Ozona school classes begin Monday

Sheriff Shane Fenton and his department would like to ask for the cooperation and assistance of every citizen in maintaining a 100% safe school zone this year. Students in the Ozona school system will begin classes Monday, Aug. 14. In-service for faculty starts Aug. 10.

"We ask that you please be alert and observant at all times while driving near our schools," said Sheriff Fenton.

Sheriff Fenton says that areas of concern are high school students and parents speeding toward the field house, drivers failing to stop for school buses when red lights are flashing (vehicles on both sides of the street are required to stop), drivers talking on mobile phones while inside the school zone and drivers speeding and running stop signs in areas outside the

school zones.

"The safety of our kids has a higher priority than any excuse for speeding or careless driving," the sheriff said.

School Zone Locations:

Primary School - Hwy. 163 enforced when lights are flashing, Monterrey St. and Martinez St., marked by signs and enforced 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Intermediate School - 14th Street enforced when lights are flashing, Jones Street marked by signs and enforced from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Middle School - Ave. G and 5th Street marked by signs and enforced 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

High School - Ave. E enforced when lights are flashing. Ave. D marked by signs and enforced 7:30 to 4:00 p.m.

Sterling City, 2 Murphy Black of Ozona and 3 Lane Hale of Ozona.

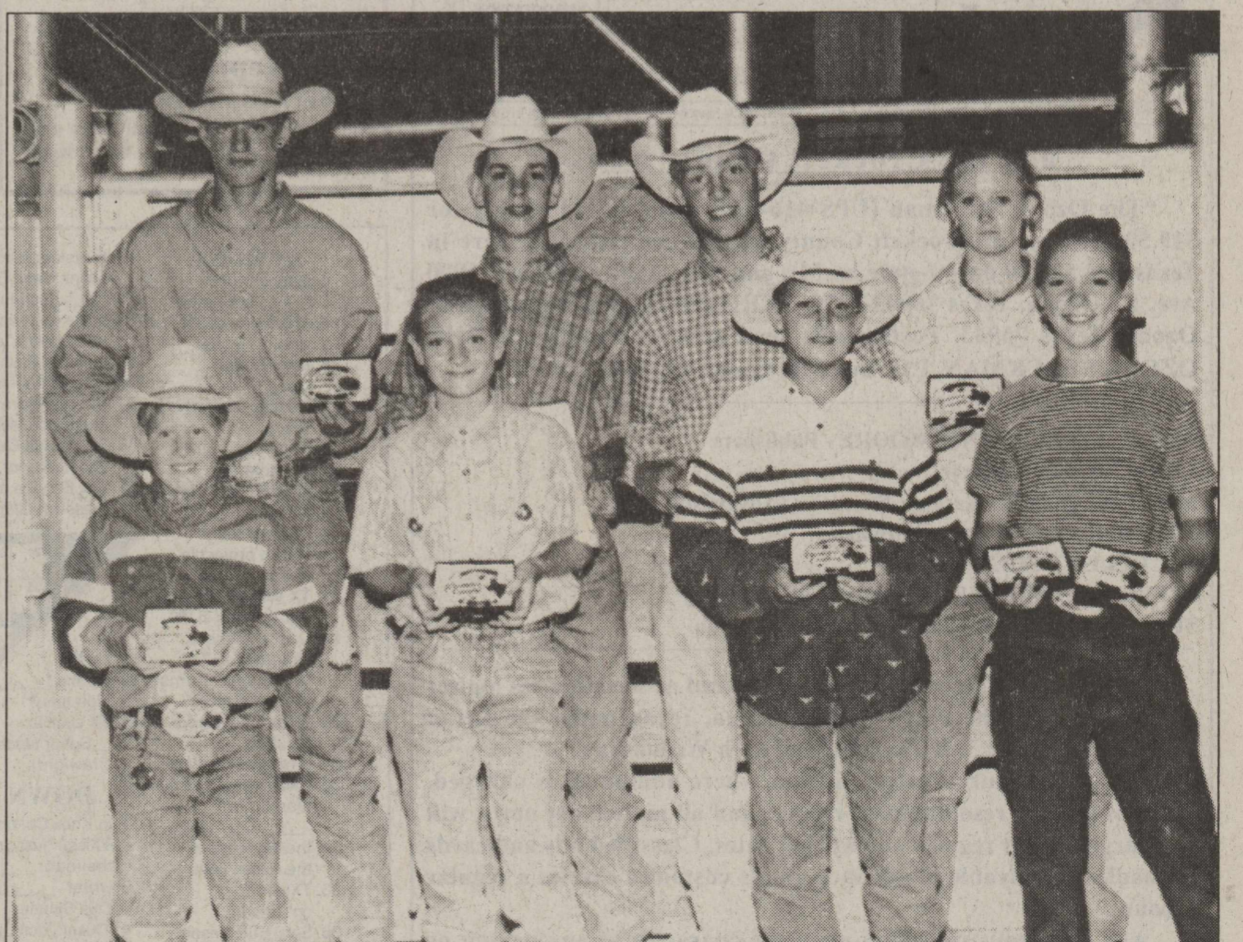
First and second place girls in this division were 1 Jayci Miller and 2 Allie Black, both of Ozona.



Reaching out to impoverished areas

Congress did a tremendous thing recently, and it did so without partisanship and bickering. We passed the Community Renewal and New Markets Act of 2000 to help America's most impoverished communities. The bill combines the Congress American Community Renewal Act with the Administration's New Market Initiative to give our nation's low income communities faith, hope and an opportunity at the American Dream.

While most of America is enjoying the economic prosperity brought upon by a balanced budget, fiscal responsibility and middle income tax cuts, some rural and inner city areas continue to be left behind. The lack of employment opportunity and economic activity continues to contribute to high crime and drug abuse rates. This poisons the American Dream. The Community Renewal and New Markets Initiative Act will change that and bring low income communities into America's prosperity through its array of incentives.

The legislation will reduce taxes and deregulate restraints in order to spur business investment and employment growth in depressed areas. It will provide 40 "renewal communities" with much-needed assistance in the form of targeted, pro-growth tax benefits, regulatory relief, savings incentives, and home ownership opportunities, as well as provide for the inclusion of faith-based organizations in local solutions such as drug and alcohol treatment.

The Community Renewal and New Market Initiative provides a \$21 billion tax cut targeted specifically to low income communities. It would make individuals and businesses within renewal communities eligible for a variety of tax incentives including: a zero capital gains rate, expensing for small businesses, wage tax credits and a 20 percent revitalization deduction for non-residential building. In addition, faith-based substance abuse treatment programs will be encouraged to enter the communities and be eligible to receive federal assistance to provide counsel and help to needed members of the communities. Home ownership will also become a reality with greater opportunities available.

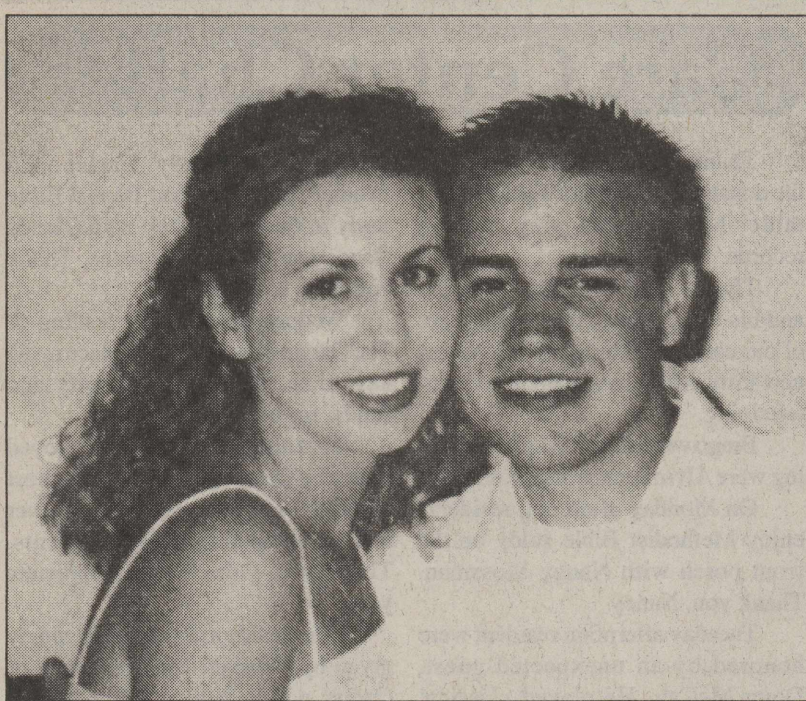

They will reside in Duncanville.



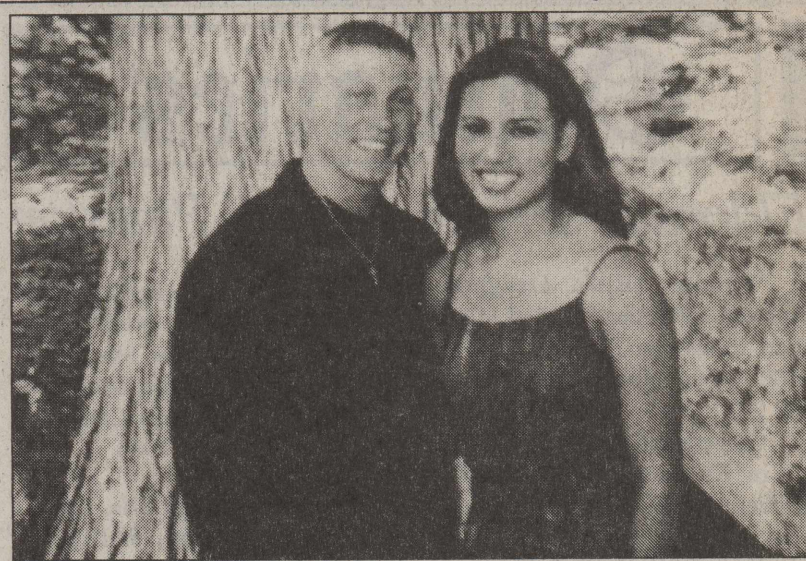

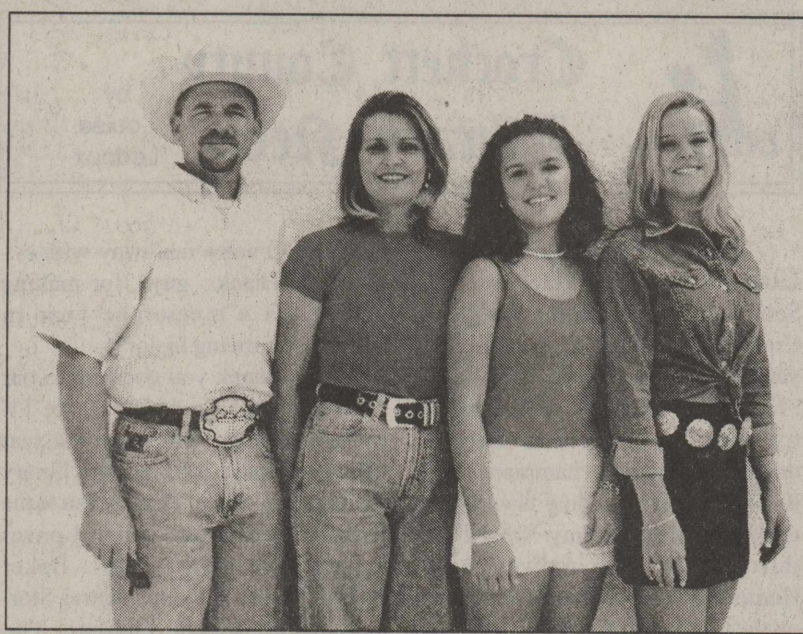
Service held for Bernabe Villarreal

What Is Truth?

(John 18:38)

Sixth in a series concerning the creation/evolution issue

"You created my inner being and wove me together in my mother's womb. I thank You for how marvelously and wonderfully I am made. What You do is wonderful, and I am fully aware of it." (Psalm 139:13-14)

Each time evolutionary scientists become overwhelmed with the detailed complexity of God's creation, they see the need to turn back the clock further and further - because they need this time to make their theory work. What used to be thought of as millions of years for evolution to take place has grown to billions of years, and it seems that the 4.6 billion of a few years ago will soon be backed up to 20 billion - or maybe more. After all, which is the average person more likely to believe, that the entire universe came about in billions of years, or that it suddenly appeared in less than one week?

Dr. Henry Morris (ICR) has done some extensive research into the probabilities of "Random Chance", carefully calculating the possibility of accidentally arranging 200 parts into perfect order through the means of simple chance selections. Since there are 200 bones in the human body, this should give us some idea of the complexity of putting together a simple structure of man's skeleton by chance. Of course, there are many ways the bones could be assembled. In fact, there are about 10(375) possible ways (that's a one followed by 375 zeros). In other words, is only one possibility in 10(375) tries to correctly put together all of the bones in our skeleton and still have your toes in the right place and your shin in your leg - and not your neck! Maybe we could better see it this way: suppose you would attempt one skeleton alignment every second, and that you started 10 billion years ago. To date you would have attempted only 10(18) times - hardly enough time! Or suppose we tried a billion combinations every second for 30 billion years. This would still not even get us to half the trials we might need!

The irony of this ridiculous estimating is that so far we have only worked with a structure of 200 pieces. Now consider this: the cerebral cortex of the human brain contains over a billion cells, all arranged in the proper order! Each of these cells contain countless messages that must be in a certain order for the brain to function properly. How many years do you think that would take by random

chance? Sir Fred Hoyle, British mathematician and astronomer, estimated that the probability of life originating by random chance was one in 10(400,000). It's also estimated that the simplest type of protein molecule that could be called 'living' is made of at least 400 amino acids, which are made up of four or five chemical elements, and which in turn are made of a special arrangement of protons, electrons and neutrons. Marcel Golay has predicted it would take 10(450) chances to duplicate just one of these molecules. R. L. Wysong has further calculated the probability of forming proteins and DNA (the code-bearing brains of each cell) for the smallest self-reproducing entity to be 10(167,626).

Of course, anyone who's taken a close look in the mirror knows that this machine we call a body is just too complex to have come about by mere accident.

Let's briefly take a closer look at just some body parts we take for granted. 1. The Human Heart: This past year your heart pumped about 40 million times - without your instructions. It knows when to pump faster and when to slow down. About 4,000 gallons of blood pass through the heart daily - or about 400,000 tons in an average lifetime. It's more powerful than an athlete's thigh muscle, yet weighs only about 12 ounces.

2. The Lungs: Weighing in at about one pound, this organ - unlike the heart, is not a muscle. Its job, however, is just as necessary. It contains millions of tiny air passages where blood cells exchange their load of carbon dioxide for a supply of oxygen.

3. The Blood Stream: Average adults have about 75,000 miles of blood vessels in their body, where a river of blood flow day and night without stopping. Oxygen and carbon dioxide are carried by red blood cells on a never-ending trip during the cell's 120 day life. The blood vessels also carry white blood cells loaded with

anti-bodies designed to fight off disease. Each antibody is programmed to fight off just one disease, which means there are close to a million different antibodies in your blood.

4. Your Cells: From the single cells of sperm and egg, you have grown into a walking collection of about 26 billion cells - each one having a pre-arranged job to carry out its work, through a carefully coded computer of its own.

5. The Eye: Of all the human organs, the eye has presented evolutionists with the greatest dilemma - as Darwin himself admitted. The complexity of this ping pong ball sized organ, with the unique ability to handle 1.5 million messages at the same time, is mind boggling! The cornea begins the seeing process by organizing light rays that strike the lens, which becomes flatter or fatter depending on the distance of the object. Then the image is projected on the retina, a paper-like thin wall less than an inch square that covers the back of the eye. Here 130 million rod-shaped cells work on the black and white vision, while another seven million cells are working on the color. Each cell is connected to the optic nerve, which sends these messages at about 300 miles per hour on a trip to the brain, where they're immediately interpreted so that we can see the picture!

FOOD FOR THOUGHT: How could these organs have come about over long periods of time when they are only worthwhile in complete working order? How is it that the Tribolite, which supposedly died out long before man came on the scene, had a very complex eye? According to any sense of probability, evolution could not, and did not, happen! Only an all-knowing Creator could design such complex wonders and bring them into existence at a moment's notice!
