

The referral itself may be made by anyone such as the patient, family, friends or your physician. Hospice is available to patients with any of a wide range of life-limiting diagnoses which include, but are not limited to: heart disease, cancer, lung disease, and Alzheimer's disease.

Once a family requests hospice, we will contact your physician to make sure he or she agrees that hospice care is appropriate at this time. The patient must sign consent forms just like when going to the doctor's office or entering the hospital.

You may choose to stop hospice at any time. For example, if the life-limiting illness goes into remission a patient may choose to be discharged from hospice to again seek more aggressive treatment. In most cases the patient can return to hospice if the need arises.

Courage Under Fire: Do We Have It?

In his book Citizen Soldiers, author and historian Steven Ambrose tells the story of the pivotal days during and after D-Day in World War II as the Allies landed what would be the decisive blow against the Nazis. Ambrose tells much of the story from the perspective of the soldiers who fought in those battles.

I suppose all guys have wondered about how they would react in battle. Would I have the courage needed to get the job done or would I turn tail and run? I suppose no one can

know for sure until the time of testing really comes. To actually know the answer to that question is a fearful and costly thing, and whether that knowledge is worth the pain it takes to possess it is very much open to question. Most men have no choice: they are either there at

the time of testing or they are

My wife's father knew. And, like most of the guys who were in the thick of battle and who stood the test, he didn't much like to talk about it. I don't know what he'd had to see. I don't know what he'd had to do. But his silence probably said more than words could. Learning the answer about the depth of his own courage was expensive to him. Ambrose writes:

About themselves the most important thing the majority of the GI's discovered was

that they were not cowards. They hadn't thought so. That had fervently hoped it would not be so. But they couldn't be sure until tested. After a few days of combat, most of them knew they were good soldiers. They had neither run away nor collapsed into a pathetic mass of quivering jello-their worst fear, even greater than the fear of being afraid.

They were learning about others. A common experience: the guy who talked toughest, bragged most, excelled in maneuvers-everyone's pick to be the top soldier in the company—was the first to break. While the softtalking kid who was hardly noticed in camp was the standout in combat. These are the clichés in war novels precisely because they are true.

Courage under fire. Would you have it? Would I? No one really knows until he is tested.

Most of us will not be tested on a battlefield in Normandy or the Mekong Delta or outside of Baghdad. But you can be sure that tests of courage will come.

You may not be breaking through a hedgerow in France when the bullets come; you may be waking up after cancer surgery and hearing the verdict.

You may not be lying in the snow bleeding with shrapnel wounds from a mortar explosion; you heart may be bleeding because of painful "explosions" in the life of a child.

Tests of courage on the battlefield of life will come. But God's children never face their enemies alone, and because they know their King will win, they fight in the sure knowledge that, even though the struggle is long and difficult, the victory is theirs in Him.



Choosing the right athletic shoes

It's a new year and time to keep that resolution of "losing weight and being healthy." Courtney According to Schoessow, Texas Cooperative Extension health specialist, one way to achieve this goal is by choosing the right athletic shoe.

With the many types of athletic shoes available, it can be hard to choose the right shoes. There are differences in design and variations in material and weight. The American Academy Orthopedic Surgeons says that these differences have been developed to protect the areas of the feet that encounter the most stress in a particular athletic activity. Some of the different types of sports shoes available include the following:

 Athletic shoes are grouped into the following categories: running, training, and walking; they include shoes for hiking jogging, and exercise walking. These shoes should have a comfortable soft upper, good shock adsorption, smooth tread, and a rocker sole design that encourages the natural roll of the foot during the walking motion.

Features of a good jogging should include shoe cushioning, flexibility, control, and stability in the heel counter area, lightness, and good traction.

Cross-training shoes several combine characteristics of other types of shoes so that you can participate in more than one sport and wear the same shoe.

A good cross trainer should have flexibility in the forefoot that is needed for running, in addition to stability on the inside and outside of the shoe for the control needed for aerobics and tennis.

Walking shoes should flex easily at the ball of the foot, which help feet to push forward.

· Court sport shoes include comfortable in the store, they attaching the sole to the upper. shoes for tennis, basketball, won't be comfortable when and volleyball. Most court sports require the body to move forward, backward, and side-to-side. As a result, most athletic shoes used for court sports are subjected to heavy abuse. The key to finding a good court shoe is the sole. Ask a coach or shoe salesperson to help you select the best type of sole for your

sport. Field sport shoes include shoes for soccer, football, and baseball. These shoes are cleated, studded, or spiked. The spike and stud formations vary from sport to sport, but they generally are replaceable or detachable cleats, spikes, or studs affixed into nylon soles.

 Track and field sport shoes are very specific to the sport. The needs of the individual are most important when picking the shoe. For example, foot types, gait patterns, and training styles should always be considered. It is always best to ask a coach about the type of shoe that should be selected for the event in which you are participating.

It's also important to choose proper-fitting sport shoes. Proper-fitting sports shoes can enhance performance and prevent injuries. Follow these specially designed fitting facts when purchasing a new pair of athletic shoes:

· Try on athletic shoes after a workout or run and at the end of the day. Your feet will be at their largest.

· Wear the same type of sock that you will wear for that sport.

· When the shoe is on your foot, you should be able to freely wiggle all of your toes. There should be a thumb's width from the tip of the shoe to the end of the shoe.

· The shoes should be comfortable as soon as you try them on. There is no break-in period. If they're not

the shoes. They should be comfortable. The heel of the shoe should not slip off the foot as you walk or run.

 Always re-lace the shoes you are trying on. You should lace through each top eyelet as you crisscross the lacing pattern to ensure a more snug fit and decrease slippage. Don't tie the laces too tight as this may cause injury to the nerves or tendons on the top of the foot and ankle.

Now that you know what type of shoe to buy and tips to picking out a properly fitting shoe, you need to consider its construction—how well it is made.

Understanding the basics of shoe construction can help you choose intelligently from among the thousands of available styles. Stitching should be secure, even, and straight. Rubber around the base of the shoe should be one continuous strip, tightly

The toe box should be square for adequate toe room.

· Walk or run a few steps in The should have side and tongue padding for extra comfort. Cushioning on the cuff around the ankle and at the Achilles tendon helps to reduce friction and irritation.

The inner sole should be soft and resilient, with adequate arch cushions. The reflector should be as big as possible, especially if you will be outside at dusk or dawn. The insole should be removable for cleaning and, when it loses springiness, replacement.

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


