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



Anderson is the son of Diane and Tom Anderson. He plans on attending Texas A&M University and majoring in petroleum engineering.


During his high school career, Anderson participated in UIL Science, Current Events and Social Studies. He was a regionand Social Studies.

County Attorney withdraws resignation By MELISSA PERNER

County Attorney Bill Mason has withdrawn his resignation, due to a violation of the Texas Open Meetings Act.

In a letter filed May 10 to the County Judge, Mason states that when the commissioners approved his resignation during the May 8 meeting, the agenda posting this action was filed after the advance notice of 72 hours.

"Notice is further given that all actions taken during that meeting were and are of no force and effect," Mason's letter stated.

According the Texas Open Meeting Act, the notice of a meeting of a governmental body must be posted in a place readily accessible to the general public at all times for at least 72 hours before the scheduled time of the meeting. The commissioners' court meeting began at 9 a.m. on May 8.

On the original commissioners' court agenda, which was filed at 8:22 a.m. May 5 (within the 72-hour notice), the resignation of the county attorney and appointment of a new county attorney was listed as a discussion item. This means that the commissioners could not take action on this item.

A supplemental agenda was posted at 1:22 p.m. on May 5 that stated for the commissioners to take action on accepting

prices have risen tremendously, putting added pressure on family budgets across the United States. The escalating price of crude oil, which is traded in a world market, is one contributing factor. Decisions or events occurring in the farthest, most remote areas of the globe can have a huge affect on the price of crude for all nations. Over the past couple of years, many factors have contributed to this crisis. Predatory pricing by members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) drove many U.S. producers out of business. This gave the members of OPEC a greater majority of the international oil production and increased America's dependence on foreign sources of fuel. Additionally, OPEC has been slow to raise production quotas after having greatly reduced them in 2002. You may remember that an oil embargo instituted by OPEC 30 years ago rattled our economy and triggered mile-long lines at gas pumps. Shortages in supply have been furthered by large disruptions in the oil production of major oil exporters, such as Venezuela, Iraq and Nigeria. However, the largest contributing force driving the current oil shortage is an explosion in demand for fuel by China and India. Add all these factors together and you have the perfect recipe for an international fuel shortage.

What can we do to alleviate this problem? As a nation, we must decrease our dangerous dependence on unstable Middle East oil. Three decades ago, America was 30 percent dependent on foreign oil. Today, we are nearly two-thirds dependent. am committed to decreasing our nation's dependency on Middle Eastern oil. I support environmentally sound exploration in the Alaskan National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR), which is known to have the single largest deposit of oil in the entire United States with an estimate of more than 10 billion barrels of oil. That is more than double the proven reserves of the entire state of Texas and almost half of the total proven reserves in the U.S. Drilling in ANWR will also generate more than 735,000 new jobs and benefit the national economy.

Another contributing factor to the increase in the price of gasoline is the lack of necessary refineries to process crude oil into gasoline. American demand for gasoline has risen significantly as economic growth has increased. This mounting need for fuel must be met with

Since the spring of 2004, gas increased production. There are 148 operating refineries in the United States, down from 324 in 1981. Total capacity at operating refineries is roughly 17 million barrels per day, while total United States demand averages nearly 21 million barrels per day. This growing gap is met by an increasing amount of imports of refined products from foreign sources. Unfortunately, a new refinery has not been built in the U.S. in more than 30 years. This is in large part due to the complex system for obtaining a permit. Reforming this process and expanding refining capacity is an essential component to increasing domestic production and ending our reliance on foreign oil. Last year I voted for the Energy Policy Act of 2005, which helped to streamline the permit process for building and revitalizing refineries. Currently Congress is considering further legislation which will provide more regulatory certainty for companies as they make longterm decisions to expand refining capacity. Less regulation will allow for increased construction of American refineries and therefore reduce our dependence on foreign sources of gasoline. I will continue to support legislation which will increase refinery construction on U.S. soil.

My colleagues and I are committed to securing affordable energy for all Americans. We cannot simply moan about rising energy prices, we must take action. We must remain steadfast in this commitment to discover solutions to the United State's urgent energy challenges. On May 3, 2006, the House of Representatives passed H.R. 5253 the Federal Energy Price Protection Act. This bill will prohibit price gouging in the sale of gasoline, diesel fuel, crude oil, and home heating oil. I voted for this bill which passed by a vote of 389 to 34.

We must remember that these problems associated with high gasoline prices took decades to develop and will not be solved overnight. It is essential to our society and economy that we update our nations' outdated energy policies. We must remain committed to new ideas to promote conservation, reduces America's growing dependence on foreign oil, and create new jobs. Along with increasing domestic energy production, we must reduce our foreign oil needs and increase renewable and alternative energy usage. I will continue to support responsible legislation that will promote greater fuel efficiency, decreased foreign dependence and increased domestic production.

Pamela Maresch will present our plans for the triangle park "Butterfly Garden" to the upcoming Commissioners' Court


meeting for verification.



House infesting ants

home, such as the Pharaoh ant, can be controlled using a variety of different methods. One method is baiting, using a self-made bait with boric acid as the active ingredient.

Pharaoh ants are omnivorous, feeding on sweets (jelly, particularly mint-apple jelly, sugar, honey, etc.), cakes and breads, greasy or fatty foods (pies, butter, liver and bacon). Nests are rarely found outdoors and are found almost anywhere indoors, such as light sockets, potted plants, wall voids, attics, in any cracks and crevices, particularly close to sources of warmth and water. Nuisance ants are often found in window sills where they feed on dead in-

nuisance ant species is an important first step to controlling them effectively. If red imported fire ants are found indoors, consider treating colonies outside the structure as described in the Texas Cooperative Extension publication B-6043, "Man-aging Red Imported Fire Ants in Urban Areas", also found on the web site, http://fireant.tamu.edu. Also, try following ant trails to find where their nest is located or if they are coming indoors from outside nesting sites.

Boric acid is a slow-acting stomach poison. It is commonly formulated as a dust or liquid bait for indoor control of ants. Boric acid powder can be purchased at any pharmacy to be used in making a home-made boric acid bait. For indoor situation, mix 1 part

from page 1 the county attorney's resignation and appointing a new county attorney. This agenda was posted after the 72-hour requirement,

Mason stated in his letter. During the meeting, the commissioners approved Mason's resignation and approved a motion to appoint Steve Taliaferro as county attorney.

In a letter from County Judge Johnny Jones to the members of the Crockett County Commissioner's Court, and also to Taliaferro, it states: "Enclosed are the documents presented by County Attorney Bill Mason. Mr. Mason has informed me that he intends to remain as Crockett County Attorney and has withdrawn his letter of resignation. No action is required by the Crockett County Commissioners' Court on this matter."

In another letter by Mason, filed May 10, Mason states that he "intends to continue office until the end of the term for which I was elected." Mason's term ends at the end of 2008.

Nuisance ant species in the boric acid powder per 100 parts bait material, i.e., 1 teaspoon per 2 cups of food material, to make a 1 percent bait.

> For outdoor use, a boric acid solution can be made by mixing 1 teaspoon boric acid, 3 tablespoons sugar in 2 cups water, placing it in a container plugged with a cotton ball, and laying it on its side near an ant hill. However, organic gardeners feel that boric acid should not be used outdoors since it can be toxic to

Effective bait formulations contain slow-acting pesticides that are collected by foraging worker ants and brought back to the colony where the pesticide is fed to the other ants queen(s) and brood

Tips for success when using Proper identification of the baits to control house-infesting ants include: Do not make the bait concentration of boric acid too strong, as this reduces its acceptance. The one percent bait is better than higher concentrations since it is less repellent to the ants and kills ants as efficiently. Keeping the bait fresh and moist. Use enough stations or material to treat the infestation. Enhance bait effectiveness by removing or covering other food sources which compete with the attractiveness of the bait. Avoid the use of any surface applications of long-acting contact insecticides (often applied to control cockroaches or to ant trails) that would prevent foraging worker ants from being capable of reaching the bait station before and during baiting

Be patient for the baits to work. Three to four weeks or more may be required to eliminate some colonies.

Example for making a 1:100 Mint-Apple Jelly Bait Station:

- Step 1: assemble supplies: · Mint-apple jelly
- Boric acid powder
- · Foil • Soda Straws
- · Squeeze Bottle (marked "Poison")
 - · Scissors
 - · Spoon
- Measuring sup & spoon (1/4 tsp)

Step 2: Add 1/4 tsp boric acid powder to 1/4 cup mint-apple jelly or other attractive material. (Note: adding peanut butter may make the bait more attractive to soil and grease feeding ant species). Stir well. Wash or discard all utensils after use. Do not use them for any other pur-

Step 3: Squeeze mixture into soda straws cut into 2 inch lengths. Alternatively, cut foil into 2 inch squares on which to squeeze bait. Mark squeeze bottle "poison" with a description of contents. Do not use for nay other purpose and keep out of reach of children.

Step 4: lace soda straws containing any bait or foil squares in area where ant activity has been observed. The more stations the better. Do not place stations where they may be consumed by small children. Monitor stations and refill as needed. Be patient for ant activity to cease.

Note: This bait may not be attractive to all ant species.


Victoria plans on attending Tarleton State University this fall where she will major in computer science and compete on their rodeo team.



Package of tax reform bills pass, head to governor



Texas Legislature passed House Bill 1: property tax relief: bined school finance legislation.

Passage came on May 12, four days before the end of the 30-day special session, when the House on a vote of 136-8, approved Senate amendments to

Voting against the bill were Democrats Lon Burnam of Fort Worth; Garnet Coleman, Jessica Farrar and Rick Noriega, all of Houston; Rene Oliveira of Brownsville; Eddie Rodriguez of Austin; Marc Veasey of Fort Worth; and Mike Villarreal of San Antonio.

The bill pulls \$3.8 billion out of the state's \$8 billion budget surplus. Of the \$3.8 billion, \$2.4 billion will be used to reduce the maintenance and operations portion of school district property taxes and \$1.4 billion will be used for classroom education-related purposes.

Also, Texas schoolteachers will get a \$2,000 pay raise, plus another \$500 to replace a health care stipend that was taken away from them in an earlier legislative session. Plus, school districts will get an extra \$275 per pupil, based on average daily attendance, to help students pass exit exams. 500

A couple of complaints against the bill included loss of local control in how state money can be spent and in the capping of local enrichment.

Lawmakers agreed that the legislation, while not perfect, is good enough for now, and that it can be improved in the next regular legislative session, which begins in January.

The Texas Supreme Court ruled last year that lawmakers over the years have in effect created an unconstitutional statewide property tax, because many school districts are forced to set tax rates at the \$1.50 cap. Thus, those school districts have lost "meaningful discretion" in setting tax rates. So, the high court ordered the governor and the Legislature to give back meaningful discretion to local school districts.

HB 3, creating a businessactivity tax, passed the House and Senate, and sat on the governor's desk over the May 13-14 weekend. Three other bills, below, are now headed to the governor's desk.

HB 2 allocates revenue from franchise taxes, motor vehicle sales and use taxes, and taxes on cigarettes and other tobacco products to provide future property tax relief.

HB 4, the liar's affidavit bill, amends the tax code so that the used car sales tax will be based on the Blue Book value of the vehicle.

HB 5 increases the cigarette tax by \$1.

Independents submit petitions May 11 was the deadline for the independents to hand over their petitions to the state's chief elections officer, Secretary of State Roger Williams.

Independent gubernatorial candidates Carole Strayhorn and Kinky Friedman each delivered to Williams' office what seemed to be enough signatures to earn them places on the November ballot.

Rounded off, Strayhorn delivered 223,000 signatures, or about five times the required number of 45,540. Friedman turned in about 170,000.

How many of these signatures will stick is the question.

To verify signatures, which may take four to six weeks, the Secretary of State's elections division must follow Elections Code Chapter 277, which says for a petition to be valid, it must contain (in addition to the signature):

• the signer's printed name;

· the signer's date of birth and residence address or voter registration number; Furthermore, if the territory from which signatures must be obtained is situated in more than one county the petition must contain:

• the county of registration; and the signer's residence address; • the date of signing; and · comply with any other requirements prescribed by law. Governor expands session call

With the success of his tax reform plan largely realized, Gov. Perry added a few subjects the Legislature may consider in the remaining days of the special session.

Among those subjects are legislation related to FutureGen, a high-tech coal gasification plant; and revenue bonds for building projects at colleges and universities.


