

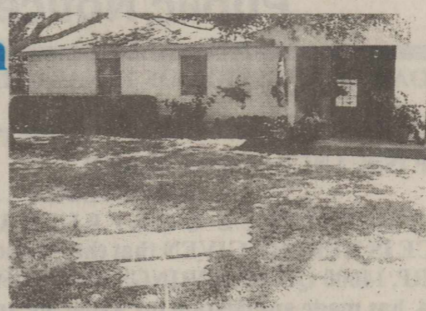

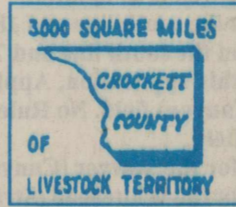

Sculpture dedicated to citizens of county

The dedication service for "The Tie That Binds", a bronze sculpture by Judy Black, drew a good crowd of local and out of town people Sept. 23. Held at the gazebo on the north end of the square, the ceremony provided an opportunity to recognize many individuals and organizations instrumental in making possible the heritage appreciation sculpture on the square.

"The Tie That Binds", which is a tribute to the pioneers of Crockett County, was commissioned by Ozona Woman's Forum. Shirley Kirby, in giving the welcome address at the dedication, commented on the joint efforts of different segments of the community. "It will be a constant reminder of those who came before us, and of the spirit that binds us together," Mrs. Kirby said.

Marolyn Bean, who was co-chairman of the project along with Mrs. Kirby, was lauded as a special person who worked hard to make the project come about.

In her comments, Mrs. Bean stated

that "the sculpture signifies the work and hardship our ancestors endured to make a better life for us. In addition to a tribute to our heritage, we wanted to provide a piece of enduring art for the community," she continued.

"The county is fortunate to have a sculptress who is able to signify the importance of heritage with her quality work," she said of Crockett County native Judy Black.

In relating her efforts to come up with an idea for the sculpture, Ms. Black said "nothing seemed good enough". The idea for the sculpture Ozona has today came to her as she was driving down the road. "The thing I liked best is that it felt like it had a dignity to it that the people of the 1880's would have appreciated," she said. "I'm grateful to the Woman's Forum for giving me the opportunity of adding to the quality of life in Ozona, but I'm mostly thankful for the pioneers who came before us."

Ozona Chamber of Commerce President Jana Wilson thanked the Forum and Ms. Black before the sculpture was formally presented to Crockett County by Mrs. Bean. Accepting on behalf of the county was Judge Jeffrey Sutton.

Adding to the joy of the afternoon with music were the Forum Singers and the choir from Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church. An invocation was given by Marilyn Cox.

Court approves bond election

At a called meeting Sept. 23, county commissioners approved an order for a bond election to be held Dec. 16. The \$3,850,000.00 bond

election is for the purpose of building a new Ozona Middle School. The board of trustees had previously approved

the election. Supt. of Schools Larry Taylor told the court that there will be no recapture of any of this money by the state due to a legislative change.

Commissioners accepted a letter of resignation from Tedra Ulmer. Ulmer has been in Ozona nine years as the County Extension Agent - Family and Consumer Sciences. She is accepting a position in Centerville, and the court authorized a search for a replacement.

In other action, the court approved a new drug policy and reviewed an emergency management plan. Commissioner Fred Deaton expressed reservations with such a plan, saying "my concern is someone from somewhere else coming in and taking over". Emergency management coordi-

nator Steve Kenley said "If we get our plan in shape, we won't have to get anyone from elsewhere in."

Commissioners asked that their roles in the written plan be increased. As it stands, commissioners "are out of the picture for seven days" according to Deaton. The revised plan will be examined for approval at another meeting.

Court members also voted to readvertise for bids for the senior citizens' center and approved a contract with Prichard and Abbott for on-line data processing.

A request by the library board to change architects for the library enlargement project was approved by the court at the discretion of the board. Librarian Louise Ledoux said she had talked with several architects.

4-H Award Banquet set for Monday

"Go 4 It" is the theme for the annual Crockett County 4-H Award Banquet, which is set for Monday, Oct. 6, at 6:30 p.m. in the Crockett County Convention Center. In addition to the annual recognition of 4-H members for their accomplishments in project work, leadership, and citizenship, a special slide presentation on this summer's Senior 4-H Exchange Trip to Kentucky will be featured.

All 4-H members, their families and friends are invited to the event. Each family has been assigned a food

item to bring and should be watching for the letter with information about the banquet, according to County Extension Agents Tedra Ulmer and Miles Dabovich. The meal will feature Mexican casserole, Spanish rice, salad, tortillas, and chocolate cake for dessert.

Lost mail found

"As you are aware, the U. S. Postal Service lost a pouch full of mail that originated from this office," said Postmaster Melvin P. Wende. "I am glad to announce the pouch has been found, and we are processing the mail as fast as we can."

The mail with return addresses is being placed in the boxes of Ozona postal customers. "We would like to give you the opportunity to 'tell us' if you would like for the piece of mail to be dispatched or not," Wende said. "In many cases it would create more problems to dispatch the piece than it would to return it to you. Please let us know,

and we will see that your mail is handled as you wish.

"None of the mail was stolen that was in this pouch. It was simply routed improperly somewhere between Ozona and Midland. The cause for this is still being investigated so that proper action can be taken to keep it from happening again.

"We at the postal service apologize for the inconvenience this has caused our customers in Ozona, and we pledge to do everything we can at our office to give you the best service possible. Please let me know if there is anything else I can do to help you," Wende said.

Rosa's Chicken Mole

Pumpkin Bread

Grease and flour three small loaf pans or use 3 one pound coffee cans filled equally. Bake at 350 degrees for 55-69 minutes. Remove from pan and let cool. Wrap in Saran. Eat tomorrow.

Baptist Church invites area men to view promise keepers gathering

The national Mall in Washington, DC, will be the site of a gathering Saturday, Oct. 4, from noon until 6 p.m. Eastern Standard Time. Called *Stand in the Gap: A Sacred Assembly of Men*, the event is sponsored by Promise Keepers, the international Christian men's organization that has drawn some 2.6 million men to 58 stadium conferences since 1992. Promise Keepers has invited men from 186 nations to participate in *Stand in the Gap*.

This will be televised in its entirety and can be seen from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the parlor of First Baptist Church in Ozona. "All men of Ozona and the surrounding area are welcome," said Rev. Bill Fuller.

Momentum for the event is building as groups of men from across the country finalize plans to travel to Washington. For example, the Atlanta-Washington AMTRACK route has been sold out since April. Twelve 757's from Sacramento, CA, have been chartered to carry 5,400 men. A men's ministry in Des Moines, IA, has chartered two DC 10's and a 727 to accommodate some 900 men.

The Christian Motorcycle Association is coordinating a cross-country motorcycle ride called "Run to the Gap". A quick sampling of nine bus

companies in Ohio, Michigan, Indiana and Pennsylvania revealed that 110 coaches carrying more than 5,000 men were booked to Washington as far back as three months ago. Twenty-two buses have been chartered in one New York county alone.

Bill McCartney, founder of Promise Keepers, said the goal of this event is to "gather a diverse multitude of men to confess personal and collective sin. We will present to the Lord men on their knees in humility, then on their feet in unity, reconciled and poised for spiritual awakening... We believe God wants men to accept responsibility for the well-being of their families."

The event is patterned after Old Testament references to sacred assemblies. There are at least 12 such instances recorded in the Bible when the nation of Israel was called by God to gather for one or more days of prayer, fasting and repentance of sin. Since the 1600's, sacred assemblies have been called by churches and denominations in items of spiritual crisis.

"Stand in the Gap" comes from the Old Testament passage Ezekiel 22:30, which reads, "I looked for a man among them who would build up the wall and stand before Me in the gap on behalf of the land so I would not have to destroy it, but I found none."

Promise Keepers was founded by Coach Bill McCartney in 1990 with a meeting of 72 men in Boulder, CO. This year, Promise Keepers will reach more men than ever through stadium conferences, a national television special, small group meetings and leadership training, a web site that receives more than three million hits per month, books, weekly and daily radio programs and other resources. The non-profit organization is based in Denver, CO.

A total of 49 runners were entered in the middle school boys' division and 78 runners in the girls' division. The top 20 runners were given medals for their efforts.

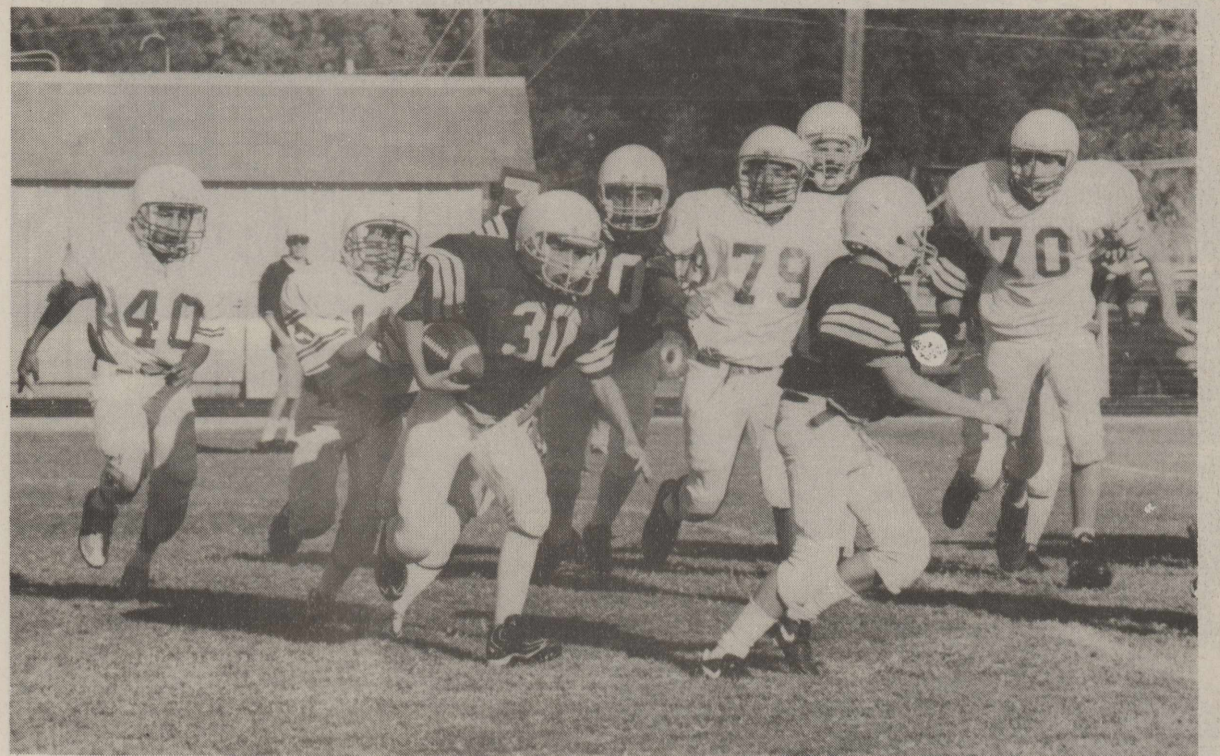
Jared Shaffer placed second with a time of 11:38 minutes. He was followed by teammates 6 Jimmy Lopez

Eagles swoop down upon Lions 35-0

The Eldorado Eagles exploded with three touchdown passes and 142 yards in the air to defeat the Ozona Lions 35-0 in a District 8-2A homecoming game held in Lion Stadium last Friday night. The Lions fall to a season record of 2-2 and a district record of 0-1. The Eagles extended their season record to 4-0 and district record to 1-0.

"We have to believe that one district loss is not the end of the race," said Ozona Lions' head coach Walter Hargrove. "Eldorado is good, and they may go through undefeated, but two teams go to the playoffs. We cannot think the season is lost just because we lost our first district game."

Ozona fans, players and coaches may have thought it was Friday the 13th as things went bad from the first. Ozona won the toss and elected to receive, but overeagerness showed on the first play as Ozona fumbled and Eldorado recovered on the Lions' 29-yard line. On the first play, Eldorado's quarterback Casey Snelson threw a pass, and an Ozona defensive player was called for interference with the Eagles getting the ball on the Lions' 19-yard line.

With a five-yard pass to Kyle Hunter and a 14-yard run by running back Garrett Bownds, the ball reached the 1-yard line. On the second play from that point, Bownds scored with 10:09 remaining in the first period. The PAT by Corey Reeves hit one of the goal posts and was no good.

"Mistakes with the ball, missed assignments, and missed tackles have really hurt us in our two losses. If we can correct those things, and all are correctable, then we are fine," said Coach Hargrove. "We need to stay positive, care about the team, be unselfish, and develop a real and honest desire to win each week. We are very close to that, but we all haven't crawled all the way over that fence yet. It needs to happen now."

The Eagles' defense went to work on the Lions' offense as they held the Lions, forcing a punt. The Eagles received their next possession of the ball on their 40-yard line. They covered the distance in 10 plays, which were climaxed with a 1-yard touchdown pass from Snelson to Hunter with 3:16 left in the first quarter. This time the Eagles ran the ball with Bownds scoring the conversion to expand their score to 14-0.

The Eagles appeared not to slow down in the second period, either. They started their third touchdown drive from midfield after a Lion fumble. Four plays later, after a one yard loss and an illegal shift penalty, the Eagles scored on a 46-yard pass from Snelson to Mark Fryar with 8:22 remaining. This time, the PAT by Reeves went between the uprights, and the Eagles enlarged their score to 21-0.

"We dug ourselves a hole early in the game against a good team, and we couldn't get out of the hole," Coach Hargrove said. "I am not discouraged, but we better tighten the screws and take care of business each week."

An Ozona interception by Eldorado's Lance Mitchell set up the Eagles' second touchdown in the second period. The ball was intercepted on the Lions' 38-yard line. It took the Eagles five plays to cover the yardage for a touchdown, which was a 9-yard run by Bownds with 4:31 remaining in the first half. The PAT by Reeves was good, giving the Eagles a 28-0 halftime lead.

"Three of their scoring drives the first half started inside our 40-yard line," said Coach Hargrove. "You can't give good teams those opportunities."

The Eagles' last touchdown occurred early in the third period. Eldorado took the second half opening kickoff and returned it to their own 28-yard line. In six plays with the help of a Lion personal foul call, the Eagles crossed the goal line on a 22-yard pass from Snelson to Lance Mitchell with 10:18 left in the quarter. The PAT by Reeves was good, giving the Eagles a 35-0 victory.

Eldorado had three linemen over 200 pounds, and Fryar weighed in at 200. With players of that size, it was difficult for the Ozona line to block them with any success. "They really pushed our offensive linemen, and that created some problems," Coach Hargrove said. "People have had success doing that, so we will probably see a lot of that."

Snelson finished the evening with 142 yards passing as he hit 11-for-16 passes. Bownds rushed for two touchdowns and 66 yards.

Unfortunately for the Lions, the Eagles played good defense as well. They caused four turnovers, three of which were fumble recoveries. They held the Lions to only 69 yards rushing on 31 carries. Justin Browne, the Lions' quarterback, completed only two of 13 passes with one interception. Brian Badillo caught one pass for 12 yards, and Anthony Ortiz caught one for five yards.

Although, it wasn't exactly the penalties that killed the Lions (3-for-35 yards) it was the fumbles. The Lions had seven fumbles and lost three.

"We missed a lot of assignments, missed a lot of tackles, and missed some coverages. Those things hurt us," said Hargrove.

The Lions will not have an easy foe this week either. They face off with the 1996 Class 2A State Champions, the Iraan Braves. The Braves can be beaten, and that's what happened last week when Wall beat the Braves 21-20.

"Wall upset Iraan last week in a big win. They (Iraan) are not invincible, but I'm sure they will be plenty mad," said Coach Hargrove. "Iraan is still good, but they lost some weapons

from last year's group."

The non-district game will be played in Braves Stadium on Friday, Oct. 3, starting at 8 p.m. Be a Lion supporter and go out and watch the game.

Ozona High School classes off to good start

According to high school principal, Donny Wiley, classes at Ozona High School are off to a good start in spite of the construction activity taking place on the campus. In addition to lots of learning taking place in individual classrooms, the traditional activity period has been supplemented by two new programs. Activity period is from 8:55 to 9:20 a.m. daily on weekdays except on Fridays when the activity period is moved to noon for pep rallies. Activity period assignments are determined by the school counselor, David McWilliams, and Mr. Wiley, the principal. A variety of educational activities are taking place during this twenty-five minute period.

Junior and senior students who have not yet passed a portion of the TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) exit tests in reading, writing, and mathematics are assigned to a teacher in the appropriate subject area for intensive TAAS tutoring. These students are working to get ready for the next TAAS exit test administration which will be held on Oct. 28, 29 and 30. Since this test determines whether or not a student graduates from high school, this TAAS tutorial period is taken very seriously by students and teachers alike.

After the first grading period, students who are failing or in danger of failing specific subjects are assigned to a tutorial activity period. The purpose of these tutorials is to determine why a student is not succeeding and to formulate a plan to improve his/her grades. Since eligibility for sports, band, and all U.I.L. activities is based on grades, work in the tutorial activity period can directly affect a student's participation in many school activities.

Two new activity period programs

have been initiated this year for those students not needing tutorials. One of these is Project R.E.A.D. (Read Every Available Day). In this program, coordinated by librarian Sherry York, selected freshmen students participate in the project. These students spend their activity period reading books. Teacher-leaders in Project R.E.A.D. are athletic director, Walter Hargrove, and agriculture teacher, Terry Crawford. R.E.A.D. students select the books they will read during the project so some students are reading Accelerated Reader books to complete an assignment in Mrs. Arrott's English I classes. Others are reading *The Psychology of Winning* by Dennis Waitley. This book is required reading in Mr. Hargrove's health classes. Still others are checking out fiction and nonfiction library books on subjects of their own choosing. Daily reading logs are being kept by students in Project R.E.A.D. to document their reading.

According to Mrs. York, "It is my belief that the more our students read, the better students they will become. Reading develops vocabulary and cognitive skills which carry over to all subjects. Better readers become better TAAS test takers, better S.A.T./A.C.T. test takers, and better citizens."

A second promising activity period program is the college-prep tutorial. In this program junior and senior-level students are assigned to the library. The purpose of this program is to allow college-bound students to explore all the college-prep materials housed in the career room of the library. These students work independently at their own pace to become familiar with the numerous resources available to help students plan for college.

A checklist of college-prep materials includes fifteen books, six CD-ROM programs, a video, a cassette-booklet kit, and a set of flash cards. All of these materials can be checked out by students to use at home as they prepare for college entrance examinations. Also housed in the same area of the library are various college profile books, books on how to pay for college, books on scholarships, etc. Another excellent resource is *Peterson's College Selection Program* which is available on the career room computer. This program leads a student through a series of questions to help determine which colleges most closely fit the criteria he has chosen. This computer program also allows students to print out letters of inquiry to colleges and universities across the country.

Counselor McWilliams and the librarian have coordinated efforts for several years to make the college prep section of the career room a user-friendly, current, and diverse collection of materials to help Ozona students as they plan for college. New and replacement materials are added each year with several new materials currently on order to expand the collection. Now juniors and seniors have an opportunity to devote activity period time specifically to exploring these resources, making decisions about college, and starting the process of college entrance.

Obviously there is a great deal of activity during activity period at Ozona High School as school administrators, teachers, and staff cooperate to provide a positive learning environment which meets the needs of all students.

Plant Tips

Treat for TAP Now

Now that the night time temperature has fallen to a comfortable level, we can let our guard down as far as our lawns are concerned. Right? Wrong! This is the primary time to control the worst disease to hit St. Augustine since the great St. Augustine Decline (SAD) scare a number of years back. It's called Take-All Patch (TAP). Before we throw everybody into a panic, it has not taken over the town. We should be aware of it. The affected areas will be irregular and the leaf blades will have a yellowish to bronze tint. The affected area may thin out and weeds can invade the area. During the winter you may not detect spots that are tan to straw colored. This disease can survive on decaying matter, such as thatch. Over fertilizing and shallow watering will contribute to a thatch build up. Deep frequent watering is almost always best. There are very few exceptions to this rule.


Now is the time to apply a fungicide to control the problem. This disease affects the crown and roots first. Apply Premium Lawn Fungicide with Bayleton. It should be watered in slightly so it can go to work on the crown and root system. The damage done by this disease will be apparent in the late spring or summer.

Early next spring you should begin thatch removal if you have a thatch problem.

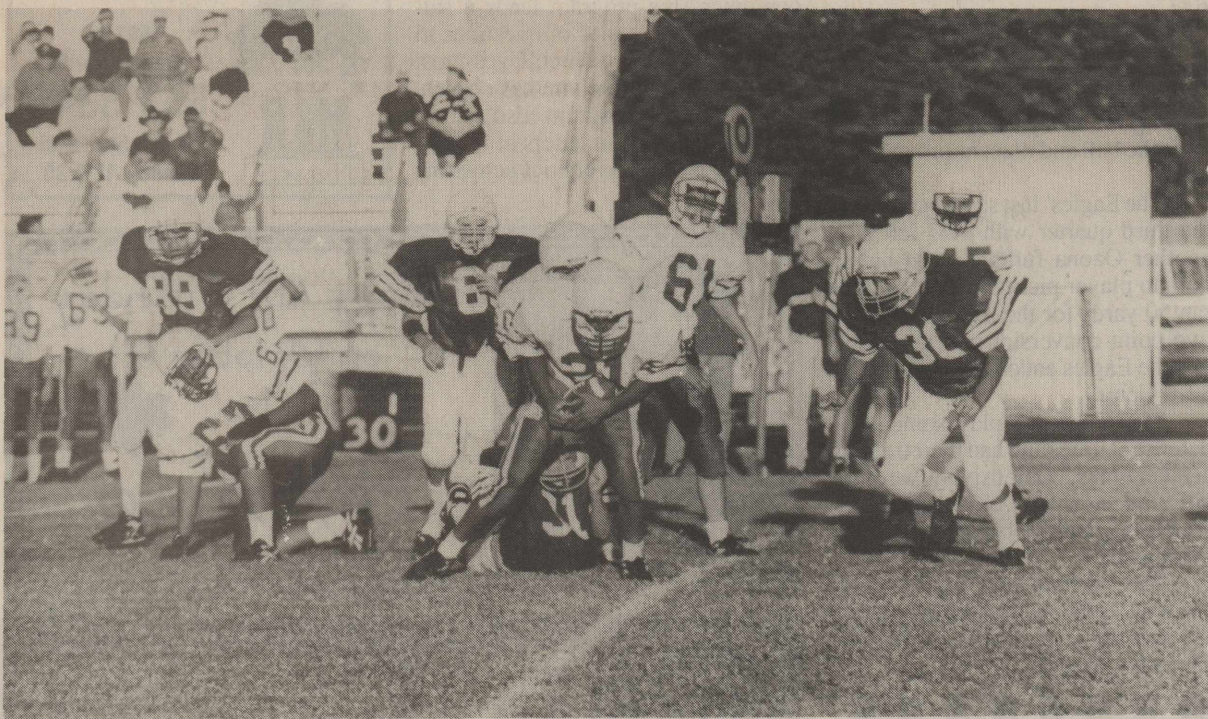

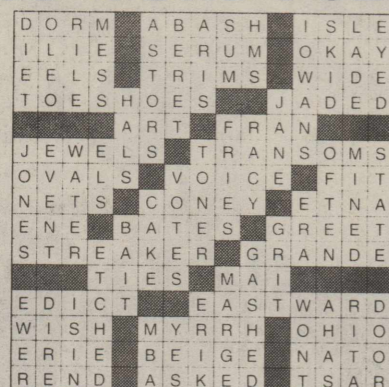

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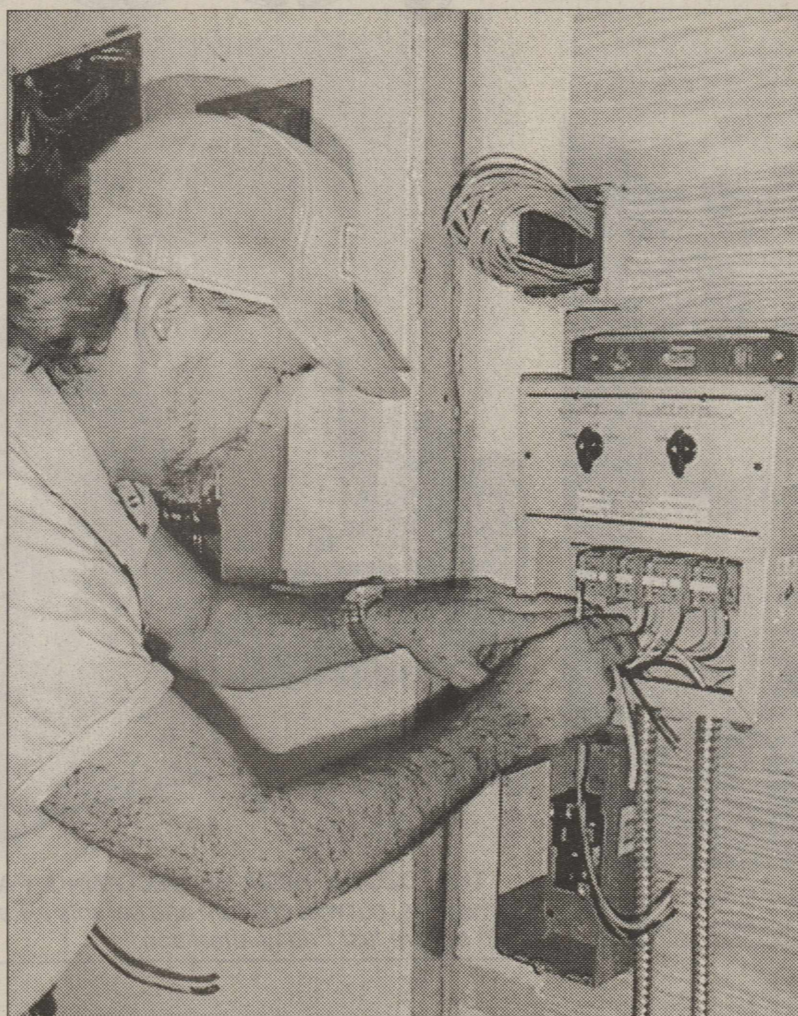

Weekly Drilling and Completion Report

Flowing 100 barrels of oil per day on a 48/64 choke, the No. 73F Union Pacific has been completed 11.2 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's Ozona Field. The well was drilled a total of 7,000 feet with plugback to 3,287. Production will be from a Clear Fork Formation interval, 3,122 to 3,138 feet into the wellbore. Flowing tubing pressure stood at 150 PSI.

Marathon Oil Co. has posted first production data for the No. 313 Olson Unit, located 15 miles east of Iraan in Crockett County's Olson Field. The developmental well pumped 40 barrels of oil per day. It was bottomed at 2,530 feet and will produce from 2,186 to 2,262 feet into the hole.

At a location 44 miles southwest of Ozona, Enron Oil & Gas Co. of Midland is preparing to make hole for the No. 7 Daniel-State 2 in Crockett County's Simpson-Mann Field. Drillsite is a 583-acre lease in the T. J. Brown Survey A-5453. Canyon Formation will be the target at a depth of approximately 6,500 feet.

The same operator has filed for permit to drill the No. 17M. K. Daniel "A" 45 miles southwest of Ozona, also in Crockett County's Simpson-Mann Field. Location is a 3,601-acre lease in the I&GM Survey A-529. Authority has been granted for 6,500 feet of maximum hole.

Crockett County's Davidson Ranch Field will see some developmental action via a recompletion bid for extended well life at the No. 4 Joe Wylie McMullan, 10 miles southwest of Ozona. Harrison Interests Inc. of Houston is the operator. Drillsite is a 1,344-acre lease in the GC&SF Survey A-4454. The venture is under permit for 9,700 feet of hole making.

Ballots and information mailed on Sheep and Goat Referendum

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, sponsoring organization for the upcoming sheep and goat referendum, has mailed ballots, return envelopes and information sheets to all TSGRA members, American Meat Goat Association members, American Boer Goat Association members and all county Extension offices.

The balloting period is from Sept. 26 through midnight on Oct. 10. All ballots are to be mailed to: Sheep and Goat Referendum, Texas A&M Research and Extension Center, 7887 U. S. Hwy. 87 North, San Angelo, TX 76901.

Producers will be voting on whether or not to assess themselves up to 20 cents per head on all sheep and goats to be collected at each point of sale to finance promotion, research and education pertaining to sheep and goats across the 254 counties in the state of Texas. Assessments will be refundable to any party who requests a refund within 60 days of date of sale. Refund requests must be made in writing accompanied by a dated bill of sale verifying the assessment was paid.

All individuals who owned sheep and/or goats in Texas on Jan. 1, 1997, may vote. Family members or members of a partnership may vote as long as family members or partners split, or

are assigned, production numbers. If only one member of the family or partnership is assigned production numbers, only that individual may vote. For example, if a man and wife own 500 sheep, each may vote 250 head. If a young person owns animals in his or her name and would be required to pay the assessment, he/she may vote. If a partnership owns 100 head, each partner may vote his or her share of the production.

Producers will also be voting to elect a 9-man board of directors which will be responsible for determining projects for sheep and goats assessed under this program if the referendum passes. The state is broken down into three districts, and three directors will be elected from each district. Producers should vote in the district where they live or where their major production lies, and they must also vote for directors from that district.

If the referendum passes by a two-thirds majority of producers or a simple majority of production based on Texas Statistical Service numbers for sheep and/or goats as of Jan. 1, 1997, assessment will begin on a date set by the newly elected board.

OHS Vocation Adjustment class begins 12th year

The vocational adjustment class at Ozona High School kicked off its 12th season with 12 VAC students employed in the local community.

The VAC is a work/study program is designed to transition students with disabilities into the world of work. Vocational training and job experience are combined with academic courses in a special curriculum that leads to maximum development of employment potential.

The goal is to prepare students to enter the world of work so they can be as self-sufficient as possible upon graduation from high school. While most students may have trouble with academics, they can perform well on a job if it is within the range of their abilities. They desire employment to establish their identity and independence. The program's underlying philosophy is that the best way for these students to prepare for future employment is to build successful work experiences while enrolled in high school.

Each student continues with academic subjects, especially reading and math. Those who can achieve success in mainstream classes are placed in those classes, where their progress is carefully monitored. In VAC classes, emphasis is placed on teaching students the necessary attitudes, habits, behaviors, and skills required to obtain and keep a job in the community.

Students earn credit toward high school graduation through the VAC program. Students in the VAC program participate in vocational training through paid and/or unpaid training sites. Students may work part or full time. Ozona presently has two full and 10 part time workers.

The students are employed at various job sites throughout the community. These include the transportation department at the school, the care center, the Head Start School, Poco

Taco, Town and Country Food Stores, Pepe's Restaurant, Shot's #4 and Stokes Well Service.

Mr. James Cox, the vocational adjustment coordinator, at the school

wishes to thank all the employers who have employed these students. He also reminds potential employers that there can be a tax incentive for hiring VAC students.

Active children need adequate nutrients

With the beginning of school, many children will become involved in after-school activities and school sports. During this time it is important that they receive sufficient calories and nutrients to support growth and development.

In order to get nutrients that are essential for health, a child's total diet should contain a variety of selections from all the food groups. It is important to understand that no one food contains all the needed nutrients.

If your child only eats hot dogs or hamburgers, you need to incorporate more nutritious foods into their diet to promote a normal growth and well being.

Vitamins are probably the most famous group of nutrients. Choosing vitamin-rich fruits and vegetables can make a big difference in your child's overall health and should be included in any child's daily diet. Having fresh fruit or vegetable snacks is one way of making sure that your child is getting enough servings per day.

Children often find raw fruits and vegetables cut up in fun shapes or with yogurt dip more appealing than when cooked and served with meals. Getting at least five servings of either fruits or vegetables per day is a good goal to set for your child.

These foods will also provide sources of carbohydrates which should provide the majority of an active youth's diet. Other sources of carbohydrates include grains and cereals.

Calcium and iron are two very important minerals that children need to obtain from their diet. Children need to keep iron stores up for periods of rapid growth, stress, injury or illness.

ness. Growing children also need more iron for their size because they have a higher metabolic rate. Sources of iron include dried fruit, red meat, whole grain foods, leafy green vegetables, breads and cereals.

Calcium helps to build strong bones and teeth and is also essential during this rapid stage of growth. The best sources of calcium include milk and milk products such as cheese, yogurt or ice cream. Other sources include dried beans and nuts, green leafy vegetables and canned fish with bones.

Protein is another important nutrient that is necessary for not only growth but also for building, repairing, and replacing body cells, tissues and enzymes. Some examples of protein-rich foods include fish, poultry, beef, pork, eggs, milk products, dried beans, peas, and some vegetables.

Fat is another nutrient worth mentioning because it provides almost twice as many calories as carbohydrates and protein. Besides providing energy, fats contain essential fatty acids that children need for healthy skin and proper development. Fats give certain foods flavor and do provide some vitamins necessary for health but should be consumed in moderate amounts.

When planning your child's diet, always consider balancing their diet with a wide variety of foods.

While some children may not accept all new foods incorporated into each meal, continue to expose them to new food experiences. Food habits formed now will affect the food choices they may make as an adult and a healthy child will grow to become a healthy adult.

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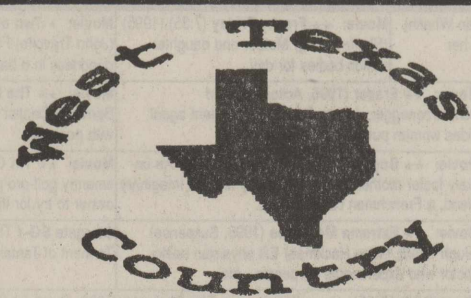

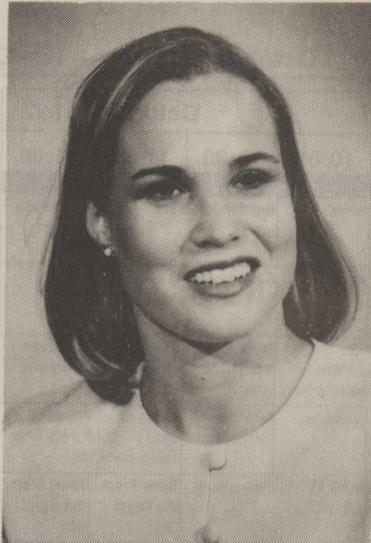

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
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
