## Kinder, pre-kinder students register Monday, April 20

Pre-registration for the 1998-99 pre-kindergarten and kindergarten classes at Ozona Primary School will be held on Monday, April 20, in the primary school gym.

Pre-kindergarten students will register from 9 a.m. until noon. To be eligible to attend pre-kindergarten, a student must be unable to speak and comprehend the English language, eligible to participate in the National Free or Reduced-Price Lunch Program, or is homeless. The child must be four years old on or before Sept. 1, 1998. Parents must have their child's birth certificate, shot record and Social Security card in order to register the child. If the child speaks Spanish, testing will be done to see if he or she qualifies for pre-kindergarten, therefore, you need to bring the child with you to registration.

Kindergarten registration will be in the gym from 1 to 4 p.m. the same day, Monday, April 20. Kindergarten students must be five on or before Sept. 1, 1998. Parents will also need to bring their child's birth certificate, shot record and Social Security card to registration. A copy of these documents will be made, and the originals will be returned to you. This is required by law 25.002 of the Texas Education Code.

The Texas Department of Health will conduct a free shot clinic in conjunction with registration. Nurses from their staff will be on campus at Ozona Primary on Monday, April 20, to immunize children who need these shots. As of Aug. 1, 1998, all children born on or after Sept. 2, 1992, are required to have hepatitis B immunization. The staff from the Texas Department of Health will be here to provide this hepatitis vaccination. Your child will not be allowed to register on April 20 if he or she has not had all required immunizations. 2/9

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## Head Start registration coming soon

The Head Start Program for children three and four years of age will hold registration for the 1998-99 school year April 15 and 16. Location is 1310 Ave. G and hours are from 1 to 3:30 p.m.

Tom Green County Community Action Council Head Start Program is a free, comprehensive, pre-k program serving children of low income families. Children three and four years of age participate in a program that provides them a "Head Start" to education, social and self-held skills and their health dental care. Head Start children receive a nutritious breakfast, snack and lunch, participate in large and small group activities, individual activities, center time, story time and many successful, self-esteem

building exercises.

It is required that the child be three years old by Sept. 1, 1998, in order to register for the Head Start Program. Parents or guardians of a child must bring copies of the following: 1. Proof of income (3 recent consecutive check stubs, 1998 W-2/1040 Tax Form, copy of AFDC benefits), 2. Proof of child's age (child's birth

certificate), 3. Child's Social Security number, 4. Up to date immunization record, and if applicable, 5. Medicaid, FDC, Food Stamp Case No. All of these items must be brought with you to register your child for the program.

Children with disabilities are a priority to the program. When applying, please be sure to inform the center director if this applies to your child.

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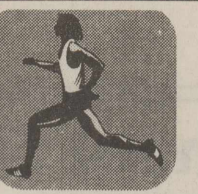

men on base.

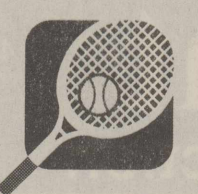

**No fish tale . . . . .**

Well, they're at it again. The federal government is positioning itself to step on the rights of private property owners in Texas. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is moving forward with their proposal to add the Devil's River Minnow to the Endangered Species list. They tell us not to panic just yet - at this point it's just a "proposal".

River Minnows quite tasty. It's unbelievable that landowners near the Devil's River will have to pay the bill for the ill-mannered bass' dinner. But that's exactly what will happen if the Devil's River Minnow is added to the Endangered Species list.

But we all know what happens almost every time the Fish and Wildlife Service sets a plan in motion. They tell private property owners they are only "considering" adding an animal to the Endangered Species list. They spend thousands of your tax dollars conducting surveys and soliciting comments from locals. Then they go ahead and push their agenda anyway, without regard for the concerns of private property owners. It's the standard "We're only thinking about it" line, but every time they even think about it, they do it.

This is a classic example of the federal government once again jumping in and ignoring the rights of landowners in Texas. The people of South and West Texas have cared for their land and their environment for generations. Bureaucrats in Washington can learn a lot from these folks when it comes to forming a plan that protects wildlife in these areas.

Landowners near the Devil's River are continuing to work diligently with the Texas Park and Wildlife Department (TPWD) to come up with a conservation plan for the Devil's River Minnow. Landowners and TPWD officials have held meetings and conducted surveys to determine the current status of the minnow. In addition, 50 Devil's River Minnows were taken from the San Felipe Creek for captive breeding.

The number of Devil's River Minnows in the Devil's River is not as high as it once was. What the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service glosses over is that there are still large numbers of these fish in other West Texas and Mexican waterways.

We must protect the rights of landowners in Texas. The federal government has no business demanding that Texans alter how they use their own land, especially just to accommodate a minnow that will probably end up as a snack for a smallmouth bass anyway.

Apparently part of the reason for the lower number of the minnows in the Devil's River is that smallmouth bass in the same river find the Devil's

**Wildlife officials optimistic about spring turkey season**

Coming off a banner production year and taking into consideration prime range conditions, state wildlife officials are forecasting an excellent upcoming spring turkey hunting season in Texas.

turkey season is open in 17 East Texas counties from April 13-26 and is limited to shotgun only and a one gobbler bag limit. Harvested turkeys must be checked at mandatory check stations set up in the counties having an open spring eastern turkey season.

"Hunters should see plenty of birds," offered Dr. Markus Peterson, turkey program leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. "Production last year was way above average, particularly in the Edwards Plateau, so there'll be lots of jakes on the ground. I would also expect there to be a lot of mature gobblers out there, too."

In addition to possessing a valid Texas hunting license, turkey hunters are required to purchase a Special Turkey Hunting Stamp. The annual bag limit on turkeys is four.

Rio Grande turkey hunting season opens March 28 in South Texas and runs through May 3, and begins in the remaining counties having a spring turkey season on April 4 and runs through May 10. The spring eastern

Hunters in the Edwards Plateau will likely be covered up in birds, Peterson said, referring to results of last year's hen/poult survey, a statewide field observation study which records the number of offspring accompanying hens. In the Edwards Plateau, where the long-term average is 1.7, there were 3.7 in 1997.

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## For your information . . . . .

Have you ever shrank your sweater or had the dye in a new shirt run? Don't throw them away. If you followed garment care instructions, you can return them to the retailer for a refund or exchange.

There is a law under the Federal Trade Commission's care labeling rule that manufacturers must tag their clothing with at least one safe cleaning method.

Beginning July 1, 1997, the manufacturer may use certain care symbols in place of words on labels. The FTC says, to help consumers

understand the symbols, manufacturers must include on the label a written explanation along with the symbol or picture. These explanations will only have to be used for 18 months from July 1, 1997. That means that by January 1999 some labels may have only the symbol.

To help you remember and understand these symbols when you see them, here is a clothing care symbol guide. It is from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service adapted from a publication of the Federal Trade Commission, Bureau of Consumer Protection.

HOUSTON - Children need their morning meal to prepare for a day of hitting the books.

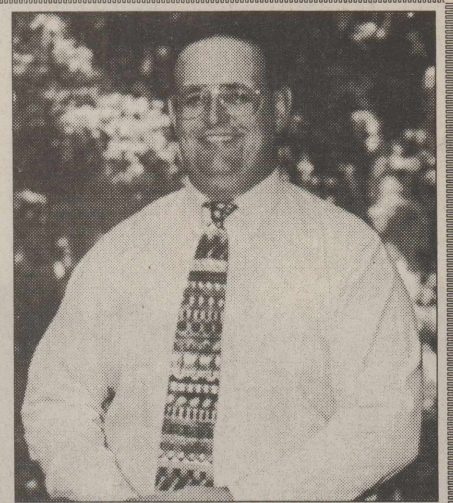

### Area artist still going places

After exhibiting her work in Waco, San Angelo and Dallas, long-time Sonora resident Nora Weaver will be showing some of her classical realism artwork at Sutton County National Bank in Sonora beginning April 18. There will be a reception on that date from 2 to 4 p.m. The public will have the opportunity to view and discuss Mrs. Weaver's work with her. This exhibit will be on display at Sutton County National Bank from April 18 through April 24.

Included in the exhibit will be a variety of her work ranging from portraits to landscapes and still life. Also included in the exhibit will be "Madame Pasteur", which is the work she was able to copy while at the Louvre in Paris in 1995.

Mrs. Weaver renewed an earlier interest in art by attending oil painting workshops beginning in 1993. Over the next three years, she studied in Texas, Utah, Colorado, Louisiana and Vermont. This culminated with her being invited to be a member of the first American group to be allowed to copy a masterpiece in the Louvre in Paris, which is the most famous museum in the world. She returned to Paris in the spring of 1996 for a month of independent study. Since that time, she has been working in her studio continuing art history and language studies, and teaching private lessons.

October of 1998 will bring about more exciting changes for Mrs. Weaver, as she will travel to Florence, Italy, to further perfect her art. Several months ago she was accepted to the Charles Cecil Studios in Florence. The Sonora Chamber of commerce submitted Mrs. Weaver as a candidate for the Cultural Connections Program of the Texas Commission on the arts grant program. She received the grant, which is funded in part through the County Arts Expansion Program of the Texas Commission on the Arts, which allows the artist a year of intense study.

Mrs. Weaver was thrilled to be accepted to the Charles Cecil Studios,

as only 40 students are accepted internationally. Charles H. Cecil Studios occupy the most historic Florentine atelier still in active use. Lorenzo Bartolini converted the church of San Raffaello Archangelo into a studio complex in the early nineteenth century. Bartolini, pupil of Jacques-Louis David and associate of J.A.D. Ingres, was one of the renowned sculptors of his day. The early American sculptor Horatio Greenough studied on the premises in the 1920's.

Upon her return from Italy in June of 1999, Mrs. Weaver's professional career plans include keeping the classical realism method alive through showing her work in major cities in North America and Europe, and by sharing her knowledge through workshops.
