Grand jury indicts local man for child pornography

An Ozona man has been indicted by a Crockett County Grand Jury on 10 counts of possession of child pornography.

David Vargas Perez, 42, was indicted on Sept. 24. He was arrested by U.S. Marshals on Sept. 27.

Perez is currently out on a \$35,000 surety bond with the conditions that he remain in Crockett County and is not to under the age of 18.

The other conditions of his bond include no supervision or participation in any program or email by any means. that includes persons who are 17 years of age or younger, including athletic civic or culture activities, not allowed to go in or within 1,000 feet of a premises where children commonly gather, including school, day care facility, playground, public

have contact with any children or private youth center, public swimming pool, park or video arcade facility and shall not have access to a computer, the Internet

According to documents filed in the Crockett County Clerk's Office, Perez allegedly possessed visual material that visually depicted a child who was younger than 18 years of age engaging in sexual conduct.



skateboard park approved

Making a more visible skateboard park was approved by the Crockett County Commissioners during Monday's regular meeting.

The commissioners approved tearing down the current building and fencing, putting up a pipe railing around the park, filling in the old pool, placing a chain-link fence on the side of the park that is by the school and add lighting to the park.

Problems that have been occurring at the park include vandalism, fighting and students engaging in inappropriate activities.

Superintendent Abe Gott said that a skateboard park is needed, but that the park currently has hiding places where law enforcement can't always see what's going on.

"If you light it up enough, the kids who do want to do bad things will find another place,"

Commissioner Alfredo Tobar said he was in favor of tearing down the building and filling up the pool before the park opened. Tobar also said that when the

building is torn down, the county could look at making that area a place for basketball goals. Commissioner Pleas Chil-

dress III said he was also opposed to having the pool open and that the pool should be filled up with new ramps placed on top, and lighting added as well.

'I'm disappointed that we made a nice place for them, and they disrespected us by vandalizing the place," Childress said.

Until the improvements are made to the park, the park hours will remain the same closing each night at 6 p.m.

Historical commission needs to ease up on courthouse restoriation

town square without the majestic beauty of the Crockett County Courthouse.

The high dome structure designed by Oscar Ruffini, was built from locally quarried limestone in 1902.

A lot has changed since most historic Texas courthouses were built.

Modern air conditioning, sound systems, better insulation and wiring for modern computer systems was not in the original designs.

Texas Historical The Commission fails to recognize some of the modern needs in the courthouse preservation program, hence why our county commissioners have spent the majority of this year going round and round with the state agency.

Instead of trying to get one of the THC's grants to restore the courthouse, the commissioners have budgeted money to pay for the repairs.

However, the historical marker on the side of the building means the commissioners must go through the THC before any work is done.

The problem with the THC is that they want to turn courthouses back in time, instead of trying to move forward.

Don't get me wrong, I'm all for preserving history and I have no problem keeping the historical appearance of our beautiful building.

I do have a problem with spending money to make a building function like it did in the late 19th to early 20th Century.

county officials would end up with less space instead of more, forcing them to find other buildings to house county employees when the restoration process began.

In the case of a courthouse with major ADA compliance issues, things can get tricky. County officials and architects have to be creative when trying

It's hard to picture Ozona's to balance the need to comply with ADA requirements while still preserving the historical integrity of a building built before elevators or wheelchair accessible restrooms were common.

In Shackelford County, architects were faced with the task of installing an elevator in a building constructed in 1883. Architects eventually decided to put the elevator in a hallway with it coming out in the jury room on the second floor in order to make it less conspicuous.

In Crockett County, a new roof is needed to keep water from destroying a courtroom. Air conditioner units need to be moved to reduce noise, plumbing needs to be fixed and a new sound system installed.

A letter has been sent to THC by the commissioners in hopes that the air conditioning and plumbing issues will be approved.

However, in order to really keep our courthouse functioning, a new roof has to be installed.

The THC has said that the work on courthouses is part communication and compromise between county and commission.

In the Crockett County Commissioners meetings, the THC officials have been more interested in keeping some of the repair projects their way and pushing their grant program.

While the THC Courthouse Preservation Program looks good in print, it still doesn't upgrade historical structures to most modern needs.

Sitting in the Donley County Courthouse in Clarendon, Texas, In Atascosa County, the visitors can see firsthand the re-

The courthouse has been open up porches that were part restored to become a beautiof the original structure but were ful building. To the common eye, though, it seems more like a courthouse museum with its wooden, theater-style seats and hardwood floors that make a crowd of people sound like a thundering herd of cattle.

It doesn't look like a functioning courthouse, which it is.

The THC needs to ease up and think about finding a compromise to modernizing historic structures, while keeping historical appearances.

Cattle brands are more than just iron

Author, spur collector talk about the unique, western history of those who left their mark By MELISSA PERNER Editor and Publisher

The brand burned into a cow's backside is more than just a sign of ownership.

For Leonard Stiles, cattle brands told the history of ranching in Texas.

Western author Jane Pattie expanded on the history of cattle brands and her relationship with Stiles Monday night during the annual Friends of the Library dinner at the Civic Center.

A freelance writer and photographer, Pattie said her greatest Read while a pair of love is the lure of the American West and the Texas Cowboy.

"A man on horseback, Texas ranchers and cowboys have always fascinated me. That is why I write non-fiction books," Pattie

Pattie, author of the book "Cattle Brands: Ironclad Signatures," is a non-fiction book about Stiles, a former "field inspector" and brand historian.

Stiles branding iron collection is currently located at the Cattle Raisers Museum in Fort

"The brand of a cowman is an ironclad signature that leaves no question as to who the animal belongs to," Pattie said. "The brand is also a walking billboard, each with its own story."

Stiles collected more than 1,000 branding irons. As he collected them, he was careful to document each brands history.






Jesse Carl (Sonny) Malone Jr.



Allee was stationed in Ozona at the time.











TEXAS AWARDS FIRST WIND LEASES

The Texas General Land Office on Oct. 2 awarded the first four bid leases for offshore wind power in U.S. history.

"The Texas Wind Rush is on, and the pioneers are staking their claims," Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson said.

The leases, awarded to Louisiana-based Wind Energy Systems Technology, allow work to begin on the construction of meteorological testing towers on the tracts.

Once the wind farms are operational, the lessee will pay the state's Permanent School Fund a minimum of \$132 million over the 30-year life of the leases.

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
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
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
