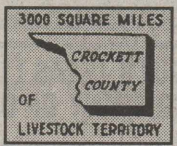

## School Board committee to negotiate tax abatement with wind power company

In their regular monthly meeting that was held on Thursday, June 27, Robert Peña, Melissa Miller and Randy Sowell from Cielo Wind Power Company appeared before the Ozona School Board to request and seek board approval for an abatement agreement on their proposed wind farm located in Crockett and Upton Counties.

Ms. Miller explained that House Bill 1200 was passed by the 77th Texas Legislature to encourage large scale capital investments in Texas, enable local government officials to compete with incentives offered by other states, and level the tax burden on capital intensive companies. It is an agreement in which a taxpayer agrees to invest a certain amount and create jobs in exchange for an eight year limitation on the tax-

able value of certain property for school district maintenance and operation (M&O) purposes after a two year qualifying period.

Ms. Miller went on to explain that companies requesting an abatement agreement under the provisions of House Bill 1200 have to submit an application to a local school board requesting participation in seeking the tax incentive, and a copy of the application is sent to the Texas Comptroller's Office. The school district is required to conduct a third-party economic impact study that will assist the school district to determine whether an appraised value limitation would be in the best interest of the school district and the state.

The State Comptroller will issue a recommendation regarding the project and state approval or options for reconsideration. The school district then reviews the application, economic impact study and the comptroller's recommendation and approves or disapproves of the application within 120 calendar days from the filing date of the application.

Following a report from former superintendent of schools Larry Taylor and Jim Ramage, new superintendent of schools, on their meeting in Austin with State Comptroller Office and Texas Education Agency officials regarding House Bill 1200, the board approved the appointment of a committee of Jim Ramage, Elliott Barrera and Tom Anderson to develop the economic impact study and negotiate with Cielo Wind Power for an abatement agreement.

During the meeting the trustees toured the completed renovation and addition to the boys' fieldhouse at Lion Stadium, and they voted to accept the completed project subject to a completion of district architect Larry Harvey's punchlist of items to be corrected. In a related development, the board also approved the installing of artificial Astroturf floor covering in the fieldhouse.

The board voted to approve a grant application for the Tele-

communications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) Special Projects Grant that was developed by Rod Miller, district technology coordinator.

Both the Ozona Primary and Ozona Intermediate campuses are eligible for this grant because they have not received previous TIF grant monies. For this particular program, both campuses will be awarded \$44,000.00 to build technology capacity at the campus level.

The Special Projects Grant requires no matching funds to be provided by the school district, and the TIF funding under the Special Projects Grant will allow the school district to replace 82 of their outdated computer systems with new and faster computers in order to incorporate more technology into the curriculum and better serve students, teachers and the community.

The district is applying to replace computers in the computer labs and libraries at both campuses, and with the grant money, the district will purchase a total of 82 Dell Pentium IV computers, Microsoft Office XP licenses and TIF tech training.

The board also approved the hiring of Mr. Doug Karr of Lubbock as a Chapter 41 school district consultant. Superintendent Jim Ramage told the board that Mr. Karr is a person that all Chapter 41 superintendents contact regarding state funding. His services will cost \$3,000.00 to \$5,000.00.

## Action plan approved for Trans Texas Corridor

AUSTIN - A new concept in transportation moved closer to reality June 27 with the Texas Transportation Commission's approval of the Trans Texas Corridor action plan.

The 95-page report accepted by the three-member commission at its regular monthly meeting outlines the basic design of a state-wide 4,000-mile multi-use transportation system. The corridor -

up to 1,200 feet wide - will include separate lanes for passenger vehicles and trucks, six rail lines (three in each direction for high-speed passenger rail as well as commuter and freight rail) and a dedicated utility zone for water lines, petroleum pipelines, electricity and data.

Identified as one of the four priority corridor segments is the route paralleling I-10 from Orange to El Paso.

"This report, prepared by TxDOT at the request of Gov. Rick Perry, outlines the future of transportation in Texas," said Mike Behrens, TxDOT executive director. "Texas is at a crossroads, and today our commission took the first step down a new road that will literally pave the way to a better Texas."

The report identified four routes as priority corridor segments. These routes - only conceptual at this point - are from Denison to the Rio Grande Valley paralleling I-35, I-37 and the proposed I-69, from Texarkana to Houston to Laredo paralleling the proposed I-69, from Dallas-Fort Worth to Houston paralleling I-45 and from El Paso to Orange paralleling I-10. Nearly four million people live within 10 miles of these priority corridors.

Under the action plan approved by the commission, TxDOT will designate a central office to oversee the development of the corridor. It is a process which could take up to 50 years, but the corridor report's action plan sets forth a series of first steps beginning in August and continuing to December 2003.

Estimated total cost of the corridor ranges from \$145.2 billion to \$183.5 billion. The report discusses a variety of funding possibilities, though planners generally envision a public-private effort paid for with tolls, bonds and other financing tools.

"The Trans Texas Corridor is a Texas-sized idea," Behrens said. "It is the largest engineering project ever proposed for this state, much more extensive than the Capitol, the Galveston seawall, Texas' portion of the Interstate highway system, you name it."

## Bonilla calls on court to reverse

### PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE RULING

- Calls Decision Outrageous -

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Moments after a California court ruled the Pledge of Allegiance unconstitutional, Henry Bonilla rounded up colleagues and headed to the steps of the U.S. Capitol. Standing close to House Speaker Dennis Hastert, Henry and his colleagues joined together and recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

"Gathering at the Capitol steps was a sign of solidarity. It was an opportunity for every member of Congress to say before God and our country that we adamantly disagree with this ruling. In fact, we find it outrageous. We will not step aside and allow this injustice to take place," said Mr. Bonilla.

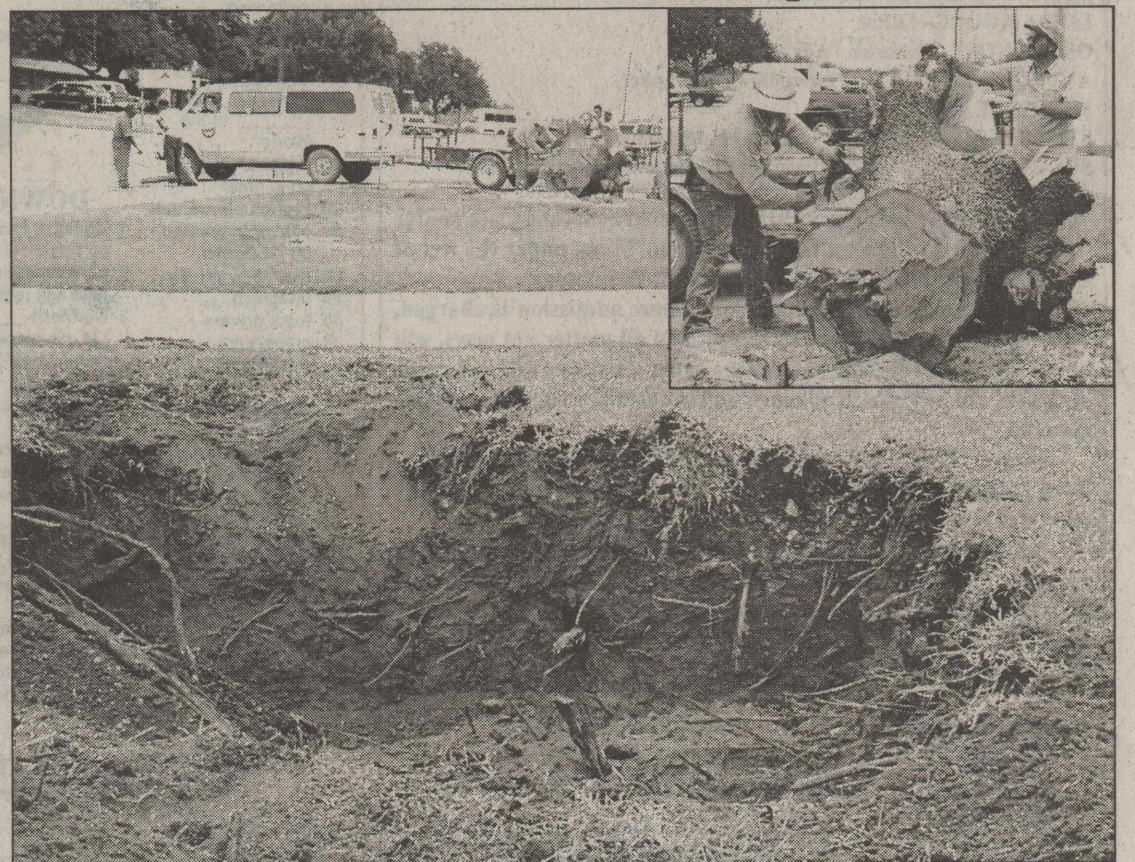
In the hours that followed the court ruling, Bonilla became an original co-sponsor of legislation that urges the Ninth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to rehear the case and reverse their ruling. The legislation calls the ruling inconsistent with the first amendment and advises that the phrase "One Nation, under God" remain in the pledge.

I cannot imagine what the court was thinking. We all recognize the separation of church and state, but this takes litigation to an inconceivable level. The court's decision tells students and teachers across America that they cannot display their patriotism. Now, more than ever, our country needs outlets and opportunities to honor our nation's traditions and history," said Bonilla.

The California court case was brought by an atheist, who objected that the school district in which his second-grade daughter was enrolled encouraged students to recite the pledge. If the ruling is allowed to stand, schoolchildren will be prohibited from reciting the pledge.

"This decision lacks common sense. A simple two-word reference to God does not eliminate the separation of church and state. Students are not required or forced to recite the words 'under God' or for that matter the entire pledge," said Bonilla. "It is the duty of the court system to rehear this case. I strongly urge the court to reverse their earlier decision. One way or another, we will fix this damage."

Bonilla authored legislation in 1999 to allow students and supporters to pray before sporting events. His resolution was overwhelmingly approved by the House of Representatives.

## Crockett County History

"This is the way it was"

This story is about stage lines, mainly in Crockett County.

There were some early wagon trains and stage lines mostly in Val Verde County and southern Crockett County to Fort Lancaster.

We now have the Sheffield Hill, but stop about halfway down and look north to the point of a hill you could see parts of a road built off the point down to Fort Lancaster. This was in the 1850s to 1890. Soldiers accompanied them some of the way.

The first stage went from Fort Concho to Fort Stockton in 1868. The stage came through the northern part of the county.

The first stage in Crockett County was from Emerald settlement to Knickerbocker and Sherwood to Fort Concho. This was in 1890. The appointment of a postmaster at Emerald continued until December 1891. The stage was a buckboard. The line was to operate three times a week with mail and passengers. Seems that came as a joke. If it came once a week it was fine.

After Ozona became a village, mule trains brought supplies and mail from San Angelo. In the fall of 1891, a postmaster was appointed for Ozona and a stage line

started to San Angelo. The mail contract to San Angelo also included Comstock.

A road had been completed to Comstock. The two stage lines, one to Comstock and one to San Angelo, connected with rail lines.

The stages were not the famed Concord but a 3-seated hack with drop curtains. The Ozona-San Angelo line operated with one leaving Ozona early and another leaving San Angelo. The first stop in the 86 mile run to San Angelo was called High Lonesome. It was about 20 miles from Ozona in the O-9 country north-east of Ozona. Station #2 was 18 miles south of Sherwood. The third change was at Sherwood Station and #4 was at Knickerbocker.

The San Angelo station was at a livery stable on West Concho Avenue. A man was at each station with horses ready. Two horses were used except in bad weather. There were 41 gates on the route.

Mrs. Kirkpatrick had the Kirkpatrick Hotel in Ozona. She gave the drivers meals to bring her passengers.

The first cars were put on the line by Ralph Watson in 1908. The cars were Model T chain drive Buicks with a two cylinder motor and side crank. The drivers had to change flats or repair them. They carried extra motor and drive parts.

We are a long way from this in 1902. A few like me remember the early cars.

This is condensed from the Bi-centennial history book. Interesting to me. Hope you like it.

If you are 50+, come spend the day and have a great time.

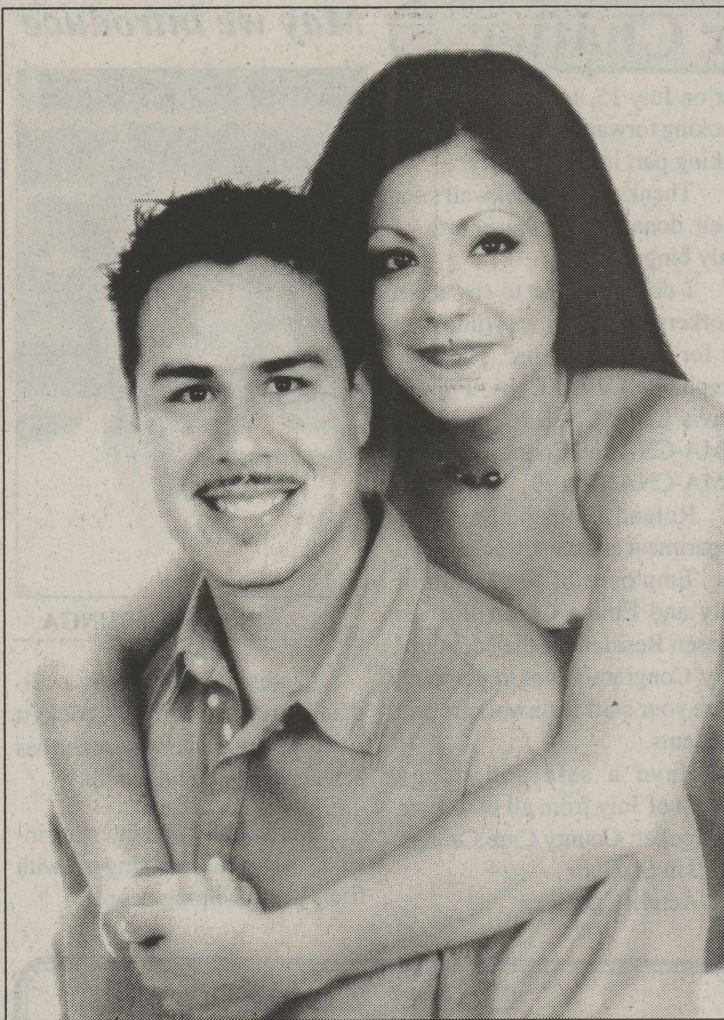
Next week will be exercise as usual Tuesday and Thursday.

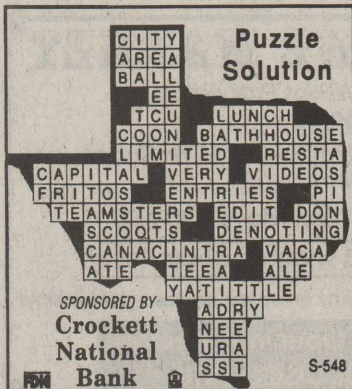

### Divorce and Forgiveness

Little is permanent in our lives. We bypass the idea of family members having lasting ties. The thought of families having deep roots in communities is also foreign to us. Fleeting relationships, one-night stands, and easy divorce are the norm rather than the exception.

From the perspective of the Bible we must therefore look at two important sides of divorce. First, God's plan is for permanence in all marriages. "I hate divorce," says the Lord, the God of Israel" (Malachi 2:16). God is not pleased with easy divorce laws. God is not pleased with the cavalier implementation of such laws. God is not pleased with the casual laying aside of marriage vows in favor of some elusive so-called personal freedom.

Second, although God looks down on divorce, He cautiously allows it. Adultery is a legitimate reason for divorce. Desertion, which cannot be remedied by counsel in the church or helpful legal advice, is also a proper reason for divorce. Some add the desertion of marriage vows by abusive spouses. Marriages require trust, love and commitment to prosper and flourish.

Divorce always involves us in sin. But God is in the forgiveness business. Some folks think divorce is the unpardonable sin. It's not. All other sins, including divorce, are forgivable through faith in the sacrifice of Christ as the only adequate payment for those sins.

A collection of wedding and photograph albums loaned for the exhibit included wedding organizer Marilyn Cox's photos of her brides.

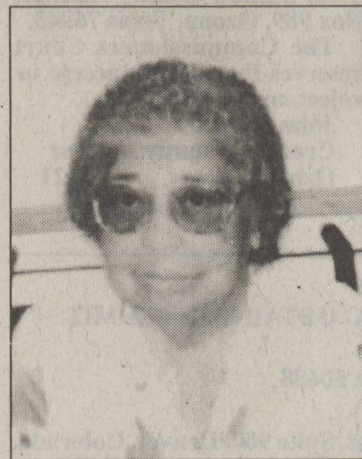

### Resident of the month

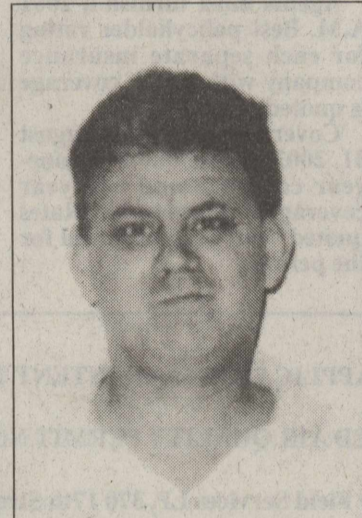


Resident of the Month of July at Crockett County Care Center is Emma Camarillo.

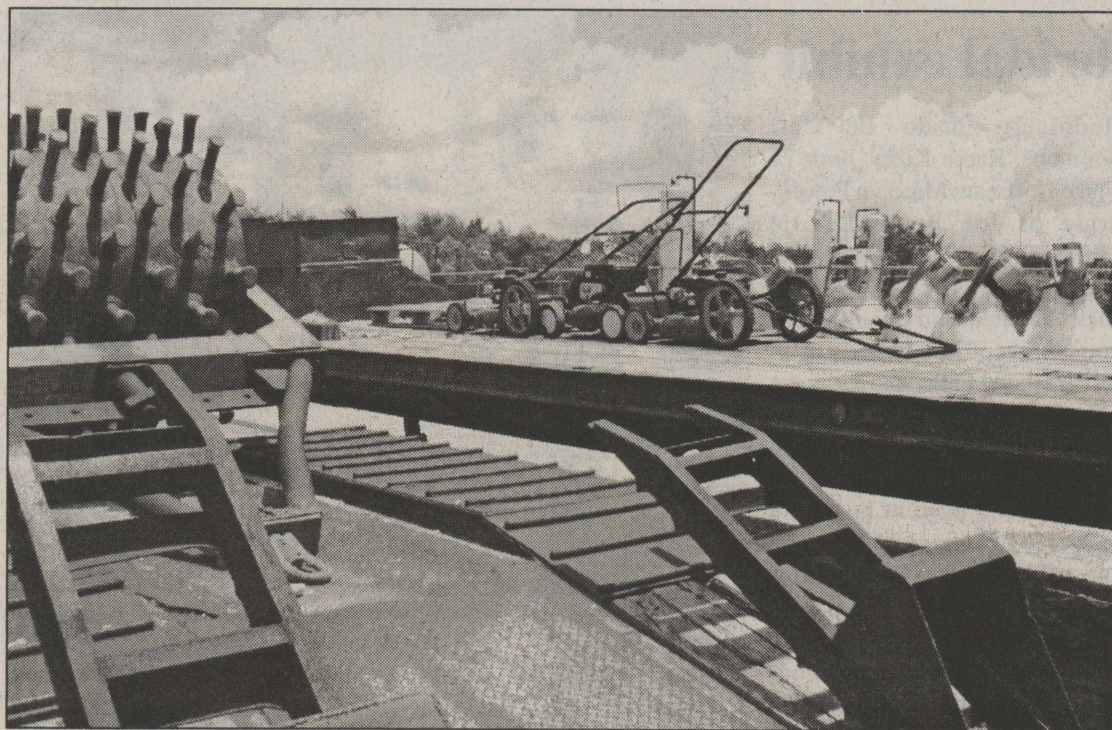

The TNRCC executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application.

The TNRCC will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. The deadline to submit public comments is 30 days after newspaper notice is published. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing within 30 days following this notice to the Office of the Chief Clerk, at the address below.

If a hearing request is timely filed, additional notice may be provided. Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the executive director will forward the application and any requests for contested case hearing to the TNRCC Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact relating to relevant and material air quality concerns raised during the comment period. 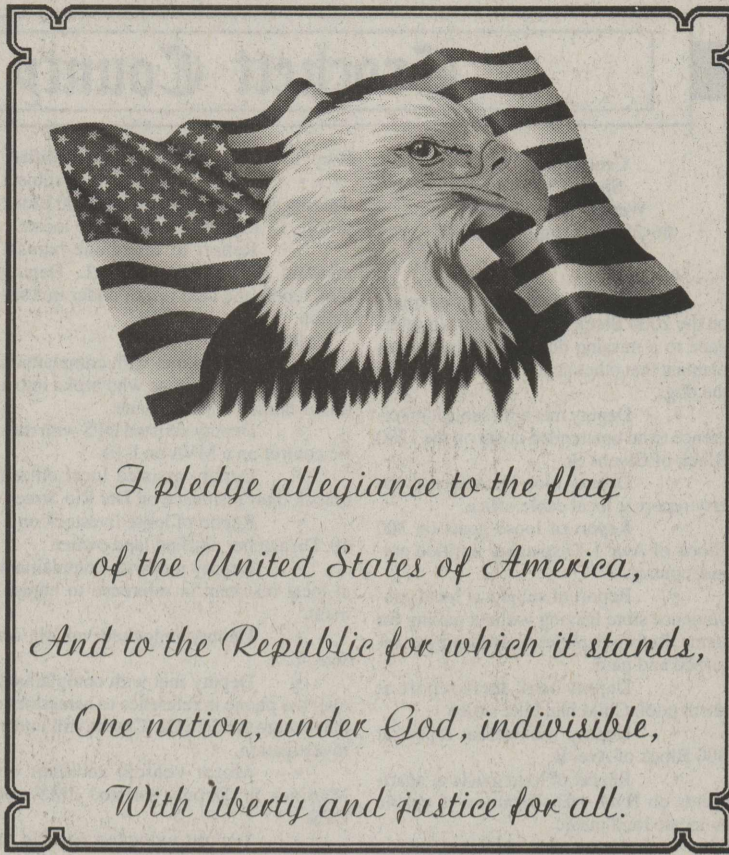
One day they toured the grand Ramsdell Theater, which has been recently restored to its Victorian splendor, where several stars have performed in local plays (including James Earl Jones,

Boy Scouts from other troops. They are all looking forward to attending next year's summer camp where most of the boys will have an opportunity to be tapped out for the Order of the Arrow.

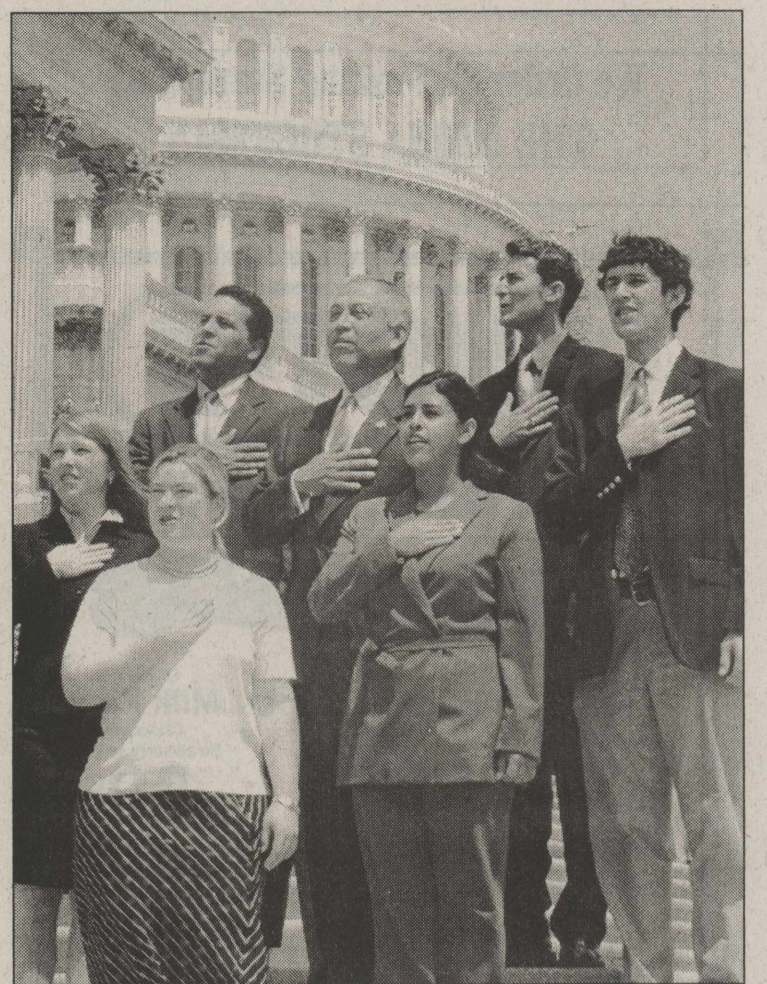
