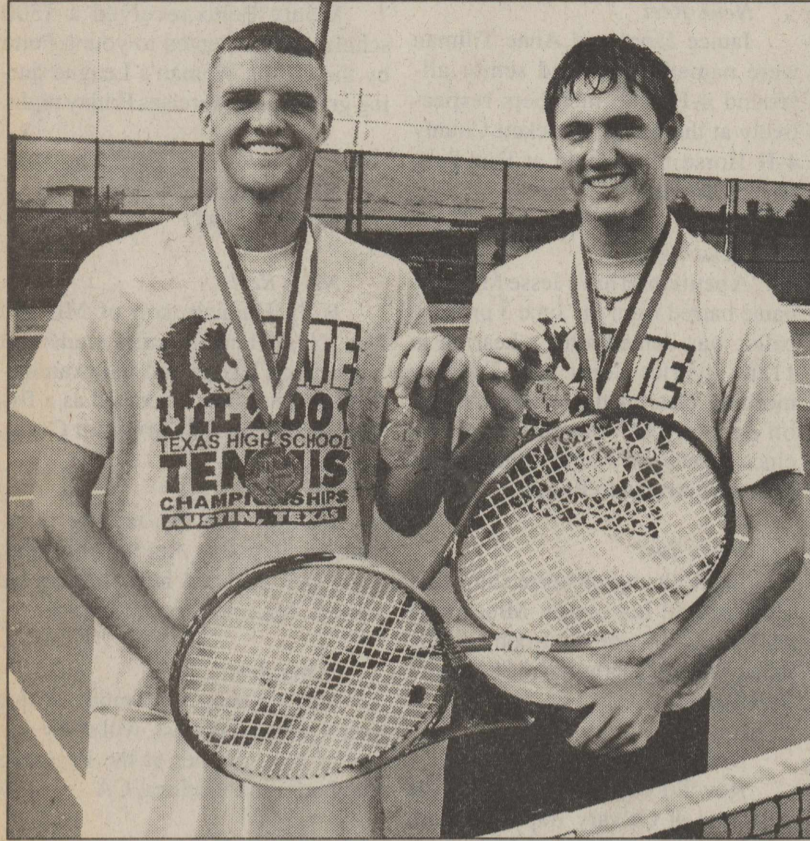

## Tennis duo places second at state

Ozona High School tennis duo Dustin Faught and Shane Albers played their way to the tennis finals May 8 in Austin.

In their first match, held May 7 at the World of Tennis at Lakeway, the duo defeated Shiller Hill/Chris Petrosky of Brackettville 6-2, 6-2. The Ozona players then advanced to the semifinals when they beat Brandon Baker/Paul Theodosios of San Saba 6-2, 6-4, advancing to the finals.

Tuesday's finals saw the Lions taking on Jared Melde/Justin Schwarz of Thorndale. The Thorndale pair came out on top, defeating the Lions 6-4, 6-4.

The Ozona doubles team placed second in the competition, playing their best in the state contest.

"What a fantastic experience this was for everyone involved," said Coach Rick Bachman. "Dustin and Shane performed magnificently and were able to bring home silver medals in the most prestigious tennis tournament in our state."

"I am so happy and proud for these young men as they both deserve

this honor. They have both worked extremely hard for many years, and for them to culminate their season in this fashion is indescribable.

"They overwhelmed their first opponents from Brackettville 6-2, 6-2 in a perfectly played match. Their next opponents were from San Saba and fought extremely hard to try and derail Dustin and Shane's quest for the finals. Our Lions prevailed in this match 6-2, 6-4 and moved into the finals to face an experienced team from Thorndale. I felt we played well in the finals but we just couldn't win enough crucial points to turn the match in our favor. We gave Thorndale all they could handle, but they came out on top of a 6-4, 6-4 victory.

"I was totally please with the poise and sportsmanship displayed by these two fine young men. Our community should be very proud to have young people like these representing us in the great way that they did. Everyone I talked to had nothing but positive comments concerning Dustin and Shane. It has been both an honor and a privilege to work with these two this year as well as all the years past."

## Court approves transfer of land for visitors' center

Court members voted Monday to transfer land south of the interstate to Ozona Chamber of Commerce for use as a visitors' center site. The chamber is submitting a nomination for a visitors' center project to the Texas Department of Transportation seeking statewide transportation funds.

If the chamber is selected to receive the funds, the state will provide 80% and the county 20% of the project's cost. Value of the land will more than cover the county portion of the project.

With their vote May 14, commissioners approved a 5-year time period for the transfer. If no center is built within that time, the land will revert back to the county.

Representatives of Texas West Ranch met with the court to request electric company variances and final plat approval of Phase 1, Unit 2 of their subdivision. Commissioners voted to approve variances for the utility company.

Approval was given for the installation of a glass security partition for employees in the office of the justice of the peace. The glass will prevent clients from approaching the workers' desks.

"I feel it is needed for security for our employees," Judge Jim Hearne said when he presented the request to commissioners.

A grant management agreement

with Gary Traylor and Associates for the Texas Community Development Program was approved. This grant will finish sewer line improvement and replacements south of the interstate. The \$174,999.00 grant to Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District for the project is administered through Crockett County.

In other action, the court approved Crockett National Bank's bid for the depository contract, payment for installation of carpet at Texas Tech Rural Clinic, set a \$25.00 fee for the subdivision rules and regulations manual, reviewed and approved the 2000 fiscal statement for the 112th District Attorney's office and approved retaining George Thompson as attorney of record regarding pending litigation by West Texas Rural Counties Association.

WTRCA has notified the county and both water districts of possible litigation regarding health care services received through the association's insurance pool. Emerald and Crockett County water districts voted last week to engage Thompson in the matter.

No action was taken on agenda items regarding including a driving policy in the personnel policy and to approve modifications to the substance abuse policy.

Regular monthly reports were received from departments.

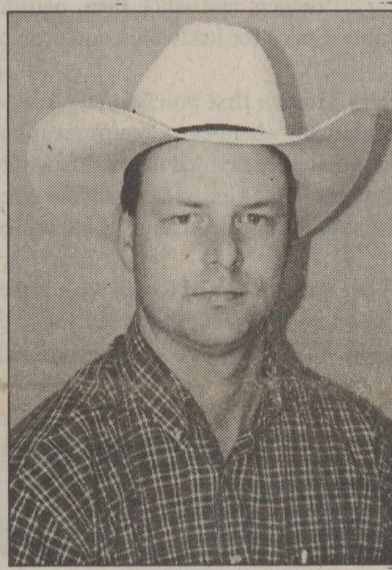

## White returns for hearing

Death row inmate Melvin White took the stand in 112th District Court here May 14 during an evidentiary hearing seeking to show that he had ineffective counsel during his 1999 capital murder trial. White was convicted and sentenced to death for the 1997 murder of 9-year-old Jennifer Gravel.

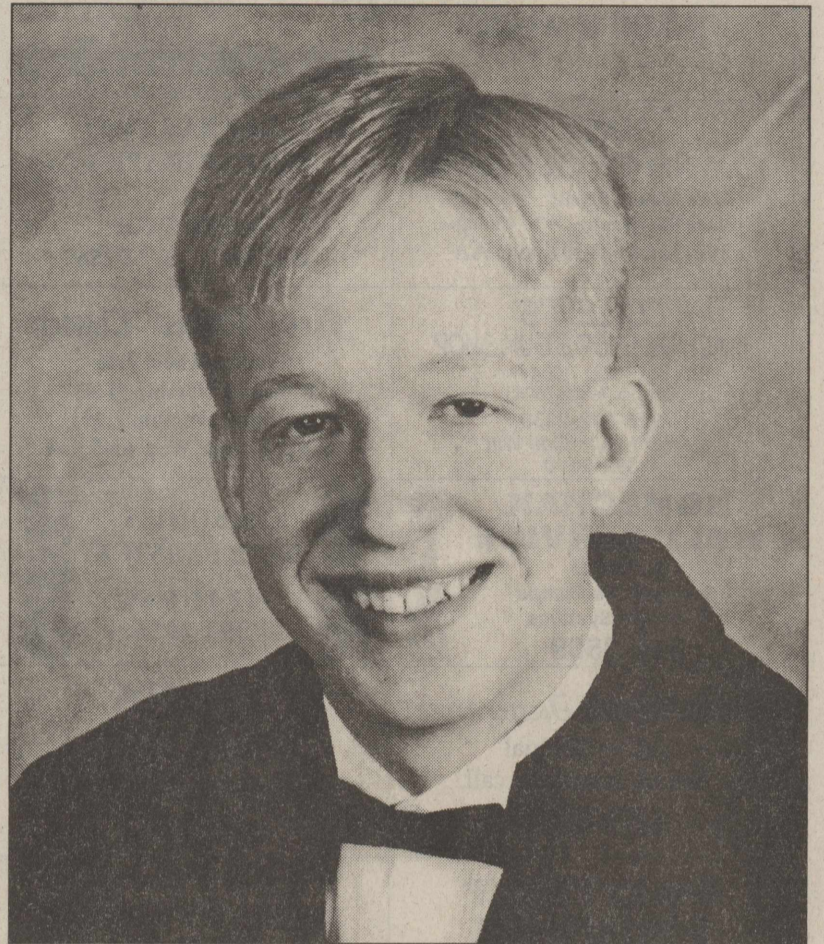
His attorney, Rusty Wall of Midland, and District Attorney Ori White questioned Kirk Hawkins and Paul Parker who represented White at his trial and Al Gonzales, defense investigator on the case, before putting Melvin White on the stand. Questioning began after District Judge Brock Jones denied White's request for another magistrate. The hearing is required to be before the magistrate who heard the trial.

Jury selection, trial strategy, witnesses, expert testimony, photographic evidence and White's participation or lack of in the trial, whether or not he asked his attorneys to file a motion requesting another judge before the trial, his history of alcohol and prescription drug use were among the subjects addressed.

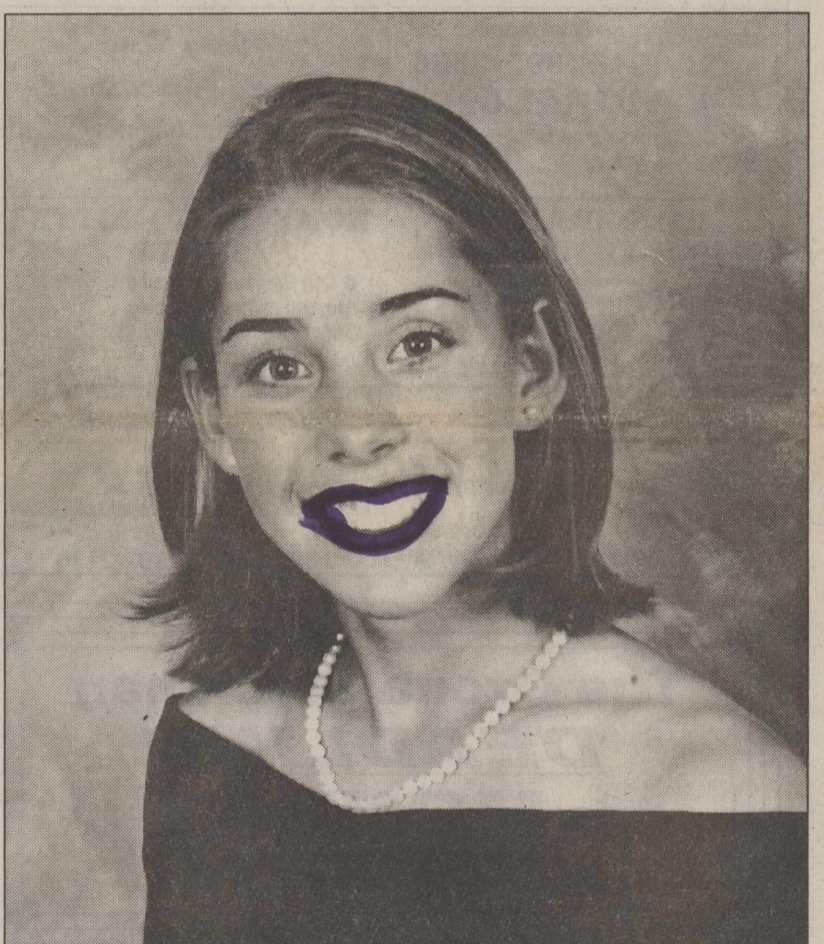
The state and counsel for White said they will file supplemental briefs. This must be done within 30 days of the time this hearing transcript is filed.

## County signs 5-year contract with Shannon for \$418,600

Commissioners voted Monday to enter a 5-year contract with Shannon Medical Center for health care services. Beginning date is July 1, 2001, with the contract to be ratified annually by commissioners.

During their review of the contract with Linda Knightstep, regional health director for Shannon, the court requested that the term "medical practitioner" be changed to licensed physician or physician's assistant where applicable.

Under the new contract, Family Health Center of Ozona continues to be open 24 hours a day with regular clinic hours from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00

p.m. Monday through Friday. Either a physician or a physician's assistant shall be on call for emergency treatment with the response time of the doctor or P.A. to be 20 minutes from the time the telephone conversation with the clinic ends.

The licensed physician is to be an independent contractor; the P.A. will be an employee of Shannon.

To the extent possible, Shannon shall use its best efforts to staff the clinic with residents of Crockett County to the extent that these residents have the appropriate medical qualifications for services at the clinic.

## Enhanced 911 system activated

Installation of Crockett County's enhanced 911 equipment began May 10. The system went into operation beginning May 15.

Addressing coordinator R. B. Babbitt said 911 has completed the last addressing checks. This was the final update until the equipment is in operation and there will be continuous updates after that.

When a 911 call is made to the enhanced system, the name the phone is listed under and the address appear on a computer screen that is part of the system at the Sheriff's Office. A deputy will respond to any 911 call,

Babbitt said, along with other appropriate emergency personnel such as fire department or EMS. Personnel from all three will respond to I-10 accidents.

With 911 EMS calls where special circumstances are involved, a remark section in the computer data base will be filled in to help with future calls for similar problems. For example, if a person is diabetic, a cardiac patient or on oxygen, this type information can be noted in the computer.

911 came to Crockett County through the efforts of Ozona Woman's Forum.

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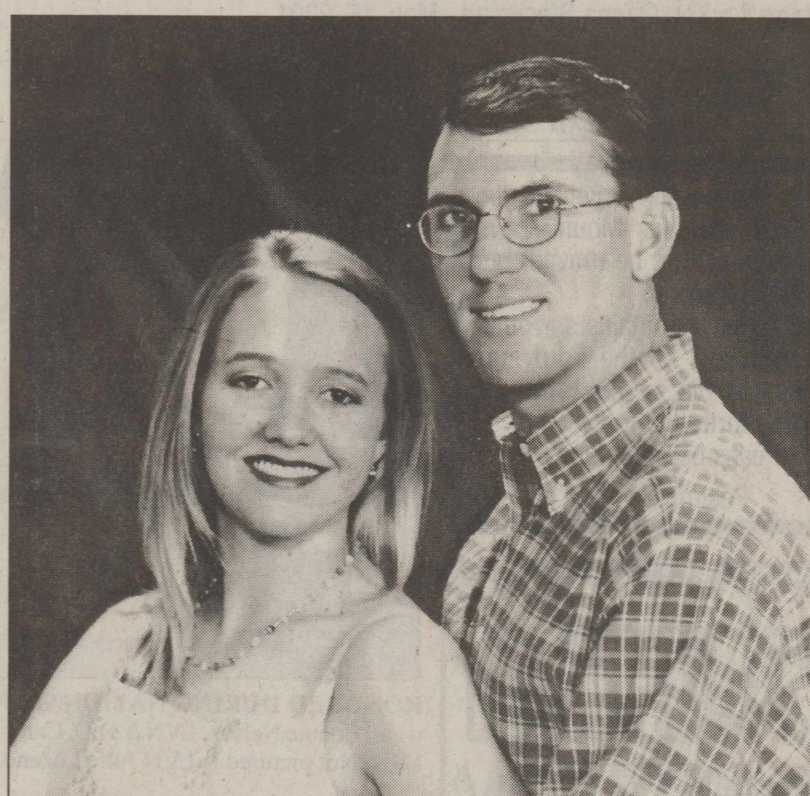

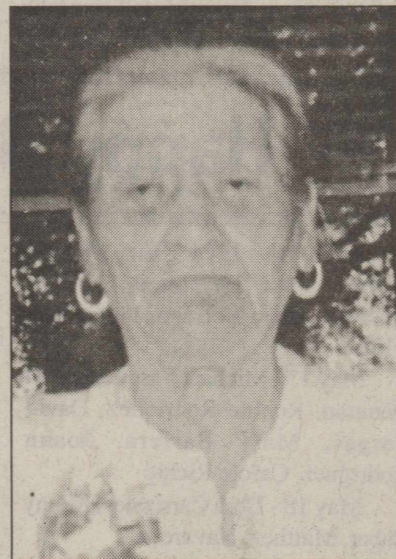

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Obituaries

Stanford service for Weldon "Hoot" Gibson

Weldon "Hoot" Gibson, senior director emeritus of SRI International, died Sunday of heart failure at his home in Stanford, CA. He was 84.

Gibson, who received his M.B.A. in 1940 and his Ph.D. in 1950 from the Stanford Graduate School of Business, was one of the founders of SRI (then Stanford Research Institute), joining as chairman of business and economics and becoming chairman of international programs in 1947.

He remained at SRI for more than 40 years, building it into a world wide research and technology development operation, and organizing and directing more than 80 major international conferences for senior business executives in 25 countries.

Gibson was named associate director in SRI in 1956, vice president in 1959, executive vice president in 1960, senior director in 1982, and senior director emeritus in 1988.

Before joining SRI, Gibson served in the U.S. Army Air Corps as director of material requirements, retiring as a colonel, and was assistant director of the U.S. Air Force Institute of Technology in Dayton, OH.

He was awarded the Medal of the Legion of Merit in 1946 and the order of Commander of the British Empire in 1947. In recognition of his lifetime of achievements, SRI established the Weldon B. Gibson achievement Award in 1999.

Dr. Gibson was the son of an Eldorado farming family hard hit by the depression. His uncle, Buck Bailey, made it possible for him to attend Washington State University where he graduated in 1938. He is survived by his wife of 60 years, Helen; a son, David; and a grandson, Ruben. Also by cousins Mrs. T. J. Bailey of Ozona, Joe Bailey of San Angelo, Martha Bailey Henderson of Eldorado and Louise Kennedy of Austin.

Funeral services are private. A memorial service will be held at 2 p.m. Tuesday, July 10, in Memorial Church at Stanford.

Lustful literature litters the landscape. Pornographic Internet sites lure victims into lurid acts. The objectives of the underworld are clear. X-rated sales are high. Big money is involved. The objectives of the Underworld are also clear. When lust has conceived, it gives birth to sin; and when sin is accomplished, it brings forth death (James 1:15).

Jesus puts it this way. I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lust for her has already committed adultery with her in his heart (Matthew 5:28). This also goes for female lustful looking. Each one is tempted when he is carried away and enticed by his own lust (James 1:14).

Christ gives some advice. If your right eye makes you stumble, tear it out and throw it from you.... If your right hand makes you stumble, cut it off and throw it from you; for it is better for you to lose one of the parts of your body, than for your whole body to go into hell (Matthew 5:29-30). Crockett County will pay \$418,600.00 annually for Shannon's management, operation, staffing and delivery of services through the family practice clinic. The county is to receive monthly operation reports including information relating to financial and operational issues.

In addition to the annual fee, the county furnishes facilities and office

space, pays all bills for utility services, provides all necessary janitorial service and maintains the facilities to Shannon's satisfaction.

Shannon is permitted to use all laboratory and x-ray equipment and facilities in connection with the services provided. Shannon is responsible for maintenance and costs of repair of the lab or x-ray facilities or equipment unless the items are deemed dilapidated or unrepairable. Title to this original equipment remains with the county.

Crockett County also is to provide and maintain in force general liability insurance covering the premises and grounds of the Family Medical Center of Ozona.

"I think the (health services) board has done all of their homework and has looked at all avenues," said Judge Johnny Jones of the process which led to the contract.

The students also have achieved of success in solo and ensemble competition, earning all region and all area honors.

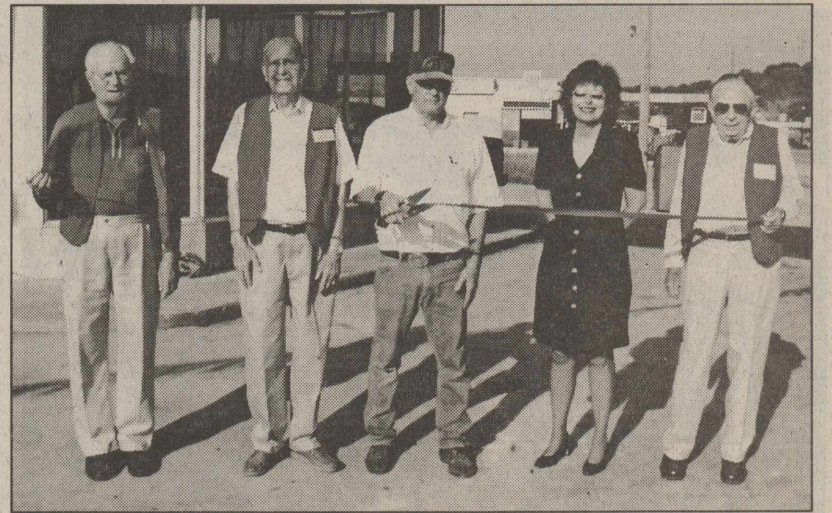

"I just love it," Carroll said of directing. "I like the kids. I have had a ball with them; they're fun to be around."

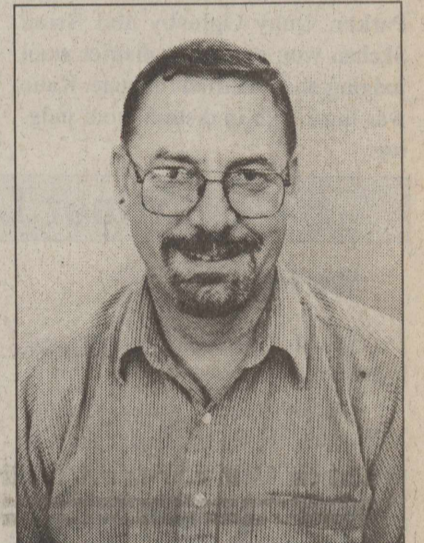

## Ozona schools receive \$100,000 TIF grant

High-tech, dot com, world wide web, and surfing the net are just a few phases that can be associated with the technology revolution and have become staples in the daily lives of many Texans. With the assistance of the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) Board, a state agency that provides technology funding for Texas public schools, new opportunities to participate in the ever-progressing technology of today are now possible. Students across the state are able to reap the benefits of technology in education. Using TIF grants, schools are introducing students to modern technology, including high-speed Internet access and distance learning. Crockett County CCSD received a grant award of \$100,000 for high school and middle school campuses. This funding will be used to develop new, and expand current, technology infrastructure to provide students with the technology they need to prepare for the digital era.

The TIF Non-Competitive Grant for Texas Public Schools was designed to fund up-to-date hardware and connectivity equipment, high-speed workstations, Internet access, and/or distance learning equipment so that students may take classes from another school district and/or an institution of higher education. Additionally, grant funds will be used for technology staff development, including hardware and software training, network training, methodology training, and base level technology training. These grant projects officially begin May 15, 2001.

In an effort to provide equitable funding for Texas public schools, TIF collaborated with the Texas Education Agency (TEA) by coordinating the release of the PS9 grant award an-

nouncement with the Technology Integration in Education (TIE) announcement. Prior to this release, staff members from both TIF and TEA met to discuss the functionality and purpose of each grant program. As a result, Texas public school districts will be able to leverage funds from both funding sources thus allowing schools to expand and increase technology capacity.

"Students are the future of Texas," said Rod Miller, the project director

for this grant. "Today, students are gaining the opportunity to use modern technology for researching via the Internet, word processing, and learning. We, as educators, want our students to succeed and become more marketable because of the education that they received while in school here. Thanks to TIF, the opportunity to fund this equipment and infrastructure is a reality."

Since its creation by the 74th Legislature in 1995, TIF has awarded approximately \$592 million in grants to

its four constituent groups- public schools, libraries, institutions of higher education, and public, not-for-profit healthcare facilities. The agency receives approximately \$150 million per year in revenues from telecommunications assessments to disburse over a ten-year period.

Hardly ever will a young lady work hard and try to win both crowns/titles. Once a young lady is crowned a queen or princess, she considers it a hard job to want to work a second time.

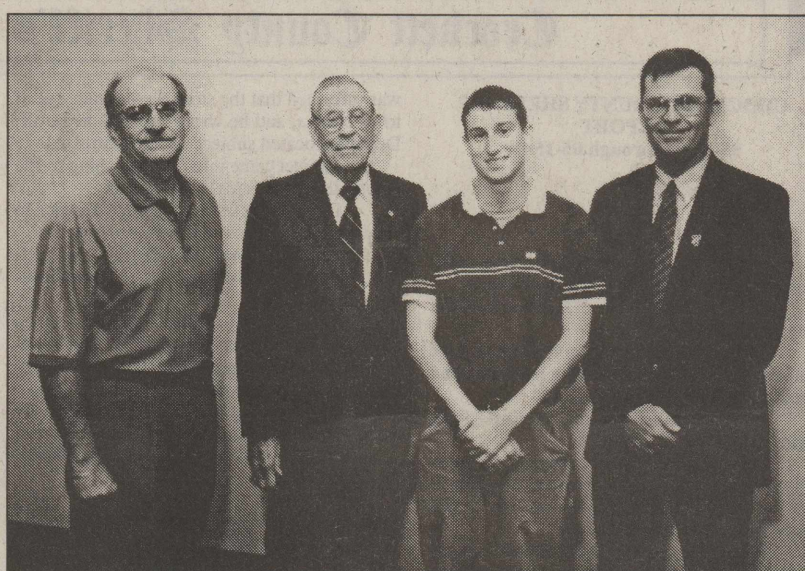

Did you know that every hunter born on or after September 2, 1971, must successfully complete a Hunter Education training course in order to hunt in the state of Texas? It's true - and it's the law. It's the law in Texas, as well as many other states in America. It also makes good sense to be certified in Hunter Education.

• Hunters 17 and older must successfully complete a hunter education course.

• Hunters aged 12 to 16 must successfully complete a hunter education course or be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 or older when hunting.

• Hunters under 12 must be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 or older when hunting.

Where can you attend a course? Right here in Crockett County. When the course is completed, the certification card is good for life and is honored by the 49 states and 10 Canadian provinces that require hunter education. The Hunter Education certification card must be carried at all times while hunting.

The fourteenth annual West Texas Hunter Education Camp will be held on the Gene Perry Ranch in Crockett County June 8-10. It is open to boys and girls 12-15 years of age. There is a minimal cost of \$5.00 to the partici-

pants for attending the camp. The Perry Ranch contributes bunkhouses, classroom, and dining hall facilities along with various local contributors who ensure that all meals, drinks, and snacks are provided. Camp is held from 8:00 a.m. Friday morning through Sunday evening when the parents are invited to join camp participants for supper and closing ceremonies.

Qualified instructors are on hand all weekend to teach participants how to handle firearms safely, how to track game through the brush, how to identify poisonous snakes, and how to survive in the wilderness. Students will also learn about wildlife management, emergency first-aid, marksmanship techniques, hunter ethics, hunting, modern firearms, muzzle loaders, and archery equipment.

Use registration forms that were distributed to the Crockett County Junior High and High School systems before summer dismissal, or you can sign up at the Crockett County Extension Office (next to the Fair Park Convention Center on Ave. AA in Ozona) or the Crockett County Water Office (511 - 11th Street on the south side of the square) by 5:00 p.m. on May 31.
