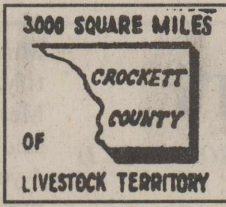

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White guilty of capital murder

It took the 112th District jury in the Melvin W. White trial only about 30 minutes last week to find White guilty of the capital murder of Jennifer Gravell on Aug. 5, 1997. The Ozona murder case was given a change of venue to Fort Stockton, and the trial began in the Pecos County district courtroom on Monday, June 7. The testimony in the punishment part of the case opened Monday, June 14.

Heading up the prosecution is 112th District attorney Ori White, no relation to Melvin White, of Fort Stockton, assisted by Martin Underwood of Comstock and Shannon Flanagan, assistant district attorney. Court appointed attorneys Kirk Hawkins and Paul Parker of San Angelo are handling the defense.

Texas Ranger Jerry Byrne testified June 8, introducing a 4-hour video-taped interview, during which Melvin White confessed to killing and sexually assaulting Jennifer in 1997. He said he took her in his pickup to the Dorado plant, where he was employed. White said she hit her head when she fell while climbing on a truck. He then told of taking her to the rest area park about 13 miles north of

town, where he attempted to have sex with her. When she resisted, he said he taped her hands behind her. He said some car headlights spooked him, and he drove with Jennifer to the tank battery where he killed her and left her battered body. White said he hit her in the head several times. He then told Ranger Byrne and Chief Deputy Alton Davis where to find her.

He said he hit her with a tire tool, which he threw out on his way back to town. The murder weapon was never found.

The trial continued Wednesday, June 9, with forensic experts testifying about blood, tire track and shoe tread photos, along with the autopsy report and pictures of the little girl. According to the autopsy, the child was hit in the head with a blunt object seven times, any of which could have caused her death. Photos were projected onto a television screen for the jury to view.

In closing the guilt/innocence part of the case, District Attorney Ori White spoke to the jury, stating, "The state's evidence in this case is so overwhelming, it's astronomical." He cited the blood evidence, photographs of hair on the tape, blood on the truck, the bound body with blood all over the face, huge wounds on the skull, and

hands still taped behind her.

The judge charged the jury, and they filed out for deliberation, only to return with the "guilty of capital murder" verdict in 30 minutes. The court recessed and set the punishment phase of the trial to begin Monday, June 14.

Early in the punishment phase June 14, Ori White called Melvin Wayne White's own daughter to the stand. Christina White Constancio told a story of rape, sodomy, oral sex and physical violence against her by her father, Melvin White, when she was only 12 years of age. She recounted a story of horror that had lasted three to four hours.

She had been out riding with friends until around midnight, Christina said. When she came into the house, her father was mixing a drink and offered her one. At first she said no, but then accepted.

Christina said she was preparing for bed when her father attacked her, grabbing her around the neck with his arm. He took her to his room, threatening to "break her neck" if she cried out, she said. She went back to her room when he drifted off to sleep.

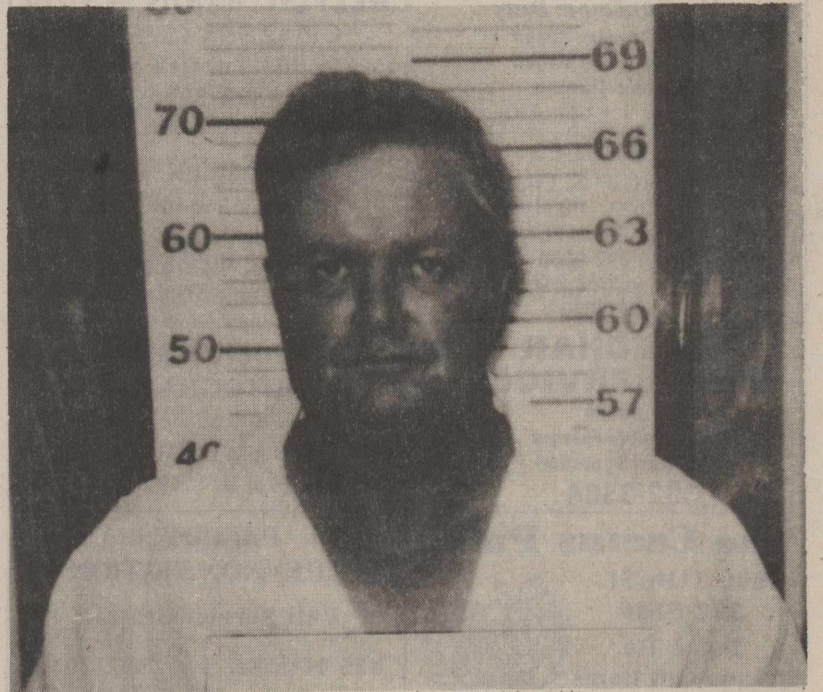
The next day, Christina continued, she told a friend, whose mother reported the attack to the sheriff's office and the child was taken to San Angelo to a hospital emergency room.

Kirk Hawkins questioned Christina as to why she did not call out for help from her two brothers who were in the house. In her response to a similar question from District Attorney White, Christina replied "I was scared for my life."

Dr. Greg Dunham of San Angelo testified that he examined the child two days after the occurrence. Although the child had bathed, there was clear evidence of a sexual attack with an attempt of vaginal entry. The jury was shown two photographs, and Dr.

County to get new asphalt machine

Commissioners voted Monday to buy a new asphalt distributing machine. Problems with the old machine delayed the beginning of paving season, which usually starts in April, until last week. Judge Jeffrey Sutton is to explore means of financing the equipment. A 3-year lease purchase is under consideration.

The court also approved the purchase of a used over the road pull truck under \$15,000.00.

Eddie Moore, road and parks superintendent, was authorized to hire an engineer for construction of a bridge leading to the Chandlerdale West Addition. Moore and Commissioner Rudy Martinez are to work with the engineer to develop plans and specifications.

Purchase of right-of-way fencing material for the Jimmy K. Thomas section of Road 406 was okayed by the court. This will be a total of four miles of fence.

An agenda item regarding approval of a contract with Domingo Perez Salvage Yard was tabled until the next meeting to allow Mr. Perez time to review the contract.

The court approved removal of dirt located at the corner of 14th Street and Ave. J adjacent to the collection center. This dirt came from the middle school before construction began. Eddie Moore is to supervise the removal.

Commissioners also approved removal of dirt and mesquite by Abel Martinez from the new addition of the cemetery.

During discussion of fees for the collection center, it was emphasized

that individuals may bring grass and trimmings to the center without being charged. There will be a fee for commercial dumping of these items.

This year to date, there have been commercial fees charged amounting to \$884.00. An additional \$1,100.00 has been charged for acceptance of tires from businesses. Individuals may drop off their tires at the collection center at no charge.

There is a fee for construction debris when deposited by a contractor. If deposited by a homeowner doing the work, there is no charge.

No action was taken on an agenda item to discuss fees for private swimming parties.

Commissioners voted to approve rental of a high lift platform to wash and scrape windows at the museum. Also approved was maintenance of landscaping which will be done to encourage economic development and tourism. This is part of a State Highway Department program which has been approved for Ozona in 2001.

The sheriff's report for May showed 238 calls for service and 40 persons placed in jail.

The fire department responded to 14 incidents during May. They were; EMS/rescue - 4, wash down - 2, grass - 2, structure - 4, vehicle - 1 and investigation - 1.

Helping Hands for the Elderly reported 1052 meals served in May.

The civic center report listed 19 functions held there during May.

Librarian Louise Ledoux brought samples of carpet and paint for the library expansion to show commissioners.

Goat ropers vie for championship this weekend

Ozona is the location of the World Championship Goat Roping for the eighth year with events beginning Friday at 10 a.m. Presented by the Texas Goat Roping Association, Ozona Chamber of Commerce, Crockett National Bank and the Crockett County Roping Association, the two-day competition features three go rounds for novice, ladies, juniors and seniors Friday morning.

The final go round for novice and ladies' top 10 starts the 6:30 p.m. competition Friday followed by three go rounds for the juniors and seniors' top 10. Ten runs for the Big Bad Billy Goat Bustin' and the 12 and under goat sacking are also scheduled for Friday night.

Saturday's activities begin at 7:00 a.m. with three go rounds for the open division followed by one go round for the top 15 in this division.

The final go round for the juniors' and seniors' top 10 will start the 6:00 p.m. contest. The competition will end with three go rounds for the open division top 15. This year there is

\$10,000.00 added money to the open.

Also planned for Saturday is a 4:00 p.m. cowboy church service and the Goat Ropers' Ball from 8:00 p.m. until midnight. Music will be by *Asleep at the Wheel* with Tim DuBois opening.

Red Cross assists Sheffield after storm

A violent thunderstorm devastated Sheffield June 5, producing heavy rains and grapefruit size hail. An assessment by American Red Cross indicates that 139 homes were affected in Sheffield, with one single family home destroyed, and 16 mobile homes destroyed. There was major damage to another 30 single family homes and minor damage to 54 single family homes and 34 mobile homes.

A team of at least five volunteers and one paid staffer went to Sheffield to provide mobile feeding to workers and residents during the clean up. A service center was also opened by the Red Cross to provide assistance to families affected by the disaster.

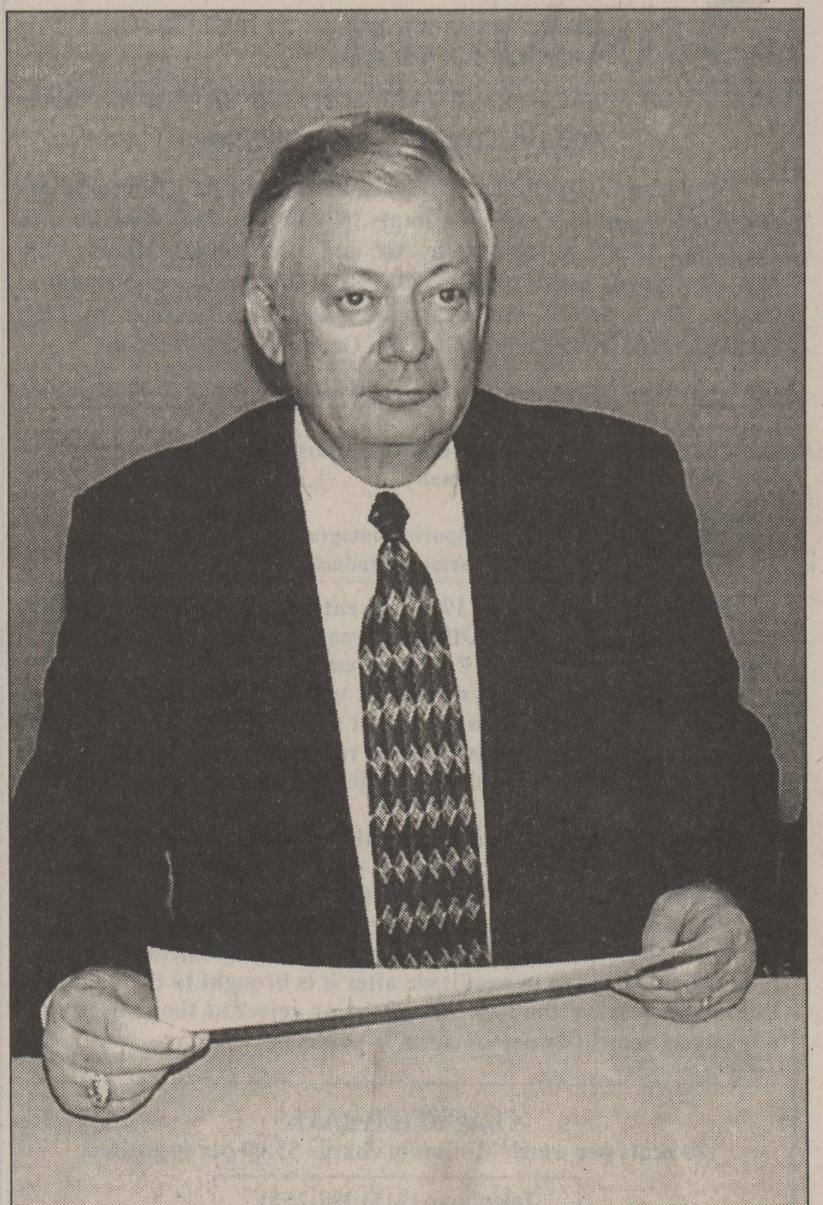
"We will miss the day to day banking operations, but it is just time to look to other things," he said.

Dunham said his findings were consistent with rape even though no seminal fluid was present.

Lynn McFadden of the Child Protective Service in San Angelo validated the rape claim. He said the three White children were removed from the home on the basis of allegations of physical and sexual abuse of the girl and abuse by neglect. Christina was placed in the home of her grandparents, S. L. and Marie White. Two years later, she was allowed to spend the night at her father's home. This time, when she was 14, the girl said her father propositioned her to have sex for \$50.00 a week.

Christina ran away to San Angelo, where she had been in girls' homes before moving to her grandparents' house. Again CPS investigated. McFadden said that after the 1994 solicitation of Christina by her father, Melvin White confessed to the sexual assault of his daughter. He said he did it, but denied making the money offer, McFadden said of White.

After the initial investigation of rape, McFadden said Melvin White was required to do a 28-day alcohol abuse treatment, which he completed. He was also required to see a psychiatrist and undergo sex offender treatment on a regular basis. White never completed the sex abuse treatment, McFadden said.

McFadden testified that he visited with then district attorney J. W. Johnson about the case.

When asked by District Attorney Ori White if Melvin was ever remorseful during their conversations, McFadden said, "I think he stated that he wanted his daughter back, but as far as remorse, no."

In an attempt to show that Melvin White was a lifelong sex offender,

Mrs. Edna White was called to testify. Mrs. White was married to Melvin White's uncle at the time she said she found Melvin fondling her 4-year-old daughter. She said Melvin was around 9 to 11 years of age at the time. She testified that she found Melvin with the 4-year-old in the back of the store she operated with her husband in Big Lake.

"He had her pulled close to him with her little dress pulled up and his hand down inside her little panties," the mother said.

Sheriff Shane Fenton and Chief Deputy Alton Davis testified early on June 14 as to whether or not they had formed an opinion regarding Melvin White's "reputation for peacefulness and ability to abide by the law". Each said "It's bad".

The prosecution rested in the punishment phase at 1:47.

Hawkins was not ready for the defense, since he did not expect the state to rest its case so early. He opened his case Tuesday morning, June 15, with testimony from four Ozona residents who talked about how White handled his alcohol and that they had never seen him drunk.

Marie White, mother of Melvin Wayne White, testified about her son's

growing up years and told of an automobile accident he was in at age 21 which left him in a coma for 28 days.

Introduced into evidence were seven almost-full bottles of pills Mrs. White had removed from her son Melvin's freezer after the death of Jennifer Gravell. Among them were pain medications and a tranquilizer.

Marie White said she never believed the story of the fondling incident with the 4-year-old, but she did eventually believe Christina's story of rape after reading the sheriff's department report several months after the incident.

Also brought to the stand were Melvin White's first wife and a daughter by that marriage. Shirlene Stodder, to whom White was married from 1968 to 1975, and their daughter, Mellisa Wolsey, testified to White's behavior toward them during those years.

Melvin White's sister, Estelle St. Clair, and his sons, Mickey and Sammy White and Christopher Heisler, who had been a prisoner in Crockett County Jail with White, also testified for the defense.

An expert witness for the defense is expected to take the stand Wednesday.

Attempted reduction in wildlife services funding fails

The American Sheep Industry Association and other U.S. livestock industries scored a major victory in Washington, D.C., this week when U.S. House of Representative members voted down an amendment that would have eliminated Wildlife Services funding for livestock protection.

The amendment -- offered by Reps. Peter DeFazio (D-OR) and Charles Bass (R-NH) -- and championed by animal-rights activists, was defeated by a vote of 230-193.

"We are extremely pleased that

the House members once again focused on the numerous and undeniable benefits of this program, despite intense lobbying efforts by animal-rights groups and an extensive amount of propaganda distributed by them on the program," said Peter Orwick, executive director of the American Sheep Industry Association.

Also fighting to protect Wildlife Services funding during the debate were Representatives Henry Bonilla (R) and Charles Stenholm (D) of Texas and others.

U.S. sheep industry awaiting presidential decision on 201 trade action against imports

Exactly one week after the official deadline for the president's decision on the U.S. sheep industry's 201 trade action against lamb imports came and went, the trade action's thousands of supporters were still awaiting the final ruling on the matter at press time at 3 p.m. MST on Friday, June 11.

"We know how very difficult this 'hurry up and wait' period is for everyone," said Peter Orwick, executive director of the American Sheep Industry Association. "But between the Kosovo situation and discussions within the government on the form of trade restrictions, the process has been delayed."

At press time, ASI Vice President and Idaho sheep producer Cindy Siddoway was wrapping up a meeting with John Podesta, Clinton's chief of staff. Congressional action on the 201 this week remained strong: Sen. Max Baucus (D-MT) continued to visit with administration officials on the matter while Sen. Tom Daschle (D-SD) spoke directly with the president regarding the industry's requested

relief via a two-tier, four-year program.

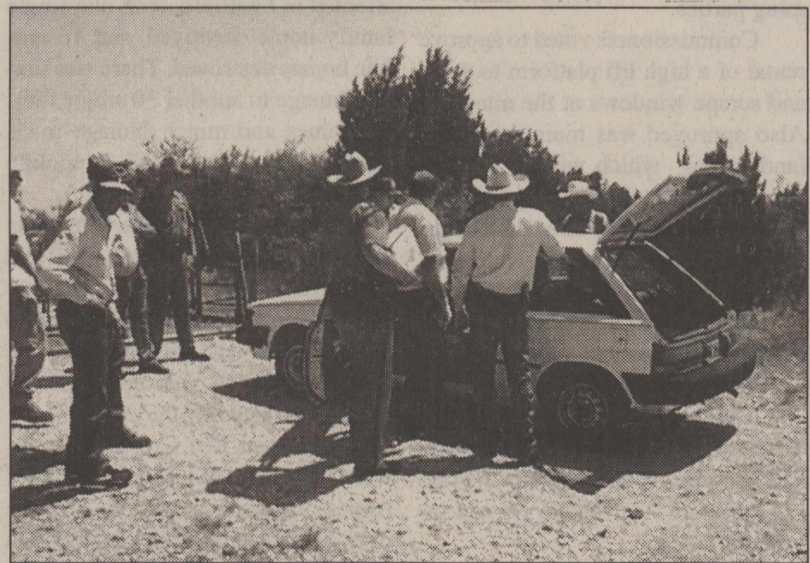
The president will make a decision and then report it to Congress.

Suicide is suspected in the death of a Houston man in Crockett County last week, says Justice of the Peace Jim Hearne, but confirmation will come from an autopsy report.

The deceased has been identified as Jyh-Huei Ren, age 43.

Fernando Cervantez, Sanderson Game Warden, discovered the body in a car on top of Lancaster Hill on old Hwy. 290 Thursday around 1:00 p.m. Cervantez was on a routine route when he came upon the 2-door white compact car.

Hearne said the man "had probably been dead less than 48 hours. Officers found a 357 revolver and one discharged 38 special cartridge. The bullet was recovered from the seat of the car after passing through the body," Hearne said.

The body was taken to the Bexar County Medical Examiner for an autopsy.

Law enforcement officers at the scene were Chief Deputy Alton Davis, Deputy Steve Kenley, and DPS Troopers Todd Ross and Kurt Knapp.

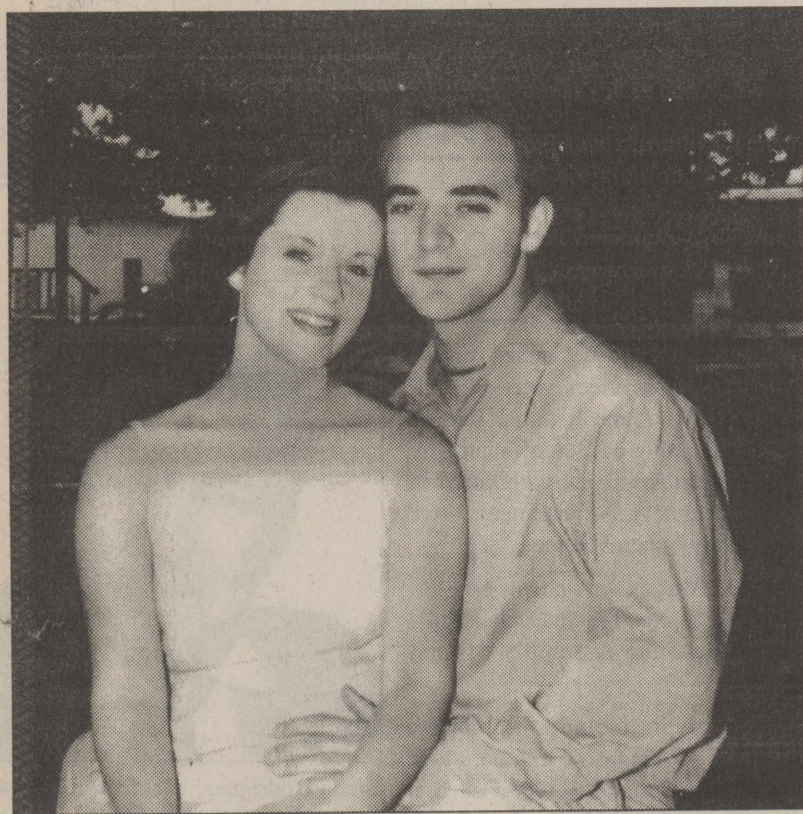

Meador also said the three new defibrillators have arrived. Two will go into deputies' cars after proper training in use of the devices. The other will be utilized by EMS first responders.

The EMT-B class will take the state test on June 24, Meador said.

Mr. Roddie asked the board to

define his role in the EMS Department. Both Meador and Roddie said they had failed to contact each other just as an oversight. Roddie was not aware until recently that he was to be involved in any decision making that involved the EMS.

Eddie Moore, member and former board president, commented that Roddie is the administrator of the medical department under the board and should be involved in budgetary/financial decisions as well as play an advisory role to Meador and the EMS Department. He said that Meador, Roddie and Dr. Sims should work together to handle the EMS Department.

Director of Nursing Gerald Creel reported that as of June 10, the center had 45 residents with two in the hospital. His report also included information on skin conditions of residents, incidents/accidents of residents and employees, weight gain/loss and intakes.

Mr. Roddie's report included the

census, food costs, activity director, Care-A-Van, TAHA meeting and budget information.

Jan St. Clair is the new activity director for the center effective June 9. She has been working in that capacity for several months.

The board discussed various means of covering the cost of a Care-A-Van replacement. Included were grant applications, organization and private donations. Mr. Roddie has contacted several companies who deal in vans for the handicapped. He is searching for a van that is both wheelchair and stretcher accessible.

He also reported on the annual meeting of the TAHA he attended along with board member Armando Arredondo. Among the seminars were information on conflict management and hospice in the long term care. After seeing aviaries for health care facilities, Mr. Roddie is interested in obtaining one for Crockett County Care Center.

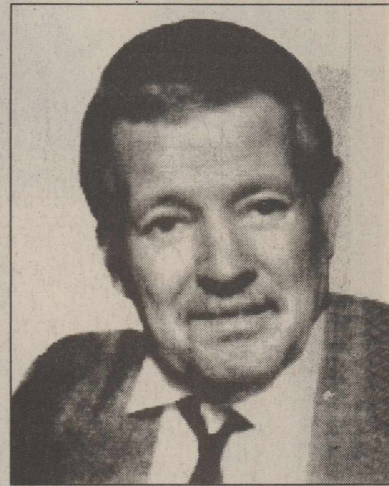
glasses of water or other noncaffeinated beverages each day should be a priority for seniors."

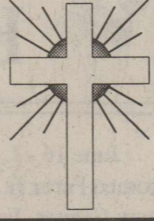
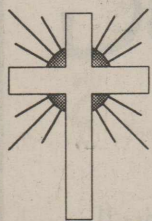
relations.

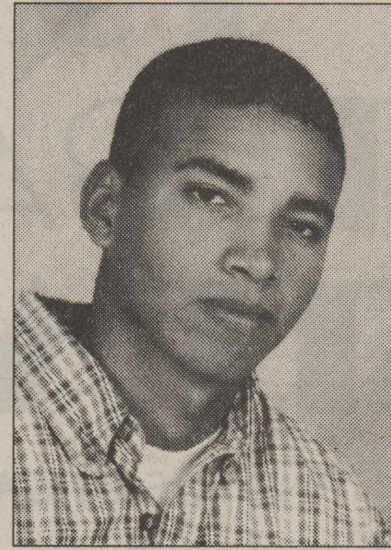

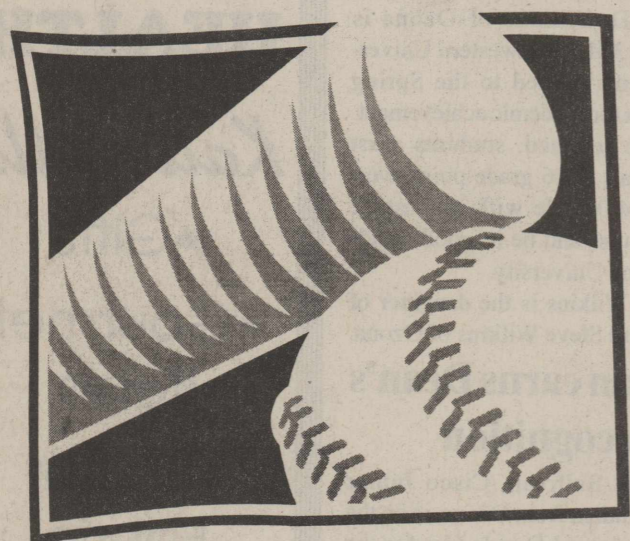

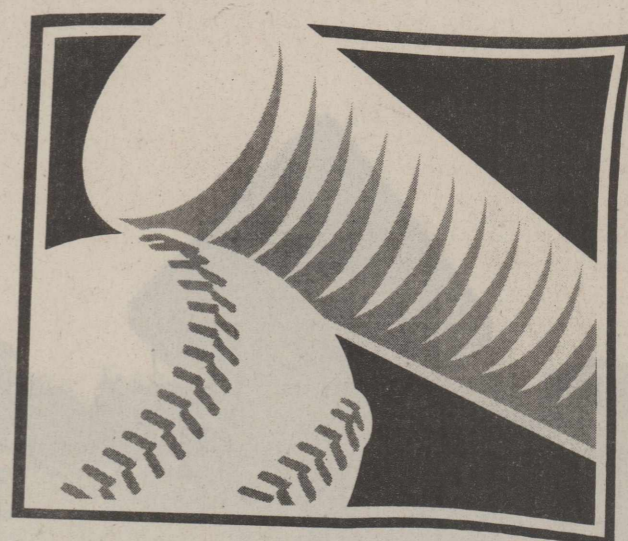

Dehydration impacts how you feel

Thirsty? Then your body is on its way to becoming dehydrated.

The average adult has between 10 and 12 gallons of water in his or her body - accounting for 50 percent of body weight. That water plays a critical role in nearly every bodily process. And being a quart or two low can impact how you feel.

"Water is needed by virtually every muscle or tissue cell," said David Brennan, an exercise physiologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Regulating body temperature is one of the most important roles water plays in the body. Without a plentiful supply of water, the body can have a difficult time maintaining a normal temperature."

Nearly everything you do during the day - including typing, talking, walking and even eating - requires energy. That energy, in turn, generates heat, which escapes the body through perspiration. Perspiration is the mechanism that keeps the body cool.

"We lose about two and a half quarts of water a day through normal activity," said Brennan. "People who exercise lose even more and should drink water throughout the day to meet the demands of exercise. But don't wait until you are thirsty. Thirst is the body's way of saying your water level is low."

Dehydration is the most serious consequence of not drinking enough water. The loss of just two to three percent of bodywater weight can impact some of the functions in the body.

To guard against dehydration, drink up.

"Drinking eight to 12 cups of water a day should keep you well hydrated," said Brennan. "Water is best for fluid replacement, but sports drinks and juices are also good options."

Brennan suggests limiting consumption of beverages containing alcohol and caffeine - they cause water loss.

Dangers of the deep, get a checkup before you dive

HOUSTON - Dive into your medical history before you strap on the scuba equipment, says Dr. Cliff Dacso with the Travel Medicine Service at Baylor College of Medicine.

Generally, scuba diving is not recommended for people with exercise-limiting illnesses such as angina or asthma; bullous lung disease, a condition that produces abnormal pockets of air in the lungs; a history of serious ear problems or infections; epilepsy, or insulin-dependent diabetes.

Major health risks associated with scuba diving stem from the effects of changes in ambient pressure and exertion.

"Changes in pressure with depth can cause lung barotrauma, air embolisms, decompression sickness, and toxic reactions to gases. Physical exercises or the stress of a new environment can also trigger heart attacks, one of the major causes of diving fatalities, and panic attacks," Dacso said.

If you have one of these conditions or any impairment of heart or lung function or any blockage of the ears or sinuses, it is not wise to undertake a diving program without consulting a physician.

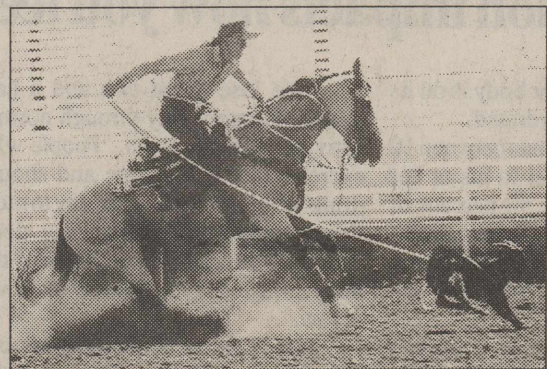

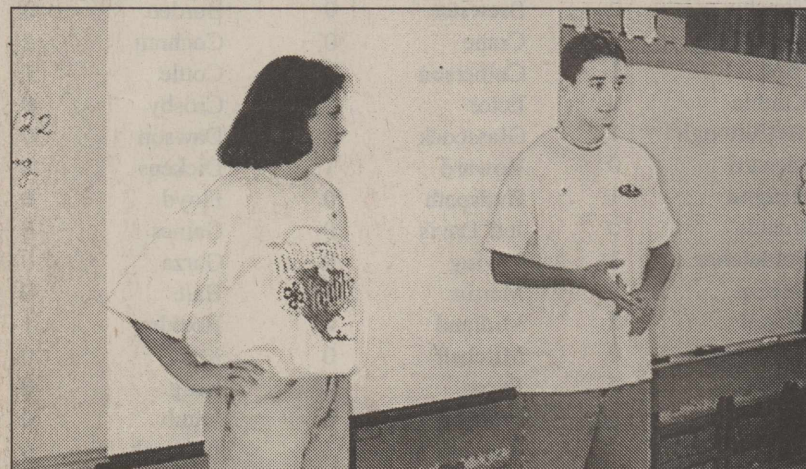

Arron Garza placed ninth in the Trans-American Junior Golf Championship held at Austin's Jimmy Clay Golf Course on June 8-10.

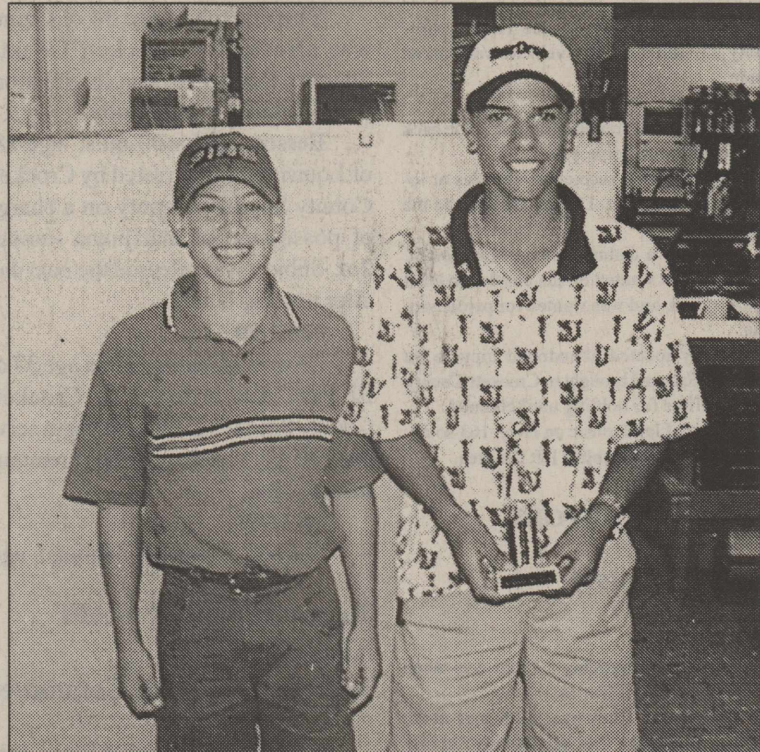

Travelers can weigh new option to 'kick the tick'

HOUSTON - Vacationers headed to wooded, brushy or overgrown grassy areas might consider the new vaccine for Lyme Disease, an infection caused by bacteria transmitted via the bite of ticks that live on deer or white-footed mice.

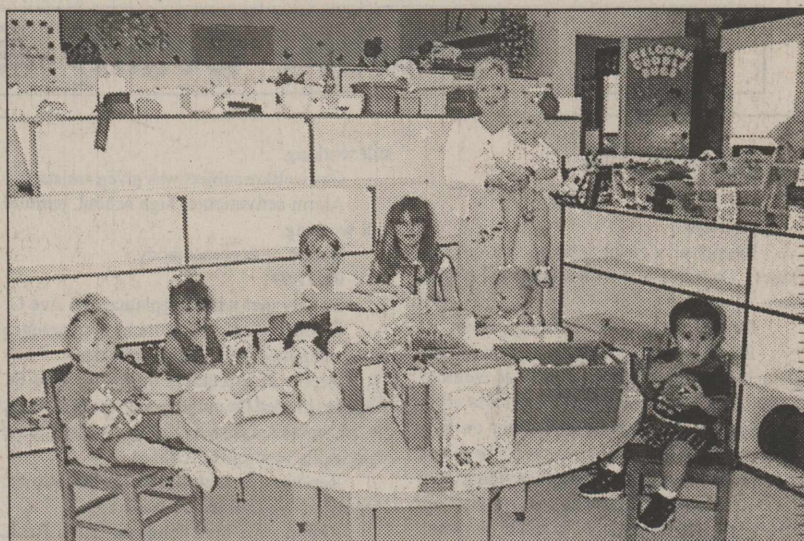
"But, the new vaccine might prove tricky for travelers who do not plan their trips far in advance," warns Dr. Cliff Dacso with the Travel Medicine Service at Baylor College of Medicine. Recommendations call for vaccine doses to be given in three injections over the course of a year. booster shots may be needed over time.

Geography and lifestyle should be factored into the decision to take the vaccine. Individuals who are at high risk are those who live, work or play in the Northeast of Mid-Atlantic States, particularly along the coastal areas from Maine to Virginia.

Dacso noted that no vaccine offers perfect protection so he encourages nature enthusiasts to practice standard preventive measures. This means wearing protective clothing, using tick repellent and removing attached ticks as quickly as possible.

Caught early, Lyme disease is highly treatable. Left untreated, in rare cases the illness can lead to disabling arthritis and neurological problems. Travelers should consult a physician as soon as possible if they suspect an infection.

Texaco has completed two gas wells in the Scheuber-Wilkins leaseholding within Crockett County's Henderson Field.
Both are located about 10 miles southeast of Ozona. They are designated as the Nos. 27 and 28 Scheuber-Wilkins. They potentialized at 650,000 and 2,045,000 CFD on absolute open flow, respectively.
The No. 27 went to total depth of 8,250 feet and was plugged back to 8,160. The No. 28 bottomed at 8,200 feet and was plugged back to 8,054. Production intervals will range from 7,814 to 7,934 feet into the wellbore.
The No. 27 flowed 521,000 CFD on a 1.25-in. choke, while the No. 28 flowed 1,475,000 CFD on the same size opening. Production in both wells is in the Canyon Sand.

Texaco also has completed the No. 6 J. H. Scheuber "B" in the Henderson Field 11 miles southeast of Ozona.
The well flowed 1,057,000 CF gas daily on a 1.25-in. choke and earned a 1,868,000-CFD evaluation on absolute open flow.
It probed to an 8,100-ft. bottom and was perforated for Canyon Sand gas, 7,858 to 7,932 feet into the wellbore.

The Massie Field saw a good producer come on line when the No. 9 Wayne West Ranch "A" was completed about 29 miles south of Ozona. Union Oil is the operator.
The well was taken to total depth of 11,348 feet. It was perforated to produce in the Strawn Formation, 11,001 to 11,348 feet into the hole.
It showed ability to flow at the rate of 1,476,000 CF gas daily on a 1.5-in. choke. It was rated at 3,200,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

Tamarack Petroleum has brought three new gassers on line in the Ozona Field about 18 miles southwest of Ozona. The wells include the Nos. 1413, 1414 and 1511 Sutton.
The first two were gauged on 48/64 chokes and flowed 285,000 and 221,000 CFD, respectively. The open flow ratings came in at 308,000 CFD and 231,000 CFD. The 1511 flowed 135,000 CF gas per day on a half-inch choke. It was evaluated at 160,000 CFD on open flow.
The wells were drilled to total depths of 6,500, 6,500 and 6,430 feet, respectively. Production will range from 6,076 to 6,380 feet in the Canyon Sand.

Flowing 63 barrels of oil per day on a 1-in. choke, the No. 2 Powell "56" has been completed in Crockett County's M.P.I. Field about 16 miles south of Big Lake. Enron Oil and Gas is the operator.
Enron took the hole to an 8,310-ft. bottom and plugged it back to 8,217. Production will be from a perforated interval in the Ellenburger Formation, 8,056 to 8,118 feet into the hole.
