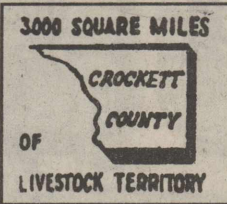

LIONS BI-DISTRICT CHAMPS

The Ozona Lion football team traveled to Big Lake Nov. 11 to compete against the Reagan County Owls for the bi-district championship and to move further toward the state playoffs. The Lions and the Owls each finished their regular season with a record of 7-3.

The Lions have made a complete turnaround from last year's season record of 1-9. The Lions are dedicated to being the best they can be and are more confident than they ever have been in part due to new Head Coach Steve Taylor and his group of coaches, Benjy Unger, Ty Payne, Jeff Streun, Bobby Azam, Lynn Searcy, David Delgado, Tom Duncan, Steve Osborn and Rick Bachman who have shown the Lions that they are a very talented team and can play ball against any team as long as they believe they can.

The Lions' stands were packed full of Ozona fans who were cheering the players on when they came out to warm up on the field before the game. This had to make the Lions feel great to look up in the stands to see the large crowd cheering them on well before the game even started.

It was obvious that the Reagan County Owls thought that all they had to do was to show up and that would intimidate the Lions enough for the Owls to beat them and move further into the playoffs. However, the Mighty Lions soon proved to the Owls that they had not seen the new and improved Ozona Lions and that the Lions had the confidence to take on any team and the skill to beat the Owls. Just as the Lions did when they captured the bi-district championship.

In the first quarter, the Owls held the Lions, forcing them to punt. As they began to return the ball, the Owls fumbled, and Lion Tim Maldonado recovered the ball. On the next play, Ross Crawford took off down the right side of the field for a 64-yard touchdown run. Cade Clark then kicked the ball successfully for the Lions. The Lions took an early lead 7-0 in the first quarter with 9:52 remaining on the clock.

The Owls came back after several series to score for the Owls on a 26-yard pass, narrowing the Lions' lead to 7-6.

In the second quarter, both teams remained scoreless until the Owls flew dangerously close to the end zone, attempting to score another touchdown. The Lions held the Owls and forced them to kick for a field goal. The Owls connected with the 23-yard field goal, successfully kicking the goal complete for a 2-point lead over the Lions.

At halftime, the Owls remained two points ahead of the Lions with the scoreboard reading Owls 9 - Lions 7.

Both teams remained scoreless in the third quarter.

In the fourth quarter, both teams exchanged possessions. With 2:00 minutes remaining in the ballgame, Lion Bobby Cervantez intercepted the ball from an Owl pass to eventually score another

touchdown for the Lions as quarterback Ross Crawford threw a sweet 30-yard pass toward the end zone where Dustin Faught stretched out over the side of the end zone and hauled it in for the go-ahead score.

Clay Richardson ran the 2-point conversion in for the extra two points, increasing the score to Lions 15 - Owls 9.

With less than two minutes remaining in the game, Crawford was forced to punt deep in Lion territory. The ball bounced off the chest of an Owl player and into the arms of Lion defender Cade Clark, ending the Owls' season and sending the Lions into a celebration mode winning bi-district and proving that Owls don't belong in the jungle.

Offensively, Crawford had 117 yards passing for one touchdown and rushed for 76 yards and a 64-yard touchdown run. Seth Webster and Dustin Faught combined for 105 yards receiving and one touchdown.

Defensively, Tim Maldonado and Ray Ramos had an awesome night, each having 11 tackles. Also having a great game was Ty Mitchell with 10 tackles.

"These kids just keep getting better and better each week," said Coach Taylor after the game, "but that's what you have to do if you want to keep playing."

"Dustin Faught made two great catches, especially on the winning touchdown, and Ross Crawford played great again, making a lot of good decisions. The offensive line of Mario Barrera, Lance Unger, Ty Mitchell, Fabian Trujillo and Dustin Shaffer did a great job of giving Ross time to throw.

"Defensively, Tim Maldonado, Ray Ramos, Ty Allen, Ty Mitchell, Cade Clark, Juan Garcia and Dustin Shaffer did a great job of stopping the run, and the secondary, especially Seth Webster, covered some really dangerous receivers all over the field."

Several members of the team expressed their feelings about the team after the game.

"We're finally reaching our peak," said Ty Mitchell. "Our game has really come together."

Tim Maldonado commented, "We're getting better and better, and if we keep doing that, we'll go far."

Ken Sessom voiced the opinion that "We're finally playing like a team, and that's what it's going to take for us to keep advancing."

Dustin Faught said, "We're playing really solid offensively and defensively, and we're improving ever week."

The Lions will take on the Post Antelopes Friday evening, Nov. 19, at 7:30 p.m. in Big Spring for the regional championship.

School board meets, tours new middle school facilities

Following a 6:00 p.m. tour of the renovations at Ozona Middle School, members of the Ozona School Board during their regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, November 10, heard a report from Duane McQueen, owner of SunWest Construction Company, on the renovation of Ozona Middle School and the Ozona Middle School Gymnasium.

McQueen said that SunWest will have seven renovated classrooms located in the southeast corner of the middle school substantially completed and ready for occupancy on Thursday, November 18. "Heating and air-conditioning will be operable as well as

restroom facilities in this wing of the building, and any corridors leading to the new construction west of this wing will be sealed off for the purpose of safety", McQueen added.

During his report McQueen stated that the Ozona Middle School Gymnasium will be substantially completed and ready for occupancy on Wednesday, November 24, and on Monday, November 29 the gym would be ready for basketball competition.

Following McQueen's report, the trustees discussed a plan for moving the sixth grade students, who are pres-

Care Center complaint investigated

The Texas Department of Human Services was contacted by Crockett County Care Center on Nov. 9 to report allegations of abuse at the center. Administrator Jim Roddie said Monday. The state came Nov. 10 in response to a complaint, and both the allegations and complaint were found to be unsubstantiated, Roddie said.

A survey conducted by the state at the center did reveal three deficiencies, Roddie said. These deal with the policies and procedures on reporting allegations of abuse and investigation of abuse. "We have already addressed these policies and procedures," Roddie said.

The care center board met in emergency session Friday Nov. 12 to discuss the state survey and also met

in executive session to discuss personnel.

The state will send the results of their survey to the center within 10 days of their visit. Then the care center will have 10 days to respond. After that time, the survey will be posted at the care center where it is available for public examination.

"We've still got some work to do, but I think we're going to be fine," Roddie said.

Dennis Morris, who works for a private firm and investigates abuse, will be here Nov. 17 to conduct an inservice on abuse and policy and procedures.

"Our policy on abuse is not as up-to-date as we thought, and as a result, we're working on that," said Judge Jeffrey Sutton.

ently occupying the Ozona Convention Center, into the renovated classrooms at Ozona Middle School. The plan calls for the district to begin moving middle school equipment out of the County 4-H Barn on Thursday, November 18, and into the renovated classrooms. Moving will continue in phases through Tuesday, November 23, and sixth grade students will have their classes in Ozona Middle School on Monday, November 29. The seventh and eighth grade classes will remain where they are until substantial completion has been reached on all renovations and additions at the middle school. "Sixth grade physical education classes and band classes will probably continue under the same arrangement that we have now", Charles Floyd, principal of Ozona Middle School said, "although we may have to walk the sixth grade students to the high school cafeteria for lunch."

During the meeting the members discussed bids received to renovate, install central heating and air conditioning, and place gabled metal roofs on 5 school-owned houses located east of Ozona Intermediate School. While bids were received on renovation materials and the gabled roofs, no bids were received for installing central heating and air conditioning on the five units. Since a central heat-

ing and air conditioning contractor has to work closely with the gabled roof contractor during renovations, the board decided not to accept any bids, and it accepted the administration's recommendation to re-bid the project in January of next year. The trustees approved a proposal by Supt. Larry Taylor to allow the district to pay a certified substitute teacher their professional daily rate after the teacher of record has gone beyond their twelve weeks of Family Medical Leave. Taylor explained that the district has a certified teacher who has been substituting for another teacher who is on Family Medical Leave. "Our policy calls for a substitute teacher who has a teaching certificate to be paid \$45 per day if he/she teaches for a teacher for 1 - 10 consecutive days, and a \$75 per day if he/she teaches for a teacher in excess of 10 consecutive days; however, our policy does not speak to periods of time that may extend to the maximum of 180 days for temporary leave," Taylor said. "What I propose (and what the board approved) is that when leave of this type occurs and if the substitute is a certified teacher, that we keep them classified as a substitute, with board approval on a case by case basis, and that they be paid their daily rate after the teacher of record has gone beyond the twelve weeks of

Family Medical Leave."

The board reviewed a plat survey that was done by Wilson Land Surveying, Inc. of San Angelo of land located behind the Ozona High School Band Hall, home economics building, and high school library. The trustees authorized Board President Wade Richardson to negotiate with the Crockett County Commissioners Court for the exchange of county property for school district property.

The meeting was adjourned following an affirmative vote by the members to set the date and time for a special meeting of the board on November 17 at 6:00 p.m. and to set the date and time for their December regular monthly meeting on December 14 at 7:00 p.m.

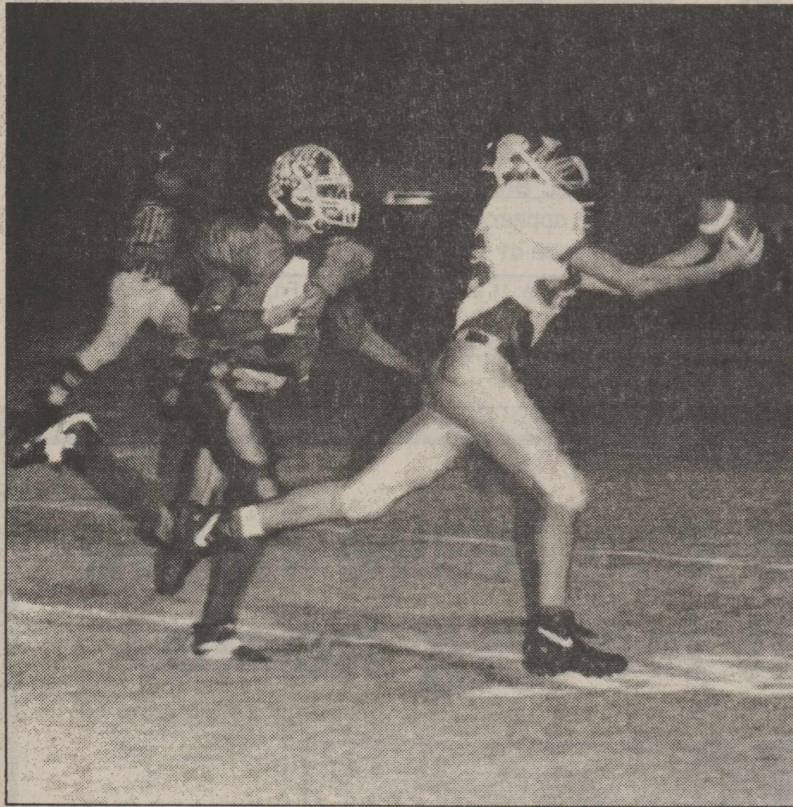

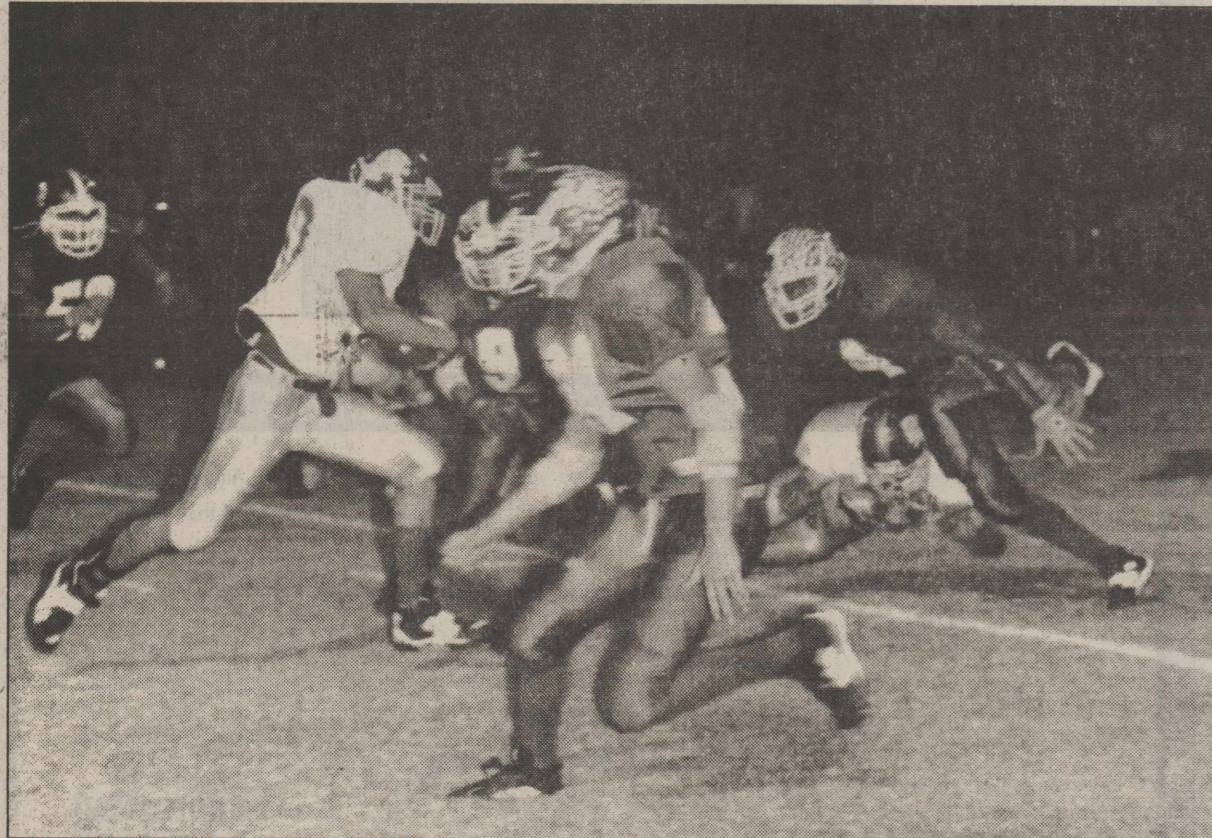

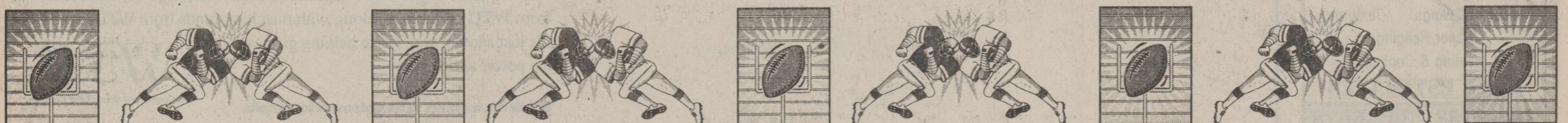

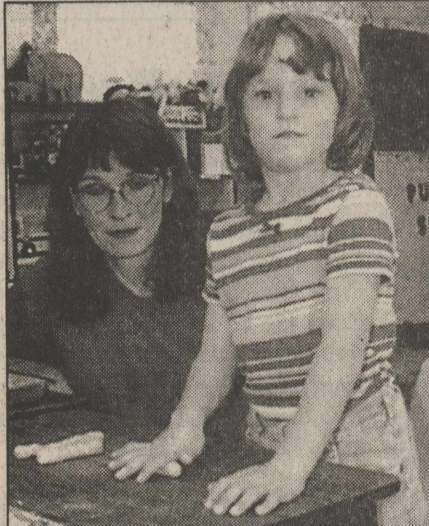

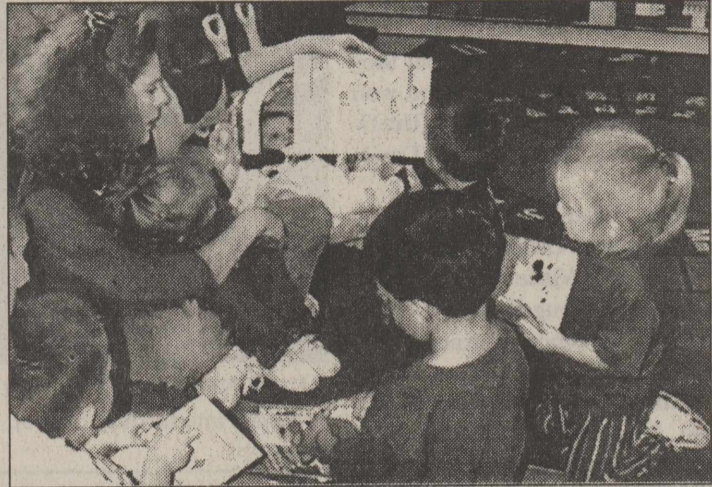

Senior Health Briefs

Aging is a balancing act

HOUSTON—With age, many people expect a slight loss of hearing or sight, but few foresee problems with balance.

According to Dr. Helen Cohen, an assistant professor of otorhinolaryngology at Baylor College of Medicine, as people age, they become less active and can suffer from disequilibrium of aging. DEA is seen mostly in people older than 60, and it might account for why some elderly people fall.

"DEA occurs because the central nervous system begins losing cells. Things just don't work as efficiently. Sight, hearing and memory may also

diminish."

About 20 percent of the population may have some type of disorder of the vestibular labyrinth, the system that monitors the positions and movement of the head before relaying the information to the brain.

To help patients regain their center of balance, Cohen recommends a combination of exercise and therapy. "We encourage walking and, in therapy, we play games such as catching a ball and other exercises that retrain the vestibular system and the brain."

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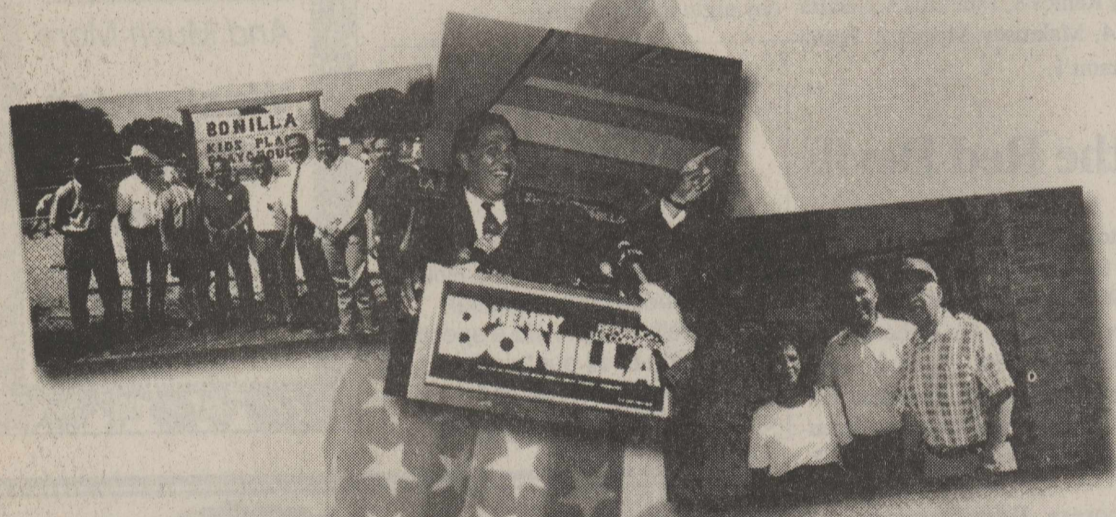
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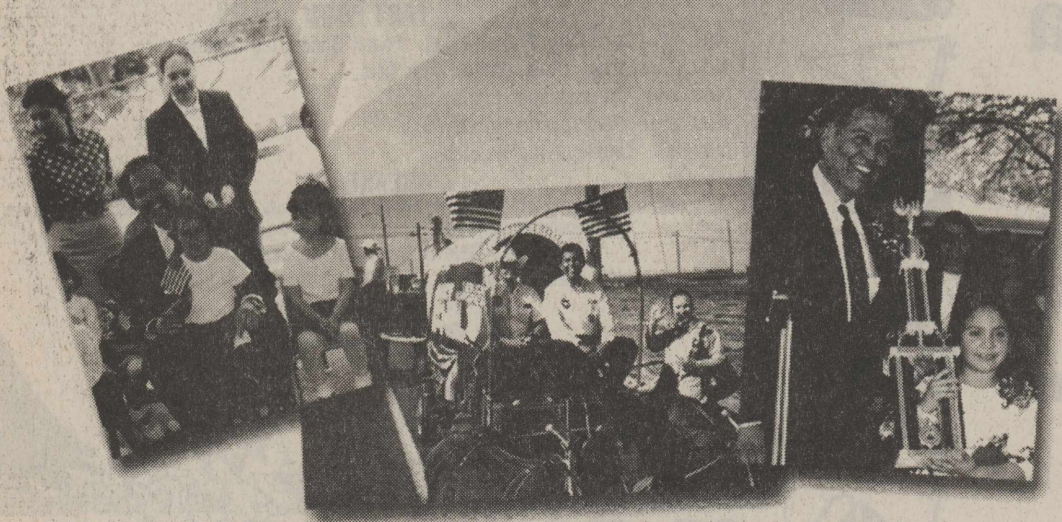

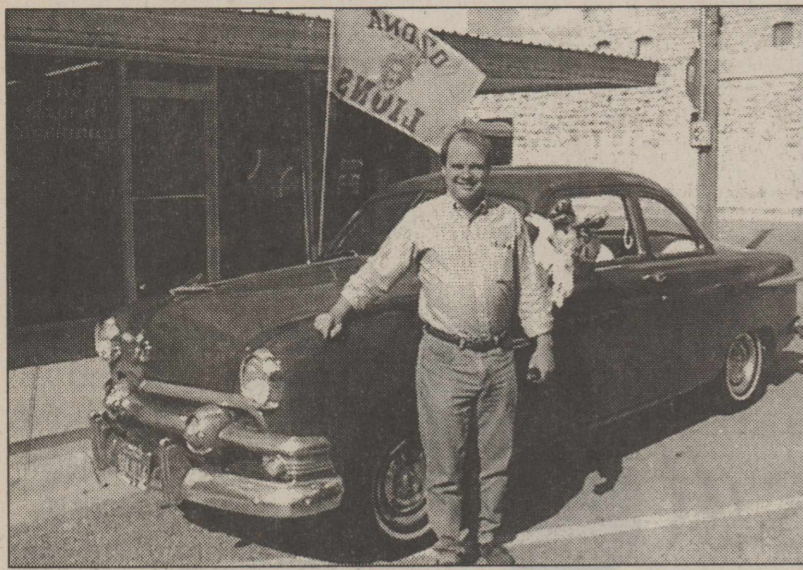

Public comment solicited on pipeline from Houston to El Paso

The U. S. Environmental Protection Agency and U. S. Department of Transportation have made a preliminary finding of no significant impact after completing the environmental assessment on the proposed petroleum pipeline system to be operated by Longhorn Partners Pipeline, L.P. The pipeline could eventually transport up to 225,000 barrels per day of primarily gasoline and distillate from Houston to El Paso.

The pipeline crosses the north-eastern corner of Crockett County. The environmental assessment examined the total operation of the system, including the existing condition of the pipeline and the potential for the pipeline to impact human health and the environment.

The assessment is based on the maximum capacity of the pipeline and "reasonable worstcase spill" scenarios. Several options were evaluated, including no action and alternate routes to avoid sensitive or populated areas. A supplemental assessment will be made to analyze the impacts associated with planned additional pump stations.

- Request that creamy dressings and sauces be served on the side.
- Forgo deep-fried appetizers and side orders.
- When ordering Chinese, order steamed instead of fried rice.
- Choose chicken instead of beef fajitas and corn instead of flour tortillas.
- Order plain, steamed or grilled vegetables, fish and chicken.

Horse test: now the law!

Since September 1, Texas law has required that equine, including horses, donkeys, mules and asses, have a test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA), (also known as "Coggins" or "Swamp Fever") within 12 months before the animals undergo any change of ownership, whether through trade, gift, or sale through private treaty or at a market.

The law exempts zebras, nursing foals less than eight months of age that are changing ownership with their test-negative dams, and equine sold to slaughter.

Persons who sell equine and fail to comply with the law, passed as House Bill 1732 in the 76th Texas Legislature, commit a Class "C" misdemeanor. The 12 governor-appointed commissioners for the Texas Animal Health Commission, the state's livestock health regulatory agency, have adopted a regulation that mirrors the legislation.

"Other aspects of the EIA regulations will not change," explained Dr. Beals, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC).

A negative EIA test within the previous 12 months is required for equine transported to events, races, trail rides, assemblies, or other gath-

erings.

The EIA passport or identification card or the EIA test document, aVS 10-11, is adequate proof of testing. Equine used exclusively for ranch work are exempt from EIA tests, unless they are undergoing change of ownership.

The EIA virus is spread from an infected equine to a "clean" equine by blood-to-blood contact. Biting flies and reused needles can mechanically carry the disease from one horse to another, and unsterilized medical instruments or blood transfusions can put equine at risk.

EIA-infected equine must be euthanized, sold for slaughter or sent to a research facility. If the animal must be kept, it must remain permanently quarantined at least 200 yards from other equine.

"Infected equine can move through the market to slaughter, as they are permanently identified with the 74-A brand and are inspected within 24 hours prior to entering the market," Dr. Beals said. A TAHC or USDA-accredited veterinarian ensures the animal has no clinical signs of the disease and has a normal temperature. The animal will move under a VS 1-27 permit and remains isolated under a roof at the market. It may remain on the premises no longer than 24 hours.

Pendergrass appointed to 83rd District Court

AUSTIN-Governor George W. Bush announced on Oct. 28 the appointment of Carl Pendergrass of Del Rio as judge of the 83rd Judicial District Court in Pecos, Reagan, Terrell, Upton and Val Verde counties. He will replace Judge Alex R. Gonzalez of Fort Stockton, who retired.

Pendergrass will serve until the next general election.

Pendergrass has been an attorney in private practice for over 30 years. He was elected to serve three terms as the Val Verde County Attorney between 1971 and 1979. He has served

on the City of Del Rio's Planning and Zoning Committee and as an advisor to the Department of Human Services Child Welfare Board. He is a former member of the board of directors for the Val Verde Memorial Hospital and the Del Rio Housing Authority. His professional memberships include the State Bar of Texas and the Val Verde County Bar Association.

Pendergrass earned his bachelor's degree from Texas A&M University and his law degree from the South Texas College of Law.

The appointment is subject to Senate confirmation.

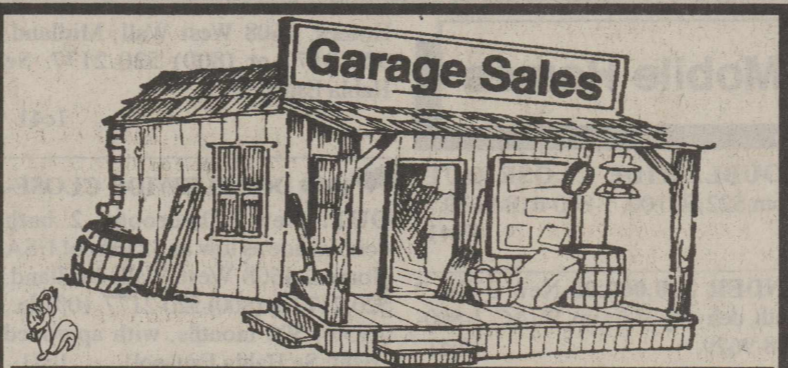

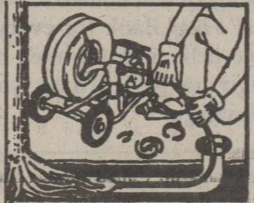
