Convention Center noise raises roof

A commissioners' court meeting April 2 to discuss sound monitoring equipment at Fair Park Convention Center almost raised the roof on the courthouse. Noise from activities at the center has been a source of irritation to nearby residents since the building opened.

In an attempt to cure the problem, commissioners had sound monitoring equipment installed which will cut off the electricity once the noise reaches a certain level. The sensitivity of the equipment to sounds is causing people to stop using the building according to some. Others insist that the equipment is needed for monitoring in the area.

No action was taken on the matter at the meeting last week, but the court agreed to get someone to test the equipment and see what needs to be done to solve the problems.

In a related matter, commissioners asked the convention center board to come back to the court regarding new rules for use of the building.

The Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) is the newest natural resource conservation program in Texas. As part of the 1996 Farm Bill, EQIP takes the place of previous USDA programs including both the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) and the Great Plains Conservation Program. (GPCP)

To receive funding for EQIP, producers are required to enter into a long-term contract. Contracts must be at least five years long and cannot be longer than 10 years Producers can receive up to \$10,000 of EQIP funding per year not to exceed \$50,000 for the life of the contract. EQIP will pay up to 75 percent of the cost of installing some conservation practices.

Each producer will be required to develop a local conservation plan. To develop a plan the producer and Natural Resources Conservation Service conservationist will inventory the

Rainfall average for the county in 1997 amounted to 18.78 inches according to records kept by Emerald Underground Water Conservation District. The statistic was based on records from 24 locations across the county. The yearly average for 1996 was 17.69 inches, and 1995's average

Inmate Costs Discussed

In a discussion of medical treatment of prison inmates, the Senate Criminal Justice Committee learned two things last week: that it costs more to keep older inmates healthy and the number of Texas prison inmates is growing due to longer sentences and new laws that stiffen parole requirements.

As of Jan. 1, Texas had 9,130 prisoners age 50 or older — a 15 percent increase from a year earlier and more than double the number of that group four years ago.

At the meeting, committee chairman John Whitmire, D-Houston, said elderly prisoners with terminal illnesses who pose no risk to society should be allowed to leave prison to die at home with their

Under the state's managed healthcare system, the cost per doctor visit for inmates age 55 and older is \$14.50. And, the cost for drug therapies for inmates with HIV is projected to rise to more than \$18 per day per patient by the end of the fiscal year.

Court Rejects TEA Suit

On March 31, the U.S. Supreme Court rejected a lawsuit that would have freed Texas of certain federal requirements when stepping in to manage a school district with serious financial problems. Justices said the suit was premature because it raised potential, not actual,

At issue was the amount of time state officials have to wait to intervene, under present law, when conditions in a given school district have badly deteriorated.

"When a district is in critical shape," Debbie Graves, a spokesman for the Texas Education Agency, told the Dallas Morning News, "we need to be able to act quickly to protect the interests of schoolchildren. That is why this lawsuit was filed."

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
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

Runaways and troubled youths urged to call statewide hotline

A statewide campaign has been launched to promote greater public awareness about the runaway and troubled youth problem, according to Jay Smith, director of the Texas Runaway Hotline.

"In Texas, more than 120,000 children ages 7 to 17 run away annually," Smith said. "Whether they are in large cities or small towns, runaway youths are vulnerable to a wide variety of crimes including assault and sexual exploitation. many youths call the Hotline to find food, shelter or simply to hear a caring voice." According to Smith, Hotline staff and volunteers received 35,663 calls last year from troubled youths, their families and youth related organizations.

"Many people believe we only receive calls from runaways who are on the streets in large metropolitan areas," Smith said. "We actually receive calls from runaways and troubled youths all over the state."

Smith said statewide television and radio ads, billboards and 150,000 pieces of runaway prevention materials for schools, truck stops, bus stations and youth service organizations, are aimed at bringing the runaway problem to wider public attention and to make young people and parents more aware of services that are available. The toll-free Hotline telephone number is 1-888-580-HELP (4357).

"Runaway children are not running to something," Smith said. "More often than not, they are running away from difficult family situations."

Kinder, pre-kinder students register Monday, April 20

Pre-registration for the 1998-99 pre-kindergarten and kindergarten classes at Ozona Primary School will be held on Monday, April 20, in the primary school gym.

Pre-kindergarten students will register from 9 a.m. until noon. To be eligible to attend pre-kindergarten, a student must be unable to speak and comprehend the English language, eligible to participate in the National Free or Reduced-Price Lunch Program, or is homeless. The child must be four years old on or before Sept. 1, 1998. Parents must have their child's birth certificate, shot record and Social Security card in order to register the child. If the child speaks Spanish, testing will be done to see if he or she qualifies for pre-kindergarten, therefore, you need to bring the child with you to registration.

Kindergarten registration will be in the gym from 1 to 4 p.m. the same day, Monday, April 20. Kindergarten students must be five on or before Sept. 1, 1998. Parents will also need to bring their child's birth certificate, shot record and Social Security card to registration. A copy of these documents will be made, and the originals will be returned to you. This is required by law 25.002 of the Texas Education Code.

The Texas Department of Health will conduct a free shot clinic in conjunction with registration. Nurses from their staff will be on campus at Ozona Primary on Monday, April 20, to immunize children who need these shots. As of Aug. 1, 1998, all children born on or after Sept. 2, 1992, are required to have hepatitis B immunization. The staff from the Texas Department of Health will be here to provide this hepatitis vaccination. Your child will not be allowed to register on April 20 if he or she has not had all required immunizations. 2/9

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

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

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Wildlife officials optimistic about spring turkey season

Coming off a banner production turkey season is open in 17 East Texas year and taking into consideration prime range conditions, state wildlife officials are forecasting an excellent upcoming spring turkey hunting sea-

"Hunters should see plenty of birds," offered Dr. Markus Peterson, turkey program leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. "Production last year was way above average, particularly in the Edwards Plateau, so there'll be lots of jakes on the ground. I would also expect there to be a lot of mature gobblers out there, too."

Rio Grande turkey hunting season opens March 28 in South Texas and runs through May 3, and begins in the remaining counties having a spring turkey season on April 4 and runs through May 10. The spring eastern

counties from April 13-26 and is limited to shotgun only and a one gobbler bag limit. Harvested turkeys must be checked at mandatory check stations set up in the counties having an open spring eastern turkey season.

In addition to possessing a valid Texas hunting license, turkey hunters are required to purchase a Special Turkey Hunting Stamp. The annual bag limit on turkeys is four.

Hunters in the Edwards Plateau will likely be covered up in birds, Peterson said, referring to results of last year's hen/poult survey, a statewide field observation study which records the number of offspring accompanying hens. In the Edwards Plateau, where the long-term average is 1.7, there were 3.7 in 1997.

Have you ever shrank your sweater or had the dye in a new shirt run? Don't throw them away. If you followed garment care instructions, you can return them to the retailer for a refund or exchange.


There is a law under the Federal Trade Commission's care labeling rule that manufacturers must tag their clothing with at least one safe cleaning method.

Beginning July 1, 1997, the manufacturer may use certain care symbols in place of words on labels. The FTC says, to help consumers

understand the symbols, manufacturers must include on the label a written explanation along with the symbol or picture. These explanations will only have to be used for 18 months from July 1, 1997. That means that by January 1999 some labels may have only the symbol.

To help you remember and understand these symbols when you see them, here is a clothing care symbol guide. It is from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service adapted from a publication of the Federal Trade Commission, Bureau of Consumer

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








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

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HOUSTON - A blood test can determine whether a woman has an increased risk for the most common cancer among women.

Women with a mutation in the genes known as BRCA1 and BRCA2 have an 80 to 90 percent chance of developing breast cancer sometime during their lives.

A genetic test can identify the mutation by analyzing DNA from a blood sample, said Dr. Benjamin Roa, assistant director of the DNA Diagnostic Laboratory at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Although the presence of the gene mutation does not guarantee that breast cancer will develop, it can serve as a warning that the woman and her physician should watch closely for early signs of cancer through mammograms and breast self-exams.

Before being tested for BRCA1 and BRCA2 mutations, women should seek genetic counseling to learn the limitations of these tests and the implications of their results," Roa said.

Date of the first of three weekly publications of this notice: April 8, 1998 in the Ozona Stockman.

1. Notice is given that the Texas Border Weather Modification Association, 232 West Strickland, Del Rio, TX 78840, has filed an application with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) for a State permit to conduct weather modification operations to change, or attempt to change, the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period, and by the method summarized herein below. The Executive Director will issue this permit unless a written hearing request is filed within 30 days after the first newspaper publication of this notice.

2. The Texas Border Weather Modification Association submitted an application for a Texas weather modification license on March 23, 1998.

3. The purpose of the weather modification operation is to increase rainfall. The period of the permit is May 1, 1998 through April 30, 2002. The proposed cloud-seeding operation may be conducted at any time

during that time period. 4. The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of the Texas Border Weather Modification Association,

232 West Strickland, Del Rio, TX 78840. 5. The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both and "Operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area. The operational area is that area including Val Verde, Kinney, Maverick, and Terrell Counties, which is

the target area; and those portions of the following counties within 30 miles of the outer boundary of the target area: Crockett, Sutton, Pecos, Edwards, Uvalde, Zavala, and Dimmit. 6. The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification op-

eration is the target area. The target area is that described as Val Verde, Kinney, Maverick and Terrell Counties.

7. The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation are summarized herein: A licensed meteorologist will select cumuliform clouds or other appropriate clouds for cloud seeding using a weather radar display, standard meteorologist analyses, forecasting techniques, surface weather observations, and pilot reports to initiate the release of the seeding particles, such as silver iodide crystals from airplanes equipped with flare racks and/or generators.
