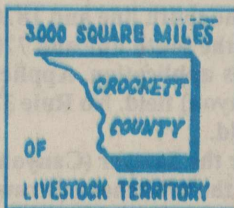

Appeals Court upholds decision in Susie Neumuller conviction

The Court of Appeals, Eighth District of Texas in El Paso, has concluded there was no error in the judgment when Loretta "Susie" Neumuller was convicted for capital murder in the death of Larry Albers. Ms. Neumuller was tried in the 112th District Court of Judge Brock Jones in Crockett County and assessed punishment of life imprisonment. The appeals court judgment was filed in the office of District Clerk Debbi Puckett on Sept. 15.

The following is reprinted from the opinion of the appeals court.

Larry Albers was 79 years old at the time of his death. He was a retired rancher who owned several apartments and a flea market in Ozona, Texas. Mr. Albers had also inherited oil and bank interests from his late wife.

In April 1993, shortly following the death of his wife, Mr. Albers met Loretta Neumuller at the White Horse Lounge in Del Rio, Texas. By June, Albers had asked Neumuller to move to Ozona with him. In September, Albers deeded his home to Neumuller and agreed to extensive remodeling. Neumuller then moved in. Albers also promised Neumuller that he would revise his will in her favor.

Shortly after moving to Ozona, Neumuller met Tyrone "Pete" Parker, a tenant of Albers. By October, Neumuller and Parker had become lovers. In September 1993, Neumuller told Parker she was so mad at Albers that she could just kill him. Parker replied that that could be arranged. After that, Parker would occasionally mention killing Albers.

In January 1994, Albers began transferring significant amounts of property to Neumuller. He added her name to his checking account signature card. On February 28, 630 shares of common stock in the Ozona National Bank were transferred from Mary Frances West Albers (Albers' deceased wife) to Larry Albers or Loretta C. Neumuller. Also in January, Albers retained attorney Troy Williams to prepare a new will naming Neumuller his executrix and sole beneficiary. He signed the new will on January 24, 1994.

William Mason, an attorney who had represented Albers in earlier pro-

bate matters, contacted Albers in early March and asked him to come to Mason's office to discuss a debt. Albers arrived at Mason's office accompanied by Neumuller. Mason asked to speak with Albers alone. Mason testified that appellant was "miffed". In the course of their two hour meeting, Mason asked Albers why he was transferring so much of his property to Neumuller. Albers appeared astonished that he had transferred so much control and property to appellant. Mason further testified that he advised Albers on ways of regaining control of his property and that Albers agreed to do so. Mason and Albers made an appointment for the next morning.

Rather than Larry Albers, however, the next morning Neumuller came to Mason's office with a letter terminating Mason and demanding Albers' files. Mason refused to deliver them. Several days later, Mason received a letter from Troy Williams asking for Albers' files. Mason arranged to meet with Albers and Williams to make the transfer. This meeting never took place.

Instead, on March 16, 1994, Neumuller notified the sheriff's office that Albers was missing. Highway department workers spotted Albers' car down an embankment about 28 miles south of Ozona. Albers' decomposed body was in the car. The interior of the car was partially burned and officers discovered a full can of gasoline in the backseat. They also found a bloody pipe in the trunk of the car. Albers' death was ruled a homicide. The car and its contents were sent to the DPS forensic lab in Austin.

The bloody pipe bore the palm print of Tyrone "Pete" Parker. On March 30, Parker was arrested, and he gave a statement to the police impli-

cating Neumuller. She was arrested on March 31 and also gave a statement.

According to Neumuller, Parker asked her in January if Albers had made a new will and told her she should get that done. Parker told Neumuller sometime later that Albers told him (Parker) that he (Albers) had made a will leaving everything to Neumuller. In her statement, she commented, "I guess maybe he was waiting for confirmation from Larry." After the new will was made, she claimed Parker "started talking seriously about killing Larry". At some point after this, Parker told her, "I think it's time to kill Larry". In response, Neumuller told Parker she could not do it. Parker told her not to worry, that he would do it. They then discussed making Albers' death look accidental, Parker said he would find someplace to make it look like an accident.

On March 15, Parker called Neumuller and told her "tonight is the time to get it over with". That evening, the two cleaned out the trunk of Albers' car. Neumuller then had dinner with Albers. After dinner, she called Parker and arranged to pick him up at a ravine near his trailer. Neumuller let Parker into the house and she joined Albers in the den where they watched the late news. Albers and Neumuller then went to their separate bedrooms. Parker followed Albers into the bathroom. Neumuller heard Albers call out. She "ran back to where Pete and Larry was at" and saw Parker on top of Albers with a pipe across his throat. At this point, she told Parker she couldn't do this. Parker said it was too late.

Neumuller and Parker then wrapped towels around Albers' bloody

Bond set for Taylor

Paul Wesley Taylor, a suspect in the 1990 murder of Dean Phillips, was arraigned in open court before District Judge Brock Jones on Sept. 15. At that time bond was set at \$500,000. His court appointed attorney, Pete Gomez of San Angelo, entered pleas of not guilty on all counts.

Taylor was indicted on one count of capital murder and two counts of felony murder by a Crockett County grand jury June 18. An indictment means that at least nine of 12 grand jurors believe there is cause for trial. Count I reads that Paul Wesley Taylor did intentionally cause the death of an individual, Dean Phillips, by striking Phillips in the head with a blunt object unknown to the grand jury, and did then and there intentionally cause the death of the said individual in the course of committing and attempting to commit the offense of robbery directed against Dean Phillips.

Count II finds further that Taylor did then and there intentionally and knowingly cause the death of an individual, Dean Phillips, by striking the said Dean Phillips with a blunt object unknown to the grand jury.

Count III states that Taylor did then and there intending to cause serious bodily injury to an individual, Dean Phillips, commit an act clearly dangerous to human life, to-wit: by

Sutton County jury gives maximum in drug case

A Sutton County jury, after a 3-day trial, convicted Pascual Barrientos Salas of possession of marijuana over five pounds but less than 50 pounds. The jury assessed the maximum punishment of 10 years and a \$10,000 fine against Salas.

Ori White, district attorney, praised multiple agency cooperation for the success, saying, "U. S. Melvin White arraigned

Bond was set at one million dollars Monday when Melvin Wayne White was arraigned in District Judge Brock Jones' court in Ozona. White was indicted Aug. 15 on six counts in connection with the death of Jennifer Lee Gravell. An indictment means that at least nine of 12 grand jurors believe there is cause for trial.

The 9-year-old girl was reported missing early on Aug. 5 and her body found later in the day north of Ozona. White was arrested that same day.

within the 180-day time-frame (for trial) as much as possible. A second attorney will be appointed soon.

The case could come to trial in early December.

The suspect in the murder is a down-the-street neighbor of Beth and Charlie Gravell, parents of the victim.

Kirk Hawkins of San Angelo, court appointed attorney representing White, entered not guilty pleas on all counts on behalf of his client.

District Attorney Ori White of Fort Stockton had said he will seek the death penalty in the case. A pre-trial hearing is set for Oct. 24.

Shannon Hunnicutt--Cook-of-the-Week Someone's in the kitchen

Cook of the Week Shannon Hunnicutt shares a variety of recipes all will enjoy. Leading the list is grilled cayenne/lime corn which sounds like something to hurry and try while roasting ears are still plentiful.

"I don't cook very often, but when I do, I want to make sure it's good because I don't want to waste my time," said Shannon. She likes to cook when entertaining and for family gatherings. Cooking for large groups is easier than for the day to day meals, she says.

"Martha Stewart is my idol. When Rick and I married, Jane Garlitz gave me a subscription to Martha Stewart's Living magazine.

Shannon and sister Stacy laugh about a Martha Stewart river trip with meals based on Martha Stewart recipes. "We enjoyed fixing it as much as eating it," the girls said. The guys didn't mind too much after they were finally convinced that beans and brisquet weren't on the menu. This was Shannon's first time to fix grilled cayenne/lime corn, "and it was delicious."

Shannon says she only tries new recipes when she has time for a possible failure. Diamonds in the Desert is her favorite cookbook, but she has started a family recipe book which will be a treasure once it is finished.

When Shannon was first out on her own, an attempt at making macaroni and cheese was such a flop (She put in twice the amount of milk called for) that she vowed never to cook again.

"I had a brand new puppy, and I said, 'how am I ever going to take care of this puppy. I can't even take care of myself.'"

Squash Casserole

6 large zucchini
6 large yellow squash
8 oz. cream cheese
1 c. grated Velveeta
1 c. seasoned croutons
Cook zucchini and squash until tender, drain. While still hot, mash together with cream cheese. Add Velveeta and croutons. If too thick, add cheese. If too thin, add croutons. Pour into baking dish. Cook at 350 degrees for 1 hour. (Great for holidays, can be adjusted for any size group!)

Neiman-Marcus Cake

1st layer:
1 box yellow cake mix
1 stick butter (melted)
2 eggs
2nd layer:
8 oz. cream cheese
2 eggs
1 lb. box powdered sugar
1 c. chopped pecans
Mix ingredients for first layer together and press into bottom of 9x13 pan. Cream the cream cheese. Add other ingredients for 2nd layer and pour over top of 1st layer. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes or until done.

Exchange German chocolate cake mix for yellow in 1st layer and add 1/2 c. coconut to 2nd layer.

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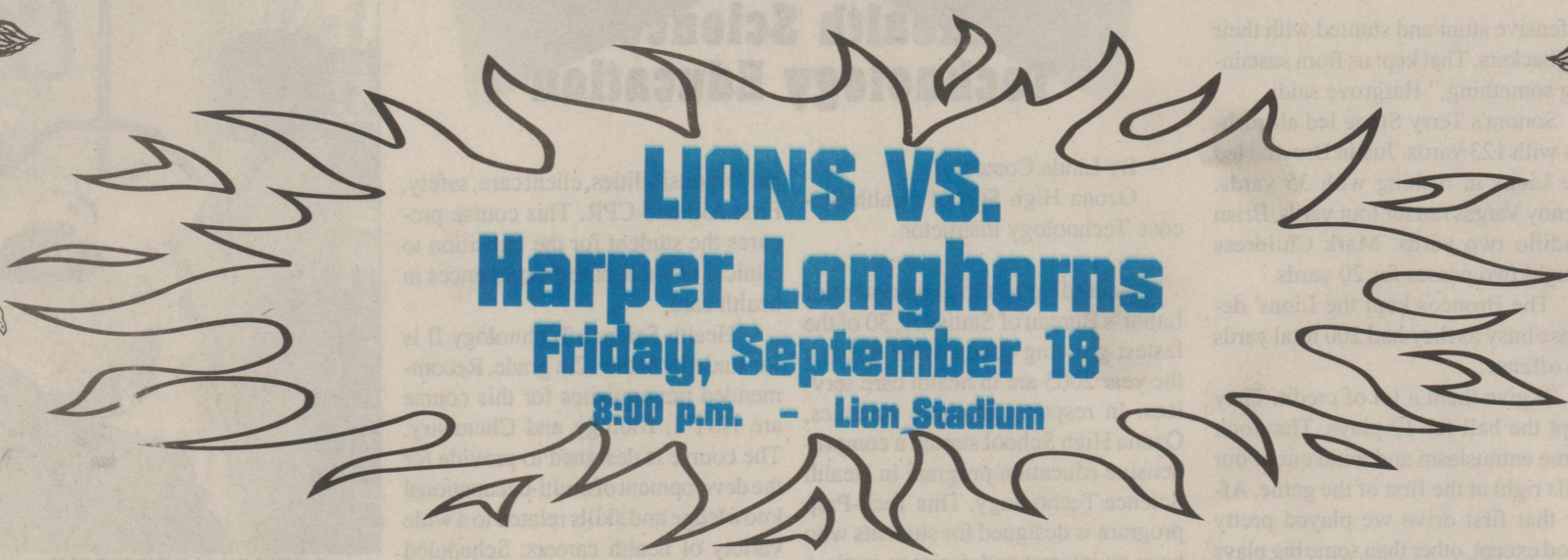
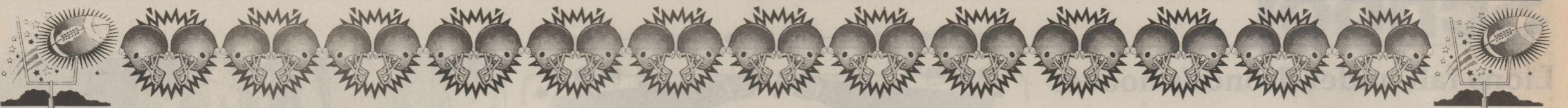
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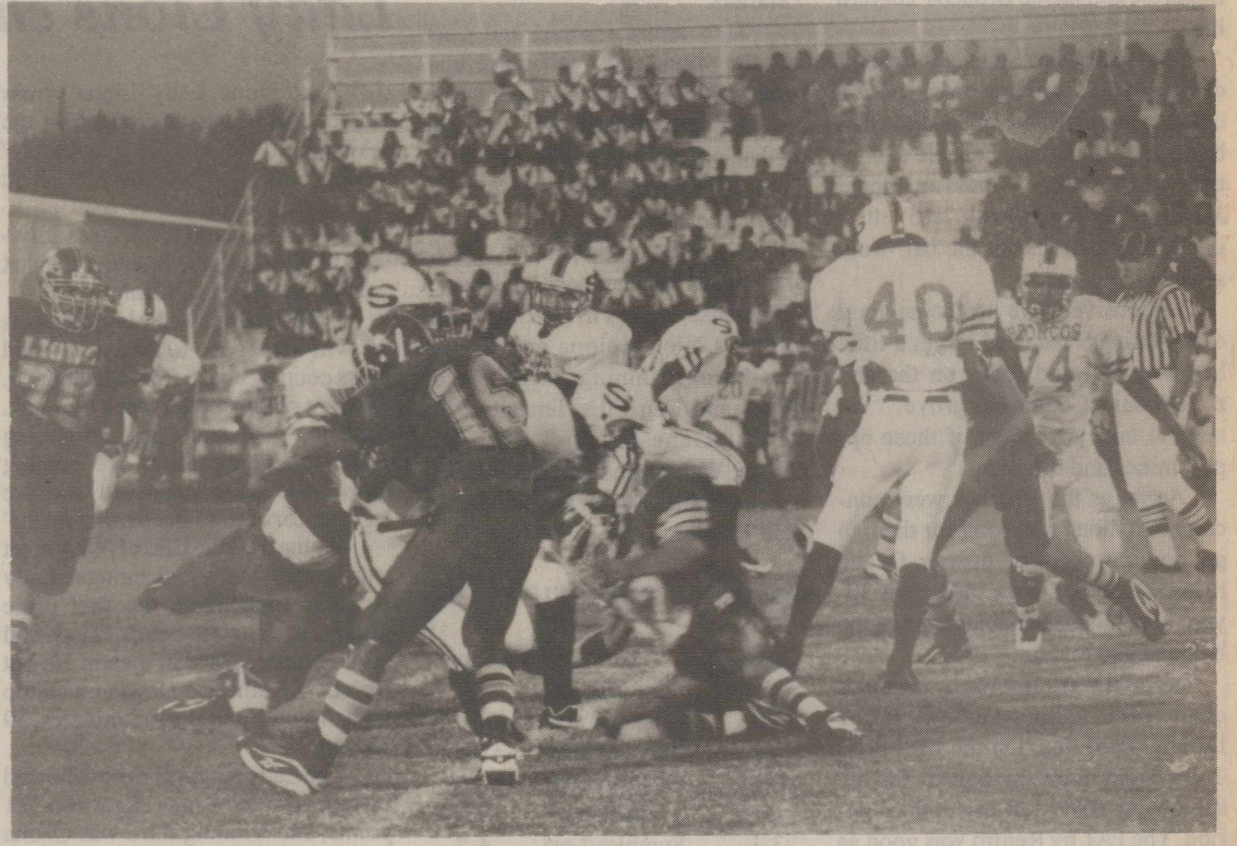

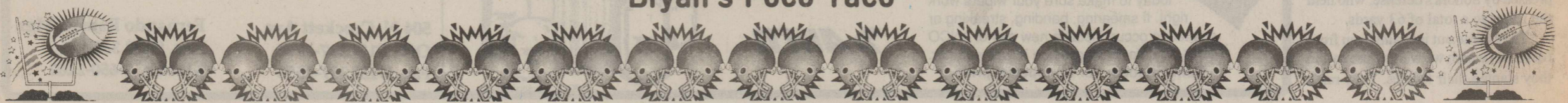

The Ozona JV Lions played well, but failed to capitalize on opportunities given them as the Lions were defeated 21-6 by a ground attack from the Sonora JV Broncos on Thursday, Sept. 11 in Sonora. The JV Lions now have a 1-1 season record.

"I thought we played real well. We moved the ball real good on offense this week," said JV Lions' coach Ronnie Casey. "These guys are playing their hearts out and never quit. These guys are not discouraged, are a little hurt emotionally, but will bounce back."

"Defensively, we played really well. We had some people step up like Josh Tambunga, Cade Clark, and Jed Roane that played well," said Ozona High linemen and defensive coach Gerry Morgan. "Our linemen did pretty well and we are improving. Our seconds will step up a spot due to injuries and two guys moving up."

Sonora got the scoring started in the second quarter with real good field position. That was provided after an Ozona fumble and a Sonora recovery on the Lion 35-yard line. Five plays later, they scored on a running play to take a first-half lead 7-0.

As Coach Casey indicated earlier, the Lions moved the ball real well. Unfortunately for them, they had four turnovers in the game--three fumbles and one interception.

"We had four turnovers and they hurt us as the game went on. We would be driving and have a turnover. We got inside their 10 yard line twice, but didn't get in," said Coach Casey. "We need to execute better and capitalize on opportunities like that. I think we had 295 yards on offense--175 yards passing and 120 yards rushing. So again, we did an outstanding job doing our plays. We just had some turnovers that were the difference in the game."

In the second half, the Broncos started from the Lions' 40 yard line, went 10 plays and scored on a running play. The PAT was good and the Broncos took a 14-0 lead.

The Broncos were not through yet in the third quarter, as the Lions fumbled on their own 25-yard line. The Broncos reached the end zone in three plays, scoring on another running play. Again, the PAT was successful and the Broncos led 21-0.

"Sonora had some big kids. They had a big fullback, who was hard to bring down," said Coach Morgan. "It took us a couple of series to decide that we could beat them. Even with us down 21-0, we continued to fight hard and we were in it."

Fight, they did, as the Lions came back to score in the third quarter. The Lions took 11 plays with Glenn Sutton getting some short yardage runs of five, eight, and eleven yards. Dustin Faught caught two passes with one of 19 yards and the other of 24 yards. Jed Roane had a 4-yard run and Cade Clark scored on a 8 yard pass from Clay Richardson. Richardson tried to

pass, then ran, but came up a yard short of the goal line on the two-point conversion try.

According to Coach Casey, the Lions' kicker, Marcus Cordova, tried an inside kick which slid out and underneath an Ozona player's hands. "Down by 21-6, if we could have gotten that, we could have had a great opportunity to score and made it a different ball game," Coach Casey said.

Casey praised the Ozona defensive team, saying that, "Ty Allen and Mario Barrera had a good game before they got hurt." Also, having a good game were Marcus Cordova, linebackers Josh Tambunga and Jed Roane, safety Dustin Faught, Clay Richardson, Juan Garcia, corners Glenn Sutton and Seth Webster, and defensive ends Cade Clark and Mack Lindsey.

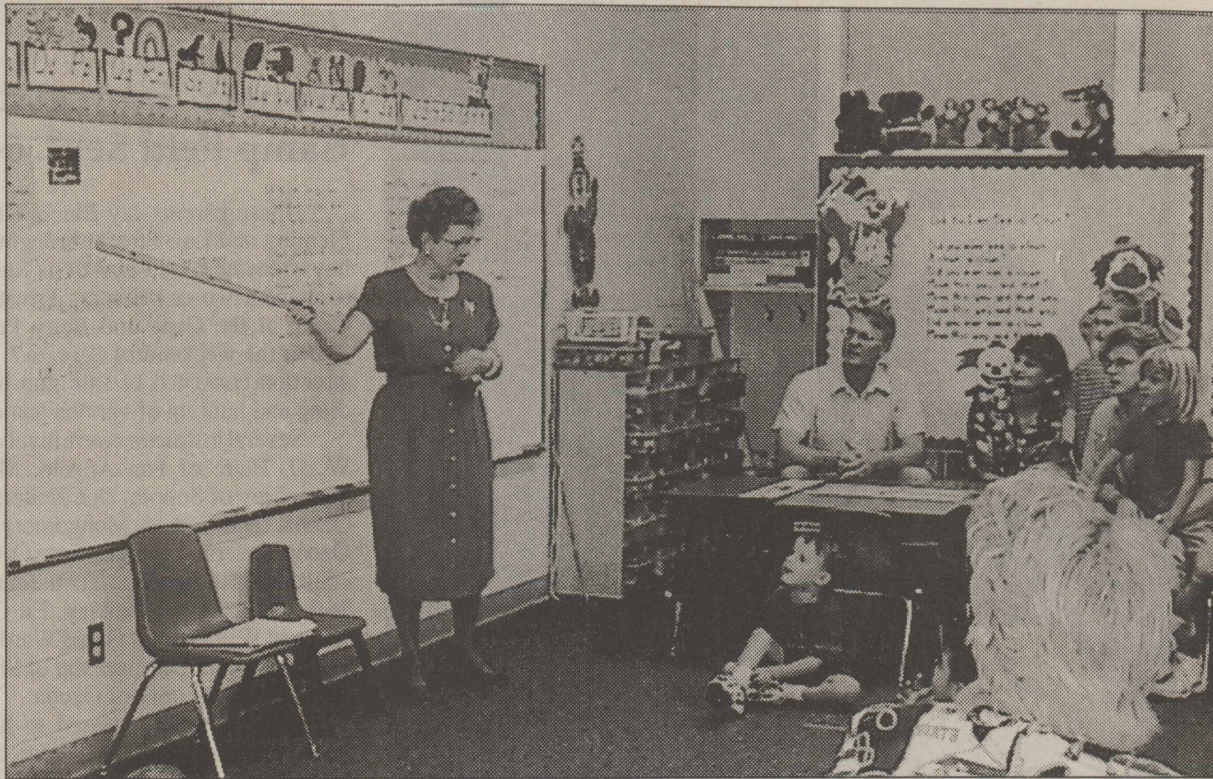
The Lions did well offensively despite the four turnovers. Sutton ran for 101 yards, Roane eight yards, and Joe Luna three yards. Richardson passed for 175 yards and receiving those passes were Faught with 77 yards, Juan Garcia 46 yards, Clark 28 yards and Seth Webster eight yards. Faught punted one time for 40 yards and he intercepted a pass.

"We will have a whole new group both offensively (except two people) and defensively, due to players being hurt and two players moving up to varsity," Coach Casey said.

The JV Lions will travel to Grape Creek to play the Eagles, starting at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 18.

"When we go to Grape Creek, you are playing a good ball club and that's their varsity," said Coach Casey.

Look for Grape Creek to run a veer offense and a split-six defense.

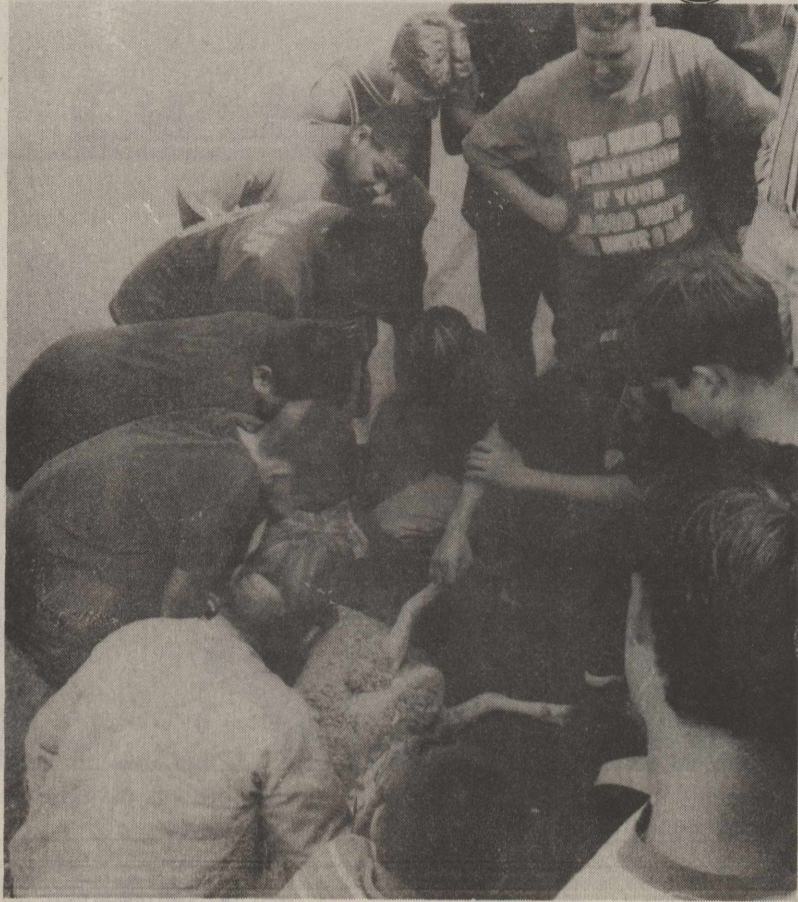

Union Pacific Resources Corp. has completed six developmental wells in Crockett County, as follows.

--No. 3 Crystelle Childress "102A," located 22.4 miles southwest of Ozona in the Ozona Field. Flowed 150,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke and was rated at 160,000-CFD on absolute open flow. Bottomed at 6,674 feet, it will produce from a Canyon Sand Formation interval, 6,126 to 6,326 feet into the hole.

--No. 12 Meybin "4," located eight and a half miles southeast of Ozona in the Davidson Ranch Field. It was drilled a total of 9,462 feet with plugback to 8,617. Flowing 552,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke, it earned a 625,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow. Production will be from Penn Formation perforations, 8,026 to 8,280 feet into the wellbore.

--The well designated the No. 36H Union Pacific "C" was drilled a total of 10,625 feet, horizontally. It produced at the rate of 1,388,000-CFD on a 2-in. choke and was rated at 1,567,000-CFD on absolute open flow. The well will produce from 8,396 feet to hole's end. It is located in the West Hunt-Baggett Field, about nine and a half miles southwest of Ozona.

--Located 30.4 miles southwest of Ozona, in the Ozona Field, the No. 5 Tom Mitchell-State 20D flowed 163,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke and 184,000-CFD on absolute open flow. It was taken to a 7,450-ft. bottom and will produce from Canyon Sand Formation perforations, 5,730 to 7,188 feet into the wellbore.

--The No. 4 Crystelle Childress "8" is located 24.1 miles southwest of Ozona in the Ozona Field. It flowed at the rate of 195,000-CFD on absolute open flow and showed ability to yield 188,000-CFD on a 1.125-in. choke. Bottomed at 6,930 feet, it will produce from a Canyon Sand interval, 5,972 to 6,176 feet into the hole.

--The well known as the No. 8 Tom Mitchell-State "20A" is located 30.1 miles southwest of Ozona in the Ozona Field. It probed to 7,400 feet total depth and flowed 551,000-CFD on a 1.25-in. choke. The well earned a 618,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow and will produce from 6,532 to 6,842 feet into the hole in the Canyon Sand Formation.

Enron Oil & Gas Co. of Midland is preparing to make hole for the No. 10 M. K. Daniel "A" about 45 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett Co's Simpson-Mann Field. Location is a 3,601-acre lease in the I&GN Survey A-3993. Canyon Formation will be the objective at a depth of approximately 6,500 feet.

A new pool wildcat is scheduled for spudding 12 miles southeast of Ozona in Crockett county's Hunt-Baggett Field. It has been designated the No. 5 Baggett 2 with Sonat Exploration Co. of Midland as the operator. Drillsite is a 640-acre lease in the GC&SF Survey A-4700. The operator will seek Strawn Formation pay at approximately 10,000 feet of depth.

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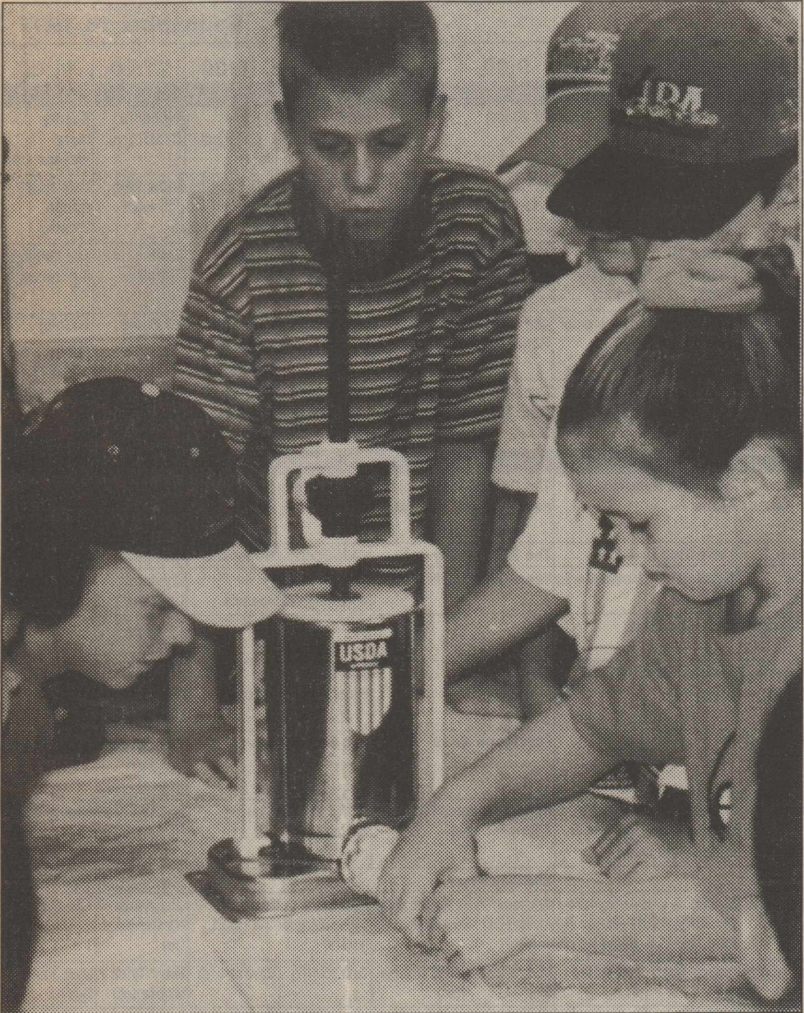

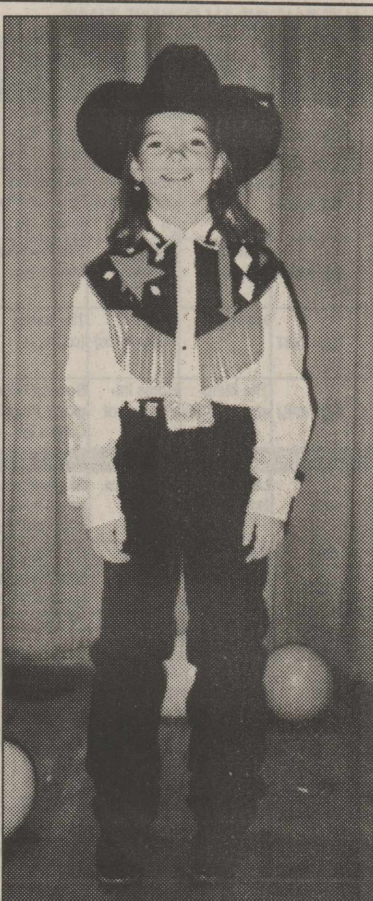

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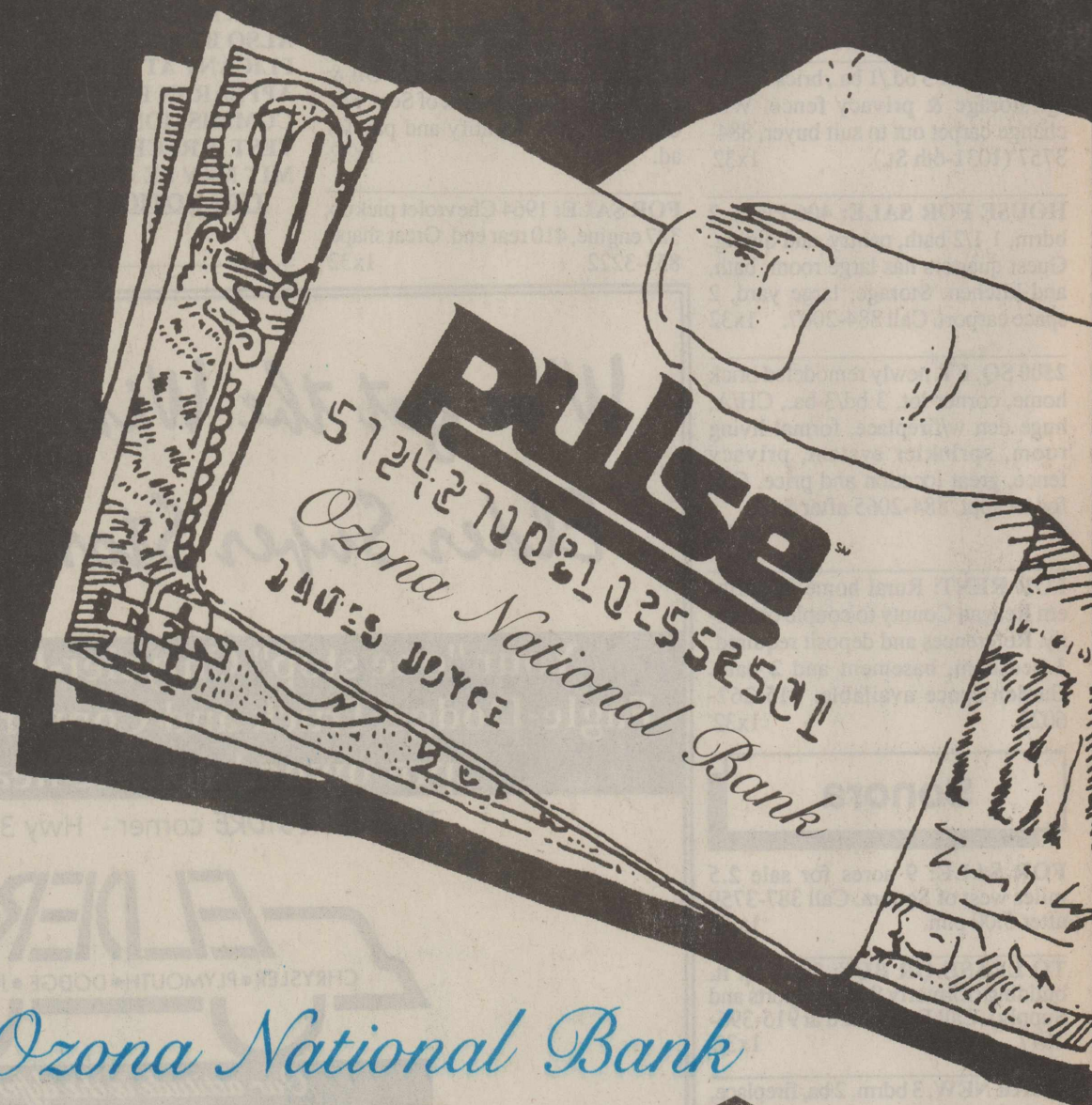
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
