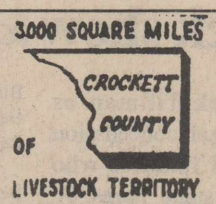

County junior livestock show a huge success

Ninety-three Crockett County youth exhibited their livestock projects at the 51st annual Crockett County Junior Livestock Show Jan. 7-9. A huge success is how the 1999 show has been labeled due to a smoothly run show and excellent awards program and premium sale.

"The large crowd, especially during the awards program and sale, were great," said Miles Dabovich, County Extension Agent. "We have not had attendance like that since I have been here, and I want to thank everyone who came. That's what made it great. It makes all the difference in the world. And even with hard economic times, the supporters were there to help the kids."

The show began Thursday night with the exhibiting of the rabbits. Winners in the rabbit show included: Champion Fancy Rabbit - Amanda Hignight, Reserve Champion Fancy Rabbit - Julia Henderson, Champion Commercial Rabbit - Frankie Skinner, Reserve Champion Commercial Rabbit - Amanda Hignight, Champion Intermediate Rabbit Showman - Hilary Huffman, Champion Junior Rabbit Showman - Kasey Gray, Champion First Year Rabbit Feeder - Julia Henderson, First Place Rabbit Production - Grant Stevens.

Thirty members participated in this year's rabbit competition.

In the market swine show, Ashlee Worley received grand champion swine with her heavy weight entry, while Megan Riddle received reserve champion honors with her light weight entry. Taylor Oglesby received champion swine showman, and Ashlee Worley was the reserve swine showman.

This year's meat goat show brought 97 entries in five classes. Judge Ross Stultz worked his way through each class and selected Jake Stewart's goat as the grand champion while Jenna Henderson received reserve champion. Showmanship winners included Dustin Shaffer as se-

nior showman, Quay Oglesby as junior showman and Peyton Fenton as intermediate showman. Jared Spence took the buckle for winning the first

division, Rachel Murr exhibited the champion crossbred lamb followed by Trey Hale with the reserve champion crossbred lamb. The first year

feeder award was won by Victoria Miller. Winner of the Regina Everett Memorial Buckle was Cody Hunnicutt. This buckle is given each

year to the 4-H member who placed highest at the major livestock shows the previous season.

Showmanship winners in the

lamb division included: Champion Senior Lamb Showman - Mark Childress, Champion Intermediate Lamb Showman - Clint Hale, Champion Junior Lamb Showman - Kristin Bunger.

In the 20 or 25-40 lamb showmanship contest, Miles Dabovich got cheated out of the belt buckle as his wife, Jodye, received it from long-time buddy Ross Stultz, who judged.

"Not really, Honey - you did a good job, no matter what Will M. and Terry C. said about you," commented Miles.

In the 40 and over division, Billy Reagor walked away with the belt buckle. Thanks to all the older showmen who participated. It has really been a lot of fun.

Courthouse annex violates Architectural Barriers Act

Crockett County's new courthouse annex was found to be in non-compliance with several provisions of the Architectural Barriers Act commissioners were told Monday. Eddie Moore, superintendent of the roads and parks departments, told the court the problems cited by an inspector of the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation could cost \$10,000.00 to \$15,000.00 to correct.

Public buildings or facilities costing over \$50,000.00 to construct

must be licensed and regulated by the state.

A letter and accompanying inspection report sent to Judge Jeffrey Sutton Dec. 1 states that non-complying items must be brought into compliance and written verification furnished to the TDLR Dallas Regional Office within 30 days. A notice of inability to comply within the 30 days is requested if modifications cannot be made that quickly. Otherwise, the matter will be referred to

the department's enforcement division and may result in a maximum \$1,000.00 administrative penalty per violation, per day, Moore said.

Corrections include building a ramp at every outside entrance. The major problem here will be the door in the tax office, which opens into an area where rainwater drains.

The front entry to the building has a handicapped accessible ramp, but this area was cited for having a handrail only on one side.

Both the commissioner's courtroom and J.P. courtroom were in violation due to the four inch level to reach the county judge's bench and a six inch change in level in order to reach the J. P.'s area and witness stand.

There is no mounted signage for the two accessible parking spaces, and neither space is additionally designated as van accessible. A van accessible space must be adjacent to an access aisle with a minimum width of 96" The existing aisles are 68" wide.

The one drinking fountain in the

building is 36" high to accommodate wheelchair users. Also required is a cooler with a 42" spout height to accommodate those who have difficulty bending or stooping.

Urinals must have the rim no higher than 17 inches above the floor. The one in the men's bathroom is 21 inches above the floor. Lavatories in both the men's and women's bathrooms have only 23 inches of clearance between the bottom of the lavatory apron and floor. These are required to have at least 29 inches of clearance and have a surface no higher than 34 inches above the floor.

Signage to the men's and women's bathrooms contains no grade 2 Braille. The signs that are there are mounted only on the doors, and it is required that this be on the wall next to the latch side of the door at a specified height.

Commissioners voted to have Moore and his crew begin making the modifications and at the same time directed County Attorney Bill Mason to contact the TDLR regarding additional time to fulfill the requirements.

Clean up, Ozona

County Attorney Bill Mason's campaign to rid Ozona of junked cars received support from county commissioners Monday. The court voted to designate three entities to assist in locating areas that need to be cleaned up. Crockett County Road Department, Crockett County Sheriff's Department and Crockett County Water Control & Improvement District #1 will be asked to notify Mason of locations needing attention. Individuals are also encouraged to contact the county attorney's office to report problem areas.

"I'm looking primarily at the safety of the children," said Mason. "The first thing we want to do is clean up junk autos which are a haven for

rats and snakes." All streets are considered public highways under the state's health and safety code, Mason said, and one of the first steps in clearing them and private property harboring junked vehicles is to send out letters putting owners on 30-day notice to correct the problem.

"You can't use your property to the detriment of your neighbors," Mason said when asked about removal of vehicles and junk on private property.

Structures which are deemed to be a health and safety hazard also will be looked at as part of the clean up of Ozona.

"We need to clean up, and it's going to take everyone to do it," Mason said.

Insurance worries trouble commissioners

Commissioners voted Monday to advertise for bids for health insurance in preparation for a possible pull out from West Texas Rural Counties Association. The association has requested an advance payment the equivalent of three months of insurance premiums (\$116,000.00 for Crockett County). If the payment of this cash call is not made, WTRCA has notified the county that its health insurance ceases Feb. 1, Judge Jeffrey Sutton said.

The county's insurance for liability, workman's comp and structures is also through WTRCA.

Mark White, the county's insurance agent of record, discussed the situation with commissioners.

Jim Roddie, care center administrator, was given the informal blessing of the court to accept residents from the state hospital as long as the care center does not have over 50 residents. The facility currently has 46 residents and can hold 54 comfortably, Roddie said. The center's license is for 56.

The possibility of accepting residents from the state hospital at Big Spring came when representatives of the MHMR met with the health services board. Admission will have to be approved by Roddie, Dr. Marcus Sims and Gerald Creel, director of nurses.

Janet McDaniel reported 1,189 meals served in December by the Helping Hands Meals on Wheels program.

Sutton expressed concern that the West Texas Wind Energy wind energy turbine project is not living up to the terms of its 5-year 100% tax abatement contract with Crockett County. Under the terms of the contract, \$4,000,000.00 is to be spent in the county during the 25-year life of the project.

Most of this money should be spent during the construction phase for services and materials, commissioners believe, and thus far that is not happening. The project is to be in operation by the end of 1999.

Chamber chairman Rob Whitesides spoke to the court about the Keep Ozona Beautiful project being planned based on programs through the Texas Department of Transportation. Ozona has applied to TXDOT for funding which will be available in 2001.

A convention center report by Shelly Childress affirmed that the school will be using the building Aug. 1 through Oct. 31 while the middle school is being renovated.

After the lunch recess, commissioners agreed to Judge Sutton's suggestion that monthly reports could be submitted in writing unless the court or person giving the report needed to make comments, ask questions, etc. The exception to this will be the report from the care center, health and emergency services board of directors.

Representatives of the company did not come to Ozona last week to meet with prospective contractors, suppliers and workers as Sutton had hoped. He said contractors will be at the site near McCamey on Jan. 14 and that Dave Herrick of FPL Energy, had suggested that local contractors come there regarding possible work.

Appointed to the salary grievance committee were: Pamela Jane Cunningham, Judy Huckabee Farris, Janet Ruth Wilson, Donna Herring, Shawn Steven Morrow, Anna M. Gilley, James Thornton Cox, Marcus Lynn Sims and Eugene F. Perry. These names are drawn from the list of persons serving on the grand jury.

Monthly reports were heard from department heads and the county auditor.

Commissioners voted to:

- approve continuing in an interlocal agreement with the Rio Concho Drug Task Force
- advertise for paving materials
- appoint Rhonda Shaw to civic center board to fill unexpired term of Helen Bean
- enter a mutual aid agreement for emergencies only with Sutton County EMS
- approve a second term for library board members Alejos Lara and Jim White.
- approve lease of former NatGas building for use by library during expansion construction
- extend their rental agreement with West Texas Rehab
- have pool managers hired and supervised by the road and parks department.
- advertise for depository contract for county funds
- designate Crockett County Road Department, Crockett County Sheriff's Department and Crockett County Water Control to assist in locating areas in need of a clean up
- request the county attorney investigate possibility of obtaining additional time to fulfill the requirements of the Texas Department of Licensing and regulation and direct Eddie Moore to begin meeting these requirements for the annex building.

According to John Stokes, auditor, the county ended 1998 with \$1,244,598.00. This is \$524,000.00 better than 1997, he said.

Eddie Moore reported that upcoming work for the road department includes providing materials for 3.6 miles of fencing (1.8 miles per side) for Charlie Davidson along County Road 106. He also expects to put in two bumpgates on the Dunlap Ranch.

Work on the senior citizens' building is at a standstill until materials arrive. Moore said he hopes to have the building in use by late summer.

Sheriff Shane Fenton reported 268 calls for service to his department in December. There were 31 persons placed in jail during that time.

Garland Young reported problems with the heater in the youth center. Repairs to the heater have not been successful.

Laura Sievering - Cook of the Week

Cook of the Week Laura Sievering brings a wealth of Italian recipes to West Texas. The daughter of an Italian mother and Irish father who learned to cook Italian better than the Italians, she learned the secrets first hand. When her parents married, he would eat only hamburger and chicken, Laura says. Her mother, "a most incredible cook," converted him.

"I learned to cook from my Italian mother," said Laura. "The first thing she taught me was that most good Italian recipes are 'done to taste'. So most of the amounts in these recipes are a guess. Use my mom's advice, 'Taste it, if it tastes good, it's fine. If it doesn't, add a pinch more of everything, stir and taste again.'"

Laura and her husband, Jeff, moved here from Northern Virginia. He is the physician's assistant at Family Health Center of Ozona. In addition to his master's degree in medical science, he is also certified in basic and advanced life support. Laura is a certified physician's assistant with a master's degree in medical science. At present she is enjoying staying home with daughter Beth who is almost two.

Beth is her number one hobby, says Laura. She likes to cross stitch and both she and Jeff like to cycle. Cooking can also be considered a hobby of Laura's. She works at converting recipes into lighter, healthier versions whenever possible.

Baked Ziti

This is a favorite of a lot of Italian families because it's easy and it makes A LOT! My mom always made her own tomato sauce, but it's just as good with canned sauce. I use Hunt's garlic and herb tomato sauce and "dummy it up" with my own spices and garlic. I also use light ingredients - part skim ricotta cheese and reduced fat mozzarella. Less calories and fat but not less taste.

2 - 26 oz. cans of Hunt's garlic and herb tomato sauce

1 lb. ground beef
4 T oregano
4 T basil
2 T + 1 tsp. olive oil
6 to 7 cloves of garlic (chopped)
1 lb. Ricotta or part skim Ricotta
2 eggs
1/2 c. Parmesan cheese
2 1/2 c. Mozzarella cheese
16 oz. ziti or penne pasta

In a heavy sauce pan over medium heat, add tomato sauce. Stir in 2 T of oregano, basil and olive oil. Add in 4 to 5 cloves of garlic (crushed or chopped). Let come to a boil, then lower heat and simmer.

In a separate frying pan, add 1 tsp. of olive oil and chopped onion. Sauté until transparent. Add ground beef and brown. When done, drain fat and add meat mixture to the tomato sauce. Stir and continue to simmer on low.

Cook pasta as per the package instructions. While pasta is cooking, in a separate mixing bowl add 1 lb. ricotta, 2 eggs, 1/2 c. parmesan

cheese, 1 c. mozzarella cheese, 2 T basil and oregano and 3 to 4 cloves of crushed garlic. Mix well

When pasta is done, drain the water and add pasta to cheese mixture. Mix well until pasta is well coated.

Add in 3 to 4 cups of tomato sauce with meat until well coated and a "pinkish color". Sauce and meat should be evenly distributed throughout the mixture. If not, add a few more cups of sauce.

Transfer to a 13x9 inch baking dish and spread out evenly. Top with more sauce and remaining 1 1/2 c. of Mozzarella cheese. Spread evenly over top. Bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes or until hot and bubbly. Serve immediately. You can use remaining sauce to top ziti when you serve it.

This is best with a salad and crusty Italian bread.

Roasted Garlic

This is a wonderful addition to any Italian dish. If done right, the garlic comes out of the skins easily and spreads like warm butter. I usually use ELEPHANT garlic. You can use regular garlic as long as the heads are medium to large. Two heads of elephant garlic will feed at least four adults and a small kid or two. For the bread to spread this on, I usually use Pillsbury french loaf or breadsticks because if you time it right you can serve it all warm and it's delicious. (That and I haven't found a good Italian bakery yet!)

Take the heads of garlic and peel off just the loose papery skins. Cut off the top of each clove, trying to leave the head intact and the skin on the garlic.

In a small mixing bowl, mix 1/2 c. to 3/4 c. of olive oil, 2 to 3 T of basil, oregano and thyme. Salt and pepper to taste. Mix well. With a pastry brush, brush oil mixture over garlic heads, coating well.

Bake 1 hour at 300 degrees. I use a terra cotta garlic baking dish available at most kitchen stores, but in a pinch, you can wrap it in tinfoil. Baste with remaining oil mixture every 10 to 15 minutes. At the end of the hour, open the foil or take the lid off the dish and bake an additional 20 minutes basting frequently. Serve immediately.

Zoupa de Pesca

Or fish soup in English. This was always one of my favorites. My mom

only made this for special occasions or special guests, but always on my birthday because it was the one day I could have whatever I wanted, and I always wanted this.

The good thing about this recipe is you can buy more of what's on sale and less of the expensive seafoods and it still tastes good. Again, this is a typical Italian recipe - it tells you what to buy but not how much. Half a pound of each of the shellfish and 1 or 2 fillets of each of the fish is a good start.

1 to 2 flounder fillets cut into chunks

1 fresh fillet of monk tuna or halibut cut into big pieces
Shrimp, mussels, clams and scallops

Lobster meat
1/2 c. olive oil
2 cloves garlic, crushed
1 bay leaf
1 med. onion sliced thin
4 sprigs of parsley, cut up
2 tsp. salt
2 shakes of Tabasco
5 peppercorns
1 c. black olives (optional)
1 1/2 c. dry white wine. If not dry, add 1/4 c. wine vinegar

Arrange ingredients in a heavy stock pot in layers. Pour oil and wine over last. Cover with brown paper bag and then put lid over that. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes. Serve with linguini pasta.

Indian Pudding

This is a favorite dessert in my family. We usually made it at Thanksgiving. It's usually served immediately following dinner with a scoop of vanilla ice cream. But I think it would be great for any cold winter night.

4 c. milk
3/4 tsp. salt
1/4 c. (sifted) yellow cornmeal
2 T quick cooking tapioca
2/3 c. packed brown sugar
1/2 tsp. ginger
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1 T butter

Measure 3 c. of milk into the top of a double boiler. Cover and place over boiling water until scalding (not boiling). Add salt and sift in cornmeal. It's good to have a second person helping you - they can whisk constantly while you add in the ingredients. Sift in cornmeal slowly. Add tapioca while continuing to whisk the mixture. When mixture is smooth and thick, add in next four ingredients and mix thoroughly.

Pour remaining 1 c. of milk over top. Do not stir. Cover and cook 3 hours, stirring occasionally after the first hour.

Adjust heat for three hours and keep an eye on the water in the double boiler. Make sure it doesn't evaporate or the mixture will burn.

Chicken Marsala

This is a quick and easy version of an old Italian favorite. I "lighten" this up by using low sodium chicken broth and lowfat mushroom soup. Another hint is to make the sauce first and cover and keep warm on the stove while you prepare the chicken.

2 lb. chicken cutlets, pounded thin
1 c. chicken broth
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1/2 c. marsala wine

Pepper to taste
1 pkg. mushrooms, sliced
Chicken

Add 1/2 c. of flour to 2 separate dishes. Season 1 with salt and pepper. Season the second with salt, pepper, oregano and basil. (About 2 to 3 T) Beat one egg with a little milk to make an egg wash. Dip the chicken in the flour with salt and pepper. Then in the egg wash. Then in the second flour mixture. Then fry in olive oil. Drain and keep warm. Once all the chicken is done, serve with sauce.

Sauce

Mix broth, soup, wine, pepper and mushrooms in a sauce pan. Bring to a simmer for a few minutes. Should be thick and bubbly. Serve over chicken.

Eric Elizondo completes six month deployment

Marine Lance Cpl. Eric O. Elizondo, son of Juan R. Elizondo of Ozona, recently completed a six-month deployment to the Western Pacific Ocean, Indian Ocean and Arabian Gulf with the 15th Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU), embarked aboard the ships of the USS Essex Amphibious Ready Group (ARG).

During the deployment, Elizondo received training on urban warfare techniques, rope rappelling, close-quarter battle, weapons and small unit fighting. Elizondo's unit also completed training in Hawaii, which tested all areas of amphibious warfare, including noncombatant evacuation operations and amphibious assault.

Elizondo and crew members also had the opportunity to visit Bahrain, Hong Kong, Malaysia, Oman, Seychelles, Singapore, Thailand and the United Arab Emirates where crew members participated in community relations projects in the host countries.

Home based in Camp Pendleton, CA, Elizondo's unit is an expeditionary intervention force with the ability to rapidly organize for combat operations in virtually any environment. Elizondo's unit is divided into an infantry battalion, an aircraft squadron, a support group and a command element. With the combination of these teams, Elizondo's unit supplies and sustains itself for either quick mission accomplishment or clearing the way for follow-on forces.

In addition, the 15th MEU can evacuate civilians, rescue downed pilots, conduct reconnaissance and serve as an initial landing force ashore, providing the USS Essex ARG commanders with a wide range of capabilities.

The 1995 graduate of Ozona High School joined the Marine Corps in July 1995.

Texas Tech University Junction Campus anticipates change

Texas Tech University hosted a planning session on the future of the Texas Tech Campus at Junction Dec. 3. At the meeting, held on the cam-

pus Thursday evening, Dr. William "Bill" McCaughan, newly appointed director of Texas Tech University Center at Junction, met with members

of the Kimble County community to explore ways in which the campus could better serve Junction, Kimble County and the surrounding counties of the area. Dr. McCaughan and Professor Ashton Thornhill, academic coordinator, outlined several areas of educational, economic and cultural development being explored for possible implementation through the campus beginning in 1999. Among the ideas presented was the installation of an interactive video classroom that would allow potential students in the region to participate in classes being taught on the Lubbock campus and other locations around the state. This project is already funded and the facility is to be installed on the Junction campus during the first part of 1999. The members of the community participating in the planning session discussed a number of ways that the campus could better serve the region and responded enthusiastically to the idea of expanding the Junction Campus programs.

The first item to be addressed is the formation of a Regional Advisory Board composed of persons from Kimble, Gillespie, Kerr, Edwards, Sutton, Menard and Mason counties. A primary focus for the board would be to explore educational and economic development needs which could be met or supported by Texas Tech through the Junction Campus. The board would also be active in outlining and fostering facility and program development for the campus. The first meeting of the board is expected in February 1999. John T. Montford, chancellor of Texas Tech, Dr. Donald R. Haragan, TTU president, and Dr. John Burns, TTU provost are expected to attend the kick-off meeting of the board.

A New Beginning

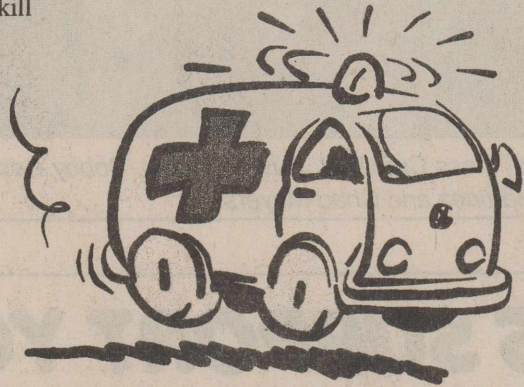

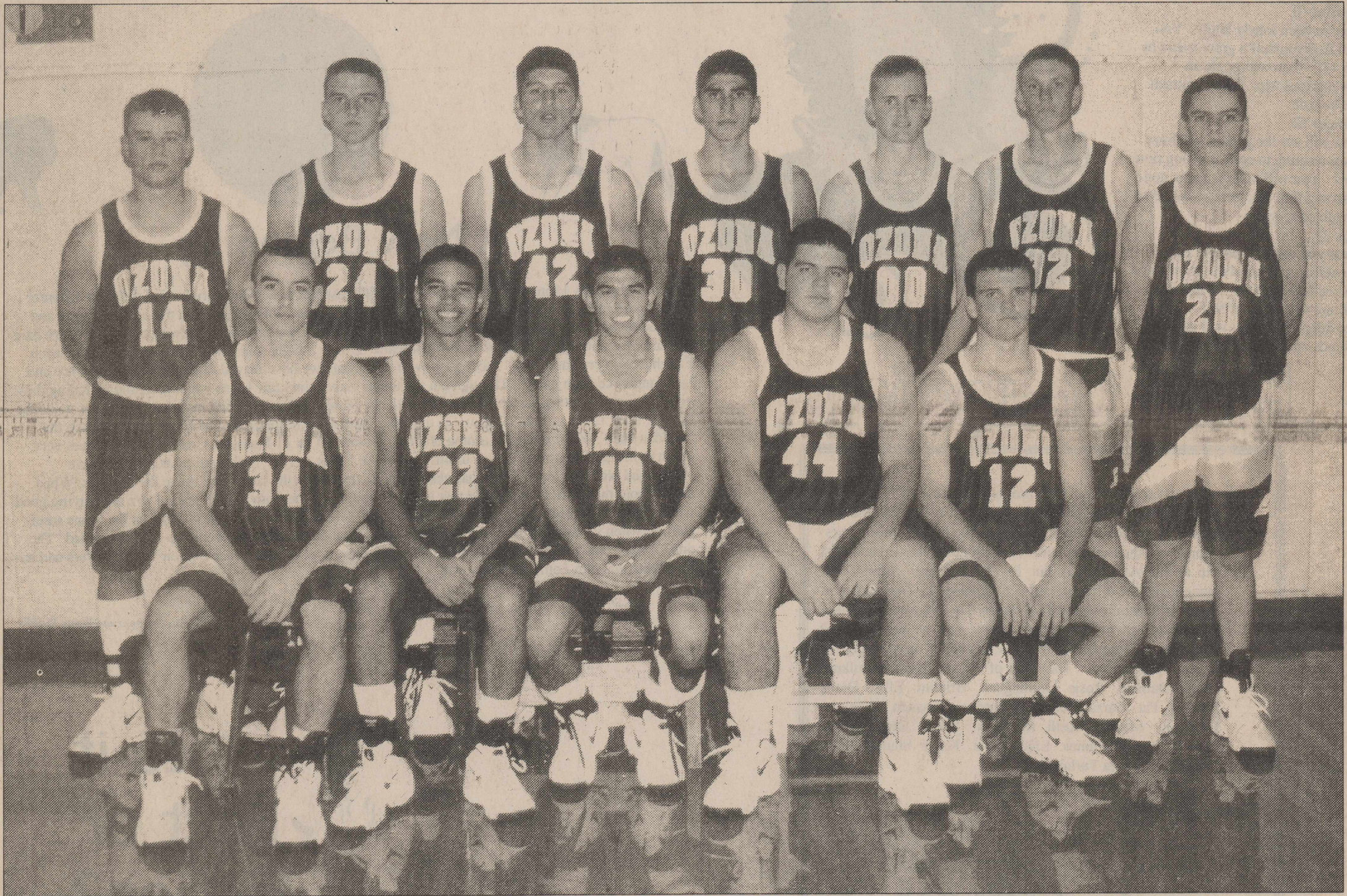

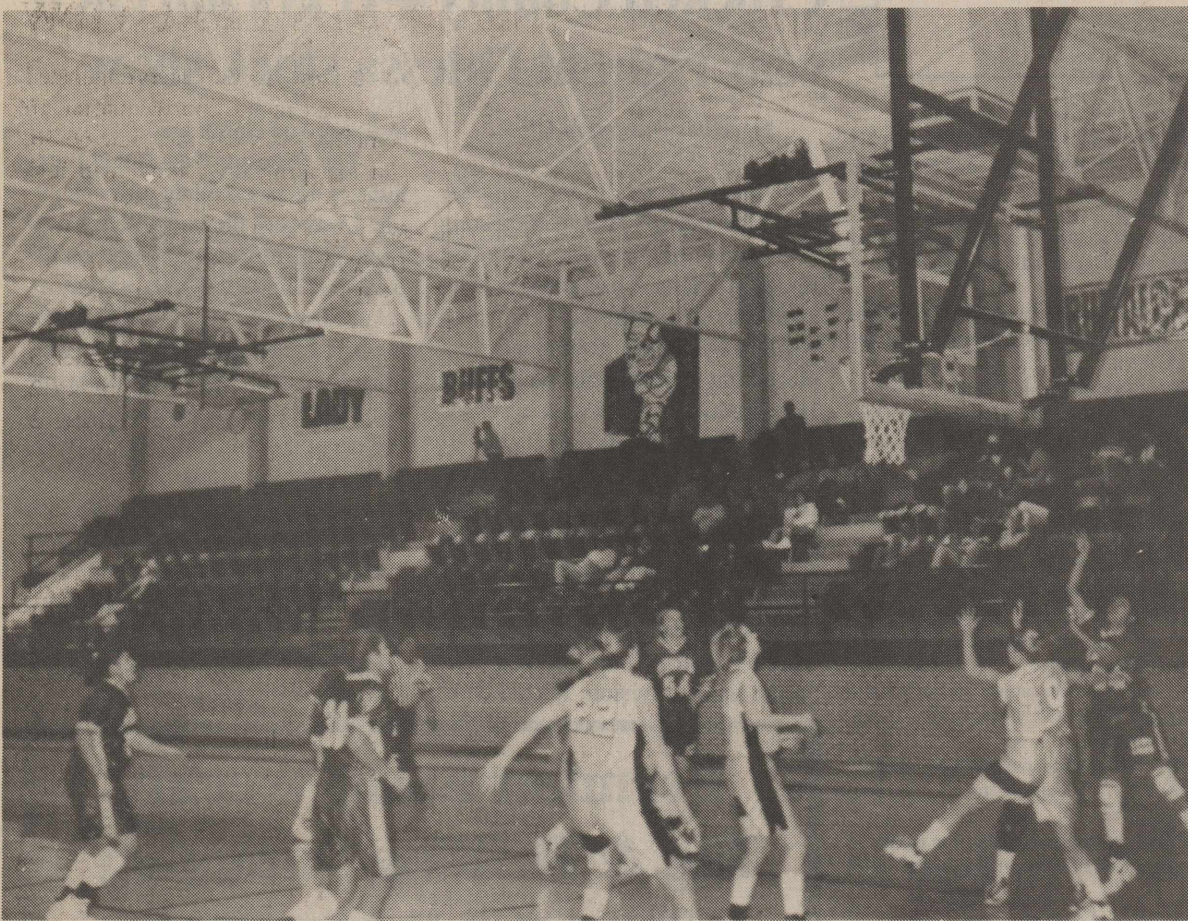

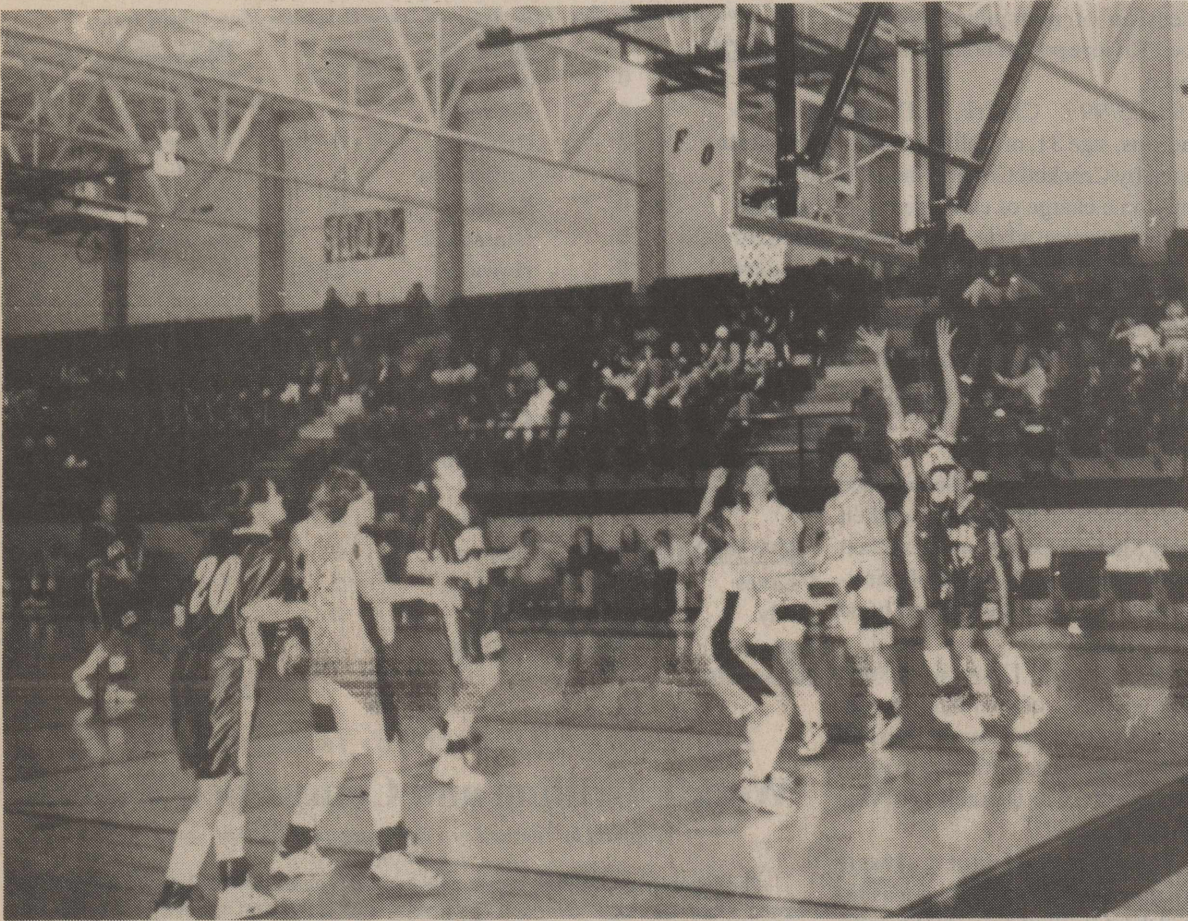

The well was drilled by independent operator J. Cleo Thompson.
It flowed 390,000 CF gas per day on a 1.25-in. choke.
The well bottomed at 7,960 feet and was perforated for production 7,632 to 7,660 feet into the hole.
Two 6,500-ft. developmental wells are now under permit in the Ozona Field 18 miles southwest of Ozona with Tamarack Petroleum Co. of Midland as the operator.
Location is in a 2,880-acre lease in the TCRR Survey A-5149. Tamarack will be seeking new pay in the Canyon Sand. The wells are designated as the Nos. 1413 and 1414 Sutton.
The No. 6 Montgomery "2" has been completed in the Ozona Field 16 miles southwest of Ozona. Union Pacific Resources is the operator.
The well flowed 191,000 CF gas daily on a 48/64 choke opening. The open flow capacity was calculated at 222,000 CFD.
The well went to total depth of 6,900 feet and was perforated for production in the Canyon Sand, 6,499 to 6,741 feet into the wellbore.
