Most evangelicals, when asked what one must do to be saved, answer with the now cliche, "Believe on the name of Jesus." That is, of course, true only if we know what it is to believe on Jesus' name.

Believing in Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of sins is not sufficient to inherit eternal life. It may be a good start, but it falls short of the whole requirement of scripture. Believe on the name of Jesus--period.

Indeed, it was always by faith that one inherited life, but that "faith" has to be much more than agreement to an institution's doctrines: eternal life is inherited only by those whose belief in Jesus radically modifies their whole existence.

Faith unto the forgiveness of sins is worthless unless that same faith generates obedience to the Father. He forgave us our sins through Christ Jesus for this very purpose, that we could obey Him in holiness and with a whole heart.

If we are "in Christ," having "accepted Jesus into our heart," then we have made a good start. But the run-

ner who does not finish the race amounts to nothing. So too, if we grow weary after making a good start, of what benefit is the good start? Better is the end of a thing than its beginning," (Eec. 7:8) but we make such a great show of the beginning of life in Christ that the end is completely ob-

A trip to the altar is not the same as entry through the pearly gates; and a good confession at the evangelistic event does not a godly life make. These are just starts. Unless we hold to Christ until the end--that is, unless we walk in obedience to God's commands as we are enabled in Christ to do-then, regardless of how far we progressed, we lose the prize and amount to nothing.

The expert in the law asked Jesus what he must do to be saved. When Jesus referred him to the Law, the man answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself. Jesus then said to him, "You have given the right answer: do this and you will live." (Lk 10:25-28)

What?!? Jesus didn't say "Believe on me and you will live." Was He momentarily confused? Did He temporarily forget that we are not saved through obedience to the law?

On the contrary, it is we who are confused and who have forgotten the whole counsel of God. Jesus did not make a contradiction, but a one-forone equivalence: believing on Jesus in spirit and in truth is every bit equivalent to loving God and one's neighbor as we should.

In our culture, the thrust is to enhance self-esteem, self-preservation, self-protection, self-fulfillment, selfpromotion and self-development. Americans are seeking first and foremost a deity who will handle their consumer-driven wants, needs, dreams, and disappointments. How can we then be so bold as to assure ourselves that we love the living God, when our first esteem is of ourselves, and He is simply the means to our own

If you have a high self-esteem, you rob God, for all your esteem is to be upon God. God sees you as the dust of the earth, here today and gone tomorrow, rebelling today and repenting tomorrow. If you esteem yourself highly how can you claim to love God? Your estimation of yourself is in conflict with God's. How then shall your claim to love Him reach His ear?

What must you do to be saved? Why, the answer is simple: Believe on the name of Jesus to such an extent that you love God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength; and your neighbor as yourself. Deny yourself, take up your cross and follow Jesus, forsaking your own will and the contemporary thrust of this culture. Do this and you will live.

COLLEGE STATION—Finding the best way to buckle up a toddler, preschooler or school-age child can be confusing. "Almost half of the children, between 3 and 12 years of age, ride without the protection of a child safety seat or safety belt," according to Janie Harris, passenger safety education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

What is the best way to protect children in a motor vehicle?

The rear seat is the safest place for all children. In any vehicle, passengers in the rear seat are safer than in the front. Those in the rear are farther from the point of impact in serious head-on crashes.

If your vehicle has a passenger air bag, the rear seat is the only safe place for children. A child under age 13 and about five feet tall is not safe riding in the front seat. Even if your child is correctly buckled up, there is a high risk of serious injury or death when the force of the air bag is unleased.

If you have absolutely no way to avoid putting a child in front, the tallest child should be the one selected. Take these steps to reduce the risk. Move the seat as far back as possible. 



Chronic coughs often age-related in children

Treatment for children's chronic cough may be determined by their

"Diagnosis for coughs lasting longer than three weeks vary according to patient age," said Dr. Stuart Abramson, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Coughs can indicated a number of disorders, although the cause can be determined in more than 80 percent of cases, said Abramson, a physician at Texas Children's Hospital.

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"It's a frustrating diagnostic and and physicians alike," he said. "But Congratulations. Matias! once the cause is found, treatment is usually effective."

Abramson lists three categories for childhood coughs: *Up to 18 months: The most likely causes are gastroesophageal reflux, aortic arch anomalies or cough variant asthma.

Gastroesophageal reflux often results in vomiting. Treatment includes keeping infants in an elevated position, using cereal to thicken formula, and medicines that control the regurgitation of stomach contents.

Aortic arch anomalies, or an abnormality of arteries leading off the aorta, may constrict the esophagus. Surgery may be required for this rare condition.

Cough variant asthma (CVA) results when patients have restricted airways causing a form of asthma that results in mainly coughing rather than wheezing. Treatment includes regular use of antiinflammatory medicines in persistent asthma cases.

*18 months to age 6: These children most likely have coughs due to CVA or sinusitis, an inflammation of the membrane lining the facial sinuses. Sinusitis is typically treated with antibiotics and decongestants, although surgical drainage may be necessary in some cases. Respiratory allergies may also lead to sinusitis and should be

controlled. *Adolescents: Teenage coughs usually are the result of CVA, sinusitis or are stress-related. For the latter, addressing the source of stress is the best treatment.

"Annually, more than 16 million physician visits by adults and children are due to coughs," Abramson said. "The majority of patients have only one underlying cause for their cough."

Abramson advises parents to see their physician or pediatrician whenever there is concern about a child's

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

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
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PATTERSON RIG #117 drills the first horizontal Canyon well in Crockett County for UPR. The location is behind Lima and Cedar Hill Cemeteries.
