## Injuries Sustained In Fall, Fatal To Mrs. M. C. Berry

Mrs. Mary Catherine Berry 89, died at the Callahan County hospital at 11:45 a. m. Wednesday, death resulting from a broken hip sustained in a fall at her home south of Baird Monday of last week.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church yesterday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, the services being conducted by Rev. Joe R. Mayes, of Abilene, former pastor of the Baptist Church here and Rev. A. A. Davis, pastor.

Pall bearers were, Fred Cutbirth, Bob Norrell, Jack Gilliland, Haynie Gilliland, Robert Estes and Glenn Boyd. Burial was made in the family plot in Ross cemetery under the direction of Wylie funeral home.

Mrs. Berry, whose maiden name was Mary Catherine Sloan, was born in Nashville, Hempstead county, Ark. August 29, 1853. She came to Texas when a young girl and was married to A. J. Berry in Georgetown, Sept. 23, 1871 at 19 years of age. The Berry family came to Callahan county November 25, 1881, locating on the farm on which Mrs. Berry has lived continuously since.

Mrs. Berry was the widow of Capt. Jack Berry, one of the heroes of the battle of San Jacinto, who was present when Gen. Santa Anna surrendered to Gen. Sam Houston, being a boy of 16 years old at that time. Mrs. Berry is one of the few, it is not the only widow of the heroes of the battle of San Jacinto.

Capt. Berry died in Baird July 31, 1899 from injuries received when thrown from a wagon loaded with lumber which he was hauling to his farm. His two younger sons, Grover and Ode, then small boys, were on the wagon with their father when the accident occurred.

Mrs. Berry was honored on her 82nd birthday, Aug. 29, 1935 with a public reception held on the court house lawn. Judge B. L. Nussell was Master of ceremonies and S. E. Settle, deceased, was speaker of the evening, paying a beautiful tribute to Mrs. Berry as a pioneer of Texas naming her "The First Lady of Texas" and on Nov. 14, 1936, she was the guest of the Texas Centennial Exposition at Dallas, where as an honored guest she was shown many courtesies. Mrs. Berry was accompanied by her daughter, Mrs. Wylie Gaines of Abilene, and son, Harry Berry and wife of Clyde.

Mrs. Berry is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Fannie Murphy of Baird, Mrs. Wylie Gaines of Abilene five sons, George, Bob, Ode and Grover of Baird and Harry of Clyde. She is also survived by fourteen grandchildren, Mrs. Verda Lunsford, Herbert, Lawrence, Ollie, R.G., R.L., Don, Darral and "Tiny" Murphy; Mrs. Ralph Wylie Mrs. C. R. Pope, Mrs. Hal Shanks, Miss Osalite Gaines and Royce Gaines. Also seven great grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

Mrs. Berry is also survived by one step-daughter, Mrs. Lizzie Martin, of San Antonio.

Mrs. Berry was a member of the Baptist Church, having joined the Baird church in 1882, a short time after the church was organized.

## Pfc. Arthur A. Parish Killed In Action In North Africa

The casualty list issued by the war department Wednesday carried the name of Pfc. Arthur A. Parish, killed in action in the North Africa area. Arch L. Parish, father of Pfc. Parish had been notified some two weeks ago that his son had been killed in battle on April 23.

Pfc. Parish has a twin brother M-Sgt. Arch L. Parish stationed at Fort Sumner, N. M. who was given a two-weeks furlough on receipt of the news of his brother's death. He returned to camp Monday.

The twin brothers are 27 years of age and the youngest of a family of eight children. The father and step-mother have lived in the Midway community the past 20 years.

Arthur Parish entered the Army Dec. 4, 1939, a little more than a year after Arch's enlistment. Arthur's training stations included many camps in the East, from Georgia to Massachusetts, and he was at Staten Island, N. Y., for many months. It was while he was at the latter place that he was granted his only furlough to visit home—at Christmas time in 1941.

He was with the landing forces at Casablanca and wrote frequently of having seen action, but did not go into details. His last letter home was dated April 18—five days before his death.

The brothers were born at Sterling City, Aug. 25, 1915. Their mother died when they were three years old.

Arthur and Arch were the only members of their family in the service. The other brothers are Lee of Houston, Emmett of Flagstaff, N. M., Damon of Crane, and Tom of Bakersfield, Texas, and there are two sisters, Mrs. Florence McDonald of Maryneal, and Mrs. Etta Lee Robbins of Castorville.

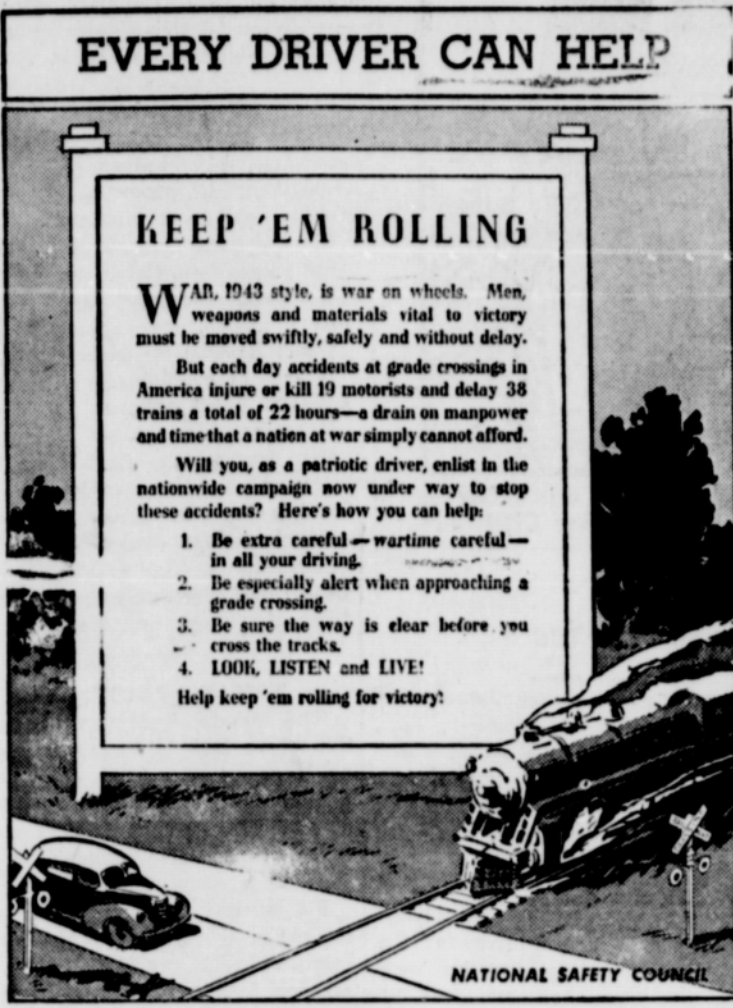

Graduation ceremony was held in the auditorium of the Sterling Law Buildings before a large audience of relatives, friends and sweethearts on hand to congratulate the new officers and pin on their gold bars.

Courses that Lieut. Eastham took while stationed at Yale include an intensive study of electrical armament controls, explosives and ammunition, bomb racks and tow target equipment and synchronization of aircraft machine gun sights and gun cameras. These courses are continuously devised in order to profit by the latest information gained in the far-flung fighting fronts of the U. S. Army Air Force.

The new technical officer will shortly be assigned to a tactical unit where he will be in charge of a crew of enlisted men who have been thoroughly trained as specialists.

Lieutenant Eastham is a graduate of Baird High School. He has been a member of the Baird Volunteer Fire Department for some years and is Past Chief of the department. He was working for the Consolidated Air Craft Company in San Diego Calif., when he resigned to enlist in the Air Service in September, 1942.

**Derryberry Gets Gold Bars Pinned On By His Brother**

The new gold bars of a second lieutenant passed from brother to brother when I. D. Derryberry, 30-year-old Abilenean, was graduated from officers candidate school June 5 at Fort Knox, Ky.

His new insignia were pinned on by Capt. L. E. Derryberry, elder brother of the new lieutenant. Formerly manager of the Abilene municipal airport, Captain Derryberry now is stationed at Nashville, Tenn., as commander of an Army ferry service squadron.

Commissioned an officer in the Army's armored forces, Lt. I. D. Derryberry was sent immediately into four weeks of battle training maneuvers in the hills near Fort Knox. At their conclusion he is due to report for duty at Camp Chaffe, Ark. near Fort Smith, and is hoping to be granted sufficient leave then for a visit home.

As a civilian, Lieutenant Derryberry was employed at Abilene in the meter department of the West Texas Utilities company. He was a member of Abilene's Battery E, 131st Field Artillery, which was mobilized with the rest of the Thirty-Sixth Division (Texas National Guard) in the fall of 1940. Derryberry was discharged the following November as over-age, was chagrined to see his former battery mates sail for the Pacific battle zone and later heard of their capture on Java by the Japanese.

Derryberry re-enlisted in January 1941, and was sent to Camp Polk, La., for training with the First armored division before going to officers candidate school.

He is a brother of Mrs. J. B. Crutchfield, 633 Beech, Abilene. Their father, J. A. Derryberry, lives in Abilene with Mrs. Crutchfield but currently is staying at Clyde.

Two more brothers, E. O. Derryberry and Albert Derryberry, are engaged as civilian mechanics for the Army Air forces but where they are stationed is a military secret.

Lieut. Derryberry is a former resident of the Spring Gap community in Callahan County.

**FARM LABOR REGISTRATION**

Registration of farm labor and labor needs will continue at the County Agent's office in an effort to supply labor on farms where labor shortages exist. At this time additional labor is needed on several farms, therefore any persons desiring farm work are urged to make application.

**GRASS HOPPERS**

Where grass hoppers infestation occurs, control measurers should start immediately in order that damage can be kept to a minimum.

Good results may be expected by using poison bait which can be made by mixing the following ingredients:

- White arsenic or paris green, 1 lb.
  - Wheat bran, 25 lbs.
  - Water, 3 1-2 gallons
  - Molasses, 1 quart.
- Mix dry matter first then add water and molasses, apply in the morning for best results.

If wheat bran cannot be purchased some other similar product may be used, and molasses may be omitted from the above mixture.

**TOMATO FRUIT WORM**

The tomato fruit worm which is about one inch in length, and green or brown striped in color, feeds on tomatoes, beans, pepper, and ears of corn. If control measurers are not taken, considerable damage will be done in a short time.

For control measurers start dusting when tomatoes are the size of marbles, with cryolite 1 part, and sulphur 2 parts; or 1 part calcium arsenate, and 1 part sulphur. For best results, apply in the morning when the plants are moist.

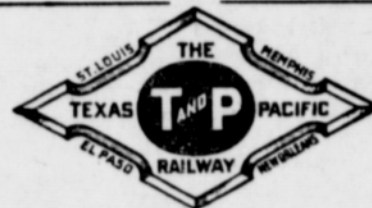

What Should You Save To Help?

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The following table issued by the Treasury Department is intended as a savings yardstick for the average income-earner.

"The job ahead of us is far bigger than most of us realize," Secretary Morgenthau declared in making the table public.

While persons without dependents may be able to set aside more than the suggested figures, persons with several dependents, or with other heavy family obligations, may be unable to save at the suggested rate, the Treasury Department pointed out.

Table with columns: If Weekly Earnings Are, And One Saves Each Week, In One Year He Will Save, Number of Persons in Each Income Group, Total Annual Savings.

When Italy Is Invaded

WHEN the troops of the United Nations invade Italy this year they will be received as brothers and liberators by the people, by the army and by the members of the Underground in that Axis nation.

This prediction is made by Count Carlo Sforza, former Italian Minister of Foreign Affairs, Ambassador to France, Ambassador Extraordinary to Japan, Life Member of the Italian Senate and acclaimed as leader of the Free Italians by the Montevideo Pan-American Conference of 1942.

Count Sforza, writing in the June issue of Cosmopolitan Magazine, describes in detail the events he believes will take place when American troops land in Italy.

"If the necessary morale and diplomatic preparations have been made by the Allies, then I, and all others who know the psychology of the Italian people, will not hesitate to forecast this timetable of events in Italy," writes Count Sforza.

1. "The Americans will be received as brothers and liberators by the people, by the army and by the daring, anonymous young heroes of the Underground."

2. "The Italian Army will be proud to fight once more shoulder to shoulder with the American Army against the Germans, as it did in 1917-18."

3. "The people of Italy will welcome the union of American and Italian arms as a symbol of the future progress and prosperity of Italy."

4. "The Fascists! Poor Fascists! Each and every one of them will swear to the Americans they became members of the party only as self-protection and sometimes in order to fight it from inside. They will swear that in their secret hearts they were first and last true democrats—and there will be more than a degree of truth in some of their statements."

5. "Mussolini will flee, unless he is assassinated or commits suicide. But his end is certain!"

6. "The poor King, too, will flee. He will offer no resistance and will be only too glad to get away."

7. "The Italian people will adopt a republican form of government, sans King, sans dictators."

"This is a highly desirable timetable and it CAN be put into effective operation. I base my prognostications on highly confidential information, my knowledge of the Italian people and my constant contact with its soul; morally I have never been an exile: far from it."
