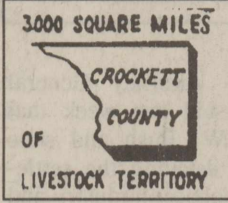

Lady Lions hurdle Hawley

At the Dorothy Garrett Coliseum last Saturday night in Big Spring the Ozona Lady Lions took the first successful step toward a trip to Austin when they took out the Hawley Lady Bearcats in bi-district action.

Amber Tarr took command of the net, Diana Ellison dominated the boards and the rest of the Lady Lions controlled the floor and the tempo of the game, knocking off Hawley 61-38. The victory sends the Lady Lions into the arena round to face Sundown on Tuesday night, Feb. 24.

For a minute and a half in the first period nobody wanted to score but Amber Tarr got things started with two at the 6:24 mark. Late in the quarter Diana Ellison pulled down one of her many rebounds for the evening and lifted it back up and off the glass to give the Lady Lions a 7 point advantage.

The long-range bombers then took over to give the Lady Lions a small cushion leading up to half time. Leslie Avila hit from three-point distance at the end of the opening period, then Juli Hall and Tarr added more of the same to open the second.

Diana Ellison, who would finish with 16 points in the contest, hit for 6 in the third period while Amber McWilliams added 5 in the same time frame to keep the Lady Lions me-

thodically pulling away from the frustrated Lady Bearcats. In the final stanza Tarr exploded for half of her total night's production of 25 points while it seemed that every missed shot put up by Hawley landed in the waiting hands of Ellison.

The Lady Lion's season record climbs to 34-1 with the big win but, most importantly, it propels them into the next round of playoff action.

Court approves Chandlerdale plat

Crockett County commissioners voted to accept a plat adding 70 lots to Chandlerdale West Feb. 20 at a 6:30 a.m. meeting. The meeting originated Feb. 19, but Commissioner Rudy Martinez, in whose precinct the land development is, was unable to be present. The court recessed and completed discussion and took a vote on the acceptance the next morning.

The extension will be to the west of the addition. There will be three sizes of lots. The plat provides for 50' streets and 20' alleys. All utilities will be in the alleys.

No other action was taken at the meeting.

The court was unable to move on the agenda item to approve paving locations for 1998 because all the necessary information was not available.

An item to approve additional paving at the airport at county expense no longer required action as the area

in question will be paved as part of the improvement project now underway through state grants.

The agenda item to approve road direction and fencing at the cemetery was discussed, but no action was forthcoming.

Mitchell, Stokes qualify for state

Ty Mitchell and John Austin Stokes placed first at the district UIL meet in Wall Feb. 17 to qualify for the state cross-examination meet. The competition will be held March 16-21 at The University of Texas at Austin.

A second Ozona team made up of Clay Richardson and Seth Webster placed fourth in the event. All four boys are sophomores. They are coached by Mrs. Renée Casey.

"UIL debate competition prepares students for the adult world by challenging their problem-solving and critical thinking skills, as well as their creativity," said Jana Riggins, UIL debate director. "This year's cross-examination debate topic required students to research renewable energy sources, increasing their knowledge of how to make their future world a better place. Certainly, learning how to think on one's feet, to investigate and analyze problems, and to effectively communicate ideas increases those leadership skills in students and gives us all hope for tomorrow."

UIL academic contests range from feature writing to accounting, and from computer science to poetry interpretation. Of the 2.2 million students who participated in UIL activities last year, 637,000 competed in one or more of the 22 general academic contests.

Through participation at the state meet, students qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. Since its inception in 1954, the TILF has provided \$11.4 million to approximately 10,315 students.

Board okays drug testing

In a special meeting that was held on Wednesday, Feb. 18, members of the Ozona School Board approved at second and final reading a district random mandatory drug testing policy for students who participate in extra or co-curricular activities in Ozona Middle School and Ozona High School.

The policy defines students who are subject to random mandatory drug testing as any student who participates in athletics, band, cheerleading, University Interscholastic League (UIL) activities, and all other voluntary extra or co-curricular activities.

It gives the district the right to test for the following substances: alcohol, amphetamines, barbiturates, benzodiazepines, cocaine metabolite, marijuana, methadone, opiates, phencyclidine, propoxyphene, hallucinogens, steroids, and all other illegal or addictive drugs. It also defines the type of sample collection, method of selection, testing procedures to be used, and consequences associated with positive drug tests.

Sample collection will be obtained by using urinalysis, hair analy-

sis, breath analyzer, and/or other approved drug testing methods. Students will be randomly selected to be sampled through the use of a computer program by Southwest Consortium Controlled Substance Testing, Incorporated of San Angelo, which is the same company the district utilizes for random drug and alcohol testing of all transportation employees and school bus drivers.

The policy, which will go into effect on August 1, 1998, requires a signed permission form from the parent or guardian that authorizes their student to be in extra or co-curricular activities. A student whose parent or guardian refuses to sign the permission form will not be allowed to participate in these activities.

At the beginning of the school year, each sponsor/department head will submit a list of students to be consolidated into a master list of students in activities. The master list will be submitted to the company that the district employs to do the testing, and then the master list will be computerized by the testing company. Random drawings will be generated from a computerized program by the testing company. The testing company will

administer the test, and the sample to be tested will be obtained in the district facilities that provide reasonable privacy for the student. The drug testing administrator will notify the designated school administrator of the results, and if the test is positive, the designated school administrator will notify the staff who shall be charged with implementing the consequences as described below.

After the first positive test result a confirmation test will be administered by the drug testing laboratory to confirm the initial test results. If this test is positive, the parent or guardian will be notified by a medical review officer of the results. The parent or guardian may have a reanalysis test performed on the original specimen by the drug testing laboratory at the parent's or guardian's expense.

A confidential parent or guardian/student meeting with a campus administrator will be held.

Early voting off to good start

Early voting began Monday, Feb. 23, and by 1 p.m. Tuesday, 93 ballots had been cast by personal appearance. Early voting judge Jean Conner said she has also responded to 26 requests for mailout ballots. Usually 95% or better return the mailouts, according to Mrs. Conner.

Early voting is being conducted at the county courthouse Monday through Friday during regular business hours through March 6.

With election day falling during spring break for Ozona schools and several contested races, early voting will likely be brisk.

Sutton named to regional water board

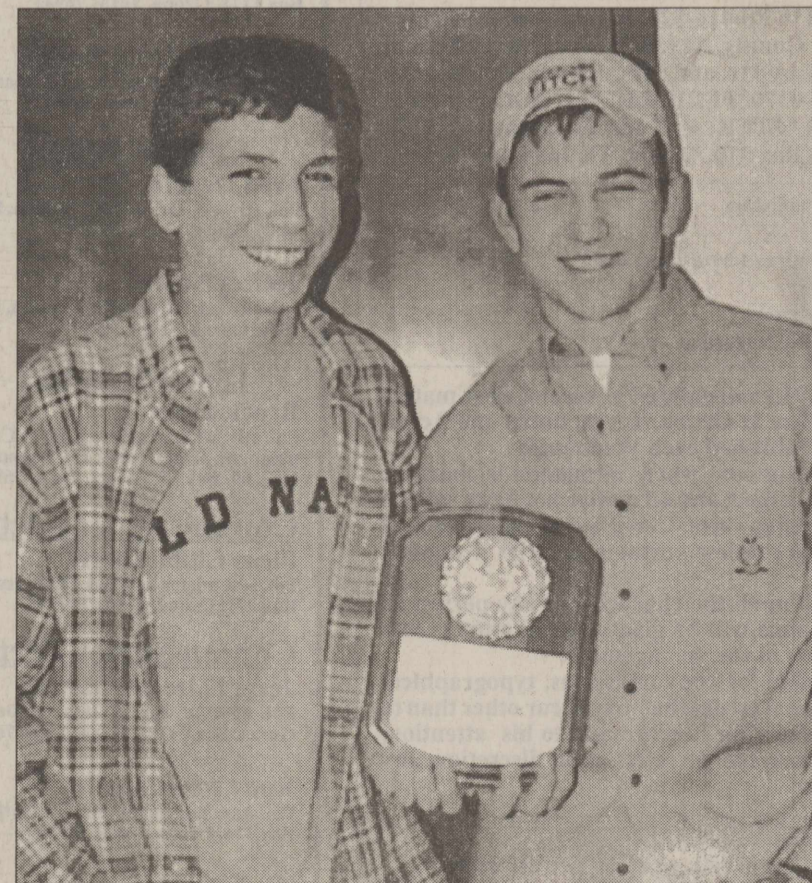
Jeffrey Sutton has been appointed as one of 20 members of a regional board responsible for creating a plan to develop, manage and conserve its water. Crockett County is part of the 30-county Region F designated by the Texas Water Development Board to include Kimble, Sutton, Reeves, Pecos, Schleicher, Menard, Mason, McCulloch, Concho, Irion, Reagan, Upton, Crane, Ward, Winkler, Loving, Brown, Coleman, Runnels, Coke, Glasscock, Ector, Martin, Andrews, Mitchell, Howard, Scurry, Borden and

Tom Green counties. Senate Bill 1 of the 75th Texas Legislature requires the development of a state water plan and the Texas Water Development Board to adopt it no later than Sept. 1, 2001.

A part of SB 1 requires the water development board to divide the state into regional water districts to plan for local water needs. These regional plans have to be approved by the water development board and then become part of the statewide plan.

This year, the TILF expects to award an estimated 5525 new and renewed grants, valued at approximately \$750,000. These academic scholarships have been funded by grants and

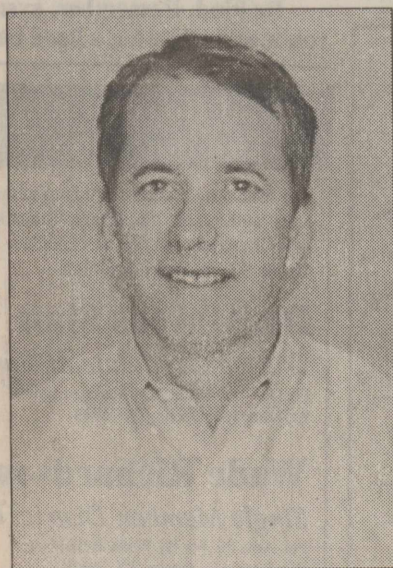
donations from foundations and individuals. Each dollar that the TILF receives goes directly for scholarships and no administrative or other overhead expenses are deducted.

AUSTIN — Attorney General Dan Morales said last week that Gov. George W. Bush and state legislators are delaying the settlement with the tobacco industry and withholding money that should be going to children's health care.

"The money is sitting in the bank. Thousands of children are sick. Let's get that money to the kids," Morales was quoted in the *Austin American-Statesman*.

Under federal law, Texas' \$15.2 billion settlement with cigarette makers could become effective Feb. 23, a date 30 days after U.S. District Judge David Folsom approved it. According to Morales, Texas could begin using the money that day, to extend health insurance to 72,000 poor children across the state.

Bush and the legislators rebuffed Morales' assertion, saying that state law, which requires the Legislature to appropriate money before spending it, prevents them from immediately spending it. Legislators must write a new state budget when they convene in January 1999.

"It's not up to Morales to decide how to distribute that money. The money will be distributed through the appropriations process," said Sen. Troy Frasier, R-Marble Falls. Frasier is one of seven state senators who have filed a motion to prevent

expenditure of the settlement.

Test Preparer Lauds Program
A new Texas A&M program that doesn't require the Medical College Admissions Test for some students has drawn praise from a company that prepares incoming students to take standardized tests.

Paul Cohen, a spokesman for Princeton Review, said the MCAT and other such tests are poor indicators of a student's ability.

"If these tests really measured how well you were going to do in medical school and law school, you couldn't take a test-preparation course and go up 6 points. We don't make our students better doctors or lawyers. We make them better test-takers," Cohen said, adding that he believes the tests are racially biased.

The A&M program, which addresses declining minority enrollment, recruits students from areas with large minority populations. It offers guaranteed admission to the A&M medical program to applicants who maintain a high enough grade-point average in an approved curriculum.

TAAS Guides Shipped
Copies of a study guide to help students pass the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills exit exam have been shipped to high schools across the state.

The "Working Through TAAS" guides cover the same skills that are taught in school and tested on.

Education Commissioner Mike Moses said, "The new guides will help the students be better prepared for the TAAS when they take it again next month."

High school students must pass the TAAS to graduate. They may take it up to eight times starting in their sophomore year.

TAAS guides — designed to help parents tutor their children over the summer — will be available in June for students in third through eighth grades.



Fresh Apple Pecan Cake

- 2 c. sugar
- 4 c. apples, diced
- 1 c. pecans, chopped
- 3 c. flour
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 2 tsp. soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 c. oil

Mix together sugar and apples and let them stand for 45 minutes. Add pecans for 15 more minutes. Add oil and eggs and mix. Add rest of dry ingredients. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour.

Catfish Meal

This recipe is one Mrs. Sanchez sometimes prepares when daughter Rosario, a teacher, comes for lunch.

- 2 medium fish
 - 1 T. oil
 - 2 slices of onions separated into rings
 - 1 c. cilantro
 - 1 T butter or margarine
 - 1 T lemon juice
 - Salt and pepper
- Sauté fish in hot oil two minutes each side. Drain oil. Add rest of ingredients, cover and cook five more minutes. 2 servings.

Baked Pork Chops

- 4 pork chops
 - 1 lb. potatoes
 - 2 slices onion separated into rings
 - 1 can cream of celery soup
- Place pork chops in baking dish. Cover, cook in pre-heated oven (350 degrees) for 30 minutes. Add slices of potatoes, onions and cream of celery soup. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover and cook for 30 more minutes. 2 to 4 servings.

As a result, children have no models to follow. Then, when they see a close knit street gang, they want in. The gang becomes their family.

The Bible provides a proper model

for love. Jesus tells us, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:39). Jesus' words fit right in with the Ten Commandments. John, the apostle of love, points this out. "For this is the love of God, that we keep his commandments" (1 John 5:3).

You see, when we obey our parents, we love them. When we protect the property of others, we are loving them. When we preserve the chastity of our girl friend, we are loving her. When we do all we can to preserve human life, we are acting in love. When we refuse to gossip about others but protect their name, we are loving them. These are the attributes of love. And they remain a real positive standard for love. They may be old fashioned because they reflect God's Ten Commandments. But contrary to popular opinion, "His commandments are not burdensome" (1 John 3:5). Kids involved in street gangs are looking for just this kind of love.

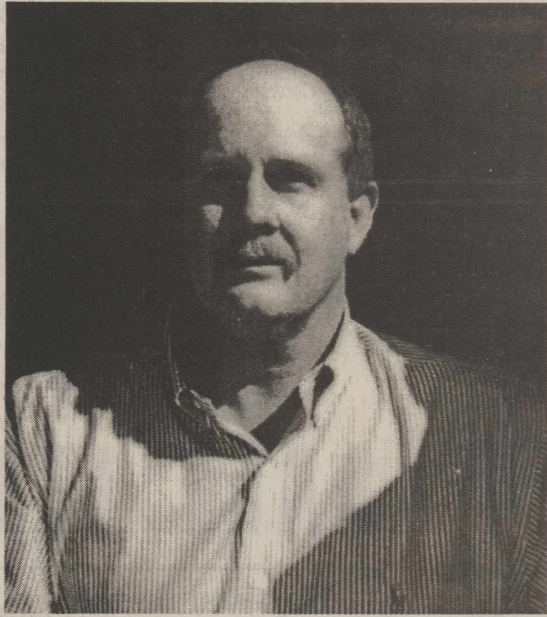

These oil revenues covered shortfalls in the tax revenue brought on by the drought of the '50s and its devastating impact on the agricultural tax base. Natural gas production started in the 1970s, booming through 1985. At this time, the entire county revenue started shifting from an agricultural to a petrochemical tax base. Then came a simultaneous petrochemical and agricultural bust in 1985. Following the bust, the county government used its reserves to continue running the county and the reserves were much depleted. To date they have not been replenished. Recovery followed in the early 1990s, and by 1995 the shift to a petrochemical supported tax base was essentially complete. Present tax revenues are derived 87.54% from petrochemical, 3.75% from agriculture, 5.34% from business, and 3.37% from residential property taxes. County expenditures are on the rise. With current declines in oil and natural gas prices, future tax revenues to pay for increasing spending will of necessity have to be shifted to Crockett County property taxes. Historic conservative budget management practices are not being followed at present in Crockett County. They could be again.

What does a County Judge do? Well, a County Judge is the presiding officer of Commissioner's Court. The County Judge is primarily a public relations and managerial position acting as a spokesman to carry out the orders of Commissioner's Court. The County Judge is the central administrator for the County, and the Commissioner's Court manager.

The County Judge administers only the wishes of Commissioner's Court.

The County Judge is entrusted to manage the administration of tax money. He proposes the yearly operating budget to Commissioner's Court based on budgets submitted by various County departments which he assembles and presents to the Commissioner's Court.

The County Judge cannot commission county debt without the approval of Commissioner's Court.

The County Judge presides over county court for "A" or "B" misdemeanors.

In Crockett County, the County Judge is essentially a 5th member of Commissioner's Court. Unlike the commissioners who are required to fulfill 16 hours of annual continuing education, the County Judge is required, upon election, to fulfill 30 hours and thereafter 16 hours of annual continuing education.

Fred Deaton has been a County Commissioner for 7 years. Who could be better qualified to work with and administer the wishes of Commissioner's Court than an experienced Commissioner?

Fred Deaton had 24 years prior business experience in the Ozona Butane Company. He started at the bottom with minimum or less pay, and worked up to management level and bought ownership of Ozona Butane. He then bought the coin laundry which was very successful. Fred is now serving the people of Crockett County with his own heating and cooling business, Deaton Mechanical, using knowledge gained working with his Dad and others at Ozona Butane Company.

The boards necessitated new learning, mainly about organizational budgeting and dealing with taxes. 4-H Rabbit Club members win big at San Antonio

Hilary Huffman, Jenna Henderson, Frankie Skinner, Adrienne Bendele, Julia Henderson and Amanda Hignight attended the San Antonio Livestock Show as a 4-H project to exhibit their rabbits in the annual San Antonio Junior Livestock Show and Exposition.

Youth show secretary Nita Shed said Ozona had one of the largest entries in the youth rabbit show. Over 1,000 rabbits were shown during the day. Beginning the show was a 6 a.m. check-in. Judges for the show were Bob Laurence of Houston and Mike Withrow of Yoakum.

In the California breed, Amanda Hignight placed third with a senior doe, received two fifth places and three sixth places.

The next commercial breed shown was Satins. Jenna Henderson won this breed by obtaining the recognition of Best of Breed and Best Opposite Sex for her senior broken buck and her solid black senior doe. In the same breed, Adrienne Bendele had a first place senior white that received a Best of Variety, and her Chinchilla Satin received a second place. Jenna and Adrienne had several competitors in this class who were amazed that they were so tough in the competition and from the same county.

In the Mini Lop breed, Amanda Hignight had a first place solid junior buck and a first place broken junior buck. Adrienne Bendele won in this breed with her solid senior doe with a Best Opposite Sex and her broken senior buck with a Best of Breed. All four of these Mini Lops received Best of Variety for that color.

In the American Fuzzy Lop breed, Adrienne and Jenna and Julia Henderson were in competition. Adrienne won Best of Variety and Best of Breed with a broken senior buck while Jenna received a Best of Variety and Best Opposite Sex. Julia's rabbit received a second place.

In the Mini Rex competition Hilary Huffman received first place with her junior Seal doe and first with a senior black doe. This doe received a Best Opposite Sex Variety.

Amanda Hignight received four first places with her pair of senior Torts and senior Castor doe and senior Seal doe. These rabbits received Best of Variety and Best Opposite Sex Variety.

In the Mini Rex competition, Frankie Skinner showed her senior red buck. Placing second with the buck, she was ready to show her two other rabbits.

In the Holland Top Breed, Frankie showed two senior bucks. She placed 10th in the solid class with her senior buck and 11th with her broken buck. Hilary was third with her broken senior buck. Both girls said this was hard competition. Hilary had competed at state 4-H in December and recognized some of the same 4-H youths in this class.

With the competition very hard, only four rabbits from Ozona were disqualified. These rabbits did not meet the standard for showing. Examples are: over or under weight, broken toenail or broken teeth, abscesses or

colds. All of these could have happened as late as the day of the show, so the Ozona youths showed their skills of providing excellent care of their rabbits while traveling to the show and during the stress of showtime.

After the show, several families and children had fun on the rides at the carnival. The Scorpion and the Star Ship 2000 seemed to be the favorites. Following the fun and the carnival it was loading and going home from the show.

Sunday the Bendeles stayed for the open show where youths can compete against adults. Again Adrienne won numerous classes for her rabbits. These wins included: American Fuzzy Lop, Best of Breed; white Satin Best of Variety, Best of Breed; Mini Rex Tortoise, Best of Variety; Chinchilla Satin buck, Best Opposite Sex Variety and Best Opposite Sex; Satin Chinchilla, second; Mini Lop solid doe, Best of Variety; Mini Lop broken buck, second; and broken Holland Lop, 7th.

It is very unusual that so many "wins" are won by one county. Hard work by these youths has rewarded

them with these high placings.

Marvin Clark, who judged the Crockett County Junior Livestock Show, accompanied these youths. During the day he assisted them with showing techniques and general help. 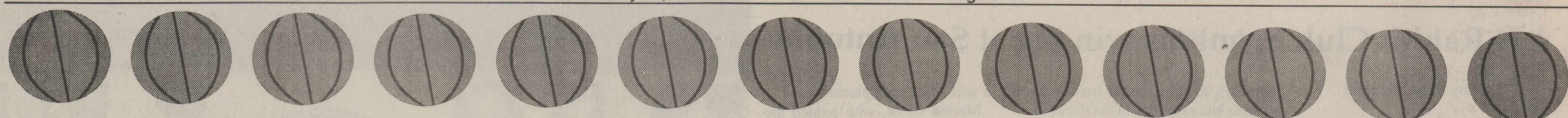

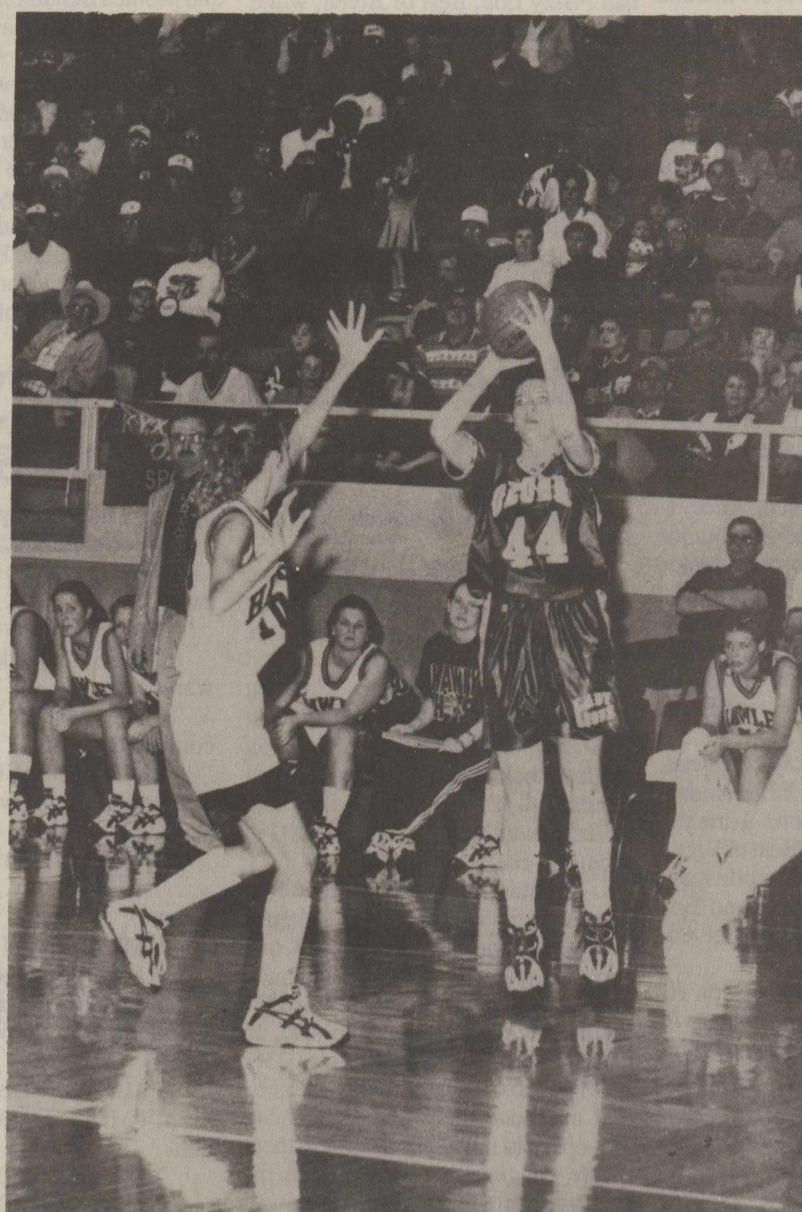

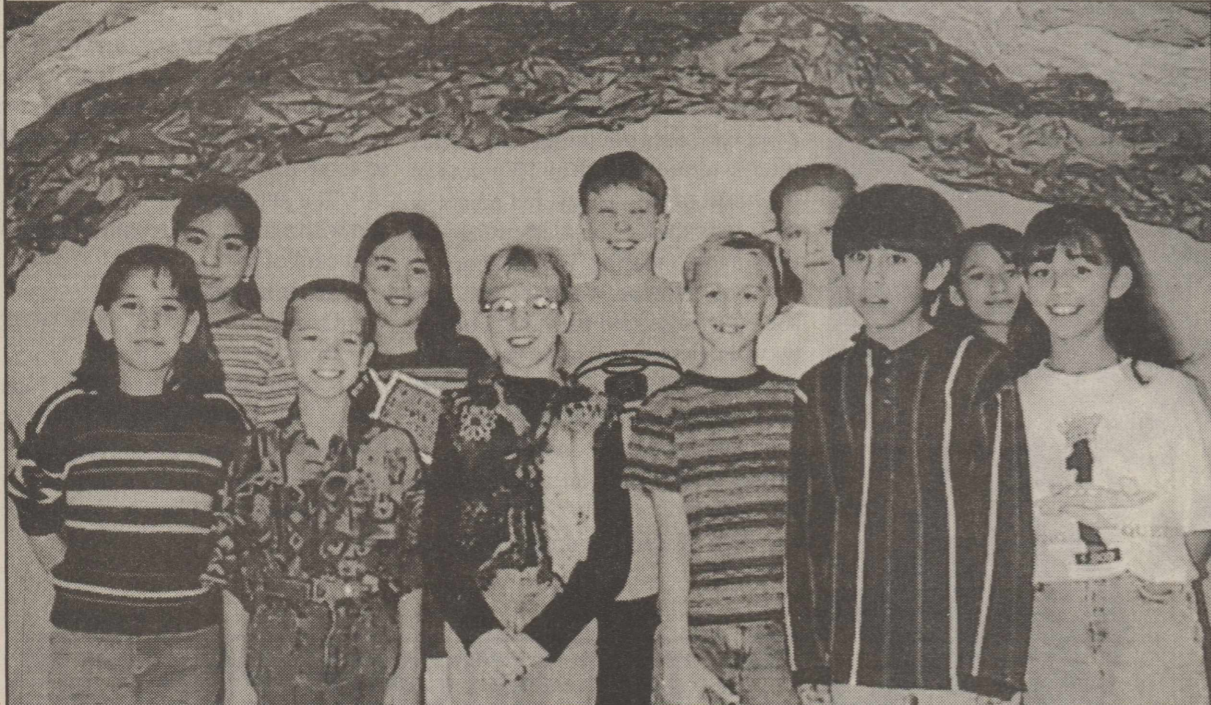

istrator will be required. At the meeting the administrator will explain drug testing policy and consequences, explain future drug testing procedures, and provide a list of available resources, if requested. Students will be subject to testing on three subsequent test dates thereafter.

After the second positive test result a confirmation test will be administered by the drug testing laboratory to confirm the initial test results. If this test is positive, the parent or guardian will be notified by a medical review officer of the results. The parent or guardian may have a reanalysis test performed on the original specimen by the drug testing laboratory at the parent's or guardian's expense.

A parent or guardian/student meeting with a school administrator will be required to outline specific actions that will occur. The student will be suspended for 30 calendar days from participation in the program upon confirmation of the results. The student will be subject to testing on three subsequent test dates thereafter, and the student will have to provide verification of attendance at six sessions of Alcoholics Anonymous or chemical dependency counseling.

After the third positive test result the student will be suspended from the program for one calendar year, after due process, if necessary.

Each time a student refuses a drug test, after having signed a permission form, he or she shall be subject to the consequences of a positive test as follows: (1) The first no = a first positive test, with the same consequences; (2) The second no = a second positive test, with the same consequences; and, (3) The third no = a third positive test, equal to the same consequences, after due process, if necessary.

Students who do not declare their intent to participate in the programs at the beginning of the school year will be tested at the time they declare their intention to participate in any such activity.

The school district will provide a question and answer document concerning the random mandatory student drug testing policy and process to parents and students prior to the beginning of the 1998-99 school year.

During the meeting the trustees

also approved policy updates to their school board policy manual, and they also approved a resolution in honor of Texas Public Schools Week, which will be held March 2-6. At an earlier meeting also held on Wednesday, the members received school board mem-

ber training on policy development, use, and maintenance of the district's policy manual. The training was conducted by Kathy London, policy consultant with the Texas Association of School Boards.

Notice of new election requirement

The voting procedures contained in this summary reflect changes in state and federal law which took effect on Sept. 1, 1997.

1. Qualifying a Voter-Identification Required, if the voter has no registration certificate. In the past, identification could be requested of a voter. This has been changed. Now, if a voter fails to present his or her voter registration certificate, the voter must in every situation either: (1) present proof of identification or (2) have an affidavit signed by a polling place official in which the official attests to the voter's identity. The election worker affidavit may be used only if the voter has no identification. If a person fails to present his or her registration certificate and fails to present a proper form of identification and neither the election judge nor any clerk can attest to the identity of the voter, the person may not be accepted for voting.

Any of the following documents

will establish identification.

1) a driver's license or personal identification card issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety; or

2) a form of identification containing a photograph that establishes a person's identity; or

3) a birth certificate or other document confirming birth that is admissible in a court of law and establishes a person's identity; or

4) United States citizenship papers; or

5) a United States passport; or

6) pre-printed checks containing the person's names that are issued from a financial institution doing business in Texas; or

7) official mail addressed to the person by name from a governmental agency; or

8) any form of identification prescribed by the secretary of state's office.

If you have any questions concerning this procedure, please contact the absentee voting clerk or an election judge.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to charge an additional 26 cents per month per line to recover costs for providing Expanded Local Calling service (ELC) to certain Texas Customers.

The 26 cents per month surcharge would not be billed to customers who receive ELC. However, customers who receive ELC and pay less than the maximum \$3.50 a month residential ELC charge or less than the maximum \$7 business ELC charge will have to pay the additional 26 cents per month charge.

Expanded Local Calling was created in 1993 by Texas legislation that requires telephone companies to provide toll-free calling between small towns that share a community of interest such as a school or hospital district. The legislation allows telephone companies to recover costs not paid through customer charges by applying a surcharge to all other customers in the state who do not receive the ELC service or who do not pay the maximum ELC rate. The maximum monthly ELC rate allowed under state law is \$3.50 per line for residential customers and \$7 per line for business customers.

Southwestern Bell estimates that the 26 cents per month per line charge will recover the \$27 million annual cost of providing ELC service that is not recovered from ELC rates.

If approved by the PUC, the monthly statewide surcharge of 26 cents per line per month will begin with the April, 1998 billing cycles, with an agreement to refund all or part of the charge if the PUC does not approve it.

The PUC assigned Docket Number 18513 to this proceeding. The deadline for intervention in this matter is March 31, 1998. La tarifa máxima mensual permitida por la ley estatal es \$3.50 por línea para clientes con servicio residencial y \$7 por línea para clientes con servicio comercial.

Southwestern Bell calcula que los 26 centavos al mes por línea cubrirán los \$27 millones del costo anual del servicio ELC que no está cubierto por las tarifas de ELC.

Si la PUC autoriza el cargo mensual estatal de 26 centavos al mes por línea éste comenzará a partir de los ciclos de facturación de abril 1998, con el acuerdo de reembolsar todo o parte del cargo si la PUC no lo autoriza.

The department will deposit the remaining \$20 to the credit of the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse. The money may only be used for drug abuse prevention programs provided by non-profit organizations that primarily serve children.
