

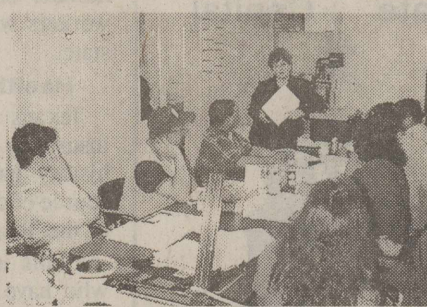

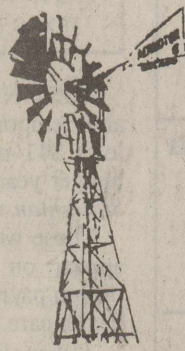
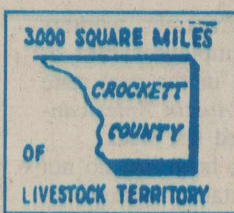

Arrest ends nine hour manhunt

A traffic stop by Cpl. Ben English of the Department of Public Safety turned into a manhunt when the driver of a stolen car fled into the brush east of Ozona Monday. Beginning about 3 p.m., the search for a man with long red hair spread down country roads and into the skies as a plane and helicopter joined officers' attempts to locate Mark Shane Bennett of Colorado.

Dense fog hampered search efforts after dark, and two dogs brought from the Texas Department of Corrections unit at Fort Stockton were still out Tuesday morning.

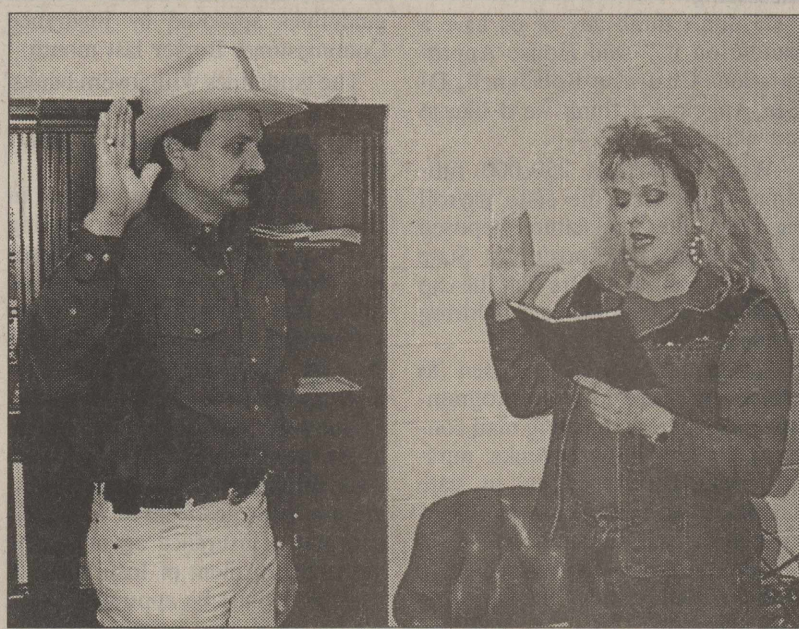
Bennett, 26, was arrested without incident by county deputies at four minutes past midnight on Heracio

Street, approximately three miles from the start of the pursuit. Deputies were sent to the area after the sheriff's office received calls of someone trying to break into a locked car.

He was charged with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, two counts of burglary of a vehicle and evading arrest. The car which Bennett was driving was reported stolen out of Dade City, FL.

In the car at the time of the traffic stop was a hitchhiker who was detained but not arrested.

DPS Troopers, county officers, Texas Ranger Jerry Byrne and the game warden were assisted by officers from Sonora.

Filing ends for March 10 primaries

Filing for a place on the ballot in the March 10 primaries ended Friday, Jan. 2, at 6 p.m.

Asking for a place on the ballot are incumbents Debbi Puckett-Moore, district and county clerk; Jeffrey Sutton, county judge; Burl J. Myers, county treasurer; Rudy R. Martinez, Pct. 4 commissioner; James M. (Jim) Hearne, Justice of the Peace, Pct. 1; and A. O. Fields, Democratic county chairman.

Also on the ballot will be Fred Deaton, who has filed for the county judge position, and Pleas Childress III, a candidate for Pct. 2 commissioner; Jesse F. DeLa Garza, who is asking election to the Pct. 4 commissioner spot; and Bob R. Falkner, a candidate for justice of the peace.

Letters of intent to file as independent candidates in the general election have been filed with Judge Jef-

frey Sutton by Victor De La Garza, a candidate for justice of the peace, Catarino Villarreal, a candidate for treasurer, and Orlando DeHoyos, a candidate for county judge.

Persons wishing to be on the ballot as an independent candidates can not actually file until after the primary run-offs, but they must file a letter of intent on the same deadline as other candidates.

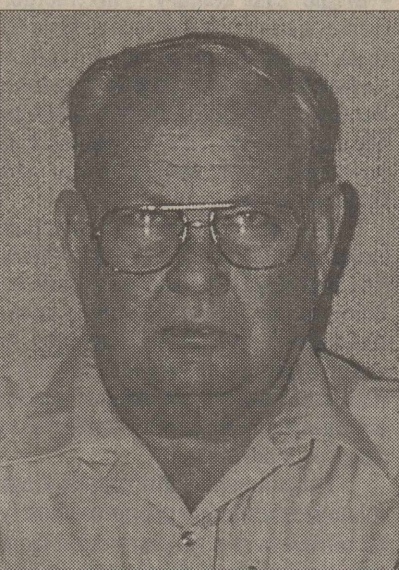

911 to be implemented Jan. 14

Concho Valley Council of Governments and Crockett County invite the public to a ceremony to celebrate the implementation of 911 emergency telephone service in Crockett County. The ceremony will be held between the sheriff's office and fire station Jan. 14 at 1 p.m. In case of bad weather, the event will be moved to the Fair Park Convention Center.

Crockett County is the last county in the state to have the 911 emergency

service. Ozona Women's Forum members made 911 an organization project and worked diligently to achieve this result. Commissioners voted twice in 1996 to implement 911, and on Nov. 18, 1996, more than 100 citizens attended a commissioners' meeting to hear a report from a committee appointed by the court to study the feasibility of having 911.

Court members had approved 911 during the administration of the late

Judge Kathryn Mayfield, but had rescinded their approval.

Crockett County will have a transfer system located in the Sheriff's Office. There will be a direct line with two answering points, at the jailer's desk and in the chief jailer's office. A transfer button will contact the fire department or ambulance service as needed. The system is hooked to an emergency generator, and a tape log will record all incoming calls.

Rudy Martinez Jr. has filed for re-election to the post of Crockett County Commissioner, Precinct 4 for a third term.

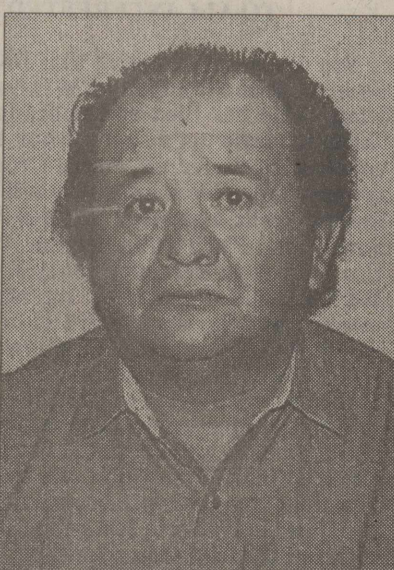

Oil and gas still #1 money bag for county

Oil and gas producers in Crockett County continued to be the top tax paying entities for the county and school coffers in 1997 accounting for 86.7% of the total tax bill. This total is down by .1% over last year according to Crockett County Tax Assessor figures.

The fifteen top tax payers in the county for 1997 with property assessed at \$449,967,190 were: Union Pacific Resources Co. - \$116,588,890 valuation and \$2,359,176.19 tax; Union Pacific Oil & Gas - \$67,590,210 valuation and \$1,367,687.90 tax; Shell

Western E&P Inc. - \$54,611,930 valuation and \$1,105,072.40 tax; Texaco Exploration & Production Inc. - \$42,985,910 valuation and \$869,819.89 tax; Enron Oil & Gas - \$39,682,510 valuation and \$802,975.59 tax; Thompson (J. Cleo) - \$21,784,010 valuation and 4440,799.44 tax; Devon Energy Corp.

- \$16,478,180 valuation and \$333,435.97 tax; Union Oil Co. of CA - \$16,186,010 valuation and \$327,523.91 tax; Cross Timbers Operation Co. - \$16,120,890 valuation and \$326,206.21 tax; Harrison

Interest Ltd. - \$13,471,530 valuation and \$272,596.41 tax; Sonat Exploration Co. - \$10,689,960 valuation and \$216,311.34 tax; Parker & Parsley Dev. The total assessed value of taxable property in Crockett County in 1997 was set at \$694,517,383.74. Of this total oil and gas valued property

was \$602,146,571.70 for 86.7%.

A breakdown of other taxpayers in 1997 were: agriculture land - \$25,905,498.41 (3.73%); ranch improvements - \$2,291,907.36 (3.3%) - residences (homes and mobile homes) - \$23,405,235.83 (3.37%); apartments - \$1,180,679.55 (.17%); vacant lots - \$1,111,227.81 (.16%); local business and personal property - \$37,087,228.29 (5.34%).

Tax rates per \$100 valuation for 1997 were set at: Crockett County - \$.70, Crockett County Consolidated Independent School Dist. - \$1.30; Emerald Underground Water Dist. - \$.0235 for a total tax rate of \$2.0235.

AUSTIN — Contract workers and temporary employees cost at least \$41 million in the past state budget year, the *Austin American-Statesman* reported last week.

Those workers, however, do not appear on the state's annual \$6 billion payroll. Nor do they receive health care and retirement benefits.

Although state officials say they don't know how many outside workers perform state jobs and how much paying them costs, they acknowledge that both numbers are increasing.

"I don't think any of us have a handle on it," said House Appropriations Chairman Rob Junell, D-San Angelo. "I think we'd like to see where they are."

With more than 250,000 full-time workers on the state payroll in 1997, the Legislature imposed a cap on full time positions. State officials want to ensure that the cap doesn't lead to an increase in hiring "temps."

Among the tasks assigned to temporary workers are programming computers, opening mail containing child support checks, nursing mentally ill patients in state hospitals and taking calls from victims of natural disasters.

State Auditor Lawrence Alwin said he will study the growing

number of temporary and contract workers who perform tasks for the state.

Health-care Pool Opens
 Texans who couldn't get health insurance because of their medical history gained access Jan. 1 to a source of coverage with the opening of the Texas Insurance Risk Pool.

"This is a milestone for Texans who have gone without health insurance because poor health made them uninsurable," said Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer.

The pool was created by legislation sponsored by Rep. Kip Averitt and Sen. David Sibley, both of Waco, and passed by the 1997 state Legislature.

The pool will sell two major medical plans that differ only in their deductible amounts and out-of-pocket maximums. Both plans offer lower costs for patients who use health-care providers on the pool's provider network, but patients are free to use out-of-network providers for an additional out-of-pocket cost.

Annuities Rules Approved
 Banks in Texas cities of any size may obtain agents' licenses to sell annuities under interim guidelines approved by Insurance Commissioner Bomer last month.

The guidelines will govern banks' annuity sales until the 1999 Legislature can amend the state's agent-licensing laws.

Bomer issued the guidelines in response to an October ruling by U.S. District Judge James R. Nowlin of Austin. Nowlin ruled that federal banking laws authorizing banks to sell annuities override Texas laws that prevent their doing so.

Annuities are investment contracts usually sold by life insurance companies. To sell annuities, a bank must be licensed as an incorporated insurance agent by the Texas Department of Insurance. A bank also must be appointed by at

least one life insurance company to act as its agent for the sale of annuities.

Day-care Law Takes Effect
 Jan. 1 was the deadline for day-care providers to comply with a new state law requiring people who care for three or fewer children to undergo criminal background checks by the state.

"The background checks are designed to ensure that no person with a criminal or substantiated child-abuse history is entrusted with the care of children," said Karen Eells, a spokeswoman for the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services.

After the background check is completed, the caregiver is issued a certificate of listing with the state at a cost of \$20.

Caregivers who don't become listed with the state risk penalties, including fines of up to \$2,000 and up to six months in jail.

Other Capital Highlights
 ■ A telephone survey of 2,710 people between January and April last year revealed that about one in four Texans witnessed an incident of child abuse or neglect. The poll also showed that almost 30 percent of those surveyed did not know state law requires them to report such incidents to authorities.

■ The Public Utility Commission has approved a 4 percent interim rate cut for residential customers of Texas Utilities Electric Co. The rate reduction applies only to the non-fuel portion of the monthly electric bill. PUC officials said some commercial customers, mostly small and medium-sized businesses would get a rate cut of 2 percent.

■ The Texas Office of Public Utility Counsel has joined the Virginia State Corporation Commission in asking the Supreme Court to overturn new federal rules that removed state caps on pay calls, including the 25-cent cap that Texas had.

WTU's parent company announces merger

American Electric Power Company, Inc. and Central and South West Corporation announced on Dec. 22, 1997, that their boards of directors have approved a definitive merger agreement for a tax-free, stock-for-stock transaction. This combination creates an electric utility company which will serve more than 4.6 million customers in 11 states and approximately 4 million customers outside the United States.

Under the agreement, each common share of CSW will be converted into 0.6 shares of AEP. Based upon AEP's closing price of \$52.00 on Friday, Dec. 19, 1997, this represents a premium of 20% over the CSW closing price of \$26.00. AEP will issue approximately \$6.6 billion in stock to CSW stockholders to complete the transaction. CSW stockholders will own approximately 40% of the combined company. Both companies anticipate continuing their current dividend policies until the close of the transaction.

Under the merger agreement, there will be no changes required with respect to the public debt issues of the outstanding preferred stock of CSW or its subsidiaries.

Dr. E. Linn Draper Jr., chairman, president and chief executive officer of AEP, said, "We believe that together we will be a successful competitor - nationally and internationally - in the 21st century. This merger creates a company that is diverse in its fuels, its generation and its workplace - a link between the Midwest and the Southwest, reaching from Canada to Mexico. We are two companies that have historically been efficient and financially strong."

E. R. Brooks, chairman and chief executive officer of CSW, said, "With this merger, CSW and AEP will be doing much more than simply combining two excellent companies to create a larger one. We are creating a new standard for excellence in the emerging global energy and related services market."

The companies anticipate savings related to the merger of approximately \$2 billion over a 10-year period from the elimination of duplication in corporate and administrative programs, greater efficiencies in operations and business processes, increased purchasing efficiencies, and the combination of the two workforces.

The companies anticipate that the merger will not affect base rates. The electric systems of AEP and CSW will operate on an integrated and coordinated basis as required by the Public Utility Holding Company Act of 1935. Any fuel savings resulting from the coordinated operation of the combined company will be passed on to customers.

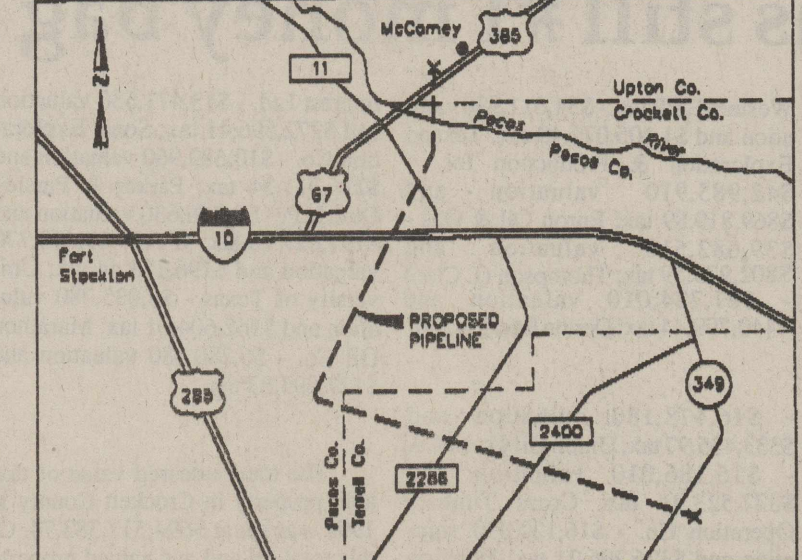
Draper, currently chairman, president and chief executive officer of AEP, will remain chairman, president and chief executive officer of the combined company. Brooks, currently chairman and chief executive officer of CSW, will become a board member of the combined company. Thomas V. Shockley III, CSW president and chief operating officer, will continue as a key senior officer of the combined company in the Southwest region.

The board of the combined company will be made up of 15 members, 10 from AEP, plus Brooks and four others from CSW. The name of the combined company will be American Electric Power Company, Inc. and will be headquartered in Columbus, OH, with significant operations in all 11 states.

Thelma Hyde--Cook-of-the-Week

An innovative cook, Thelma Hyde created three of the recipes she shares today. "A cousin asked, 'could you ever just go by a recipe?' " Thelma said. "I might just have to add a little something," said Thelma in reply.

This cook of the week uses a lot of homegrown garlic. "I eat garlic like it was onion," said Thelma. "I don't eat very much at one sitting, and I eat slowly," she said.

She started cooking in 4-H in the Lubbock area where she grew up on a farm. Thelma says she really learned to cook while her parents were working in the fields. One day her father told her to kill and cook a chicken for their meal. "When Daddy said to do it, you'd better do it," so she did. To this day, Thelma cuts up chicken the way she did that first time with no experience to guide her.

Thelma moved to Ozona from Lubbock in June of 1977 when she married the late Jack Hyde. She lives in their home on Ozona's east hill where she enjoys watching deer, turkey and little animals in the back yard. She likes sewing, crocheting and yard work, although a shoulder injury put a stop to the yard work several months ago.

In addition to feeding the animals that visit her yard, "I try to help my fellow human beings, too. God put us here for a purpose, and that is my purpose," she said.

Friends call Thelma The Angel Lady. She began a collection of angels in 1952 in Amarillo and continues today.

When Thelma takes food to a gathering, friends always ask her to "bring your cornbread dish". Here it is.

Thelma's Cornbread Dish

1 pkg. Mexican Cornbread Mix. Make by directions on package. Add to this, one can cream style corn.

Brown 1 pound ground meat (chicken, turkey or deer). Add to this, 1 chopped onion, 2 cloves garlic, salt and pepper to taste. 2 cups grated cheese.

Heat 2 or 3 tablespoons oil or

Crisco in 2 inch iron skillet. Add 1/2 cornbread mixture in hot skillet. Then add the cooked meat. Sprinkle on top of cornbread mixture. Then add grated cheese all over the meat. Add rest of cornbread mixture. Cook at 400 degrees about 30 minutes or until cornbread is brown.

Thelma's Corn Casserole

1 can cream style corn (16 oz.)
1 Egg Beater
1/4 can diced green chilies
1/2 c. or more chopped onion
2 chopped garlic cloves or 1 tsp. garlic powder or salt
1/4 c. cornmeal
2 T. cooking oil
Mix all together, put in greased baking dish. Top with grated cheese. Bake at 325 degrees for about 30 minutes or until cheese is brown.

Thelma's Chicken Casserole

3/4 c. milk
1 c. sour cream
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 box chicken Stove Top Stuffing
1 boiled, boned, diced chicken
Mix everything except dressing. Pour into 9x13 pan. Prepare stuffing according to box. Drizzle over top of meat mixture. Bake at 325 degrees 35-40 minutes.

Butterscotch Pie

2 c. brown sugar
3 c. milk
3 T. cornstarch
3 T. flour
3 egg yolks, beaten
6 T. butter
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla
In medium saucepan, stir together brown sugar, cornstarch and flour. Add milk, egg yolks and butter, combine well. Cook and stir over med. heat until mixture is thickened. Cook and stir 2 minutes. Pour into 2 baked pie shells. Top with meringue.

This favorite of Jack Hyde's is from his mother's 1927 P.T.A. cookbook.

Jenna Henderson selected as a top 12 merit finalist

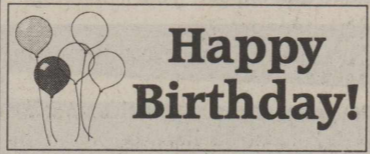

Midland College course offerings

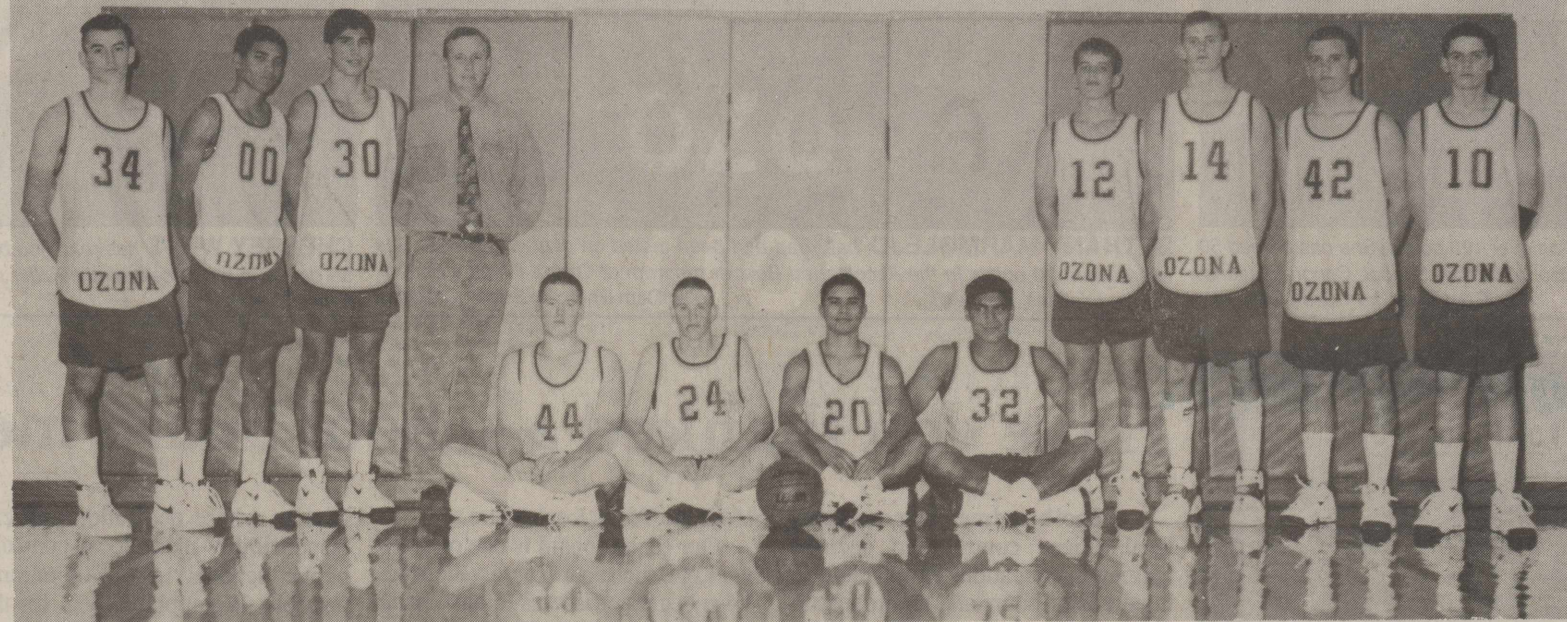
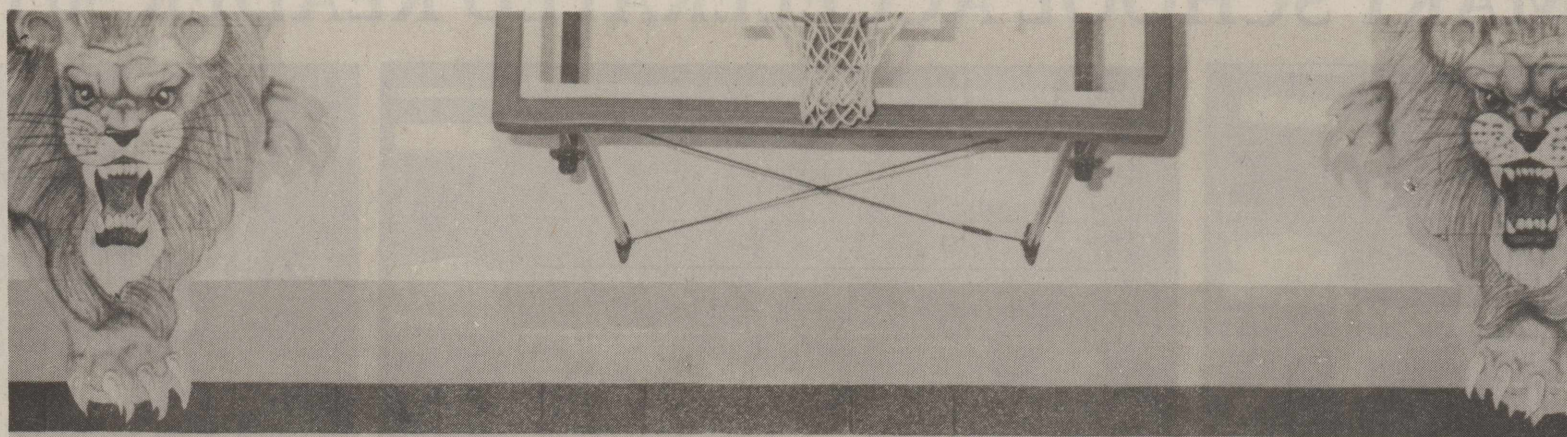

Peter Rodriguez scored 17 points against the Eagles and Justin Browne and Steven Martinez contributed 13

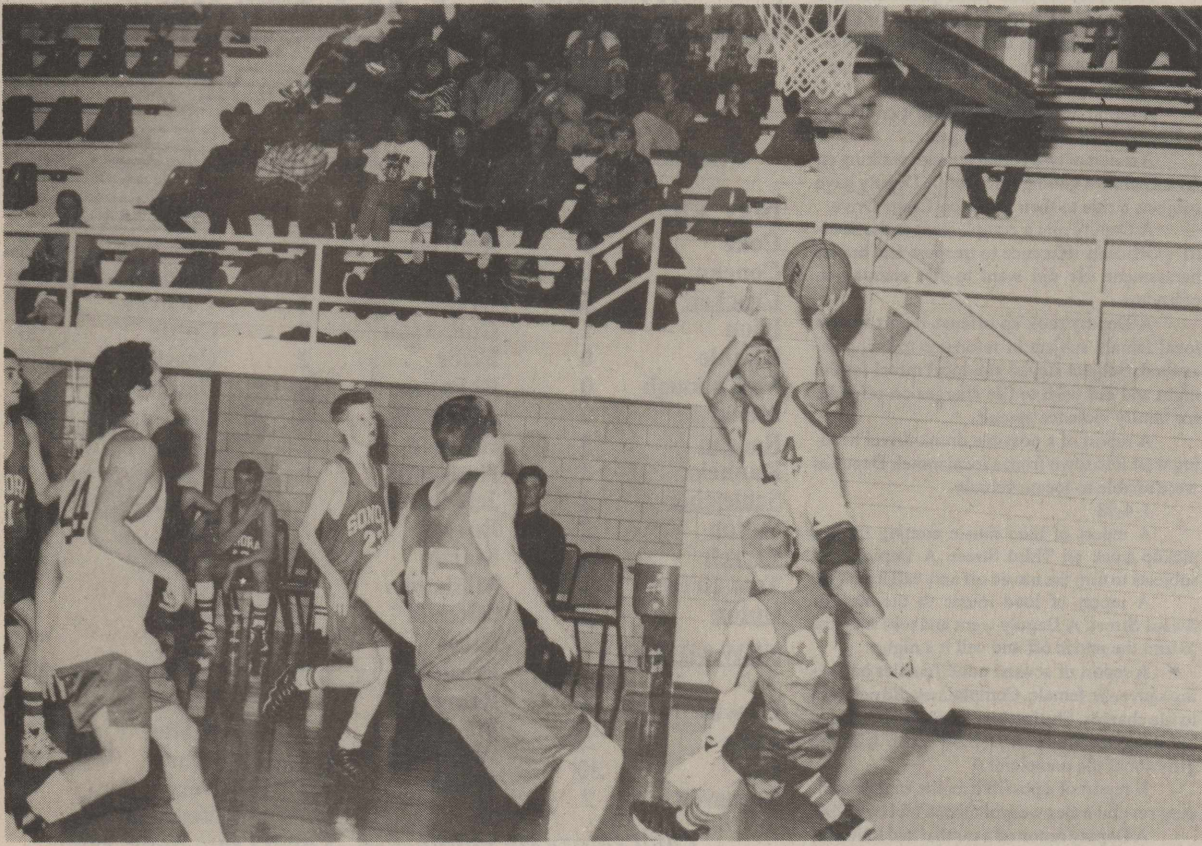
each as every man in uniform got a piece of the action against the helpless Eagle defense.

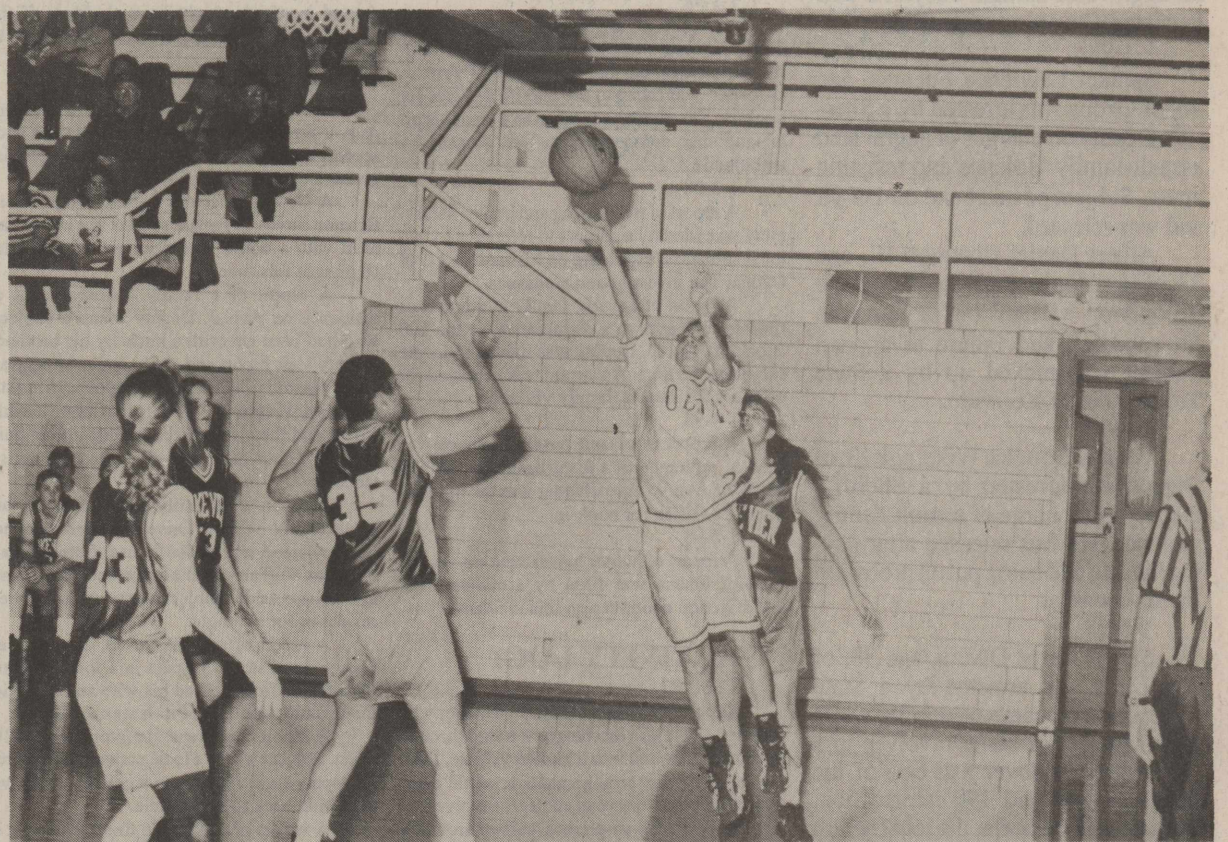

A report of a disturbance at a local apartment complex. There was no violence when Deputy arrived. They were just being loud. Subjects were told to quiet down and call it a night.

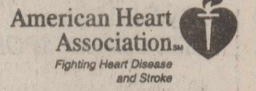

Weekly Drilling and Completion Report

The No. 4 Dunlap 91 has been brought on line 35 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's American Field. With Primal Energy Co. as the operator, the well was bottomed at 7,750 feet. It flowed at the rate of 263,500-CFD on a 1.25-in. choke and earned a 284,000-CFD rating on absolute open flow. Production will be from 7,200 to 7,572 feet into the hole in the Canyon Formation.

Crockett County's East Ozona Field gained new production via a recompletion bid at the No. 5H Friend "A", about two miles southeast of Ozona. Union Pacific Resources Corp. is the operator. The 12,107-ft. horizontal well was plugged back to 8,311. It flowed 700,000-CFD on a 1.25-in. choke and was rated at 2,621,000-CFD on absolute open flow. New production will be at 8,154 feet to hole's end.

First production figures have been posted for the No. 15 M. K. Daniel, located 45 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's Simpson-Mann Field. Enron Oil & Gas Co., the operator, bottomed the well at 6,160 feet. It flowed 452,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke and earned a 480,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow. The well will produce from 5,215 to 5,979 feet into the hole.

Cross Timbers Co. has brought two new gassers on line in Crockett County's Henderson Field. New producers include the Nos. 14 and 16 Jean Scheuber "B", located 11 miles southeast of Ozona. The wells are assigned absolute open flow ratings of 320,000 and 580,000-CFD, respectively.

The No. 14 well will produce from 7,808 to 7,838 feet into the hole. It potentialized at 310,000 CF gas per day on an .0875-in. choke. It was bottomed at 8,029 feet.

Flowing 580,000-CFD on a 1.25-in. choke, the No. 16 well was perforated at 7,764 to 7,794 feet into the hole. The well probed to 7,815 feet total depth.

The No. 32 A. R. Kincaid Trust "B" was recently completed about three miles southeast of Ozona in Crockett County's Northeast Ozona Field. Texaco Exploration & Production Co. is the operator. It flowed 243,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke and earned a 290,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow. Bottomed at 6,600 feet, the well will produce from 6,184 to 6,344 feet into the hole in the Canyon Formation.

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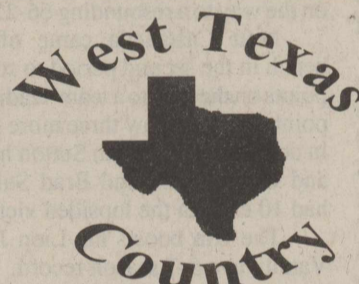
