

Lions, Lady Lions victorious in district opener

Lions pounce on Eagles

The Ozona Lions traveled to Eldorado last Friday to take on the Eldorado Eagles for their first district game of the 1999 season.

The first three quarters of play resulted in a 39-39 tie with the Lions on top by one after the first quarter, the Eagles topping the scoreboard 29-25 at the half and the Lions playing catchup to tie the game at 39-39 at the end of the third.

The fourth quarter was an entirely different story for the Lions as they steamed up their boilers and ran past the Eagles in a 61-45 finale.

Bobby Cervantez led the Lions to their victory with an amazing 27 points. He also had one 3-point goal, 10 free throw points, 5 rebounds, 3 assists and 1 block to top off an incredible night on the court. The victory puts the Lions with a district win-loss record of 1-0.

In the second half the Lady Lions hit the court ready to play basketball and that they did as they steamed up to full power defeating the Lady Eagles 51-35.



Crockett County jury finds Brown guilty

An eight man, four woman jury set punishment at 30 years in the penitentiary for Jay Taylor Brown Monday night. In their fifth day on the case and after four hours of deliberation, the jury came back at 3:00 p.m. Monday with a guilty verdict.

Brown was arrested last July on a charge of attempted murder but was later indicted for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. The indictment found that Brown had intentionally, knowingly, recklessly caused bodily injury to Paula Leslie Milliken by striking her in the head with a rock.

The Florida couple had been quarreling when Brown turned off the interstate onto the Pandale Road exit west of Ozona on July 5, 1998. According to Deputy Steve Kenley, the woman was hit repeatedly with a rock and choked before Brown drove away. He later drove back where

she was, but didn't pick her up, Kenley said.

Milliken was found by officers after they received reports about the injured woman from passing motorists. She was able to give the name and description of the man and vehicle before being taken by Medivac to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo.

Brown's vehicle was found in Ozona early the next morning and put under surveillance. After he entered the car and drove away, Brown was stopped and arrested without incident.

During the punishment phase of the trial, jurors listened to Kenley in his capacity as a fingerprint expert. He verified fingerprints taken from Brown at the time of his Ozona arrest were the same as fingerprints in four arrest records from Florida and one from California. The Crockett County fingerprint card and each of

the arrest records were entered into evidence by Shannon Flanigan, assistant district attorney.

The jury was told that if they found, beyond a reasonable doubt, that Brown had served time after having been convicted of a criminal offense, enhanced punishment could be assessed at life or not more than 99 years or less than five years with a possible fine of up to \$10,000.00.

Otherwise, sentence would be limited to a maximum of 20 years with no less than two years and a possible fine of \$10,000.00.

Jurors did find for the assessed punishment and a 30 year sentence with no fine. Flanigan had asked for no less than 50 years.

Brown will be formally sentenced on Jan. 28. He is represented by Orlando DeHoyos.

\$67,052 siezed in routine traffic stop

A speeding stop Monday night resulted in the arrests of three California men and the confiscation of \$67,052.00 in currency. The money, mostly in \$20.00 bills, was concealed in the doors' quarter panels, under the carpet, in luggage and in the trunk. There were no controlled substances in the vehicle.

The Department of Public Safety drug dog was brought from Eldorado to do a search of the 1994 Oldsmobile after DPS Trooper Todd Ross made the stop. He was assisted by Deputy Tyler Roy of the Crockett County Sheriff's Department.

Arrested were: Juan Rocha, age 26, of Los Angeles, CA; Jose Rocha, age 19, of Fontana, CA; and Jose Avendano, age 23, of Inglewood, CA.

Drug free workshop here next month


Preparing for the Drug Free Years, a 3-session workshop, will be offered in Ozona beginning Feb. 7. The program is sponsored by the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Council for the Concho Valley and the Ozona United Methodist Church. The three part program will be held at Ozona United Methodist Church on Feb. 7, 14 and 21 from 3 to 5 p.m.

Preparing for the Drug Free Years is a program for parents of children in grades 4-7. It empowers parents to reduce the risk that their children will use drugs. The program teaches parents to identify the risk factors associated with teenage drug abuse and to practice skills which will promote family bonding and reduce those risks.

The program was developed by Drs. J. David Hawkins and Richard F. Catalano of the University of Washington. Their research has shown that children who are bonded to their parents, school, non-drug using peers, and to the community are less likely to become involved in negative behavior, such as drug use, that may threaten those bonds. Through this program parents will learn to increase their children's opportunities for involvement in the family, to teach skills needed in adolescence and to provide rewards for positive behavior as well as appropriate consequences for undesired behavior.


An innovative method for teaching economics to students, the Stock Market Game is a computer simulated

competition played by more than 5,000 high school, middle school and elementary students throughout New Mexico and West Texas. According to Dorothy Hughes, Stock Market Game coordinator at NMSU, "The game this Fall has been exciting as well as educational due to the wild fluctuations in stock prices. Winning portfolios held many tech and Internet stocks, most of which ended higher."

Each team begins with an imaginary \$100,000 and during a 10-week

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AUSTIN — Families and friends of lawmakers swarmed to Austin last week for the opening of the 76th Texas Legislature on Jan. 12, kicking off the 140-day regular session.

On the minds of most legislators and lobbyists this session is how to spend a projected state budget surplus of \$5.6 billion.

Retiring Democratic Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock slammed the Senate gavel to open the session, before bidding the Legislature farewell after his more than 40 years of public service.

Bullock's Republican successor, Rick Perry, will play a powerful role in deciding which bills live or die and how the budget surplus will be spent.

Bullock continued to preside over the Senate until Perry's official swearing-in this week. Regarding his ascendancy to the office of lieutenant governor, former agriculture commissioner Perry said, "It's not easy following a legend."

After Bullock turned over the gavel to new Senate president pro tempore, Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, Bivins hailed Bullock, Lyndon Johnson and Sam Rayburn as "the

three giants of Texas politics in the 20th century."

Meanwhile, Rep. James E. "Pete" Laney, D-Hale Center, was unanimously re-elected to a fourth term as speaker of the House. Laney already is busy picking House committee chairmen and vice chairmen and assigning other members to committees.

And, Gov. George W. Bush, whose Jan. 19 inauguration does nothing to dampen speculation about his presidential aspirations, repeated his pledge that he will remain focused on the legislative session until his agenda is passed.

Rylander Recommends Budget

New Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander recommended adopting a "family-style" budget as she delivered her first official revenue estimate to the Texas Legislature on Jan. 8.

"Texas is a big, extended family," she said. "Like any good family, we need to spend wisely, invest wisely and save some for a rainy day. This revenue estimate lets the state do that."

Rylander estimated \$471 million will be transferred to the Economic Stabilization Fund or "rainy day" fund, and she forecasted the following:

- \$94 billion in earnings from all sources in fiscal 2000-2001;
- \$4.4 billion on hand in unspent funds from the current biennium, including \$1.1 billion from the state's tobacco lawsuit settlement;
- \$58 billion available for general purpose spending; and
- \$40 billion to be collected from sources including federal funds, tax proceeds and assorted fees.

AG to Probe Tobacco Litigation

Attorney General John Cornyn last week said he intends to inves-

tigate Texas' tobacco industry litigation to see whether civil or criminal wrongdoing has been committed.

Cornyn said he would not give the five "hired gun" lawyers who represented the state in its anti-tobacco lawsuit a release on behalf of the state "for any legal or unethical conduct that they may have engaged in while representing the state."

Other Highlights

- General Land Office surveyors last month measured the height of the state Capitol at 302.64 feet tall, from the Oval Walk at the south entrance to the tip of the star in the hand of the Goddess of Liberty. The height of the U.S. Capitol is 288 feet, from the East Walk to the top of the dome's Statue of Freedom.
- Gov. Bush has appointed Daisy A. Stiner as executive director of the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs. She served as acting director of the agency following the August resignation of Larry Paul Manley.
- The Texas Board of Health last week gave initial approval to rules that would require a warning label for most products containing ephedrine, an ingredient in many weight-loss and energy-boosting dietary supplements.
- Elton Bomer, former Texas insurance commissioner, was sworn in Jan. 11 as secretary of state, replacing Al Gonzales, who has been appointed by Gov. Bush to replace former Justice Raul Gonzalez on the Texas Supreme Court.
- Gov. Bush last week appointed Austin businessman Robert J. Huston to a four-year term as chairman of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission.

Have you filed a homestead exemption yet?

A Texas homestead exemption helps you save on taxes on your home. An exemption removes part of the value of your property from taxation and lowers your taxes. For example, if your home is valued at \$50,000 and you qualify for a \$5,000 exemption, you pay taxes on your home as if it was worth only \$45,000. Other than exemptions for disabled veterans or survivors, these exemptions apply only for your homestead. They do not apply to other property you own.

Does your home qualify for exemptions?

You must own your home on January 1. Your homestead can be a separate structure, condominium or a mobile home located on leased land, as long as you own it. Your homestead can include up to 20 acres if the land is used as your yard. A residence may be owned by an individual through an interest in a qualifying beneficial trust and may be occupied by a trustor of a qualifying trust. You must use the home as your principal residence on January 1. If you have more than one house, you can only get exemptions for your main or principal residence. If you temporarily move away from your home, you can still get an exemption if you don't establish another principal residence and you intend to return. For instance, if you enter a nursing home, your home still qualifies as your homestead if you intend to return. Renting part of your home or using part of it for a business doesn't disqualify the rest of your home for the exemption.

What home exemptions are there?

All homeowners will qualify for a \$5,000 homestead exemption on home's value for school taxes.

All homeowners where your county collects a special tax for farm-to-market roads or flood control will receive a \$3,000 exemption for this tax. If you qualify for local-option exemptions for age 65 or older homeowners or disabled homeowners, you will receive only the local-option exemptions.

Optional exemptions

Any taxing unit, including a school district, city, county or special district, may offer an exemption for up to 20% of your home's value. The amount of an optional exemption can't be less than \$5,000, no matter what the percentage is. For example, if your home is valued at \$20,000 and your city offers a 20% optional exemption, your exemption is \$5,000, even though 20% of \$20,000 is just \$4,000. The governing body of each taxing unit decides whether it will offer the exemption and at what percentage.

This percentage exemption is added to any other homestead exemption for which the applicant qualifies.

If you are a disabled veteran or survivor of a disabled veteran, you may qualify for a property tax exemption.

A veteran who was disabled while serving with the U.S. armed forces or the surviving spouse or child (under 18 years of age and unmarried) of a disabled veteran or of a member of the armed forces who was killed while on active duty qualifies.

You must be a Texas resident. You must have documents from either the Veterans' Administration or the branch of the armed forces that show the percentage of your service-related disability. Your disability rating must be at least 10 percent. If you are a surviving spouse or child, you must have the veteran's disability records. You may need other documents such as proof of marriage or age. This exemption ranges from \$5,000 to \$12,000, depending on the extent of the disability. This exemption is not only for a home -- you can apply it to any property you own on January 1. However, you may pick only one property to receive this exemption for the taxing units that tax the property. The disabled veteran's exemption is different from a disabled homeowner's exemption. Contact your county appraisal district about any other exemptions available.

A homeowner with a disability also may get exemptions. "Disabled" means either you can't engage in gainful work because of physical or mental disability or you are 55 years old and blind and can't engage in your previous work because of your blindness.

If you receive disability benefits under the federal Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance Program administered by the Social Security Administration, you will qualify. Disabil-

ity benefits from any other program do not automatically qualify you for this exemption. You may need information on disability ratings from the civil service, retirement programs or from insurance documents, military records or a doctor's statement. If disabled, you will qualify for a \$10,000 exemption for school taxes, in addition to the \$5,000 exemption for all homeowners. And, any taxing unit can offer an exemption of at least \$3,000 from the home value of taxpayers with disabilities. Homeowners who are disabled and apply for homestead exemptions also may pay their home taxes in installments.

What should new homeowners do?

Before you buy a home, you or your mortgage company should get a tax certificate for the home from all taxing units that tax it. The tax certificate will show if delinquent taxes are owed. You can't get clear title to the property until you have paid all delinquent taxes. Your mortgage company may pay property taxes on your home out of an escrow account. If this is the case, make sure the tax collectors send the original tax bills to the mortgage company. You may want to request a receipt to see if the mortgage company pays the taxes on time and for federal income tax purposes.

Apply to the appraisal district for a residence homestead and any other exemptions. You must apply in each appraisal district that appraises your home. If you sold your previous home in Texas, make sure it's listed under the new owner's name and address. If your home is new, you should receive a notice of appraised value from the appraisal district in April or May.

Each year the top state, regional and essay contest winners in New Mexico and West Texas are presented with plaques and T-shirts and every participating teacher's top team members are awarded certificates. According to Hughes, over 600 awards were presented this Fall.

In addition to coordinating the game in New Mexico and West Texas, Hughes also directs the NMSU Regional Processing Center, one of only three in the United States, where 10 states are processed each semester. Before the game each semester, Hughes offers several training workshops, during which game rules and general investing information is provided. 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Frances Baker - Cook of the Week

"I guess I've lived in the country too long," said Cook of the Week Frances Baker. "The way I cook mostly is with just what I have in the kitchen."

Mrs. Baker recalls staying at the ranch six weeks at a time when her sons, Fred and Mike, were growing up. "We always had a vegetable garden." Canning and pickle making, the 16-day kind, were also part of feeding a family on the ranch.

There were chickens for eggs and cows for milk and butter making. She also made bread for the family. "I love to make bread. I can remember when I used to make bread three times a day."

"Mother had us helping cook. She cooked, but we had things we had to do." Many of the dishes, Frances Baker cooks are without a recipe, such as a chicken barley casserole made recently.

"I would love to go to a culinary school just for the knowledge," she said.

All her time wasn't spent in the kitchen, however. "I used to play bridge and golf and still do a lot of handwork such as knitting and crocheting." She also creates wonderful oil paintings.

The recipes she chose to share are quick and easy to prepare.

Frances' Cake

"I've been making this cake for about 40 years. It is just a little bit different."

She began with orange chiffon cake but later changed to lemon chiffon. Any cake, chiffon or plain, box or scratch, could be used.

Bake cake according to directions. If a chiffon cake, split into three layers. Fill with lemon pie filling. Frost top and sides with meringue. Bake as you would a baked Alaska.

This cake was served at a gathering to celebrate the 101st birthday of her mother, Mrs. George Bean, last week.

Frances Baker's Chicken Barley Casserole

Boil a chicken as you would to make chicken spaghetti. Debone and cut into bite sized bits. In the chicken broth, cook approximately one-half cup barley, chopped onions, bell pepper and celery. Add salt and pepper to taste. Cook down, add chicken and place in casserole dish. Freezes well.

Mrs. Baker says barley takes longer to cook than rice, approximately 40 minutes. The use of barley goes back to England and Scotland. It is not used much in this part of the country, she commented.

Marinated Salad

Combine drained artichokes, sliced red onions, cherry tomatoes, halved. Marinate overnight in Italian dressing.

Praline Squares

Line a jelly roll pan (or something similar) with old time graham crackers. Cook together one cup butter, one cup brown sugar. Boil for three minutes. Add one cup pecans. Pour over graham crackers. Place in 350 degree oven for 10 minutes.

Easy Peanut Butter Cookies

1 can (14 oz.) sweetened condensed milk
3/4 c. peanut butter
2 c. biscuit baking mix
1 tsp. vanilla extract
Sugar

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. In a large mixing bowl, beat the sweetened condensed milk and peanut butter until smooth. Beat in the biscuit mix and vanilla extract; mix well. Shape dough into 1-inch balls; roll in sugar. Place balls 2 inches apart on ungreased baking sheets. Flatten cookies with a fork. Bake for 6 to 8 minutes or until lightly browned. Do not overbake. Cool in pan. Store, tightly covered, at room temperature. Makes about 4 dozen.

For a nice variation called Peanut Blossoms, do not flatten the balls of dough. Bake as above; remove from oven and press a milk chocolate candy kiss into the center of each cookie.

Dr. Carlisle buried here Jan. 18

Don Lee Carlisle, M.D., died Saturday, Jan. 16, 1999, at his home in San Angelo.

Service was held at 1 p.m. Monday at First United Methodist Church in San Angelo officiated by the Rev. Carl Rohlf. Graveside service followed in Cedar Hill Cemetery in Ozona with the Rev. Grosse Mohler officiating.

Dr. Carlisle was born Nov. 7, 1928, in Cisco to Dr. Margil Clinton Carlisle and Hallie Fax Carlisle. He was a graduate of Augusta Military Academy and Baylor University. He received his master's degree from the University of Texas at Austin and his doctor of medicine from the University of Texas at Galveston. He did a double residency in surgery and orthopedics at Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, MD.

Dr. Carlisle served as a regular and reserve in the United States Marine Corps and the U. S. Navy. He was a veteran of the Korean War where he received the Silver Star, Bronze Star, Navy Marines Medal, Purple Heart, Commendation Medal, Presidential Unit Citation and the Secretary of the Navy Unit Citation. He also received the Civilian Medal of Freedom of Outstanding Service.

He practiced medicine and surgery in Topeka, KS, before returning to Texas in 1967 to enter private practice in Goliad. He moved to Ozona in 1969 where he practiced for many years before going to San Angelo to the emergency room of St. John's

Hospital through 1997. Most recently he had worked in the Indian Health Service Hospital on the Sioux Indian Reservation in the emergency room in Rosebud, SD.

He was a life member of the American College of Emergency Physicians, which recently honored him for more than 30 years of practice of emergency medicine.

Bible Study - Endangered Species

There is something that is slowly but surely becoming extinct in America today. We would probably never be comfortable to admit it, but Bible study in the home has dropped to an all time low. To be eligible for the Dean's List, a student must be enrolled as a full time student and have at least a 3.25 grade point average.



The career of the week is a stenographer. A stenographer is one who is skilled in using abbreviations or characteristics for whole words and transcribing dictated material. Stenographers usually referred to as court reporters, have certain requirements that you must meet. First of all, you need a high school diploma, four years of clerical experience or any combination of training and some legal experience. Their salary ranges from \$10.54-\$16.22 an hour, you must have typing skills of at least 50-60 WPM (words per minute) and shorthand at least 85-95 WPM. The most important requirement, you must have attended a Stenography school for at least 1 to 3 years which is a self-paced school. Stenography schools can be located in San Antonio, Houston, Dallas, or Abilene. Many Court Reporting Schools guarantee their graduates at least \$40,000 starting salary when they get out of school. There are also opportunities with this field but in television. A stenographer could make \$110,000.00 by typing script in for the hearing impaired. You can also be a freelance court reporter and work for several different attorneys typing their cases. Before beginning any career, a high school diploma must come first, so get your education and think about a fascinating career like this one.
