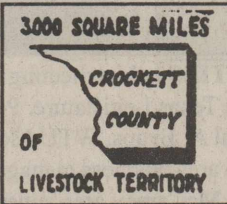

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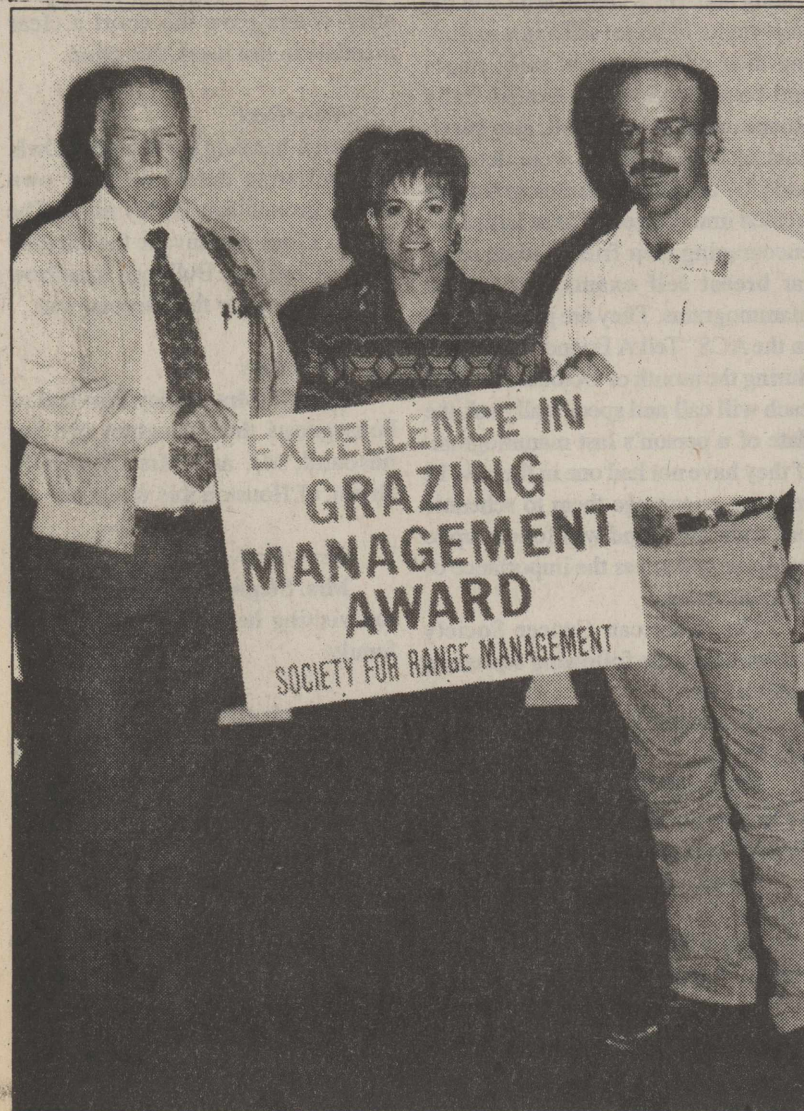

**Commissioners change bridge location**

Commissioners voted Monday to change the location of a bridge to Chandlerdale West from War Admiral to Pecan Street. A Pecan Street crossing of Johnson Draw had been considered before, but was rejected by the court as being a possible detriment to the building by the state of an interstate south access road. Now that the Texas Department of Transportation has informed the county that they will not fund an access road, commissioners decided to change bridge locations.

Gary Harris, engineer for the firm of Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, met with the court to discuss his company's progress on the bridge project. Harris explained that he has learned that the Corps of Engineers did not do a watershed analysis for the area downstream from Ozona when dams were built after the flood of 1954. He expects to be able to have two bridge options developed for a Pecan Street crossing by the first of the year if not sooner.

Commissioners discussed a 30' wide road surface with a 4' walkway on one side, guard rails and load limits. They voted to allocate an additional \$12,500.00 if needed to complete the engineering study. The hiring of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper was authorized by the court in late May with \$10,000.00 approved at that time.

Judge Jeffrey Sutton advised the court that he would be in San Angelo Tuesday to attend a meeting relating to the national flood insurance pro-

gram. Effective in the year 2002, all Texas counties will be required to participate in this program.

Possible solutions for the disposal of solid waste were looked at by commissioners. Big Lake is interested in having Ozona use their new facility, according to Eddie Moore, road and parks superintendent. Judge Sutton was asked to look into locating an area for a landfill and a place to transport junked and abandoned automobiles. The county has a contract with Mingo Perez to dispose of autos.

After discussing the use of Perez' salvage yard, court members voted to spend \$12,000.00 to finish fencing the property with prisoner labor as part of the project. The county had previously purchased materials to fence the front of the property and 125' down each side with Perez to provide the labor.

They also voted to authorize the judge to pursue purchase of Shannon Estate's Class IV landfill.

In another trash related agenda item, the court passed a resolution authorizing the submission of an application for a \$17,500.00 grant to buy five additional roll off trash disposal containers.

Action on an application for a pipeline permit for GPM Gas Corporation was tabled until Bill Mason, county attorney, and Eddie Moore come up with the proper verbiage. Mason is developing a contract to be used for pipelines, and it is not complete at this time.

The court discussed options for

helping with office space for the Texas Tech University Health Science Center's WIC program in Ozona. A vote was taken and approval given to pay half the rent for the office. Crockett County had paid half the rent several years ago. Other counties/cities provide facilities for the program.

Architect Kim Williams of Austin met with commissioners to discuss restoration of the courthouse and landscaping to tie the courthouse, annex and museum building together. A renovation plan needs to be in effect in order to compete for state money for such projects.

When the bond election was passed to build the annex, voters also approved \$55,000.00 for renovation of the courthouse.

Williams will meet further with commissioners about the project.

Linda Knightstep of Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo and Dr. Marcus Sims talked with the court about the helicopter landing pad at the Ozona clinic. Pilots of the emergency chopper feel the current site near the Rehab office is safe. "Your best bet is to stay with what you have," said Knightstep.

She also reported to the court that

bringing a dialysis unit to Ozona is not possible due to the facts that patients are high risk, specially trained personnel are necessary and expensive equipment is required. Mrs. Knightstep had been asked to look in to the possibility due to the number of patients here who go to San Angelo several times a week for dialysis.

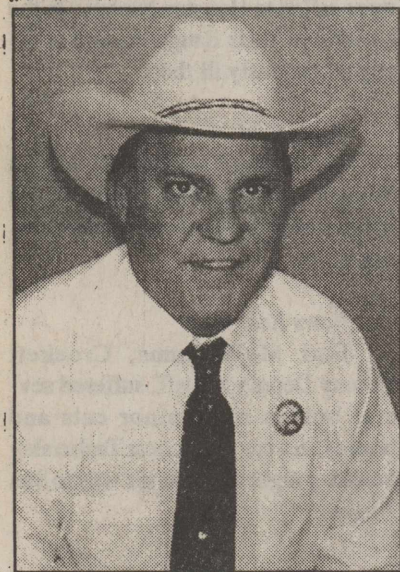
Action was tabled pending acquisition of more information regarding refusal of life insurance coverage by Principal Financial Group for certain retirees.

Advertisement for a firm to conduct employee drug and alcohol testing was approved by the court. They also approved payment by the county for flu shots for employees and dependents. Employment of a firm to determine whether or not the county needs to redistrict was discussed. Every county will have to look at this possibility after the census is taken in the year 2000.

Jim Roddie was present to give a report on the care center. He said there were 35 ambulance calls in September with 25 patients transported. Ozona Family Health Clinic had 308 patient visits for Dr. Sims and 253 to

**Crockett County ranchers receive awards**

Marty Acton and Bobbie Renfro were recognized last week in Stephenville among the recipients of the Excellence in Rangeland Management Award. This award was presented at the annual meeting of the Texas Section Society for Range Management.

The excellence in rangeland management award is presented to those ranchers that the TSSRM feels are doing an outstanding job in range and ranch management. Nominations are sent to a committee of the TSSRM each year. The committee evaluates the nominations and selects only those who are doing an excellent job and setting examples for others to follow.

This brother and sister team was selected because they have done a superior job of range and ranch management. They grew up in the ranching business and carried on the excellent job of management taught to them by their parents, Earl and Pam Acton. The ranch is operated in a one herd-two pasture grazing system with the stock being rotated every four months. Over half of the ranch has been tree dozed or aerially sprayed to control mesquite, redberry juniper and prickly pear. Several areas on the ranch have been tree dozed to control the juniper and then several years later sprayed to control the mesquite and the prickly pear. The planned grazing system has made the brush management practices and the deferment following the control very easy. The forage production following the brush management has been incredible.

Along with the brush management they have installed over three and one-half miles of pipeline, a water storage facility and several troughs. This water development has improved the grazing distribution tremendously. The combination of brush management, water development and grazing

management has greatly improved the quality and quantity of desirable forage.

Marty and Bobbie have promoted range management by demonstrating their ability to apply sound rangeland management to their land. They have an excellent knowledge of range and wildlife management and a concern for conservation. The TSSRM is proud to make this award presentation as ranchers like Marty and Bobbie are the ones actually on the land ensuring that productive rangelands will be here for future generations. Undoubtedly this brother and sister team will continue to promote wise use of natural resources and be leaders in the ranching industry.

## Electric restructuring

What Senate Bill 7 means to you

Paul Evans, West Texas Utilities Company area business manager, was in Ozona last week to talk about Senate Bill 7 passed by the Texas Legislature in 1999. This law gives retail customers the opportunity to choose their electric provider beginning Jan. 1, 2002. Along with Evans were Sharon Tinsley, area business manager out of Sonora, account manager Sean Jurica of San Angelo and Gene Morris of Ozona, supervisor of systems distributing.

With the aid of a video it was explained that retail competition begins Jan. 1, 2002, for most areas of the state. Retail electric cooperatives and municipal utilities can decide whether they want to participate in retail competition. Delivery of the electricity over the power lines will remain the responsibility of the local utility company.

Customers who do not choose an alternate supplier will stay with the utility's affiliated retail electric provider (REP), the affiliate that will be responsible for selling electricity.

For all REPs that serve more than 300 megawatts (MW) of load in Texas, no less than five percent of the load served must be for residential customers.

In areas in which customer choice is in effect, a provider of last resort shall be designated to offer a standard service package at an approved price to any requesting retail customer. Designating a provider of last resort will ensure that all customers have the opportunity to purchase electric service.

Pilot programs allowing customer choice for five percent of a utility's load will begin on June 1, 2001.

Investor-owned utilities and other utilities opting to participate in retail competition must freeze rates in effect on Sept. 1, 1999, through Dec. 31, 2001.

Starting on Jan. 1, 2002, an additional six percent reduction will be available for residential and small commercial customers for 60 months. This reduction is known as the "Price to Beat".

Utility REPs can begin competing in their own service territories for either residential or small commercial customers at a price different from the Price to Beat, after 36 months or when 40 percent of the respective class (residential or small commercial customer)

## Breast cancer survivors emphasize importance of exams, mammograms

"October has been designated Breast Cancer Awareness Month by the American Cancer Society," stated ACS county chairman Elizabeth Upham, "and we in Crockett County join with others across the United States in proclaiming our "hope for the cure" of breast cancer signified by the pink ribbon on the courthouse pillar and the pink lapel ribbons many will wear this month."

Breast cancer accounts for one out of every three cancer diagnoses in the United States. All women are at risk of developing breast cancer, and the single most important risk factor in all women is increasing age. Over 76% of new breast cancer cases each year are in women over the age of 50.

Breast cancer survivors Joyce Young and Veva Vargas both cite the importance of breast self exam in finding their own cancer at early stages and being successfully treated. Sally Roane and Debbie Arrott, also survivors of breast cancer, were detected early by an annual mammogram and treated immediately. These ladies are encouraging their friends to do regular breast self exams and annual mammograms. They are participating in the ACS "Tell A Friend" campaign during the month of October in which each will call and specifically ask the date of a person's last mammogram. If they have not had one in the past 12 months, encourage them to schedule one right away and will follow-up to continue and stress the importance of this screening.

The American Cancer Society recommends the following screening guidelines:

Breast self-exam monthly after age 20  
 Physician breast exam by a doctor or nurse every three years aged 30-39 and annually after age 40  
 Mammography annually after age 40.

These are guidelines for women with no symptoms; women experiencing breast problems or at high risk for breast cancer should consult their physician.

"Mammography, an x-ray of the breast, is the single most effective method of screening since the procedure can detect cancer before physical symptoms are apparent," says Elizabeth Ann Wadsworth, Wesley Nurse, Ozona United Methodist Church.

There will be two opportunities to have mammograms done in Ozona. The Texas Tech Mobile Mammography unit will be at the Ozona Health Fair at the Ozona United Methodist Church on Nov. 10, and the Shannon Mobile Mammography unit will be at the Family Health Care Center on Nov. 23.

If you would like more information about scheduling a mammogram, contact Elizabeth Ann Wadsworth at 392-3060, or if you would like to volunteer for the "Tell A Friend" Campaign, call Elizabeth Upham at 392-2334.

"Show your support this month in the hope for the cure of this disease by wearing a pink ribbon, and, more importantly, scheduling your own annual mammogram," stated Mrs. Upham.

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## Permian Basin Poetry Festival Oct. 16

The Permian Basin Poetry Society's World Day of Poetry Festival will take place from 1:00-5:00 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 16, at the Center for Energy and Economic Diversification located at the intersection of Highway 191 and FM 1788 between Midland and Odessa.

Visiting poet for the festival will be Paul Ruffin, who will conduct a writing workshop from 1:00-3:00 p.m. The workshop will be followed by a poetry reading by Ruffin, an awards ceremony for winners of the World Day of Poetry contest, including a reading of their winning poems, and a reception and book signing.

Registration fee for the workshop is \$10.00 and may be paid at the door. There is no admission charge for the poetry reading, awards ceremony and reception.

Paul Ruffin is the author of essays, reviews and short fiction as well as poetry. He directs the creative writing program at Sam Houston State University, where he edits the Texas Review, an internationally distributed literary journal. He has done readings and workshops all across the south and southwest and in New England, the northwest and England, including appearances at numerous writing conferences and colleges and universities.

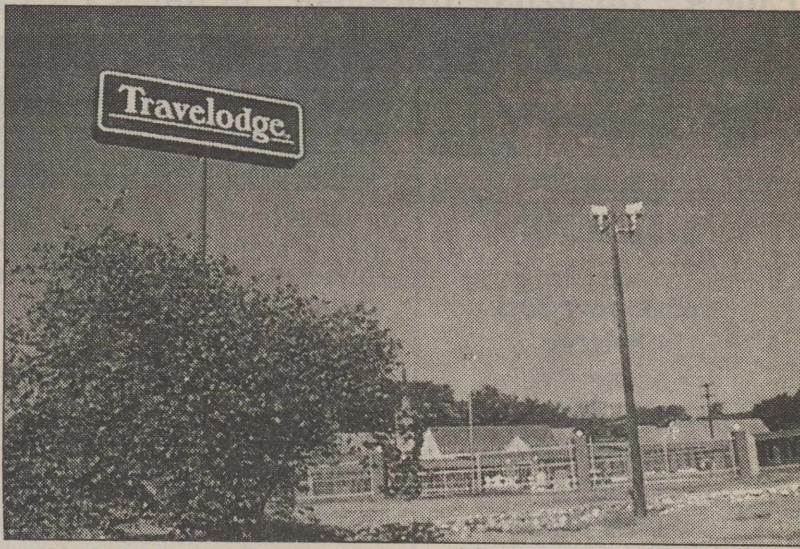
More than 600 of his poems have appeared in literary journals and anthologies. His book of poems called *Circling* was the 1997 winner of the Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters award for poetry.

### Why Join?

What do you think? Is church membership important? After all, you can derive all the benefits without any of the responsibility. Why join? Good question.

Jesus Christ guides us to formal ties with the visible body. The Great Commission makes this clear. "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:19-20).

Disciple includes baptism. Look at the example of the New Testament church. Peter preached. Many were converted. "Those who had received his word were baptized; and that day there were added about three thousand souls" (Acts 2:41). Those converted to faith in Christ were baptized. They were added to the number of the disciples in this fashion.

The disciples met together. "They were continually devoting themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer" (Acts 2:42). They were willing to sit and learn all that Christ commanded. This was their commitment.

Biblically speaking, discipleship includes a formal relationship with the church ratified by baptism. Discipleship also includes a pledge to learn all that Christ commands. To be disciples there must be baptized commitment within the visible church.

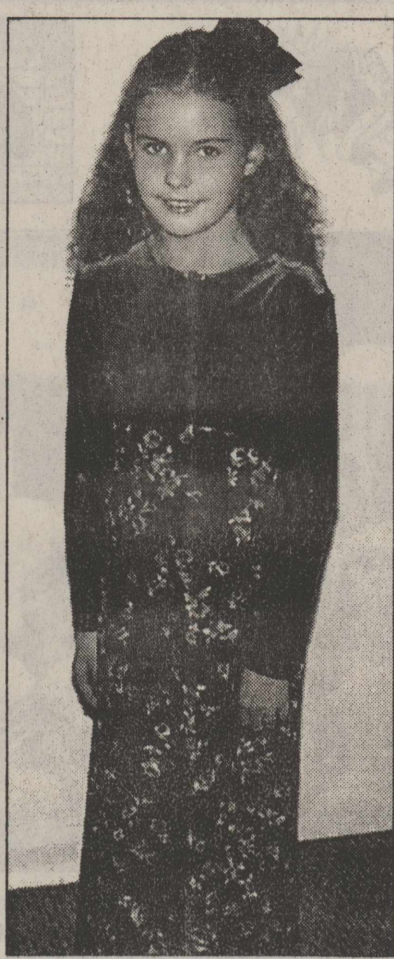

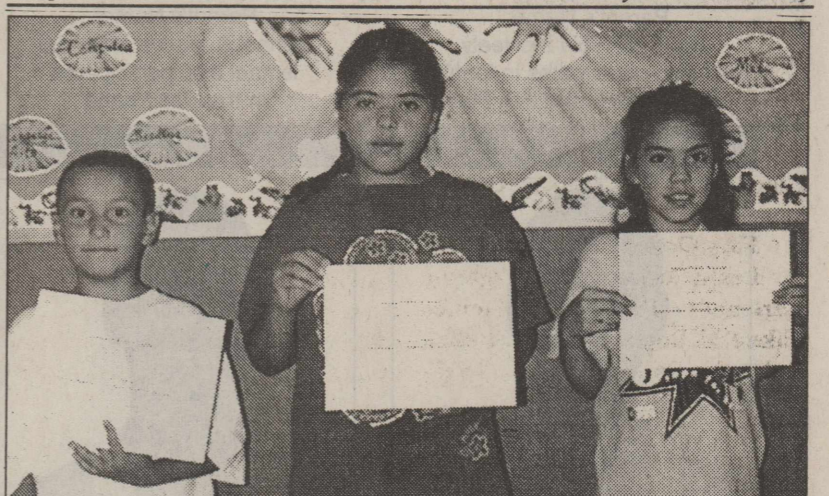

**Ozona firemen battle oil truck fire**

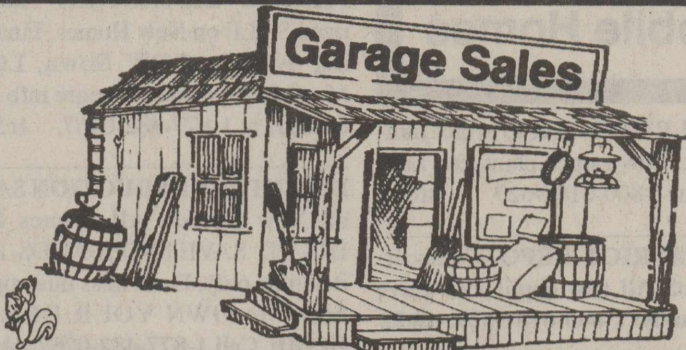
