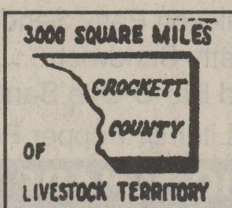

Accident kills one, injures five

A motor vehicle accident two miles west of Ozona Saturday morning resulted in the death of a six-month-old child, and five other passengers were injured. All are from Weslaco.

The deceased, Mariah Lazo, was not restrained by a car seat or a safety belt according to the accident report.

Michael Lazo, age 3, received head injuries and was in serious condition. He was taken by Air Flight of Abilene to a Lubbock hospital after being taken by ambulance to Family

Health Center of Ozona. Jose Lazo Jr., Ofelia Lazo, Michelle Lazo and Roberto Lazo received lesser injuries and were in stable condition. Jose was also taken to Lubbock by Air Flight.

Ofelia Lazo was found on top of a road cut after being thrown 24 1/2 feet from the vehicle. Although not wearing a seat belt, Michelle Lazo, who was sitting in the right rear of the 1996 Ford Explorer, was the only occupant not ejected. The accident report showed that 14-year-old Roberto

was the only occupant wearing a seat belt.

The accident occurred around 7:20 a.m. as Jose Lazo Jr. was driving westbound on I-10. He fell asleep, and the vehicle drifted into the center median. After the driver over-corrected, the vehicle went into a sideways skid, then crossed back onto the roadway. Lazo steered to the left, causing the vehicle to turn over about four times.

Investigating officers were Trooper Monte Carroll and Sgt. Carl Mayfield.

County must fund own access road

Judge Jeffrey Sutton was notified last week by the Texas Department of Transportation of policy which would prohibit their funding an interstate access road.

Walter G. McCullough, district engineer for the San Angelo TxDOT district, said that the department's policy would allow them to conduct the planning, design and construction of frontage road extension meeting their criteria at the expense of the sponsoring governmental agency.

Texas Administrative Code 15.54, which governs construction of transportation facilities, states that "The department may assist a requesting local government in the construction of additional frontage roads as fol-

lows: (i) where a usable section of frontage road that will be of benefit to the traveling public is to be developed (usable section being defined as an addition or extension from a cross road separation to cross road separation or connecting to a public roadway or major traffic generator).

A rough preliminary estimate of the requested extension indicates that the cost of this project, including preliminary engineering and construction administration costs, would be \$1.8 million, McCullough said. This estimate represents anticipated costs for a bridge and approach roadway necessary to connect the existing frontage road to the Chandlerdale West addition.

McCullough's communication with Judge Sutton resulted from a resolution adopted by the Crockett County Commissioner's Court on Aug. 9. In the resolution, the county asked TxDOT to build a bridge and access road off I-10 west of Ozona, citing health and safety needs of

Chandlerdale west residents as reasons for the request.

Commissioners voted in May to build a bridge from Hwy. 163 South across Johnson Draw on War Admiral Street to alleviate problems created by high water when it rains.

Construction project geared to safety improvement

A highway construction project which is underway beginning at the north edge of Ozona on Hwy. 137 should result in safety improvements for motorists, says Hector DeHoyos,

head of the Ozona TxDOT office.

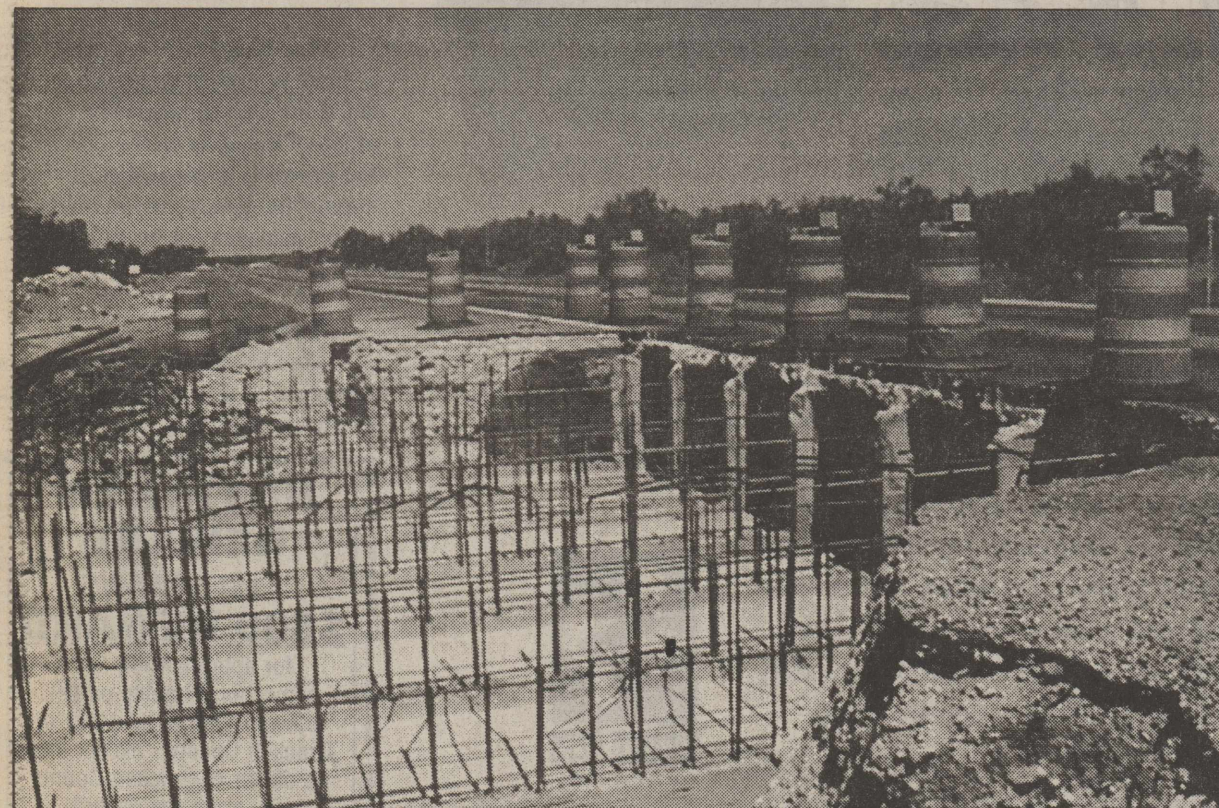
Widening of bridge and drain areas between town and the Hwy. 137 intersection is the first phase. When the project is completed in the summer of 2000, the highway will have been widened to four lanes up to the Crockett County Road Department. Curbing and gutter will be placed from the road department into town.

"The Hwy. 163 and 137 intersection will be changed into as much of a T-intersection as our property will allow," said DeHoyos. Eliminating the traffic merge aspect at this location will be a safety improvement. There will be a turning lane off Hwy. 163.

During the construction, the road from town to approximately one-half mile north of the Big Lake turnoff will be torn down completely. This will be done in sections and involves taking the road down "a couple of feet" and stabilizing with new material.

There will be times when the surface is slushy and travel inconvenient, DeHoyos knows, but once completed, the improvements will be evident.

Eventually the highway will be re-done to the 190 intersection. Bids for that portion will probably be let in the summer of 2000.

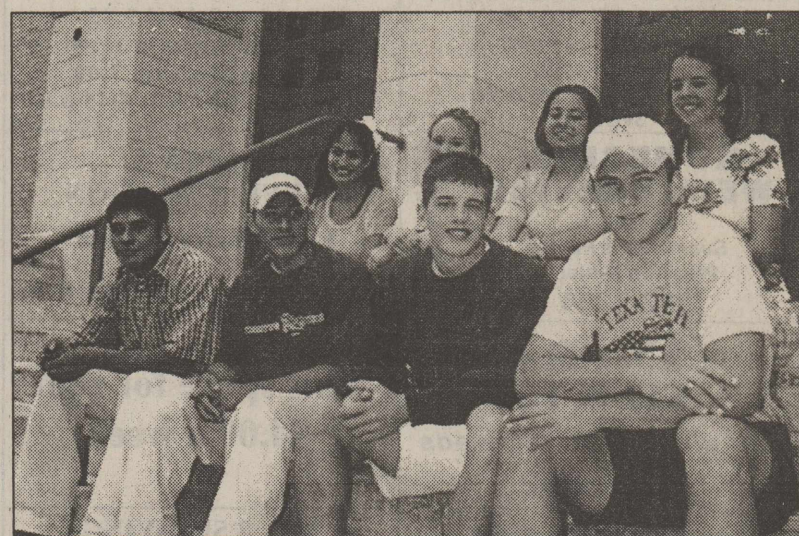

Braves scalp the Lions 32-6

Coach Steve Taylor's Ozona Lions again met their match Friday night as they battled the all powerful Iraan Braves in Lion Stadium.

The Lions came out on the field in force in the first quarter as they hit pay dirt with 3:55 left on the clock from a Ross Crawford 10-yard pass to Bobby Cervantez for six-points. The extra point attempt was unsuccessful putting the Lions in the lead 6-0 which they held for the remainder of the half.

The Braves came to life in the third quarter when they put points on the board from a 13-yard touchdown run and a successful extra point attempt giving them the lead for the first time in the football game.

The Braves continued their scoring abilities against the Lions later in the third quarter with a 49-yard pass play and a 25-yard fumble return increasing their lead over the Lions by 13 points.

Iraan scored their final touchdown of the night on a 20-yard pass play leaving the Lions in defeat 32-6.

"We just made too many mistakes in the second half against a good team to be able to win. We had some injuries and some people out of position which in addition to bad field position and turnovers made for a bad third quarter. Iraan did a good job of taking advantage of the situation," Coach Steve Taylor stated after the game.

Coach Taylor further stated, "The young men played a great first half and never gave up. This game won't hurt us at all, if these young men will learn from it and keep believing in themselves. We've got a good football team and when we play like we did during the first half we can play with anybody."

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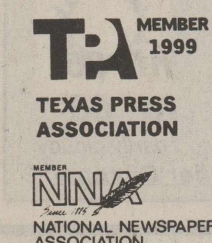

The next meeting will be a trip to Lamesa on October 2 to view the bronze collection of Mr. John Saleh.

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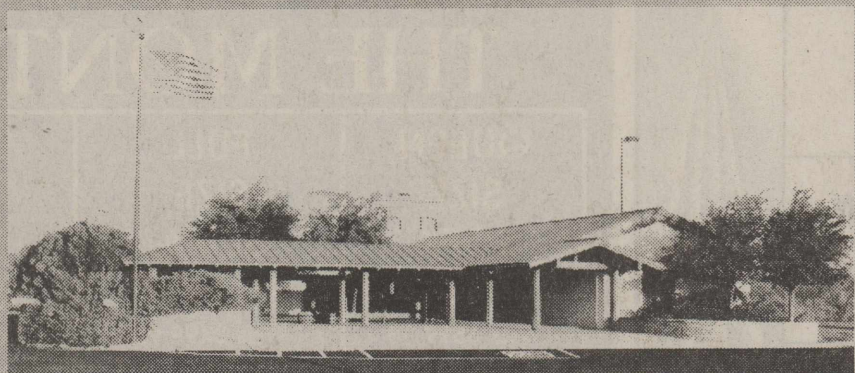
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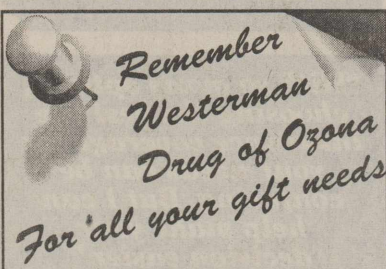

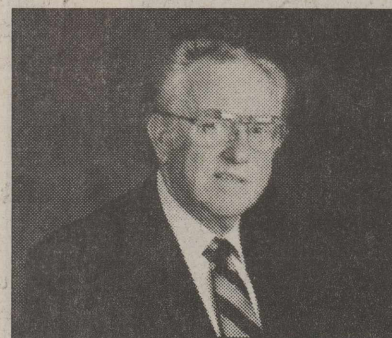
Victor McManus leads Baptist revival

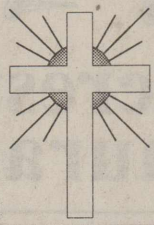
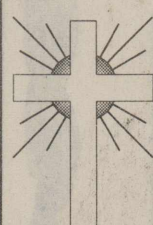
God's law regulated this practice. "If a man has committed a sin worthy

JoLynn Warden earned a bachelor of science degree in nutritional sciences. She is the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Gary Vannoy.

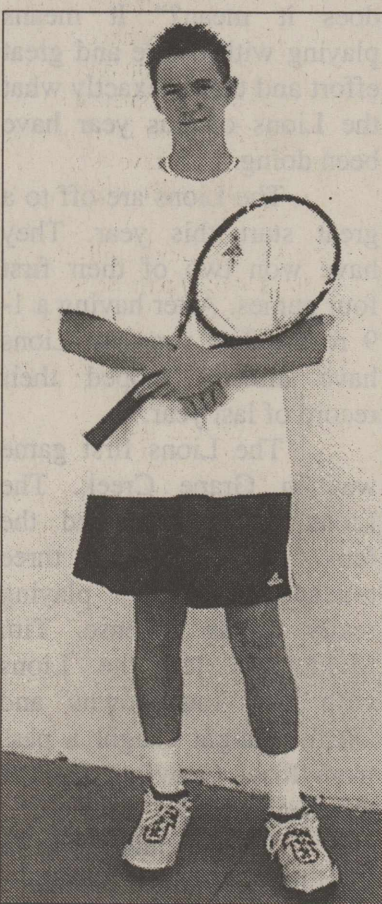
