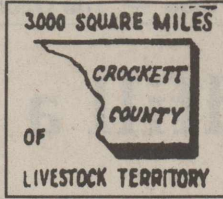

Large crowd gathers for Jennifer Lee Gravell memorial dedication at intermediate school



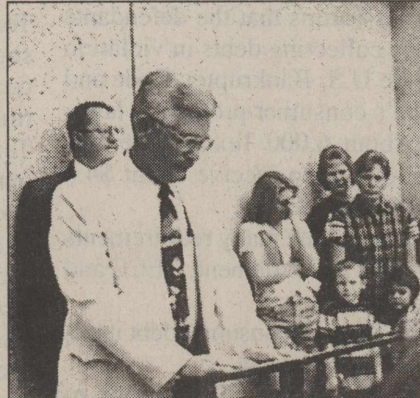

Wind power project delayed

Due to unforeseen circumstances, West Texas Wind Energy Partners' (WTWEP) wind power project planned for construction on Southwest Mesa in Crockett and Upton counties has been delayed. "The project has not been cancelled, nor has WTWEP withdrawn from the project. Actually, WTWEP is still working hard to keep the project moving ahead," said Dave Herrick. Herrick was in Ozona last week to update commissioners on the project.

The delay was caused by an error in the wind speed data collected and sold by Central and South West Serv-

ices (CSWS) to the companies participating in CSWS' solicitation for renewable power generation. CSWS is an affiliate of Central and South West Corp., the parent of West Texas Utilities.

The error was discovered by WTWEP and involved several of the meteorological stations installed on the mesa by CSWS. The error resulted in an overestimation of the wind potential of the Southwest Mesa site and a corresponding underestimation of the power purchase price necessary to support the project.

WTWEP believes the most reasonable solution is to adjust its win-

ning bid price to correct for the error and proceed with the project. However, CSWS has rejected that position and recently elected to permit the original "short listed" bidders to adjust the pricing and output of their original proposals.

"CSWS' re-bid adds new risks to the Southwest Mesa Project," said Herrick. The original project scheduled had the project complete before the current federal Production Tax Credit (PTC) expiration date of June 30, 1999. With the new schedule resulting from this re-bid, actual construction of a project would not likely begin before the summer of 1999. The tax credits factor significantly in the project economics and allowed the project energy to be bid at a price very favorable to the ratepayer and CSWS. If the tax credits are not extended, the price for the energy would rise significantly, perhaps to the point where either CSWS or the Public Utility Commission could elect not to proceed with a project. WTWEP is hopeful that bills to extend the PTCs, pending in both houses of Congress, will be passed.

The Southwest Mesa Project calls for 113 tri-blade wind turbines, each producing 660 kilowatts of energy with the capability of producing enough electricity to power approximately 30,000 homes. Life of the project is expected to be 30 years.

"WTWEP remains strongly committed to the project and looks forward to working with people of Upton and Crockett Counties to successfully complete this project," said Herrick.

Grant bringing music residency to Ozona

Ozona has been selected as a site for one of the Texas Folklife Resources community residencies musicians this fall. Texas Folklife Resources, a private nonprofit cultural organization dedicated to celebrating and perpetuating the traditional arts of Texas, has received grants from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Texas Commission on the Arts to do week-long music residencies in 12 to 15 small Texas towns during the fall of 1998 and spring of 1999.

"This is the second year for the program which placed musicians in 20 communities in the state last year," said Sandy Stokes, who was notified in July of Ozona's acceptance in the program. Ozona Chamber of Commerce will be the sponsoring organization here.

The program brings stellar traditional musicians such as accordion master Santiago Jimenez Jr., legendary fiddler Johnny Gimble or dynamic blues duo Carol Fran and Clarence Holliman as well as other fine Texas musicians to communities for an entire week. Gimble is the musician who will be in Ozona.

The residencies are designed to involve the whole community, and "our job is to find things for him to do during that week," said Stokes. Examples of sites visited by the artists in residence last year include senior centers, churches, parks, nursing homes, schools, community centers, detention centers and major local employers. The musicians are available for presentations, workshops, demonstrations of their own musical traditions or jam sessions or performances with other musicians in the community. The visiting musician may be booked for a maximum of 30 hours in each community.

There is no cash match required from each residency site: the time spent by the committee members, the local advertising done to support the residency, and the various locations of

individual events in the town will be used as in-kind match.

Ozona's resident musician of the program, Johnny Gimble, has spent the last 60 years playing and recording with famous musicians. He has played and recorded with Bob Wills and His Texas Playboys, Willie Nelson, George Jones, Merle Haggard, George Strait, Connie Smith, Asleep at the Wheel and Chet Atkins. He's recorded with Paul McCartney and appeared in a Clint Eastwood movie.

Gimble describes his music, Texas Swing, as "Dixieland jazz on strings." He is expected to arrive in Ozona Oct. 27.

Commissioners consider local landfill a possibility

Court members voted Aug. 10 to let Judge Jeffrey Sutton "learn what he can" about a parcel of land which has potential as a location for a solid waste landfill. The vote came at their regular August meeting after review of cost analysis information compiled at the request of the county by the firm of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper.

The PSC "opinion of probable cost" to permit and open a Type I-AE solid waste landfill is \$732,000. Annual operating costs in the report amounted to \$246,000.

Dee Keilers of the Crockett County Water Control and Improve-

ment District, suggested that commissioners look toward the state's Water Development Board as a source of financing for the proposed project.

To pay or not to pay took a large part of the court day. Commissioners tabled an agenda item to approve final payment to Sunwest Construction Company, the firm that built the new annex. Specifically mentioned as a reason to wait on payment was an air conditioning check which has not been performed.

During the bill paying portion of the meeting, Commissioner Fred Deaton continued to question payment of a bill for computer wire ordered for the new annex building. County Attorney Bill Mason ordered the wire at the direction of architect Jack Meeks. The wire was not specified in the original plans for the building.

"A lot of stuff was changed, re-changed and never brought to commissioners' court," said Deaton of the annex.

Payment of the \$3,400 bill was approved with Judge Sutton and Commissioners Rudy Martinez and Frank Tambunga voting for and Commissioners Fred Deaton and Fred Nicks voting against.

A request for payment of \$1,125 from Bill Mason for legal work done for the library board was paid on an identical for/against vote.

Librarian Louise Ledoux said she thought use of Mason's legal services would come under his duties as county attorney, and Mason said he believed he had made it clear to Mrs. Ledoux that the work would be billed for.

The job of the county attorney is only to prosecute, Mason said, and civil work will have to be billed. "I did as much as I could for free. I was trying to do it for free, but all of a

sudden it (civil work for county entities) just began to absolutely inundate me," Mason said.

A bill from Mason for county work included a lease which the court had voted to have done by a San Angelo law firm. Judge Sutton had later requested that the work be done by Mason, he said.

"There's work on that \$9,000 bill I didn't ask you to do," Commissioner Deaton said, emphasizing that such matters should go through the court.

Mason responded by saying that not all questions could wait 30 days (the commissioners meet regularly once a month) for a reply.

The court voted to execute a resolution recognizing the principals and organizations bringing about the tobacco litigation settlement. Crockett County will get approximately \$72,000 from the settlement, Judge Sutton said.

Jim Schroeder of FORAS Energy, the company responsible for construction of a wind power project in Crockett and Upton Counties, and Dave Herrick of FPL Energy Inc. were at the meeting to report on the project. Herrick told commissioners of delays in the project. (See related story, this issue)

Commissioners voted to re-bid the senior citizens' building construction at the request of the architect and also voted to purchase, in the amount of \$2,500, a table and 15 chairs for the jury room. Janet Hill McDaniel reported that the senior citizens' building fund now has \$189,000.

During the report by Sheriff Shane Fenton, he commented that Crockett and Sutton Counties may qualify for large grants through Concho Valley Council of Governments because of the nearness to the border.

Commissioners also discussed with Fenton and Bob Falkner possible ways of dispatching upon the retirement of Mrs. L. A. McCaleb from the fire department. Mrs. McCaleb has expressed her intention to retire as

Ozona schools enrollment down

Enrollment was down by 29 students on the first day of school this year with losses from the middle and high school campuses. Total first day 1998 enrollment was 961 compared to 990 in 1997. The figure this fall is the lowest in four years with 1996 opening enrollment at 967 and 968 in 1995. However, the 961 figure surpasses 1994's total of 926.

Ozona Primary and Intermediate Schools each had increases this year. The primary is up by four to 234, and

intermediate school increased from 214 to 216. Enrollment decreased at Ozona Middle School from 225 to 216 this fall, and the figures for Ozona High School decreased from 321 to 295.

Enrollment by grade shows the following: pre-kindergarten 22, kindergarten 81, first grade 70, second grade 60, third grade 70, fourth grade 75, fifth grade 71, sixth grade 71 seventh grade 68, eighth grade 77, ninth grade 78, tenth grade 70, eleventh grade 85 and twelfth grade 62.

soon as the county can make arrangements for someone to take over the responsibility.

Gerald Creel, director of nurses at Crockett County Care Center, was present in the absence of Crystal Hargraves, administrator. The health services board had been unable to meet for lack of a quorum the previous week, Creel said.

Hargraves' last day is tentatively set at Sept. 9, Creel said. There are 16 applicants for the position. The fact that Creel is a member of a search committee which will be part of the hiring process was questioned by Commissioner Frank Tambunga. Others on the committee set up by the health services board are Dr. Marcus DeHoyos, Nikki Sewell and Tom Anderson.

Other court members also expressed concern about Creel's pres-

ence on the committee. He said he would bring the matter before the board.

Creel reported that Ozona Rehab is seeing 10 to 12 patients a day, more than Kelly Jackson can handle by himself. Speech and occupational therapy have also been added to the services at the Ozona Rehab.

As part of the health services agenda, commissioners voted to appoint Armando Arredondo to fill a vacancy on the board.

Commissioners also voted to approve changes to the convention center rules. Monthly reports were heard from Eddie Moore, road and parks superintendent; Garland Young, civic and youth center director; Shelly Childress for the Fair Park Convention Center; Janet Hill McDaniel for Helping Hands; Bob Falkner, fire chief; and Louise Ledoux, librarian.

During a review of 1999 budget requests, a number of citizens attended on behalf of a budget line item allocating \$30,000 for the museum maintenance and utilities. Geniece Childress commented that the museum had 800 visitors in July with 17 foreign countries represented.

District Court, Aug. 13, 1998

Joe Don Moran entered a guilty plea on a charge of possession of a prohibited weapon. He was placed on two years of community supervision under deferred adjudication, ordered to pay a fine of \$250.00 and perform 400 hours of community service.

Michael Wayne Smith entered a guilty plea on a charge of possession of a controlled substance (cocaine). He was placed on three years of community supervision with deferred adjudication, ordered to pay a fine of \$2,000.00 and pay \$140.00 restitution to the Texas Department of Public Safety and court costs of \$209.00.

Ruben Rene Lopes entered a guilty plea on a charge of possession of a controlled substance (cocaine) without intent to deliver. He was placed on three years of community supervision with deferred adjudication, fined \$1,500.00 and ordered to pay \$124.50 in court costs and restitution of \$140.00 to the Texas Department of Public Safety, and to perform 160 hours of community service.



AGs Win Collections Settlement
Texas Attorney General Dan Morales and the attorneys general of other states on Aug. 7 reached a multi-million dollar settlement with General Electric Capital Corporation and Montgomery Ward Credit Corp. regarding unlawful collection of debts from bankrupt customers.

The agreement filed in State District Court in Travis County settles claims that the defendants were collecting debts in violation of the U.S. Bankruptcy Code and state's consumer protection law.

About 6,000 Texas customers can expect to receive about \$4.8 million in refunds.

Among the many requirements listed in the settlement, GECC and Wards must:

- Forgive consumer debt it improperly obtained.
- Repay about \$70 million to affected customers nationwide, including any interest and fees paid.

Morales obtained a similar settlement with Sears in September 1997, resulting in about \$1 million in refunds to about 11,000 Texans.

Assistant Attorney General D. Esther Chavez of Morales' Consumer Protection Division handled the case.

Bush Suspends Law on Hauling
Drought has caused the depletion of pasture forage and hay supplies, creating the need for many Texas ranchers and farmers to buy hay from suppliers outside their immediate areas.

But a Texas law requires anyone hauling hay beyond 150 miles of his or her home to obtain a commercial license.

Gov. George W. Bush ordered the temporary suspension of the requirement for 90 days, effective Aug. 5.

Other Capital Highlights
■ Figures compiled by the Texas Department of Public Safety show the number of traffic fatalities dropped in 1997 for the first time in four years. Last year, 3,508 Texans died on Texas roads compared with 3,738 in 1996. That's a decline of 6.2 percent.

- Texas prison officials plan to spend \$100 million for the construction of 2,000 solitary-confinement cells. These "Super Max" cells will be used to isolate violent gang members who recently have become more disruptive.
- Austin police are investigating a death threat against the Texas Funeral Service Commission. The staff of the funeral agency allegedly was threatened by a former apprentice embalmer for a company being fined for alleged violations of state embalming laws.
- Under a program initiated in July by the Texas Department of Insurance, nearly 100 drivers who had trouble obtaining insurance or had none are now covered. The Market Assistance Program assists drivers who live in ZIP codes designated as underserved.
- Nora Linares, former director of the Texas Lottery, has reached an out-of-court settlement in her lawsuit against the lottery operator, Gech Holdings Corp. Terms of the lawsuit were not specified. Linares sued Gech after she was fired by the lottery commission in January 1997.

Pursuant to Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT or Commission) Procedural Rule 22.52(a)(1), notice is hereby given that West Texas Utilities Company (WTU) has filed an application for a Certificate of Convenience and Necessity (CCN) with the PUCT for WTU to construct facilities in Crockett, Reagan and Sutton Counties in order to continue to provide reliable electric power to the areas in and around the towns of Ozona and Sonora, Texas. WTU is proposing this construction to prevent the overloading of existing transmission equipment and transmission lines and prevent voltages from dropping to unacceptable levels in the Ozona and Sonora areas when there is an interruption of any one of several transmission circuits that transmit the power to this area. This will require the construction of a 73.4 mile, 138 kV transmission line from the town of Big Lake to a new substation east of the town of Ozona and then on to the town of Sonora. A description of the line route for the two segments is provided below. The estimated cost of the project is \$12,042,300.

Big Lake to Ozona Section:
The proposed transmission line will exit the South side of WTU's Big Lake Substation that is located on the South side of Big Lake and is in the block bounded on the West by Plaza Street, on the East by Depot Street, on the North by Wolters Street and on the South by Sengelman Street.

The line will exit the Substation in a South direction and extend for 900 feet to an angle point; then turn in a South Southeastly direction for approximately 3000 feet to an angle point; then turn Southeast for approximately 3260 feet to an angle point; then turn in a Southerly direction for approximately 600 feet where the proposed line will cross Crockett County Road 10 at a point approximately 8,200 feet East of its intersection with Chico Lane and then continue on for approximately 6,700 feet to an angle point; then turn to the Southeast for approximately 5,600 feet and cross the Crockett-Reagan County line at a point approximately 27,000 feet West of the Reagan-Iron County line and continue on approximately 1,100 feet to an angle point; then turn slightly to the North for approximately 2,100 feet to an angle point; then turn Southeast and extend approximately 5,300 feet where the proposed line will cross Crockett County Road 206 and continue on approximately 6,800 feet to an angle point; then turn South and extend approximately 5,600 feet to an angle point; then turn South Southeast for approximately 21,800 feet to an angle point; then turn Southerly for approximately 5,900 feet to an angle point; then turn slightly South Southeastly for approximately 3,000 feet to a point crossing Crockett County Road 205 and then continue on approximately 17,900 feet to a point crossing FM 29 at a point 1,800 feet west of Crockett County Road 205 and then continue for approximately 6,900 feet to an angle point; then turn South Southeastly for approximately 27,300 feet to an angle point; then turn in a South Southeastly direction for approximately 15,500 feet to an angle point; then turn slightly in a Southeastly direction for approximately 12,000 feet to an angle point; then turn in a Southeastly direction for approximately 800 feet where the proposed line will cross FM 163 at a point approximately 5,500 feet North of the junction of FM 163 with FM 137 and then continue on approximately 15,000 feet to an angle point; then turn South for approximately 4,200 feet to an angle point; then turn in South Southeastly direction parallel to a ranch road for approximately 1,200 feet to the west side of the Friend Ranch Substation.

The total length of the proposed line section from the existing Big Lake Substation to the proposed Friend Ranch Substation is 42.1 miles.

Ozona to Sonora Section:
The Friend Ranch Substation will be located on the North side of the right of way of Interstate 10 and Business Loop 466 and approximately 10,000 feet East of the Community of Ozona. The proposed line to Sonora will exit the South side of the Substation.

The line will exit the Substation going South for approximately 900 feet and cross Interstate 10 to an angle point just South of the Interstate 10 right of way; then turn in an Easterly direction just South of and with the meanders of Interstate 10 right of way for approximately 107,900 feet to an angle; then turn in a Northwesterly direction for approximately 2,900 feet to an angle point; then turn Southeast for approximately 11,200 feet where it will cross FM 1989 at a point approximately 6,100 feet South of Interstate 10 and then continue on for approximately 1,800 feet to an angle point; then turn in an Easterly direction for approximately 17,200 feet to an angle point; then turn South and continue for approximately 5,200 feet where it will cross the Sutton County Road 104 at a point approximately 9,000 feet South of Interstate 10 and continue on an additional 1,500 feet to an angle point; then turn East Southeastly for approximately 21,700 feet to an angle point; then turn in a Southeastly direction for approximately 4,600 feet to the west side of the WTU's existing Sonora 138 kV Substation located on the West side of Sonora, Texas.

The proposed line section between WTU's proposed Friend Ranch Substation and WTU's existing Sonora 138 kV Substation would total 33.1 miles in length.

SCHEDULE:
Construction on the Big Lake-Ozona-Sonora transmission line is scheduled to begin in the Summer of 1999 and be complete before the summer of 2000.

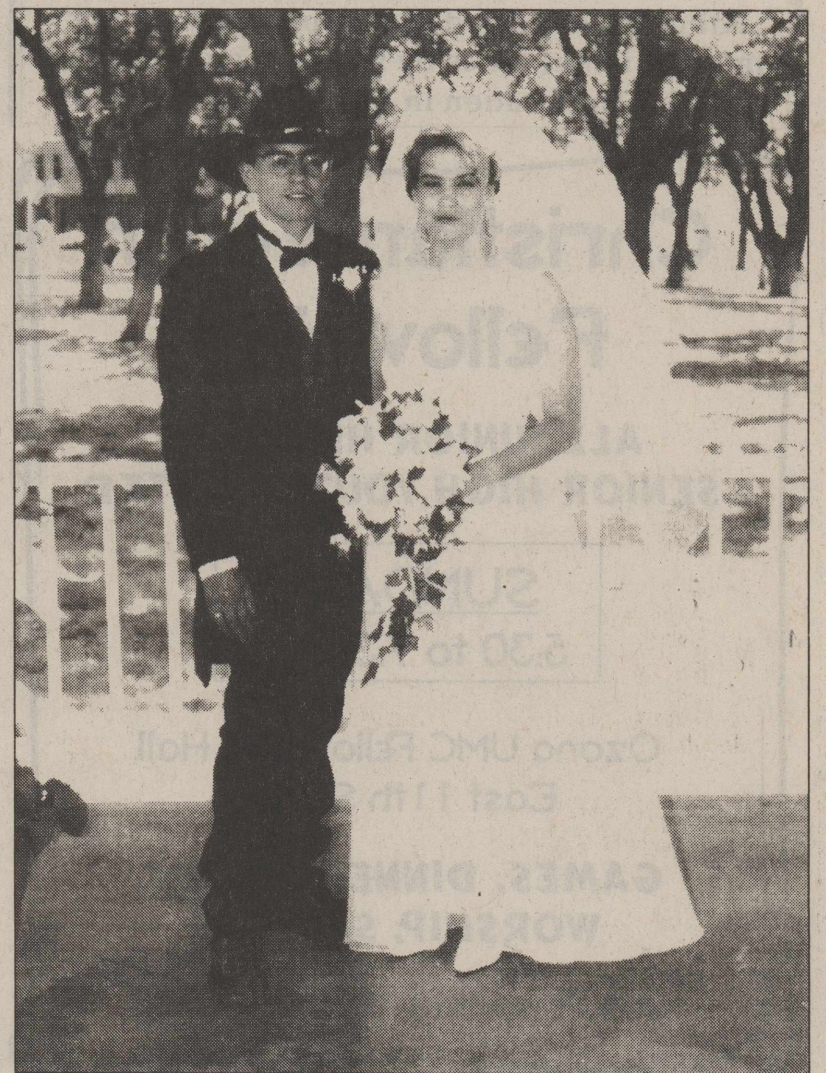

2 1/2 c. chopped cooked spinach
1 c. milk
3 T butter
3 T flour
1/3 tsp. nutmeg
1 tsp. grated onion
1 T lemon juice
2 eggs, well beaten
1 tsp. salt

Mix all ingredients together and pour into a well-buttered quart ring mold. Place in hot water bath. Bake at 375 degrees until firm.

Unmold on round tray and fill center with a creamed vegetable.

Ice Box Rolls

1 quart milk
1 c. lard
1 2/3 c. sugar
2 yeast cakes
5-6 c. flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. soda
5 tsp. salt

Put milk, lard and sugar in pan, heat to boiling. Cool to lukewarm

Dissolve yeast cakes in 1/4 c. lukewarm mixture. Add yeast cakes and enough flour to make the consistency of cake batter (about 5 cups). Allow to rise in warm place for two hours.

Add baking powder, soda and salt along with flour to make dough stiff. Make out as many rolls as needed. Let rise and bake 15 minutes at 350 degrees. Refrigerate remaining dough and use as needed. Takes chilled dough about 2 hours to rise.

Carmel Squares

1/2 c. butter
1 c. sugar
2 eggs, separated
1/2 c. chopped pecans
1/4 tsp. salt
1 1/2 c. flour
2 tsp. vanilla
1 c. brown sugar

Mix butter, salt and sugar. Add egg yolks, 1 tsp. vanilla, salt and flour. Spread over bottom of 8-inch square pan.

Beat egg whites stiff. Add 1 tsp. vanilla, brown sugar and pecans. Spread over mixture. Bake 40 minutes at 350 degrees.

May easily be doubled and cooked in 13"x9" pan.

Ride On Victoriously

Here is a grand picture. "I looked, and behold, a white horse, and he who sat on it had a bow; and a crown was given to him, and he went out conquering and to conquer" (Revelation 6:2). Is this horseman Jesus Christ?

Psalms 45:4 exhorts, "In Your majesty ride on victoriously, for the cause of truth and meekness and righteousness." This is definitely Messiah, the anointed One, Jesus of Nazareth.

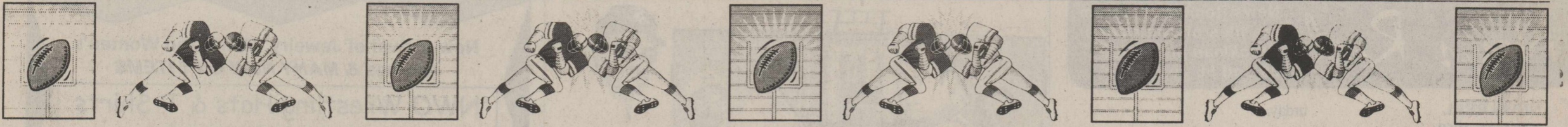

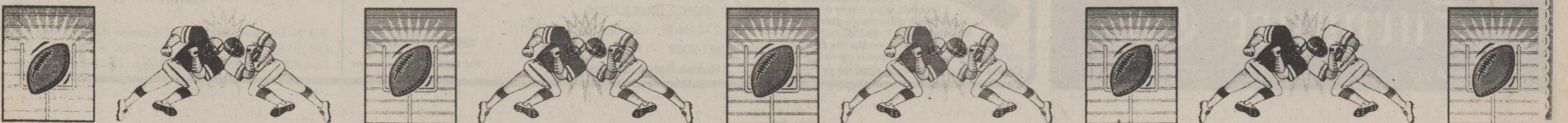

School District receives recognized status

Texans have long been known for bragging. Today, even our critics admit that Texas has a great deal to boast about. We all know that the Lone Star State is not perfect, and we aren't blind to the areas where improvement is needed, but when it comes to public schools, we have reason to crow.

Very quietly and very gradually over the last few years the Texas public school system has been moving ahead. We have moved ahead of other states in developing an accountability system, ahead of other states in defining what we want our children to learn, and ahead of other states in identifying schools where improvement must take place.

Last year people all over the nation began noticing what was happening in Texas. In May, an article in a California newspaper, the Orange County Register, was headlined "Lone Star Lesson for California" and stated that California "lags far behind Texas, which boosted test scores with early starts, smaller classes and accountability".

In October, Education Week gave Texas an "A" for its system of standards and assessments. Later that month, Texas was again in the spotlight when several presenters at the Columbia University Teachers Conference, sponsored by the prestigious Hechinger Institute on Education and the Media, praised the Texas accountability system.

In November, the National Education Goals Panel, which President George Bush established in 1990, reported that Texas was one of only five states where students have made significant progress in math and sci-

ence.

In March, 1998, the conservative Heritage Foundation published an article in its flagship publication, Policy Review, entitled "The Gold Star State: How Texas jumped to the head of the class in elementary school achievement". The article noted that, "If funding and demography were vital to educational performance, then Texas would likely have one of the worst public school systems in the nation." Instead, the article continues, "Within the past few years, Texas has become one of the highest performing states in the nation. Texas has achieved this remarkable turnaround by applying a simple lesson from the corporate world: Educators will find innovative ways to raise achievement if they are given the freedom to experiment and are held accountable for student performance."

Texas public schools have taken steps to make real gains in student achievement. In Ozona, our student performance is ahead of the state average in every category measured. The Crockett County Consolidated Common School District has received a Texas Education Agency rating of "Recognized" for the second year in a row. While others have bemoaned the state of public education, Texas and Ozona educators have done something about it. Texas schools are fast becoming a respected role model for other states.

Following is a copy of the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District cumulative student performance for the past five years. It is quite evident these days, Ozona Public Schools and public schools in the state are giving Texans even more to brag about.

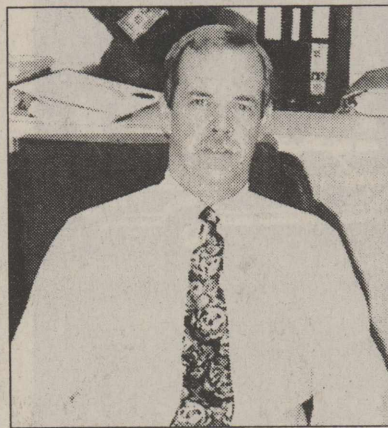
Meet the new faculty at Ozona schools

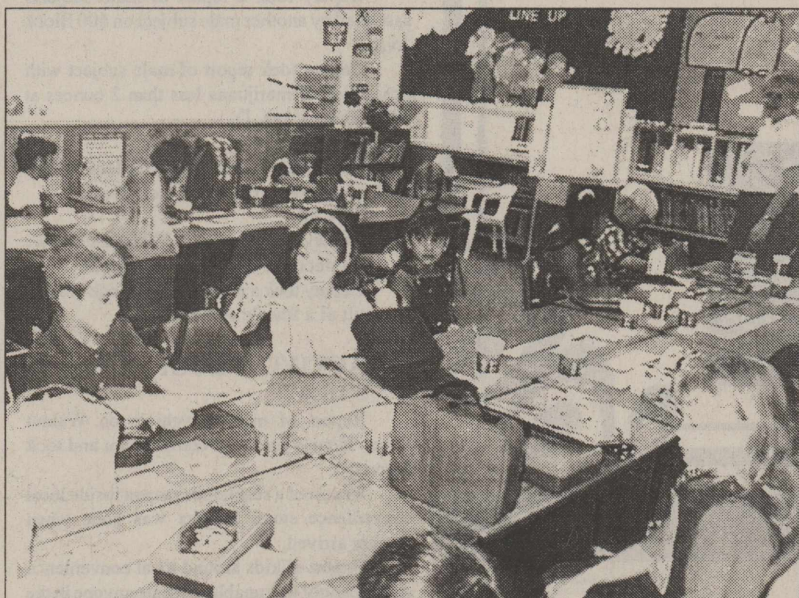

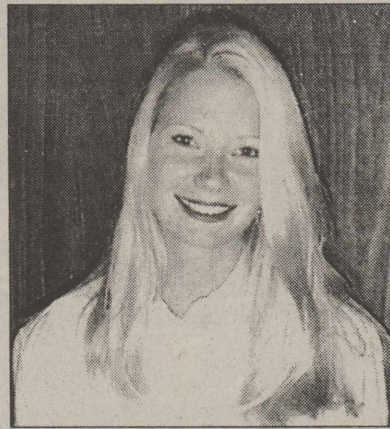
DAN PULATTIE

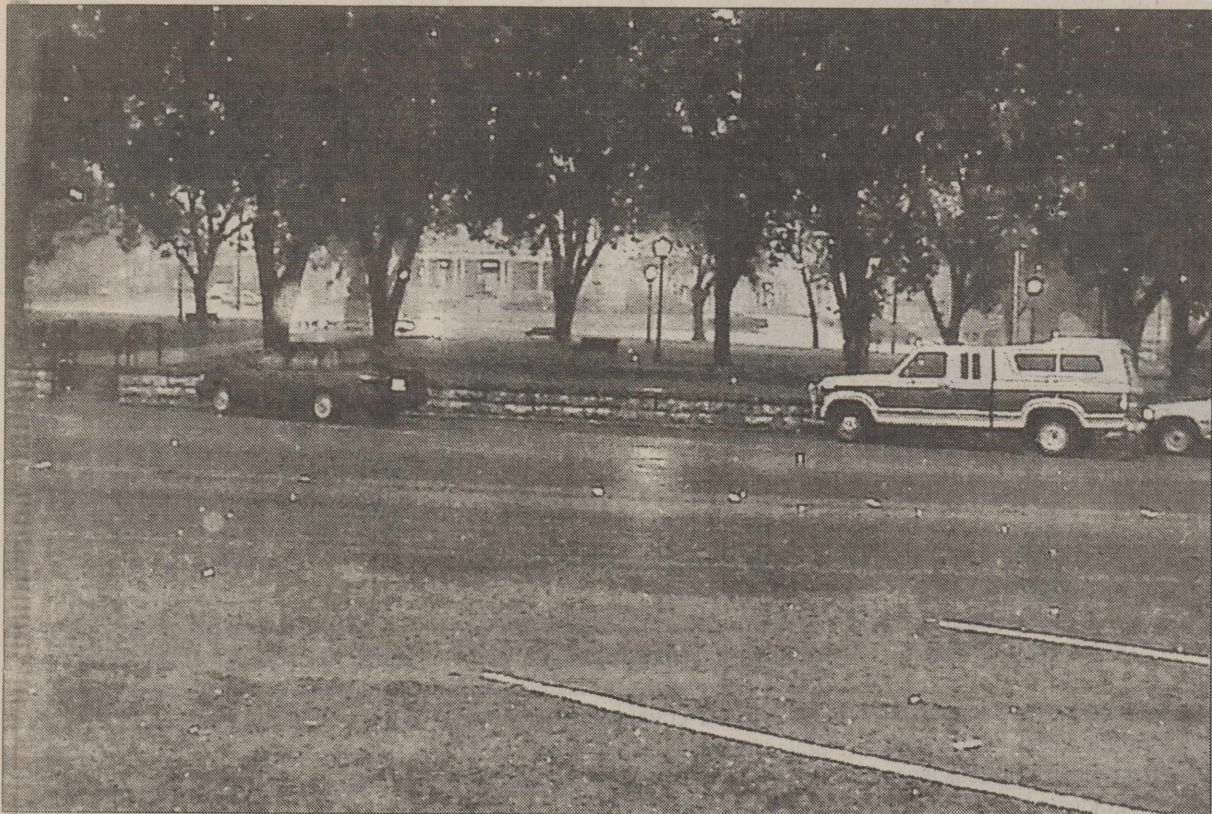

TNRCC begins monitoring haze

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) will begin sophisticated airplane monitoring as part of an ongoing effort to better define the causes of haze in Big Bend National Park and the surrounding region.

The TNRCC will amend an existing contract with Baylor University, which flies a specially equipped twin-engine airplane which has been used to monitor ozone formation in Texas metropolitan areas. That plane, based in Waco, has been modified for the Big Bend flights and will take air quality measurements from large air masses moving across Texas and the Gulf of Mexico, and from air entering the Big Bend region from Mexico. A \$218,000 grant from the Environmental Protection Agency will pay for 50 hours of flying time this year.

The flights will begin as soon as favorable weather conditions are forecast.

The TNRCC innovation is the latest in a series of studies designed to find out what is causing haze in the popular park.

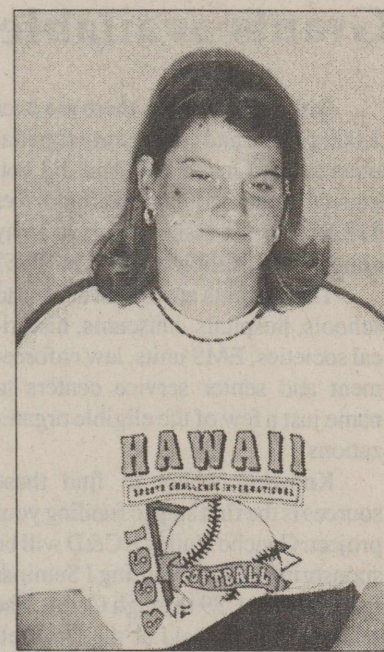
Kassie Conner on international team
