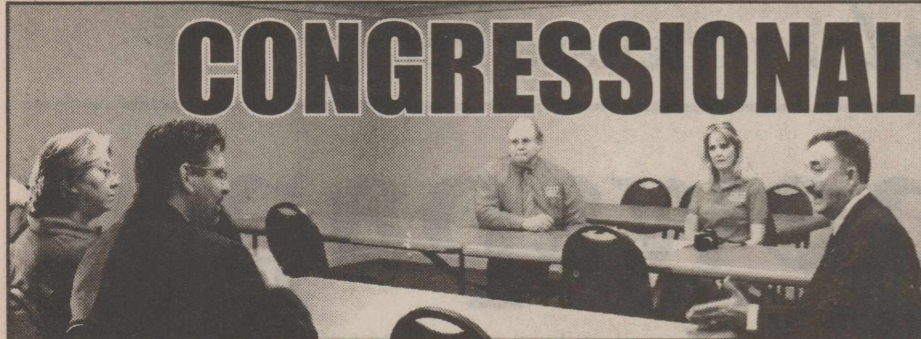

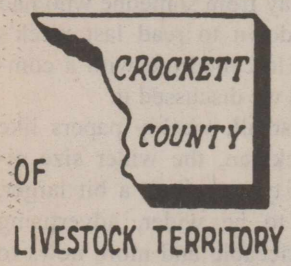

Graduates look to the future

Diplomas were conferred on fifty-four students as the Class of 2008 graduated Friday night at Lion Stadium.

In her welcome speech, Salutatorian Park Reagan Preddy spoke of the "major transition" that her and her classmates were about to embark.

"We are leaving everything behind and entering into an uncertain future," she said. "We are all capable of achieving great things."

Preddy spoke about how lucky she was to have grown up in a small community, and to be graduating with classmates that she started kindergarten with.

"Growing up, to me, we were all more like siblings instead of classmates," she said.

Julia Leeann Henderson, the third-highest graduate, spoke about trusting in faith to guide them for their future.

"I do know if I let God control my future, then I know everything will fall nicely in place," she said.

Henderson spoke about the many people, teachers, friends, family and community, that have helped the Class of 2008 become the young adults they are now.

With graduation and the world upon them, Henderson said it is now time for the class to step up and out on their own.

"This is the time to take responsibility and make a future for ourselves," she said. "Graduates, whatever your plan to do, I wish you great success. I encourage you to be the ones who make it happen. No matter what, give it your all and you can become everything you want to be."

In speaking about having faith, Henderson turned her thoughts to her grandfather, Jerry Perry. Perry was diagnosed with cancer earlier this year, which was "one of the saddest days," Henderson said.

"By having faith you can overcome any obstacle," she said. "If we

have faith in God that He will heal us, He will. I encourage you all to have this kind of faith."

Justin Tyler Maldonado, the fourth-highest graduate, spoke of his class having "courage" throughout their school journey.

"We are athletes, musicians, parents and most importantly friends," he said. "We have all helped each other like brothers and sisters. We are a class filled with courage."

No matter what has happened, the Class of 2008 has received support and worked together to get to this moment, Maldonado said.

"We are at a time in our lives for the training wheels to come off and we are put to the test - the test

of life," he said. "As we walk across the stage tonight and enter the future, we must all have the courage to enter the world and what God has set for us."

As she was beginning her Valedictory address, a gust of wind caught Puja J. Bhakta's cap and knocked it off her head.

"Only me," said the smiling top graduate. "Four years ago we walked into the Heritage Building full of excitement. Four minutes from now you all will be glad this speech is over."

Bhakta spoke of the rocky road of success, stating that there will be curves of failure, loops of confrontation, speed bumps with friends, but that with the insurance of faith and

God in the drivers' seat everyone can make it to a place called success.

"It's important that we take in the lessons that we've learned," she said. "Our options are endless to what life can throw at you. We can't wait for something that might happen. We must achieve what we want, not what others want of us."

Bhakta spoke of "raising the bar" so that her and her fellow graduates might better themselves but using the many lessons they have learned growing up in Ozona.

"The most important lesson I have learned is to live each day to the fullest, and not to forget to be thankful each day that we live," she said.

Bhakta also spoke of the endless support given to her and her

"When I go to college, I hope I will learn to drive so Mr. Gott can walk with Mr. Webb and not worry about me flying around the corner," she said.

Giving the invocation was Morgan T. Capps, and the benediction was given by Jonathan C. Flores.

Bhakta was presented as the President's Academic Excellence Award winner.

Awards were also presented to the 13 honor graduates.

What's on My Mind by Melissa Perner

A beefy newspaper

As you flip through this week's paper, you might notice that one sheet seems skinner than the other pages.

Also, in case you haven't notice this in the past two weeks, the other pages got fatter.

No we didn't instead to just beef up some pages and put two other on a diet, but with a change in suppliers The Ozona Stockman is breaking a trend in newspapers.

While other newspapers are taking on a thinner route, we decided not to diet and beef up our size by going wider.

How did this change come about?

In case many of you didn't know, we print The Stockman here in Ozona.

No, not on those little presses in the back of our main office you may have seen or heard.

We have a large press room across the street from our main office, behind Westerman Drug. Each week, we fire up the old press and crank out another edition.

For years, we have been buying the newsprint paper to print The Stockman on from the San Angelo Standard-Times.

Just this past year, the Standard-Times switched to a skinner, 46-inch web size.

What you are currently reading is the older, 52-inch size.

When the Standard-Times switched, we started looking for another newspaper supplier.

We felt that if we got any skinner, we might not have enough room for all the Crockett County news each week.

We might have had to cut out some of those school photos, part of a news story or increase our size in pages, which would use more newsprint and make us have to do two press runs. Two press runs would mean longer hours printing the paper, and to us we like to save our time when we can.

Unfortunately, not all of the paper is the 52-inch web.

If you will notice, pages 5 and 6 are the former 50-inch web. Just a little bit skinner.

This page is called a "dinky." In newsprint sizes we have full rolls that had hold two pages on each sheet.

For example, pages 1 and 10 are on one size of the roll and pages 2 and 9 are on the other end of the roll.

This works well until you get to 5 and 6. We place 5 and 6 on what is called a "dinky" roll.

When we decided to go with a new paper supplier, we still had lots of rolls of the old "dinky" size.

We do not waste paper at this office. So, for the time being The Stockman may have weeks of a 52-inch newsprint size with a 50-inch "dinky."

The news will still be there. Advertising will still be there, it just may be skinner on those two pages.

No, that is not the diet news.

Unlike other papers, we cannot afford to be skinner.

In trying to keep our printing here in Ozona, we have to accommodate our newspaper to our suppliers.

This supplier just happens to not like skinny sizes either.

Newspapers are becoming skinner in order to reduce the use newsprint, and make the paper size friendlier to commuters.

The industry also claims the skinner size helps to reduce newsprint costs.

Well, I wouldn't exactly call The Stockman a commuter paper. Our readers have a full week to

memorize, criticize and comment on each edition.

In fact, I received a phone call on Monday from someone who had just sat down to read last week's edition. He called me with a comment and we discussed it.

For small, weekly papers like The Stockman, the wider size allows the type to look a bit larger, pictures to be wider, advertising more noticeable and more news to be printed.

We also feel like we are saving newsprint as well by not having to go to extra pages that might not be needed if we were skinny.

Along the lines of changes, we are also currently updating our web site - www.ozonastockman.com.

Photos and news from each edition will be uploaded each week.

Check it out! There might be some photos that were not able to make it in the paper on our web site.

We are also planning on utilizing our web site for late-breaking stories, such reporting sports scores, local emergencies or exciting news events.

Smaller may be the trend for most newspapers, but in Ozona we're beefing up on our news size.

Creative Bovine Enhancer

Prior to 1986 the purebred cattle industry wasn't like it is now.

Breeders today are committed to enhancing their respective breeds using the latest technology and genetics.

Prior to the tax laws changing in 1986 there were a lot of doctors, lawyers and celebrities in the business, not necessarily to produce genetically superior cattle, but tax write-offs.

You would come to my sale and buy \$500,000 worth of cattle and take an investment tax credit of \$50,000 right off your tax bill and then I would come to your sale and do the same thing.

The primary accomplishment was that we both got to keep a little bit more of our own money.

As a "field editor" during this period one of my jobs was to go to your ranch, take photos and generate an ad campaign for your upcoming sale.

Then I'd work ring and write

a sale report afterwards. My initial contact with the breeder usually consisted of a ranch tour and an inspection of the high priced, often inferior, cattle.

But I couldn't come out and say that or I wouldn't have sold any advertising.

So, as a creative bovine enhancer I had to come up with comments that were true... but not really. I'd say things to the breeders like:

"That bull will certainly leave an impact on the cattle industry." (It's gonna take 50 years to eradicate his bad genes from the breed.)

"I've never seen a bull like yours before." (Did you forget to feed him?)

"He sure has an interesting muscle pattern." (I've seen more meat on a flea.)

"I'm sure when someone uses that bull on their cows they'll see a genetic explosion." (The Holstein blood in him is really going to come out.)

"You wouldn't have seen a bull like him 20 years ago." (He'd have been a steer.)

"I have never seen a fuller tail. And look at those incredible dew claws."

"That calf certainly has all four feet moving in the right direction."

"I like his sensitive and flaring nostrils and I've never seen such large hooves on an animal that size!" (Are you sure he doesn't carry the gene for club foot?)

"He" certainly is an active scamp." (He's got such a lousy disposition I couldn't get close enough to take a decent picture even with a telephoto lens.)

"That sure is a beautiful fence you built there." (Don't worry, by the time the photo touchup artists are done you won't even recognize your ugly heifer.)

"You hardly notice that old pinkeye scar and that lump jaw sure healed nicely."

After the sale I had to write a flowery sale report that did justice to the person's ad budget.

A scrapbook-worthy sale report was also necessary so that the breeder would not be embarrassed in front of his fellow tax dodgers.

In one case that I know of, my sale report was used in a tax court

to prove that the advertiser was actually engaged in a real business. I wrote things in sale reports like...

"The animals in this sale offered something entirely new to the industry and the buyers responded accordingly." (It was a wreck.)

"A standing room only crowd gathered for the sale." (The cheap-skate forgot to rent bleachers for the auction.)

"The cattle all found new homes today." (Yeah, at the slaughter house.)

"A snowstorm and/or the first day of deer hunting season and/or road construction kept the crowds away." (The owner blamed me for the disastrous sale.)

"It was a rapid fire, quick and snappy auction." (We only got two head out of 60 sold and I left the minute the auctioneer's gavel hit the block.)

I'm glad the tax laws were changed as I was beginning to suffer from truth burnout, a disease prevalent amongst road agents of the period.

Sadly, after this early education I found that I was only suited for one job: I became a journalist. I still regularly offer the same creative contributions only for much less money.

AUSTIN - Children the state of Texas removed from a polygamist sect's ranch near Eldorado in early April must be returned to their parents, the state's highest court ruled May 29.

Beginning June 2 children were returned to their parents if the parents first presented identification and agreed to take parenting classes and remain in Texas.

The conditional release arrangements were made after the Texas Supreme Court upheld a ruling by the Third Court of Appeals in Austin. The ruling said the state failed to provide evidence warranting the separation of those children from their parents.

The removal of more than 400 children began April 3 after the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services received word that a girl or young woman had called a crisis hotline alleging abuse by an older male resident of

the ranch.

The state obtained a court order to enter the ranch owned by the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, a breakaway sect of the Mormon church. Buses transported mothers and children to San Angelo, and from there the state placed children in foster care in homes and facilities across Texas.

In its ruling, the Texas Supreme Court said, "While the district court must vacate the current temporary custody orders as directed by the court of appeals, it need not do so without granting other appropriate relief to protect the children."

So, Tom Green County state District Judge Barbara Walther, whose original order removed the children, now may proceed within her authority to ensure the best interests of each child and that state Family Code is enforced.

The lawsuit seeking relief from the original removal order was brought by 38 Yearning For Zion Ranch mothers with the assistance of the nonprofit group Texas RioGrande Legal Aid Inc. and a private law firm.

HEARING HELD ON COST OF COLLEGE
Texas Commissioner of Higher

Education Dr. Raymund Paredes and the chairs of boards of regents at all Texas public university systems testified May 28 at a meeting of the Senate Finance Subcommittee on Higher Education.

The Senate subcommittee is charged with studying the impact of tuition deregulation, passed by the Legislature in 2003, on college participation.

The cost of tuition for a semester at the University of Texas at Austin was \$1,975 in 2002. Today it is \$4,012.

Paredes estimated that the average public university graduate will owe between \$15,000 and \$16,000 in student loans.

Paredes said the increase in the cost of a public university education is driving more students to choose community colleges as a place to start.

State Sen. Royce West, D-Dallas, said, "We must find other sources of revenue in order to fund higher education in the state of Texas. It is really important for you guys to start coming up with some ideas. We can't keep taxing the students."

TEXANS TAKE CUBA TRADE TRIP
The United States trade em-

bargo with Cuba has been in effect since 1961. In 2000, Congress passed the Trade Sanctions Reform and Export Enhancement Act, allowing the sale of agricultural and medical products to Cuba.

Now the Lone Star State is thinking about stepping up trade with the Caribbean state.

Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples and a group of business people traveled to Cuba May 27 to 31 to promote trade with Texas. The group of 24 included farmers, ranchers, commodity suppliers and port officials.

"It is only 900 miles between Houston and Havana but for several decades it might well have been a million miles," Staples said. "This is a great occasion for two nations to work together to improve relations and what better way to do that than through food."

TEXAS TO RESUME DEATH PENALTY
A Kentucky case that went to the U.S. Supreme Court put the execution of Texas death row inmates on hold last September. The court ruled that the three-injection system used by Texas and other states is not cruel.

This month, Texas will return to administering the death penalty,

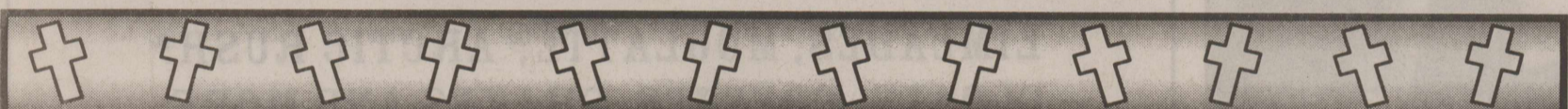
We have had a wonderful week. We feel good and excited. Father protect us by the power of your name.

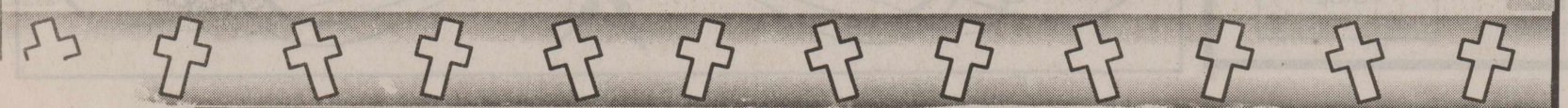

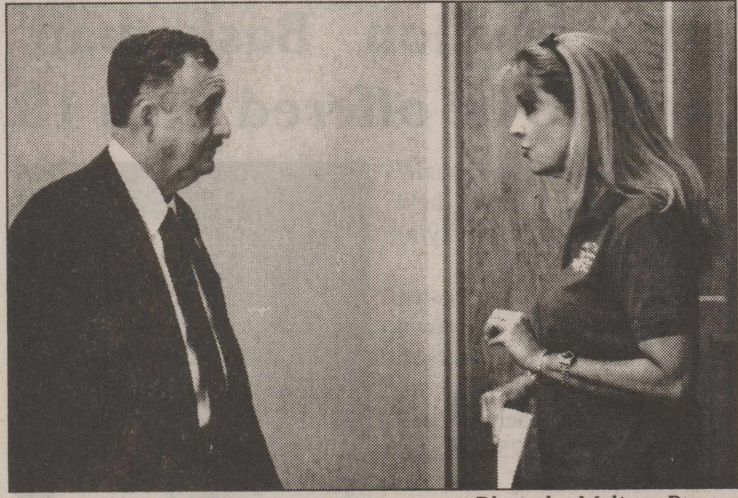

Congressman visits Ozona

A back-to-basics government is what Congressman Ciro D. Rodriguez spoke about last week during a brief visit to Ozona.

Rodriguez, D-San Antonio, stopped in Ozona on May 30 at the chamber of commerce and visitor center.

Topics during the small roundtable discussion ranged from education, health care, veterans benefits and the price of fuel.

In education, Rodriguez said he is trying to "derail" the "No Child Left Behind" bill which has mandated policies for schools, but not provided any funding for these mandates.

Superintendent Abe Gott said "No Child Left Behind" has been "the most damaging legislation."

"It's killing our schools. I think we're going to see an increase in dropouts due to these students not being able to pass a test," Gott said.

Rodriguez said more emphasis needs to be made on special education and on trade and skills labor programs.

"We have killed them off," he said, referring to trade and skills labor classes. "We need schooling on trade skills and then on teach-

ing students how they can operate their own business."

Randy Verner, director for the USDA Rural Development program, said more emphasis needs to be made in helping small businesses.

Rodriguez presented a plan that showed tax cuts and benefits that was passed in 2007 to help small businesses.

"We really need to make investments in our area and zero in on the terms of our needs," he said.

Rodriguez recently backed the Strategic Petroleum Reserve Fill Suspension and Consumer Protection Act, which directed President Bush to temporarily suspend the fill of the Strategic Petroleum Reserve through the end of the year. Rodriguez was a cosponsor of the bill.

The bill is expected to save citizens up to 24 cents per gallon on gasoline.

Rodriguez is facing reelection in November and has two opponents in Republican challenger Lyle Larson, a former Bexar County Commissioner and San Antonio City Councilman, and Libertarian Lani Connolly, a business manager also from San Antonio.

DPS to hold commercial vehicle Roadcheck 2008

The Texas Department of Public Safety will inspect commercial vehicles throughout the state during Roadcheck 2008, a 72-hour intensive inspection program that runs from Tuesday, June 3, - Thursday, June 5, throughout North America.

DPS Commercial Vehicle Enforcement troopers and noncommissioned inspectors, along with Highway Patrol troopers who have received specialized training in commercial vehicle inspection, will stop thousands of commercial vehicles to inspect safety equipment and check driver log books, driver licenses and endorsements.

Inspectors will also look for possible drug or alcohol use.

"It's been a successful program in making sure truckers and commercial vehicle owners meet proper safety requirements," said Chief Randall K. Elliston, head of the Texas Highway Patrol. "The bottom line is we will remove unsafe vehicles from the roadway and issue tickets as necessary."

During Roadcheck 2007, inspectors examined 6,051 vehicles in Texas.

As a result, troopers removed 1,659 vehicles and 259 drivers from service because of the serious nature of their safety violations-both numbers were an increase over the year before.

The Roadcheck program, which stretches from Mexico to Canada, is designed to reduce commercial vehicle highway fatalities through increased vehicle safety.

The Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance (CVSA), which sponsors Roadcheck, reports a significant decrease in the commercial vehicle crash rate in North America since the program's start in 1988.

Vehicles passing inspection receive a CVSA decal exempting the vehicle from inspection for a 90-day period, unless they have an obvious safety defect.

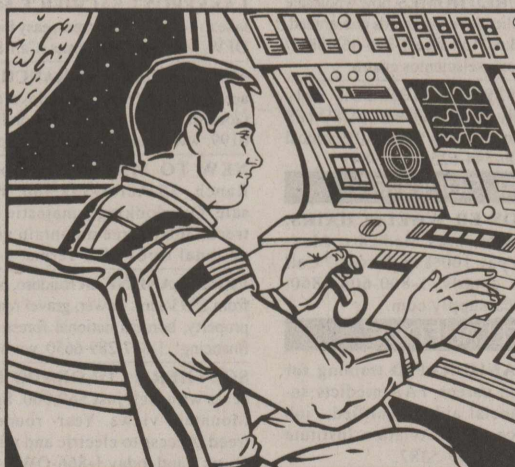
