## Lions pluck the Van Horn Eagles 40-7

The Ozona Lions shot down the Van Horn Eagles 40-7 Nov. 10 at Lion Stadium for their fifth district win.

In the first quarter, the Lions got off to a good start. They scored on a long drive after eating two minutes and 40 seconds off the clock. Ray Ramos ran in the 2-yard touchdown, and Arron Garza's kick for the extra point was good.

Ty Allen kicked off for the Lions. Jarryd Taylor intercepted the Eagles' first pass of the game. Later in the second quarter, Abel Rodriguez would also intercept an Eagle pass.

Kyle Richardson threw a great 12-yard pass to Trey Hale who was waiting in the end zone. The PAT attempt was no good. With 8:57 left in the first quarter, the Lions already led the Eagles 13-0. Later in the first quarter with 3:29 remaining on the clock, Ozona scored again on a 3-yard run by Jared Shaffer. Garza's kick was good for the extra point.

The Eagles were devastated by the end of the first quarter.

The Lions scored in the second quarter on an awesome pass from Richardson. With 6:39 remaining on the clock, Lion quarterback Kyle Richardson threw a 32-yard pass to Dustin Faught for the Lions' fourth touchdown of the game. Again Garza's kick was good for the extra point.

The Lions led the Eagles 27-0 at halftime.

The Eagles couldn't believe their eyes as the Lions continued to capitalize on Eagle mistakes. In the third

### An editorial

A chad here and a chad there-

Election "2000" has been the laughingstock for all Americans this year, especially in the Florida vote. Everyone keeps handling and rehandling in an attempt to count and recount the ballot cards with these perforated little pieces of paper. First the machine count and then the machine recounted and now handled and recounted manually.

As a printer for the past 25 years, I have learned from experience and

advice from other professionals that it is a "no no" to over handle perforated paper. The more you manipulate, straighten, jog, bend, fan perforated paper stock, the weaker the perforation becomes. The tiny strands of paper fiber holding the perforated piece of paper in place become weaker and weaker as the paper is handled.

For several years The Ozona Stockman has been printing the DeerFest tickets. After the card stock finishes its run through the printing press and rerun through the numbering and perforating press, great care has to be taken in handling and packaging to ensure that the perforated stub has not been bent and subjected to undue stress resulting from over manipulation.

After watching the recount folks on television, I couldn't help but cringe and wonder how many thousands of ballots have had their attached perforated small pieces of paper become "chads" (the small piece of paper that falls out after being punched) become loose or fall out completely from over manipulation. I saw one guy beating, banging and fanning a stack of ballots in an attempt to straighten them into a nice neat pile. I wonder how many new holes were created, or how many of the already weakly attached perforated pieces of paper became unattached or partially unattached in this process.

Who is the voter in this case, the people who went to the polls and voted, as a Constitutional right, for the candidate of their choice, believing that their ballot would be processed through a machine as intended, or the recount manipulators? Who gets the vote, Governor Bush, Gore or Buchanan? Your guess is as good as mine, folks.

What really tops it off is the thought that your vote and mine isn't worth a "hill of beans" if this process is allowed to continue. Only those voters in Palm Beach County, Florida who don't know how to follow arrows are the electors of your president and mine.

How about them apples folks?

### Snow, snow look at it snow

Last week's 3.25 inch snow was a delight to those who wanted to be out in it but less than pleasant for the AEP West Texas Utilities employees who spent the day tracking problems which caused a power outage for a large part of the town.

A primary wire was downed at 210 Ave. I when a water-soaked and snow laded tree limb caused the wire to burn in two according to Martin Childress.

Near the home of Margaret Coates at Sixth and Ave. J, limbs on a line shorted and tripped a breaker that feeds that part of town. At this location, the transformer that serves the water department pumps was described as fried.

Limbs on a line at 322 Ave. I also caused problems as did limbs near the Perner and Ingham homes at Angus and Circle Drive.

"We couldn't isolate one single problem. There were too many limbs on too many lines," said Childress. The limbs were heavy with rain, lots of green leaves and then the snow.

In places the WTU workers knocked snow off limbs with a "hot stick" and those limbs went up approximately five feet in the air, Childress said.

No wires were broken other than at the Knox home on Ave. I but it was not possible to keep the breakers back in due to the many heaters and lights in use according to Armando Arredondo of WTU.

"We isolated problems as we went along, turning power back on as quickly as we could." Some parts of town were without power for more than seven hours.

Two trucks and repairmen came from McCamey to assist Ozona workers in restoring electricity.

### Young to resign from Civic/Youth Center

Garland Young announced to commissioners Monday that he plans to retire as director of the civic and youth center Jan. 1.

"It was one of the hardest decisions I've ever made," said Young in his resignation letter. "My years of working with the youth of our community have been very rewarding. The civic center is busy with meetings and activities, and the youth center attendance is good. I just think it is time to retire."

Young was chairman of the board of directors who started the youth center in 1970. It took all the boards who have served through the years to make the center a success, Young commented, and "it couldn't have worked without the court's help. It's been very

rewarding."

A reception honoring him will be hosted by the board of the civic and youth center. A date has not yet been decided.

The center's board has approved employing Joyce Young as interim director pending hiring a new director. The board is preparing a job description as part of the hiring process. Board chairman Belinda Wilkins told commissioners that "no later than Feb. 15" is the board's goal for hiring a new director.

During a report for the Fair Park Convention Center board, Shelly Childress told commissioners that the center by putting cigarettes out on the tops. The 40 new tables, bought for

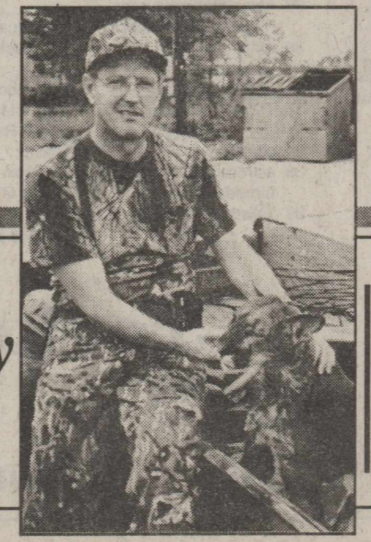



### Elections the Texas way

When we held The Stockman past the usual presstime last week to wait for local election results, little did we know that more than a week later the nation and the world would still be waiting for the results of the presidential election.

Watching the resulting drama play out in Florida with its varied ways of voting led many to wonder about election law in Texas. County and District Clerk Debbi Puckett is the election authority in Crockett County and provides the following information.

In Texas, all ballots for the General Election are of a format established by the Secretary of State. The order of names on the ballot is determined by the Office of the Governor.

Deadline for challenging the results of the General Election in Texas is 5:00 p.m. of the fifth day after Election Day or 5:00 p.m. of the second day after the date the Secretary of State, who is the canvassing authority, completes the canvass.

Canvassing of results must take place within seven days of the elec-

tion.

To extend hours of voting, at the state or county level (general or primary elections) the election authority must be presented with a petition carrying the signatures of 15 registered voters who request extended hours. Notification of the extended hours must be posted by the authority conducting the election in a public building 72 hours before the extension begins.

Crockett County is in its third year of voting on a paper ballot that is counted by an optical scanner.

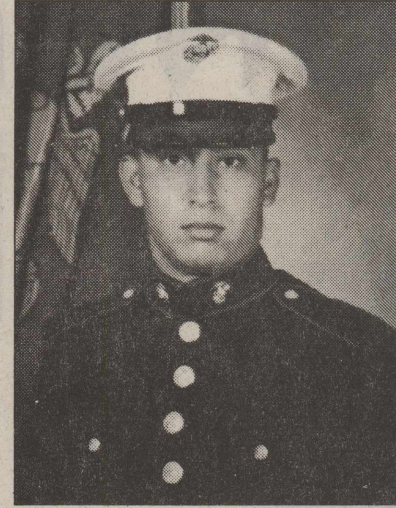

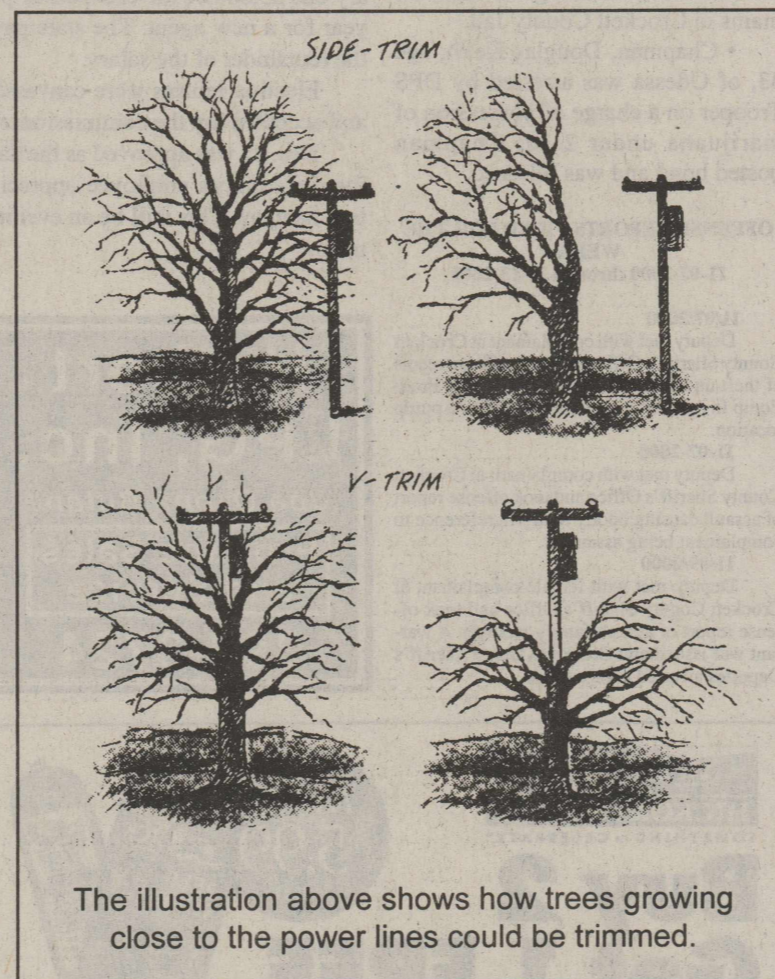

## No Topped Trees!



Trees growing near power lines can be a safety hazard and a major cause of power outages. You should never attempt to prune trees near the power lines your self. AEP West Texas Utilities has hired a professional tree service to prune and remove trees in your area. This work is provided at no charge to you. Trees located to the side and below of power lines will be pruned to accepted standards. The amount and extent of clearance between the power lines and trees, is based on the tree species and site condition and the mutual consent of the land owner and power company.



The illustration above shows how trees growing close to the power lines could be trimmed.

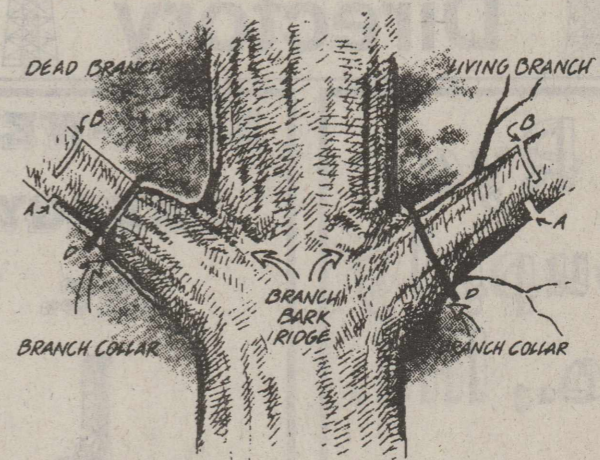
Trees and utility line can co-exist when these kinds of pruning techniques are used:



Stubs left from topping usually decay. The shoots that are produced below the cut are weakly attached, and often become a hazard.

The new shoots grow very quickly, as much as 20 feet in one year, in some species. Unfortunately, the shoots are very prone to breaking, especially during windy conditions. The irony is that while the goal was to reduce the tree's height to make it safer, it has been made more hazardous than before.

As the illustration shows, make the first cut from the bottom up one quarter of the way through the branch (A). Next, cut through the branch until it drops (B). Make the final collar-cut (C to D) without peeling the bark down the trunk. We don't recommend pruning paint or any other type of dressing. These products may only inhibit the branch collar from growing new wood.

sponses to two motor vehicle accidents and two oilfield calls. There was one alarm/incident each for rescue, structure and vehicle emergencies. The department has responded to 128 calls January through October.

The Helping Hands for the Elderly report stated that 1343 meals were served in October. Income from clients for the month was \$603.60, from the state \$2,190.81; donations \$25.00 and county \$1,770.00.

If the weather holds, the low water crossing on War Admiral Street can be opened in seven to eight working days Eddie Moore told commissioners. The project will finish underbudget, Moore said, due to the road department doing a lot of the work they had expected to have to hire done.  
"We need the concrete to cure as much as possible before we put traffic on it," Moore said.

During Moore's report, commissioners voted to approve buying fencing material to lane two sides of a 1.7 mile stretch of County Road 306. Cost for materials is approximately \$3,000.00 per mile, Moore said.

Librarian Louise Ledoux was the bearer of good news. She reported that her application for a grant from the Massie Memorial Foundation has been approved. She has also applied to the Tocker and Verizon Foundations for grants to be used for automation of the library.

Mrs. Ledoux said that the sprinkler system donated to the library by Roy Elliott of Ozona Plumbing has not been completed. New faucets, a few more stations and the controller remain to be installed by the company, she said.

She has talked with the manufacturer of the damaged fountain which is in the library's courtyard. "We have ordered a new bowl and hope we can put the fountain back together for approximately \$400.00," Mrs. Ledoux said.

Commissioners voted to approve a request by Tax Assessor/Collector Tommy Stokes to refund \$1,631.74 to Tite Bishop which he had been incorrectly assessed for the 1984-1999 period.

The court voted to advertise for bids for health insurance for county employees. The bids are to contain the same benefits as the current policy with additional bids for dental, vision and life insurance. These will be opened in January.

The No. 31 Joe Tom Davidson Jr. is scheduled to be drilled in the Davidson Ranch Field ten miles southwest of Ozona. Carrying permit for 9,400-ft. maximum hole, it is in a 320-acre drilling unit in the TCRP Survey A-2892.  
The Harrison Interests of the Houston is the operator.

Larron Energy Co. has posted first production data for two newly completed oil wells in Crockett County's Farmer Field. Located about 25 miles northwest of Ozona, the wells are designated as the Nos. 3 and 4 University-M "G".  
They showed ability to pump oil at the rate of 14 and 12 barrels per day, respectively. Overall, production will range from 2,174 to 2,275 feet in the San Andres Formation.

The Ozona Field will see more developmental drilling when two 7,600-ft. Canyon Sand tests are spudded by Union Pacific Resources of Fort Worth.  
The wells are designated as the No. 37 Union Pacific "C" and No. 17 Union Pacific "D". The "C" well is in a 675-acre lease in Crockett County's GC&SFRR Survey A-4804, while the "D" well is in a 658-acre lease in the GC&SFRR Survey A-5574.

Production in the Wolfcamp Formation will be the target when the No. 1042 Phillips Arledge is spudded in Crockett County's Morrison Field.  
Located 33 miles southwest of Ozona, the well is in a 5,440-acre lease assembly and is in the TCRP Survey A-5384. Total hole is projected to 5,350 feet. Prize Operating of Grapevine will be the operator.

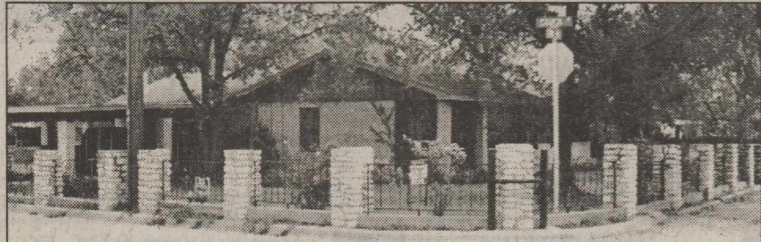

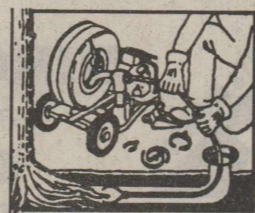

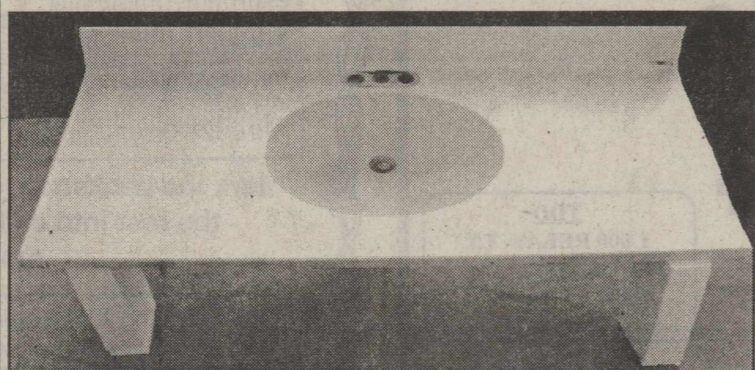
