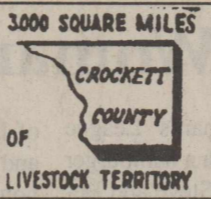

County 1999 budget adopted

County commissioners adopted the 1999 budget Sept. 30 at a budget hearing. Tax rate for the \$7,418,759.00 budget will be set at the regular meeting of commissioners on Oct. 12.

In the called meeting which followed the budget hearing, commissioners discussed possible changes in

the employee contribution rate to the Texas County and District Retirement System. The court members voted to leave the plan as is.

No action was taken on an agenda item regarding final payment to Sunwest Construction for the courthouse annex. Judge Jeffrey Sutton said he

would have people from Sunwest and the air conditioning company at the next regular court meeting.

Commissioners voted to support the position of workman's comp that Belia Garza was not at employee at the time she injured her foot last summer. Mrs. Garza was taking a class to be-

come certified as a lifeguard when she broke her foot.

At a called meeting on Sept. 17, commissioners voted to execute a resolution authorizing application for a Texas Community Development Program grant for sewer improvements.

Fire Prevention Week underway at local schools



Members of Ozona Volunteer Fire Department are busy bringing fire prevention facts to schools in the community as party of Fire Prevention Week. Theme for the Oct. 4-10 observance in 1998 is *Fire Drills - The Great Escape with the Family Circus*.

Fire Prevention Week commemorates the Great Chicago Fire of Oct. 9, 1871, which claimed more than 250 lives and destroyed 17,430 structures. In 1911, on the 40th anniversary of the Chicago Fire (and the year the infamous Triangle Shirtwaist Company fire claimed 145 lives in New York City), the Fire Marshals Association of North America proclaimed the nation's first Fire Prevention Day to promote public awareness of fire safety.

Since 1925, the week containing the Oct. 9 Chicago Fire anniversary has been the focus of an annual fire safety awareness campaign sponsored by National Fire Protection Association.

This year's theme focuses on developing and practicing home escape plans. While eight out of 10 fatal fires happen at home, most households are unprepared for a fire emergency.

The Great Escape aspect of this year's fire prevention week is NFPA's

first-ever effort to develop a unified North American fire drill, where families throughout the U. S. and Canada will participate in simultaneously exiting their homes upon hearing their local fire station sound its siren or bells. "The Great Escape" is planned to take place on Wednesday, Oct. 7, at 6 p.m.

Volunteer firemen in communities across America work throughout the year to keep fire safety awareness foremost in the minds of citizens. Their unselfish devotion to their jobs as firemen often goes unrecognized; therefore, National Fire Prevention Week is an opportune time to stop and thank these individuals for what they do.

School trustees approve tax rate

In a special meeting that was held on Thursday, Sept. 24, members of the Ozona School Board approved recommending to the Crockett County Commissioners Court a 1998-99 school year tax rate of \$1.30 per \$100.00 of assessed value for the maintenance and operation fund and a 1998-99 school year tax rate of \$0.089 per \$100.00 of assessed value for the interest and sinking fund.

The \$1.30 maintenance and operation fund tax rate is the same as last year, and the \$0.089 interest and sinking fund tax rate is the result of local voter approval on August 22 of renovations to Ozona Middle School and Davidson Gymnasium facilities.

During the meeting the trustees approved the purchase of a 1982 MC9 coach-type activity bus from International Bus and Coach in Fort Gibson, OK, or one of two coaches (1981 MC9 and 1982 MC9) bid by A-Z Bus Sales Incorporated in Colton, CA. International's bid for the 1982 MC9 coach-

type activity bus was \$57,900.00 followed by A-Z Bus Sales' two bids: \$55,000.00 for a 1981 MC9 and \$58,000.00 for a 1982 MC9.

Transportation supervisor Pete Maldonado and Ray Don Myers left Ozona on Monday, Sept. 28, for an inspection of the coach-type activity bus from International. The bus met with their approval and was driven back to Ozona.

The members went into executive session to discuss personnel items, and following the executive session, they voted to approve the reassignment by Supt. Larry Taylor of Walter Hargrove from head football coach/athletic director/teacher to teacher in the district for the remainder of the 1998-99 school year. They also approved the recommendation of Supt. Taylor that Ronnie Casey be approved as interim head boys' football coach, Donny Wiley be approved as interim athletic director, and that each of these two individuals be awarded a \$2,000.00 1998-99 school year stipend for these responsibilities.

Victor De La Garza seeks office of J.P.

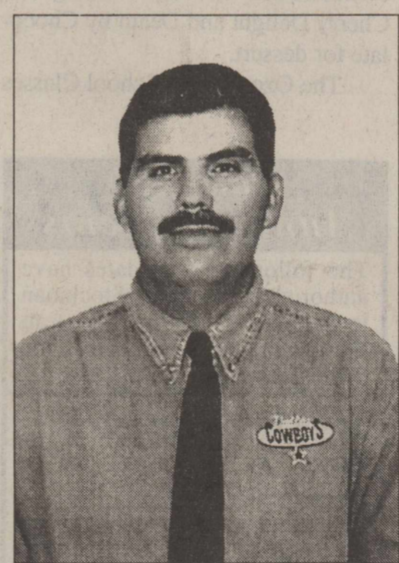
I, Victor De La Garza, would like to formally announce my candidacy for Justice of the Peace for the November General Election.

Rep. Bob Turner announces candidacy

State Representative Robert Turner has authorized The Ozona Stockman to announce his candidacy for re-election.

Bob Turner is a fourth generation Texan from the City of Voss. A former small-business and military man, he now is a farmer/rancher and executive director of the Coleman Development Corporation.

Prior to working in rural economic development and serving in the Legislature, Bob owned and ran a well-known retail store for 20 years (Bob Turner's Western Ware), and served with distinction on the U. S. Army reserve for 35 years.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK OCTOBER 4-10, 1998

WHEREAS, Eight out of 10 fatal fires happen at homes, yet most households are unprepared for a fire emergency. While more than half of the respondents to NFPA's 1997 Home Escape survey said they had developed a home escape plan, only 16 percent had actually practiced it. But practice is essential; there's no time to lose in a real fire emergency; and

WHEREAS, The number one cause of fires in the home is cooking equipment - an average of 99,300 fires resulting in an average of 290 deaths, 4,949 injuries, and \$400 million in property damage per year; and

WHEREAS, More than half of all fatal home fires happen at night while people in an average of 820 deaths per year; and

WHEREAS, Every family member must be prepared for a fire emergency. Each family must make a step-by-step plan for escaping a fire. Each household must make a floor plan of their home and discuss escape routes. A meeting place must be agreed upon where everyone will gather after escaping a fire. A fire escape drill should be practiced at least twice a year. Every family member must remember that a fire drill is not a race. Get out quickly but carefully; and

WHEREAS, Many lives can be saved if people react quickly in a fire emergency. Once a fire starts, there is no time to develop a plan. The 1998 theme for National Fire Prevention Week in "FIRE DRILLS: THE GREAT ESCAPE!"

WHEREAS, The Ozona Volunteer Fire Department is dedicated to the safety of life and property from the devastating effects of fire; and

WHEREAS, Those members of the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department are joined by other concerned citizens of this county as well as businesses, school, service clubs and organizations in their fire safety concerns.

I Jeffrey Sutton, Crockett County Judge, do hereby proclaim the week of October 4-10, 1998, as Fire Prevention Week. This week commemorates the great Chicago fire of 1871, which killed 300 persons, left 100,000 homeless and destroyed more than 17,000 buildings. I call upon the people of this community to participate in fire prevention activities at home, work and school and to heed the message: "FIRE DRILLS: THE GREAT ESCAPE!" As the 1998 Fire Prevention Week Theme suggests.

Michael Bedford deployed

Navy Airman Michael J. Bedford, son of Lynn M. Dominguez of Ozona, is currently halfway through a six-month deployment to the Western Pacific Ocean, Indian Ocean and Arabian Gulf aboard the aircraft carrier USS Abraham Lincoln.

Bedford is one of more than 5,000 Sailors and Marines aboard the ship, which departed its home port of Everett, WA, to lead the USS Abraham Lincoln Battle Group. The battle group is comprised of 10 tactical air squadrons, five surface combatants and two submarines.

During the deployment, Bedford and crew members have had the opportunity to visit Hong Kong, Singapore and the United Arab Emirates.

While in Hong Kong, Sailors and Marines from Bedford's shop partici-

pated in Project Handclasp providing humanitarian aid to a disaster relief organization, a school for the mentally handicapped, and an international Christian school. In addition to providing food, hygienic items, toys, books and paper to the recipients, members of Bedford's ship cleaned, repaired and painted buildings.

Aircraft carriers like USS Abraham Lincoln are forward deployed around the world to maintain a U. S. presence and provide rapid response in times of crisis. They serve as a highly visible deterrent to would-be aggressors and, if deterrence fails, offer the most versatile and powerful weapons available.

The 1995 graduate of Yucaipa High School of Yucaipa, CA, joined the Navy in April 1996.

Assistant Secretary Ervin promoting voter turnout

Assistant Secretary of State Clark Kent Ervin will visit public schools Tuesday, Oct. 6, to discuss with students the importance of voting. The visits are designed to prompt students to encourage their parents to vote in the Nov. 3 general election.

Tuesday's event is part of a two-month-long statewide tour in which Assistant Secretary of State Clark Kent Ervin will travel to Texas schools to talk with students about the significance of voting.

The students of the Eldorado and Ozona schools systems are among the thousands participating in mock elections this season sponsored by the agency's Project V.O.T.E. (Voters of Tomorrow Through Education).

Texas students are also among those featured in a new TV public service announcement, "Vote! It's the Texas Thing To Do!" that will be distributed for broadcast to network and cable stations throughout the state.

Ervin will be at Ozona High School from 2:30 to 3 p.m.

Mavis Dunlap--Cook-of-the-Week

"I think cooks go through different stages," said Cook of the Week Mavis Dunlap.

"When I was 14-years-old, my Mother let me have the kitchen once a week. It was usually Saturdays. It was my job to plan the menu, shop for the groceries and prepare the evening meal. The meal had to have a meat dish, vegetable, salad and dessert. My Mother still makes three meals a day for her husband and herself. They are retired from Texas & Pacific Railroad and live near Lake Cypress in Mt. Vernon.

"Later, with young children at home and teenagers constantly on the go, the challenge was to have plenty of food ready at all times. Then, cookies, snacks, pot roasts and hams were either in the refrigerator or slow-cooker or oven often. I cooked a lot of bread, rolls and combread and beans and meatloaf.

"Now, I should watch calories, fat grams, and because I'm at work most of the time and gone to the ranch on weekends, my cooking has changed. I use a slow cooker, and it cooks at night. A microwave warms my noon meal. The three children and five grandchildren live across Texas and come home only once a year.

"Don stays at the ranch, and when he comes for supper, we always have chicken fried steak. I think every cook should have a heavy cast iron skillet. In fact, when each of my three children got married, I gave them one. This is the basic cooking tool!

For Chicken Fried Steak
3/4" thick tendered beef or 3/4" thick tendered deermeat, pork chops, chicken pieces.

Dip the meat in buttermilk. Then salt and pepper it. Then dip in flour, coating the meat real well.

Put about 1/2" of cooking oil in iron skillet and get it very hot before placing flour-coated meat into it. Brown each side of the meat, then put on paper towels when cooked. Set aside.

Using the same iron skillet with the remaining oil and drippings, put 1/2 cup flour, salt and pepper and cook until it's brown. Then add 2 cups milk and 2 cups water until it thickens as much as you like, stirring a lot. Pour over the cooked meat.

Mavis' Oatmeal Pie (Mock Pecan Pie)

In large bowl, mix in order given:
3 eggs
1 c. sugar
Dash salt
1 stick melted margarine
1 c. syrup
1 c. raw oats
1 tsp. vanilla
Pour into unbaked pie crust. Bake at 375 degrees until filling leaves side of crust.

English Pea Salad

1 can (drained) English peas
2 c. cooked and drained macaroni
1 c. cubed, mild cheddar cheese
3/4 to 1/2 c. salad dressing
1/2 c. pickle relish
1 small jar drained pimientos

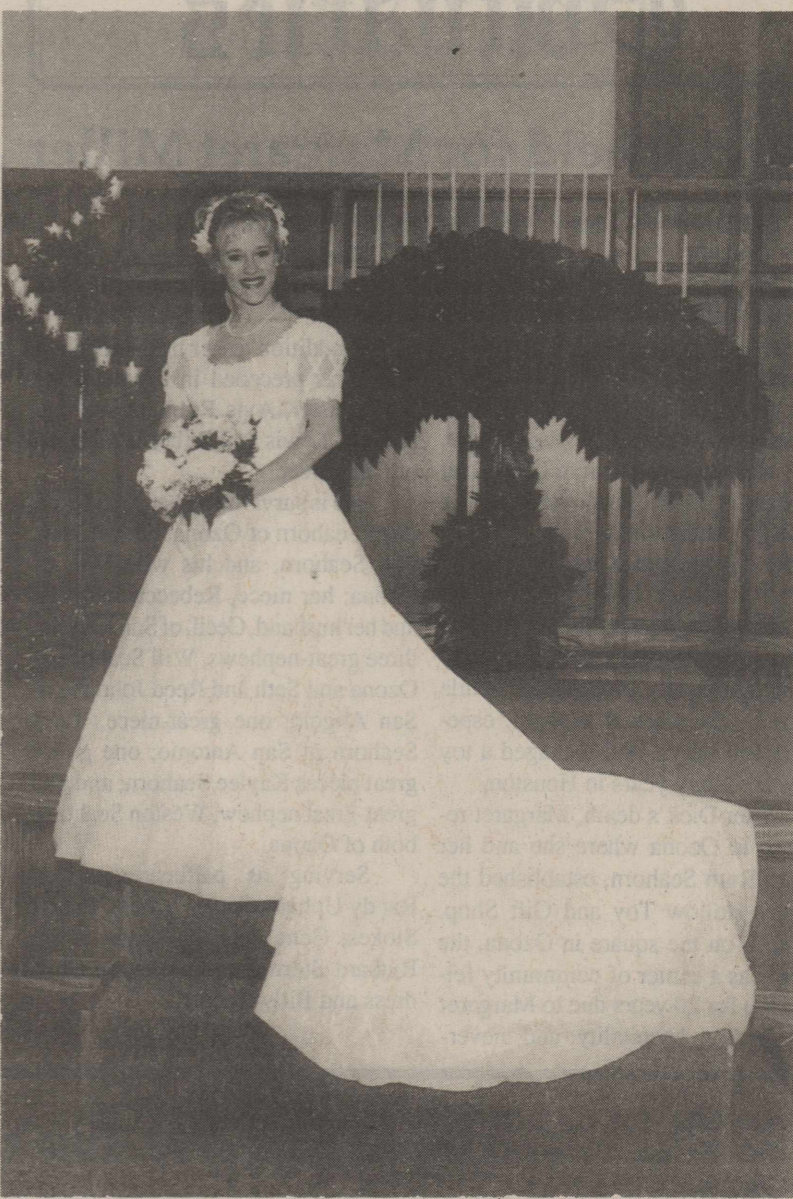

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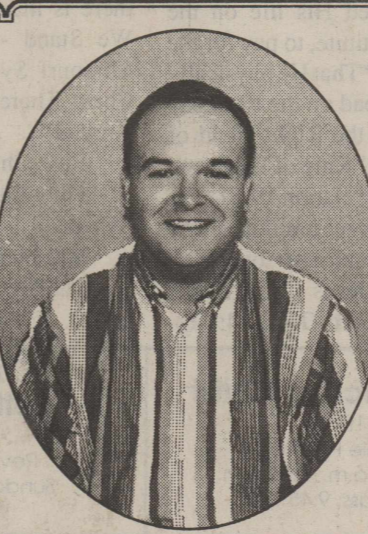

"In Case You've Wondered...."

If you've tuned in to CNN over the past three weeks, you've probably seen and heard the 'Message of Hope' ads presented by the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. The theme is: 'In Christ, There's Plenty of Hope to go Around!' How true!

But perhaps you've wondered about the Lutheran Church, its history and teachings. On Oct. 31, 1517, a Monk named Martin Luther nailed Ninety-Five Theses to the church door in Wittenburg, Germany - in an attempt to reform the church from its authority given to the Papal Office and its traditions, which were regarded as equal to and even above the word of God. The church demanded that he recant, which he refused - declaring: "Here I Stand" as he took his stand on the sure and certain Word of God. This was the beginning of the sixteenth Century Reformation, from which the Protestant Church arose. The central doctrine of Scripture on which the church stands or falls, Luther said, is: 'Justification By Grace Through Faith Alone' (cf Genesis 15:6, Romans 3:21-28, etc.).

The Lutheran Church has been in the news lately, especially concerning dialogue and agreement with the Roman Catholic Church and some Reformed Church bodies. However, this group of Lutherans is known as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America - and not ALL Lutherans are alike. The Missouri Synod was formed in 1847 at St. Louis, and today consists of over 6,000 congregations in the United States, with 2 1/2 million members, and with mission fields in

almost 60 countries. The LC-MS has the largest Protestant education system in our nation, from pre-K to grade school, high schools, colleges and seminaries.

And just what do we Believe, Teach and Confess? *That the Bible is God's inspired Word of Truth and Life, without error or defect, and applies to every aspect of life. *That all events (such as creation of the universe in six literal, 24-hour days), miracles, and information are true historical accounts. *That through our first parents in the Garden of Eden, who disobeyed the Creator and brought about the Fall of the whole creation, all of us have inherited a sinful nature that is opposed to the Lord God (cf Psalm 51:5). *That God's eternal Son, as promised in Genesis 3:15, has come in human flesh (being conceived by the Third Person of the Trinity, the Holy Spirit; and born of the Virgin Mary) in the person of Jesus of Nazareth. *That He is both true God and true man in one Person - Christ, the Messiah. *That as our Representative He lived the perfect life of obedience to God's will, as expressed in the Ten Commandments. *That Jesus Christ willingly sacrificed His life on the Cross as our Substitute, to pay for the sins of all people. *That He physically arose from the dead on the third day and now rules at the Right Hand of God the Father as "King of kings and Lord of lords" (Revelation 19:11-16). *That Salvation is received as a free gift from God through a personal faith relationship with Jesus Christ as the only Savior and Lord (John 14:1-6).

*That on the Last Day Christ will return to raise up all the dead, and take all true believers to Heaven with Him, but that all unbelievers will be eternally separated from Him in Hell. *That all human life (from conception to natural death) is sacred and precious, and therefore always to be protected. *That sex outside God's institution of marriage, and homosexuality is against His will. *That Christ has provided the benefits of His Life, Death and Resurrection to His Church through the Means of Grace (the Word of God and the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper) to offer forgiveness of sins and to strengthen faith in His disciples. *And that every Christian has a mission to proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ to others.

In a society that has, for the most part, tossed God's Word behind its back and is following the scientific, humanistic philosophy of evolution, there is little hope. We can easily see the Bitter Fruits of this mistake in the crime, violence and sexual perversion that surrounds us. And in church denominations that have tried to compromise the Truth of God's Word, there is little hope. Therefore, Here We Stand - the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod, declaring that 'In Christ, There Is Plenty Of Hope To Go Around!'

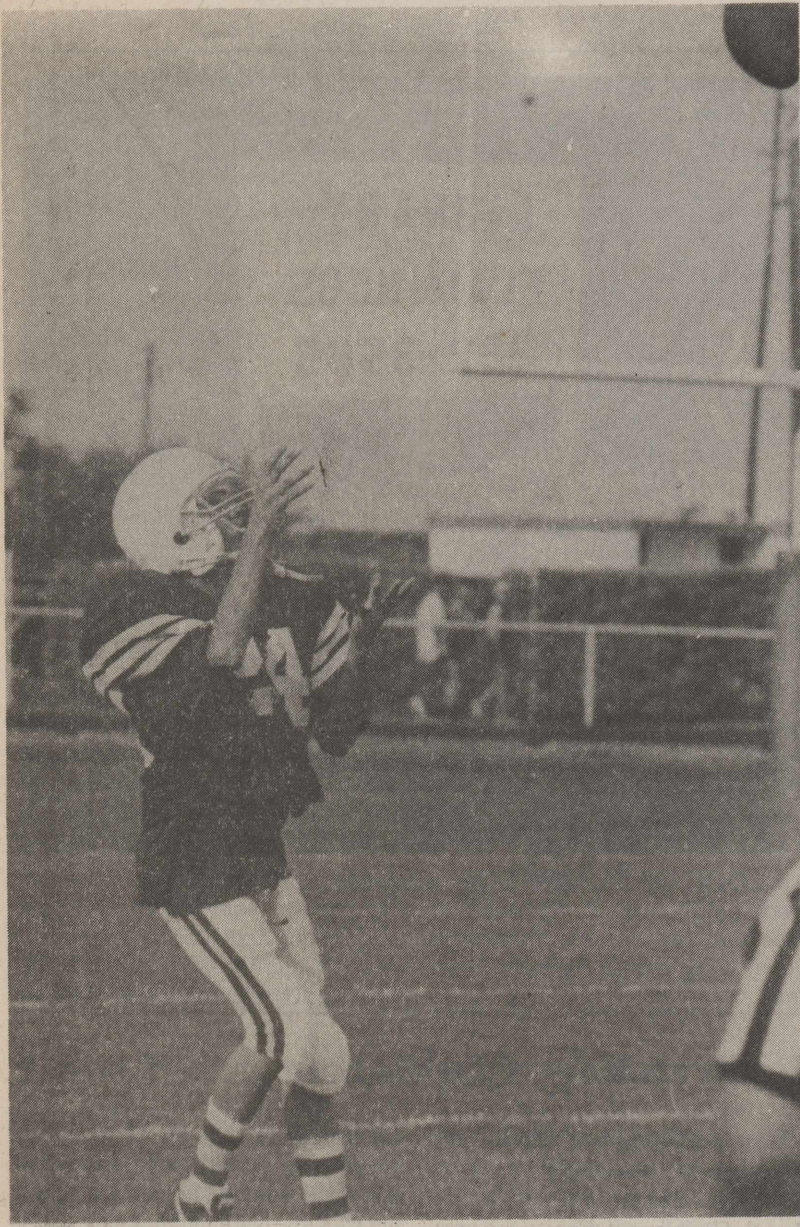
The Cubs impressive offensive attack witnessed no less than nine players scoring either a touchdown or two extra points. Early in the third

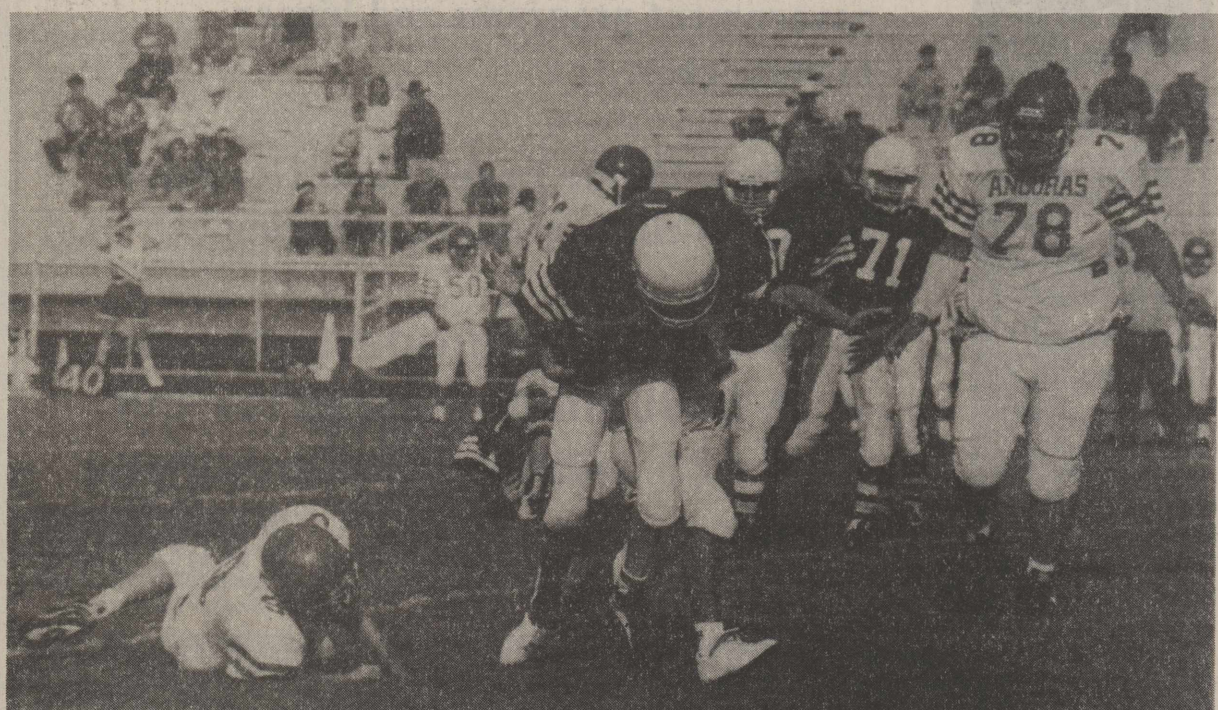
