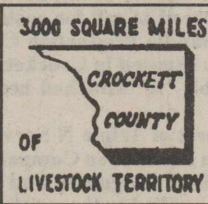

Results of the spraying will be assessed when commissioners meet Aug. 5. Five evenings of spraying should be complete by then.

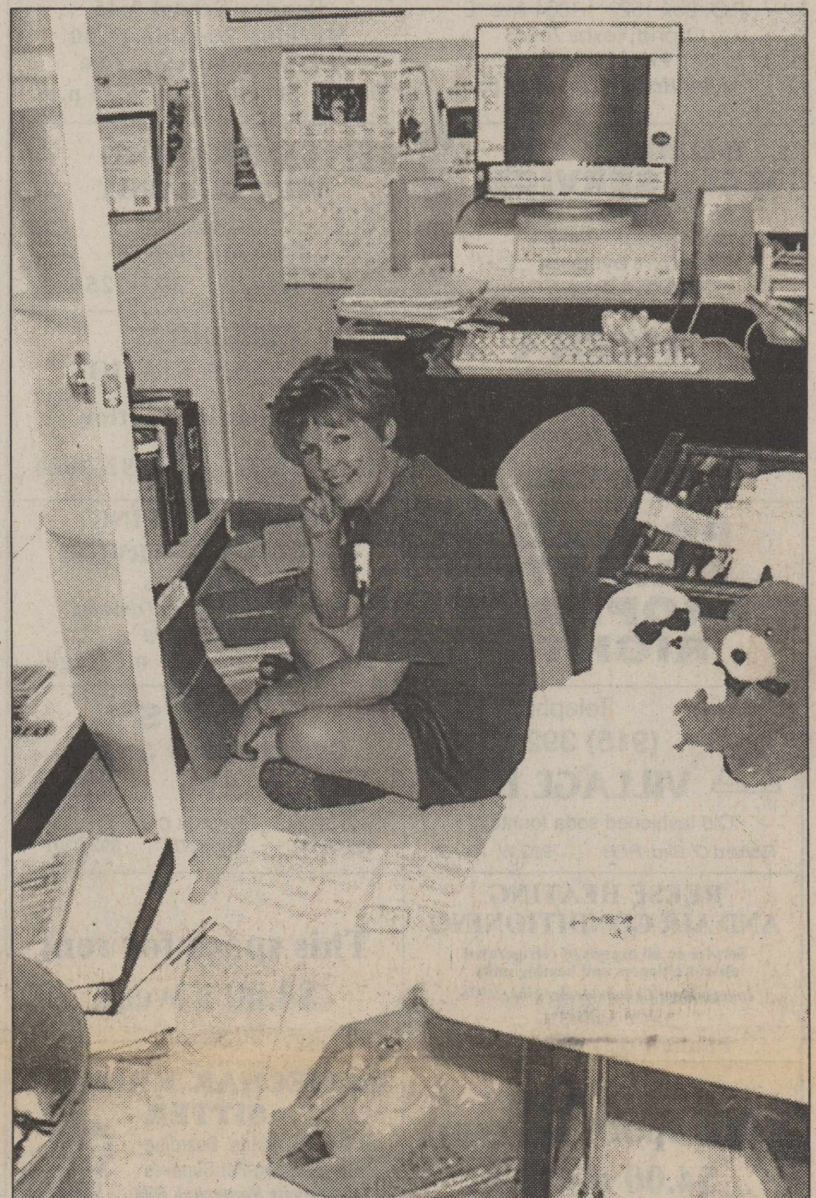
Commissioners will consider whether or not to buy a sprayer for Crockett County depending on results of the initial spraying and comments from the public, they said at a called meeting July 26.

Three action items were on the agenda at Monday night's meeting.

Commissioners met and approved employment of Jennifer Marshall of Eldorado as County Extension Agent-Family and Consumer Sciences.

The court members also approved specifications for construction of a sheep feeding facility for the 4-H and authorized advertisement for bids for the project. County Agent Miles Dabovich went over plans for the structure with commissioners.

Payments to the architect and contractor for the library expansion were approved by the court. These two payments will exhaust all funds that have been raised for the project according to John Stokes, county auditor.

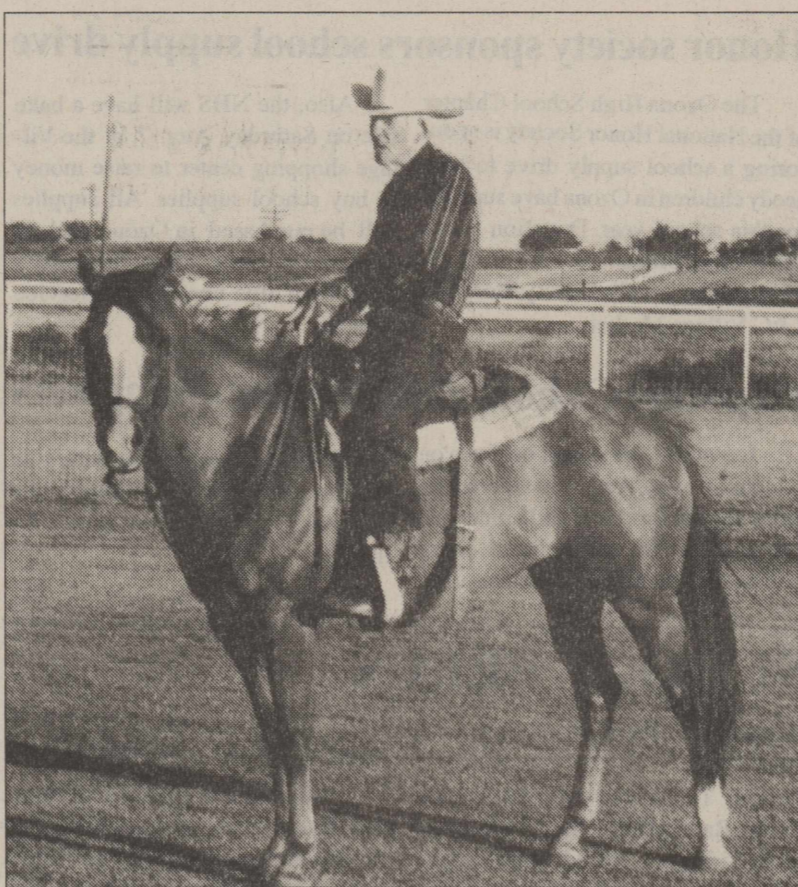

J.D. KILGORE takes his horse April out for a short ride on his for the highlight of his 94th birthday. Submitted Photo

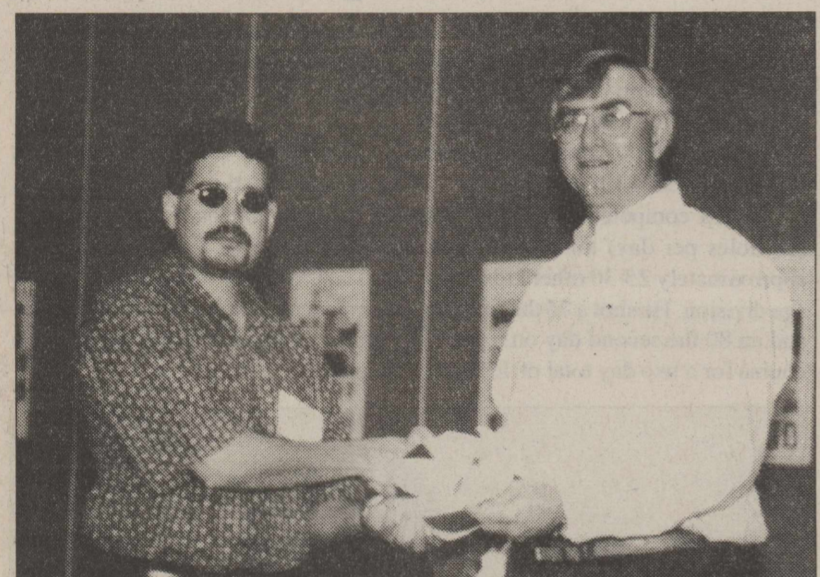
Seminar for those who are getting older Aug. 11

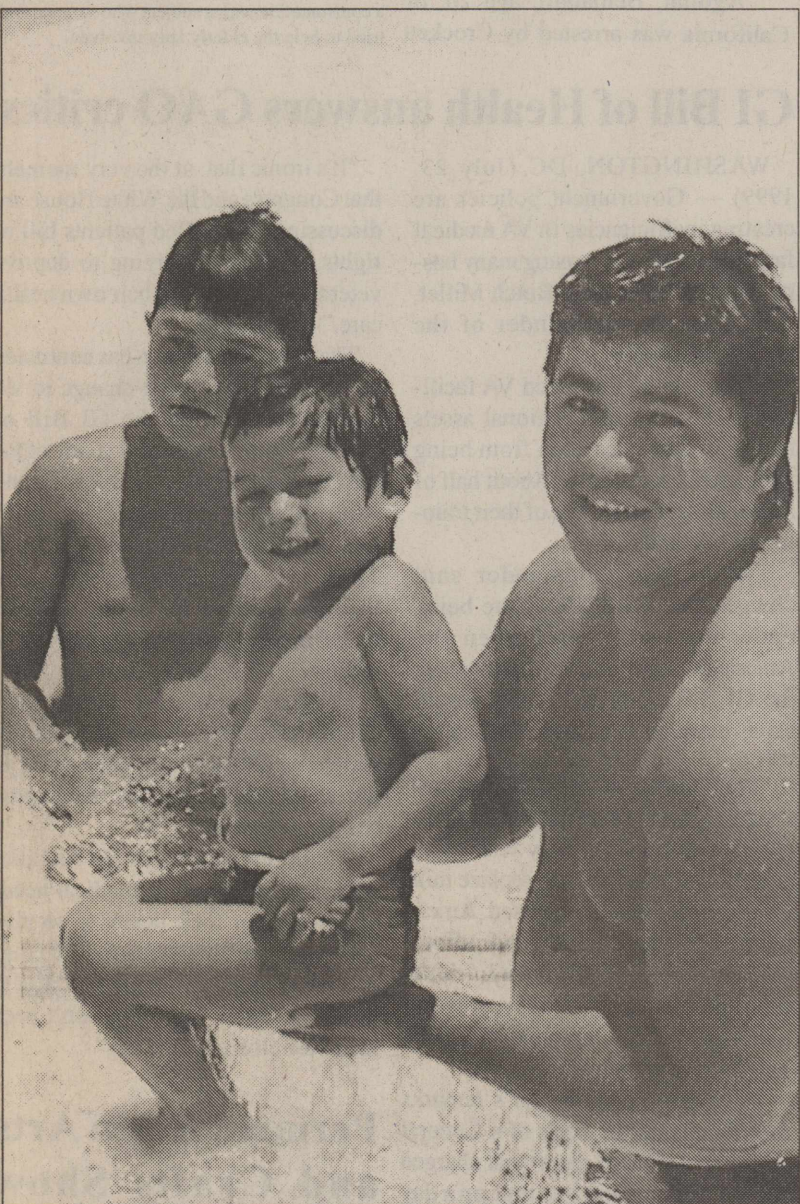
The dedication of the McVey plaque was discussed, and plans were finalized for the reception. It will be Aug. 7.

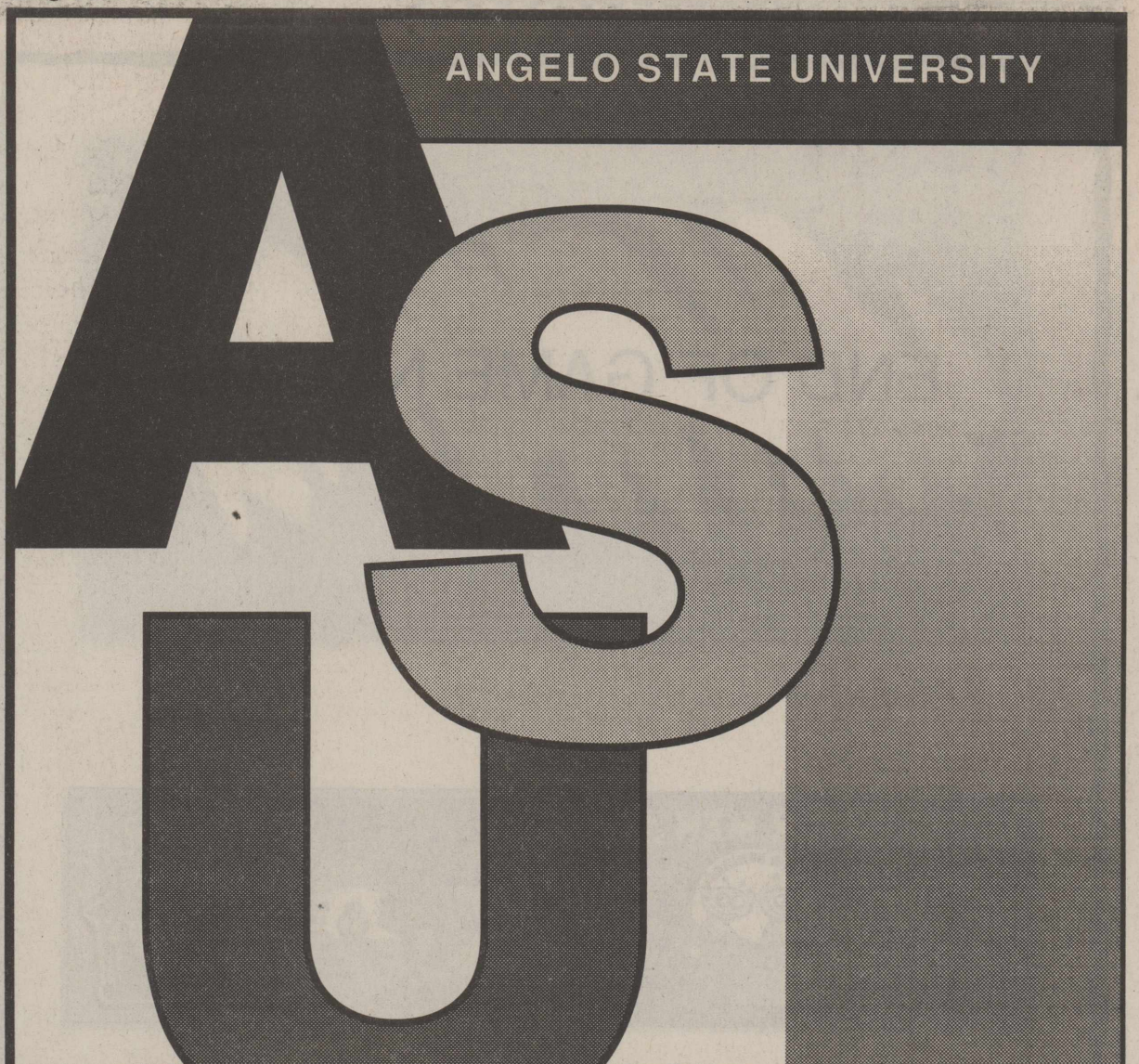

GI Bill of Health answers GAO critics

WASHINGTON, DC (July 23, 1999) — Government policies are creating inefficiencies in VA medical facilities and under-using many hospitals and clinics, said Butch Miller. The national commander of the American Legion.

"There are no unneeded VA facilities — just valuable national assets that senseless rules keep from being fully used," said Miller. About half of all doctors receive some of their training in VA facilities.

The Legion commander said charges that VA facilities are being under-used only strengthen the American Legion's case for adopting the GI Bill of Health, which would bring more patients into VA health-care.

"The families of our older veterans are desperate to find long-term care for their loved ones. Military retirees are searching for hospitals to replace military facilities that have closed. Americans everywhere want good, affordable health care," Miller said. "All of those problems can be solved by expanding and strengthening the VA's health-care system."

The Legion commander's remarks today came on the heels of a General Accounting Office report that charged the VA was wasting one million a day on unneeded medical facilities. The report noted that the number of patients in VA hospitals dropped from 49,000 a day in 1989 to 21,000 a day in 1998. The report failed to mention the overall increase in people receiving VA health care during that period.

"Hasn't GAO gotten the word that VA medicine is moving toward outpatient care? Haven't they heard that VA has been squeezing veterans out of the system for years by lightening its eligibility rules because of inadequate funding?" Miller asked.

The GAO report was also critical of VA officials for giving veterans service organizations and other interested parties the chance to comment on many local VA decisions involving the allocation of resources.

"It's ironic that, at the very moment that Congress and the White House are discussing a so-called patients bill of rights, the GAO is trying to deprive veterans of a voice in their own health care," Miller said.

The American Legion has continued to promote a sweeping change in VA health-care, called the GI Bill of Health, which would solve many of the GAO's concerns. The GI Bill of Health would open up under-used VA facilities to veterans and their families. Those new patients would rely upon their own health insurance or upon benefits offered by Medicare or the military's retirement system.

"Military retirees and their dependents and veterans receiving Medicare should be afforded the opportunity to access VA health facilities," the Legion commander said.

"Counting patients in VA facilities says nothing about the medical needs of veterans or their desire to receive VA treatment," Miller said. "Veterans and their families want greater access to VA facilities. The case hasn't been made for closing anything"

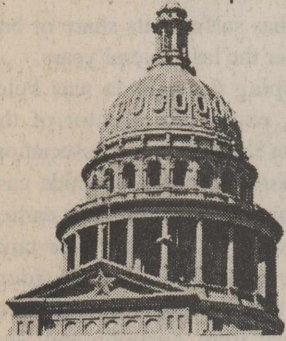

AUSTIN — Wayne Scott, executive director of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice since 1996, has been approved to receive a \$23,000 increase to his \$127,000 annual salary.

The new state budget, which takes effect Sept. 1, allows Scott and other agency chiefs to be paid as much as \$150,000 a year.

Allan Polunsky, chairman of the Texas Board of Criminal Justice which oversees the criminal justice agency, said he will recommend the raise for Scott.

As head of the agency, Scott is responsible for a \$2 billion a year budget, 40,000 employees and 145,000 inmates.

Also approved by the state Legislature were raises for other agency chiefs, the *Austin American-Statesman* reported last week, including:

- The commissioner of the Texas Department of Human Services, from \$105,000 to \$150,000;
- The commissioner of Texas Health and Human Services Commission, from \$125,106 to \$150,000;
- The commissioner of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, from \$135,000 to \$140,000;
- The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, from \$90,000 to \$102,000; and
- The executive director of the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services, from \$90,000 to \$115,000.

This year, the Legislature also approved a \$100 a month pay raise for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice's 23,755 guards.

The starting salary for a prison

guard is \$17,000, and low pay is one reason the agency has more than 1,000 job openings in its system of 112 prisons and jails.

Education Chief Applies at Tech
Texas Education Commissioner Dr. Mike Moses has applied for the position of deputy chancellor for external affairs at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

Moses, who has served as commissioner of education since 1995, submitted his application at the urging of Tech Chancellor John Montford, according to Debbie Graves Ratcliffe, senior director of the Texas Education Agency's division of communications and public information.

Moses and Montford's friendship goes back to Moses' term as superintendent of Lubbock Independent School District. Then, Montford was a state senator representing Texas Senate District 28, which includes Lubbock.

School Violence Topic of Meeting
Texas Attorney General John Cornyn and Texas Education Commissioner Moses were in San Antonio July 15 for the first meet-

ing of the Attorney General's School Violence Task Force.

One of the goals of the task force is to ensure that every school district has a crisis management plan.

Moses, co-chairman of the task force, said the effort brings parents, community leaders, teachers and principals together in a forum in which they can share ideas for solutions to campus violence.

"It also gives them the resources available to prepare for the possibility that students today may act in a violent manner," Moses added.

"As the father of two public high school students, I'm encouraged by what I've heard today," Cornyn said. "The practical advice of these experts will give our schools the programs and strategies to make our schools safe."

Future meetings of the task force have been set for Sept. 7 in Lubbock, Nov. 8 in Houston and Feb. 3, 2000 in Dallas.

According to Texas Education Agency statistics, there were

200,000 assaults against students and 18,000 assaults against teachers reported in the last four academic years.

In the same period, more than 31,000 weapons were confiscated in schools and 85,000 acts of vandalism or criminal mischief against schools or student property were reported.

Other Highlights

■ Nearly 90,000 items from abandoned safe deposit boxes will be sold to the highest bidder on Oct. 2, at the state's next unclaimed property auction in Austin. Jewelry, coins and currency, stamps, historical documents, and other collectibles and curiosities will go on the auction block, state Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander announced last week.

■ Retailers and shoppers can get details about the Aug. 6-8 sales tax holiday from the Texas comptroller's easily accessible web site, www.window.state.tx.us. Items listed — primarily school attire and supplies — will be exempt from state, city and county sales taxes.

Tests confirm sheep infected with cattle strain of Johne's Disease

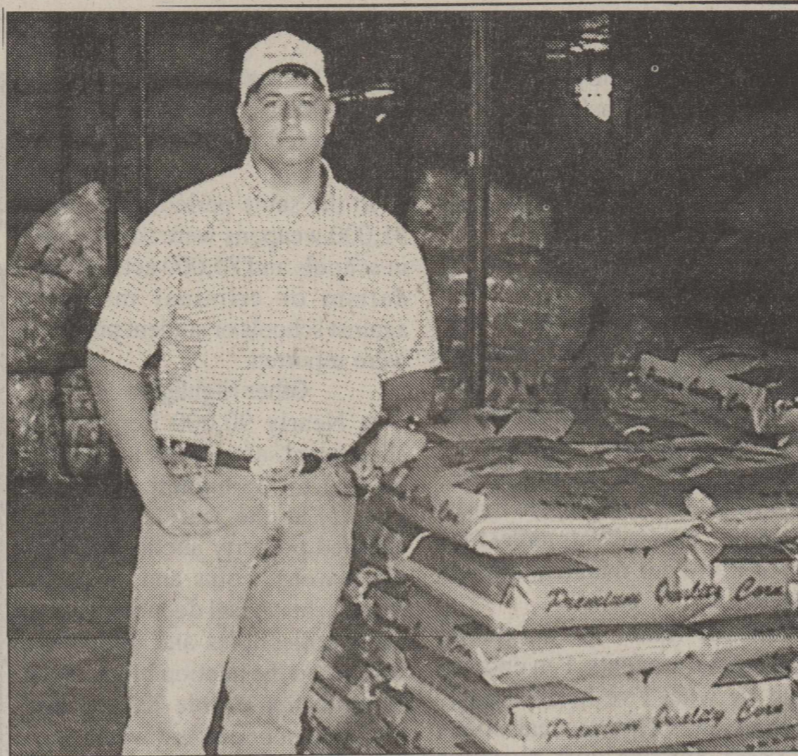
Strain testing of Southern Australia's only confirmed mainland case of Johne's Disease has revealed that the infected sheep are carrying the bovine, not ovine, form of the disease. The most recent diagnoses brings the total number of flocks infected with Bovine Johne's Disease -- housed on separate properties -- to three. Greg Johnson, of the Kangaroo Island Ovine Johne's Action Group, told the Australian Broadcasting Corp. that strain testing of sheep under the Johne's Market Assurance Program should become compulsory. He added that destocking the

sheep and replacing them with cattle may not be the best answer. "Using cattle for any sort of a decontamination program on destock properties might be a difficult thing to do because it's possible the contamination of the pasture -- with cattle strains of Johne's Disease -- could result in diseases and further contamination in those cattle during the supposed decontamination period," said Johnson. "The other issue is that it means the whole definition and way Johne's Disease is viewed in the country needs to be seriously looked at and changed."

RRC sets TX gas production allowables for Aug.

AUSTIN, Texas July 22 -- Railroad Commission Chairman Tony Garza and Commissioners Charles R. Matthews and Michael L. Williams today set August natural gas production allowables for prorated fields in the state to meet market demand of 45,459,940 Mcf (thousand cubic feet). For these fields, the August 1999 allowable represents a decrease of 3,003,538 Mcf when compared to actual production of 48,463,478 Mcf in August 1998. In setting the August 1999 allowable, the Commission used historical production figures from August 1998 and producer forecasts for the August 1999 demand, then adjusted the figures to account for such factors as well capability, new wells in a field, etc. Texas natural gas in storage reported by the Commission for the month of June 1999 is 301,917,265 Mcf compared to 250,843,983 Mcf in

June 1998. The July 1999 gas storage estimate is 307,648,816 Mcf. Commissioners reported that crude oil and petroleum products imported into the U.S. averaged 10.49 million barrels per day for the month of June 1999. This was a decrease of nearly six percent from the same period a year ago. Preliminary statewide production reported for May 1999 is 33,477,219 barrels of crude oil and 371,503,064 Mcf of gas well gas. The Commission's estimated final production for this month can be obtained by multiplying these preliminary production totals by a production adjustment factor of 1.0219 for crude oil and 1.0674 for gas well gas. (These production totals do not include casinghead gas or condensate.) The next statewide hearing has been scheduled for Tuesday August 24, 1999 at 9:15 a.m.

His college livestock judging team placed 13th at the national contest, and his was the second highest placing in Division II. House passes defective African trade bill

The U.S. textile industry was dealt a hard blow on Friday, July 16, when the U.S. House of Representatives passed the Africa Growth and Opportunity Act (H.R. 434). The bill would allow quota- and duty-free access into the United States of African apparel and fabric. Unfortunately, what the bill doesn't contain is language that would prohibit the illegal entry of non-African fabrics and textiles into America through the simple practice of rerouting goods through Africa. "It is a pity that the House leadership turned a blind eye to how the bill will damage U.S. textile and apparel jobs, product and investment," said American Textile Manufacturers Institute Executive Vice President Carlos Moore. "In their rush to pass something to help Africa, the bill's supporters instead have given China

an enormous loophole to illegally ship Chinese textiles and apparel through the Sub-Sahara." Moore stressed that while the U.S. textile industry is not against trade with Sub-Saharan Africa, it is against H.R. 434 since it benefits neither U.S. nor African apparel workers. The Senate Finance Committee last month approved its version of the Africa trade bill, which restricts benefits to apparel assembled of U.S.-made fabrics or yarns. A vote in the full Senate has not been scheduled. If the full Senate approves its version, the focus will shift to reconciling the two very different bills. The American Sheep Industry Association supported ATMI's stance on the issue through both individual and joint lobbying efforts. Staff contact: Peter Orwick ext. 33

ASI now offering membership for goat producers

The American Sheep Industry Association is now offering individual memberships for the nation's goat producers, making it the only national organization for sheep and goat producers alike. "We're excited about bringing goat producers into the fold ... it's a growing industry and many sheep producers also raise goats," said American Sheep Industry Association Executive Director Peter Orwick. Orwick added that although some differences between the two industries exist, they more often than not deal with the same issues including health, regulatory and environmental challenges, and predators. Memberships are calculated on a per-head basis -- 4 cents per head -- with a \$25 minimum. The annual membership fee entitles members to a one-year subscription to ASI's monthly tabloid, the Sheep Industry News. The move to add goat producers to the ASI membership roster started with the association's Bylaws Committee, which put forth its recommendation to the full Board of Directors at the July 8-10 ASI Mid-Year Meeting in Denver. Jernigan elected TSGRA president

Mike Jernigan of Iraan was elected TSGRA president at the organization's 84th Annual Convention July 16 and 17 in San Angelo. Other officers elected were Jule Richmond, Blanket, first vice president; and Glen Fisher, Sonora, second vice president. Coming on the heels of a favorable trade ruling by the White House, 1999 convention of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Association was an encouragingly upbeat affair for an industry that has suffered its share of bad news over the last several years.

Topping the agenda was Peter Orwick, executive director of the American Sheep Industry Association, who reported on the 201 trade case ruling handed down just days earlier. Orwick outlined the three-year tariff increase announced by President Clinton that will apply to imports of lamb meat from Australia and New Zealand.

Australian wool growers urged to bail

Australian sheep producers have been issued a "save yourself" message via a long-awaited proposal that encourages them to either quit the business -- or radically change the way they sell wool. The report, sanctioned by the Wool Future Directions Taskforce, blamed fixed-price schemes, centralized wool marketing, and auctions for creating a "culture of dependency." In an interview with The Australian newspaper, Wool Future Directions Taskforce Chairman Ian McLachlan said the industry must change for the benefit of future wool growers. "The central message for wool growers and other wool businesses is this: There is nobody out there to save you, but there are ways you can save yourself if you are sufficiently determined, resourceful, flexible and innovative."

Recommendations put forth by the task force for turning the industry's dire situation around include the introduction of legislation that would protect "truth in labeling" at point of export and government assistance in helping marginal farmers "leave the land." It was also recommended that growers who are not the country's top 20 percent profiteers "reconsider their future," and that part of the Australian textile industry's \$700 million tariff-pause windfall be used for industry development. The final recommendation calls for the replacement of both the Australian Wool Research and Promotion body and the Woolmark Co. with an innovation-focused organization, which would place growers, as the organization's shareholders, in charge of operations.

Wool considered for environmental role

Wool may soon become the "natural" choice for yet another environmental task -- the extraction of heavy metals -- thanks to research being conducted by scientists at New Zealand's Wool Research Organization. Working with the Wool Research Organization of New Zealand (WRONZ), The scientists slightly modified the wool, thereby increasing its uptake of heavy metals and harmful chemicals. The wool could be used in the treatment of wastewater and in

heavy-metal industries such as galvanizing. The new material, called Woolspill, consists of pea-sized wool balls or "knops." It has been licensed to Orica NZ Ltd., which will debut the product at an environmental exhibition in Tokyo later this year. Orica Business Development Technologist Greg Lowe says the product will be marketed heavily overseas as natural, New Zealand-made and biodegradable.

Two 10,000-ft. new pool wildcats are planned 12.3 miles southeast of Ozona by Houston-based Primal Energy Inc. The wells will be designated as the No. 1 Read "A" and the No. 4 Read. They are near existing production in a Strawn Sand pay horizon of the Read Ranch Field. The No. 1 is in a 640-acre unit in the GC&SFRR Survey A-4057 while the No. 4 is in a 640-acre unit, TCRR Survey A-3459.

Flowing 686,000 CF gas per day on a 1.375-in. choke, the No. 4 H. H. West "B" has been brought on line in Crockett County's Henderson Field. Location is about 11 miles southeast of Ozona with Texaco Exploration as the operator. The well received an 800,000-CFD rating on absolute open flow. It probed to an 8,000-ft. bottom and was perforated to produce from the Canyon Sand. Production ranges from 7,778 to 7,914 feet into the hole.

Union Pacific Resources of Fort Worth has filed for permit to conduct a recompletion for extended well life at the No. 7 Jones-Miller in the Ozona Field. Now bottomed at 6,900 feet, it will seek new production in the Canyon Sand. The operation will be in a 320-acre unit in the GCSFRR Survey A-5422 about 11 miles southwest of Ozona.

J. Cleo Thompson, independent operator from Midland, has revealed plans to drill two 9,500-ft. new pool wildcats near proven pay in the Ozona Field. The wells will be known as the Nos. 3-31-31S and 4-31-7n University. Locations are in 320-acre drilling units in the University Lands, 11 and 15 miles southwest of Ozona, respectively.

Cross Timbers Operating Co. of Midland has filed for permit to conduct two recompletions for extended pay in the Ozona Field about 14 miles southwest of Ozona. The wells are designated as the Nos. 4 and 8 Henderson "23". They are in a 320-acre drilling unit in the GC&SFRR Survey A-2122. They now are bottomed at depths of 9,100 and 9,110 feet, respectively. New production in the Canyon Sand will be the goal.

APPLICATION. Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, P.O. Box 117, Ozona, Texas 76943-0117, has applied for a Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) wastewater permit. The applicant has an existing Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) Permit No. 10059-001. The draft permit authorizes the discharge of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 500,000 gallons per day. Issuance of the proposed TPDES Permit No. 10059-001 will replace the existing TNRCC Permit No. 10059-001.

The plant site is located approximately 3,000 feet west of the State Highway 163 and approximately 2.5 miles south of Interstate Highway 10 in Crockett County, Texas. The treated effluent is discharged into Johnson's Draw; thence to the Devils River in Segment No. 2309 of the Rio Grande Basin. The unclassified receiving water uses are no significant aquatic life uses for Johnson's Draw. The designated uses for Segment No. 2309 are exceptional aquatic life uses, public water supply and contact recreation.

The Executive Director of the TNRCC has prepared a draft permit which, if approved, will authorize the conditions under which the facility must operate.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING. Written public comments and requests for public meetings may be submitted to the Office of the Chief Clerk, at the address provided in the information section below, within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of this notice. A public meeting is intended for the taking of public comment, and is not a contested case hearing. A public meeting will be held if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application.

CONTESTED CASE HEARING. The TNRCC may grant a contested case hearing on this application if a written hearing request is filed within 30 days from the date

of newspaper publication of this notice. The Executive Director may approve the application unless a request for a contested case hearing is filed within 30 days after newspaper publication of this notice.

To request a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "(I/we) request a contested case hearing;" (4) a brief and specific description of how you would be affected by the application in a way not common to the general public; and (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the proposed activity. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address provided in the information section below.

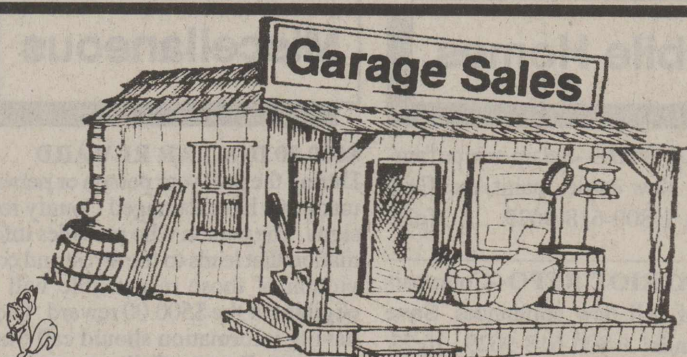
If a hearing request is filed, the Executive Director will not issue the permit and will forward the application and hearing request to the TNRCC Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

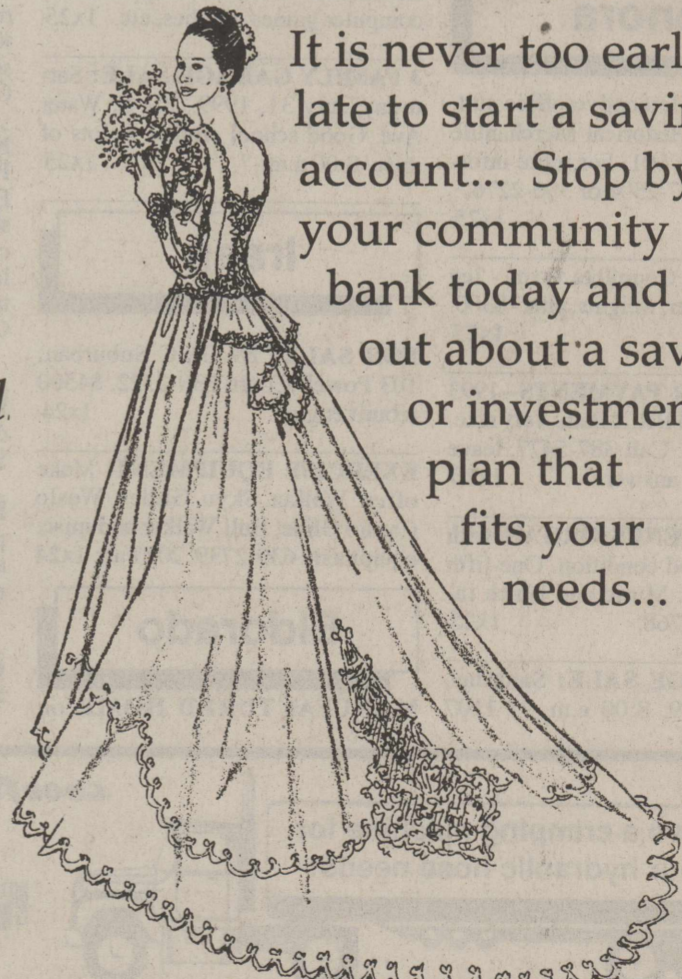
