

Parks and wildlife Crockett County off-road park

The start of an off-highway vehicle park in Crockett County took a big leap forward last

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission approved the master plan for the Escondido Draw Recreational Area (EDRA) during their Nov. 8 meeting in Austin.

The approval includes a \$400,000 grant from the National Recreational Trails Fund (NRTF) for the development of the 3,300-acre area located 25 miles southwest of Ozona, off of County Road 406.

The Texas Motorized Trails Coalition submitted the grant proposal back in 2005. The TMTC will be the organization overseeing the development and running of the park.

held in Ozona to discuss plans about the park, with the latest one being held in September.

During that meeting, the

park's master plan draft was presented, along with information about how the TMTC would cooperate with neighbors, Crockett County and the people of Ozona.

The commission was very complimentary on the fact that we have worked so hard to build bridges with the local community of Ozona and the local landowners in Crockett County," said Tony Eeds, president of TMTC.

The next step, before development on the park begins, is to receive approval from the Texas Historical Commission, the U.S. Fish and Game and the U.S. Department of Transportation.

Eeds said he expects to receive approval from all three agencies by early December. Development will then begin on the park, which is set to open sometime in spring 2008.

"The Cox family has been so nice to work with and is work-Several meetings have been ing closely with us on walking and repairing fence-lines at the park," Eeds said, referring to one of the neighboring landowners. "We've got a lot of work we've

got to get done. Good, strong fences make good neighbors."

Steve Thompson of TPWD will be the team leader in the laying out of trails in the park, which will be for off-highway vehicles, motorcycles and allterrain vehicles.

'We would really like to see people in this community adopt this park," Thompson said. "We want this to be a place for youth and the public to go camping, hike nature trails and just have

Texas is second in nation, behind California, in off-road vehicle sales, Thompson said.

However, Texas only has very few place for off-road vehicles to go, Thompson said. TMTC has developed a

similar park in east Texas near

The EDRA will have an office, provide maintenance and have campsite facilities. Showers and toilets will be constructed on the site. There will also be public and RV parking.

should be like," he said.

On Nov. 6, Koehne held a second meeting with OPS and OIS teachers and staff, as well as the first meeting with the new design committee.

The design committee is made up of Dan Webb, primary school principal, Connie Crenwelge, primary school teacher, Manley Holmes, intermediate school teacher, Michael Gully, intermediate school teacher, Linda De La Garza, primary school parent, Rita Vasquez, intermediate school parent, Rosario Tambunga, community member, Gott and a rotating school board member. Board President Dr. Marcus Sims attended the first meeting.

During these meetings, Koehne presented ideas and concerns that he compiled through the questionnaires and interviews.



Direct Deposit approved for county employees By MELISSA PERNER

Editor and Publisher County employees will soon

have the option to have their paychecks electronically deposited into the bank. During Monday's meeting,

the county commissioners voted to give all county employees the choice of having their checks direct deposited into the employee's bank account. County Judge Fred Deaton

said direct deposit is not mandatory and that the county should have it started by 2008.

The commissioners also approved a ban on all aerial fireworks, which include skyrockets with sticks and missiles with fins or rudders.

Small firecrackers are permitted. Violation of the fireworks restrictions is a Class C misdemeanor.

The commissioners also reinstated the burn ban, which restricts outdoor burning. Exemptions to the ban are outdoor cooking, controlled campfires and certified agriculture controlled burns. Violation of the burn ban is also a Class C misdemeanor.

Commissioner Frank Tambunga said he would talk with the Ozona Garden Club about how to beautify the grassy area in front of the skateboard park. The commissioners also suggested painting the skateboard area similar to the county pool.

From science whiz to actor

Richard L. Jackson's life looks like on paper.

Jackson, 52, is a 1973 graduate of Central High School. He majored in physics and was a 1978 Presidential Award Winner at Angelo State University. In 1980 he received his master's degree in material science from the University of Wisconsin in Madison, and now he is a computer chip engineer for high-tech companies up to and including Texas Instruments.

However, with all this hightech knowledge, Jackson is taking on the role of "Chicken Farmer" in the Coen brothers' latest movie, "No Country for Old Men."

For Jackson's sister, Vicki Davis, a second grade teacher at Ozona Primary School, and his nephew, Sean, a freshman at Ozona High School, it's about the excitement for her brother.

In an article, written by friend Rick Smith at the San Angelo Standard-Times, Jackson talked about his new movie, which stars Tommy Lee Jones, Javier Bardem, Josh Brolin, Woody Harrelson and Kelly Macdonald. The movie is scheduled for release on Nov. 21.

Steps to obtaining a patent

idea for an invention then just a few months later find that someone has actually taken your idea, made the product and it is for

Recent TV programs such as American Inventor and The Next Big Idea, may lead you to think getting a patent is easy, but it is not. Let's take a look at an imaginary patent idea.

Some of the simplest of inventions start as an idea which stems from a functional need. Imagine you are working in the yard one evening raking leaves. As you raise your rake to dump the leaves into a trash container, you think there must be an easier way to keep the leaves on the rake. With your idea in mind, you go to your workshop. You take your leaf rake and a second leaf rake, install a spring loaded hinge between the two and fashion a self-closing pair of giant salad tongs. As the sun begins to set, you dash out into the yard to try your invention and it works! The question now is where do you go from here?

In order to perform a basic search, you do not have to travel to the United States Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO) in Virginia. Information concerning Patents issued since 1975 is available on-line. Other patents, back to inception of the Patent Office in 1790, are available by Issue Date, Patent Number and Classification.

The USPTO website appears ominous, but do not let that intimidate you. When you are on the website, www.uspto. gov, click on Patents in the lefthand column. Many patents will be retrieved using the keywords 'leaf rake." After you have searched through the patents, you might be able to determine that your invention may actually be unique enough to receive a

According to Patent It Your-

Have you ever had a great self, by David Pressman, the inventor should log the information in a journal or a lab notebook. Be sure the information is dated, includes all sketches of the invention, and includes a narrative of your work. The information needs to be signed by one or two witnesses who understand the invention and would be able signatures need not be notarized, but two witnesses are better than one. In commercially prepared lab notebooks, the signature line may state: "The above confidential information is witnessed and understood."

The next phase of patent idea protection could be to file paper work necessary to participate in the Disclosure Document Program. Or, if you plan to make the product and get it out into the market place, you may file and receive a Provisional Patent. The Provisional Patent allows you to use "Patent Pending" for a specified amount of time (one year), on your product. All of the necessary information for either of these is available on the USPTO

After the product has proven its marketability you can decide whether filing for a Non-Provisional patent would be the next step. Keep in mind that there are fees associated with each of these steps and if you need legal assistance, there would be attorney's fees.

The ASU Small Business Development Center can help you sort through the options for your next big idea and help you identify patent attorneys registered with the USPTO.





In the back of each book is a pattern for a quilt that goes along with the book.






