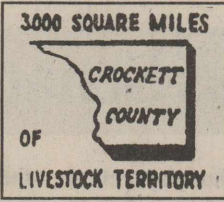

Trustees review construction bids in special meeting

In a special meeting that was held on Thursday, Feb. 18, members of the Ozona School Board reviewed and discussed bids received for the renovation of Ozona Middle School, Ozona Middle School Gymnasium, and Davidson Gymnasium.

Two bids were received for the renovation project. Mid-Tex Construction Company in Midland submitted a bid of \$3,663,000.00, and Sun-West Construction Company in Lubbock submitted a bid of \$3,484,404.00. Both bids included three alternates requested for consideration by the school board.

Alternate number one includes all work related to a new covered walk between the middle school classroom building and the middle school gymnasium. The covered walk would include new concrete footings and walkway, new steel columns and beams, reworking existing hand railings, new exposed roof structure, new metal roof matching the classroom building, new electric light and power services, and new light fixtures.

Alternate number two includes all work related to the installation of a new air-conditioning and heating system in Davidson Gymnasium and the removal of selected existing equipment that would no longer be needed in the gym after the new system is installed. It also includes replacing all exterior single pane windows with new tinted insulated pane windows, sealing of joints at windows, and

painting existing painted surfaces disturbed by the work.

Alternate number three includes all appliances called for the new concession area of Davidson Gymnasium.

The \$3,663,000.00 bid from Mid-Tex Construction listed a substantial completion time of 180 calendar days from receiving a notice to proceed, while the \$3,484,404.00 bid from Sun-West Construction Company included a reduction of \$42,750.00 if the contract time was extended to 214 days from notice to proceed.

The consensus of the board was to continue to include alternates two and three in the total bid and delete alternate number one for a savings of \$68,240 in addition to the \$42,750.00 bid reduction for the extension of time requested by Sun-West. The trustees also requested Larry Harvey, district architect, to examine the project's plans to determine if another \$100,000 in cost reductions, possibly in regard to air conditioning the middle school gymnasium that was included in the original bid, could be deleted from the project cost.

At the conclusion of all of the board's deliberations regarding bids on the renovation project, the trustees voted unanimously to approve the low bid of Sun-West Construction Company provided that the district architect can negotiate with the company for a total bid amount not to exceed \$3,273,414. The additional cost above the \$2,965,000.00 bond issue approved by local voters on Aug. 22 will be paid for out of the district's fund balance.

"Now that it looks as if we will not have access to the Ozona Middle School Main Building until around the first or second week in October, we can begin to plan more closely as to what we need to do to accommodate our middle school students during their first six to eight weeks of school next year," Superintendent Larry Taylor said. "As you know, shortly after the Aug. 22 passage of our bond issue, members of the Crockett County Convention Center Board of Directors contacted me to express their willingness to help the school district and our middle school students in any way that they could, and I am deeply grateful to them. They have graciously cleared their convention center calendar during the months of August, September, and October so that if we needed it, their facility would be available to us," he said.

"At this time our plans are to set up a mini-campus at that site and also move five of our portable classroom buildings over there so that we can distribute the students more evenly. Mr. Floyd (middle school principal) and his staff have said to me many times that they and their middle school students will make anything work, and I have full confidence that they can and will with our help and planning," Taylor added.

During the meeting the trustees went into executive session to conduct their annual evaluation of Superintendent Taylor. Emerging out of executive session, Taylor presented a report on upcoming basketball playoff games and reminded the members that the March regular board meeting would be held on March 16 at 7:00 p.m.

Blood donors are asked to bring identification, such as a UBS donor card or driver's license. Donors are also asked to know the name of any medication they are taking.

Luce recognized for promotion of reading performance

A local principal has been cited for outstanding performance in reading education, The Institute for Academic Excellence announced.

Marilyn A. Luce, who works at Ozona Primary School, was awarded Reading Renaissance Model School certification by the Madison, WI, based Institute. Model School certification indicates that her efforts to adopt Reading Renaissance methods school-wide have resulted in measurable increases in student reading performance.

Local drug dog dies

Crockett County's drug dog, Shark, became ill Feb. 19 and had to be put to sleep the following Tuesday, said Nick Richter, drug task force officer. Shark was taken to Ozona Veterinary Clinic and remained there over the weekend before being taken to Texas A&M. He was diagnosed with a congenital heart lesion. A blood clot had gone from his heart to the brain, Richter said.

The dog had not been in service

for approximately two months due to lack of a handler, but was scheduled to go back to work soon.

Shark, who was purchased in part through donations from the community, was warranted for a year, but that time had expired. District Attorney Ori White has offered to help purchase another dog, Richter said. If the company will honor the warranty on Shark, that firm will be used. If not, there are other possible sources for dogs.

Amy Carroll joins DPS communications team

New DPS dispatcher Amy Carroll has been on the job three months. The decision to seek the job was made after long and careful consideration. In fact, the position was open more than once before she decided to apply.

"We didn't jump into it lightly," she said.

Amy's husband, Monte Carroll, is a DPS trooper.

They also consulted their four daughters as part of the decision making process. Michelle 12, Vanessa 11, Amber 9 and Victoria 5 were in favor of Mom trying for the job.

The newest dispatcher refers to herself as "an Army brat". Her schooling was in Germany and El Paso. "I said I'd never marry anyone in the military, and I married a Marine," she said with a grin.

The Carrolls came to Ozona last spring from San Saba. Amy was employed there at the San Saba State School Juvenile Youth Facility, and she worked at Ozona National Bank

for eight months before becoming a DPS dispatcher.

"We love Ozona," said Amy. She also likes crafts, cross stitching, bicycling and soccer. She and Monte have coached soccer and are happy to see it gaining support in Ozona.

"I would also like to pledge the judicial use as a concerned taxpayer of taxpayers' monies essential to the educational needs of the district to support, maintain and upgrade as needed.

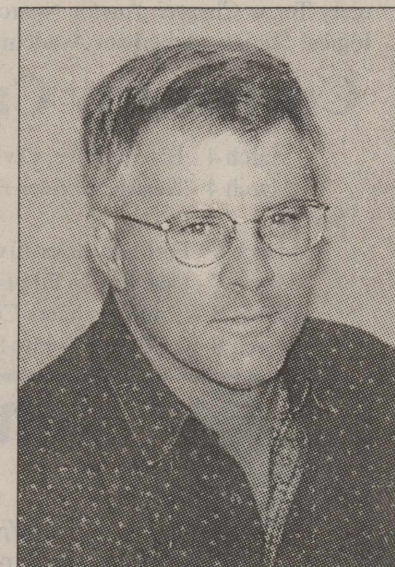

Texas Senate Review

AUSTIN--On Thursday, Feb. 26, the Senate voted in favor of giving small businesses in Texas a tax break. Committee Substitute for Senate Bill (CSSB) 148 exempts small businesses who have earnings up to \$100,000 annually from the state's franchise tax. Those businesses would also be exempt from the reporting requirement Senator Mario Gallegos Jr. of Glensia Park sponsored a floor amendment requiring the Comptroller of Public Accounts to watch and report on the progress of the tax break and whether the money is returned to the State of Texas in the form of economic prosperity and job growth. Bill sponsor Senator Troy Fraser of Horseshoe Bay says he expects 28,000 businesses to benefit at a price tag to the state of \$57 million for the next biennium.

Senator Gonzalo Barrientos of Austin supported the bill but questioned the priorities of the Legislature this session. He said he would like to direct attention to other issues like child care. Barrientos held a press conference to announce legislation providing a franchise tax credit to companies that provide child care for their employees.

Senator Teel Bivins of Amarillo continued to push education legislation through the Senate this week. He sponsored CSSB 345, passed on Monday, Feb. 22, which authorizes institutions of higher education to charge students more money for taking more than 45 hours on top of minimum degree requirements for the degree a student is pursuing.

The Senate dealt with nursing facility issues on both the floor and in committee this week. The Senate passed CSSB 19 by Laredo Senator Judith Zaffirini on Tuesday, Feb. 23, creating a one-year probationary license for nursing facility owners who previously have not conducted business in the state. Senator Mike Moncrief of Fort Worth also addressed the problem of a growing elderly population and a growing nursing home industry. "Our population of elderly is going to explode in the next ten years and Texas is not ready for that." Legislation he sponsored to prepare Texas for these issues passed out of the Committee on Health Services this week.

The Senate also passed an emergency appropriations bill, CSSB 472 with \$94 million price tag. The Senate allotted money for child protective services, teacher training for the social promotion initiative, drought relief, oyster testing, and other programs in the legislation sponsored by Senate Finance Committee Chair Bill Ratliff of Mount Pleasant.

In committee action this week,

the Committee on Natural Resources passed Senate Bill (SB) 262, as amended on Tuesday, Feb. 23, relating to the reimbursement of landowners or developers prior to annexation of a water-related special district. If a municipality, with a population of less than 1.5 million does not reimburse landowners or developers prior to the effective date of annexation, the sum will collect penalties and interest. The only city that would currently be affected by the measure is the City of Austin. The Senate Criminal Justice Committee heard testimony this week on legislation intended to protect victims of domestic violence and increase the penalties for abusers, sponsored by Senator Jane Nelson of Flower Mound.

Other legislation passed this week in the Senate include:

Committee Substitute for Senate Joint Resolution (CSSJR) 15 by Harris proposes a constitutional amendment to legitimize the giving of consent by an incapacitated spouse regarding transactions in connection with a homestead; CSSB 46 by Carona, creating a criminal offense for the fraudulent use of possession of identifying information. SB 85 by Carona, revising the Texas Business and Commerce Code concerning letters of credit; CSSB 99 by Carona, protecting health care workers who are accidentally exposed to a patient's blood or bodily fluids by allowing hospitals to test for hepatitis B or hepatitis C without the patient's consent; SB 397 by Zaffirini, which requires public or private health and human services organizations that receive state funds to provide information about their services to the Texas Information and Referral Network; CSSB 166 by Carona, requiring landlords to re-key the lock of a dwelling before a tenant takes possession of a property; SB 97 by Harris, creates the Public Employees Long Term Board and allows all public employees to purchase long-term care insurance through the pool; and CSSB 382 by Duncan, modifying the present law requiring that state agencies give reasoned justification for rules they adopt.

In observation of Texas Independence Day next week, Waco Senator David Sibley read a letter written Feb. 24, 1836 by Colonel William Barrett Travis, Commander of the Alamo, into the Senate Journal. In his famous letter, Travis made a call for help "To the people of Texas and All Americans in the World" that ended with the famous salutation "Victory or Death." The 163rd Texas Independence Day will be celebrated on Tuesday, March 2, 1999.

Dr. Fox completed M.D./Ph.D. degrees through the Medical Scientist Training Program at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. He was awarded his Doctorate in Immunology in 1987. Dr. Fox has been involved as a member of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society-Texas Chapter, Austin Neurological Society, American Academy

of Neurology, Texas Medical Association and of the Travis County Medical Association. Dr. Fox currently has two practices in Round Rock and another office in Austin.

The topics discussed will include symptom management, drug research information, immediate treatment consensus, how to become a team with your doctor, urological problems and control, sexual solutions, emotions, coping skills, depression. As well as how to become an advocate with your medical caretakers by being "in the know" about your disease, and learning about what can help you have a higher quality of life. Letter to the Editor

In reference to the Feb. 10th article of the commissioners intent to pay Domingo Perez, a fulltime county employee, \$50 for each abandoned car removed from town and to spend \$3500 to fence his private property. This property known as Mingo's Salvage.

They failed to mention that county employees use county equipment to haul old refrigerators, freezers, stoves and ect. and pile it up on this property. We home owners next to it refer to it as the Ozona Monument.

According to county records, from Jan. 95 through Dec. 98 taxpayers paid Mr. Perez \$10,200 for removal of 204 cars. Eddy Moore told me he had a list of 60 cars to be moved (\$3,000).

These are not the same cars taken care of by the on duty towing service. They handle cars abandoned on state and county roadways as well as cars impounded by law enforcement agencies.

So where do these cars come from?

As a result of our complaints to several state agencies all county activity has temporarily halted at this site.

According to Judge Sutton, Mr. Perez has applied for his state license to operate a salvage yard, D.P.S. Dept. of Auto Theft will inventory the site so he may obtain titles to salvage or sell parts. There is no license to remove contaminants. He said if all this can be worked out the commissioners could go on as planned.

This item is on the agenda for the March 8th commissioners court.

Crockett County taxpayers might want to look in on this. See you there.

"The kitchen is the family room in our home," says Camille Jones. "Preparing and sharing food from there is one of the great pleasures of my life. Be it for family, friends or guests, the reward is twofold; the making of the meal and seeing it eaten with hearty appetites."

Fourth generation Texas cook Camille Jones has always considered cooking as recreation. It turned into a family affair at their home. "Brock bosses, Margaret washes, Brock (III) and I do the cooking," she said.

Camille likes working with natural foods, a trait she learned from her mother, the late Emma Adams. Camille taught cooking for two years at Bon Appétit in Austin. Now she enjoys planning menus with Wesley Nurse E. A. Wadsworth for the Food for Thought luncheon each month at Ozona United Methodist Church. Food for Thought is held the third Thursday of each month from 11:30 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. The entire community is invited to come by for a meal and a five minute devotional given by Rev. Nancy Mossman.

Joining in the project to cook and clean up after the meal are Vickie Black, Georgia Kirby and Cheryl Whitesides.

Camille has served as president of Ozona Chamber of Commerce, has been a member of the civic center board and is an Ozona Garden Club member and teaches Sunday School at Ozona Methodist Church. She is in her second year on the regional advisory council to the Texas Tech University Health Services Center - Permian Basin. TTUHSCPB is "a very active force here," she commented, and the continued improvement of health services in rural West Texas communities is a goal being worked toward.

After 10 years as a co-owner of The Teacher Store, Camille enjoys being home and being a homemaker. Her husband, Brock, who is district judge, enjoys having a hot meal when he gets home at night. He has been on the bench for more than 20 years and is 112th District judge, an area which includes Crockett, Sutton, Reagan, Upton and Pecos counties. They make their home at their ranch south of Ozona.

Camille "loves music, loves to dance" and also loves to go to the lake and water ski. None of these activities compare, however, to the long walks and horseback rides with grandson Cuatro who is 4. Cuatro loves roasting marshmallows on a campfire and cooking on the grill with Nana and Dad Dad.

"We need to really cherish our sense of community," says Camille. "The strong sense of community and extended family that we have here is very important. You do not have that kind of community caring in the city."

Venison Meat Loaf in Sour Cream Pastry

This is Brock's favorite. It can be frozen and baked later.

Processor Pastry

Purchased frozen puff pastry may be used, or to make your own:

- 2 1/4 c. unbleached flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 12 T frozen unsalted butter cut into 1/2 inch pieces
- 1 egg
- 1/2 c. sour cream

With chopper blade in place, place flour, salt, butter in workbowl of processor. Process 30 seconds. Add

remaining ingredients, process until mixture "chases" itself around bowl. Divide into two flat pieces. Wrap one in plastic wrap and refrigerate one hour. Roll remaining half into 6" by 14" rectangle, place on buttered cookie sheet. Roll the other half into 6" by 14" rectangle. Roll extra dough into narrow strips and reserve.

Meat Filling

- 5 T unsalted butter
- 1/2 lb. fresh mushrooms, chopped finely
- 3 lbs. or 4 cups finely ground backstrap or boned venison ham (a combination of cooked leftovers, beef, pork and venison is good, too)
- 1 med. yellow onion, finely chopped
- 1 1/2 c. fresh parsley, finely chopped
- 2 c. sharp cheddar, grated
- 1 egg mixed with 2 T milk

Sauté onions and mushrooms in butter. Add meat. If uncooked, sauté until it loses red color. If cooked, sauté until butter is absorbed.

Place in large bowl, add parsley and cheese, mix well. Shape into loaf on the rolled out pastry.

Brush edges of pastry with milk/egg mixture. Place other pastry sheet on top, seal edges with tines of fork. Decorate loaf with strips of dough. Brush with egg/milk mixture. The dish may be frozen at this point.

If baking, bake at 375 degrees for 45 minutes or until pastry is golden brown. Serve with sour cream. Makes 8-10 servings.

Posolé

- 2 T canola oil
- 5 qts liquid. May use all chicken broth (non-fat) or half water and half broth
- 3 1/2 lbs. dried posolé or four 15 oz. cans hominy, drained and rinsed
- 4 to 5 lbs. pork. Cheaper cuts are fine, but trim off all fat. Cut into bite sized pieces
- 3 med. diced onions
- 1 pod roasted garlic
- Juice of 6 limes

Cover and soak dried posolé overnight. Heat oil in skillet, add pork and onion, cook until pork is slightly crispy, about 25 minutes. Drain posolé and add pork, onion, garlic and broth. Bring to boil then simmer until posolé is quite tender, approximately 4 hours. May season with 2 T ground red chili and lime juice to taste.

Garnish: chopped cilantro, chopped green onion, shredded cabbage, lime wedges, crumbled Queso Fresco cheese, sliced radishes. These garnishes add flavor and also color to the posolé.

Serve in small bowls placed around posolé. Serves 24.

This is a New Year's Day tradition at the Jones house.

Roasted Garlic

When roasted, fresh garlic loses the "hot" taste.

- 1 or 2 large pods of garlic
- 1 tsp. olive or canola oil
- Pinch of salt
- 1/4 c. water

Without peeling, cut non-stem end off of garlic. Place in garlic roaster or Pyrex pie plate, sprinkle with oil and salt. Add water and cover. Cover with foil if using pie pan.

Bake at 350 degrees 30 minutes, uncover and bake 15 more minutes. To use, just squeeze it out. If there are leftovers, it keeps about a week in refrigerator.

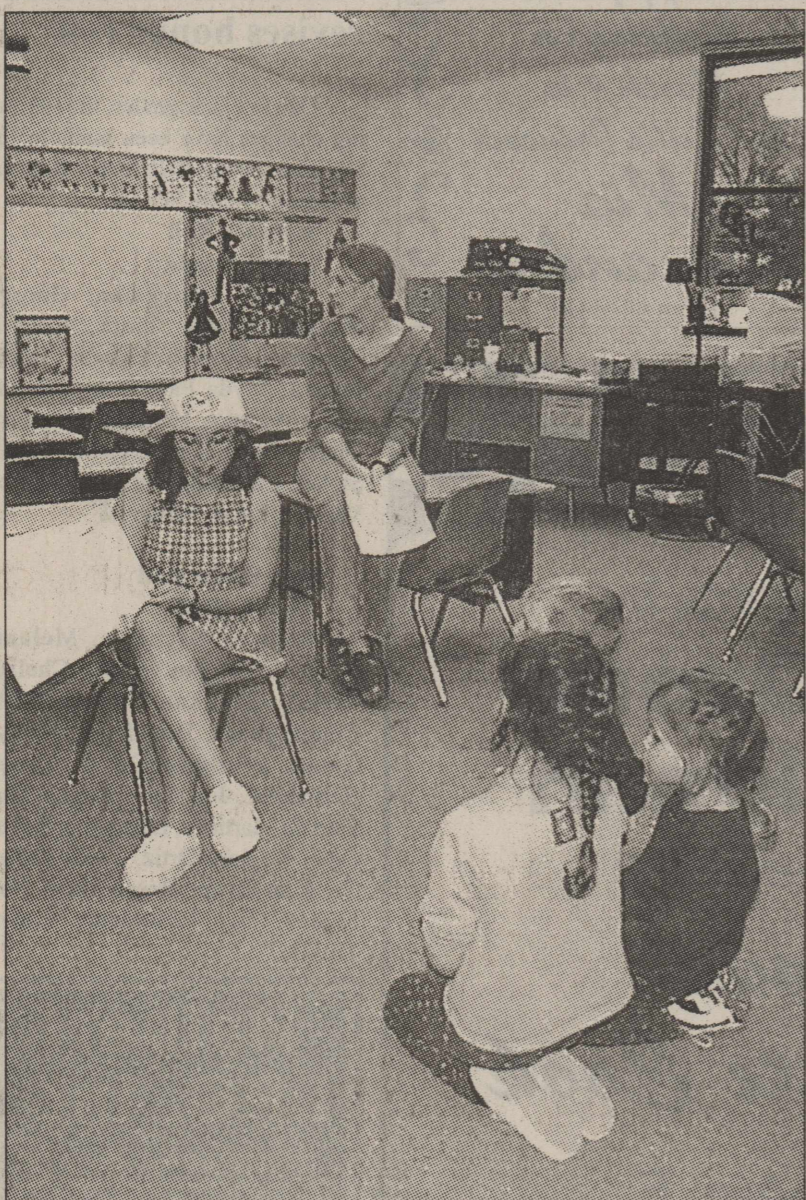

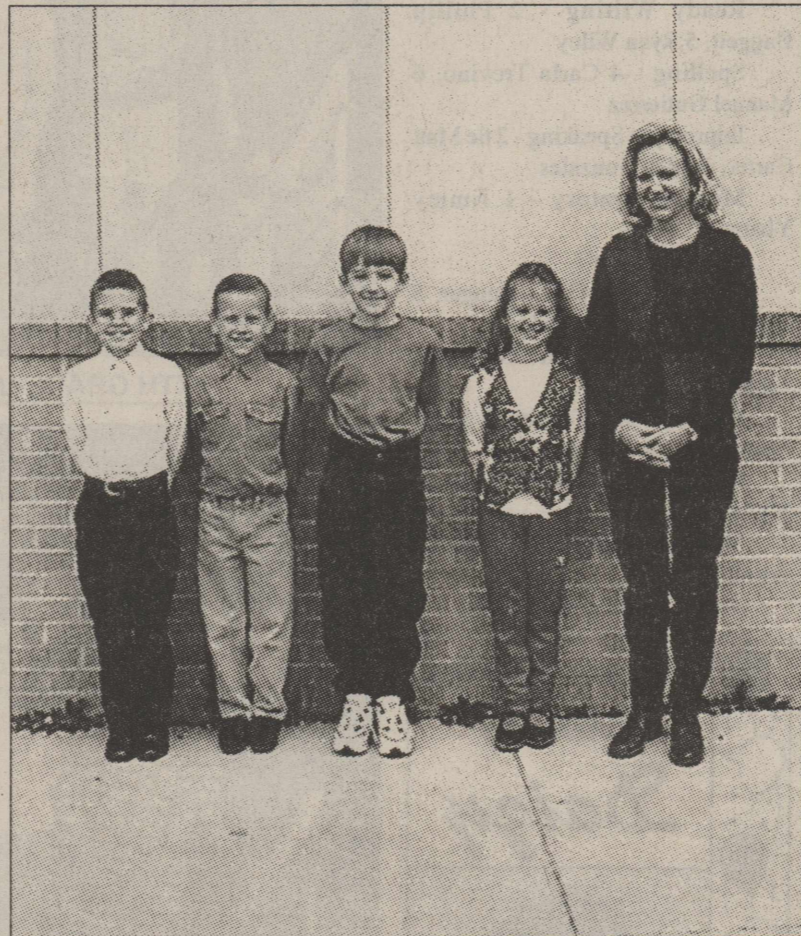
Primary students compete in UIL contests

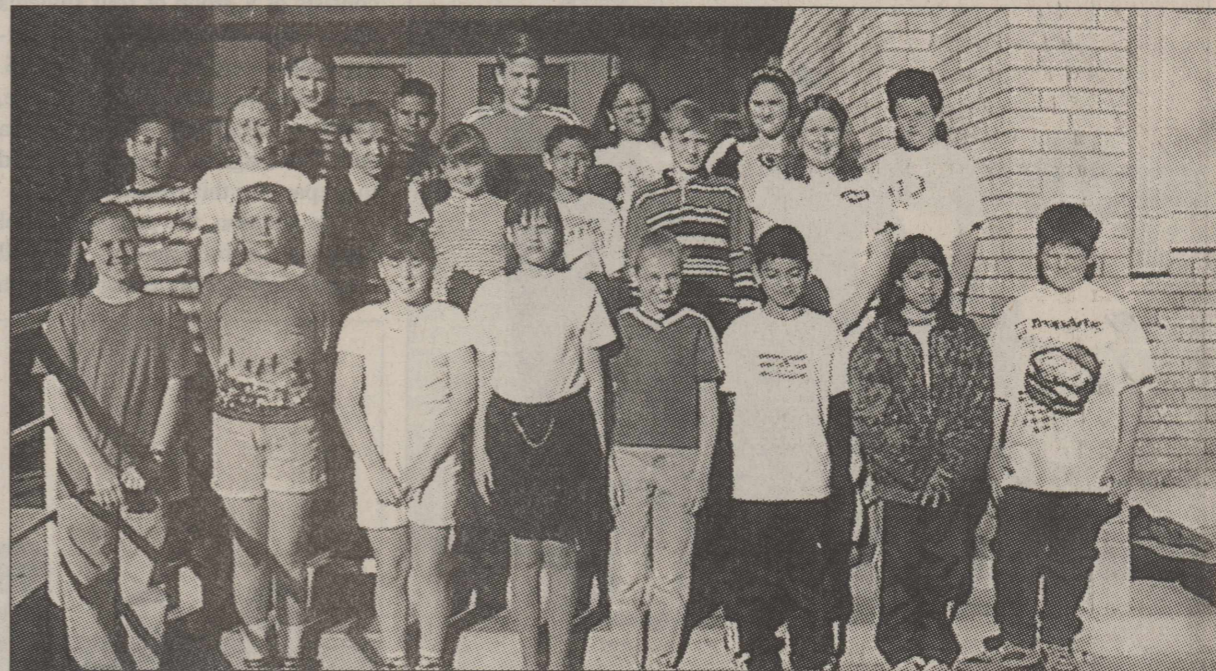

Four new gas wells have been brought on line in the Ozona Field, Crockett County, by Pioneer Natural Resources.
New producers include:
--No. 12 Hoover "49", 26.8 miles southwest of Ozona, 449,000 CF gas daily on 1.375-in. choke.
--No. 10 Moody "37", 25 miles southwest of Ozona, 126,000 CFD on a 48/64 choke.
--No. 12 Hoover "44", 25.8 miles southwest of Ozona, 150,000 CFD on a 1.25-in. choke.
--No. 15 Hoover "49", 26.8 miles southwest of Ozona, 307,000 CFD on a 1.25-in. choke.

Open flow ratings were calculated at 486,000, 139,000, 194,000 and 307,000 CFD on absolute open flow, respectively.
All four producing from the Canyon Sand, the wells have production intervals ranging from 6,200 to 7,330 feet into the wellbore.

The Hunt-Baggett Field gained new production when the No. 4 McMullen "36" was brought on line seven miles south of Ozona. Pioneer Natural Resources is the operator. The well flowed 583,000 CF gas per day on a 1.25-in. choke and was given a 614,000-CFD rating on open flow.
It probed to total depth of 9,192 feet and was perforated for Strawn Formation pay. The production interval is at 8,658 to 8,687 feet into the hole.

A potent new gas well has been completed in Crockett County's Brown-Bassett Field about 39 miles southwest of Ozona.
The well is designated as the No. 1 Mitchell "107", with Altura Energy as the operator. It flowed 1,629,000 CF gas per day on a 1.625-in. choke. It earned a 2,193,000-CFD evaluation on open flow.
Altura took the well to total depth of 14,570 feet, but perforated for production in the Ellenburger Formation, 12,994 to 14,570 feet into the wellbore.

Enron Oil and Gas has driven stake for an 8,500-ft. developmental bid in the M.P.I. Field, Crockett County, about 16 miles south of Big Lake. It will be known as the No. 2 Powell "56", and will be seeking production in the Ellenburger Formation. Location is in a 692-acre lease in the J. Bonta Survey A-3570.

The Ozona Field will see more developmental action when the No. 111 Sutton is spudded about 18 miles southwest of Ozona. It is under permit for 6,500 feet of hole. Location is in a 2,880-acre lease assembly in the GC&SFRR Survey A-3135. Tamarack Petroleum Co. of Midland will be the operator.

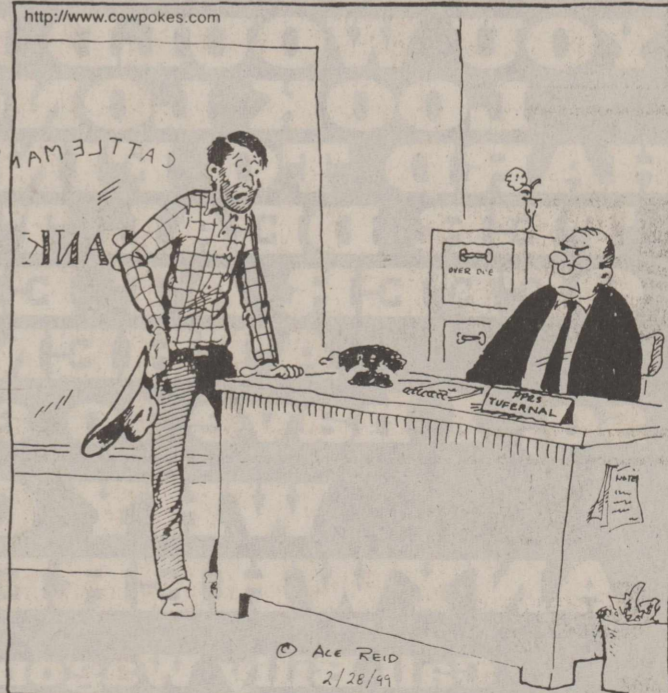
