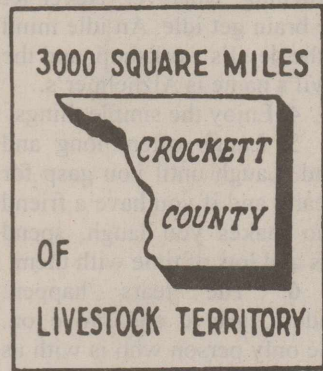

Heritage Building needs new windows now

School board to discuss possible approval at tonight's meeting

New windows for the Ozona High School Heritage Building are up for approval at tonight's (March 26) monthly meeting of the Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees.

The meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the Administration Building on 797 Avenue D.

The board is to discuss and possibly approve to obtain bids to replace windows on the Heritage Building. The windows are rotted and coming apart, mostly at the baseboard.

Also on the agenda, is for the board to consider reimbursing the district's fund balance if the \$10 million bond passes on May 10.

The Heritage Building windows are going to be part of the bond, but the school district has to approve to purchase them now due to time constraints, said Superintendent Abe Gott.

"If we are to put new windows in the Heritage, we have to purchase them now. It will take time to make them and then have them installed in July," Gott said.

If the board approves, and the bond passes, then the cost for the windows will come from the

bond money. If the board approves, and the bond fails, then the money for the windows will come out of the district's fund balance.

Other items on the agenda:

- Discussion and possible approval regarding the Booster Club request for a new concession stand or renovation to existing concession stand at Lion Stadium.

- Meeting in closed session on teacher/coach contracts for 2008-2009 school year.

- Board member resignation - action tabled from February meeting.

- Local policy regarding the use of air horns/train whistles at home football games.

- Abstinence-based sex education curriculum for grades 6-12.

- Discussion/possible approval of Board Policy DEC (LOCAL).

- Proposed revisions to Board Policy - Board Members Elections BBB (LOCAL).

- 2008 Media Honor Roll nominations for Melissa Perner, The Ozona Stockman, and KHOS Radio.

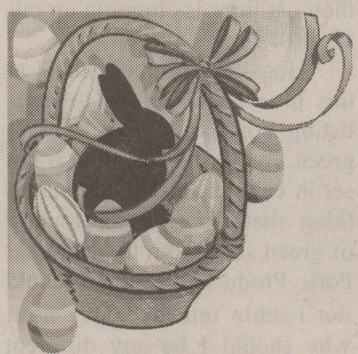
- Ratification of textbook selection.

- Discussion regarding incentive pay for employees.

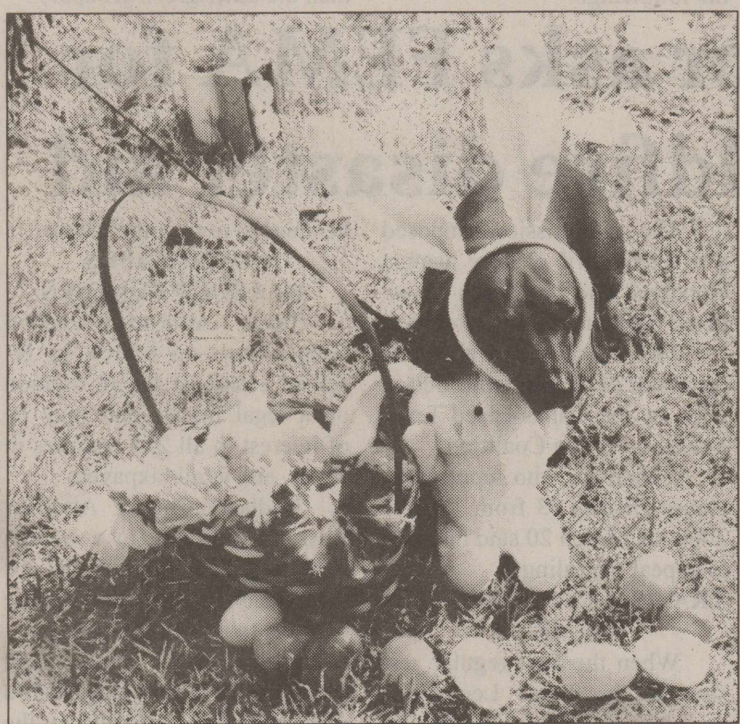
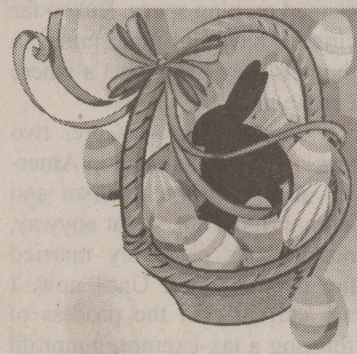

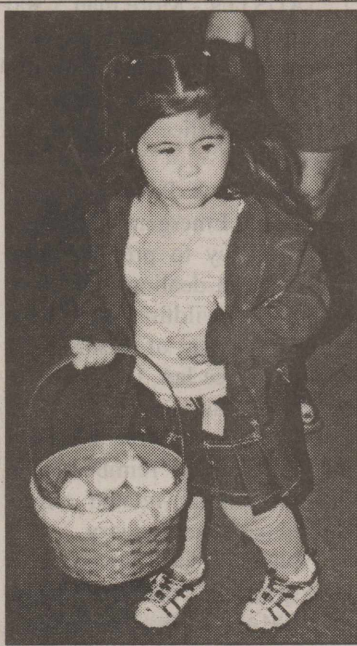
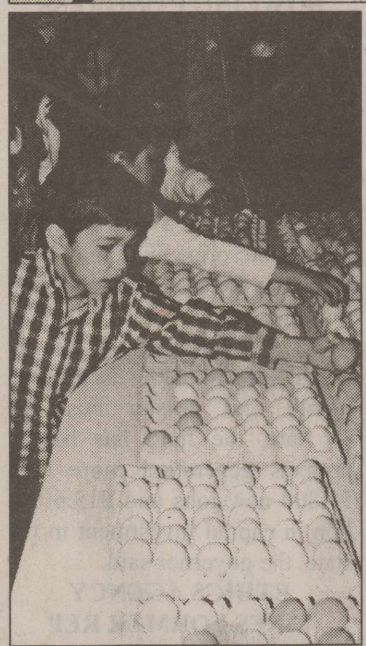
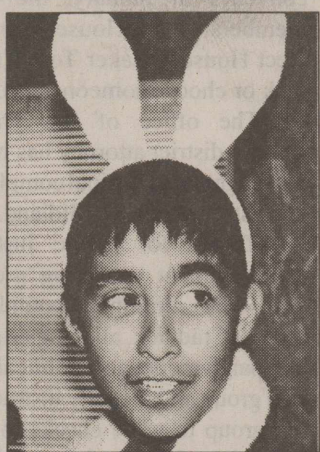
Picking Easter Eggs

Pecos River Watershed Plan to make third draft available

PECOS - A revised draft of the proposed Pecos River Watershed Protection Plan should be ready for a third round of public review and comment by the end of the month.

Will Hatler, who is coordinating the plan's development, said revisions are being made based on feedback received at public meetings in five locations in February and during an online comment period that ended on March 10.

Hatler, a Texas AgriLife Extension Service ecosystem science and management assistant at Stephenville, said the plan's objective is to get landowners involved in efforts to maintain or improve the Pecos River in Texas.

Hatler said the third draft of the document, which will also be submitted to the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, will be available at the end of March at <http://pecosbasin.tamu.edu> or from Choyia Holley at (254) 968-4144, cholley@ag.tamu.edu.

Comments will be accepted on the website or by mail through April 30.

Landowner involvement is the lifeblood of the planning effort, Hatler said, noting that public meetings on the plan in Pecos, Imperial, Iraan, Ozona and Del Rio were well attended.

The Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board provided the grant funds for AgriLife Extension to facilitate this process, Hatler said.

Hatler said once the plan is complete, the focus will be on seeking the funding to implement

the highest priority management practices outlined in the plan. Two of these, saltcedar spraying and debris burning, have already been submitted to the board for funding consideration.

"And probably most importantly, we will continue to communicate with landowners and keep them updated on project activities and developments," he said.

Two of those landowners are Larry Drgac, a property owner near Girvin, and Mike Turk, a Terrell County ranch owner.

"I think the protection plan is going good right now," Drgac said. "The people who were against it are in favor of it now. Convincing them that this wasn't a government agency trying to come in and run roughshod over everything and take control of their property was the main thing that turned the tide in favor of the project."

Drgac said initial saltcedar spraying which prompted the river clean-up plan is already having a positive effect.

"The river is up and our livestock are drinking river water now which they have never done before," he said. "We're 6 or 8 miles below Girvin, which was some of the raunchiest part of the river because of the salt in the water. The river flow is up about 8 inches, I say, because of the saltcedar spraying. People say it's because we had 20 inches of rain last year and maybe that was it, and I tell them no, it was up when we had only 4 inches of rain the year before. And plus, the year we had 4 inches is when the livestock started drinking the river water."

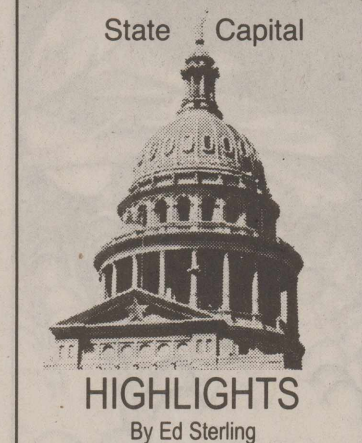

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AUSTIN - More than 5,300 wildfires have burned an estimated 940,000 acres and destroyed 140 homes in Texas, the governor's office reported on March 20.

Gov. Rick Perry is urging the Federal Emergency Management Agency to provide more assistance in dealing with three months of wildfires that have burned in 216 of Texas' 254 counties since Jan. 1.

In a letter to FEMA chief David Paulison, Perry requested that the state be reimbursed in full for wildfire-related efforts carried out since January.

State and local governments have spent \$20.5 million on this so far. FEMA has spent \$75 million.

But FEMA isn't the only agency that can help. Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples wrote a letter to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, asking for an increase in assistance for farmers and ranchers who

have suffered damages due to wildfires.

Texas Parks & Wildlife Department reported a massive wildfire that torched 95 percent of the 15,200-acre Chaparral Wildlife Management Area in South Texas, but much of the wildlife on the state's premier public hunting site escaped harm.

BOWLING CONGRESS TO MOVE HERE
The United States Bowling Congress plans to move its headquarters from Greendale, Wis., to Arlington, Texas, and bring 200 jobs.

A \$693,000 award from the Texas Enterprise Fund may have helped in the group's decision to relocate.

The fund, created by the Legislature in 2003, is used to recruit and bolster business. To date, the fund has helped projects generating more than 51,800 new jobs and \$15.6 billion in capital investment in the state, the governor said.

ETHICS AGENCY FINES FORMER REP
On Feb. 12, the Texas Ethics Commission adopted a ruling that former state Rep. Toby Goodman, R-Arlington, used campaign donations to buy real estate, in violation of the state election law.

The commission imposed a \$10,000 civil penalty against Goodman and on March 11 ordered payment within 30 days.

The ruling came about as the result of a complaint filed in 2006 by the Dallas-based Texas Values in Action Coalition.

Goodman, who represented House District 93 from 1991 to 2006, on March 20 said he plans to appeal the ruling.

TRAVIS DA INVESTIGATES SPEAKER
When the 81st regular session of the Texas Legislature convenes in January, the 150 members of the House may reelect House Speaker Tom Craddick or choose someone else.

The office of the Travis County district attorney has been investigating a criminal complaint against Craddick, R-Midland.

Texas for Public Justice, a government watchdog group, filed the criminal complaint against Craddick, alleging he sent campaign money to a political action group and illegally instructed the group to write checks to the campaign funds of lawmakers that might make a difference to him early next year.

State law prohibits the use of campaign funds for such a purpose, and Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle said

he plans to review the matter.

COUNTY ASKS AG ABOUT BONUSES
Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott on March 11 received a request for an opinion on a legal matter that may be of interest to all 254 counties in Texas, and to all taxpayers.

Midland County Attorney Russell W. Malm, in a written request, asked if it is legal for the county to pay performance bonuses to its elected officials.

Malm said the county judge is interested in adopting such a plan, subject to approval by the county commissioners court.

The attorney general's office issues most opinions within 180 days of the request.

BERLANGA'S REQUEST IS DENIED
The State Board of Education will vote on a new set of English reading and writing standards at its March 27 meeting.

A week before the meeting board member Mary Helen Berlanga of Corpus Christi and state Rep. Abel Herrero, D-Robstown, asked that time be allotted for expert input on learning styles of Hispanic children.

SBOE chair Don McLeroy of College Station said there was no time available to accept the proposed input.

PUBLIC PERCEPTION HOW THE WORLD SEES US

"In an Internet Age, Libraries still draw a Crowd." - Shown by a survey from the Pew Internet and American Life Project. This survey found that more than half of Americans had visited a library in the past year. It was young people, people aged 18 to 30, who were pushing to get through the door first, despite the advance of personal computers and the Internet. That was also the group most determined to make a return trip: 40 percent of young adults, as opposed to only 20 percent of older folks, said they'd be coming back soon to the library.

"It is true the survey showed that many of the crowd say they come to libraries for the computers, CDs, DVDs, and electronic media, not the books. But, it doesn't really matter what gets you there that counts, it's what

you leave with." - Guest essayist *Julia Keller of the Chicago Tribune writing on The Road Ahead for Public Libraries in the Modern Era.*

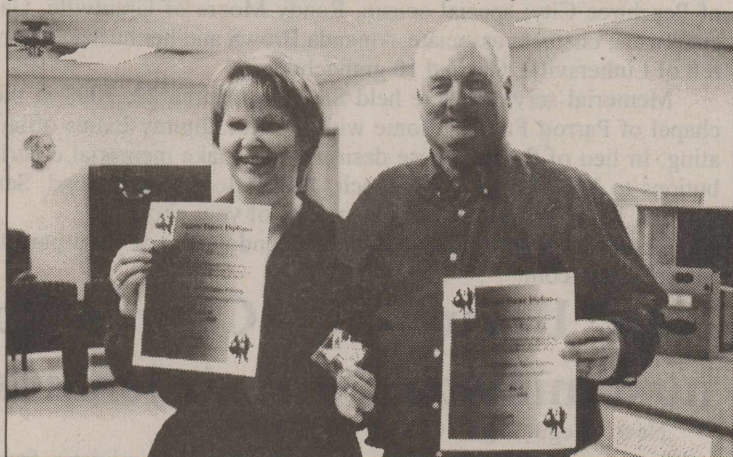
FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY SCHOLARSHIP

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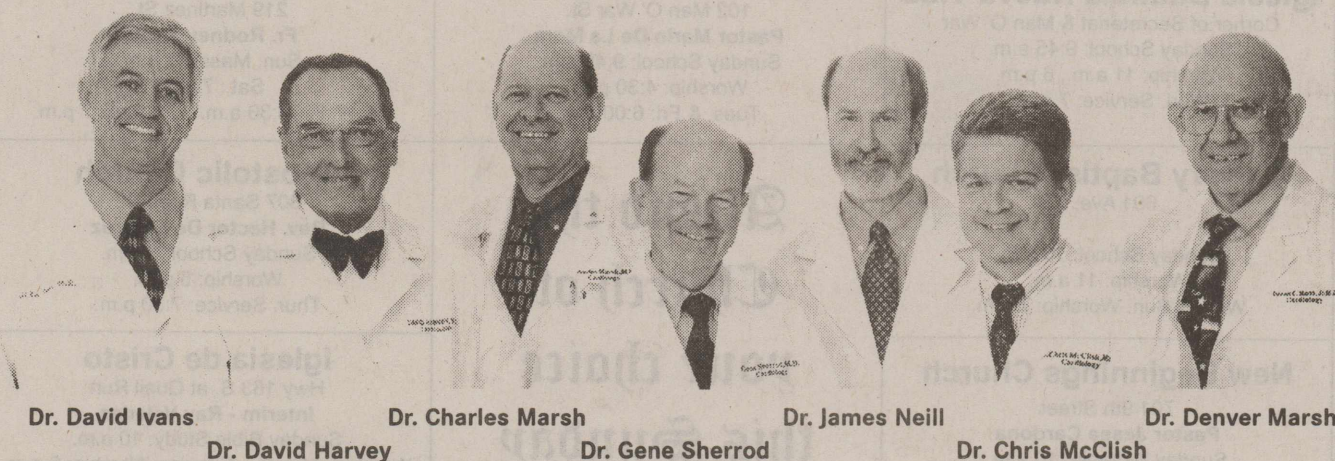

Texas Federation of Women's Clubs news

The District's 16 clubs were represented by 28 members, who greatly enjoyed the fine hospitality proffered. Luncheon entertainment was provided by two members of a children's Mexican dance troupe. Officers were installed for the 2008-2010 administration, and Catherine Travland of Pecos will be the next District President.

The TFWC Western District Alma Van Sickle Scholarship was awarded to Davis B. Stumberg of Sanderson, which he will use to further his studies in business management at the University of Texas at Permian Basin. Vanessa Valeriano of Pecos will be presented as a candidate for the TFWC Eleanor Tipps scholarship of around \$800, which, if awarded to her, will help finance her study of architecture and art at Angelo State University.

Charlotte Harrell, fund-raising chair, gave a report on the fund-raising activities of the district. The Woman's Forum of San Angelo, to which Arlene Clayton and Charlotte Harrell of Ozona belong, received two awards: third place for Advocacy for Children (a result of a \$1,000 contribution to the Concho Valley Home for Girls in San Angelo) and second place for scholarship (a result of a \$1,000 contribution to the TFWC Western District Alma Van Sickle Scholarship Fund). The Woman's Forum of San Angelo ceased meeting Dec. 31, 2007, but remains an official club in TFWC Western District through June 2008. The club, in dispersing its remaining funds, also contributed more than \$700 to the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs Inc. Historical Foundation. The Historical Foundation is responsible for the maintenance of the Texas Federa-

tion's club house in Austin. Members enjoyed an informative slide presentation and discussion by John Carter and Chief John J. Smetana Jr. of the Homeland Security Customs and Border Protection, U.S. Border Patrol. The Border Patrol force is expected to increase significantly over the next few years. However, there is a housing shortage in many of the small towns where they expect to be based. This may be a grand opportunity for entrepreneurs in the towns to build more suitable homes or to upgrade the existing housing supply.

They stressed that a solid wall from California to Brownsville is not in the planning. Walls are to be erected at certain, strategic sites to aid the Border Patrol to detect persons crossing the border. For instance, urban areas are difficult to monitor because a person can step across the border in a matter of seconds and disappear into the general population. Walls are helpful there. If persons are forced to cross the border in sparsely populated areas, detection is more feasible. While thousands of illegal aliens are apprehended each year, just as many are undetected. There is no overnight cure for the problem but the Border Patrol is doing as much as possible with the resources at hand.

Many new ways of screening vehicle traffic for drugs and illegal persons trying to cross the border are in use. Since the section of the border being discussed was the area from Sanderson going west, nothing much was said about the controversy between land owners and Homeland Security over the fence issue in South Texas. The prevalence of marijuana crossing the border was the focal point of drug discussion. Little was said about heroin, cocaine or other drugs.

The Woman's League of Ozona is a member of the General Federation Women's Clubs and the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

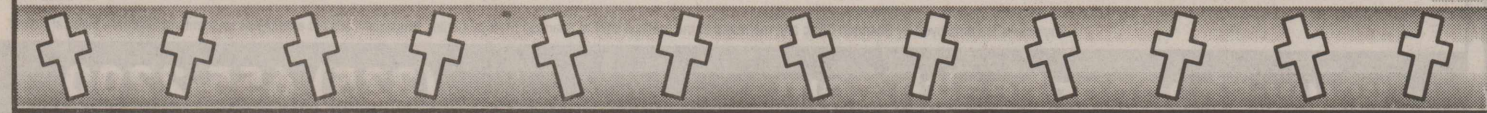

Turk feels that all concerned must never forget that the main purpose of the plan is to control the salinity in the Pecos River and increase its flow.

"Both of these issues must be addressed at the source of the water flowing into the river or we'll never see a significant improvement of the water quality," Turk said.

Turk said he plans on participating on a small scale, due to the fact that his ranch does not adjoin the Pecos River, and the ranch is under a game management program with no livestock at the present time.

"The practices I see we could do on our ranch that might result in increased spring flows into the lower Pecos would be some brush

sculpting and possibly catchment ponds with direct injection into the fresh water aquifers if that method is approved and selected," he said. "We have seen much improvement from the first draft of the plan. Since September of 2007 forward, landowners have been made more aware of meeting dates and changes in the plan."

Hatler said he was pleased with the turnout at the comment meetings and he appreciated the input given.

"Folks were appreciative of the fact that the changes they had requested during the first comment period were included in the second draft of the document," Hatler said. "We're looking forward to incorporating the additional comments we received,

and in continuing to take this effort in the direction the landowners lead us."

The Pecos River watershed drains all or part of Andrews, Brewster, Crane, Crockett, Culberson, Ector, Jeff Davis, Loving, Pecos, Presidio, Reagan, Reeves, Terrell, Upton, Val Verde, Ward and Winkler counties.

Collaborators on the project include landowners, AgriLife Extension, the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board and local Soil and Water Conservation Districts, Texas AgriLife Research, Texas Water Resources Institute and the U.S. International Boundary and Water Commission.

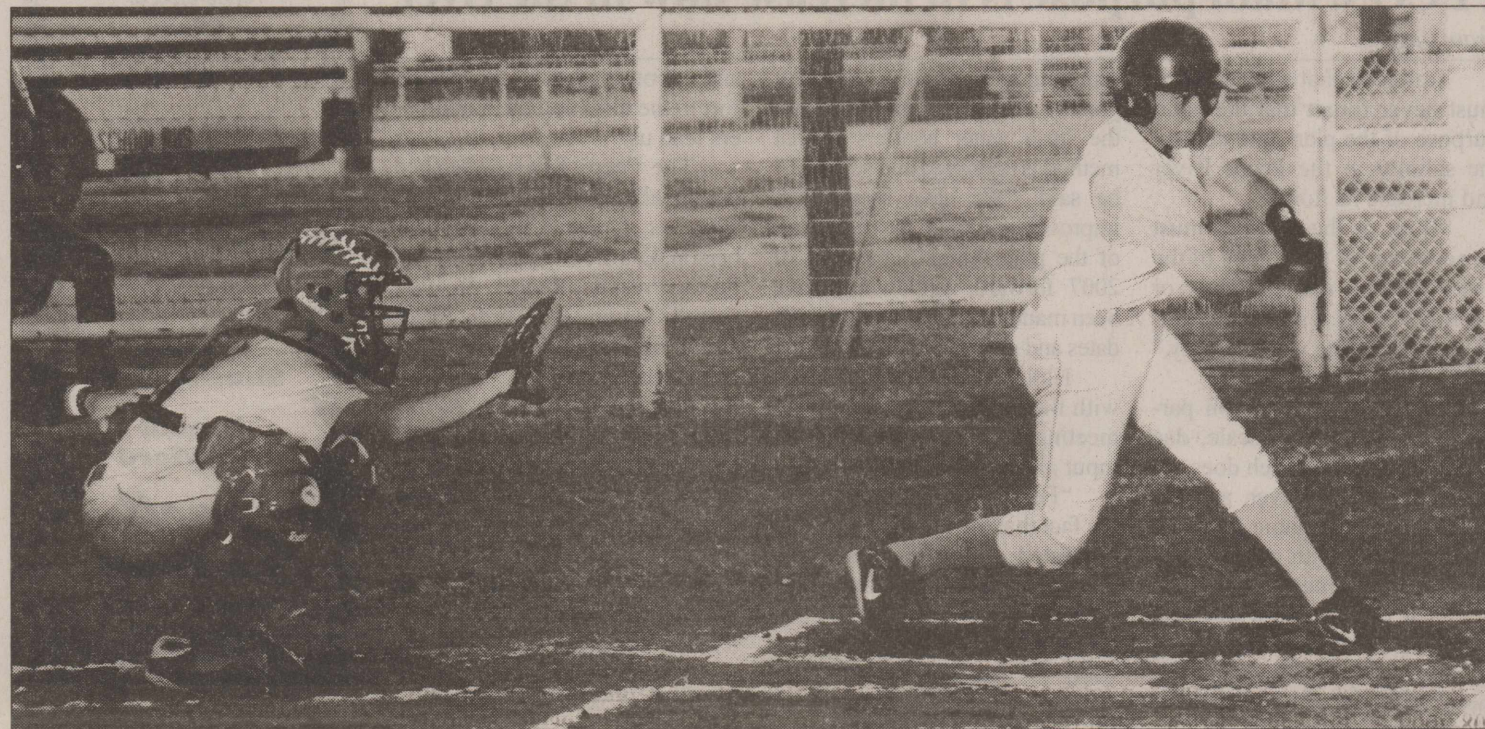

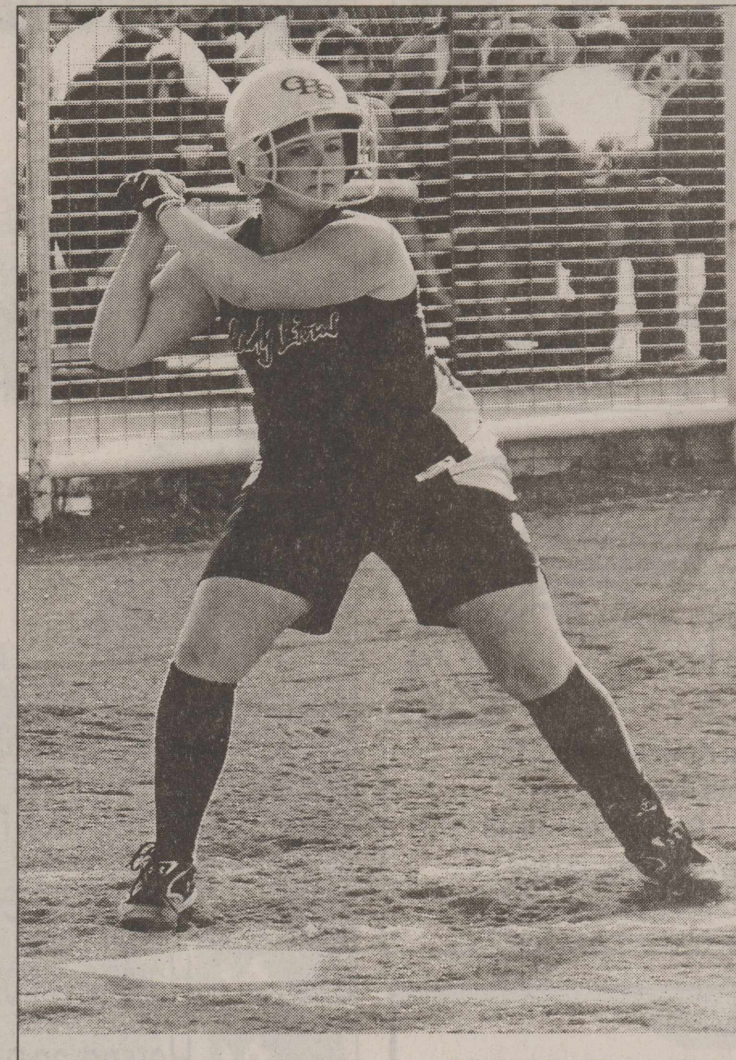

Pre-Kindergarten can register from 9 a.m. to noon and Kindergarten from 1-4 p.m..

To be eligible to attend pre-kindergarten, a student must be unable to speak and comprehend the English language, eligible to participate in the National Free or Reduced-Price Lunch Program or is homeless.

The child must be 4 years old on or before Sept. 1, 2008. **Parents must have their child's birth certificate, (not the hos-**

pital's, but the courthouse one) shot record, and social security card in order to register the child.

If the child speaks Spanish, testing will be done to see if he or she qualifies for Pre-kindergarten; therefore you will need to bring the child with you to registration.

Parents enrolling their child for Pre-kindergarten must bring a copy of their recent check stub. Income will be verified prior to the first day of school.

Kindergarten students must be 5 on or before Sept. 1, 2008. **Parents will also need to bring their child's birth certificate, (not the hospital's,**

but the courthouse one) shot record, and social security card to registration.

A copy of these documents will be made, and the originals will be returned to you. This is required by law 25.002 of the Texas Education Code.

As of Aug. 1, 1999, all children born on or after September 2, 1992 are required to have the following immunizations to begin school:

1. Hepatitis A
2. 4 yr. old booster(DTaP, Polio, and MMR)
3. If your child has not had the chicken pox the Varicella is required.
