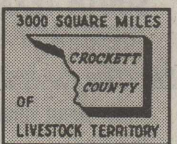

Carson house on tap for inclusion in National Register of Historic Places

Inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places is expected this month for the Carson House according to owners Lon and Laurie Porter.

"I'm so excited," said Mrs. Porter. They have worked more than a year to reach this point.

The house at 1103 Ave. C was built in 1929 by Ira and Wilma (West) Carson. After buying the home from Carson descendants in 2000, the Porters made the house into their home and a bed and breakfast with historical designation as their goal.

The road to historic recognition included a proposal to nominate, a draft of the nomination to be critiqued by the Texas Historical Commission historian, and the nomination. Once complete, the nomination was submitted to the state board where it was approved and referred to the Department of

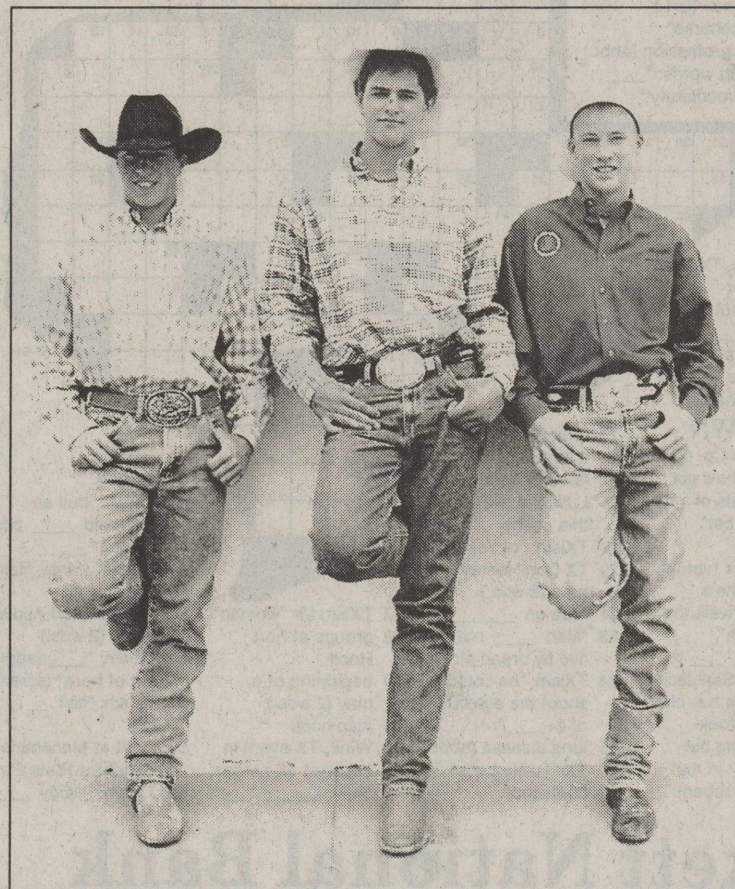

the Interior National Park Service for consideration and approval for National Register of Historic Places designation.

Included in the nomination were a narrative establishing the historical importance of the home,

verbal descriptions of the interior and exterior, the outbuildings, lot and patios. Also part of the nomination were pictures of the exterior and interior of the home, floor plans, a location map and discussion of architect Leonard

Mauldin's training, career and niche in arch evolution.

The two-story home is described as a well-crafted example of Mediterranean Eclectic architecture combining elements of Italian Villa and Spanish Hacienda styles. The Carson House was one of Mauldin's first commissions.

During his lengthy career, 1928-1972, the San Angelo architect produced more than 1,000 designs for structures in West Texas prior to 1955. His credits include: San Angelo Coliseum, First Christian Church in San Angelo, San Angelo Medical Arts Building, First Savings and Loan Building in San Angelo and the original Angelo State University campus.

In Ozona, he designed the Adams, Perner, Schneeman and Henderson homes and possibly other buildings.

Mauldin moved to Los Angeles, CA, while in his teens. He studied architecture at the Califor-

nia Art Institute and came under the influence of a German architect, A. F. Leicht. The classic Mediterranean architecture of Mauldin homes was the staple of upscale residential designs in California during the time of his education, as they are now.

After attending architecture classes at the University of California, Mauldin returned to San Angelo to work with the Roy Hamberlin firm. Mr. Hamberlin left San Angelo soon after Mauldin's arrival, and Mr. Mauldin then opened his own firm.

In 1969, the Mauldin firm moved to Del Rio in response to opportunities arising from the Amistad Dam construction.

The state is enthusiastic about the possibility of the area around the Carson House becoming an historic district according to the Porters.

Local vandals slash 21 tires

Reports of slashed tires began reaching Crockett County Sheriff's Department early May 24 and continued the following day from citizens in different parts of town.

A spree of vandalism resulted in 12 offenses involving 14 vehicles according to Chief Deputy Alton Davis. A total of 21 tires were cut on 10 vehicles, one car window was smashed and the paint keyed on another. Damage is estimated at \$3,300.00, Davis said.

Three male juveniles, ages 13, 14 and 16, were detained and have given statements to officers. After being taken to the Fort Stockton Detention Center, they were brought back to Ozona for a detention hearing. The boys have been turned over to the Juvenile Probation Department and were released to their parents under supervision until disposition of their cases.

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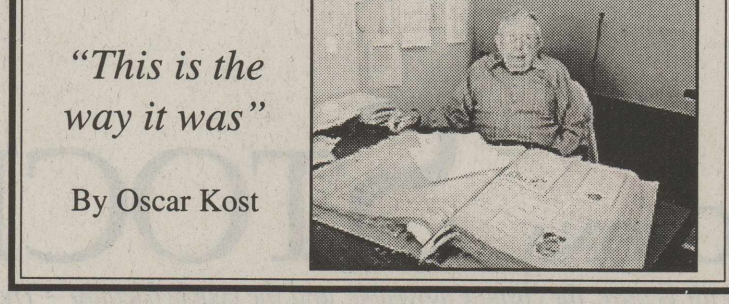

The depression is in full swing. The banks just reopened after the 10-day holiday declared by President Roosevelt. In Ozona a lot of unemployment. Under the Reconstruction Finance Corporation Ozona is getting from \$400.00 to \$800.00 a month using this to pay workers \$3.00 a day to work on streets and public works.

The highways with the caliche base are in town or ready to come to town as of April and May 1933. The workers are trying to complete the bridge on Johnson Draw where the bridge is now.

After the flood in 1954 the government built a series of dams above Ozona, dredging the draw, making it much wider as it is today. The Highway Department rebuilt or added to the bridge. The commissioners' court let

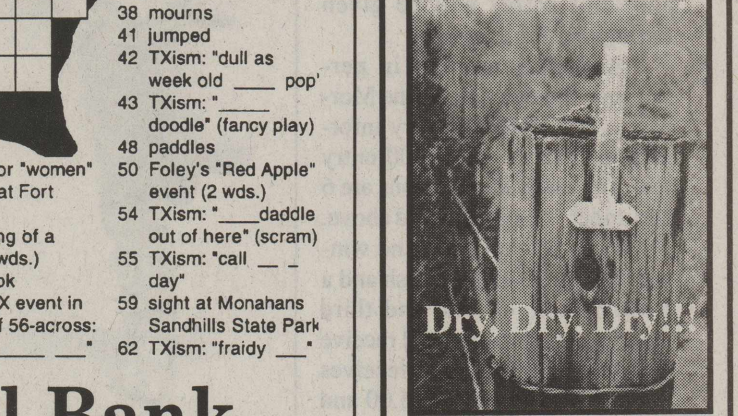

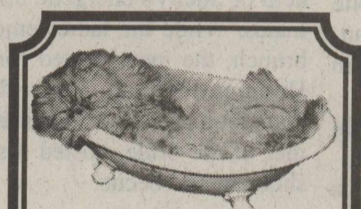

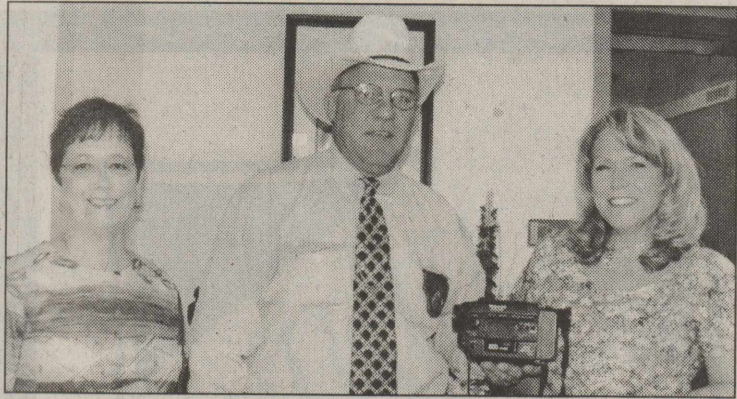

Governor Rick Perry has proclaimed June 3, 2002, "Texas Reading Club Day", the official kick off for the Texas Reading Club 2002, "Read Across Texas!" More than 425,000 children are expected to practice their reading skills and participate in a variety of free programs at their local public libraries throughout the summer.

Crockett County Public Library begins a series of children's programs for Summer 2002 on June 3 with a tour of the library, storytime and a chance for the kids to sign up for library cards, select books and check them out. The summer reading programs will be held every Monday morning in June and July. There are two age groups. Children age 6 to 12 will come from 10:00 to 11:00 a.m., and the little ones age 3 to 5 will come from 11:00 to noon.

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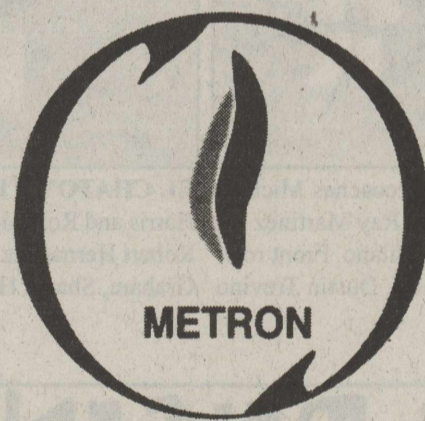
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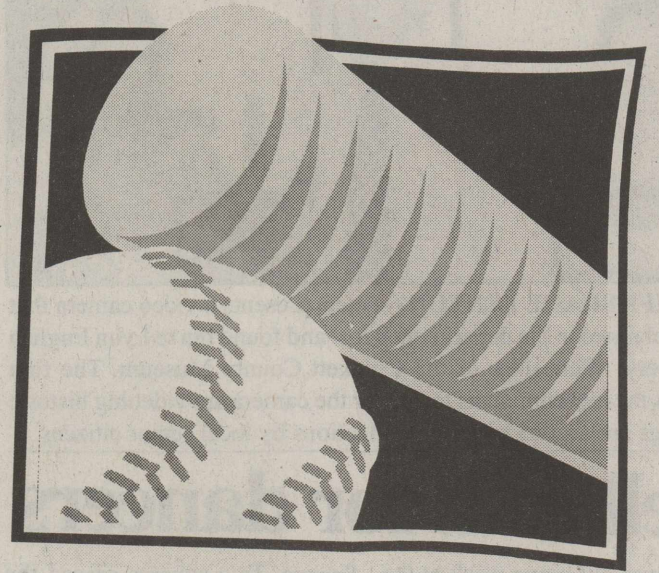

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Landscape water conservation

An adequate water supply has become a critical issue to the future prosperity of Texas. Booming populations, as well as extended periods of drought, have put an increased demand on the state's limited water supply. Urban areas use approximately 40 to 60 percent of their water supply to maintain landscapes and gardens. Much of this water is used to support high demand landscapes or is applied inefficiently.

Landscape water conservation incorporates several basic principles which will not only conserve water, but your pocketbook as well: planning and design, soil analysis, plant selection, grass selection, efficient irrigation, mulching, appropriate maintenance.

Start with a Plan

A water efficient landscape begins with a well planned design. Take into consideration existing structures, trees, shrubs and grass areas. Then consider the landscape budget, appearance, maintenance and water requirements. Implementing your landscape design can be gradually done over several years.

Soil Analysis and Preparation

To increase plant health and conserve water, add organic matter to the soil of shrubs and flower beds. This will increase the soil's ability to absorb and store water. As a rule of thumb, till in 4 inches of organic material such as shredded pine bark, peat or your own compost. For grass areas and trees, this practice may not be economically feasible or necessary.

Plant Selection

Select trees, shrubs and ground covers based on their adaptability to your region's soil and climate. Plants and grasses native to your particular region have lower water demands, fewer pest problems and lower fertilizer needs than many nonadapted, exotic plants imported from other areas. Native plants and grasses are becoming recommendations on adapted landscape plants for your area.

Grass Selection

When considering a landscape's water requirements, keep in mind that turf grasses require more frequent watering and maintenance than most other landscape plants. Planting the lowest water use turf grasses adapted to the region is an effective way to reduce landscape irrigation requirements. Achieving a significant reduction in water consumption and landscape maintenance

may also involve reducing the size of water-sensitive lawns by including patios, decks, shrub beds and ground covers in the landscape design.

Efficient Irrigation

Much of the water applied to lawns and gardens is never absorbed by the plants. Excess irrigation or applying water too rapidly contributes to runoff, evaporation and may leach nutrients deep into the soil and away from plant roots.

Sprinkler irrigation is the most commonly used method of landscape watering. Whether you use a hose-end sprinkler or a permanent underground system, make sure your sprinkler heads are adjusted to avoid watering sidewalks, driveways and streets. To avoid excess evaporation, time your watering between late evening and mid-morning.

Drip irrigation offers increased water efficiency and plant performance when compared to sprinkler irrigation. Drip irrigation slowly applies water to the soil. The water flows under low pressure through emitters or bubblers placed at each plant. Water applied by drip irrigation has little chance of waste through evaporation or runoff.

Mulching

Use mulch whenever possible. A good mulch conserves water by reducing moisture evaporation from the soil. Mulch also reduces weed populations, prevents soil compaction and keeps soil temperatures more moderate.

Appropriate Maintenance

Mowing grass at the appropriate height conserves water. Mow St. Augustine grasses and Buffalo grasses at three inches. Mow Bermuda grasses at one inch and Centipede grasses and Zoysia grasses at 2 inches. Mowing at relatively tall heights allows the grass to develop a deeper, more water-efficient root system.

Applying fertilizer to the lawn at the proper time and in the proper amount can save time, effort and money through reduced mowing and watering. Apply one pound of actual nitrogen fertilizer per 1000 square feet of lawn at one time. Apply only the recommended amount of fertilizer once in the spring and again in the fall. Excessive amounts of fertilizer can damage your lawn, as well as become a major source of pollution to streams and ground water.

Water Conservation Commitment

Water is a vital concern for every person in Texas; after all, it is a limited and fragile resource. Landscape watering is considered

by many as a luxury use of water. This "nonessential" water use implies a special responsibility to efficiently use the resource and to protect its quality. Water conservation in landscape does not mean planting a harsh cactus and rock garden. It means common sense landscaping to protect water quality and quantity.

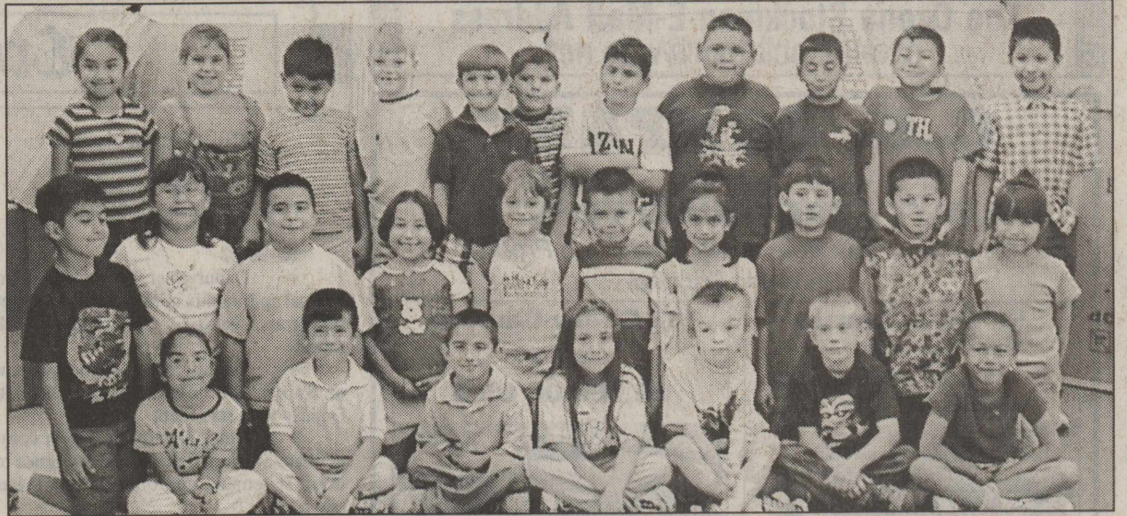
Events for Tiny Tots, age 6 and under, and PeeWees, 7-8, are: high jump, long jump, 50m and 100m dash and the 400m relay.

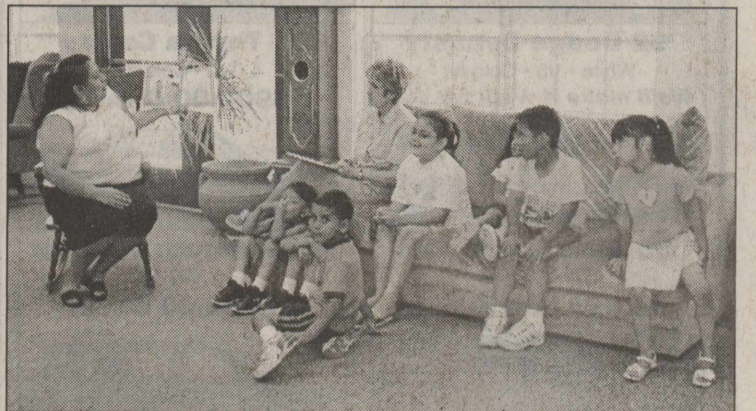

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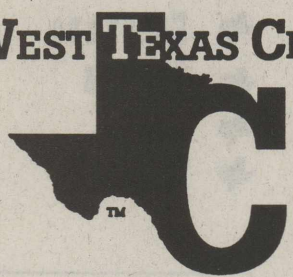

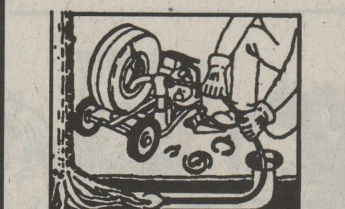
