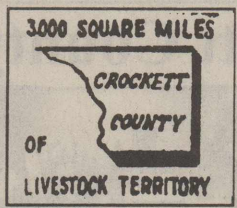

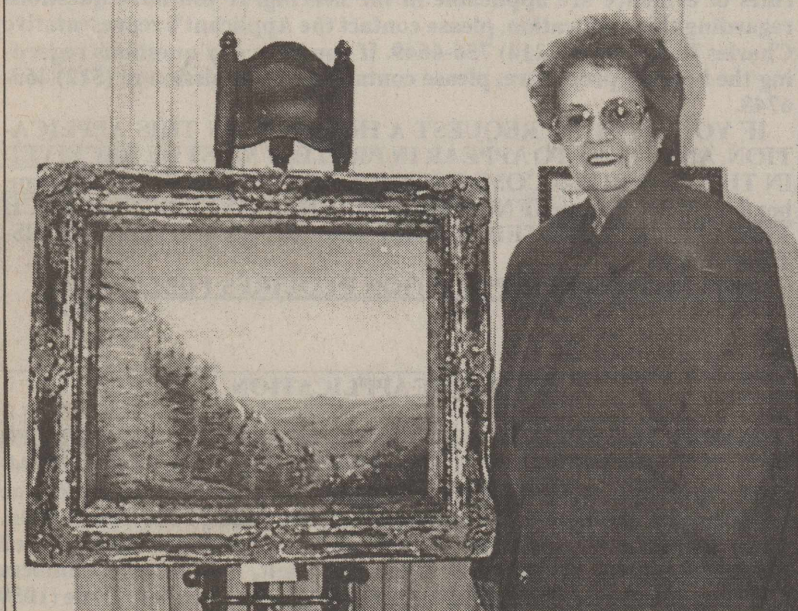
## Pridemore paintings displayed at library

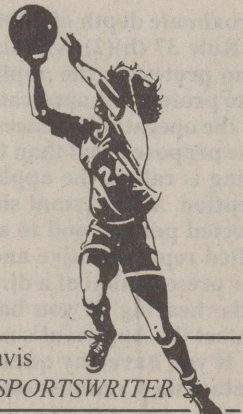

## Sanchez races to State for fourth year

Premier cross country runner Lori Sanchez is no stranger to the state cross country ranks. For three consecutive years she has competed in the class 2A meet, finishing a high of fourth place in 1997. This year she makes her final appearance after capturing first place in the regional competition in Lubbock last Saturday.

The Ozona High School Senior was running a close second in Lubbock, but she kept telling herself this was the last run at the regional level, and she wanted to be the top qualifier for the state meet. With a last minute surge, she passed her closest competition, taking first with a run of 12:26, less than two seconds in the lead. Sanchez goes to state with a strong chance to take top honors.

"She's in the top three," said Coach Pete Maldonado. "If she has a good day, it will be a good end to a successful four years."

Lori has already been recruited by some four year schools who are offering a full scholarship, Maldonado said. "Lori is also in the top percentile of her class scholastically," he commented.

Other Lady Lions who ran the two mile in Lubbock were: Valicia Hartman who finished 78th with a 14:07.91, Vanessa Hartman 14:41.84, Laramie McWilliams 15:44.07, Stacey Sutton 16:48.47, Rebeka Shaw 16:49.33 and Andrea Hiers 18:41.85.

The Ozona team finished 18th with a total time of 1:13:48.31 and an average of 14:45.66.

Jomie Tebbetts, Ozona's lone male competitor in the meet, finished

the three mile run in 68th place with a time of 19:07.64.

The best time in the boys' division was 16:44.02 turned in by Felipe

Reyna of Plains.

Lori will run in the state meet at Round Rock Old Settlers Park Saturday, Nov. 14, at 10:50 a.m.

## National flood insurance program considered

Commissioners will have a public hearing Nov. 19 at 6 p.m. to get input on participation in the national flood insurance program. The hearing will be in the commissioners' courtroom in the new annex.

If the county fathers vote to participate in the plan, anyone with mortgaged property within the flood plain must buy flood insurance. Those with un-mortgaged property could buy flood insurance if they wish. This could result in cheaper mortgages, but will also increase insurance costs.

Realtors and lenders are expected to be present at the meeting to state their views.

The severe weather alert radio system has been ordered, Judge Jeffrey Sutton told commissioners when they met Monday. Some sirens are ready to be installed.

If the electricity goes totally out, it will not be possible to power up the main siren with the 7.5 hp. generator, Fire Chief Bob Falkner said. If some

power remains on during a storm, some of the sirens can be used.

Sheriff Shane Fenton gave his monthly report and then talked to commissioners about the D.A.R.E. program. Since the resignation of Deputy Dan Griffith, there is no one here who is qualified to teach the program, no one in the department seems interested and it is too late to attend a training school this year, Fenton said.

He was given the go ahead to try to get a D.A.R.E. officer to come to Ozona through Concho Valley Council of Governments to finish out this year's program.

Eddie Moore, road and parks superintendent, said that county vehicles and vehicles belonging to county employees were misted with white paint recently when painting was being done at TxDOT.

Commissioners voted to purchase two welding machines and to purchase two used pickups to replace

old ones. They also approved sending the asphalt paving machine for repairs. Moore was authorized to look into a lease purchase program for a bulldozer.

Moore reported that construction of forms for the foundation of the Senior Citizen building should start soon. He is waiting on a blueprint.

Judge Sutton announced that the

Bake a chicken until almost done. Add a small head of cabbage cut into wedges, two sliced jalapeños, 1/2 chopped onion, 3 garlic buds (minced), 1 T ground comino, 1 T garlic salt and 1 tsp. Mrs. Dash. Cook until cabbage is done.

### Chicken and Zucchini

Bake a cut up chicken until almost done. Add the following ingredients and cook slowly until zucchini is done. 4 zucchini, sliced  
1/2 onion, chopped  
Garlic salt  
Ground comino  
Mrs. Dash  
1 can corn, drained  
1 8 oz. can tomato sauce  
1 tomato sauce can of water

### Hot Spaghetti

Season 1 1/2 lb. lean ground meat with garlic salt and cayenne pepper. Make into small meatballs and cook until done in a pan sprayed with Pam. Boil 1/2 pkg. of spaghetti in salted water. Drain and place in ice water for approximately 30 minutes. To make sauce for spaghetti and meat balls, brown 2 T flour in pan

where meatballs were cooked.

Add chopped onions, ground comino, 3 to 4 small cans of tomato sauce and an equal amount of water. Cook slow until sauce is very thick. Add spaghetti and meat balls.

### Cowboy Potato Salad The Seminole Way

Boil 4 med. potatoes, peel and cut, then add:  
2 boiled eggs, chopped  
1/2 onion, chopped  
8 slices dill pickle, chopped fine  
3 T mustard  
4 T (or more if needed) Miracle Whip

1 T sugar  
Salt to taste  
Sweet relish to taste  
You may use a little canned milk to moisten if desired.

### Mary's Easy Cheesecake

2 pkg. Philadelphia Cream Cheese (8 oz.)  
1/2 c. sugar  
1/2 tsp. vanilla  
2 eggs  
Mix and pour into graham cracker crust. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes. Cool for 3 hours in the pan.

### Seminole Pecan Pie

3/4 c. sugar  
1 c. Karo Syrup (dark or light)  
4 eggs, beaten  
1 tsp. flour or cornstarch  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 1/2 c. pecans  
Mix well, pour in pie shell. Bake for 25 to 40 minutes or until done.

Root rose cuttings in slit potatoes, then plant the potatoes. Planting parsley around the bushes increases the rose's fragrance. Use garlic and other alliums planted near roses to discourage aphids on the plants. Plant French or Mexican marigolds to discourage nematodes and whiteflies.

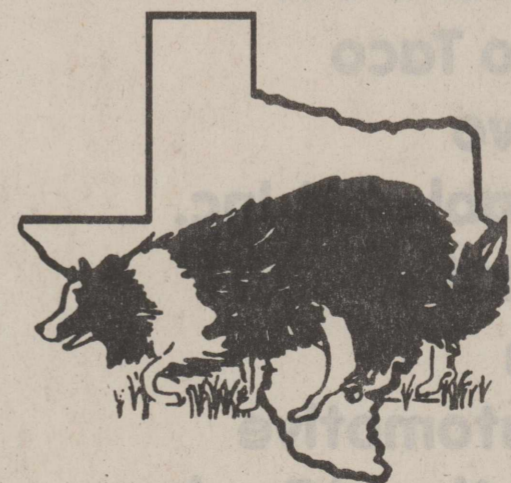

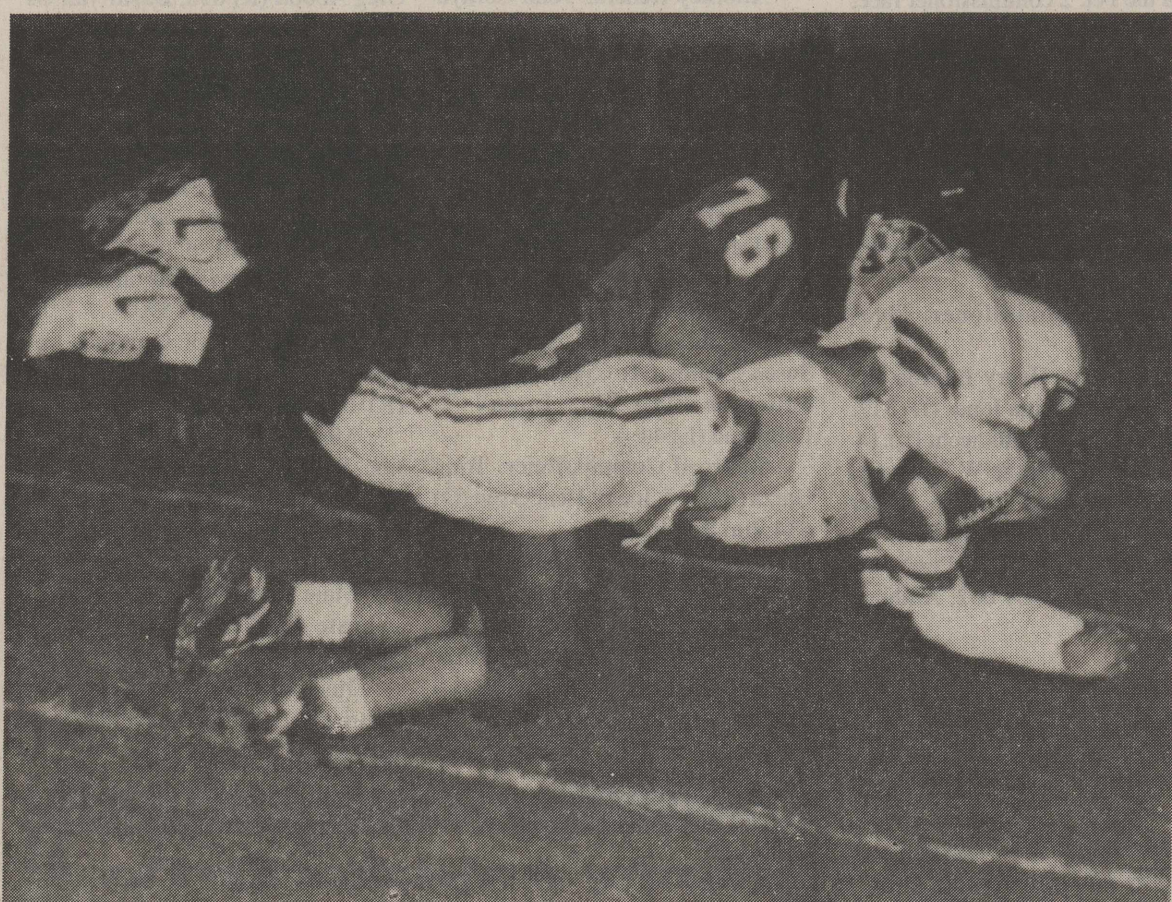

"There are good kids coming up, and I'm looking forward to possibly working with them."

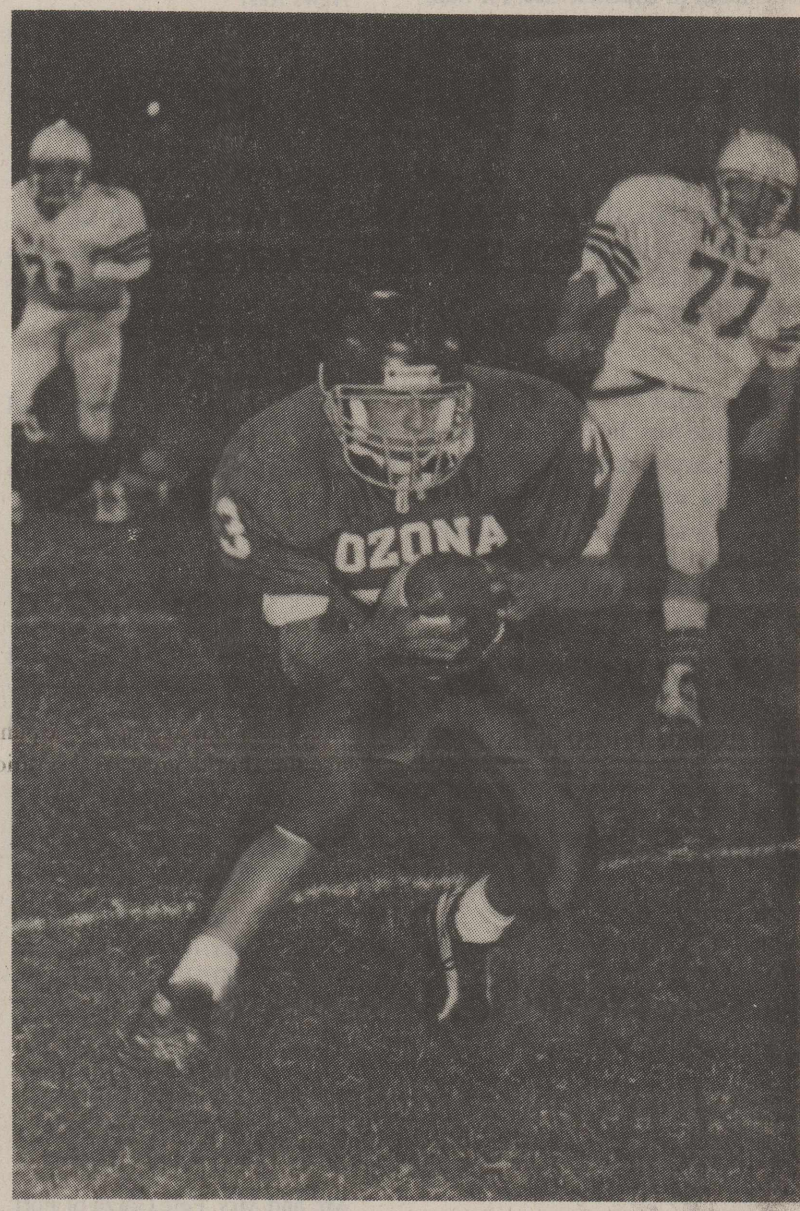

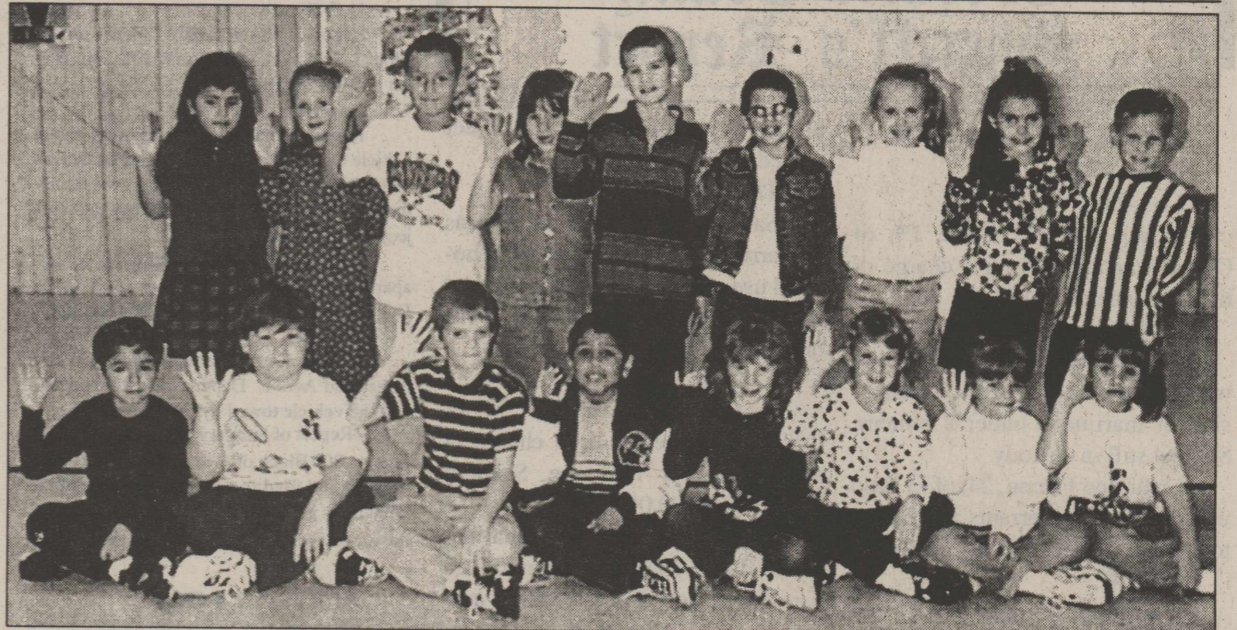

## Seventh Cubs fall to Hawks

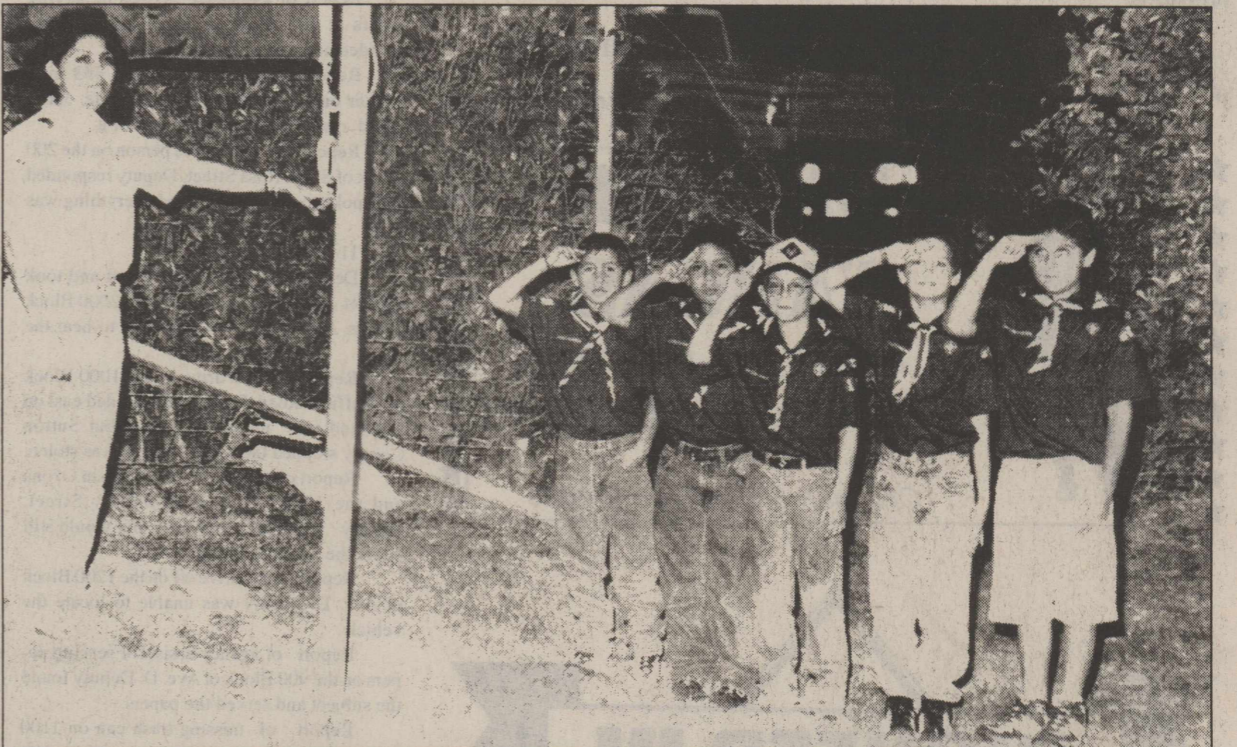

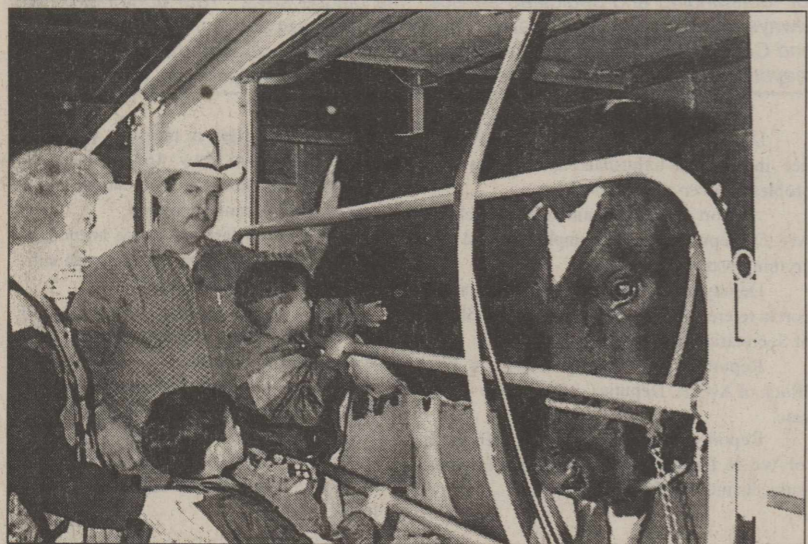

## Texas game warden field notes .....

In the course of duty, game wardens at times face harrowing situations such as confronting armed subjects who may have previous criminal histories. Heartbreaking scenarios are also part of the job - for example, searching for a young drowning victim. And there are times when game wardens are placed in harm's way, such as facing dangerous flooding situations head-on to evacuate stranded residents.

Fortunately, there are a few light moments and interesting stories which game wardens just love to share.

Before the opening of dove season, a Starr County warden heard some shots while on patrol one afternoon. Upon investigating the site, he came upon three men who claimed to have been rabbit hunting. When the warden asked the men about the dove feathers in their hair, they confessed to hunting dove and were issued citations.

In early September, a Taylor County warden received a call from a concerned citizen reporting road hunting. The caller described a vehicle as driving back and forth down the road with two guns sticking out of the window. When the warden arrived he found the vehicle on private property with a hoe and a rake sticking out of the window, and no evidence of road hunting.

On August 31, a warden in Wichita County cited a dove hunter for hunting out of season. The hunter had killed 10 doves and had no license. In arguing with the warden the hunter maintained, "But my watch says September first!"

An Upshur County warden attempted to pull over a DWI suspect

who had run several cars off the road. The suspect at first refused to pull over, then finally pulled into a gas station where officers had to physically remove him from the vehicle. The warden then had to control a crowd of angry motorists who had witnessed the events and wanted to whip the suspect for endangering other motorists. On top of it all, the suspect was wearing a MADD (Mothers Against Drunk

Drivers) t-shirt.

Two wardens testified in the trial of a Tyler County man charged with negligent operation of a motorboat. The man's defense was that he was a master electrician, and electricians do not operate motorboats in a negligent manner. The court disagreed, found him guilty, and assessed a fine of \$150.

windpower project is on go. He expects official notification of this on Nov. 18. The project should be completed in December of 1999.

Librarian Louise Ledoux reported the receipt of a \$10,000.00 grant from the Hillcrest Foundation. The library expansion project is estimated at \$291,000.

Mrs. Ledoux is seeking other grants to complete funding for the project.

She said Ozona Middle School has requested in writing to use the convention center for classrooms August through November of 1999 while the school construction is being completed. During that time, the school will pay all operation costs on the building.

Chamber motel occupancy tax

money, which is no longer needed for payoff of the convention center, is earmarked for new tables for the building, Mrs. Childress said.

Garland Young presented the report for the civic and youth center, and written reports were received from Helping Hands and the fire department.

County Auditor John Stokes said that the county is approximately \$600,000 better off than this time last year. He expects the year to end with \$1.3 million. This is slightly less than operating money for two months, but it is "the best it has been in a long, long time", Stokes said.

The care center health services board report given by Administrator Jim Roddie showed 707 patient visits at the clinic during October. Census at the care center during October averaged 46.7 residents with 44 on Nov. 9.

Roddie spoke of a respite care program which board members have approved at the care center. More information will be forthcoming on this next week.

Commissioners set the date of Nov. 23 for their annual employee appreciation luncheon.

An updated contract between the county and airport manager was discussed. The last contract was executed in the 1970's, and the insurance company is requesting a new one in connection with renewal of the liability policy. The county is to formulate a contract and have it examined by a lawyer.

Court members also voted to pay for flu shots for employees and their dependents and to execute a rescue aid and rescue agreement with Val Verde County Rural Volunteer Fire Department.

With 7,400 feet total depth, the No. 3315 Moody was rated at 246,000-CFD on open flow and flowed 221,000-CFD on a 0.75-in. choke. Production will be from 5,938 to 6,930 feet into the wellbore.

Bottomed at 7,400 feet, the No. 3314 Moody earned a 64,000-CFD rating on absolute open flow and flowed 59,000-CFD when tested on a 0.50-in. choke. It will produce from 6,264 to 7,210 feet into the hole.

Enron Oil & Gas has posted first production reports for the No. 1 M. K. Daniel "A" 45 miles southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's Simpson-Mann Field.

The developmental well flowed at the rate of 710,000-CFD on a 1.25-in. choke and was rated at 750,000-CFD on a 1.25-in. choke. It was bottomed at 5,550 feet with plugback to 5,291 and will produce from 4,915 to 5,243 feet into the hole.

First production figures have been posted for a couple of developmental wells located 45 miles south-southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's Simpson-Mann Field.

Enron Oil & Gas Company's Nos. 16 and 18 M. K. Daniel flowed at the rate of 460,000 and 265,000-CFD on absolute open flow, respectively. The No. 16 well showed ability to yield 435,000-CFD on a 1.25-in. choke while the No. 18 well flowed 255,000-CFD when tested on a 0.75-in. choke.

Operating out of Midland, Vinson Exploration Co. is preparing to make hole for the No. 6 University "24-29" 25 miles west of Ozona in Crockett County's Ingham Field. Location is a 320-acre lease in an unlisted survey. Authority has been granted for 1,700 feet of hole making.
