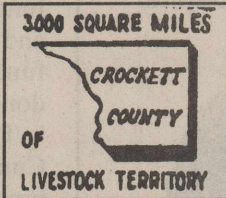

The program is free to the public and a light lunch will be provided.

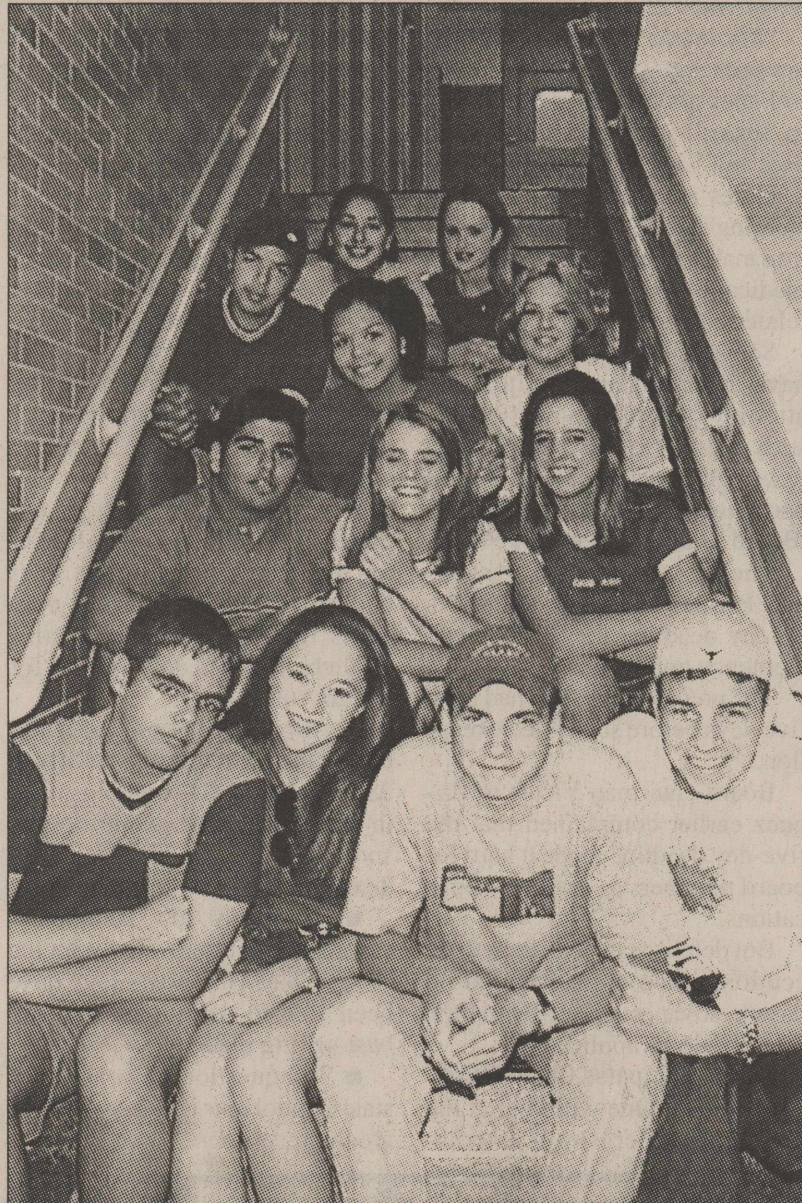

### Serviceman's widow to attend ceremony

The children of Cpt. Dean A. Wadsworth will be joined by their mother, Barbara McCarty of Devine, at a burial ceremony for the captain in Arlington National Cemetery. Kenny Wadsworth was notified last week by Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison's office that the government will pay expenses for Mrs. McCarty as well as those of her children.

Cpt. Wadsworth was shot down in Vietnam in 1963. The site where his plane crashed was excavated in May of 1995, and after tests, part

of the human remains found there were proved to be of Cpt. Wadsworth.

Any unidentified remains are to be buried in Arlington in a group grave, and this is the ceremony his family will attend. Mrs. McCarty was initially denied government assistance with the expenses of the trip because she had remarried. Her son, Kenny Wadsworth, had contacted the offices of his congressmen about the situation.

No date has been set for the Arlington interment. There will be a family service on May 2 in Moore.

## New boys' head basketball coach..... Mayberry new on OHS staff

Ron Mayberry joined the Ozona High School faculty April 6 as head boys' basketball coach and biology teacher. Mayberry has a background which includes 30 years of coaching and teaching at both the high school and college levels.

During his 15 years in secondary schools, he has worked at Odessa Permian, Hereford, Albany, Midland High, Van, Adrian, Robert Lee and Stanton.

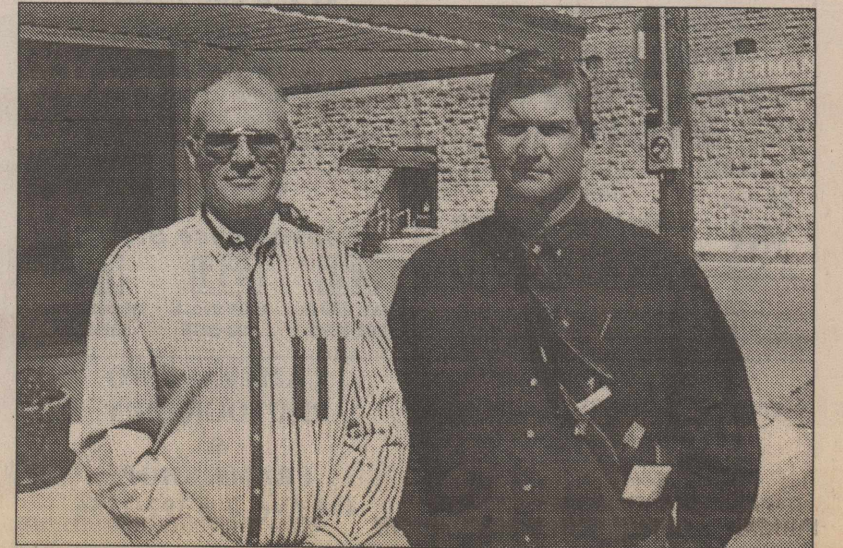
Mayberry has coached seven NBA players, more than any other junior college coach. His college coaching/teaching career includes Odessa College, Midland College, Waylan Baptist University, Kilgore College and South Plains College. At South Plains he was also associate dean of student affairs for 10 years. Mayberry was assistant administrator in the work force department and head of the kinesiology department at Howard College.

While achieving a 727-265 career record, Mayberry was head coach of a state championship high school golf team, and head coach of a state championship junior college men's basketball team. He was assistant coach of a state championship high school football team. He coached teams into the playoffs 17 straight years and was selected District Coach of the Year 11 times.

Mayberry was selected Coach of the Year at the state level three times, the only male coach to receive the award three consecutive years. He was also selected Coach of the Year at the national level, and has coached the Texas All Star game twice.

Coach Mayberry has conducted basketball clinics and camps in the Canary Islands, Spain and Caracas, Venezuela.

The Amarillo native earned a bachelor of science degree in biology and physical education at Texas Christian University in Fort Worth. His master's of education is from West Texas A&M University at Canyon.

Mayberry resigned from Robert Lee last year after being diagnosed with cancer. He later learned that he did not have cancer and now feels that he has a new lease on life.

Coach Mayberry is filled with enthusiasm for his work and anxious to begin. "I'm getting started right now all over again," he said. "I've got a whole new life I'm starting, and I'm ready to do what I love to do, coach

and teach. I'm here because I want to give back something to kids. I have a passion for coaching and teaching."

Ron Mayberry and his wife, Jeany, have three daughters: Kim, who teaches in Carlsbad, NM; Mendi, a probation officer in San Angelo, and Marcy, a senior at Angelo State University. Mrs. Mayberry currently teaches kindergarten at Harris Avenue Baptist Church in San Angelo.

**AUSTIN** — The private board that manages \$12.5 billion in public university money has agreed to be more open about its high-risk investments.

The University of Texas Investment Management Co. on March 30 told the House Appropriations Committee it will name all principals and disclose annual rates of return when making future investments with riskier private firms.

UTIMCO also said it will ask private firms to which public university funds already are committed for permission to disclose the information.

"That goes a long way toward addressing my concerns. This will provide some comfort as to how public funds are being managed," state Rep. Sylvester Turner, a member of the Appropriations Committee, was quoted by the *Austin American-Statesman*.

Turner, D-Houston, earlier had criticized UTIMCO's confidentiality policy. He was responding to a *Houston Chronicle* article citing alleged conflicts of interest involving UTIMCO chairman Tom Hicks, a Dallas investor who recently completed a six-year term as a UT System regent.

The article said Hicks had directed \$252 million to private funds run by business associates and friends and \$205 million to funds run by major Republican donors, the article said.

UT System Chancellor William Cunningham, one of UTIMCO's nine board members, said he was confident no conflicts of interest occurred.

**Lawsuit-Squelching Bill OKed**

Local governments would be unable to sue the sellers and makers of firearms under legislation approved last week by the Texas Senate in a 22-7 vote.

"My intent is to stop frivolous lawsuits and make sure gun control does not become a local issue in Texas," said the bill's author, Sen. Jon Lindsay, R-Houston.

Cities in other states are considering suing gun and ammunition makers and sellers to recover medical costs and other expenses related to gun violence.

Senators voting against the bill have argued against limiting the attorney general's power to file such a lawsuit, and pointed out that it was good there was no lawsuit ban shielding tobacco companies.

**Board Changes Clemency Policy**

The Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles last week enacted a 21-day deadline for the filing of clemency applications.

The previous deadline had been five days before scheduled execution.

Board chairman Victor Rodriguez earlier complained that the five-day deadline made it hard for board members to evaluate applications.

But defense lawyers argued executions often are scheduled 30 days in advance, giving them little time to file an application.

**Airport Anticipates Clinton Visit**

Air Force One will land at the new Austin-Bergstrom International Airport in mid-April.

President Bill Clinton will be the first person to tour the Barbara Jordan Passenger Terminal.

The president also will appear at an Austin fund-raiser to help retire the gubernatorial campaign debt of his friend and former Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, who lost a 1998 bid to unseat Gov. George W. Bush.

There they will find a 3-D, interactive replica of the \$115 million Barbara Jordan Passenger Terminal. The real thing is to open in May.

■ Last week, after completing a performance review of the El Paso Independent School District, state Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander said, "I am going to be the education watchdog for the people of Texas, seeing to it that more of every education dollar goes directly into the classroom where it belongs."

■ Republican legislators say there is growing support for shaving the state's 6.25 percent sales tax rate. Democrats raised concerns that important programs might be whittled down to pay for the tax cut.

■ About 40 people gathered before the state Capitol on March 28 to protest NATO bombing raids in Yugoslavia. The gathering was sponsored by the University of Texas Anti-War Committee.

■ Almost 40,000 specialty license plates emblazoned with the Texas A&M University logo have been sold to date, making it the best-selling plate.

■ The question most asked of state Capitol tour guides is "Where are the restrooms?"

## Texas wildscapes provide native backyard habitat

Before the spring planting urge hits, gardening and outdoor enthusiasts are encouraged to contact Texas Parks and Wildlife for tips on creating a wildscape.

Texas wildscapes are small habitats that provide the three essential ingredients for a variety of wildlife—food, water and shelter. This can be as simple as providing feeders, bird-baths and nest boxes for birds, or as elaborate as restoring native vegetation. The goal is to provide places for birds, small mammals and other wildlife to feed and drink, escape from predators and raise their young.

"Wildscapes is an innovative habitat restoration plan for rural and urban areas," according to Kelly Bender, Wildscapes coordinator for TPW. "They allow people to contribute to wildlife conservation by developing habitats where they live or work."

For a step-by-step guide on how to create a backyard wildscape, order the "Designing a Wildscape" guide, available through TPW for a \$2 donation. The guide provides clear and easy-to-understand steps in creating a landscape inviting to birds, butterflies and other wild visitors. It contains diagrams of a landscape in progress, plant placement diagrams, tips for installing and maintaining your wildscape, and a Texas native plants list.

Backyard wildlife enthusiasts may also take part in the "Texas Wildscapes" program and receive a larger information packet for \$15.

Participants in the Wildscapes program will receive a packet of information about gardening for wildlife, which includes the "Designing a Wildscape" guide, "The Backyard Naturalists" book from the National Wildlife Federation, a pamphlet on building bird feeders and nest boxes and a color pamphlet on Texas native ornamental trees.

The packet also includes guides on gardening for butterflies, hummingbirds, seed and insect-eating birds and an extensive list of plants that are native to your area's vegetation.

An application for certifying your site as an official Texas Wildscape is included in the packet. Once the application is approved, the applicant will receive a backyard sign, personalized certificate, and registration with the Wildscapes program.

## Patsy White—Cook-of-the-Week

"I have shelves and shelves of cookbooks," said Patsy White, "and I enjoy just sitting down and reading them."

The cookbooks are just a starting point for this cook, however. She sometimes likes to make a few changes so the food will be more to her family's liking.

Patsy was reared on a farm in Tarrant County, near Brownfield. She earned a degree in education with a minor in communications from the University of Texas at El Paso.

In 1962, Patsy married Mark White of Ozona. They lived for 13 years in New Mexico, then moved to San Angelo. Although they have been in and out of Ozona for 37 years, Patsy and Mark officially made Ozona their home almost four years ago. Mark continues to have his insurance company in San Angelo and also ranches.

Both their children are married. K. Lynn and her husband, Mike Naugher, live in Dallas with their son, Justin. Ted and JoBeth make their home at Tulia with children Sierra and Sterling.

Patsy and Mark attend Ozona United Methodist Church where she sings in the choir. She is a member of Ozona Woman's Forum, Friends of the Library and the board of Crockett County Museum.

Patsy's broccoli and cheese soup had its origin two or three years ago when she didn't have time to stop for her favorite soup and salad at Chili's.

### Patsy's Broccoli/Cheese Soup

- 1 sm. can chicken
  - 1 jar Cheese Whiz (plain or jalapeño)
  - 2 cans tomato sauce and 1 can water (you can substitute 1 can Rotel for 1 can tomato sauce)
  - 1 box frozen broccoli, cooked in microwave
- Mix all together and heat thoroughly.

### Chocolate Pie

This recipe is from the Maids and Matrons Club Cookbook of Brownfield.

- Mix together:
  - 1 c. sugar
  - 3 T flour
  - 3 T cocoa
  - 2 eggs
  - 1 c. sweet milk

## Runner honors Bobbie Bryson

Rebecca Nieri, a 1992 graduate of Angelo Central High School, has always dreamed of running a marathon. She never knew that her first marathon experience would not only touch her life but others also.

Nieri is currently training for the May 27 Rock-N-Roll Marathon in San Diego, CA. But that is only part of the story. While training to run the 26.2 miles, she is also attempting to raise \$4,000.00 for the Leukemia Society.

"One day I received a flyer in the mail, I scanned it, and then put it in my 'to do' box with my bills and junk mail. Two weeks later I ran across the flyer again and decided to read it more thoroughly. The Gulf Coast Chapter of the Leukemia Society has a group called TNT, or Team in Training. The group provides us a running coach, a mentor and nutrition tips to train you for the run. In turn, the runner agrees to raise money for a worthwhile cause through sponsor donations. I didn't know the first thing about training for a marathon, so this was the perfect opportunity. I was so excited, I signed up immediately!"

It wasn't long before the miles started adding up. Nieri is currently running 14 miles on her longer runs - that's over halfway. The team in training group meets every weekend for long runs at a park in Houston where Nieri is currently working as a deaf education teacher for Aldine ISD.

"I knew this would be a great physical challenge, but I never considered the emotional aspects of it all," she said.

Nieri is running in honor of two very special leukemia patients, Taylor, a 7-year-old girl in Houston, and Bobbie Bryson, a student at Texas Tech.

"I really became more emotional about running after meeting Taylor and talking with Bobbie on the phone. Knowing the people I will help keeps me focused during training."

Nieri started a letter campaign in February, sending letters to friends and family. The response has been wonderful. Not only are people sending pledges, many are sending letters of encouragement and helpful tips. Rebecca, the daughter of Pete and Donna Nieri of San Angelo, and granddaughter of Maggie Moore of Ozona, is thankful for the support of her friends and family.

"People have been so supportive! I've almost reached my goal - just \$1,000.00 to go! Now I just need to stay healthy and run hard. My main goal is to finish strong, but most of all, I just want to have fun!"

ing behavior, including (in order): age (24 and under), smoking cigarettes, eating fast food at least two nights a week, driving more than 50 miles a day, going out at least one night a week, being single (never married).

The study revealed the following viewpoints on litter.

Texans incorrectly believe prisoners more than any other group are responsible for picking up litter from Texas roadsides.

82% were aware of the Adopt-a-Highway Program.

96% of all Texans are aware of the "Don't Mess with Texas" slogan and 91% want to see the Texas Department of Transportation continue the campaign to stop people from littering.

One in five Texans do not know the litter prevention meaning of the "Don't Mess with Texas" slogan, but many of them seem to think it has something to do with Texas pride or being macho.

## State spends \$980,987 in county on major programs

The state spent a total of \$980,987 last year for major welfare programs in Crockett County, according to Barbara Evans, regional administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

Food stamps worth \$223,322 were issued for the fiscal year which ended Aug. 31, while Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) totaled \$39,732. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eli-

gibility of potential clients and non-clients and issues the Lone Star Card.

The state and federal governments share in the cost of TANF to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both parents.

Nursing home costs of approximately \$468,825 were paid for aged and disabled residents. Community Care for Aged and Disabled spent \$162,836 for Medicaid related services and \$86,272 for non-Medicaid related services," Ms. Evans said.

In the sixth inning the Lions heated up their bats and scored three runs, and only allowed the Hawks one run in the top of the inning.

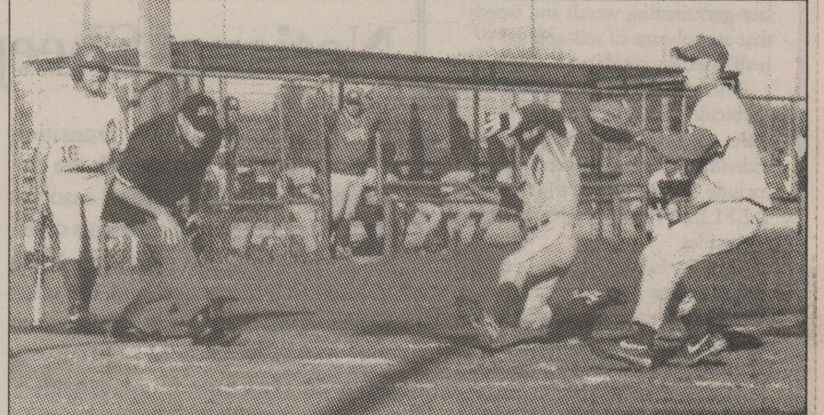
In the bottom of the seventh inning the Hawks scored only one run before shutting down the Lions winning the game 11-8.

The Lions are now 0-2 in district play and 6-8 for the season.

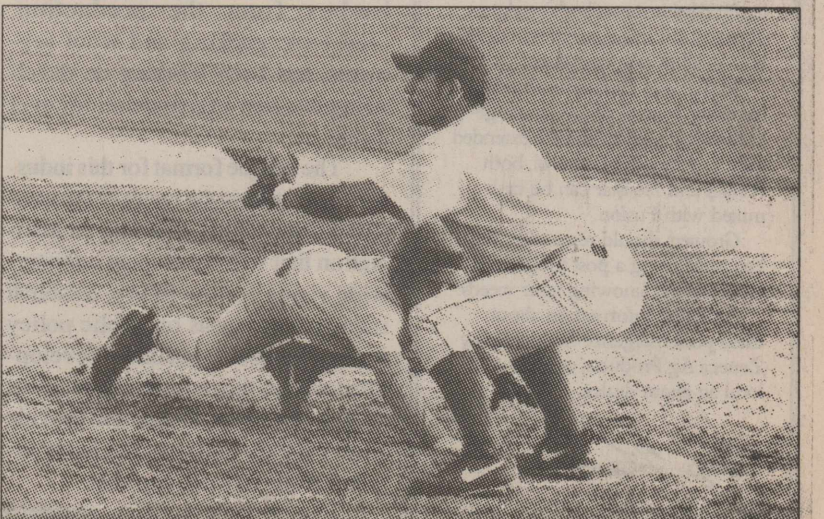

## Bob Turner's AG Trespass Bill clears Texas House

Legislation by State Representative Bob Turner, D-Voss, to give rural property owners swifter enforcement against trespassers got unanimous approval by the Texas House. The legislation is aimed at preventing nuisance trespass where people sightseeing, hunting or camping enter someone else's property without permission.

"With the growing interest of urbanites to drive through the country or float down the river has come an influx of people who don't seem to respect private property rights,"

Turner continues. "While we appreciate their patronage of our small towns, some need to learn that crossing a fence to pick wild flowers, take pictures or gather firewood is trespass. I hope HB 436 will provide us with the means of getting that point across by hitting them in the pocket book."

Under current law, trespass without a firearm is a Class B Misdemeanor which requires the law enforcement officer to actually arrest and process the violator. Also, the

person may not be released without having the court set bail. Rep. Turner feels this is a very burdensome and severe process for the officer and the trespasser considering such trespass is not a severe crime. Law enforcement officers have acknowledged the severity of the punishment for nuisance trespass by escorting the trespassers off the property and releasing them with a stern warning rather than arresting the person.

To make enforcement of trespass more practical, HB 436 makes trespassing on "agricultural land" a Class

C misdemeanor offense that is punishable by a fine up to \$500.00. If necessary, this offense could then be tried in a justice of the peace court. The real result of this change would allow a county to fine a trespassers without requiring a trial, similar to receiving a traffic ticket. Rural law enforcement officials feel this would help them deter trespassers on agri-

cultural lands by increasing enforcement of trespass law.

H.B. 436 is now headed for the Texas Senate where it must be approved before going to the Governor for his signature. State Senator Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, who serves as vice-chair of the Senate Criminal Justice Committee, will sponsor the bill in the Senate.

## Weekly Drilling and Completion Report

April 4, 1999

A 12,000-ft. Crockett County wildcat is scheduled for spudding about 22 miles south of Ozona. It has been designated as the No. 1 Michael, with J. D. Gas of Seabrook as the operator.

The venture is near existing pay in the Huppler Field. It is in a 640-acre drilling unit in the GC&SFRR Survey A-3804. Production in the Ellenburger Formation is the objective.

Union Pacific Resources has completed two new gas wells southwest of Ozona in Crockett County's Ozona Field.

New gasers include the No. 3 Henderson "B", located 12.5 miles southwest of Ozona and the No. 39 Montgomery about 11 miles southwest of the city.

The Henderson well flowed 483,000 CF gas per day when gauged on a 1.25-in. choke. It was given a 578,000-CFD rating on absolute open flow.

The Montgomery flowed 42,000 CFD on a half-inch choke and was evaluated at 48,000 CFD on open flow.

The wells bottomed at 7,100 and 6,900 feet, respectively. Production will range from 6,220 to 6,934 feet in the Canyon Sand.

Midland-based Enron Oil and Gas has staked location for a 6,300-ft. developmental bid in Crockett County's Simpson-Mann Field about 45 miles southwest of Ozona. It has been designated as the No. 21 M. K. Daniel "A".

Location is in a 3,601-acre lease in the I&GNRR Survey A-3993. Production in the Canyon Sand will be the target.

Crockett County's 19-year-old East Dudley Field gained new production when the No. 3301 Permer Ranch was completed 22.5 miles southwest of Ozona.

The field now has 14 active wells and recently passed the seven billion CF mark in cumulative gas production.

With Union Pacific Resources as the operator, the well was drilled horizontally a total of 10,923 feet. It will produce from the 8,892-ft. mark to hole's end.

It potentialized at 1,454,000 CF gas daily on a 1.75-in. choke. The absolute open flow rating came in at 1,843,000 CFD. Production is in the Devonian Age.

## National Sheep Association being developed

The Sheep Industry Transition Team is moving ahead with the development of a new national association that represents all segments of the sheep industry. According to Mike Caskey (MN), chairman of the transition team, "This new association will enable all parts of our industry from the farm gate to the consumer plant, to work together in helping members succeed within a sheep industry positioned for growth and profitability." The team, made up of leaders from the production, seedstock, packing and wool segments, has been working on developing this new organization for over a year.

The unique format for this industry association is the result of the transition team efforts to create an association that will develop an industry-wide vision for the future; establish industry consensus on public policy issues; facilitate business development within the industry; implement an industry strategic plan and provide ways for individuals and industry organizations to work together.

The transition team recently named a four member management board made up of Chairman Caskey, Tom Boyer (UT), Bob Mertz (KS) and Danny Lanning (MT) to guide the

general business and work plans of the team. The transition team has organized into work groups of three team members to develop the final details of the associations. The key areas being addressed are administration, governance/structure and short-/long-term funding. A fourth work group called the Program Implementation Task Force is working on developing program areas for the new association.

During January the team presented the new organization plan to current national producer-feeder associations and the lamb and wool processing segments of the industry. Input was received on the plan as well as endorsement of the plan by the U. S. Sheep Seedstock Association, National Lamb Feeders Association, United Sheep Producers and post-harvest lamb and wool associations. The team is now addressing the concerns raised and is making final refinements. "We are continuing to seek input from throughout the industry during this refinement phase," said Caskey.

The team is also raising funds to finish developing the new association. Up to this time the transition team has been financially supported by the American Sheep Industry As-

sociation, National Lamb Feeders Association, National Meat Association, United Sheep Producers Association, American Textile Manufacturers Association, United States Seedstock Association and American Farm Bureau Federation. Contributions for start-up costs are now being sought from other organizations and individuals that support the development of the new association.

Association membership will be open to anyone interested in the mission and goals of the association. Membership will be made up of individual dues paying members, companies and affiliated members with interest in the sheep industry. Members will select a "forum" in which they will hold voting rights. Forums will represent the various industry segments and will develop programs specific to their segments.

The transition team plans to launch the new association by July with a widespread information program, founding memberships and a general membership drive. Caskey said, "It is very important that we get the new association started very soon, because it offers the sheep industry the best opportunity for creating a more profitable industry for everyone."

## Weather, mature gobblers to test spring turkey hunters

Considering Texas enjoyed a turkey reproduction boom two years ago, wildlife officials expect there to be plenty of mature gobblers available during the spring hunting season. Just how available these toms become for hunters, however, will likely depend on the weather.

"The numbers point to an excellent production season two years ago as a sign that we should have a good season this spring, with a lot of mature birds on the ground," said Dr. Markus Peterson, turkey program leader with Texas Parks and Wildlife. "But, the weather dictates more about hunting success than production, and it's been pretty dry in South Texas and the Edwards Plateau, and very windy in the Pineywoods."

The bottom line for hunters, Peterson continued, is that finding birds may not be as big a problem as finding perfect weather conditions to hunt in.

Texas is fortunate to boast two of the four subspecies of wild turkey common to North America - the East-

ern and the Rio Grande - and while their differences on the surface may be subtle, their preferred range is not. Rio Grandes do not fare well in the wet, dense forests of East Texas, and Easterns have a tough time surviving in the dry brush country of South Texas and up through the Hill Country. Few parts, if any, in Texas will support both birds.

Rio Grande turkey hunting season opened March 27 in South Texas and runs through May 2. It began in the remaining counties having a spring turkey season on April 3 and will run through May 9. The spring Eastern turkey season is open in 17 East Texas counties from April 12-25.

In addition to possessing a valid Texas hunting license, turkey hunters are required to purchase a Special Turkey Hunting Stamp. Revenue generated from this user stamp goes back into turkey-related programs at TPW, including the Eastern turkey restoration project and to fund various research efforts.
