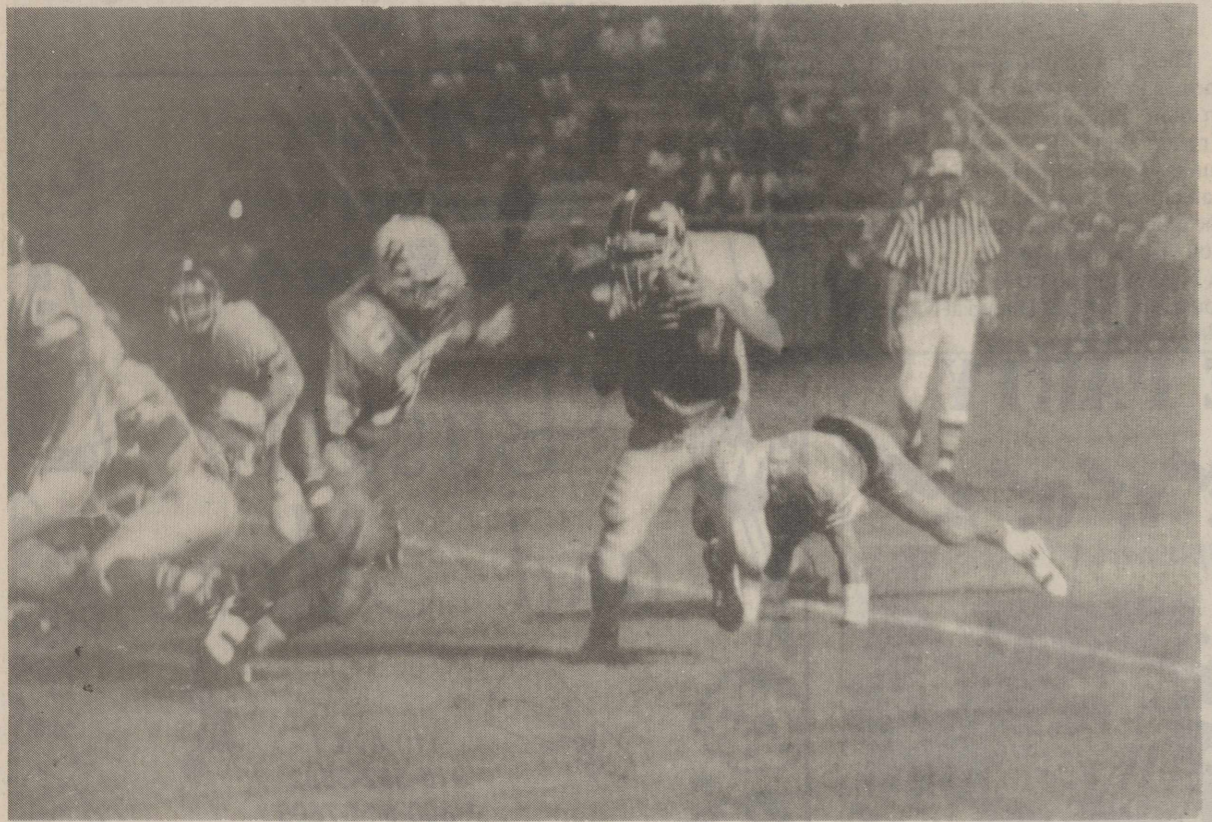

JV Lions Pluck Owls 22-0 in opener

The evening was one for football fans to remember for the Ozona players, coaches, and fans as the Ozona JV Lions defeated the Reagan County JV Owls 22-0 in last Thursday's contest in Ozona. A new scoreboard donated by Ozona National Bank and Union Pacific Resources was finished just in time for the start of the game. This was a great way to break in the new clock, with the Lions winning the game.

"I thought offensively, we played extremely well," said JV Lion coach Ronnie Casey. "The offensive line had big enough holes that a Mack truck could have driven through. A lot of our success was because of a great offensive line and Coach Morgan."

The game was one where things went right for Ozona and things went wrong for Reagan County. The Lions took the opening kickoff from the Reagan County 49-yard line. The Lions were led by quarterback Clay Richardson and running backs Glenn Sutton and Matt Castaneda. It took only four plays, as the Lions scored on a 31-yard run by Castaneda with 7:55 remaining in the first period. The two-point conversion was successful as Cade Clark caught a pass in the end zone giving the Lions an 8-0 lead.

The Lions played good defense, as well. The Owls were not able to do anything with the ball and were forced to punt.

"Defensively, we played a lot of goal line and stopped their offense. We practically shut them down," said Coach Casey. "We were a little nervous, being it was the first game of the year."

Ozona moved the ball well from their own 41-yard line. On a fourth-and-fifteen at the Owls' 26-yard line, Sutton picked up 10 yards, but came up short and the ball went over to Reagan County on their 16-yard line.

The Owls did very well, as they drove the ball down to the Lions' 39-yard line early in the second period. There they were stopped on a good tackle by Matt Castaneda. This forced a punt, with Ozona receiving the ball at their own 20-yard line. Six plays

later, the Lions were punting the ball back to the Owls.

The Owls started on their own 48-yard line. After very little yardage was gained by the Owls, they were forced to punt. The punter faked a punt, but was tackled by an alert Lion on the Owls' 45-yard line. On the first play, Richardson hit Juan Garcia for a 42-yard pass play down to the Owls' 3-yard line. A pass fell incomplete, then Sutton ran for a 3-yard touchdown with only 14 seconds left in the first half. Dustin Faught caught a pass from Richardson which was good for the two-point conversion giving the Lions a halftime score of 16-0.

In the third quarter, the Owls were knocking at the Lions' door on the Lions' 9-yard line. On a fourth-and-nine play, Steven Tarr intercepted a pass on the Lions' 2-yard line to stop the threat by the Owls.

The Lions started moving the ball with good runs by Sutton, but the clutch play was a beautiful catch by Dustin Faught between two Owl defenders for a 62-yard play. This took the ball down to the Owls' 28-yard line before Faught was tackled. Sutton, Richardson, and Castaneda made good runs in getting the ball down to the 13-yard line. There Sutton scored from 13 yards out with 2:36 minutes left in the third period. Richardson was sacked on the try for the conversion, but the Lions took the score up another notch with a 22-0 lead.

Steven Tarr came through again on an interception to stall a good drive by the Owls at the Lions' 37-yard line. The Lions again moved the ball well with good runs by Castaneda and a 16-yard pass to Seth Webster. The Lions' drive came to an immediate stop after reaching the Owls' 42-yard line. This stop was due to an Owl interception which was returned to the Lions' 26-yard line.

The Owls had some tough luck with penalties, but even more so, the Lions played good defense as well. Robert Quiroz sacked the quarterback for a 6-yard loss, and two plays later the Owls were forced to punt.

Steve Tarr came in at quarterback, who picked up five yards on a run. A penalty put the ball on the 10-yard line, but Richardson ran the ball for a

13-yard gain. The Lions fumbled the ball, recovered it, and were forced to punt. The ball was hiked high with Ty Porter trying to punt it and Reagan County recovered the ball on the Lions' 5-yard line with 45 seconds left in the game.

The Lions made an excellent goal line stand holding the Owls on all four plays and taking the ball back to run out the clock winning the game 22-0.

"We had a great goal line stance. Robert Quiroz and Steven Tarr made two clutch tackles to keep Big Lake from scoring," said Coach Casey.

Ozona linemen coach Gerry Morgan gave credit to the linemen as he said, "The kids played hard and well. They were real coachable. We probably had a few mistakes, but not bad for the first game."

Coach Casey gives credit to the linemen for the success of the running backs. He said, "Because of the successful play of our offensive line, the running backs rushed for a total of 207 yards and we passed for 135 yards."

Playing on the front line on offense are: center Josh Tambunga, right guard Mario Barrera, right tackle Ty Allen, left guard Chase Adams, and left tackle Marcus Cordova.

Coach Casey was also pleased with his quarterbacks, running backs, and receivers. "Clay threw the ball extremely well. We were real impressed and pleased with his passing. We had some receivers make some good catches. Dustin Faught had 65 yards, Juan Garcia had 45 yards (before getting hurt), Seth Webster 22 yards, and Cade Clark three yards," said Casey.

"To sum it up, it was a great way to start the season. Everyone played and everyone had a good time. There was some hitting going on and Ray Ramos made a great hit which broke his clavicle," Casey said.

The JV Purple and Gold Lions have formed together to make the junior varsity Lions. Due to the fact there is less boys out for football than expected, the JV team will play the Purple schedule only. They will travel to Sonora to play the JV Broncos starting at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 11.

Plant Tips from M&R Nursery by: Mike Glaspie

Timing Is Everything
 This is especially true when applying fall fertilizers and pre-emergence. There is a shorter time frame in the fall so we have to be a little more precise in our applications. Some in town are saying it's time now for the fall applications, but we feel it's too soon. The fall and winter weeds and grasses usually won't germinate until soil temperatures are in the low 60's - 50's, providing there is adequate moisture. If you apply pre-emergence too soon, it could be played out prior to weed germination. We usually advise to apply both the fall fertilizer and pre-emergence no earlier than mid-September & no later than the end of October. The low nighttime temperatures will give us a gauge for when the soil starts to cool down. We are recommending as a Winterizer using M&R's 16-4-8 with 3% iron. There is still time for growth & greening. Winterizing helps send our dormant grasses, such as St. Augustine & Bermuda, into the winter stronger. This should give you a healthier head start on next year's spring growth.



The pre-emergent helps prevent fall weeds & winter grasses. Just remember, the fall application will not work on next year's spring weeds. You will need to reapply late February through March.

On a final note, Ronnie, Tandy & myself would like to thank the nice people of Eden for inviting us to talk about fall lawn & garden preparations last Friday. The Eden library hosted the 1 hour presentation & I hope we were able to help. For those of you in Eden who could not make it, please give us a call if you have any questions. We can't wait to be asked back. The County Extension Agent of Ozona asked us to talk to the garden club last Monday, but we had to be out of town. I hope he asks us again.

Health Services Board looks at Rehab

The Crockett County Health Services Board, which oversees the care center and county medical facilities, is looking at a possible arrangement for physical therapy commissioners were told Monday. Crystal Hargraves, care center administrator, and Gerald Creel, director of nurses at the center, outlined a proposal from West Texas Rehabilitation Center. Creel has worked toward having physical therapy for care center residents since his arrival in Ozona.

West Texas Rehab proposes to rent the building formerly used as doctors' offices for a therapy facility

available to everyone in the community. WTRC would strive to staff the facility for the provision of physical therapy on a full time basis. Rehab would also review the possibility of providing additional services such as occupational and speech therapy and audiology on an as needed basis.

In keeping with Rehab policies, WTRC would treat patients without regard to their ability to pay. Those who can pay would be expected to do so, and WTRC would seek Medicare and Medicaid certification for the facility.

"The community has a great deal to gain," said Creel. "I don't see any-

thing except a win-win situation."

During her report to the court, Ms. Hargraves said that when state inspectors came to the care center to investigate an abuse complaint on Aug. 22 they found the claim to be unsubstantiated. Inspectors examine records of several residents when they come in order to prevent identification of the complainant, she explained. Ms. Hargraves said she understood that the situation was a resident to resident situation, not a complaint against an employee.

Care center employee Jan St. Clair has taken the position of activity director at the center along with a new hire, Susan Creel. Each will work 30 hours a week and one will work on Saturday.

Ms. Hargraves reviewed information from the health services board meeting last week, telling commissioners that there are currently 47 residents at the center.

The ambulance service had 22 runs for August, 6 local, 12 transfers, 4 stand-bys and 2 canceled. EMS coordinator Doug Meador had told the board that a grant from the Texas Department of Health for \$4,100 was approved for automatic electronic defibrillator and Pulse-x machines. The rough ride of EMS #2 was discussed at the board meeting and it was decided that air bags would be installed. Meador also informed the board that Medivac, the emergency flight service operated by Shannon Health Systems of San Angelo, will no longer transfer patients to Columbia Medical Center.

In a report for the clinic, Peggy McWilliams reported 766 visits for August (522, doctor, 62 physician's assistant, 55 nurse and 122 lab). The clinic revenue was \$47,670.05. PA Phil Coley resigned in August and has not yet been replaced.

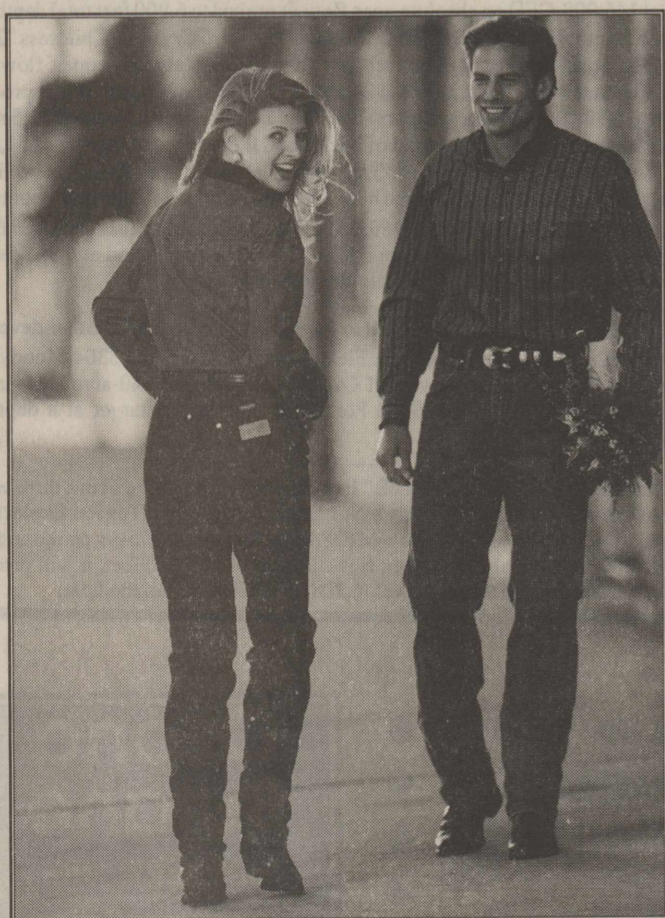

First production data have been posted for two newly completed oil wells in Crockett County's Olson Field, 15 miles east of Iran. Marathon Oil Co. is the operator. The No. 421 Olson Unit pumped 26 barrels of oil per day. It probed to 2,509 feet total depth and will produce from 2,180 to 2,270 feet into the wellbore. The No. 420 Olson Unit was drilled to a 2,431 ft. bottom and pumped 18 barrels of oil per day. Production interval is at 2,126 to 2,110 feet into the hole.

The No. 1 Hunt 24 has been brought on line in Crockett County's Aldwell Ranch Field, 19 miles southwest of Sonora. Louis Dreyfus Natural Gas Co. is the operator. Flowing 372,000-CFD on a .75-in. choke, the new gasser earned a 390,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow. It was taken to a 9,376-ft. bottom with plugback to 8,980. Production will be from a Canyon Formation interval, 8,825 to 8,916 feet into the hole.

Sonat Exploration Co. recently completed five new developmental wells in Crockett County's Hunt Baggett Field, approximately 11 miles southeast of Ozona. The wells produced from Strawn Formation perforations. The No. 5 Riggs "21" flowed 1,169,900-CFD on a 1.25-in. choke and was rated at 5,549,000-CFD on absolute open flow. It was drilled a total of 9,350 feet and will produce from 8,947 to 9,182 feet into the hole. The No. 2 E. J. Baggett "28" was bottomed at 9,810 feet. It flowed at the rate of 1,096,000-CFD on a 1.375-in. choke and earned a 2,220,300-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow. It will produce from 9,375 to 9,535 feet into the wellbore. The No. 6 Baggett "C" was rated at 789,100-CFD on absolute open flow and showed ability to yield 552,790-CFD on a 1-in. choke. It probed to 9,913 feet total depth and will produce from 9,425 to 9,554 feet into the hole. The No. 3 Riggs "21" flowed 458,300-CFD on a 1.25-in. choke and was rated at 503,000-CFD on absolute open flow. Bottomed at 9,475 feet, it will produce from 9,092 to 9,222 feet into the wellbore. The No. 1 E. G. Baggett "28" earned a 3,336,500-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow and showed ability to yield 1,183,000-CFD on a 1.375-in. choke. It was taken to a 9,608-ft. bottom. Production will be from 9,191 to 9,306 feet into the hole.

Another producer has completed a half dozen wells in Crockett County's Ozona Field. Union Pacific Resources Corp. recently posted first production reports for the wells. The No. 5 Crystelle Childress "8" located 24.1 miles southwest of Ozona. It flowed at the rate of 330,000-CFD on absolute open flow and showed ability to yield 321,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke. Bottomed at 6,720 feet, it will produce from 5,842 to 6,366 feet into the hole. The No. 13 Millsapugh-State "69" about 22.6 miles southwest of Ozona. It was taken to a 7,032-ft. bottom and flowed 132,000-CFD on a 0.875-in. choke and was rated at 156,000-CFD on absolute open flow. Production will be from 6,592 to 6,610 feet into the wellbore. The No. 2 Crystelle Childress "8" 24.1 miles southwest of Ozona produced at the rate of 139,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke and was evaluated at 146,000-CFD on absolute open flow. It probed to 6,900 feet total depth and will produce from 5,984 to 6,222 feet into the hole. The No. 5 Crystelle Childress "28D" was bottomed at 6,900 feet. It produced 357,000-CFD on absolute open flow and 316,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke. Located 24 miles southwest of Ozona, it will produce from 6,106 to 6,306 feet into the wellbore. The No. 72 Union Pacific, located 11.5 miles southwest of Ozona, was drilled a total of 7,000 feet. It produced at the rate of 51,000-CFD on a .5-in. choke and was rated at 53,000-CFD on absolute open flow. The well will produce from 6,576 to 6,680 feet into the hole. The No. 3 Crystelle Childress, about 23.3 miles southwest of Ozona, earned a 1,269,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow. It flowed at the rate of 976,000-CFD on a 1.375-in. choke. Bottomed at 6,855 feet, it will produce from 5,732 to 6,290 feet into the wellbore.

Union Pacific Resources Corp. has also filed for permit to drill another developmental well in Crockett County's Ozona Field. Designated the No. 3304 Moody, the venture is about 24.3 miles southwest of Ozona. Location is a 640-acre lease in the T&STL Survey A-4197. Canyon Sand Formation will be the target at a depth of approximately 7,600 feet.

The No. 23 A. R. Kincaid Trust "B" has been brought on line about three miles southeast of Ozona in Crockett County's Northeast Ozona Field. Texaco Exploration & Production Co. is the operator. It flowed 638,000-CFD on a 1.375-in. choke and was rated at 780,000-CFD on absolute open flow. Bottomed at 6,550 feet, it will produce from a Canyon Sand Formation interval, 6,208 to 6,328 feet into the hole.

Firemen to honor Rep. Turner

On Sept. 20, volunteer firefighters from across Texas will meet in Llano to honor Rep. Bob Turner of Coleman for winning passage of legislation that frees industrial sources to donate surplus fire and emergency equipment to volunteer fire departments without the potential threat of future liability. That legislation is being put into action by the Texas Forest Service as Texas' new Industrial Helping Hands Program.

Prior to passage of House Bill 680 in April by the Texas Legislature, corporate lawyers routinely replied "no" when asked about the donation of surplus fire and emergency equipment used to protect industrial facilities. Pressure bottles for breathing apparatus were cut in half and the regulators buried. Protective fire coats were cut apart. Fire trucks with low mileage were broken up and sold for scrap. Much of this equipment had many years of good use left in it, but the risk of those making the donation being swallowed up by litigation if some manufacturers' defect led to death or injury was too great to risk. Hence, equipment that could save lives in the hands of volunteer firefighters was being consigned to the garbage dump.

Beginning in September, things will be different. Industry can now donate surplus equipment to the Texas Forest Service. As it does with equipment donated by the military, the forest service will repair and "re-certify" the equipment. This step absolves those making the donation of future responsibility. The equipment will then be distributed to volunteer fire departments that need it. To date, the forest service has commitments for \$2.5 million in equipment destined for volunteers. Texas stands alone as the only state in this country that has lifted the threat of liability for such corporate donations.

Ozona Fire Chief Bob Falkner said several Ozona firemen will attend. They are to take Ozona's trailer given to the county by the Forestry Service and a military truck, both of which have been refurbished for use by the department.

FCE extends education to women of all ages

You may have read or heard about Family Community Education Clubs. Whether you're a young mother with toddlers, a retired grandmother, or a working mom facing the prospect of another stressful week, FCE is for you.

Many of you may be familiar with FCE under another name—either Home Demonstration Club or Extension Homemakers. Although the program has undergone several name changes since the first club was organized, the main purpose for its existence has remained the same—continuing education for women from all backgrounds, races, and ages.

Home Demonstration work began in Texas around 1914, and really came of age in the 1930's, when county Extension agents taught skills to women that they in turn used to get their families through the Great Depression—money management, food and clothing production, health and nutrition, and much more.

Through the years, clubs began to reach both rural and urban women, and the name was changed to Extension Homemakers in the 1970's. The current name change, made in 1993, reflects the mission of the organization.

That mission is to work with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to strengthen and enrich families through educational programs, leadership development, and community service. The Texas Family Community Education Club serves as a coordinating organization for the statewide activities of FCE Clubs, including scholarships for 4-H youths and for adult members of the FCE organization.

TAFCE has put together some core values which embody their philosophy. TAFCE and its members value—

- Strong families as basic to the well-being of Texas
- Educational programs that address critical needs impacting Texas families and communities
- Education as a life-long learning process
- Volunteers and opportunities for volunteer development
- Leadership development which offers opportunities for personal growth and development
- Cultural and ethnic diversity in programs and membership
- Global awareness
- Cooperative efforts with the Extension Service to attain mutual goals.

Annual dues are \$16.50 per person—\$4 state and \$12.50 national—and enable members to be eligible for state awards, receive an annual membership card, apply for adult career scholarships, have a part in providing both 4-H and adult scholarships, and supporting 4-H work across the state of Texas. There are no local dues, and national dues are optional.

The national organization has over 300,000 members from 42 states, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. Won't you join these women today in developing your educational, leadership and citizenship skills through Family Community Education?

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 4, 1997

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a person to hold the position of municipal judge in more than one municipality.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow a person who holds the office of municipal court judge to hold at the same time more than one civil office for which the person receives compensation."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 43 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the maximum annual increase in homestead appraisals for each year since the most recent tax appraisal. The amendment would also permit the legislature to allow the governing body of a school district to elect to apply the law providing for the transfer of the age-65-and-older school property tax freeze to the person's new homestead, if the move to the new residence homestead occurred before the law took effect.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to limit increases in the appraised value of residence homesteads for ad valorem taxation and to permit a school district to calculate the school property tax freeze applicable to the residence homestead of an elderly person or the surviving spouse of an elderly person in accordance with the law authorizing the transfer of the school property tax freeze to a different homestead regardless of whether that law was in effect at the time the person established the person's homestead."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 45 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to authorize counties, cities, towns, and other local taxing entities to grant exemptions or other forms of ad valorem tax relief on property on which approved water conservation initiatives have been implemented.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to permit a taxing unit to grant an exemption or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property on which a water conservation initiative has been implemented."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 104 proposes an amendment to update the Texas Constitution by deleting duplicate numbering in its provisions and removing certain of its obsolete portions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment eliminating duplicate numbering in and certain obsolete provisions of the Texas Constitution."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 19 proposes an amendment to allow the Supreme Court of Texas to hold sessions at any location in this state. Currently, the court is limited to holding sessions only at Austin, the seat of state government.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the supreme court to sit to transact business at any location in this state."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 39 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the current provision which provides that the board of the Texas Growth Fund may not invest money in a business unless the business has disclosed to the board whether it has any direct financial investment in or with South Africa or Namibia.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing the Texas growth fund to continue to invest in businesses without requiring those businesses to disclose investments in South Africa or Namibia."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment to create the Texas Water Development Fund II as a fund separate and distinct from the Texas Water Development Fund. The amendment would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to administer the fund and issue general obligation bonds for purposes of the fund under guidelines set forth in the amendment.

The amendment would also allow the Board to use loan repayments coming into the fund after the end of the fiscal year to make bond debt service payments, and would provide certain conditions for the flow of funds for repayment of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the authorization to the Texas Water Development Board to transfer existing bond authorizations for water

supply, water quality, flood control, or state participation from one category of use to another category to maximize the use of existing funds and relating to more efficient operation of the bond programs."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment which would authorize home equity lending, in which a loan could be secured by a lien against the borrower's homestead. The amendment would also establish several provisions providing for consumer protection in the home equity lending process.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The amendment to the Texas Constitution expanding the types of liens for home equity loans that a lender, with the homeowner's consent, may place against a homestead."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 96 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to authorize a property tax of five cents for each \$100 valuation in rural fire prevention districts which are located in Harris County. The constitution currently authorizes a property tax of three cents for each \$100 valuation of what county they are in.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to authorize an ad valorem tax rate in rural fire prevention districts located in Harris County of five cents on each \$100 of taxable value of property."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment to permanently dedicate monies from the Texas Crime Victims' Compensation Fund (and its auxiliary fund) so that they are used only for assisting victims of crime and not for any other purpose. If an episode of mass violence occurred, however, money from the funds could be used to assist victims of the mass violence if all other sources of authorized emergency assistance were depleted first.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment designating the purposes for which money in the compensation to victims of crime fund and the compensation to victims of crime auxiliary fund may be used."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 59 proposes a constitutional amendment to prohibit the Legislature from authorizing additional state debt payable from the general revenue fund if the resulting annual debt service (the amount needed each year to make payments) would exceed five percent of the annual general revenue avail-

able over the last three fiscal years, excluding revenues constitutionally dedicated for purposes other than payment of state debt.

The term "additional state debt" does not include bonds that, although backed by the full faith and credit of the state, are reasonably expected to be paid from revenue sources other than the general revenue fund.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment limiting the amount of state debt payable from the general revenue fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 55 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Texas Supreme Court does not act on a motion for a rehearing within 180 days of the motion's filing, the motion is denied.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to establish a deadline for supreme court action on a motion for rehearing."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish the Texas Tomorrow trust fund dedicated exclusively to the prepayment of tuition and fees for higher education. The amendment would guarantee that if there is not enough money during any fiscal year to pay the appropriate tuition and required fees, the needed money will be appropriated out of the first available money coming into the state treasury each fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to encourage persons to plan and save for young Texans' college education, to extend the full faith and credit of the state to protect the Texas tomorrow fund of the prepaid higher education tuition program, and to establish the Texas tomorrow fund as a constitutionally protected trust fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 83 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to set the official qualifications for constables.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to prescribe the qualifications of constables."

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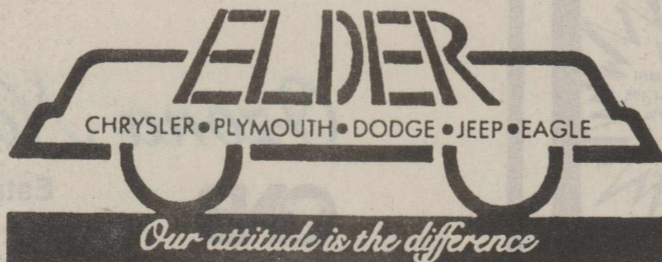
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
