## Garza wins first medalist in district golf

The Lions golf team traveled to Fort Stockton Monday, April 8, and Tuesday, April 9, to compete in the 1-AA District Golf Tournament. The first place team of Van Horn I Eagles scored 648 strokes for the two day total while the Ozona Lions took second place with 669 strokes followed by the Reagan County I Owls with 724 strokes. Placing fourth in the meet

were the McCamey Badgers with 747 strokes, fifth place went to Reagan County II Owls with 805 strokes, and Van Horn II Eagles finished in sixth place. The first and second place teams will compete at the regional level of play.

Lion Arron Garza had the best two day score with 158 strokes in the tournament. Garza led above everyone on day two with a total of 74 strokes for the day and was first place medalist

for the tournament.

Placing third in district was the team of the McCamey Lady Badgers with 891 strokes, fourth place was claimed by the Van Horn Lady Eagles with 908 strokes and Reagan County II Lady Owls came in fifth with 1015 strokes.

## New cemetery sprinkler system up and running

The new sprinkler system is up and running at the cemetery according to Eddie Moore, roads and parks superintendent. Moore told commissioners at their April meeting the system is set up to run in daytime so people can see it in operation.

Half the cemetery is watered Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and the remaining half on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Watering is done for 30 minutes per section with a flow of 8 to 10 gallons per minute.

An automatic rain delay mechanism can be added to shut off water if rain begins.

Moore discussed replacement of a water truck and 130 barrel trunk trailer with court members. He said he prefers to purchase a used truck and new tank.

Court members voted to approve two pipeline permits for Duke Energy to cross County Road 106.

The court also voted to hire Wayne Beyer of Beyer and Company to audit the county for 2001.

In another action item, commissioners voted to delete the paragraph regarding expedited consideration of applications from their guidelines for granting tax abatements.

Benny Gibbs, care center administrator, reported that his board approved using a 16'x8' area of the front porch to install an administration office. Cost for the complete project will be less than \$7,000.00, Gibbs said.

He and the business office manager have been using empty resident rooms for offices, and Gibbs gave his up when the space was needed for a resident. The facility is licensed for 56 beds.

Gibbs said the board wants to decertify the room used for the business office so they can continue to use it as an office. The state could question its use as an office if the space remains certified as a resident room, he explained. He said the room can be decertified with a letter and recer-

tified with a letter and state inspection.

Gibbs reported that the facility is \$34,000.00 under budget for March and \$42,000.00 under budget as of April 8.

During his financial report, John Stokes, auditor, also said that the care center and EMS were under budget.

Gibbs commented on his concerns about staffing and stated that he wants to get a CNA school started here.

Sheriff Shane Fenton reported 365 calls for service during March. There were 52 calls to 911, and of these, 35 were actual emergencies. Thirty-five persons were placed in jail in March and there were 19 civil citations.

Constable Raymond Borrego answered or assisted with 16 of the 365 calls and served one civil citation for the Sheriff's Department. Borrego reported 24 speeding stops during the month with five written warnings issued and 19 citations issued.

Librarian Louise Ledoux reported that she has put a filtering system on the library computers. She cited children getting on chat rooms where there was filthy language and adults and children bringing up and leaving material unsuitable for children on the monitors.

"I've never wanted to do that in the library, but it has solved some of our problems," she said of the filters. "I'm totally against censorship, but I do want to protect the children."

Joyce Young gave the report for the civic and youth center which included attendance of 786 at various functions in the civic center in March.

Written reports were received from County Extension Agent Roy Walson and Fire Chief Bob Falkner.

The fire department answered 10 calls in March including two grass fires, four motor vehicle accidents and three investigations and one other response.

The county will pick up and haul off almost anything during

**What to expect when you get a mammogram**

Eight things to expect when you get a mammogram:

\*Mammogram costs, or a percentage of them, are covered by Medicare, Medicaid, and most private health plans.

\*The procedure requires that you undress above the waist. A wrap will be provided by the facility for you to wear.

\*A technologist will be present to position your breasts for

the mammogram. Most technologists are women. You and the technologist are the only ones present during the mammogram.

\*The procedure takes about 20 minutes. The actual breast compression only lasts a few seconds.

\*You may feel some discomfort when your breasts are compressed, but you should not feel pain.

\*All mammography facilities are now required to send your results to you within 30 days. You will be contacted within five working days if there is a problem with the mammogram.

Even though regular mammography is no guarantee that all breast cancer will be found early, it greatly increases the chance for successful treatment. Just ask the 22 known breast cancer survivors in Crockett County.

Texas Tech Mobile Mammography Clinic will be at the Ozona United Methodist Church on April 29-30. Medicare pays for one mammography per year. The cost of a screening mammogram is \$75.00. Call 1-800-222-8388 to schedule your mammogram.

#### April 16 service for Leta Powell



Leta Irene Powell, age 92, of Ozona died Saturday, April 13, 2002, in the Crockett County Care Center.

Funeral service was at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, April 16, in Ozona First Baptist Church with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery. Rev. Bill Fuller of First Baptist Church and Mr. Johnnie Perkins of Ozona Church of Christ officiated. Arrangements were by Preddy Funeral Home.

Ms. Powell was born in Izoro, Lampasas County, Texas, Aug. 11, 1909, to Richard Fisher Powell and Katherine Narsisus Schrimsher Powell. She started school in Lampasas and moved to Gatesville for the second grade. In 1919, when she was in the third grade she moved with her parents to Ozona where she graduated from Ozona High School in 1927. She attended Simmons University, now Hardin-Simmons, for one year in 1927-1928.

Ms. Powell returned to Ozona and worked as a bookkeeper for her father in the Ozona Tire and Battery Shop until January 1929 when she began working as Deputy Clerk for George Russell in the Crockett County District and County Clerk's Office.

She was appointed as Crockett County District and County Clerk upon the death of George Russell in Ozona's flood in July 1954. She was elected to the office in the general election that year and reelected every four years after 1954, never drawing an opponent.

She continued as District and

County Clerk until her retirement in 1979 after 50 years in that office, 25 years as deputy clerk and 25 years as District and County Clerk.

For several years during her tenure in the county office she was a partner with Jim Dudley in the Ozona Audit Co. She began working as secretary for Ozona rancher and oilman Marshall Montgomery until her retirement in January 1998.

She moved to the Crockett County Care Center in June 2001 after living in the same house since 1919.

Ms. Powell was a longtime member of the Ozona First Baptist Church where she taught Sunday School in the Primary Department for several years. She was a longtime member of Ruth Sunday School Class, the Ozona Garden Club and a former active member and officer of the Eastern Star of Ozona.

Ms. Powell was preceded in death by her parents and a sister, Gladine Teele.

Survivors include: one sister, Luetta Kost, and her husband, Oscar, of Ozona; one brother, E. F. 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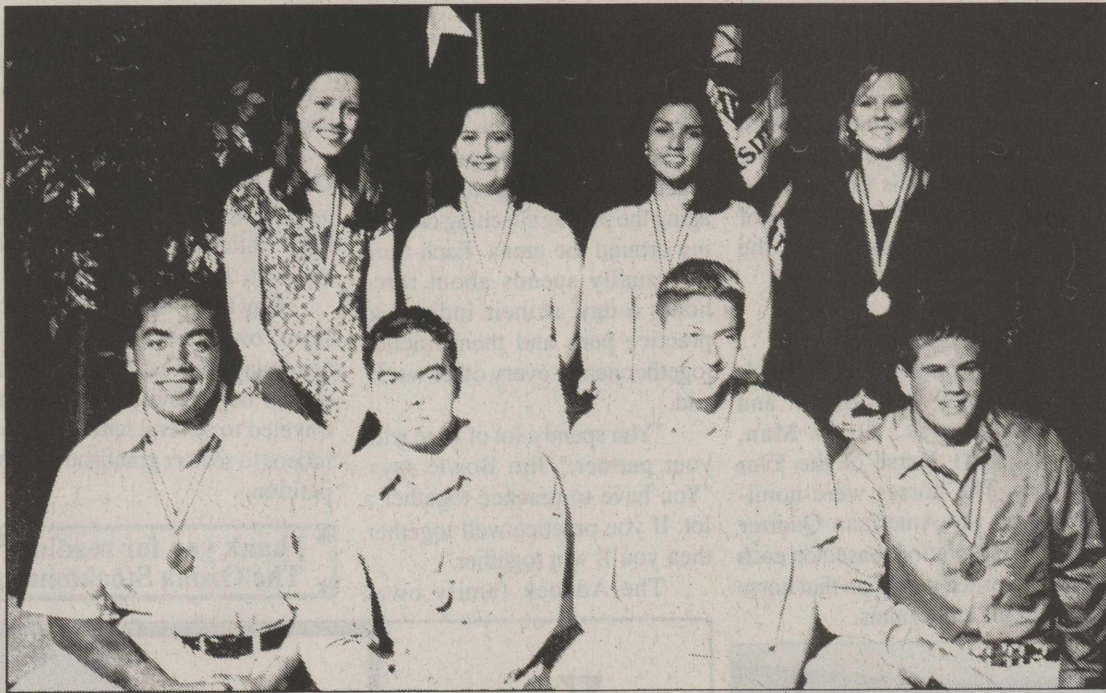

## Lady Raider banquet closes out Tarr's career

Ozona native, Amber Tarr, who first came to Texas Tech at the age of seven to attend summer basketball camps, bid a fond farewell Monday night at the annual Lady Raider end-of-year banquet.

A crowd of 1,000 watched a video highlight that honored both the team and its three seniors, Tarr among them.

Coach Marsha Sharp introduced Tarr as the player who made the change from a high school post player to a NCAA Division I forward, "a most unheard of feat."

Coach Sharp was referring to Tarr's dedication to developing a three-point shot that made her one of the Big 12's leading shooters in that category.

Tarr led the team this year with 66 three-pointers at a remarkable .379 percentage.

## Bone density screening April 29

On Feb. 28, 2002, the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) issued a new committee opinion which recommends that all postmenopausal women 65 years of age or older and others with certain risk factors be screened for osteoporosis. Osteoporosis is an often painful and crippling condition that affects 28 million Americans, 80 percent of whom are women.

ACOG advises that bone mineral density (BMD) testing is also appropriate for the following groups:

\*All postmenopausal women who have sustained a fracture, to confirm the diagnosis of osteoporosis and to determine the severity of the disease

\*Postmenopausal women under 65 years of age who have one or more risk factors, including having a personal history of fracture as an adult, being of Caucasian race, having impaired eyesight despite adequate correction and having a history of alcoholism

According to ACOG, BMD testing may be useful for pre- or postmenopausal women with certain diseases or medical conditions associated with an increased risk of osteoporosis. These include endometriosis, hemophilia, lymphoma and leukemia, eating and nutritional disorders, rheumatoid arthritis, and multiple sclerosis. Individuals exposed to certain drugs associated with an increased risk of osteoporosis, such as tobacco in cigarettes, lithium and heparin, may also benefit from BMD testing.

Women who meet these criteria should undergo a baseline screening for osteoporosis. In the absence of new risk factors, subsequent screening for osteoporosis should not be performed more frequently than every two years, says ACOG. The usefulness of repeated screening is more likely to benefit older women, those with lower baseline BMD, and those with a greater number of risk factors.

In her four-year career at Texas Tech, Tarr advanced to the Sweet 16 all four, the Elite Eight once, and was a member of two Big 12 Championship teams.

Fenton, who attends Ozona High School, was nominated for this national award by Coach Steve Taylor.

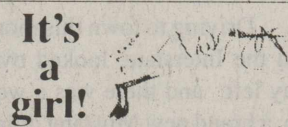
He will appear in the All-American Scholar Yearbook, which is published nationally.

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### Tennessee rodeo all star

When it comes to rodeo, Jim and Koy Adcock of Readyville, TN, can be found counting seconds and marking time at an arena on almost any weekend. Their eyes and their concentration are on their son, Jim Bowie Adcock, a Cannon County High School senior who's roped up quite a name for himself as a timed-event cowboy.

As a freshman, Jim Bowie was named 1999 Rookie Cowboy of the Year by the Tennessee High School Rodeo Association. In 2002, he ranked fifth in state steer-wrestling competitions and in the top 10 in calf and team roping. In 2001, he was named the Tennessee High School Rodeo Association's calf roping, steer wrestling and cutting state champion and ranked fifth in steer wrestling, according to the National Cowboy Association. Through the years, his composite scores have also earned him several All-Around Cowboy titles.

#### One-of-a-kind contender

"Jim Bowie is really a tough contender and has represented Tennessee well in national competitions," says Diane McPeake, state secretary for the National High School Rodeo Association. "He's a one-of-a-kind, four-event contender in calf roping, steer wrestling, team roping and cutting competitions. You just couldn't ask for a nicer contestant."

Though he's a regular contender throughout the Southeast as well as Oklahoma and Texas, Jim Bowie has competed all over the nation in pro-rodeo ranks and in high school rodeos. And he's looking to qualify for the 2002 National High School Finals Rodeo in Farmington, NM, in July. "I qualified for the national High School Finals Rodeo my first three years of high school and for the international Finals Youth Rodeo in Shawnee, OK, for two years," says Jim Bowie. "Shawnee is one of the top rodeo destinations in the nation and pays out more than \$200,000.00 in prize money to contestants. It was great just to be there. I liked the competition

and the adrenaline. I'm looking forward to competing in the nationals and hope to get to the internationals again this year."

The modest 17-year-old athlete has been competing in rodeos nearly all his life. He took part in his first horse show when he was 15 months old, riding in a lead-line class. In kindergarten, he began chute dogging, catching young calves out of the chute and wrestling them to the ground.

As a fourth-grader at Westside Elementary School, he single-handedly led Cannon County to fourth in the district in 4-H horse show competitions. He also calf roped, team roped, barrel raced and competed in pole bending, cutting and western pleasure classes.

#### Horses are family tradition

"Jim Bowie had to be a horse person because both our families worked with horses," Koy says with a chuckle, nodding to her husband, Jim. "I came from a ranching family out West. My granddaddy showed quarter horses his entire life, and my late father, Paul Hallcomb, later produced rodeos at Cowboys Incorporated in Warren County (Tennessee) near Rock Island."

"I rode bareback broncs and bulls in Koy's dad's rodeo," adds Jim, "and that's how Koy and I met - at her dad's rodeo."

Later, Jim moved into the timed events. Additionally, Jim Bowie's uncles from the Adcock side - Bill, Jack and Joe - as well as his cousins, Ty, Jesse and Clark Adcock, have competed in rodeos across the some young rodeo contenders have only one or two horses that are their favorite competitive partners, Jim Bowie is continually training several horses. The number of events you compete in also determines the number of horses you ride.

"I normally take about three horses to an event," Jim Bowie explains, "and which ones I take depends on which ones do the best in their latest workouts."

Jim Bowie says steer wrestling is his favorite competitive event. He also enjoys working in calf and team roping events, but says roping a steer as a team is a very difficult sport to master.

"Team roping is difficult be-

cause it's hard for two people and two horses to work in total unity and everyone be at their best," Jim Bowie explains. "You have two people, two horses, and one cow that all have to coordinate together to make a good run."

Jim Bowie says he has a great team roping partner in 16-year-old Ashlee Miller, a junior at Morristown East High School in Hamblen County. As a freshman, Ashlee was named 2000 Rookie of the Year, All-Around Cowgirl and Break-Away Champion by the Tennessee High School Rodeo Association. Last year, in addition to their numerous winnings as a team, Ashlee and Jim Bowie were selected to be state representatives

on the Wrangler All-Star Team, a select group of eight high school rodeo competitors who ranked in the top eight in the state in at least one event. Recently, Jim Bowie was selected by his fellow teammates to be the 2002 captain of the boys' team. Ashlee was the girls' team captain for 2001.

#### Owns Horse of the Year

Additionally, Jim Bowie's roping horse, Rex Straw, and Ashlee's horse, Straw Man, earned 2001 Horse of the Year honors. The horses were nominated by the American Quarter Horse Association, based on each rider's earned points on that horse during the state finals.

Whenever Ashlee and Jim Bowie are not at school, they are usually practicing their roping and riding skills, Koy says. Both sets of parents are a big part of the practice sessions - always encouraging the pair by coaching or helping around the arena. Each family usually spends about three hours a day at their individual practice pens and then practice together nearly every other weekend.

"You spend a lot of time with your partner," Jim Bowie says. "You have to practice together a lot. If you practice well together, then you'll win together."

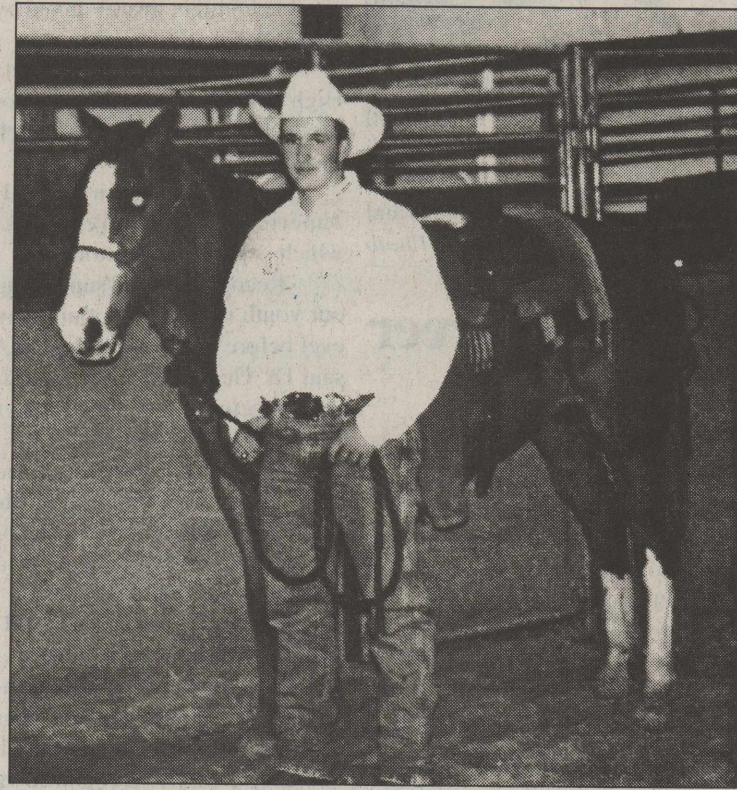
The Adcock family owns

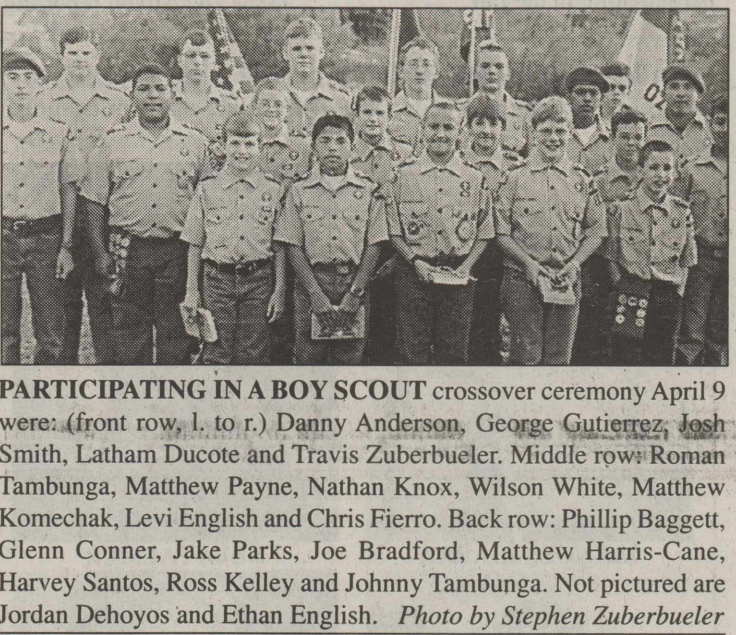
