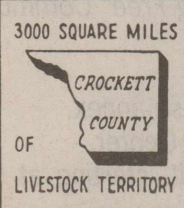


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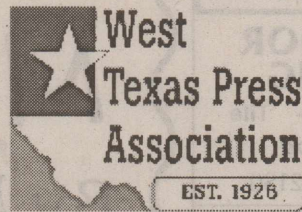

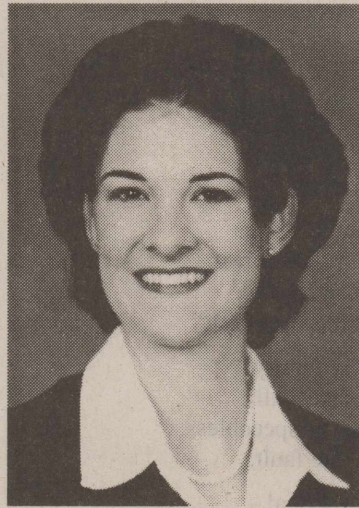

Upham wins county attorney seat

Perry, Uresti, Hilderbran win races, Bonilla ahead but runoff possible

Jody Upham became Crockett County's new attorney in one of the largest local victories for a write-in candidate Tuesday night.

Upham won with 619 votes against the Democratic candidate, and current county attorney, Steve Taliaferro, who had 436 votes.

"I just want to thank everyone for coming out to vote. I also want to thank all of my supporters and everyone who volunteered throughout my campaign. I look forward to serving Ozona and Crockett County," Upham said.

Upham won the early voting and three precincts in the race.

Results by precincts are:
 Early voting - Upham 319;
 Taliaferro 239.

Precinct 1 - Upham 50;
 Taliaferro 41.

Precinct 2 - Upham 83;
 Taliaferro 57.

Precinct 3 - Upham 120;

seven opponents but needed at least 50 percent of the vote to avoid a runoff.

In Crockett County, Bonilla won the race with 713 votes.

Albert Uresti had 115, August "Augie" Beltran had 12; Rick Bolanos had 10; Adrian DeLeon had 7; Lukin Gilliland had 34; Ciro Rodriguez had 103 and Craig T. Stephens had 23 in Crockett County.

Val Verde, Medina and northern San Antonio precincts were the remaining votes to be counted at press time.

"It's going to go right down to the wire, but fortunately the rest have to be counted are good counties for us," said Phil Ricks, director of communications for Bonilla's campaign.

In the governor's race, Republican Rick Perry was re-elected to another four-year term, earning him the chance to become the longest-serving governor in Texas history.

Though state results were not final as of press time, many media outlets were declaring

Perry the winner with 39 percent of the vote over Democrat Chris Bell who had 30 percent.

Carole Keeton Strayhorn had 18 percent, Kinky Friedman had 12 percent and Libertarian James Werner had 1 percent.

In Crockett County, Perry won with 502 votes. Bell had 220, Strayhorn 143, Friedman 173 and Werner 7.

In the State Senator race for District 19, Carlos Uresti was declared the winner by a landslide in both the special and general election.

Uresti had 45,562 votes in the special election, compared to opponent Dick Bowen's 20,401, as of press time.

In the general election, Uresti had 44,037 votes and Bowen had 26,313, as of press time.

In Crockett County, Bowen won both the special and general election.

Bowen had 534 votes to Uresti's 374 in the special election.

In the general race, Bowen had 526 to Uresti's 376.

The special election was held for the winner to fill the unexpired term left by Frank Madala who resigned in May after losing the Democratic primary in March to Uresti.

The general election was to elect a state senator to take over a new term in January.

In the State Representative race for District 53, Republican incumbent Harvey Hilderbran won big over Libertarian opponent B.W. Holk.

As of press time, Hilderbran had 27,556 votes to Holk's 4,687.

In Crockett County, Hilderbran won with 677 votes to Holk's 133.

In the U.S. Senate race, Republican incumbent Kay Bailey Hutchinson won with 62 percent of the vote over Democratic challenger Barbara Ann Radnofsky who had 36 percent and Libertarian Scott Lanier Jameson who had 1 percent.

In Crockett County, Hutchinson had 694 votes, Radnofsky 276 and Jameson 21.

LIONS SHUTOUT EAGLES

Ozona looks to maintain a perfect district record this week against Kermit

VAN HORN - The Ozona Lions shutout the Van Horn Eagles 44-0 to maintain their top spot in District 7-AA Friday night.

"I was glad to get out of Van Horn with a win and get back home. That is a long trip. The kids did a great job of taking care of business," said Coach Benny Granger. "It was also nice to see that we had more fans than they did and our people had to travel for 3 1/2 hours to see the game. Our fans are awesome."

The Lions would capitalize earlier on a Van Horn fumble to set up the first scoring drive of the game.

Quarterback Jordan Long would find Matt Turland for a 26-yard pass to put Ozona at the 1-yard line. Ely Silva would run it in for the touchdown. Mark Tambunga's extra-point kick was good to give Ozona the 7-0 lead.

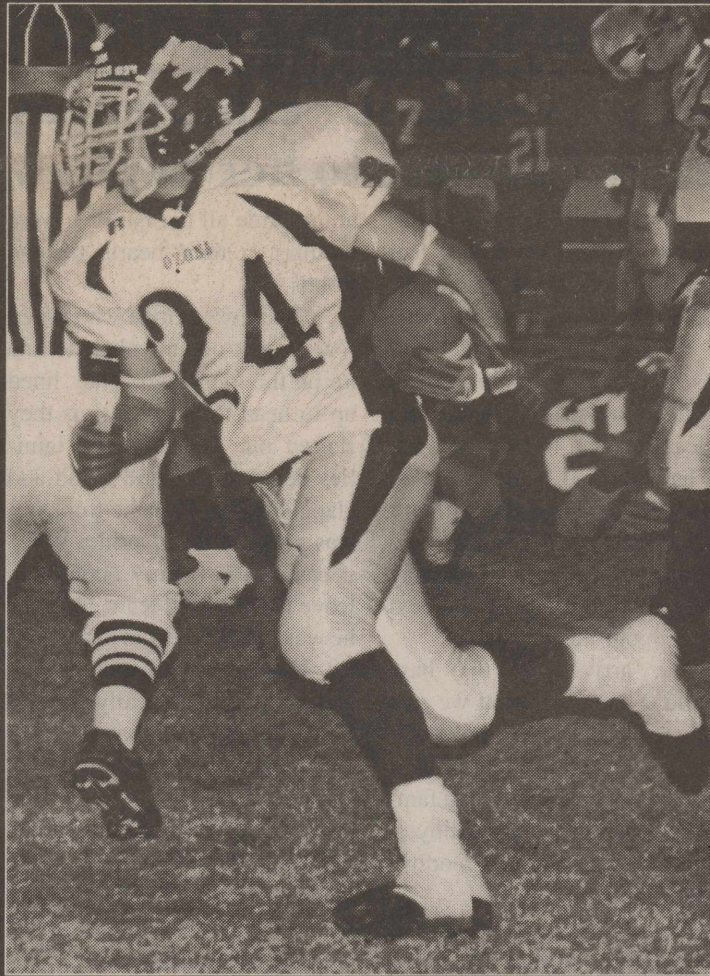

Three-vehicle collision results in seven injured

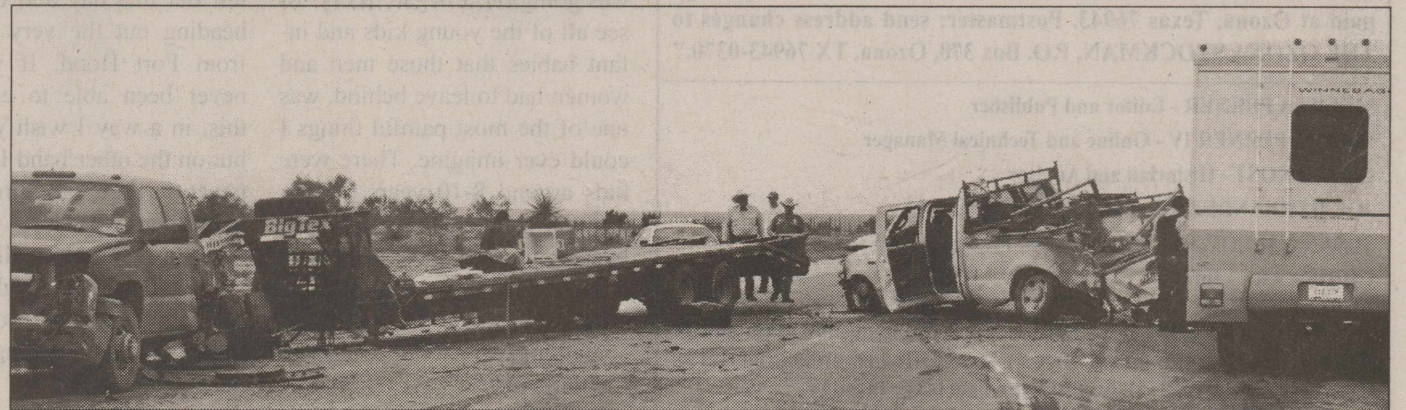
A three-vehicle accident resulted in seven people injured on Nov. 1 at the 15-mile intersection of State Highway 163 north and U.S. Highway 190.

Three of the seven injured were airlifted to San Angelo, but as of Tuesday all have been released from medical care, according to officials at the Texas Department of Public Safety.

None of the injuries were life-threatening at the time of the accident, DPS Officials said.

Ruby Jean Wood, of Arizona, was driving a 2003 Winnebago RV, heading west on U.S. 190 when she passed the stop sign and struck the right back quarter panel of a 2005 Ford F350 pickup traveling north on 163, according to a DPS report.

Roman Tambunga's fourth place finish this past weekend, at the Region 1 Cross Country meet in Lubbock, earned the Ozona High School Senior a ticket to the State Meet Saturday in Round Rock.

Tambunga finished with a time of 17 minutes, 19.46 seconds.

The Ozona Lions team placed fourth behind Wall, Panhandle and Comfort.

Finishing for the Lions were: 17. Ethan English, 18:02.29; 31. Levi English, 18:20.02; 52. Tate Collis, 19:03.01; 55. Jesse Badillo, 19:06.19; 56. Fabian Onate, 19:08.19 and 67. Lalo Longoria, 19:38.07.

"Our kids competed really well. Most of them had their personal best times of the year," said Coach Justin Holloway. "My seniors (Levi, Tate and Roman) did really well. Tate came threw the best he knew how, and Levi ran well on a banged up ankle. Roman ran tremendously well. He has big goals for himself to finish at state."

Tambunga will run at 12:50 p.m. Saturday in Round Rock.

The Lady Lions also competed at Lubbock.

Local resident experiences tearful goodbye to her nephew

In lieu of honoring our military on Veterans Day, I feel I need to write about an experience my family just went thru.

On Oct. 27, my older sister's son (who is in the army) was deployed from Fort Hood in Killeen, headed to Iraq. My sister, her husband, their daughter, their granddaughter (the military son's daughter), my mother and I joined up at the hotel the day before so we can spend the next day with our hero.

We arrived at the base around 9 a.m. and what we saw was so heart breaking. There were men and women in uniform everywhere. Most had family there to say their goodbyes, some didn't get to say goodbye to their families.

Being outside and seeing all those uniformed personnel getting ready for the next year of their lives, was almost more than I could take. But when they moved us into the base gym, and I was able to see more of what was going on, I began to cry. To see all of the young kids and infant babies that those men and women had to leave behind, was one of the most painful things I could ever imagine. There were kids around 8-10 years of age, just crying so hard, they were hysterical. And then the infant babies who really didn't know what was going on, but knew something was about to change in their lives.

The base Chaplin asked us all to pray for our troops before they would leave. I was amazed

at the pride all the families were holding in their hearts for the troops.

There was a man who asked for certain troop members to line up on the gym floor. They lined up to head to the buses, as they started out the door, the families being left behind stood and clapped so hard for the troops. It was pride, a lot of pride. When it came time for my nephew to leave I was in full tears, to know he was leaving behind his daughter who is only 14 months old, and to know she really doesn't know her dad all that well. To know that this just could be the last time she may get to see him alive (I pray he will come home safe and alive). It was just more than I could take. Tears were flowing so hard and fast I just could not control them.

After the troops loaded the buses, we all stood outside to say our final goodbye. We are so proud of our nephew and all the men and women who left out that day and the troops heading out the very next day from Fort Hood. If you have never been able to experience this, in a way I wish you could but on the other hand I pray you never have to go through this painful ordeal.

May God bless all our men and women who fought for the freedom we have today and those who are fighting to keep our freedom today.

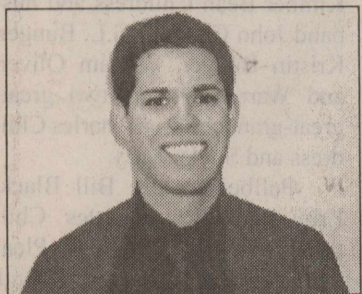
the designation of AP Scholar by the College Board in recognition of his exceptional achievement on the college-level Advanced Placement Program Exams.

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State investment in nursing home care generates over \$3.5 million for Ozona

Texas nursing facilities caring for seniors will generate approximately \$10.5 billion in overall economic activity during 2007, according to data from two Texas agencies.

"2007 projections indicate a strong labor market in the nursing home sector of the economy," said George Linal, President of the Texas Association of Homes and Services for the Aging, a long term care trade association.

TAHSA represents more than 100 faith-based organizations across Texas.

"This translates to wages and salaries going directly into the economic engine of the

state," Linal said.

According to the data, nursing homes will pay an estimated \$2.7 billion in gross wages and salaries to nursing, home staff across the state. Spending on services to senior residents will account for over

\$1.6 billion of this statewide total, making nursing home care a major source of employment and income for many workers and their families, in communities across the state.

In Ozona the nursing home impact on the local economy is dramatic. Around \$3,507,141 in nursing home spending will go towards the local economy. Crockett County Care Center, a senior care organization in Ozona provides care to 50-58 seniors.

"The state legislature should be proud of the investment they have made in caring for our se-

niors. Not only does it provide a return on quality of life for our aging population, but it also provides a solid return on investment for economic development in our community," said Administrator Benny Gibbs. "I think this provides the evidence we have always known here in Ozona. When you invest state funds in our local market, you see businesses and individuals managing and distributing that investment throughout the community."

Crockett County Care Center and TAHSA, are calling on legislators to increase their investment in long term care.

"It makes good sense to invest state resources in areas where we will see a positive impact on local economies," Linal said.

Virtually all counties in Texas have a nursing home caring for seniors. When the legislature invests in nursing homes,

it is distributing that investment across Texas.

"Rural communities, along with our urban core, will see a significant boost in their local economic growth, when the legislature wisely invests funds in organizations that care for our seniors," Linal said. "Faith-based organizations staff at high levels, and this just shows that a mission of caring for our elderly also reaps financial incentives for communities."

Crockett County Care Center sees the investment in terms of helping seniors.

"Economic growth is important, but investing funds in our local nursing home will really boost the quality of life for our seniors. While our local economy benefits, it is the quality of life of our local seniors that I ultimately the true beneficiary," Gibbs said.



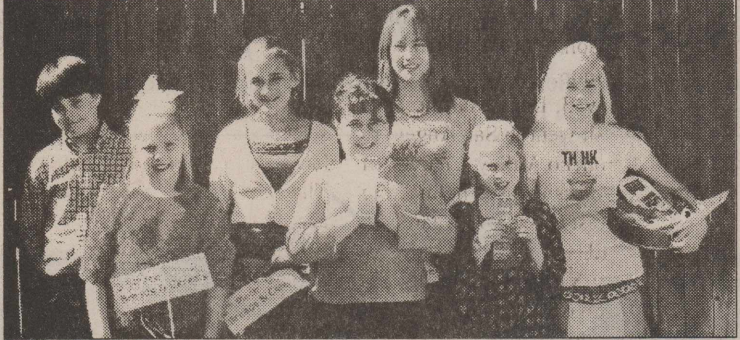

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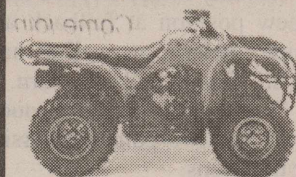

The Lions are 4-0 in district play.

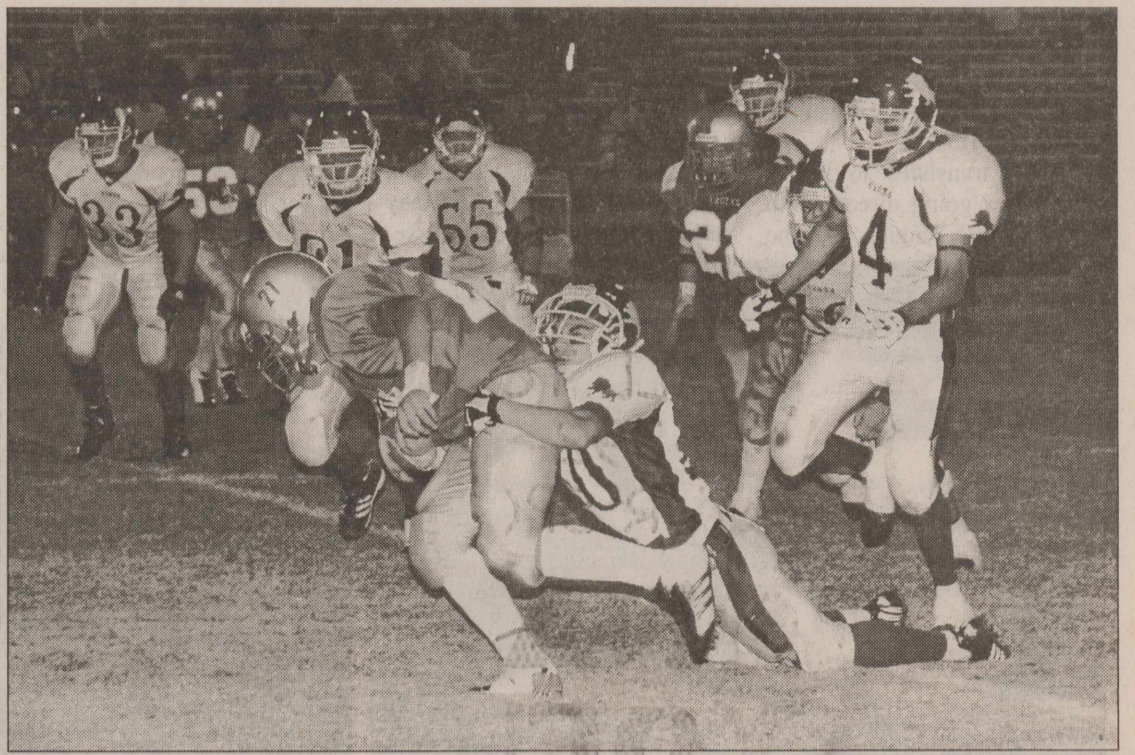
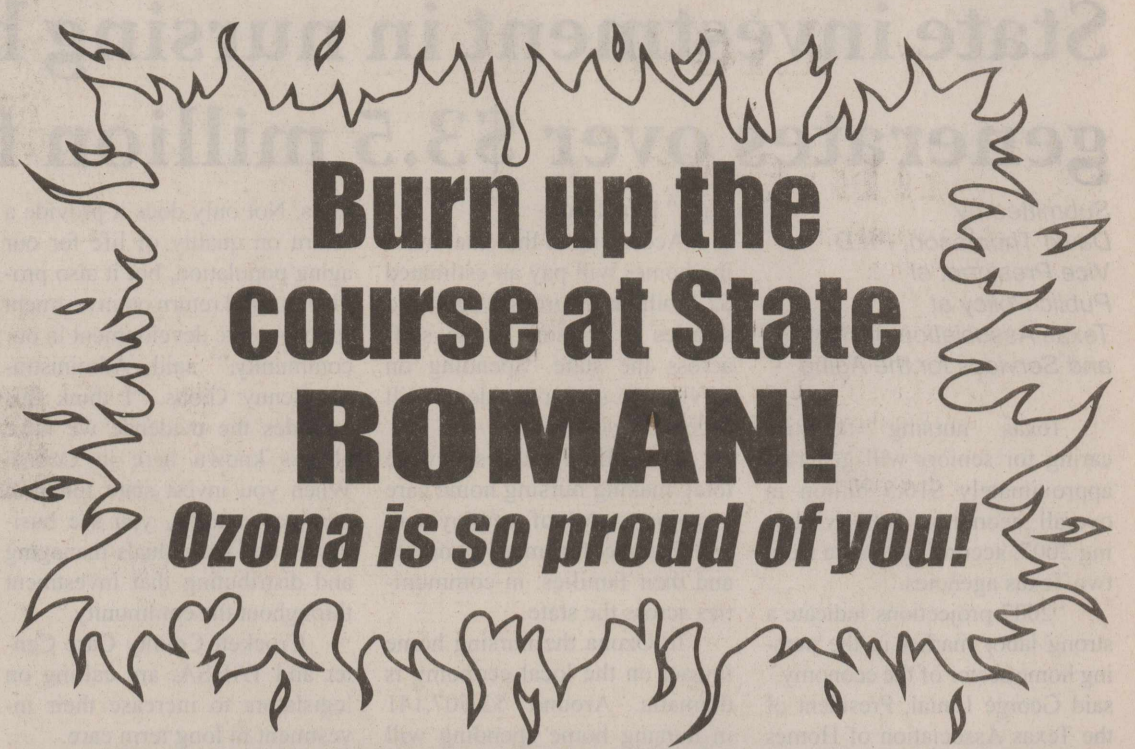

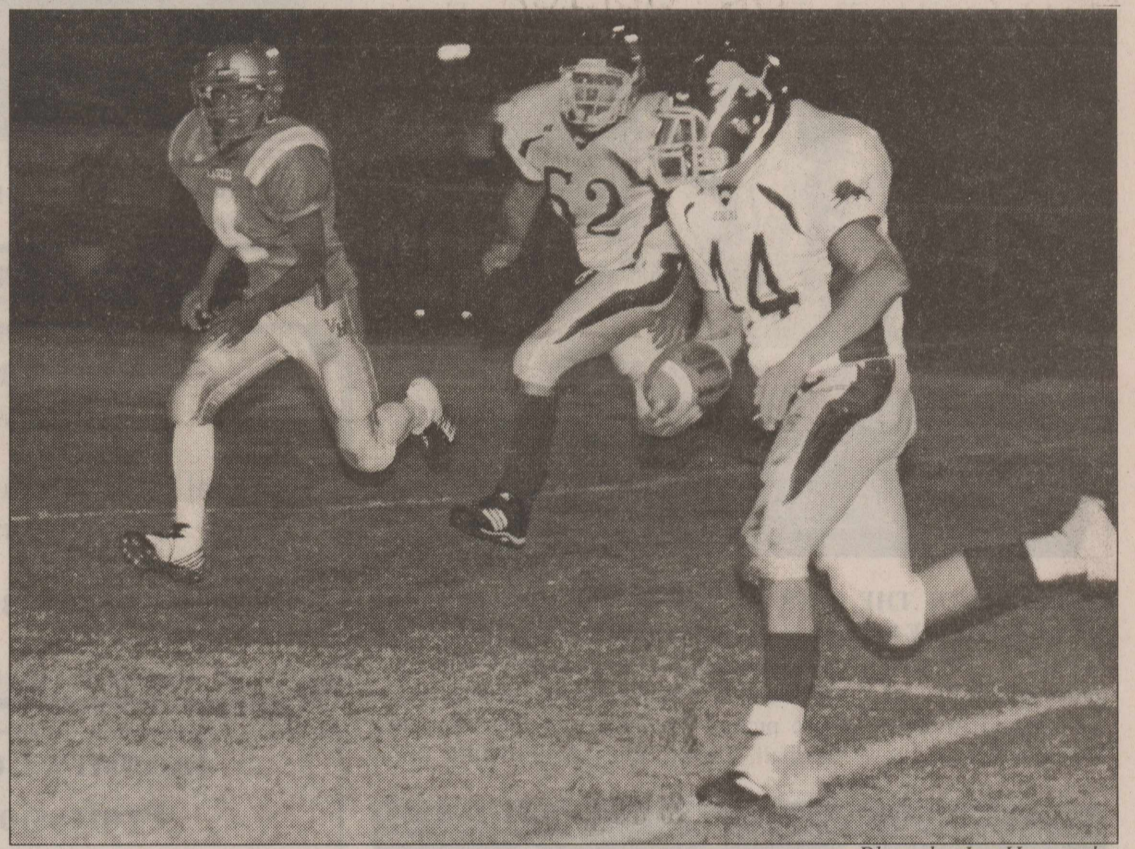

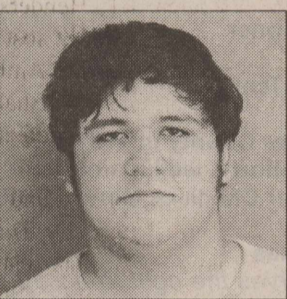

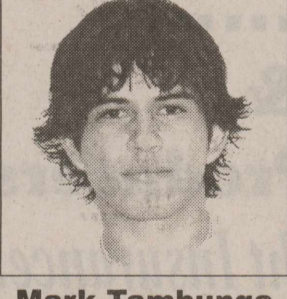

As far as the outlook for the district, Jackson said he was told District 7-AA would be easier but four teams, Crane, Reagan County, Alpine and Kermit, all

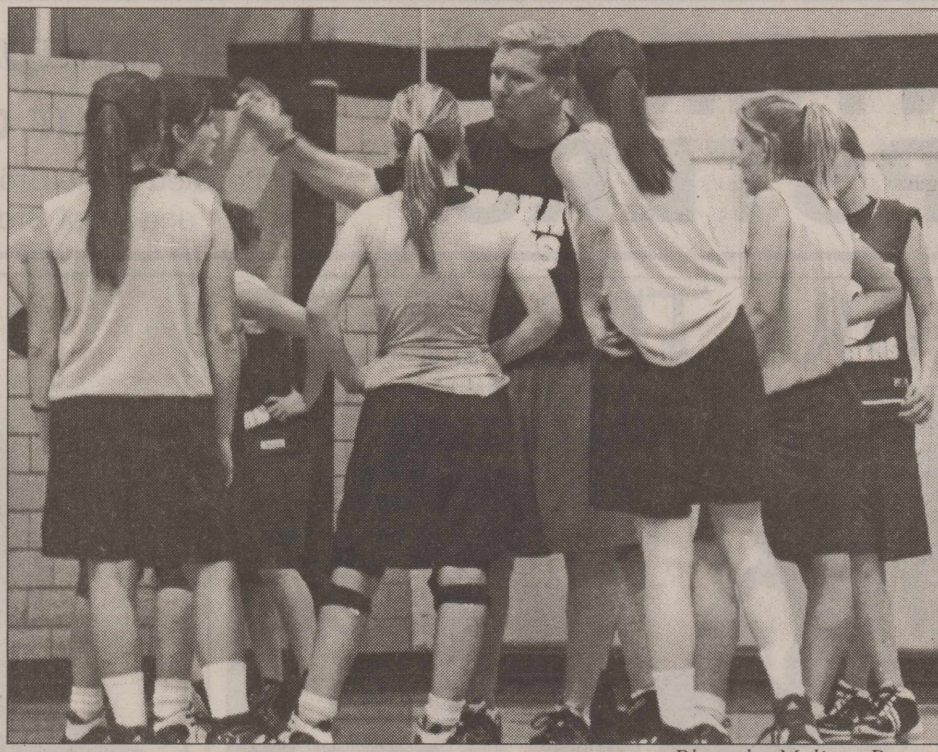

Pecos County Jury sentences man in Domestic Violence case

On Oct. 31, after about eight hours of testimony, a Pecos County Jury of 10 men and two women assessed a 10-year sentence against Michael Hector Martinez for one count of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and recommended suspension (probation) of a 10-year sentence for a second count of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

No fine was assessed for either count.

With no plea agreement, Martinez pleaded guilty to both counts.

The case stemmed from violent behavior by Martinez

against his estranged wife. Aggravated assault with a deadly weapon is a second-degree felony with a punishment range of 2-20 years and a potential fine not to exceed \$10,000.

The case was prosecuted by 112th District Attorney Laurie English and Assistant District Attorney, Steve Smith.

Martinez was represented by Alfredo Soza. Judge Royal Hart presided.

"The victims are very fortunate that the injuries inflicted by Martinez were not more severe. The jury's verdict was just and right under the circumstances and sends a message that domestic violence will not be tolerated in Pecos County, Texas," English said.

AUSTIN - Candidates fired final salvos of commercials and weaved through the state to get in last-minute words with voters the week before election day, Nov. 7.

up and running in February. After the test period, the city will position cameras at more than a dozen intersections around town. Tickets will be sent to the permanent addresses recorded from the plates.

The American Civil Liberties Union has lodged a protest, arguing that such a surveillance system would constitute an invasion of drivers' privacy and a warrantless search.

It also might be a due-process issue if a person ticketed for running a red light could not face a flesh-and-blood accuser in a court of law.

Timing spoils this week's State Capital Highlights because it is mailed the day before election day. Next week's column will include election results.

AUSTIN RANKED 5TH SAFEST CITY
In an annual ranking of the 25 safest cities in America, Austin placed fifth among cities with a population of more than 500,000.

The ranking, compiled by Morgan Quitno, is based on FBI crime statistics.

Other high-ranked big cities in Texas include El Paso, third; San Antonio, seventh; and Fort Worth, ninth.

Two cities made the "most dangerous" list: Dallas placed sixth, and Houston, 10th.

TOLL ROADS OPEN IN CAPITAL AREA
A certain kind of Texan never wants to come to Austin.

Another kind loves the capital city and seizes any opportunity to come. And yet another kind will come here but only if absolutely necessary. The last two kinds will soon note changes if they ride here on two or more wheels.

New toll roads, started in 2002 as the Central Texas Turnpike Project, have opened to the north and east of the city. These toll roads, State Highways 45 and 130, and a section of Loop 1 (MoPac), are meant to relieve traffic on Interstate Highway 35. The part of IH-35 that goes through Austin is one of the busiest and most dangerous stretches of highway in America.

Until Dec. 31, to encourage use of the system, tolls will not be collected. On Jan. 1, tolls will be collected for drivers paying cash at toll booths. TxTAG users will begin paying half the posted tolls in February. In March they will pay the regular toll of 10 percent less than the cash rate.

RED LIGHT CAMERAS TO BE TESTED
Another thing visitors might not notice but should know about is that the Austin City Council on Nov. 2 approved a two-month pilot program to test red-light cameras at intersections around the city.

The goal is to have cameras

TEACHERS TO RECEIVE INCENTIVE PAY

More than 1,100 Texas schools will share \$95.5 million in Texas Educator Excellence Grants under a program created by the Texas Legislature last spring to give incentive pay to teachers.

Each of the state's 1,119 qualified schools will receive \$40,000 to \$300,000 depending on the size of their student population on their campus.

To qualify, schools must have ranked in the top half of the state in the percentage of educationally disadvantaged students for their school type and have been rated exemplary or recognized or ranked in the top quartile performance level for improvement in math and reading.

COURT LIFTS INJUNCTION AGAINST AG

On Nov. 3, the last day of early voting, the Fifth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans lifted a lower court injunction that ordered Attorney General Greg Abbott to stop prosecuting people who help elderly and disabled voters cast mail-in ballots.

MCKINNEY NAMED A&M FINALIST

Mike McKinney, a top executive at the University of Texas at Health Science Center, has been named sole finalist for the position of Texas A&M System chancellor by the Texas A&M Board of Regents.

McKinney is a former state representative and former chief of staff to Gov. Rick Perry. Robert McTeer announced his retirement as chancellor in August.

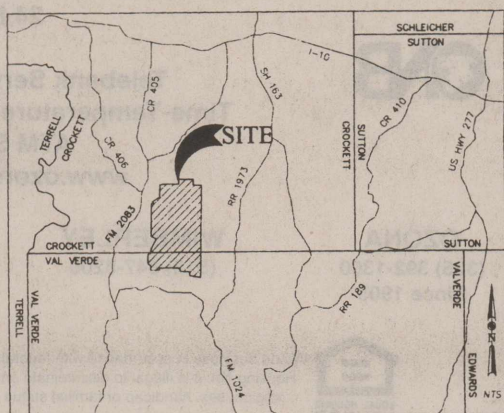

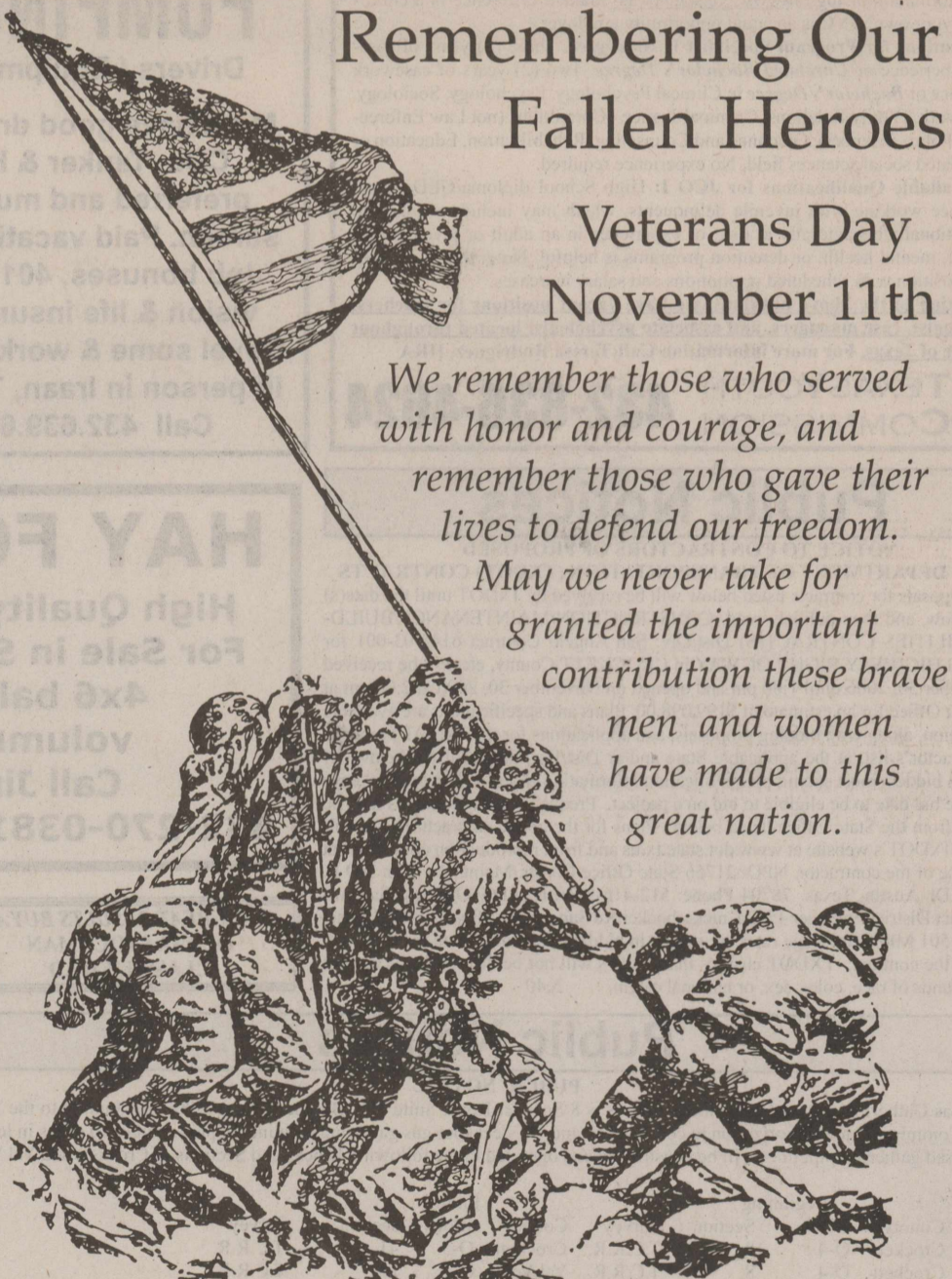
