





Pre-K, kindergarten pre-registration April 18

Pre-registration for the 2005-2006 Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten classes will be held on Monday, April 18, 2005 at the primary school library.

Pre-Kindergarten students can register from 9 a.m. to noon and Kindergarten students from 1-4 p.m.

To be eligible to attend prekindergarten, a student must be unable to speak and comprehend the English language, eligible to participate in the National Free Reduced-Price Lunch Program, or is homeless. The child must be 4 years old on or

before Sept. 1, 2005. Parents must have their child's birth certificate, shot record, and social security card in order to register the child.

If the child speaks Spanish, testing will be done to see if he or she qualifies for Pre-Kindergarten; therefore you will need to bring the child with you to registration. Parents enrolling their child for Pre-Kindergarten must bring a copy of their recent check stub. Income will be verified prior to the first day of

be five on or before Sept. 1, 2005. Parents will also need to bring their child's birth certificate, shot record, and social security card to registration. A copy of these documents will be made, and the originals will be returned to you. This is required by law 25.002 of the Texas Education Code.

As of Aug. 1, 1999, all children born on or after Sept. 2, 1992 are required to have the following immunizations to begin school: hepatitis A immunization, 4 year-old booster immunization, and if your child has not had the Chicken Pox the Varicella immunization required.



To search for any registered sex offenders living in your area--FOR FREE--go to the DPS Crime Records Web site (http://records.txdps.state.tx.us/) and click on the link that says "Sex Offender Registry" located on the right-hand side of the page. You must read the caveats and click on the link at the bottom of the page.

Information on registered sex offenders includes their name and address, a photo, the law enforcement agency where the offender is registered and information about the offense(s) for which the offender was required to register as a sex offender.

Please note that the local law enforcement agency where a sex offender is registered will always have the most up-to-date information regarding the sex offender. Once the sex offender registers with the local agency, that agency will then pass the information along to DPS for inclusion in the statewide database.

The DPS maintains files based on registration information submitted by criminal justice agencies and represents a statewide source of information on sex offenders required by law to register. DPS cannot guarantee the records you obtain through this site relate to the person about whom you are seeking information. Searches based on names, dates of birth and other alphanumeric identifiers are not always accurate. The only way to positively link someone to a sex offender record is through fingerprint verification.

DPS cautions that you should never rely solely on a list of convicted sex offenders to

ensure the safety of your chil- cific Sex Offender Registration dren. You should monitor who has access to your children and follow up on anything that seems "strange" about their interaction. Anytime there is a reasonable concern that this person may be about to reoffend or may possibly have reoffended, especially against children, you should contact your local law enforcement agency.

If you have information that a registered sex offender is not actually using the address listed on the DPS website, you should contact the local law enforcement agency where the sex offender is registered. The registering agency is listed in the spe-
