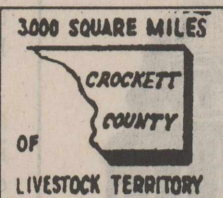

Ozona Airport 100 percent open

An elated Mary Joan Hearne, flight base operator at Ozona Municipal Airport, announced Friday afternoon that the facility is now "100 percent open". Contractor Reece Albert formally released the new runway for use at 2:30 p.m. Aug. 21 according to Mrs. Hearne.

Painting on the 6,000 foot runway was completed earlier that afternoon and the old runway was pulled up with three passes of Reece Albert equipment, said Mrs. Hearne.

Cosmetic dirt work remains to be completed at the airport and the deer proof fence was only about 50 percent done Friday. Now that runway work is finished, these two areas will be taken care of. When the fencing is complete, there will be 143 acres under fence at the airport. Previously, the fenced area included 60 acres.

Ozona Municipal Airport has a new runway that is 6,000 feet by 75 feet with a new parking apron including 15 tie-downs and connecting

taxiways. The new runway lights are medium intensity which dim to low intensity to conserve power. The lights may be brightened by radio signal from a pilot.

The bid for the 1.930 million dollar improvement project was awarded in June of 1997. Ninety percent of the cost was paid through the Texas Department of Transportation with Crockett County matching the remaining 10 percent. Most of the county's portion was accounted for

through the value of 83 acres of land donated by J. Cleo Thompson.

Construction began in October of 1997, but problems with a fog seal, which was applied to the surface, delayed completion of the project for more than three months while options to eliminate the sticky surface were being evaluated.

There will be a ribbon cutting at the airport at 1 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 27. State Rep. Bob Turner will be present for the event.

School bond passes with 270 votes

Crockett County voters gave the go ahead to renovating the Ozona Middle School Aug. 22 after two bond elections in an attempt to replace the school. Also included in Saturday's \$2,965,000.00 bond election will be renovations to the gymnasium at OMS and to Davidson Gymnasium.

A steady stream of voters on Saturday brought the election total to 270 votes for and 158 against.

The renovations will be financed by a 5-year bond issuance which will increase the current tax rate by nearly 10 cents per \$100.00 valuation for these five years. As of Sept. 1, 1997, school construction or renovation bond

money is no longer subject to recapture by the state, so the entire amount generated by the bond will remain in the county.

When trustees voted to order the bond election in June, facility improvements at the middle school were to include: removing 22 existing classrooms and office heaters from closets; installing 26 new roof-mounted heating and air conditioning units (one above each classroom, two above the office area and four above the cafeteria); providing new electrical service to the building for new air conditioning and heating units; updating and modernizing the two sets of existing boys' and girls' toilet rooms; provid-

ing a new library and a new area for band practice and student walkways; moving the administration offices to a more central location in the building; renovating the current offices into staff work areas; removing and installing new concrete slabs in 11 classrooms; painting all existing interior and exterior painted surfaces; installing new carpet in existing corridors, existing classrooms and new office, new band hall, new library and new technology rooms; installing new fire and smoke detection alarms; upgrading the building's electrical power supply; replacing all existing exterior and interior doors; removing all of the existing evaporative coolers in the cafeteria; installing a new standing seam metal roof system over the existing sloped roof; installing new batt insulation; performing asbestos abatement; installing new liquid marker boards and bulletin boards in all classrooms; providing a new science laboratory with built-in science equipment; and removing most of the existing partitions on the stage of the cafeteria and repairing the floor, walls and ceiling to return most of the stage area to a usable raised presentation platform.

Middle school gym improvements were to include: providing a new wood playing floor over the existing tartan artificial floor covering; relocating the boys' locker room to a new addition along the west end of the gym, freeing up space for additional seating; providing additional seating along the south side of the gym with storage below; renovating the existing girls' coach's office, showers and toilets for new public accessible toilets; relocating the girls' coach's office, girls' showers and girls' toilets to the

new west addition; providing new backboards for all basketball and new scoreboards; and removing existing louvers and ventilation system and installing a new ventilation and heating system with improved air flow and comfort.

Facility improvements in regard to making Davidson Gym Americans with Disabilities Act accessible include renovating the existing storage room located at the east end of the gym to be used as a public concession and viewing area. Access to this area will be provided by a new east accessible entrance and through new doors cut into the existing east wall of the gym. When completed, the gym floor will be visible from the east concession area, accessible seating will be provided for the handicapped, additional accessible public toilets will be provided, and an accessible route will be achieved into the public seating areas. Renovating the east storage area for viewing will require that the existing scoreboard be relocated. This will be achieved by the larger east scoreboard being exchanged for the smaller scoreboard that is currently located on the west wall of the gym. At the new east entrance, reserved handicapped accessible parking spaces will be provided, and, if space allows, additional nonhandicapped parking spaces will also be created.

In December of 1997, voters rejected a \$3,850,000.00 bond election which would have provided a new middle school, middle school band hall and gymnasium improvements. Also turned down was a July 1996 bond election for \$4,990,000.00 to build a new middle school, high school gym and provide district-wide improvements.

Lions face Greenwood, Coahoma in first scrimmage

Last week the 1998 version of Lions' football met in Coahoma for a three-way scrimmage against perennial 3A power Midland Greenwood and the Coahoma Bulldogs. This was the first contact of the season against another school, but they had butted shoulder pads against each other in an inter-squad scrimmage the prior Saturday.

In the inter-squad game Clay Richardson and Steven Tarr engineered one touchdown drive with Kenny Vargas picking up good yardage. Ross Crawford, expected to guide the Ozona offense at quarterback this year, sat out most of that scrimmage with a knee injury that coaches hope is minor.

At Coahoma, without Crawford playing any, the Lions' offense and defense had many highs and lows. At times they would move the ball well, picking up several first downs against the Troopers and Bulldogs. Other times the offense would stall out. From the other side of the line the Lions held their opponents well, but gave up big plays leading to scores.

The only score of the evening by the Lions was a sustained drive by the junior varsity with Tarr at the helm. This score came against the Greenwood Troopers.

The Lions tackle the Menard Yellowjackets in their next scrimmage this Thursday in Menard. The bout was first scheduled to be held in Ozona, but due to field conditions at Lion Stadium it was later changed.

School recommends tax rate remain at \$1.30

During their regular monthly meeting that was held on Tuesday, Aug. 18, members of the Ozona School Board held a 1998-99 school year budget hearing to discuss and review the 1998-99 school year official estimated budget. The \$11,312,629.00 budget includes \$3,846,100.00 that must be sent to the state for recapture. Overall district revenue is projected to be \$9,691,500.00 based on a 100% collection rate and a tax rate of \$1.30

per \$100.00 of assessed value.

Following review of the proposed budget, the members voted unanimously for its approval, and they also voted to recommend to the Crockett County Commissioners Court a tax rate of \$1.30 per \$100.00 of assessed value, which is the same tax rate as last year, even though the district's taxable value is down by a little over 10 million dollars. The trustees also approved the amended 1997-98 school year budget as presented.

During the meeting Superintendent Larry Taylor presented a report from the Texas Education Agency on the 1998 District and Campus Accountability/Accreditation Ratings Notification. He reported that the school district had achieved an "Academically Recognized" rating for the second year in a row from T.E.A. To achieve "Academically Recognized" status, Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) results in grades 3-8 and 10 have to show an overall total of at least 80% of its students and student groups (African American, Hispanic, White and Economically Disadvantaged) passing each subject area (Reading, Writing and Mathematics) on the 1998 TAAS, a 1996-97 dropout rate of 3.5% or less, and a 1996-97 attendance rate of at least 94%.

He also reported that two of the district's four campuses achieved the "Academically Recognized" Campus Rating from the Texas Education Agency. These two campuses are Ozona High School and Ozona Middle School. The district's other two campuses, Ozona Primary and Ozona Intermediate, barely missed the "Academically Recognized" rating as a result of one subgroup, economically disadvantaged, missing the 80% standard by 2.5%. Ozona Middle School also narrowly missed the "Academically Exemplary" highest Texas Education Agency rating (90% passing each subject area, including all students and each student group).

Taylor also presented the district's 1997-98 School Year Annual report

Charley brings rain to Ozona

The remains of Tropical Storm Charley reached southern Crockett County Sunday with slow, soaking rains while dumping up to 18 inches on Del Rio. Massive flooding in that city washed away homes, left 16 people confirmed dead in Del Rio and Acufita and 30 missing.

Rains moved farther north in Crockett County Monday night and Tuesday. The county was placed under a flash flood warning until 5 p.m. Tuesday with heavy rain reported at 11:45 a.m. from Sonora to Eldorado to Ozona and between Iraan and Sheffield. The National Weather Service Doppler radar in San Angelo estimated rainfall rates between one and three inches per hour. This was on top of radar estimated totals up to 10 inches

along and north of Hwy. 190 in northern Crockett County.

State Highway 163 south from Ozona to Comstock, Hwy. 137 north and Hwy. 190 from Eldorado to Iraan were closed. County roads which were closed at some time Tuesday included: CR#207, Powell Field Road; CR#208 west of Powell Field; CR#302 in Todd Field; CR#303, Bunger Road; CR#304 where Live Oak Road crosses (6 to 7 feet of water); CR#305, Live Oak Road; CR#306, Deer Canyon Road; CR#307, River Road; CR#411, Ingham-Dudley Road; and CR#405, Howard Draw Road south.

Up to 1.75 inches of rain fell in town between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. Numerous streets in Ozona were also barricaded because of high water.

Three killed in motor vehicle accident

A one-vehicle accident in Crockett County took the lives of three Louisiana residents Saturday morning. Three other passengers in the vehicle were treated and released from Iraan Hospital.

Driver of the 1998 Dodge Caravan, Ellen Walls, was westbound on I-10 approximately 28 miles west of Ozona when the vehicle left the highway on the left side. She overcorrected to the right and lost control of the vehicle, which went into a broadside skid and struck the guardrail. The vehicle overturned one-quarter time onto the driver's side and spun across the interstate, hitting the opposite guardrail. The vehicle slid backward into the westbound lane and burst into flame before coming to a stop.

An attempt to airlift Ms. Walls, 51, to the Lubbock Burn Center ended when paramedics decided to stop at Midland Memorial Hospital because of her declining condition.

Dying at the scene were her 18-month-old grandson, Joshua Granger, and Flora Triggs, 19. Walls and Granger were from Patterson, LA, and

Triggs was from Gray, LA.

Brian Mark Flemings, 31, of Mobile, AL, received second-degree burns on arms and legs. Kraig Anthony Triggs, 18, of Patterson, LA, and Tajaka Wade, 17, of Morgan City, LA, were treated for minor cuts and bruises.

All six persons in the vehicle were wearing seat belts. No one was ejected. The accident was investigated by DPS Troopers Castulo Bilano Jr. and Monte Carroll.

Suspect flees

The driver of a van pulled over on a traffic stop early Tuesday fled the vehicle two miles west of Ozona. A resulting 3-hour man hunt failed to find the subject.

Deputy Tyler Roy made the 2:51 a.m. stop and never saw the driver who bailed out of a grey van, said Chief Deputy Alton Davis. The vehicle is registered out of Parker, TX, and it is believed the van was going to be used to transport illegal aliens, according to Davis.

AUSTIN — Many Texas lawmakers are operating district offices that aren't fully accessible to people with disabilities, a violation of state and federal law, the *Austin American-Statesman* reported last week.

State inspectors found that 67 district offices for state representatives and 43 district offices for senators were in inaccessible buildings.

Offices leased by the state must be in accessible buildings, according to Texas law. In 1997, the Legislature voted to require inspections before the state occupies leased space.

But some lawmakers whose district offices are inaccessible want to exempt themselves from the law before the state can impose \$1,000-a-day fines against the building owners or cancel leases.

The Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation has agreed to consider hardship cases after Rep. Rob Junell, D-San Angelo, and Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, chairmen of the Leg-

islature's two budget-writing committees, wrote to the agency.

"We've got to do something or our members are going to be operating out of their kitchens," Ratliff said.

Advocates for access oppose such exemptions. They said that if the Legislature approves waivers for itself, they plan to force district offices to become accessible under the federal law.

"I think it's pretty amazing that lawmakers seem to think they ought to be above the law," Jim Harrington, legal director of the Texas Civil Rights Project, told the newspaper. "If they can pass a law, they ought to comply with the law."

Belinda Carlton, executive director of the Coalition for Texans with Disabilities, said her group "just doesn't have any sympathy here."

Groups Call for Electronic Filing
State law requires candidates for public office to file campaign finance reports with the Texas Ethics Commission, but the reports need only be furnished on paper.

Last week, two government watchdog groups called on candidates to make it easier for Texans wanting to find out who is giving money to political campaigns, simply by filing campaign finance reports electronically.

Craig McDonald of Texans for Public Justice and Tom Smith of Public Citizen asked candidates to voluntarily file electronically so information seekers can find what they're looking for via the Internet on the Ethics Commission web site, www.ethics.state.tx.us/.

Youth-Crime Entity Is Proposed

Tony Fabelo, executive director of the Texas Criminal Justice Policy Council, last week recommended the creation of a single entity to coordinate the efforts of 18 state agencies operating programs aimed at curbing youth crime.

A "Prevention Services Division" under the Department of Protective and Regulatory Services could serve as a one-stop shopping location, helping families find the right place to seek assistance, Fabelo said.

Presently, there are nearly 70 programs addressing at-risk youth, administered by the various state agencies.

Laser Hair Removal Scrutinized
The Texas Department of Health last week said it is investigating reports of unauthorized use of lasers for hair removal by spas, salons and fitness clubs.

Two reports were from people claiming injuries as a result of laser treatments.

State regulations require that hair removal lasers be operated only under the supervision of licensed practitioners with medical training.

Injury to patients may result from unauthorized use of these devices for cosmetic purposes.

Denied Claims to Be Reviewed
State insurance regulators said last week they will review homeowner claims for cracked foundations that have been denied by insurers since 1993.

Texas Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer ordered property insurers to report denied claims for foundation damage from mid-1993 to mid-1997.

Foundation cracks often are caused by plumbing leaks.

A Texas Department of Insurance study shows that water damage has caused up to 20 percent of all homeowners' losses.

Lack of Qualified Teachers Noted
Thirty-nine percent of the nearly quarter-million high school students who took the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills exit exam this year failed the algebra portion.

Texas Education Commissioner Mike Moses attributed the high rate of failure to the fact that so many students have uncertified math teachers.

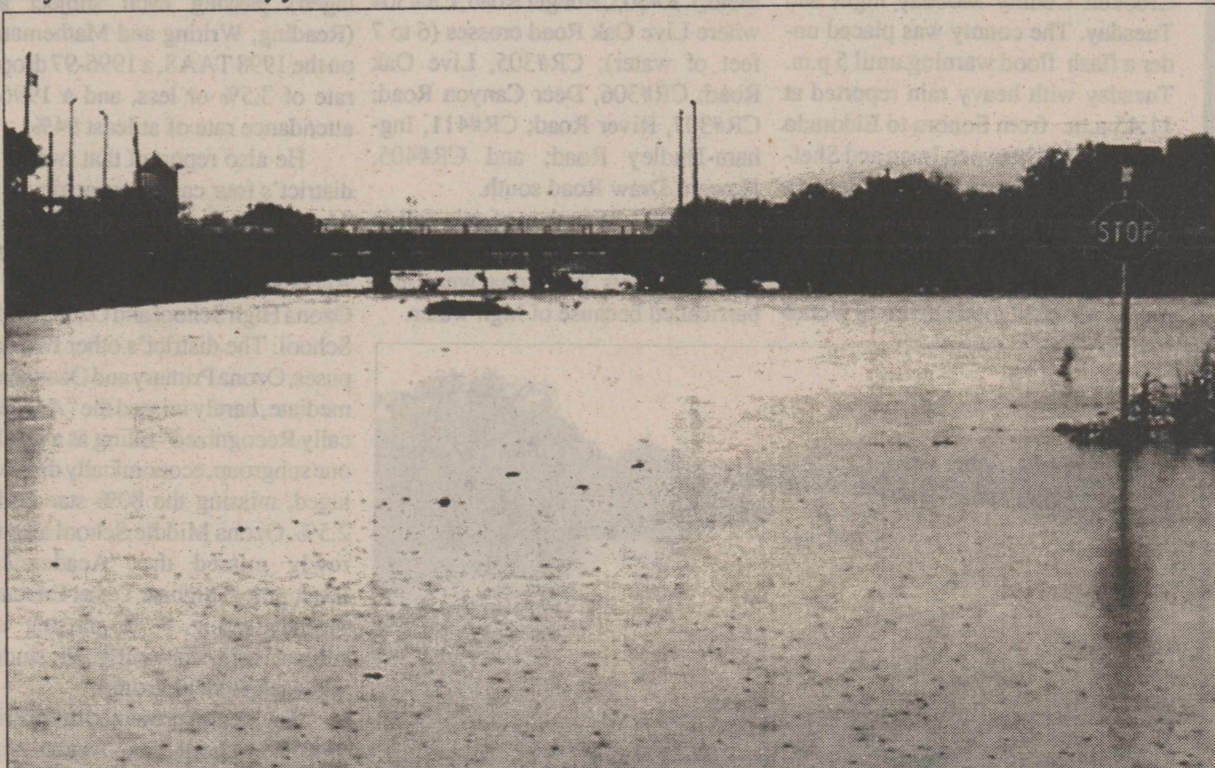

2 c. squash
1 T grated onion
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 c. sour cream
1 carrot, grated
Salt to taste
Butter or margarine

Banana Pudding Supreme

1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
1 - 8 oz. non-dairy whipped topping
1 - 14 oz. can sweetened condensed milk
4 bananas, sliced
2 c. milk
1 - 12 oz. box vanilla wafers
1 - 6 oz. pkg. instant vanilla pudding mix
Cream the cheese until smooth. Stir in sweetened condensed milk and pudding mix. Fold in 1/2 of the whipped topping. Layer pudding, cookies and bananas in dish. Top with remaining topping. Chill.

Fried Pie Crust

4 c. flour
1 T. salt
1 c. Crisco
1 c. buttermilk
Mix all ingredients. Pinch off enough to make each pie. Will keep in refrigerator.

Easy Sweet Pickles

1 gal. dill pickles, drained
1 - 4 or 5 lb. bag of sugar
Slice pickles and pour sugar over them in large bowl or pan. Let sit at least 8 hours or overnight. Will make

its own juice. Heat juice and pickles and place in jars and seal. I put lids on and turn jar upside down for about 15 min. and then set right side up to seal.

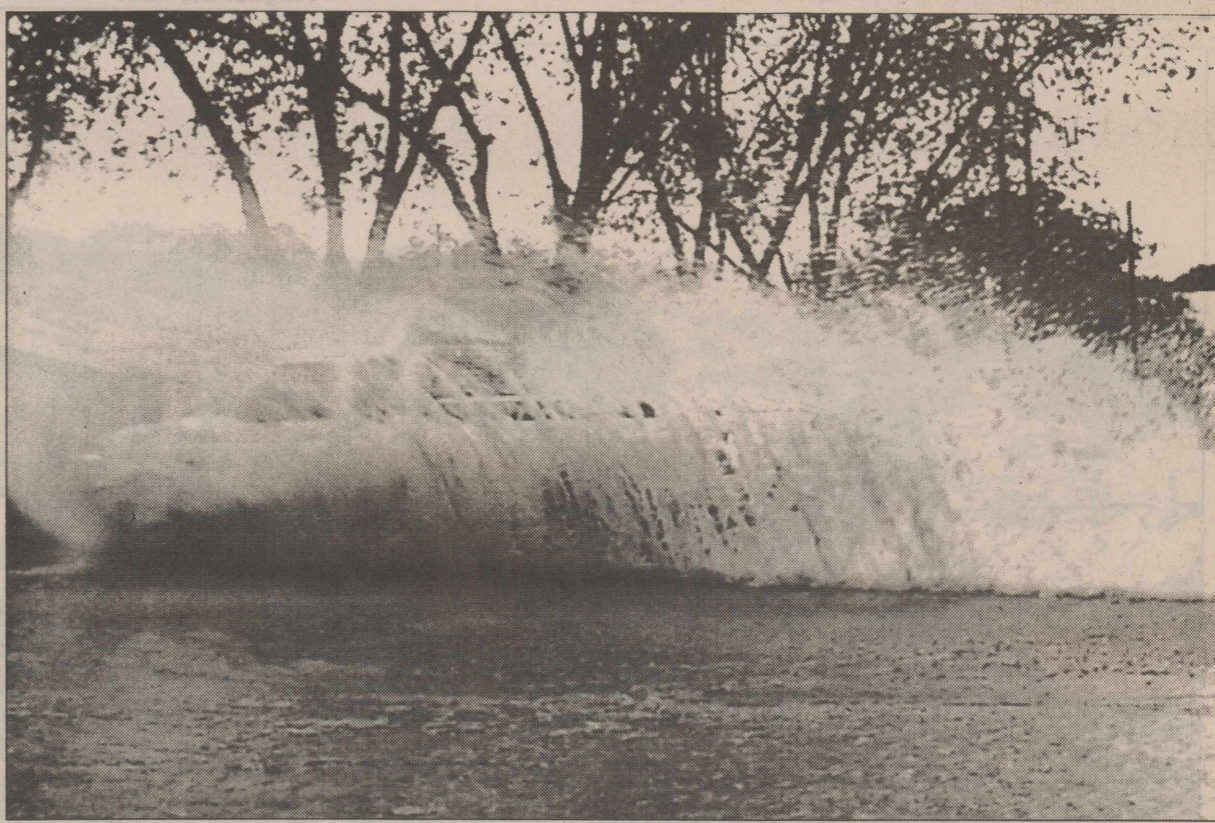

Wool, mohair help Florida firefighters

In July, Linda Rieck of Menard was visiting her parents in Florida when she saw a firefighter on TV say if anyone wanted to send them anything, to send wool socks because they were the only ones that would keep their feet dry. Her husband, wool and mohair producer Bob Rieck, contacted the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association to see if there was a way to get some of the great wool and mohair blend socks which are made and sold in Texas to the firefighters.

TSGRA, in conjunction with the Mohair Council of America, contacted Dishman International of Uvalde, Sonora Mohair of Sonora and Producers Marketing Co-Op of San Angelo and had 244 pair of boot socks in the office the next day. The firms sold the socks at their cost, and the two organizations picked up the tab.

Cicero Heartsfield and Cindy Wolf coordinated the effort on the Florida end, and on Monday, July 13, Linda went to the Flagler County, FL, firefighters' camp at the Bunnell Fairgrounds to present the socks from the grateful citizens of Texas. "There but for the grace of God goes Texas," said Tim Turner, TSGRA president. "As hot and dry as it is in Texas, we could have been burning instead of Florida, and this is our small way of thanking the men and women who have put their lives on the line in Florida."

Linda Rieck said, "These people were so tired and so hungry that they couldn't really relate to what I was saying until I told them if it had not been for their efforts my brother's family would not have had a home to come home to. Then they began to cheer and whoop and holler. They would have been delighted to have someone wash their own socks, and when they saw that people from Texas had sent them the very best socks they had to offer, they couldn't believe it."

When the Florida fire situation was declared a national emergency, firefighters from 44 states, as well as Russia, Puerto Rico and Canada, came to Florida to help.

"These tired, tired men and women kept thanking me, and I told them this was the Texas wool and mohair industry's way of thanking them," she said. "I was just sorry that we didn't have enough for everyone of the 1,600 firefighters on the line."

Zane Willard, executive director of the Mohair Council of America, said, "This was a 'Hands Across America' effort. We could have involved our politicians and other dignitaries, but the Texas wool and mohair industry wanted to show their personal thanks to these people who have worked so hard under such terrible conditions. It could have been Texas just as easy as Florida, and everybody knows it never rains in Texas."

and the district's 1998-99 School Year Improvement Plan for trustee consideration. Concerning the district's 1997-98 School Year Annual Report, Taylor told the members: "The Crockett County Consolidated Common School District is making progress on the road to educational excellence and equity. With enthusiasm and shared determination we, as a district, are seeing significant signs of success. Step by step we are building momentum, and the positive growth in student performance over the past four years has given us the energy and confidence to tackle the next larger challenge. That challenge is to continue upward improvement on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) and in all areas of the Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS).

"At this juncture, we have completed the fifth year of our efforts with significant gains on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) tests in grades three through eight and the tenth grade, the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), the Iowa Test of Basic Skills (ITBS) in grades kindergarten through the second grade, and within all indicators of the AEIS," Taylor said.

The 1997-98 School Year Annual Report contains priorities of the school district through the year 2000, district results on the ITBS, TAAS and the SAT, graduation/dropout rates and student attendance rates.

The district's 1998-99 School Year Improvement Plan was also presented by Supt. Taylor. The plan lists five district goals for the the 1998-99 school year, and these include: #1 - Improve student performance; #2 - Facilitate process for meeting facility needs in the district; #3 - Develop a comprehensive technology plan in such a way as to positively impact curriculum; #4 - Continue to focus on academic excellence, equity and professional growth; and, #5 - Continue to maintain fiscal responsibility. Both the 1997-98 School Year Annual report and the 1998-99 School Year Improvement Plan were approved by the board.

The board also approved 1998-99 school year partnership agreements with Junction, Paint Rock and Rockelle Independent School Districts to

purchase attendance credits from these three school districts. Agreements with the three will result in a gain of approximately \$8,000.00 to the district vs. sending the money to the state for recapture.

During the meeting the trustees also approved the Texas Teacher Professional Development and Appraisal System 1998-99 school year appraisers (Donny Wiley, Charles Floyd, Manley Holmes, Marilyn Luce, Ted Cotton and Larry Taylor), appraisal period, the method of appraisal, and the one appraisal as required by Senate Bill 1. They also approved a bid from the Texas Association of School Boards for employee health insurance for the 1998-99 school year, the resignation of Priscilla Cook (fourth grade teacher at Ozona Intermediate), and the employment of Sue Ellen Crawford (second grade), Becky Carter (fifth grade), Darlene Edmiston (fourth grade), and Dale Mayfield (alternative education program).

The trustees also approved the repeal of the local school board policy manual, and they adopted local policies as prepared by the Texas Association of School Board's Policy Service.

The action results in a board policy manual that will contain fewer pages as well as local policies which are more applicable to school district operations.

The meeting was adjourned following an affirmative vote to approve Sept. 15, 1998, at 7:00 p.m. as the date and time for the board's regular September meeting. Prior to adjourning,

the board also approved a special board meeting to be held at 7:00 a.m. on Wednesday, Aug. 26, 1998, in the Ozona High School Homemaking Building to discuss and approved a proposed interest and sinking fund tax rate for the 1998-99 school year and to approve taking bids for the purchase of a large diesel bus for school activities.

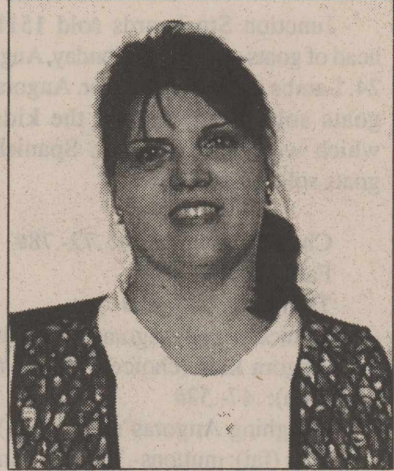
MICHELEE McGEATH

Longoria earned a bachelor of arts degree with a major in Spanish and a minor in English. She teaches private voice lessons in Ozona and elsewhere.

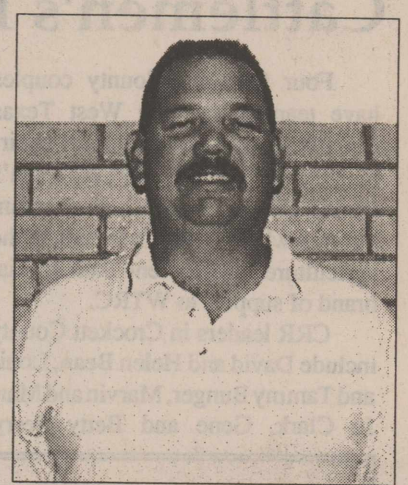
Rostyne earned a bachelor of science degree in psychology with a minor in kinesiology and English. She is employed at Crockett Abstract Company.

*Donating livestock - cattle, sheep, goats or horses - to be sold at one of Rehab's six special auctions during September and October.

*Sending a cash donation to Rehab if this is a bad time of year for you to cut out livestock for an auction.

*Attending one of the special sales and joining the bidding on livestock or novelty items.

*Notifying a CRR chairman right now of an intent to have your auction house cut a check to Rehab for the

proceeds of one or more animals to be sold later in the year.

Getting this year's Round-Up for Rehab off to a great start is the "up front" commitment by Federal Land Bank Association and Texas Production Credit and Rolling Plains Production Credit Associations to put \$10,000 into the program as sponsors for the second year in a row. Also making a corporate commitment again this year is Wrangler, which is contributing \$5,000 to the effort.

Acknowledging these gifts, WTRC President Jim Pethis expressed his hope that everyone in the livestock industry will join Rehab in thanking these businesses and will help build upon the momentum by adding their own support to Cattlemen's Round-Up.

Weekly Drilling and Completion Report

The No. 12 McDonald "A" has been brought on line about five and three-fourths miles south of Ozona in Crockett County's Northeast Ozona Field.

The 8,600-ft. well flowed 360,000-CFD on a 1-in. choke and was rated at 426,000-CFD on absolute open flow. Bottomed at 8,600 feet, it will produce from 5,978 to 8,295 feet into the hole in the Canyon Sand Formation. Pioneer Natural Resources Co. is the operator.

The same operator has posted first production data for the No. 3811 Millsbaugh 26 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's Ozona Field.

It flowed at the rate of 312,000-CFD on a 1.5-in. choke and earned a 370,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow. The well probed to 7,400 feet total depth and will produce from a Canyon Sand Formation interval, 6,232 to 6,876 feet into the wellbore.

Harrison Interests recently completed the No. 25 Joe Tom Davidson, Jr. "E" eight miles south of Ozona in Crockett County's Davidson Ranch Field.

Harrison bottomed the well at 9,300 feet. It was rated at 620,000 CF gas per day on open flow and showed ability to yield 247,000 CF gas daily on a 1.25-in. choke. Production will be from 8,033 to 8,093 feet into the hole.

First production figures have been filed for the No. 8 Davidson "A" about seven miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's Davidson Ranch Field. Union Pacific Resources Corp. of Fort Worth is the operator.

Rated at 895,000-CFD on absolute open flow, the well flowed 452,000-CFD on an 0.875-in. choke. It was taken to an 8,338-ft. bottom and will produce from 7,899 to 8,288 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 6 E. G. Baggett "28" was recently completed 11 miles southeast of Ozona in Crockett County's Hunt-Baggett Field.

Sonat Exploration Co., the operator, bottomed the well at 9,550 feet. It flowed 730,000-CFD on a 1.375-in. choke and was rated at 790,000-CFD on absolute open flow. The 9,550-ft. well will produce from 9,315 to 9,354 feet into the hole.

Molco Gas Co. has brought on line the No. 409 V. I. Pierce 24 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's Ozona Field.

The well produced at the rate of 122,000-CFD on a 0.75-in. choke and earned a 143,000-CFD evaluation on open flow. Bottomed at 6,600 feet, it will produce from an interval ranging from 5,931 to 6,345 feet into the wellbore.
