Q. I'm 25-years old and I was seriously hurt in a car accident. I've only worked for four consecutive years. Have I worked long enough to earn Social Security disability protection?

A. You probably have worked long enough for protection. To qualify for Social Security disability benefits, you must have worked long enough and recently enough under Social Security. Since you are 25 years old, you'd qualify if you have credit for having worked half the time between age 21 and the time you became disabled. At the age of 25 you would need two years of work (eight credits) out mation about your individual case.

In the early years of the war, the North Vietnamese prized prisoners like Sam because they were more senior officers. They believed that these officers would provide valuable information if they could break them. For Two of these men now serve in these men, the North Vietnamese would reserve their worst forms of torture, both physical and psychological. So they put them in a special prison. The Americans referred to it as Alcatraz, after the famous prison in San Francisco Bay, and they would call themselves the Alcatraz Gang. For three and half years, Sam Johnson was held in solitary confinement in a cell not much bigger than a closet.

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The prisoners would not give in. They developed a "tap code", tapping on the walls of their cells to each other in Morse code. Every morning they tapped the names of every man that they knew was a POW. The list tapped from memory - would become almost 300 names long. The men also The North Vietnamese doctors tapped passages from the Bible to keep their morale up and even tapped French lessons to each other.
