# Laughlin, Stalcup out on bail Schoolboard meeting

Investigation could take up to two years to complete

A district judge lowered the bail for the two people charged with misapplying funds from Wool Growers Central Storage Co. during a crowded June 14 hearing in the commissioners' courtroom at the Crockett County Annex Building.

Donnie Laughlin, 59, had his bail reduced from \$500,000 to \$250,000, while Tonya Stalcup, 38, had her bail reduced from \$250,000 to \$75,000 by District Judge Royal Hart.

Stalcup and Laughlin both posted bond last week after the-

Neither Laughlin nor Stalcup have any prior criminal re-

Family members and friends of Laughlin and Stalcup filled the tight courtroom during the

Laughlin, the former manager of Wool Growers, and Stalcup, the former bookkeeper, have both been charged with misapplication of fiduciary property ary advances.

over \$200,000, which is a first degree felony that is punishable up to life in prison and a fine up to \$10,000.

During the hearing, Texas Ranger Brooks Long testified that Laughlin had allegedly sold wool and mohair without the producers' knowledge. Long said that he learned of this after meeting with members of the board of directors and the directors' lawyer Morris Reese during

Laughlin was terminated from his position on April 6. Stalcup was terminated in May.

The producers lost an estimate of several million dollars, Long said. In an affidavit filed in the Crockett County Justice of the Peace office by Long, around \$2 million was estimated to have been "knowingly and recklessly misapplied" in unauthorized wool and mohair proceeds.

Long said the records he had collected so far date back to Aug. 31, 2001 and run through March 30, 2006.

During this time period, Long said Laughlin and Stalcup received around \$600,000 in total salary and unauthorized sal-

Grass fires smoke interstate

Long said that out of the \$600,000, Laughlin made around \$200,000 in gross salary over the five-year period. Laughlin then illegally obtained around \$180,000 in salary advances,

Long also said that he is investigating into Laughlin's previous place of employment, which was the Ranchman's Wool & Mohair warehouse in Ingram.

In March 1992, the warehouse burned down with more than 1.5 million pounds of stored fiber, according to a 1992 article published in the Livestock

According to the article, company officials, including Laughlin who managed the warehouse, saved most of the warehouse records.

Long said his investigation has found more than \$380,000 in cash advances from the Ingram

Long said he is still waiting on subpoenas for more records and that his investigation could take from six months to two years to complete before it's even ready to be taken to the

# Despite rain shower, dry weather conditions still exist

Ozona Volunteer Firefighters have spent the past week answering multiple calls.

As of press time Tuesday, the fire department responded to around 30 calls since June 14. The majority of these calls have involved grass fires.

Monday night's grass fires involved several blazes along Interstate-10 near Pandale Road.

The smoke was so thick that the Texas Department of Transportation and other local law enforcement were called out to direct traffic.

The fire was caused by some rubber from a blown tire off of a truck, said Fire Chief

Another grass fire was also reported on the Fred Chandler Ranch off of County Road 109 Monday night.

This fire was caused by some down power lines, Falkner said.

What the whole state needs is slow, steady rainfall spread over many hours so most of the rain will soak into the ground and not run off, said Tom Spencer, wildfire risk assessment coordinator with Texas Forest Service.

Crockett County received up to 1.5 inches of rain late Friday night and early Saturday

lot of debris throughout town. Despite the rain, dry weather conditions are still prime for grass fires.

Ozona firefighters responded to multiple grass fires Friday night and Saturday. The fires were located north of Barnhart on the Rocker B Ranch, off of County Road 412 and out on the Clayton Ranch off of Interstate-10 west.

An extended weather pattern of hot days relieved by only isolated showers has left grasses and other vegetation much drier than normal, according to a press release from the Texas Forest

The result: without significant widespread, long-duration rains, Texas firefighters foresee a growing threat of wildfires, the release stated.

Conditions now are similar to those that occurred in summer 1998, during which Texas experienced one of the worst years on record for wildfires, Spencer said.

"The similarities between weather and vegetation conditions in 1998 and now are very alarming, from a wildfire standpoint," said Spencer. "Texans could be facing a bad summer fire siege if increased winds should accompany hot, dry weather. Strong, gusty winds contributed greatly to the major wildfires experienced earlier this year."

Area fire departments are the worst winter fire season in Texas history, said Ron Perry, fire prevention specialist with the Texas Forest Service.

Everyone needs to exercise EXTREME caution when using any type of heat, flame, or spark producing product or equipment, Perry said.

During their June 12 meeting, the Crockett County Commissioners passed a county-wide resolution banning all private and individual use and sale of fireworks.

Public displays of fireworks, such as the one to be held on the Fourth of July by the Knights of Columbus, are allowed.

The commissioners also passed a burn ban prohibiting outdoor burning.

Violation of the fireworks and burn ban is a Class C misdemeanor punishable up to a \$500

"Irresponsible fireworks use through the Fourth of July holiday period could spark additional fires, if dry conditions prevail and vegetative fuels, particularly grasses, continue to dry out," said Bill Rose, Texas Forest Service chief regional forester for resource protection in East Texas. "We don't want to put a damper on holiday celebrations, but we do urge folks to use common sense and celebrate safely during the upcoming holiday period.'

This country was built by people who got dirty... but in a clean way. Dirty old men with callused hands and dingy overalls and women with food stains and baby spit-up on them were responsible for this nation's "Golden Age", not some starchcollared, manicured commodities trader who sits at a computer all day and trades beans, cattle, gold, oil, timber and other things he'd have no idea how to produce.

I realize that grimy oilfield roustabouts or drilling rig roughnecks wouldn't be welcome in the mansions of OPEC billionaires, or Enron-like conference rooms, but at least when they finally get a chance to clean up

in this world: there is clean dirt drain. The collective conscience of the sheiks, monopoly CEO's and incarcerated energy traders wouldn't come clean with a box of Brillo pads and a high pressure hose.





She was born July 5, 1922 in Stanton, Texas to Fredricka Anna Piwonka and John Jacob Peters, both descendents of early settlers. Encouraged by a local physician in her hometown, she entered nursing school and was a member of the 1944 graduating class of Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital School of Nursing. She went on to serve in the Women's Auxiliary Corps during World War II and had a 30 year nursing career. She was uncommonly empathetic with the suffering and the poor. As a registered nurse and supervisor at Shannon Hospital until 1987, she specialized in acute emergency care. on gold lo

She was an active clubwoman, serving as President of the Heart of Texas District of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs from 1964 - 1966, covering 21 counties and 68 clubs. She also held offices in the Victory Study Club in San Angelo. A lifetime member of the Shannon Alumni Association, she strove to advance public health as a board member of the Tom Green County Tuberculosis Association and as a record-breaking chair of the annual tuberculosis fund drive for two terms. Her club activities resulted in many improvements in highway safety, community chest drives and historic preservation. She testified in a local civil rights case that was partly responsible for higher minimum education standards for local law enforcement officers.

A life-long registered Democrat, Mrs. McKinney worked with the Kennedy Adminis-

tration's Alliance for Progress initiative to improve literacy in Latin America, particularly Peru. Her club members established 16 public libraries in poor areas of Peru; one in Lima was named after her. Working with the Texas Fine Arts Commission, she made an inventory of the arts and cultural resources of Central West Texas for Governor John Connelly. This work later

She served as President of the Parent Teachers Association of the Sacred Heart School during the most active building campaign in the 1960's.

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was used to promote funding for

the arts in the region.

Married to Sutton County rancher, James Owen Mills, she raised three daughters after his untimely death in 1973. She later married R. Kay McKinney, a publisher, in 1990.

She is survived by her daughters, Mary Jane Mills of Jersey City, New Jersey, Martha Mills of Sacramento, California, Margaret Pollard of Springfield, Missouri and a grandson, Donald William Brown, Jr. of San Angelo; a brother, George Peters of Odessa, sisters Beatrice "Bobbie" Simmons of Sunrise Beach, Texas and Clara Holliman of San Angelo; great-grandchildren Austin Brown, Allysia Brown, Leticia Brown, and Zachery Brown, numerous nieces, nephews and cousins.





sion. Today, the challenge is finding innovative ways to place families in the housing they need with payments they can afford. We're doing it creatively, with a program that "guarantees" loans made by financial institutions and with programs requiring no down payments, subsidized mortgage interest rates of as little as 1 percent depending on income levels.

And since 1961, we're doing it with popular programs like "Self Help Housing" where groups of 10 to 12 families, under the direction of non-profit organizations that receive funding through Rural Development, have been working together to build their own homes. It usually takes a family at least a year from the start of the process, because they have to do at least 65 percent of the work themselves and no participating family can move into a home until all of the homes are finished. When they're done, their labor becomes their "sweat equity". This year, the program passed an important milestone: The total number of loans made through the Self Help program topped 40,000, and the total dollar amount of mortgages made under the program topped \$2 billion. Over the 45 years the program has been rural communities. in existence, the equivalent of a medium-sized rural community has been constructed by families working together to build their

own homes.

We're also proud to be of assistance to the victims of the hurricanes that devastated the gulf coast in 2005. # WOOL: Company has yet to be audited

During Stalcup's hearing, Long testified that she received McGuire, testified that the items up to \$225,021.28 in her regular salary and in illegal salary ad-

Long also said that Stalcup received a monthly check for around \$450 from the Sanderson Wool Commission, also owned by Wool Growers, as salary for keeping their books. This payment was an agreement between Stalcup and Laughlin and the board of directors was not aware of it, Long said.

In his investigation, Long said it was his understanding that Wool Growers was not audited and that it would be up to the board of directors to determine an audit.

"There was a lot of co-mingling of the accounts," Long said.

Around \$50,000 in checks various saddle and tack companies, Long said. The items from these companies were found in Stalcup's storage shed after Long executed a search warrant.

The items were ordered through Wool Growers but there was no payment from Stalcup to Wool Growers for the items.

Stalcup's mother, Beverly were prizes for the annual Barnhart 8 and under Play day that Stalcup and McGuire coordinate

"It's a great, Christian outreach," McGuire said.

McGuire said that Stalcup, who grew up in Barnhart and still lives there with her family, is heavily involved in the community and the Cowboy Methodist Church. McGuire said that Stalcup is currently working for her father, Alan, who owns a backhoe business.

McGuire also said that she was concerned for her daughter's health while she is in jail due her recent gastric bypass surgery. Stalcup has to be on a no sugar diet and must drink 64 ounces of water a day, McGuire said.

"She isn't going to stay signed by Stalcup were made to healthy in jail," McGuire said. "When she makes bond she'll live in Barnhart. She'll make every court date."

The money for the \$40,000 surgery was allegedly obtained in advances in a "loan" approved by Laughlin, according to the affidavit filed in the justice of the peace office.

Long also testified that new evidence has been obtained that Stalcup may have had Lasik eye surgery and a breast augmenta-

"There were a lot of loans and advances between two people," Long said. "There were lots of salary advances and cash withdrawals."

During her testimony, Laughlin's daughter Amy Carranza, 27, said that her father told her he fully intended to cooperate with local law enforcement.

Carranza also said that her parents' Ozona home is currently under contract for sale and that her parents are moving to Lubbock to help take care of their grandchildren.

Assistant District Attorney Stephen Smith said that the state and the victims need to see assurance that Laughlin will show up for his court proceeds:

Richard F. Gutierrez, Laughlin's attorney from Del Rio, said the \$500,000 bail that was set when Laughlin was arrested was not to be a "reason to punish him."

Gutierrez said that family would be able to post \$20,000 to \$25,000 in a cash bond.

Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn, who is running as an independent against Republican incumbent Gov. Rick Perry, said, "More than 200,000 Texas businesses that currently do not pay taxes will have to pay or file taxes under the new law. Texans need to know how much they will be paying and begin preparing today by setting aside dollars for the new tax."

But the governor's office said the comptroller's tax calculator doesn't take into account the lower property tax bill businesses will be paying and other

State Sen. Tommy Williams, R-The Woodlands, also criticized the comptroller's take on the new tax law, saying, "As a member of the Senate Finance and Education committees, I have learned not to trust information that comes out of this politically driven comptroller's office. I would urge the Texas business community to do the same."

Despite Strayhorn's assertion that more businesses will be taxed - and pay much more in taxes than under the former franchise tax - Bill Hammond, executive director of the Texas Association of Business, has spoken out in favor of the Perry

Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs, a Republican who is running to succeed Strayhorn as the state's chief financial officer, said that if elected, she will review and rewrite the new tax law. She said there is "growing sentiment among legislators" that the tax law will need to be "tweaked" during the regular legislative session, which convenes in January.

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
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
