## Frizzell top world goat roper

Colby Frizzell of Sterling City roped his way to a world championship here last weekend with an 82.25 on seven head in the open division. Young Frizzell, who is only 15, also took the junior division of the World Championship Goat Roping with an average of 94.34 on seven head. He was second in the junior

division in 1977.

Colby's older brother, Justin, won the 1996 open title and placed second this year with a time of 84.03. Finishing out the top four in the open were Joe Ross Jameson of Colorado City with a 90.63 and Jeff Waldrop of San Angelo with 92.92.

This is the second consecutive

year for the same roper to win two events. Last year, Freddie Fields of Knickerbocker won both the open and the senior divisions. Fields took the senior championship again this year with a 93.15 average for seven go rounds.

Gary Vannoy of Ozona was second in the senior division with an average of 132.30. Allen Askins of Dryden came in third with 136.94 and Vance Worthington of Ozona was fourth with 161.19.

Tooter Smith of San Saba was winner in the women's division with an average of 90.02 on four head. Following Smith was Keli Harrell of Brady with 114.41 on four, Ashlee Worley of Ozona with 153.18 on four and Rheba Long of Rocksprings with 83.75 on three head.

Second place in the average for the junior division was Kinney Harrell of Brady with 97.78 on seven, J. R. Medina of Sheffield with 127.84 on seven and Trey Hale of Ozona with 138.46 on seven head.

The open division drew more than 50 ropers and paid \$3,645 to the champion. A total of \$15,000 in added money went to contestants in the 1998 World Championship Goat Roping with \$10,000 in the open division, \$2,000 for the juniors, \$2,000 for the seniors and \$1,000 for the women's division. Crockett County National Bank and Union Pacific Resources each donated \$5,000 to the event.

This is the 13th year for the World Championship Goat Roping, which is sponsored by the Texas Goat Ropers Association, and locally by Ozona Chamber of Commerce and Crockett County Roping Association. The event moved from San Angelo to Ozona in 1993.

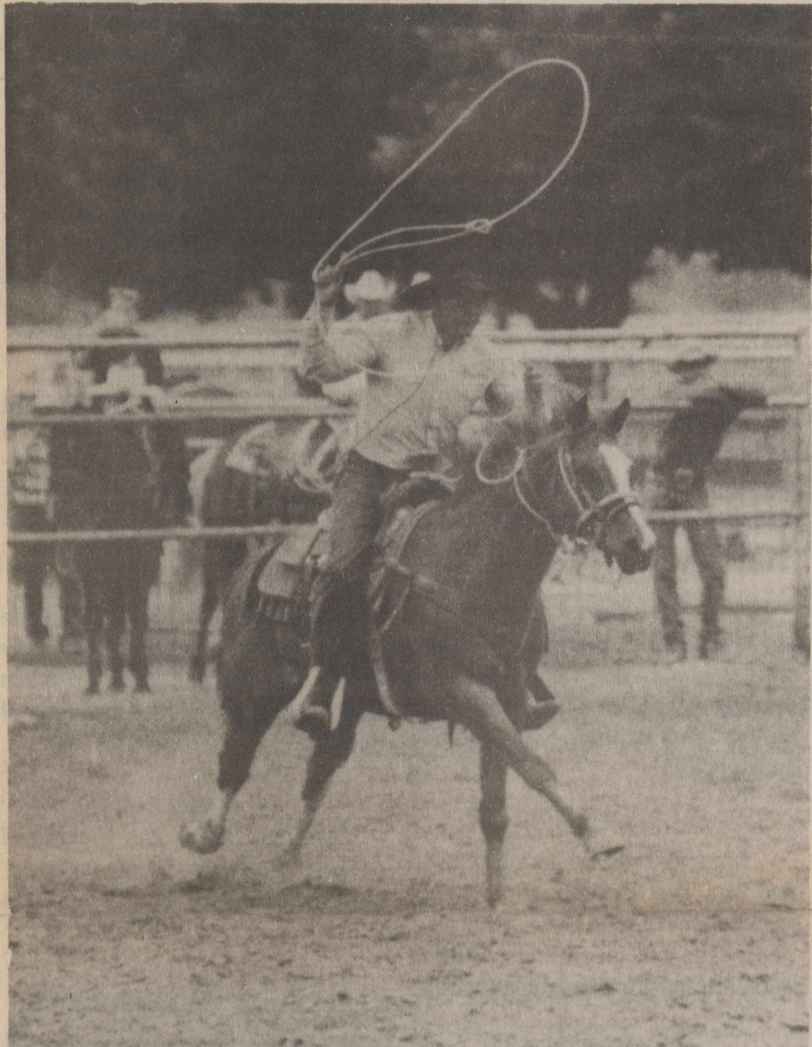

## West Texas Weather Modification Association enters third year of cloud seeding

In late 1995 and early 1996 several West Texas underground water conservation districts began discussions on what could be done to alleviate dry conditions caused by several years of severe to extreme drought

which afflicted most of the state. The outcome of these discussions resulted into the formation of the West Texas Weather Modification Association which covers over seven million acres, all or part of eight counties and seven underground water districts.

The goal of the West Texas Weather Modification Association is to use state of the art cloud seeding technology and procedures to seed suitable convective clouds to enhance their rain output over a region encompassing the counties of Glasscock, Sterling, Reagan, Irion, Crockett, Schleicher, Sutton and portions of Tom Green. Seeding is accomplished by the use of specially equipped aircraft designed to disperse silver iodide (AgI) into the forming convective clouds.

West Texas Weather Modification Association is financed through a four cent per acre assessment from each participating water district, contributions from University of West Texas Lands and state matching funds distributed through the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission.

Over the past two years, WTWMA has evolved from being totally dependent on outside contractors to owning its own radar, a Pa 23 Piper Aztec seeding aircraft and has employed a full-time radar meteorologist. WTWMA long range projections are to be totally independent by the end of the 1998 season, which will cut operational cost and provide funding to extend the seeding season from five months to year round.

WTWMA project headquarters is located in San Angelo at Mathis Field and is housed in the old National Weather Service office located south of the terminal building. ## Trustees approve \$2,965,000 bond election

For improvement of school facilities--no recapture involvement by state . . .

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in regular monthly session on Tuesday, June 16, unanimously approved an order of a bond election in the amount of \$2,965,000.00 for the purpose of renovating Ozona Middle School, Ozona Middle School Gymnasium and Davidson Gymnasium in order to make this gym Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) handicapped accessible. The bond election will be held on Saturday, Aug. 22.

In discussion regarding the bond election, the board and administration focused on the need to improve these facilities. The Ozona Middle School has major roof leaks, unlevel floors and bathrooms that need extensive repair. The Davidson Gym must be brought into compliance with ADA standards as well as the middle school gym and buildings.

Superintendent Larry Taylor explained that after September 1 of last year, school construction or renovation bond money was no longer subject to recapture by the state, thus if the bond issue passes, all of the

money will stay in the school district. "If the voters approve this renovation bond issue, ALL of the funds will stay here in our district to help the students and the citizens of Ozona. Not one cent will have to be sent to the state for the purpose of recapture," Taylor said.

If approved by Ozona voters, the renovations will be financed through the issuance of bonds for a 5-year period and will increase the district's current tax rate by nearly 10 cents during these five years.

Facility improvements at Ozona Middle School will include: removing 22 existing classroom and office heaters from closets; installing 26 new roof-mounted heating and air conditioning units (one above each classroom, two above the office area, and four above the cafeteria); providing new electrical service to the building for new air conditioning and heating units; updating and modernizing the two sets of existing boys' and girls' toilet rooms; providing a new library; providing a new area for band practice and student walkways; moving the administration offices to a more central location in the building; renovating the current offices into staff work areas; removing and installing new

concrete slabs in 11 classrooms; painting all existing interior and exterior painted surfaces; installing new carpet in existing corridors, existing classrooms and new office, new band hall, new library and new technology rooms; installing new fire and smoke detection alarms; upgrading the building's electrical power supply; replacing all existing exterior and interior doors; removing all of the existing evaporative coolers in the cafeteria; installing a new standing seam metal roof system over the existing sloped roof; installing new batt insulation; performing asbestos abatement; installing new liquid marker boards and bulletin boards in all classrooms; providing a new science laboratory with built-in science equipment; and, removing most of the existing partitions on the stage of the cafeteria and

repairing the floor, walls and ceiling to return most of the stage area to a usable raised presentation platform.

In regard to Ozona Middle School Gymnasium, facility improvements include: providing a new wood playing floor over the existing tartan artificial floor covering; relocating the boys' locker room to a new addition along the west end of the gym, freeing up space for additional seating; providing additional seating along the south side of the gym with storage below; renovating the existing girls' coach's office, showers and toilets for new public accessible toilets; relocating the girls' coach's office, girls' showers, and girls' toilets to the new west addition; providing new back boards for all basketball and new

The purpose of this Invitation to Bid is to purchase mulch grinding services as specified herein from a source of supply that will give prompt and efficient service.

**TERM OF CONTRACT**  
 This contract shall be for a term of one month.

**EXAMINATION OF SITE & BIDDER AFFIDAVIT (MANDATORY)**

Prior to submitting its proposal, the bidder is required to visit the site of the proposed work and become familiar with any conditions which may in any manner affect the work to be done or affect the equipment materials and labor required. The bidder is also required to examine carefully the drawings and specifications and be thoroughly informed regarding any and all conditions and requirements that may in any manner affect the work to be performed under the contract. No additional allowances will be made because of lack of knowledge of these conditions. **SECTION 2.0-TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS SCOPE AND LOCATION**

The work to be performed under the terms and conditions of this contract shall consist of furnishing all labor, transportation, equipment and supplies required to produce mulch from yard waste supplied by Crockett County. The process shall involve grinding of yard waste for volume reduction. Vendor shall be required to provide yard waste grinding services at one location. The location is next to the cemetery located south of the town of Ozona. The waste must first be a product with a large portion of large, coarse fragments then further reduced to fine fragments with a second pass through the grinding equipment. Waste from this location shall be removed by Crockett County for disposal.

The successful bidder must be able to process such material that will normally shred in yard waste grinding equipment and remove and stack for disposal by Crockett County, such material as found in the waste stream which cannot be ground, and or may be oversized. Oversized materials shall be deemed to be any trunk, or formed

timber over 12" in diameter. The successful bidder shall process all grindable waste, removing contaminants and oversized as possible by the use of mechanical loading equipment. Any contaminants or oversized materials removed from the yard waste will be piled in a place separate from the finished reduced materials for disposal by Crockett County. Further, the successful bidder will be solely responsible for the loading of yard waste into his equipment. 2c19

1/4 tsp. ground allspice  
1/4 tsp. ground nutmeg  
1/4 tsp. (rounded) salt  
2 lg. eggs  
1 c. thawed apple juice concen-

trate  
2/3 c. buttermilk  
2 T oatbran  
2 small Granny Smith apples (peeled, cored and chopped)  
1/3 c. chopped walnuts  
Preheat oven to 375°. Grease 12 standard size muffin pan cups or line with paper liners. Mix together flour, baking soda, cinnamon, ginger, allspice, nutmeg and salt, then set aside. Meantime, mix together eggs, apple juice and buttermilk. Then add to flour mixture. Add oatbran and mix until dry ingredients are moistened. Do not over mix. Then gently stir in apples and walnuts. Spoon batter into prepared pan cups. (2/3 full) Bake for 25 minutes, then turn muffins out onto rack to cool completely. Makes 12 muffins.

1 pkg. pork stew meat

1 sm. can Old El Paso chopped green chiles (mild)

Special baskets of goodies were made for each male resident at the care center to be placed in their rooms. A prize was given to the oldest father, and the lucky winner was Jeff Owens.

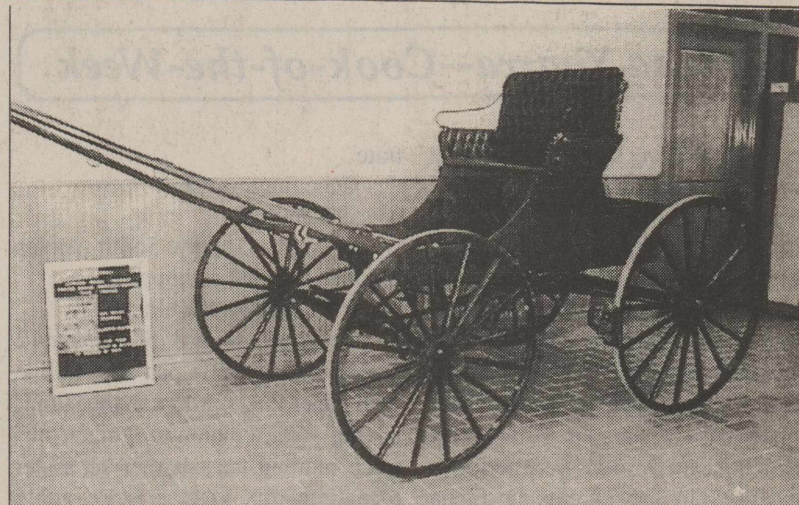

## Discipleship And A Biblical Lifestyle

Someone wrote the following lines of verse, which relate to the Christian lifestyle.

Not, how did he die?  
But, how did he live?  
Not, what did he gain?  
But, what did he give?

These are the merits  
To measure the worth  
Of man as man,  
Regardless of birth.

Not, what was his station?  
But, had he a heart?  
And how did he play  
His God-given part?

Was he ever ready  
With word of good cheer  
To bring a smile  
To banish a tear?

Not, what was his church?  
Nor what was his creed?  
But had he befriended  
Those really in need?

Not, what did the sketch  
In the newspaper say?  
But, how many were sorry  
When he passed away?

A mature disciple is one who lives a Biblical lifestyle. His conversation,

attitude, and actions are different from the world culture in which he lives.

How is one able to live a Biblical lifestyle in an ungodly world system? Jesus is the best example that one can find. He himself lived in a wicked, immoral society without sin. Isaiah said, "And he made his grave with the wicked, and with the rich in his death; because he had done no violence, neither was any deceit in his mouth." For every believer Jesus is more than a religious creed or philosophy. Through the power of the Holy Spirit and the Word of God the Divine nature is imparted to every believer. As one cultivates that nature through the spiritual disciplines, prayer, Bible study, witnessing, etc., he becomes more and more like Christ. In the New Testament world, the disciples were so much like Christ that they were known as Christians. A verse of Scripture in the book of Acts makes it clear how the religious leaders viewed the disciples. Acts 4:13 says, "Now when they saw the boldness of Peter and John, and perceived that they were unlearned and ignorant men, they marveled, and they took knowledge of them, that they had been with Jesus."

What is the role of the church in helping believers to live a Biblical lifestyle? Acts 9:31 says, "Then had the churches rest throughout all Judea and Galilee and Samaria, and were edified; and walking in the fear of the Lord, and in the comfort of the Holy Ghost, were multiplied." This verse tells us how the church helps believers

live a Biblical lifestyle. The word "rest" suggests that these believers were living together in harmony and unity with one mind and one spirit. The word "edified" means that these believers were being built up spiritually as they prayed and studied God's Word together on a regular basis. The word "fear" carries the idea that their association with the church caused them to have a deep respect for God and His will for them. The phrase "comfort of the Holy Ghost" speaks of the fact the Holy Spirit was leading them in their daily life and relationships. The word "multiplied" implies that these believers were involved in outreach opportunities through the local church.

In the *Wesleyan Christian Advocate* the question was asked, "Can I be a Christian without joining the church?" The answer was, "Yes, it is possible. It is something like being: a student who will not go to school; a soldier who will not join an army; a citizen who does not pay taxes or vote; a salesman with no customers; an explorer with no base camp; a seaman on a ship without a crew; a businessman on a deserted island; an author without readers; a tuba player without an orchestra; a parent without a family; a football player without a team; a politician who is a hermit; a scientist who does not share his findings; a bee without a hive."

May God help us as believers to model the Biblical lifestyle so that the world may see Jesus in us.

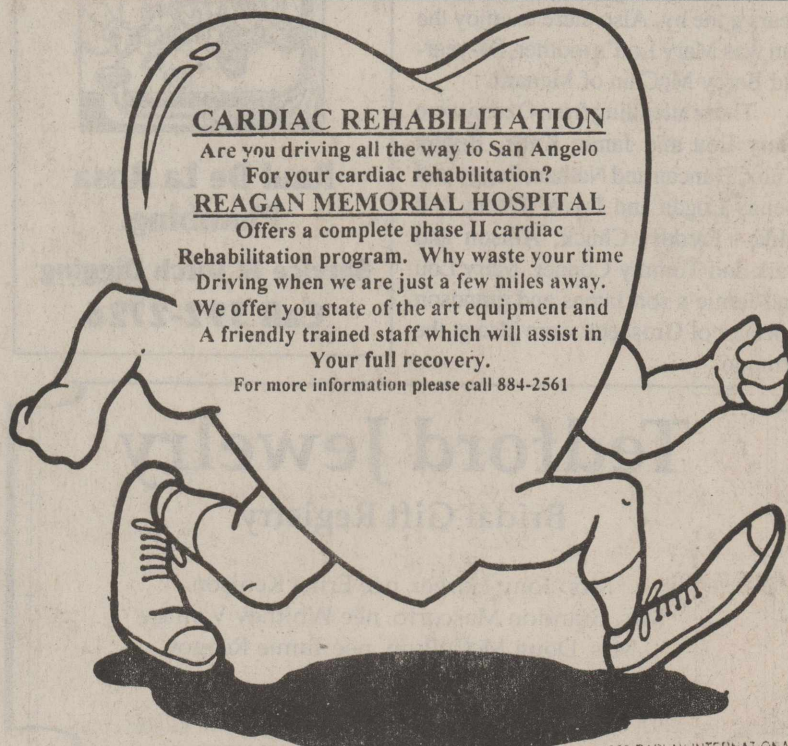

scoreboards; and, removing existing louvers and ventilation system and installing a new ventilation and heating system with improved air flow and comfort.

Facility improvements in regard to making Davidson Gymnasium Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) include renovating the existing storage room located at the east end of the gymnasium to be used as a public concession and viewing area. Access to this area will be provided by a new east accessible entrance and through new doors cut into the existing east wall of the gym. When completed, the gym floor will be visible from the east concession area, accessible seating will be provided for the handicapped, additional accessible public toilets will be provided, and an accessible route will be achieved into the public seating areas. Renovating the east storage area for viewing will require that the existing scoreboard be relocated. This will be achieved by the larger east scoreboard being exchanged for the smaller scoreboard that is currently located on the west wall of the gym. At the new east entrance, reserved handicapped accessible parking spaces will be provided, and, if space allows, additional nonhandicapped parking spaces will also be created.

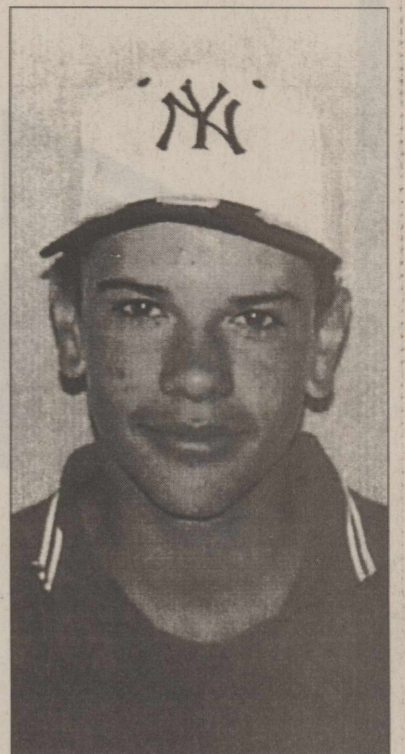
### Garza wins junior golf tournament

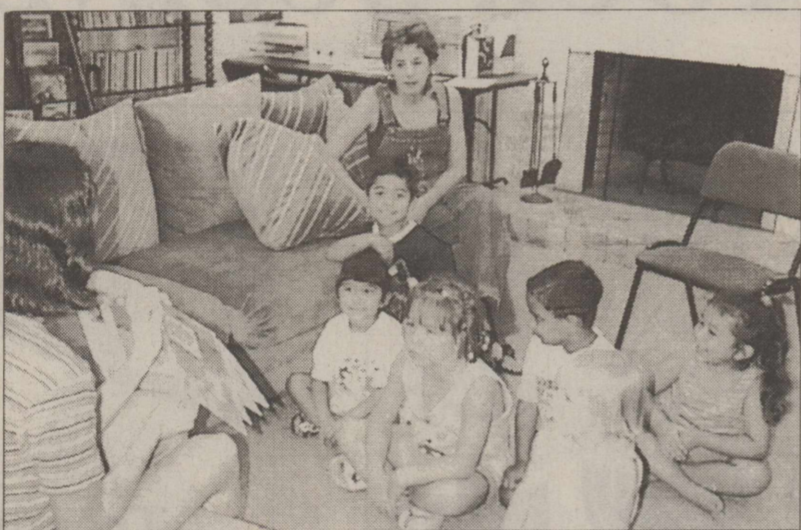
### Wilkins qualifies for golf area championship

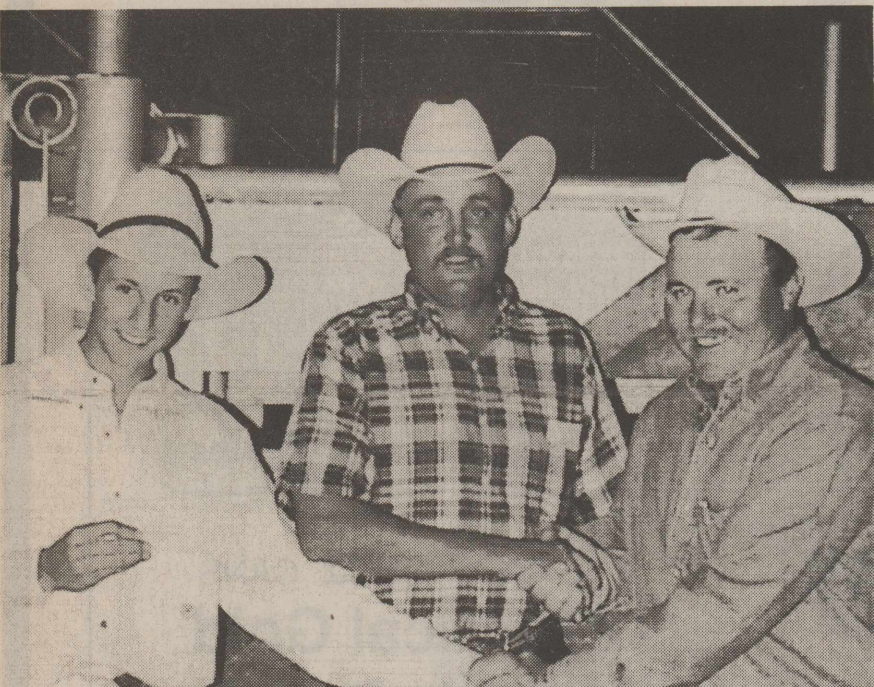

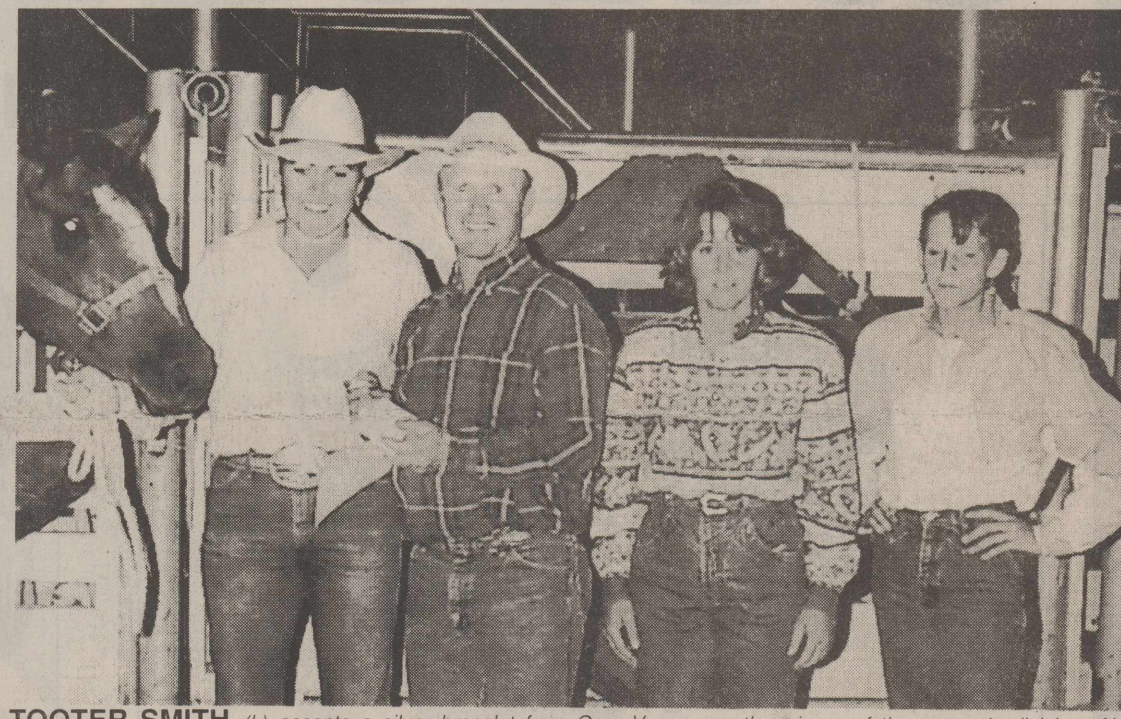

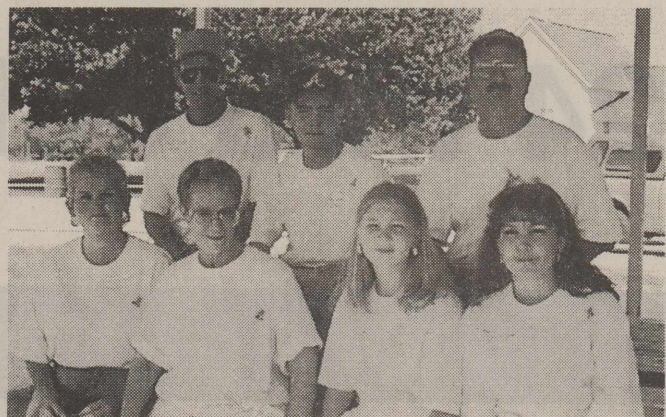

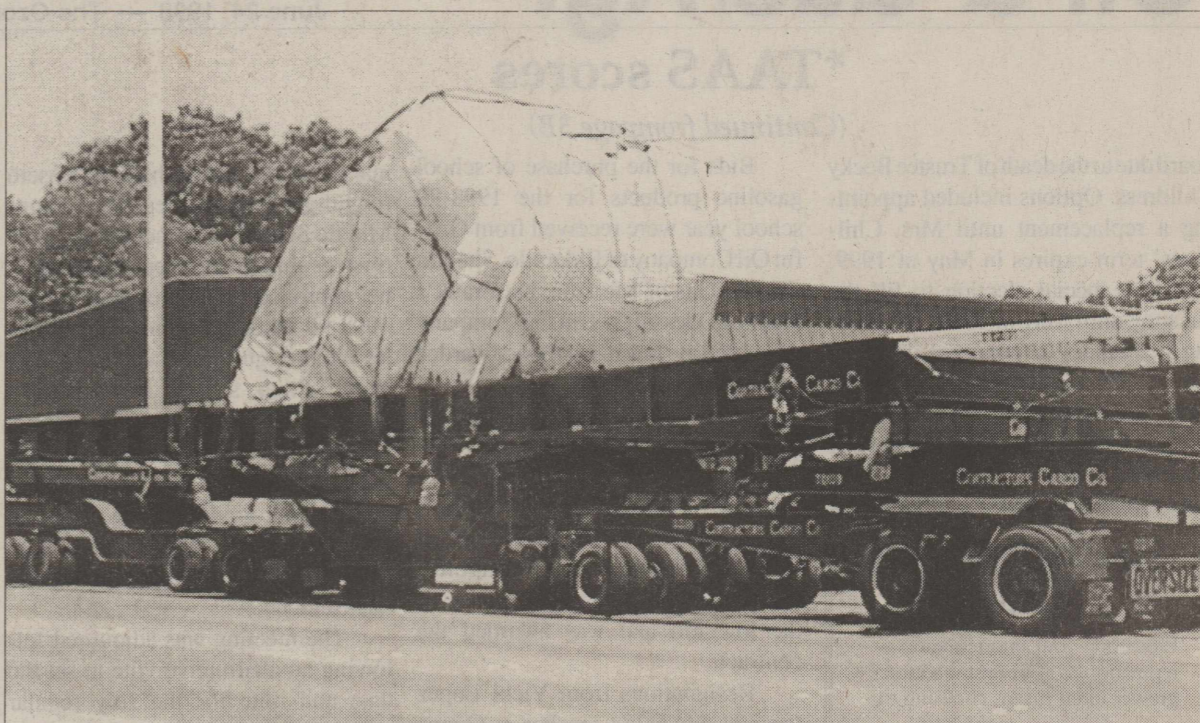

## TAAS scores show performance increases

At a regular meeting of the Ozona School Board on June 16, the trustees reviewed excellent student performance increases on the recently completed Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) for the 1997-98 school year. At the third grade, 85% of the students passed reading, and 86% passed mathematics. In the fourth grade, 83% passed reading, and 97% passed mathematics. A comparison of the scores of the fourth grade to their scores last year as third graders revealed that they had increased their reading mastery from 77% to 83% and their math mastery from 89% to 97%.

Eighty-seven percent of the district's fifth grade students passed reading, and 95% passed mathematics. A similar comparison of the scores of the fifth grade to their scores as fourth graders last year indicated that they had increased their reading mastery from 84% to 87% and their math mastery from 88% to 95%.  
Ninety-five percent of the sixth grade students passed reading, and 97% passed TAAS math. The same group last year as fifth grade students and as sixth grade students this year achieved a 9% reading mastery increase and an 8% math mastery increase.

In the seventh grade, 97% of the students passed reading and 95% passed math. A similar comparison of

the scores of the seventh grade to their scores as sixth graders last year indicated that they had increased their reading mastery from 83% to 97% and their math mastery from 88% to 95%.  
Eighty-seven percent of the eighth grade students passed reading, and 97% passed math. Last year, the group as seventh graders had 87% mastery in reading and 87% mastery in math, resulting in a gain of 10% in mastery of mathematics this year.

Ninety-four percent of the tenth grade students in Ozona High School

mastered reading, 95% mastered writing and 85% mastered mathematics.

Also reviewed during the meeting were reports of student progress on the Iowa Test of Basic Skills that is administered to students in grades kindergarten through two at Ozona Primary School. All of these reports were also positive in terms of student performance.

The trustees also discussed options for filling the vacancy on the

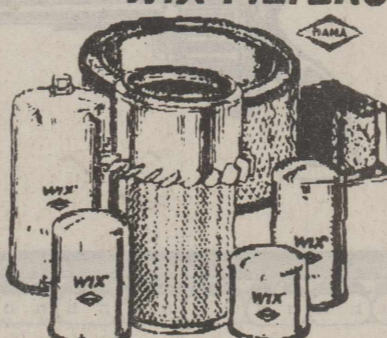

## Big Fires start small--be careful

Extremely dry conditions over most of Texas have prompted fire prevention experts to urge the public to plan their Fourth of July holiday with fire safety in mind.

"Big fires start small, so we are asking people to be aware that something as small as a spark from fireworks can start a major fire," said regional forester Ernie Smith, who leads the Texas Task Force. "Texas range and forest lands are tinder dry - large amounts of dry grass, brush and

timber throughout the state pose a significant fire danger."

Fire officials are encouraging citizens to attend community events to enjoy fireworks displays provided by professionals. "Although Texans traditionally celebrate the Fourth of July with fireworks," said Smith, "we must be extra careful so that we don't end up making a fun day a disastrous one."

## Mohair industry seeks larger market

Floor coverings are big business, and the mohair industry wants a share of this lucrative market.

Earlier this year, Mohair Council of America officials attended the annual "Surface Show" in Las Vegas to learn more about the carpet and floor covering industry.

"We did not fully understand the carpet market, and it was an eye-opener for us," said council executive director Zane Willard. He and council president Lanny Leinweber of Mountain Home visited with a number of company representatives in Las Vegas. As a result, the council contacted 45 firms making floor coverings of natural fibers to interest them in using mohair and received 10 responses.

"It takes a big investment to introduce a new carpet concept," Willard

said.

The council has been working with technologist Gerald Morrison of Dalton, GA, who makes carpet-manufacturing equipment. His expertise, along with new interest Atclier Carpets Inc. of Atlanta, could put another type of mohair carpet into the marketplace by early 1999.

According to carpet industry officials, 10 markets in the United States sell 80 percent of the high-end carpet. These markets include Dallas-Houston-Austin, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Chicago, New York, Boston, Washington, DC, Miami, Philadelphia and Atlanta.

The council is in the process of working out an arrangement with the Atlanta firm to participate in the introduction of loop mohair carpet to the

market.

"This firm has unique marketing abilities," Willard said. "They have experienced excellent growth the last several years, and we believe they have an impact."

Initially, the firm will introduce six styles of carpet in 10 colors. Samples will be supplied to interior designers in folding books that have contrasting colors and designs.

"You have to be the main attraction in order to make an impact in the marketplace," Willard said.

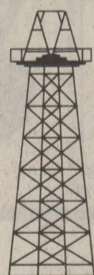

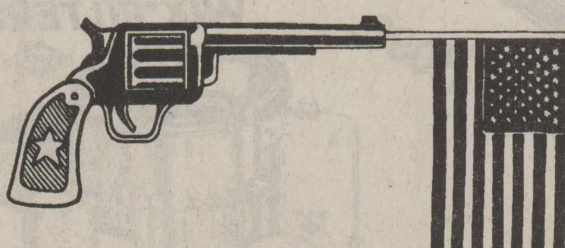

The same operator completed a couple of developmental wells 21.1 miles southwest of Ozona, also in Crockett County's Ozona Field.

The No. 2 Henderson "IGN" 7 flowed 186,000-CFD on a 0.75-in. choke and was rated at 215,000-CFD on absolute open flow. Bottomed at 6,900 feet, it will produce from 5,898 to 6,772 feet into the hole.

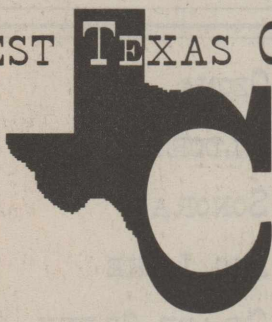
The 6,900-ft. No. 3 Henderson "IGN" 7 flowed 45,000-CFD on a 0.50-in. choke and was evaluated at 79,000-CFD on absolute open flow. It will produce from 5,892 to 6,298 feet into the wellbore.

Flowing 407,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke, the new gasser was rated at 486,000-CFD on absolute open flow. It probed to 6,569 feet total depth and will produce from an interval ranging from 6,310 to 6,392 feet into the hole.

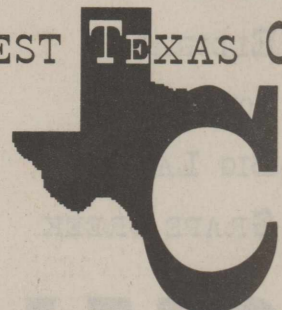
