

School calendar set for 2003

In their regular monthly meeting that took place on Tuesday, April 16, members of the Ozona School Board approved the 2002-03 Crockett County Consolidated Common School Dis- 18; and, the end of the 2002-03 trict School Calendar as recommended by the school district's district-level site-based decisionmaking committee.

The new school calendar will have students beginning school on Monday, Aug. 19, and this is four days later than when school began this year. Teacher staff devel-

Civil Rights complaint filed against school district

Rights (OCR) has completed an evaluation of a complaint filed solidated Common School Dis-

The complaint alleges discrimination against a child on the basis of disability, specifically that CCCCSD has denied the student a free appropriate public education by failing to evaluate and place him, that CCCCSD retaliated against the child by placing him in an alternative education program for fighting although he had already served in-school suspension, and that CCCCSD retaliated against the complainant's husband by not renewing his contract with the district.


OCR is responsible for determining whether entities that receive or benefit from Federal financial assistance from the Department of Education or an agency that has delegated investigative authority to the Department are in compliance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability.

The United States Depart- OCR is also responsible for enment of Education Office for Civil forcing Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990. Under Title II, OCR has jurisdiction against the Crockett County Con- over complaints alleging discrimination on the basis of disability that are filed against public enti-

> OCR has determined that it can proceed to resolution with these three allegations. Under OCR's complaint resolution procedures, if it is unable to obtain voluntary compliance, OCR will move to enforcement by either initiating administrative enforcement proceedings or referring the case to the Department of Justice. OCR can also move immediately to defer any new or additional federal financial assistance to the recipient, and will begin administrative enforcement proceedings to terminate existing federal assistance.

> In resolving complaints, OCR cannot and does not represent the complainant in the way that a person's private attorney would.

> The school district has responded to an OCR request for records and the requested documentation has been sent out.
