Library expansion increases information access

Our county owned and operated library is small, 3,100 square feet, and not handicapped accessible. Our circulation has grown from a few hundred per year to almost 18,000 per year. We now provide computers and free Internet access to the public. These dramatic increases in our operation and services has required the Friends of the Crockett County Public Library Inc., the library board and 3,000 square foot addition and disability access remodeling of our library building to meet new ADA requirements and to provide needed space. The Friends has engaged an architect, Mr. Henry Schmidt from San Angelo, to oversee every aspect of the construction of the library expansion. His talent, experience, attention to detail and love of historic buildings and older homes well recommended him to us for this project. Mr. Schmidt has designed a very accessible and open expansion plan incorporating the original Spanish red tile roof and stucco style and feel of the old building. New restrooms, an office area and





Senators are also discussing whether teacher training should be a requirement. SB1 offers voluntary reading expert training and encourages teachers with a financial incentive of \$150 per day. Schools must provide the accelerated reading instruction programs to students included in the bill, whether the teachers have completed training or not.


The bill passed unanimously out of the Education Committee with an amendment by Dallas senator and cosponsor Royce West on Wednesday, Feb. 10. West offered the amendment because he feared SB1 would specifically hurt minority students if the Legislature did not promise future funding. The amendment requires the Legislature to continue to provide sufficient funding for the programs included in the legislation.

Perry has concerns about the language in the amendment, pointing out that what is considered sufficient funding is different to each legislator. Perry thinks the problem can be worked out on the Senate floor before sending the bill to the House of Representatives.

Perry spoke against requiring schools to only hire teachers who have been trained, "All too often we get into problems here trying to make a shoe that fits all feet, a piece of legislation that fits every school district and it causes more problems than it cures."

Senator Florence Shapiro of Plano announced her plan to fight teen drug use in a press conference on Thursday, Feb. 12. Senators Shapleigh, Lucio, Corona and Lt. Governor Perry were there to show their support. Her program includes parent initiated drug testing, tracking overdoses, enhancing criminal penalties for some drug offenses, and prevention and treatment.

Shapiro said drug use is a problem throughout the state and is getting worse because drugs are cheaper, more potent and more easily accessible. Shapiro says more drugs are coming from Mexico and wants additional federal funds to help the state deal with drug-related border issues. Senators on the Special Committee for Border Affairs discussed drug trafficking from Mexico in a public hearing held Feb. 11.



AN AGENDA FOR TEXAS

7 ith the impeachment trial going on in Washington, Texans were right to wonder if their representatives in Washington will be able to address other matters. Both Congress and the President have agreed that we must. With Texans at the doorstep of the next millennium, I have developed an agenda that expands economic opportunity and security, provides innovative ideas for excellence in education and addresses fundamental aspects of our national security.

One of my priorities is to eliminate the marriage tax penalty, one of the most unfair elements of the federal tax code. Some 21 million American couples pay an average of \$1,400 more in taxes, simply because they are married, than they would if they were two individuals filing as singles. I want to stop forcing people to choose between love and money. The first bill I introduced in the 106th Congress, on January 19, would eliminate this

We need more tax relief, too, and none more so than in the oil patch. The jobs of hundreds of thousands of Texans who make their living there are in jeopardy as oil prices have fallen to the lowest level in decades. At a time when we're importing more than half our oil, we're in danger of exporting thousands of jobs overseas. I have introduced legislation that would offer tax incentives to those who are willing to re-open abandoned wells or maintain marginal wells, those that produce 15 or fewer barrels a day. This will help a beleaguered industry, keep jobs in America and increase our own national security by reducing our dependence on foreign energy.

We also need pension reform, especially for women, who live seven to eight years longer than men and have to make their retirement savings last longer. Fewer than a quarter of women of retirement age receive pensions, and the value of their pension benefits is on average about half that of men.

Our tax system encourages employer-provided pensions, with the worthy objective of spurring the private sector to supplement Social Security income. Unfortunately, current law penalizes women who drop out of the labor market to have children or who change jobs frequently.

I will offer legislation to encourage personal and portable pensions that travel with people in and out of the labor market, without discriminating against those who switch jobs frequently, work part-time, or interrupt their

We must also look for innovative ways to maintain the quality of our public schools. I have introduced comprehensive K-12 education reform in a bill I call the "Options for Excellence in Education Act of 1999." Its most important element is the establishment of Student, School and Teacher Excellence Grants, to encourage states and public school districts to be creative. In addition, this bill would make it easier for retired professionals with career experience in fields where there are teacher shortages to enter the

My bill will untangle a web of federal program regulations and requirements that cost billions in compliance, taking away scarce dollars from

Finally, while I support a defense system against ballistic missiles and other modern weapons systems, our first defense priority must be to recruit and retain the finest young people in our armed forces. This means honoring our promise of health care coverage for them and their families. We have reduced the facilities available to them with the downsizing of our military. This affects both the active duty force, in which there are more service members with families than ever before, and retired military personnel who are living longer. Our military health care system can no longer accommodate all those eligible to use it.

I have introduced an amendment to a Senate military pay raise bill that would raise reimbursement levels for Tricare, the military health-care delivery system, to attract and retain more participating doctors to the program. It also will expedite and reduce the costs of Tricare claims processing, which has been a thorn in the side of both beneficiaries and providers. It will require portability of benefits between regions. making it easier for military personnel to get their health-care needs met as they move from one duty station to

Economic growth and opportunity, options for educational excellence, a strong national defense that honors the commitments we've made to our troops: This is the agenda of the people of Texas, and one that I plan to carry in the United States Senate.

AUSTIN — Gov. George W. Bush's initiative to end social promotions in Texas public schools was unanimously approved by the Senate Education Committee last

The initiative, Senate Bill 1, would require third- through eighth-grade students to pass the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills, a reading, writing and math

High school students' scores on the exit exam required for graduation no longer would be waived to keep them with their peers, but the legislation includes funding for remedial programs to keep students from falling behind.

Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, chairman of the Senate Education Committee, said he was pleased the bill drew the committee's unanimous approval.

"I think it's become pretty clear that this bill is targeting educationally disadvantaged kids who have historically fallen through the cracks," he said.

Among provisons in the bill coauthored by Sen. Royce West, D-Dallas, are these:

■ Third-graders, beginning in 2003, must pass the reading portion of TAAS to be promoted;

■ Fifth-graders, beginning in 2005, must pass TAAS reading and math; and ■ Eighth-graders, beginning in

2008, must pass TAAS reading, writing and math in order to advance.

Money to pay for Senate Bill 1 is included in a \$125 million emergency appropriations bill that also would fund child abuse prevention programs, boll weevil eradication and prison beds.

AG Seeks Child Support Funding





CCPL has over 50,000 volumes in the library. With the building expansion and new shelving, we plan to have the capability to increase the number of reference materials - both print and electronic, by 40%, the nonfiction collection by 31%, the fiction collection by 35% and the children's collection by over 50%. There will be space to provide additional typewriters and computers for public use, especially for children to use for school reports and papers. More space is also needed for the summer reading programs, since each summer more children participate, and the Crockett County Schools now have summer classes. The public library is heavily used by students and teachers to supplement the school library facilities, since we have longer and more convenient hours for after-school

For many years, CCPL has hosted an adult literacy program with an active group of volunteer tutors and students sponsored by the Big Country Library System. CCPL serves and supports Head Start with books and materials to enhance their program for pre-schoolers. We also serve three day care programs for pre-school and after-school children with books, and with library storytimes and tours. The library has been the meeting place for all the local service organizations,

such as, the Southside Lions Club, Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts, the Ozona Woman's League, Sigma Delta Mu Sorority, the Women's Forum, the Ozona Garden Club and others, at one time or another. All of these groups will be favorably impacted by the expansion of the Crockett County Public Library.

Library Director Louise Perner Ledoux, with help from County Road Supervisor Eddie Moore, Maintenance Supervisor Ronald Shaw and various Friends and library board members, will be on site daily to work with the architect and builders on this project. Many local craftsmen and subcontractors will be working on this construction. CCPL will move to temporary quarters at 1006 Sheffield Road and will remain open to the public through as much of this construction process as possible to provide continued library service to the community.

Texas Tech meeting rural health care needs

ODESSA-Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center Permian Basin (TTUHSCB) is meeting the medical needs of West Texans by providing health care education and services throughout the region. TTUHSCPB has identified the delivery of quality health care to rural Permian Basin communities as a top priority and has taken several steps to meet the unique challenges presented in these remote and underserved sites.

The Texas Tech Rural Health Clinic in Ozona is one of seven rural health clinics operated by Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center Permian Basin. The clinic provides preventive child health services, preventative tuberculosis care, immunizations, prenatal care, postpartum services, family planning, women's health care and population focused nursing services.

The Texas Tech Rural Health Clinic in Ozona also administers the Women's Infants and Children (WIC) program for infants as well as pregnant, breastfeeding and postpartum women. This program provides infants with formula, immunizations and health screenings, and children under five with WIC foods, immuni-

walking. It may not be able to close its mouth, and may appear to be choking. Never try to clear the throat of an animal with these signs. If you see an animal acting this way, call the Sheriff's Office and have them notify animal control right away.

People can be infected with the rabies virus if they are bitten or licked by an animal that has the disease. You can also get rabies if the saliva from a rabid animal contacts your mucous membranes or any open wounds you might have. If you are exposed in this way, only a series of shots can keep you from getting the disease.

There is no cure for rabies. Once a person has contracted the disease there is little hope of surviving. In most cases, treatment given to persons after they have been exposed will cause them to build an immunity from the vaccine prior to coming down with rabies.

A person may be bitten and the virus may remain dormant for a number of years, although most mammals contract the disease within six months of the exposure.

If you are bitten by an animal, the Texas Department of Health Zoonosis Control Division recommends following these steps. They may save your life.

Quickly and thoroughly wash the bite with soap and water. Rinse it well. Put alcohol or iodine on it to kill The doctor will decide if you need treatment to prevent rabies.

Describe the animal that bit you the kind, size and color - to the doctor or animal control officer. Tell children to get help from a policeman, school crossing guard or other adult. Try to locate the animal or keep track of it if you know where it lives. Remember what it looked like.

The local health authority needs to have the biting dog or cat tested for rabies or quarantined for 10 days. If the quarantined dog or cat is alive 10 days after the bite, it could not have given you rabies.

Biting skunks, bats, foxes, coyotes and raccoons must be tested for rabies. If you are bitten by another kind of animal, the local health authority will decide if it needs to be tested or observed for rabies.

It is important that everyone, especially children, know how to prevent rabies. Dogs and cats should be vaccinated by a veterinarian every year. This is the law. Keeping your pets vaccinated protects you and them. Restrain your pets; do not allow them to roam.

Avoid contact with wild animals and with dogs and cats you do not know. Do not approach strange dogs or cats. Do not try to hand-feed wild animals and do not keep them as pets. Do not touch sick or injured animals. Call and report them to the Sheriff's Office so they may contact animal





vices Division. "As a result, homicide is no longer one of the 10 leading obstructive pulmonary diseases) 6,696 causes of death for all Texas residents. deaths It is, however, the seventh and eighth leading cause among African-Amerideaths. Pneumonia and influenza, cans and Hispanics respectively," he

Deaths due to chronic liver disease and cirrhosis increased 4.3 percent in 1997, moving from 10th in 1996 to the ninth leading cause of death. Also increasing were deaths due to diabetes mellitus and pneumonia and influenza. New in 10th spot is sep-

The majority of deaths (28.4 percent) in 1997 to people ages 1 to 44 were due to accidents. Cancer was responsible for 12.9 percent of all deaths in this age group, and HIV claimed the lives of another 5.4 per-

"The infant mortality rate of 6.4 infant deaths per 1,000 live births is very near the all-time low for the state, which occurred in 1996," Pollard said. Q: Is it legal for a doctor to

A: A Texas law prohibits obtaining or possessing dangerous drugs frauduently or by forgery. By extension, a physician would probably be in violation of that statute if he prescribed knowingly for a fictitious name. In addition, federal law makes it a criminal act for anyone, including a physician, to false information.

Q: Some time ago I had a lawyer draw up my will. I'm pleased with the job he did, but I object to a line of the document that named him the Executor. I did not tell him to do that. I can't afford another lawyer. Can I delete this statement before a notary who sees me sign it? Will this hold up in court?

A: If the document has not been executed, that is - signed ask your lawyer to make the necessary changes. You should not attempt to change the will by marking or erasing on it. There are formal procedures to change a part of a will.





The Railroad Commission of Texas issued a total of 536 original drilling permits in January compared to 1,047 in January 1998. Total drilling permits for 1999 year to date is 536, down from 1,047 recorded during the same period in 1998. The January total included 330 permits to drill new oil and gas wells, 13 to re-enter existing well bores, and 184 for recompletions.

Permits issued in January included 152 oil, 161 gas, 208 oil and gas, 9 injection and 6 other permits.

In January operators reported 132 oil, 315 gas, 13 injection and two other completions, compared to 503 oil, 393 gas, 32 injection and three other completions during the same month of last year.

Operators reported 700 holes plugged, 79 dry holes in January compared to 584 plugged and 151 dry DIST, #7C holes during the same period last year.



The Court has authority in this suit to render an order in the child's interest which will be binding upon you, including the termination of the parent-child relationship, the determination of paternity, and the appointment of a conservator with authority to consent to the child's


