

The Rainwater Harvest Project for the Ozona Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center may be in place by the start of February.

The project is being implemented through the Crockett County Extension Office and the chamber of commerce.

Susie Bishop, county extension agent for family and consumer science, said they received a bid of \$5,125.47 from Barry Wall, of Kerrville.

The extension office will pay \$3,000 for the project and the chamber will pick up \$2,125.47, including a down payment of a third of money to get the project started.

The project will consist of a 20 by 24-foot roof with poles and a 1,000-gallon water tank.

Wildfire risk can be reduced if management action is taken now

Dangerous. That's the one word fire officials and rangeland management specialists use to describe the combination of heavy grass growth and dry conditions that exist over much of

"This year most of Texas has been blessed with abundant rainfall. However, with abundant rainfall has come large amounts of grass growth," said Bob Mc-Can of Victoria, president of the Texas Coalition of the Grazing Lands Conservation Initiative.

Because of the high fuel loads and weather fluctuations, the serious situation is expected to remain through March, despite occasional bouts of moisture, said Dr. Wayne Hanselka, Texas Cooperative Extension range specialist in Corpus Christi.

"An inch of rain will not last long with high winds and low humidity's," Hanselka said.

Since November 2007, the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department has responded to more than 25 grass fire calls.

The largest one was Nov. 17 where 3,555 acres burned three miles south of the Crockett County line and extended on to the Hudspeth Ranch in Crockett County, which is located about 30 miles south of Ozona between U.S. Highway 163 and State Highway 1973.

Cause of the fire was determined to be a catalytic converter on a pickup came into contact

with the dry grass in the area.

Another large one was on Dec. 21 off of Taylor Box Road. where more than 1,000 acres burned to Interestate-10.

According to Kent Ferguson, state range management specialists for the Natural Resources Conservation Services (NRCS) in Temple, "managing grass fuels is very important right now. Some things to be done include mowing road ditches, being careful with outdoor burning, being watchful of catalytic converters, plowing or blading fireguards, and using prescribed burning."

If someone wants to do a prescribed burn, it is important to follow proper procedures Hanselka said.

"A group of interested persons met recently to begin addressing the issue of fire safety and the proper use of prescribed burning," McCan said. "This alliance included private individuals, Grazing Lands Conservation Initiative, Texas Cooperative Extension, Texas Forest Service, NRCS, Texas Ag Experiment Station, Texas Parks and Wildlife, Texas Department of Agriculture, Texas Nature Conservancy and the Welder Wildlife Foundation. Our purpose is to make people aware of the good information that is available."

There are many ways and techniques to provide fire protection as well as conduct a safe prescribed burn.

to work cattle with a rope than a table. If your neighbors ever knew in advance you planned on using one they wouldn't come to your branding. Using a table is even worse

than serving chicken at your branding. Even now there are ranchers reading this essay who will deny ever having heard of such a ghastly device. Having said all that, I must

admit I own one. Go ahead, call me a mama's boy. I'll hasten to a head on top.) I was working add that the table came with a ranch we leased. I'm not proud that my wife

IS RELEASED

An annual report on Texas public schoolteacher salaries and benefits indicates that teachers' pay is "up slightly" in 2007-2008.

The report, compiled by the Texas Association of School Boards and the Texas Association of School Administrators, includes data collected from 747 of the state's 1,031 school districts.

The weighted average teacher salary in responding districts is \$46,336 for 2007-08, up 3.2 percent from the 2006-07 average salary of \$44,897.

• 100 districts paid a bonus to new hires for 2007-2008. APPELLATE COURT **RULES ON NCLB**

The issue of unfunded federal mandates strains many Texas school districts, so this may indicate change on the horizon:

The U.S. Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati on Jan. 7 ruled that the federal government may not force states and school districts to spend their own funds to meet the mandates of "No Child Left Behind."

The Washington, D.C.based National Education Association and nine school districts filed suit in a Michigan district court against the Secretary of Education, seeking among other relief, a judgment declaring that they need not comply with the act's requirements where federal funds do not cover the increased costs of compliance.

SCHOOL SAFETY AUDITS ARE COMING

Beginning in September 2008, Texas school districts must report the results of their first campus security audits to the Texas School Safety Center.

Texas law requires schools to conduct these safety audits every three years and practice their campus emergency management plans.

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott encouraged all school districts to team up with law enforcement to annually practice campus safety proce-

"Having a plan is important, but executing that plan under stress - when seconds count - is critical to saving lives," Abbott said.

STATES JOIN IN DEATH PENALTY BRIEF

The attorneys general of 19 states joined Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott and Texas Solicitor General Ted Cruz in a friend-of-the-court brief to the U.S. Supreme Court in a Kentucky case, Baze v. Rees.

Texas argues that the fourstep lethal injection protocol used as the primary means to carry out capital punishment in Texas and 36 other states does not violate the 8th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution because when properly administered, it is not "cruel and unusual."

A decision in the case may be announced from the bench any time between now and the end of June.



Prior to the passage of H.B. 12, parks and historic sites were funded from the same account. The historic sites will now be funded through a historic site fund which will receive six percent of the sporting goods tax revenue.
