Doctor's discovery may end obesity

HILTON HEAD, S.C. -- A doctor believes that a natural formula containing the extract of a small Asian fruit can help cause significant weight loss. Anthony A. Conte, M.D. reported in an American Medical Journal that the formula, now called Bio-Rex 3000, caused patients to lose more than twice as much weight as those in a control group on the same fat reduced diet. 



Workshops slated for underground tank owners

Beginning March 10, the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) will conduct specialized workshops in 51 Texas cities to increase the awareness of registered underground storage tank (UST) owners regarding a crucial December 1998 deadline.

Workshops nearest to Ozona are slated for May 12 in Kerrville's City Hall at 10 a.m., May 13 at 9 a.m. in city hall in Alpine, and on May 14 in Odessa and San Angelo. The Odessa meeting will be in city council chambers at 10 a.m. The San Angelo workshop will be on the second floor of County Commissioners Court at 6:30 p.m.

The workshops are designed to emphasize the importance of the Dec. 22 date requiring tank owners to have fully completed all UST upgrades and financial assurance requirements under **TNRCC** rules.

In addition, tank owners who have not identified and reported petroleum contamination at their sites by this date will be ineligible for financial assistance from the state's Petroleum Storage Tank Remediation Fund. There will be no extension of this deadline, therefore, the TNRCC urges owners to take the necessary steps to avoid possible fine, closures or other potential penalties.

The UST upgrades that must be in place by Dec. 22 relate to monthly release detection, corrosion protection, spill containment, financial assurance, vapor recovery (in specific areas only), secondary containment, corrective action plans and other requirements.
