

Storage files bankruptcy

Wool Growers Central Storage Company Inc. has filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy due to recent incidents.

Chapter 11 under the Federal Bankruptcy Code means that a company is able to work out a plan in hopes of trying to pay people back, as well as working out a plan to keep operating, said attorney Greg Gossett, of Gossett, Harrison, Reese, Millican and Stipanovic in San Angelo.

However, Gossett said he

Growers will stay open or not. This affects both Wool Growers in Ozona and Sanderson.

"I don't know what they are going to do," Gossett said. "We are currently trying to determine what the facts are and who has wool there."

In a letter sent out people who had wool or mohair stored at the company, it states that "the directors have been informed by the ex-manager that mohair was sold without authority and the proceeds not paid to the producers on some occasions."

The letter then goes on to state that Wool Growers' intent, if feasible, is to work towards repayment, either in whole or in part, of the producers who may have had wool and/or mohair in one of the warehouses and who did not get paid for the product when it was sold.

"However, in trying to determine the extent that would be needed to facilitate this repayment, the amount of wool and/or mohair in issue needs to be ascertained," the letter states.

The letter also states that schedules of the wool and mohair claimed by the person and a copy of the receipt to be sent to the San Angelo law firm.

BOY SCOUTS RAISE FUNDS FOR PRIMARY SCHOOL FLAG






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

OOPS! When a famous local auctioneer could not attend an important charity auction he called his friend and asked him to stand in for him. The replacement is a great auctioneer but because he was not from the area he was unfamiliar with all the bigwig dignitaries in attendance. When he introduced the local state assemblyman prior to the sale and asked him to stand instead of polite applause you could have heard a pin drop. You see, the local politician was a paraplegic confined to a wheelchair. Needless to say, he could not stand up. As you'd expect the auction then got off to a rather cold start.

Spitting Fire I'll never forget the day we tried to sell Angus bulls with a faulty sound system, outside, during a thunder and lightning storm in the Arizona desert. It's the first and only time I have actually seen five inch sparks of electricity between the microphone and the auctioneer's tongue!

Speaking of Spitting The very first llama sale I ever worked I was warned that llamas will occasionally sputter spittle on you. I was also told that they warn you in advance by rolling their lips around in a circle. As I was working ring I turned around to turn in a bid and not a foot from my face was a llama showing all the signs of a premature eruption. I dodged out of the way just in time so that the llama's massive missive landed right on the expensive leather outfit of the heretofore volume buyer.

A Slip Off The Old Block Other auctioneers are always trying to improve on the methods used by farm and cattle auctioneers but it can't be done. I know one charity auctioneer who demanded a raised round stage in the middle of his audience about three feet off the ground. Instead of ring men yelling in their bids he had his ring men armed with flashlights with green tissue paper over the end. The idea was that when the room was darkened the green rays could be seen. Unfortunately the lights had to be turned down so low the ring men could not see the bids. And because the auctioneer had to turn 360 degrees in all directions he got to spinning around so fast he got dizzy, fell off the raised stage and broke his foot in five places. Fortunately the charity auction was for the Red Cross so disaster relief was close at hand.



My life's been full, I savored much, Good friends, good times, loved one's touch.





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Managing diabetes by reading nutrition labels

for establishing healthy eating terol and two grams or less satuhabits is reading nutrition labels

People with diabetes especially should read the fat, fiber, sodium and carbohydrate content of their packaged foods. In particular, they should look for "hidden sugars," which are added to foods but not labeled as "sugar."

Some of these ingredients are sucrose, fructose (and many other words that end with "ose"), corn syrup, high fructose corn syrup, dextrin, sugar alcohols, molasses, sorghum, honey, brown sugar and invert sugar.

But that's not the only information to be found by reading labels. The fat, fiber and sodium content of foods are also listed.

People with diabetes can eat healthier if they limit total fat intake to 30 percent or less of their daily calories; 10 percent or less should be saturated fats.

If a food is labeled "fatfree," that means it has less than 0.5 grams of fat.

Other definitions are:

grams of fat or less;

- Reduced fat: has at least 25 percent less fat than similar foods that have are not reduced fat;

- Cholesterol-free: contains less than two milligrams cholesterol and two grams or less saturated fat;

- Low cholesterol: has 20 milligrams or less cholesterol and two grams saturated fat;

- Reduced cholesterol: has

One of the best tools to use at least 25 percent less cholesrated fat.

While decreasing fat intake, people with diabetes – and anyone else who wants to eat healthier – should increase fiber intake to help lower levels of glucose and fat in the blood. In a healthful meal plan, about 25 to 30 grams of fiber should be consumed each day.

A good source of fiber provides three to five grams - or 10 percent to 19 percent - of the daily value of fiber. High fiber sources provide five grams, or 20 percent or more. Whole-grain products are a good source of dietary fiber.

People with diabetes often need to watch their salt intake too, and label information can help there. When checking for salt content, watch for the words "salt," "sodium" or "soda."

Helpful definitions regarding sodium content of foods include

- Sodium-free: contains less than 5 milligrams of sodium;

- Very low sodium: contains - Low-fat: contains three 35 milligrams of sodium or less; - Low sodium: contains 140

milligrams or less; - Reduced sodium: contains 25 percent less sodium.

Calorie count is also an important aspect of label-reading.

Watch for these terms:

- Calorie-free: contains less than 5 calories per serving;

- Low-calorie: contains 40

calories or less per serving; Sugar-free: contains less than 1/2 gram of sugar per serving; - Reduced sugar: contains at least 25 percent less sugar;

- Artificially sweetened: contains artificial sweetener; - Juice-packed: packed in

natural fruit juice;

- Water-packed: packed in water.

If a label claims a food is "Lite" or "Light," use caution. No federal regulations define these terms so read the label carefully.

When it comes to reading labels, remember the first ingredient listed is the one the product contains the most of, by weight. Ingredients are listed in descending order by weight, greatest to least, on labels, so if sugar is listed at the top of the list, the food probably contains too much sugar.

Because more and more people - those with diabetes and many without - are interested in eating healthier, many food manufacturers are producing more and more healthful foods.

Knowing how to interpret food labels can help with meal planning - and food enjoyment.

Agriculture is the backbone of the Texas economy and a vital commodity in our national trade system. Texas is the second-largest agricultural state in the United States and we lead the nation in the value of farm real estate, as well as the number and acreage of farms and ranches.

Of those who work in Texas, one in seven is employed in the agriculture industry. The once pastoral farmlands in Texas are now a booming commercial enterprise making Texas one of the nation's major exporters of agricultural products.

Agriculture is so important to the people of Texas that there are several museums that educate families and friends about its rich history. I am proud to represent the Agricultural Heritage Center & Museum located in my district in the town of Boerne. Established in 1986, this wonderful site preserves numerous historic pieces relating to the Texas Hill Country's agricultural history. Families can explore the history of the Lone Star State and even watch blacksmith's forge red hot metal into useful tools.

Because of its critical role in our economy, it is logical that agriculture is also mainstay in other areas of our daily life in Texas. You may have heard of the Aggies cheering for Texas A&M in College Station.

As we well know, the A stands for agriculture. Texas A&M University's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences consistently maintains one of the largest enrollments and ranks as one of the top colleges of agriculture and life sciences in the nation.

And let's not forget the College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources at Texas Tech University where Red Raiders have been studying the modern agricultural and renewable natural resources industry since 1925.

This week I was the key- a large need for disaster assisnote speaker at the 2006 Texas Ag Forum hosted by the Agricultural and Food Policy Center and the Center for North American Studies, both at Texas A&M University. Founded over twenty years ago, the Texas Ag Forum provides an opportunity to educate the public on key issues affecting Texas agriculture and provide and opportunity for discussion between representatives from commodity and farm groups, as well as interested individuals. This year the leadership from every major agricultural organization in Texas was present at the forum. The topics of discussion most important to those attending the Texas Ag Forum included the U.S. Department of Agriculture National Animal Identification System (NAIS) and one of the most pressing concerns to Texas producers, relief from recent drought and wildfires that plagued the state.

In 2004, the USDA initiated the implementation of the National Animal Identification System, a voluntary State-Federal-industry partnership to safeguard the health of our nation's livestock. As Chairman of the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee, I have some serious concerns about the implementation of the NAIS in Texas.

The USDA has repeatedly stated this is a voluntary program with the goal of eventual 100% compliance. I am hopeful the state will not enforce mandatory compliance or set unrealistic deadlines which would leave little time for a transition from the current system. I am also hopeful the Texas Animal Health Commission will not impose the cost of any program on producers. The USDA has provided over \$2 million to the state for the implementation of this program.

tance, but few states have been hit as hard as Texas. Producers have suffered from the flooding and wind damage of hurricanes and the drought and wildfires which have spread across our great state. I will continue to work tirelessly to ensure that any disaster package Congress might consider include assistance to address the growing needs of producers in Texas.

I have represented the 23rd Congressional District of Texas since his first election in 1992. I was appointed chairman of the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee in January of 2001. The subcommittee oversees a wide range of agriculture issues including the nation's food supply and inspection, Food and Drug Administration oversight, emergency disaster relief, agriculture research, rural development, and farm and ranch programs. In addition to funding a wide range of important, traditional programs, the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee is also responsible for the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), nationwide nutrition programs, the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), the Animal Damage Control Program, the School Lunch Program and the Federal Food Stamp Program.

Our nation is facing many challenges and we have many new issues and concerns on the agenda. I look forward to a sixth successful year overseeing the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee.

Working together with the USDA, our nation's agriculture industry will continue to be strong and prosperous. Rest assured that I will continue my efforts in Congress to meet out commitments to those who work each day to provide the food on our family's dinner table. 

Supporters say HB 3 brings property tax relief, broadens the base of businesses that must pay it, and generally lowers the tax rate for all taxable entities.

Opponents say the tax is an income tax in disguise, and it will shock business owners by costing them more than the present taxing scheme.

Such a tax, they said, also would slow down commerce and cause businesses to close or leave Texas.

• HB 4, by David Swinford, R-Amarillo, is the so-called liar's affidavit bill that would force a buyer of a used car to pay sales tax on the book value of the car. Senate Finance passed this bill, and it is eligible for consideration by the full Senate.

• HB 5 by Peggy Hamric, R-Houston, increases the state sales tax on cigarettes by \$1. If passed, the tax on a pack of cigarettes will be \$1.41.

Background on special session

The main purpose of this [3rd] special session of the 79th Texas Legislature is to cure the stamp of "unconstitutional" placed on the state's method of school district property taxation by the Texas Supreme Court last fall.

The high court found that hundreds of the state's 1,049 school districts, left with no choice but to set the maximum allowable rate of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation, had lost "meaningful discretion" in setting rates.

The high court then ordered the governor and Legislature to fix the tax system by June 1.




