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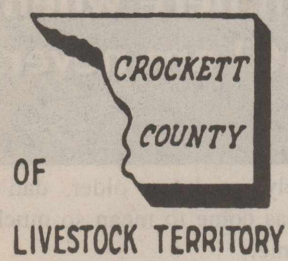

Commissioner's trial begins

A Pecos County jury will decide the fate of a Crockett County Commissioner as the trial begins this week in Fort Stockton.

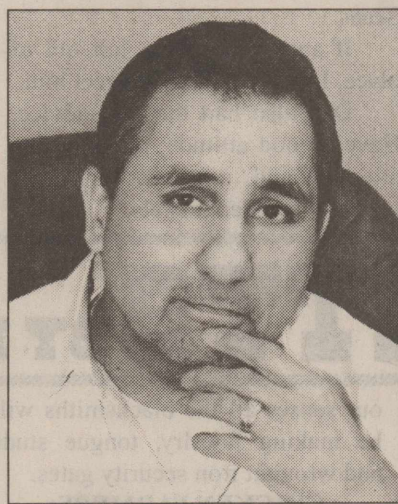
Around 400 people were summoned for jury duty Monday, with 120 showing up.

Commissioner Alfredo Tobar is on trial for charges relating to an alleged accident involving his son Timothy Joe Tobar.

Alfredo Tobar, 50, was indicted on two counts of obstruction and two counts of unlawful restraint.

According to the indictments, Timothy Joe Tobar allegedly was intoxicated when the vehicle veered off the road and rolled causing Perez's ribs to break and Crawford to cut her forehead. The indictments do not state where the accident occurred.

Alfredo Tobar's attorney, J.W. Johnson, filed a motion to have Tim-

othy Joe and Alfredo's trials held the same week.

In the state's opposition, Laurie English, district attorney, stated the defendants are not jointly indicted, nor are they charged with the same offense.

English also stated that it is the

state's responsibility to decide on consolidating trials.

According to court documents, English cited a case which was prosecuted by Johnson when he was district attorney for the 112th Judicial District. The case upholds that the prosecutor has the right and duty to determine how offenses are charged and prosecuted.

"To allow defendants to determine whether their cases should be tried jointly tramples on the prosecutorial discretion that Mr. Johnson fought so hard to maintain," English stated in her opposition.

Intermediate school principal reassigned

Webb to take over as pre-k through fifth grade principal

For 19 years, Manley Holmes has dedicated his time and service to being the principal at Ozona Intermediate School.

He has worked 17 of those years as summer school principal.

In 1968, Holmes started his work in public education. In 1980, his first principal job was at Sanderson Junior High with grades fifth through eight.

In his final school year, Holmes will not be in the principal's office of the intermediate school.

As of June 3, Superintendent Abe Gott reassigned Holmes to director of the school district's disciplinary alternative education program (DAEP) for the 2008-2009 school year. The facility is located in a portable building, across from

the middle school.

Dan Webb, principal of the primary school, has been reassigned as principal of grades pre-k through fifth.

In a letter sent to the elementary teachers, Gott stated that Webb's office will be located in the intermediate school.

The letter also stated that Webb's reassignment was to help facilitate the district's move to a single elementary school.

Holmes has one year left on his contract. He plans on retiring at the end of the 2008-2009 year.

During the June 5 called board meeting, Holmes spoke in open forum in front of the board.

"I'm not too proud to be reassigned. I've worked every job in the school business. I don't complain. I do what I'm told," he said. "I was told the other day that in the best interest of our district, I need to be reassigned. That was a pretty good lick."

Holmes said that the intermediate school has been honored five times as a recognized campus by the Texas Education Agency and one time as exemplary. The campus has also received several dual-performance acknowledgements for math and writing, along with several certificates and funding from the governor's office for performance.

Rodriguez announces disaster designation for Crockett County

SAN ANTONIO, Texas - Congressman Ciro D. Rodriguez, D-San Antonio, has announced that Crockett County has been named as a contiguous natural disaster area by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture due to damages and losses caused by fires from Feb. 25 to Feb. 29, 2008 in Irion County.

This designation makes farm operators in primary and contiguous counties eligible to be considered for low-interest emergency loans from the Farm Service Agency (FSA) provided eligibility requirements are met.

"I am pleased that Crockett and the other eligible counties will be afforded this relief so that people may recover from these unfortunate fires," said Rodriguez. "I hope that these loans can be of some assistance to people who are still in-need of aid due to unforeseen hardships caused by the fires."

Loan applications will be received through Jan. 29, 2009, for production and physical losses.

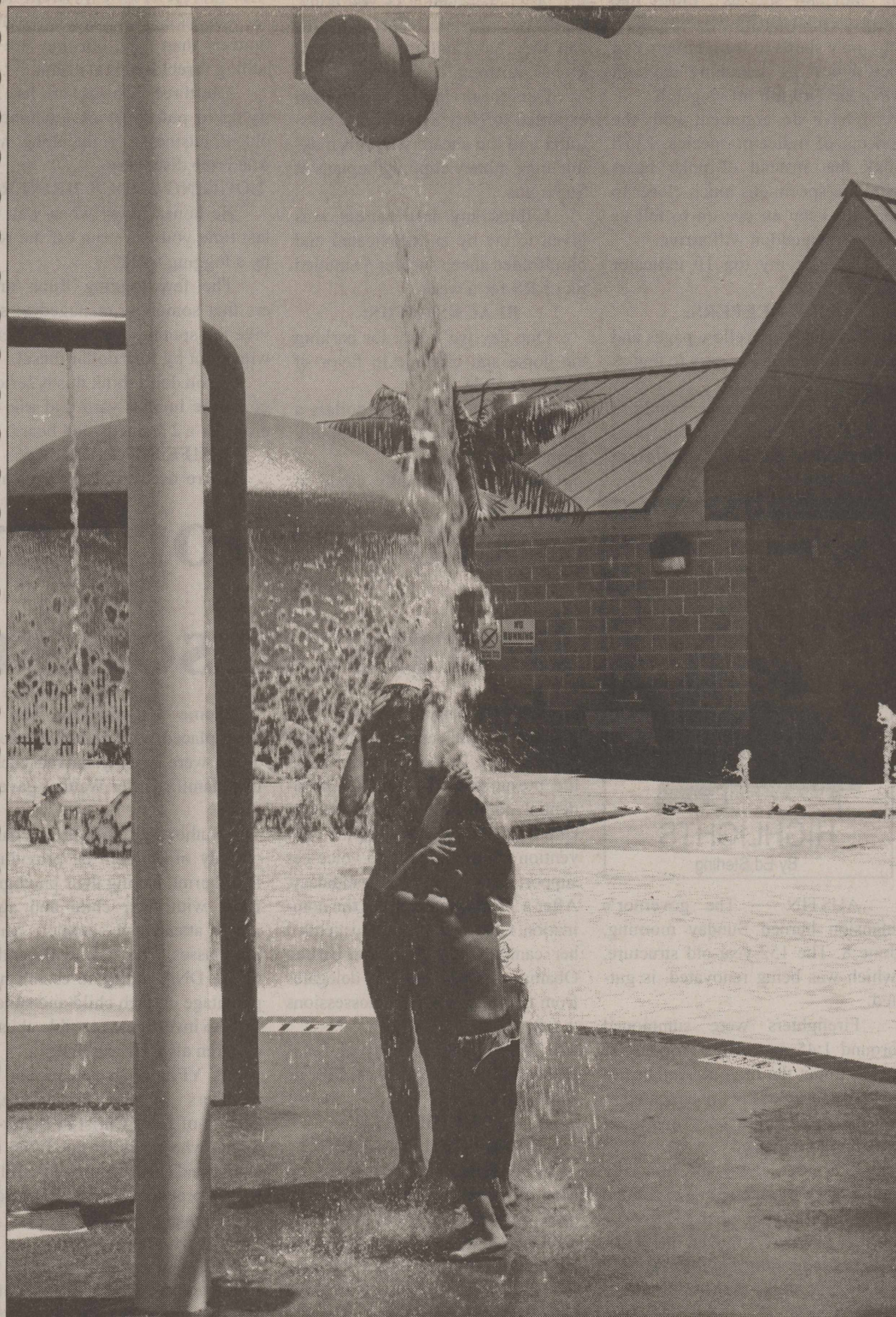
FSA will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available, and repayment ability.

In accordance with section 321(a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act, the four contiguous counties to Irion are named as contiguous disaster counties. Those counties are Crockett, Reagan, Schleicher, and Tom Green.

The local FSA office will provide affected farmer operators with further information and applications. Crockett County is administered out of the Reagan County FSA Office which also serves Irion and Upton Counties.

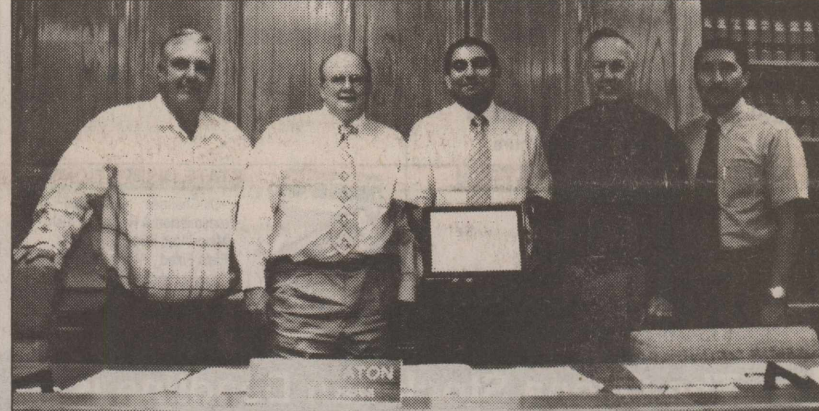

Aerial fireworks prohibited for the Fourth of July holiday

County-wide burn ban reinstated

Aerial fireworks will not be able to be flown this Fourth of July, unless they are the ones part of the Knights of Columbus annual display.

During their regular meeting on June 9, the Crockett County Commissioners voted to ban aerial fireworks, which include skyrockets with sticks and missiles with fins or rudders. Small firecrackers are permitted.

The commissioners also voted to reinstate the burn ban due to the dry, weather conditions.

Burning is permitted if it is part of fire fighters training, public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations, planting or harvesting of agricultural crops or burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, National Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified.

This order does not prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and

expert to be on hand.

Violation of the fireworks restrictions or the burn ban is a Class C Misdemeanor, which is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

SAFETY AWARD

Crockett County received a 2007 Safety Award by the Texas Association of Counties.

The award was earned for the county's record of involvement and commitment to safety in the workplace, as well as for controlling their Workers' Compensation claims.

To qualify for this honor, the county must have a safety program rated in the top 15 percent of the 300 governmental entities that collectively self-insure their Workers' Compensation in this pool. Only 38 entities were honored this year with this award.

This is too bad because as we import more of our beef and other meat from Brazil, Argentina and 30 other countries around the world we are going to need much sharper tableware.

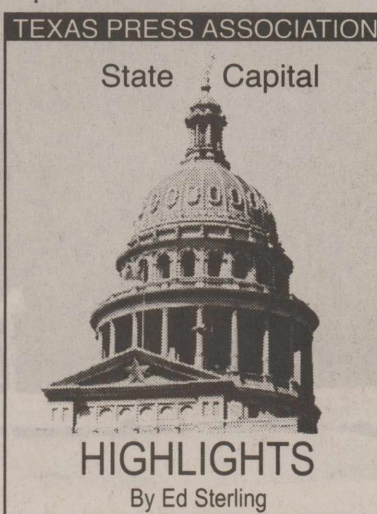
LARGE ANIMAL VETERINARIANS.

Governor's mansion burns, arson suspected



elected state party chair. Gov. Tim Kaine of Virginia appeared on behalf of U.S. Sen. Barack Obama, D-Ill., the presumptive Democratic presidential nominee. U.S. Sen. Hillary Clinton, D-N.Y., addressed the convention via the Internet to voice her support for the Obama candidacy.

After a 17-month battle for the nomination, Clinton on June 7 suspended her campaign. A few days earlier, Obama amassed enough delegates from the states and U.S. possessions to win.

The Republican Party of Texas will be in Houston June 12-14 for its state convention.

YFZ CHILDREN BACK WITH FAMILIES

The Texas Supreme Court on May 29 ruled the removal of children from the polygamy-practicing YFZ ranch in Eldorado should not have been ordered because the state failed to present evidence that the children were in danger.

On June 2, Judge Barbara Walther, in accordance with the Supreme Court ruling, instructed the state Department of Family and Protective Services to release the ranch children from foster care.

Walther, 51st state District Court, Tom Green County, gave the order that set the YFZ Ranch raid in motion on April 3.

Some 416 children who had been placed with caregivers across Texas were quickly moved back to their families after Walther gave the order.

Authorized people regained custody of children by providing a thumbprint, having their photograph taken with their child and agreeing to attend and complete parent-teacher classes. The state will continue to use DNA testing to establish the parentage of each child and state efforts to investigate possible abuse of children also will continue.

A YFZ ranch spokesman said members of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints who reside at the 1,700 acre compound near Eldorado will no longer practice "spiritual marriage" of underage girls.

Albert Hawkins, head of the Texas Department of Human Services, said despite the reversal of the massive child custody intervention, the state will not shrink from its duty to protect children from abuse.

VICTIM PROTECTION PROGRAM DEBUTS

There is a new address confidentiality program for victims of family violence, stalking and sexual assault.

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott on June 2 announced that

eligible Texans may register for an anonymous address that would appear on voter and school registration cards, driver's licenses and most government documents.

The attorney general's Crime Victim Services Division will assign a substitute address, receive service of process and mail for the participants and forward mail to participants' actual address.

Applicants must meet with a local domestic violence shelter, sexual assault center, law enforcement, or prosecution staff member to discuss a safety plan and learn more about the enrollment process.

Sen. Eddie Lucio, D-Palmview, authored a law passed during the 2007 state legislative session creating the Address Confidentiality Program.

PROGRAM SCRUTINIZES DRIVERS

Roadcheck 2008 subjected commercial vehicle drivers to higher than usual scrutiny on the roads of North America, June 3 through June 5.

The Texas Department of Public Safety participated in this intensive inspection program.

Troopers stopped thousands of commercial vehicles to check safety equipment, drivers' log books, licenses and more. Troopers also looked for evidence of drug or alcohol use.

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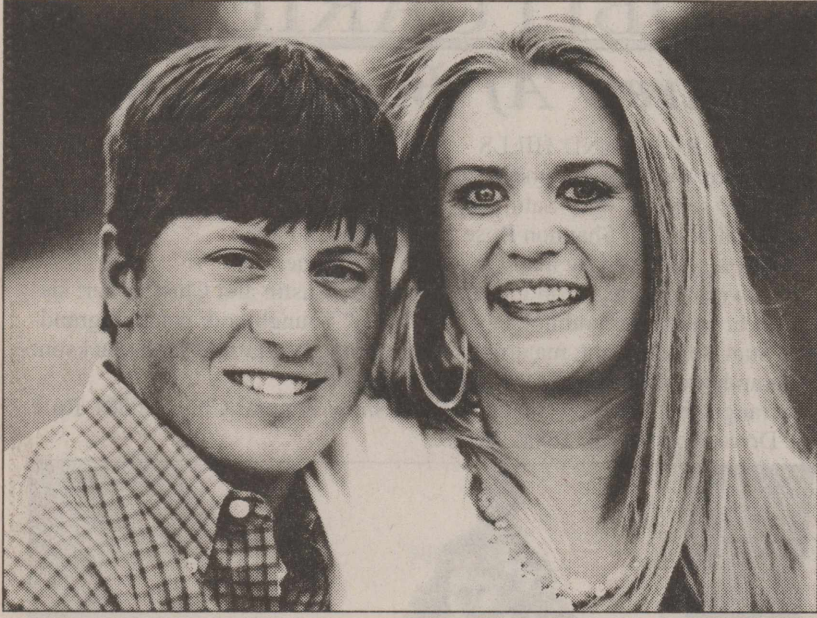

This is the 60th annual CNFR and the 10th anniversary of the event's home in Casper.

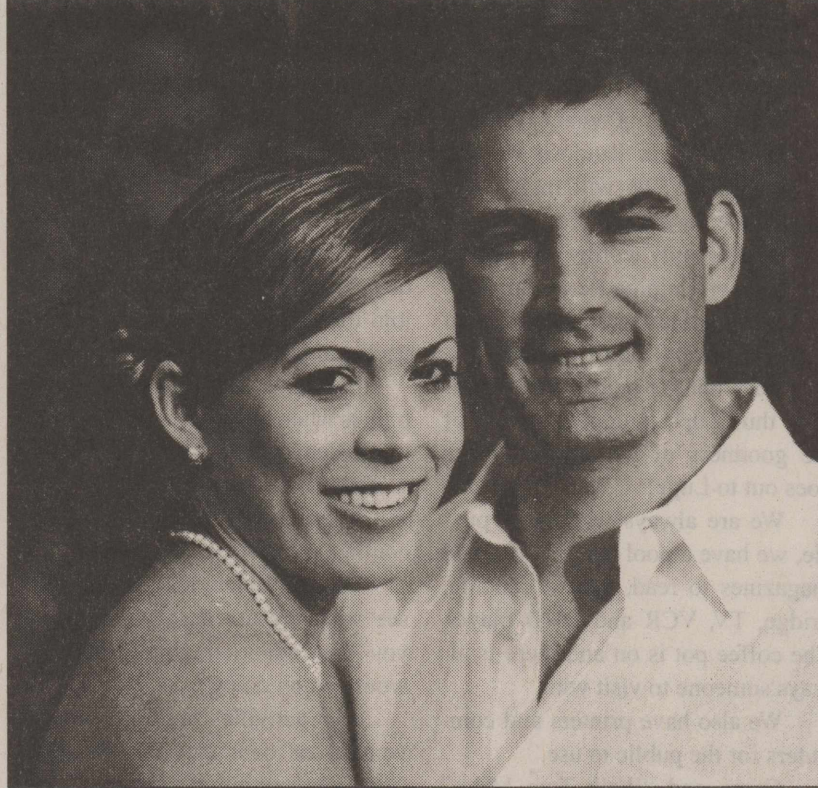

Holmes also stated that this past school year the intermediate campus had 96 percent attendance and that only one teacher resigned due to commuting expenses.

This year's TAKS scores on the intermediate campus were 81 percent reading and 71 percent math in third grade, 89 percent reading, 94 percent math and 98 percent writing in fourth grade and 85 percent reading, 80 percent math and 64 percent science in fifth grade.

Holmes also said that the 64 percent in science was the second highest in the district, and that elementary teachers are not trained in science, which is a problem they continue to struggle with.

He also said that he has very little parent and teacher complaints at his campus.

"I have also been commended several times by superintendents over the years for doing more with less money," he said.

According to the district's policy, all personnel are employed subject to assignment and reassignment by the superintendent or designee when the superintendent determines that the assignment or reassignment is in the best interest of the district.

"I don't deserve this. I can't imagine why this is in the best interest of the district," Holmes said. "For everything we can't do in this district, every mistake we make, we've got a good, smooth answer for it. Not in the history of this school, since I've been here, have the teachers been more upset in our academic program. I can't understand why it would be in the best interest for me to sit at AEP. I have no animosity toward anybody, I just want to do my job and do it well."

Since no item on the agenda pertained to Holmes' reassignment, the board could not comment on his statements.

according to the Texas Open Meetings Act.

"The success of individuals in DAEP is just as important as those who are not in DAEP. The Crockett County School District takes the success of all students very seriously," Gott said.

Holmes is working on getting an item on the June 18 school board agenda so the matter can be discussed further.

ENFORCING COMPLAINT POLICY

In his report, Gott said that it was time to enforce the district's complaint policy due to parents and employees going straight to school board members before taking the steps cited in the policy.

According to the policy, the board encourages the public and employees to discuss concerns and complaints through informal conferences with the appropriate administrator. Concerns should be expressed as soon as possible to allow early resolution at the lowest possible administrative level.

If the problem is not resolved at the lowest level, then there are steps to take throughout the upper levels and then to the school board.

"There is too much micro-management going on that does not pertain to board duties," Gott said. "Our policy states that the problem needs to be solved at the lowest possible level."

Gott said that if a board member calls him with a complaint and that the policy has not been followed, he will not research or take the complaint seriously.

"I don't want parents upset, but a lot of times it is much quicker to call the principal," he said.

CONSTRUCTION OF NEW ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

The board listened to representatives from Waldrop Construction Company out of Brownwood and DSA Construc-

tion Management, of Cleburne, on discussion about selection of a construction method of a new elementary school.

After a lengthy discussion on the different methods, the board voted to go with the construction manager at-risk method.

This method is intended to assume the risk for construction at the contracted price in the same manner as a general contractor, but also provides consultation to the school district regarding construction during and after the design of the facility.

In selecting the construction manager-at-risk, the school district is required to utilize the competitive sealed-bid proposal process.

The next step is to advertising for proposals to request for qualifications for a construction manager. The proposals will be due July 1 and a committee of three board members will meet to pick three to five managers to interview. Interviews will be conducted by the committee July 8 and then approval will be at the July 9 regular board meeting.

"This is probably one of the bigger projects in West Texas in the last few years and there are a lot of people interested in it," said architect Douglas Koehne.

OTHER AGENDA ITEMS APPROVED

- A bid of \$390,439 from Nortex Modular on 14-month lease for portable buildings to be delivered by July 1. The buildings are to be located behind the Administration Building and across from the middle school. Grades pre-k through second will be housed in the buildings during construction of the new elementary school.
- Canvass of May 10 school bond votes.

The next regular monthly school board meeting will be at 6:30 p.m. June 18 at the Administration Building.

District Judge Dick Alcalá, of El Paso, ruled against Johnson's motion, which means only Alfredo Tobar will be on trial this week. Timothy Joe Tobar's trial has been set for June 30.

Three of the charges against Alfredo Tobar carry third-degree felonies, which is punishable up to 10 years in prison and a fine not to exceed \$10,000, according to the Texas Penal Code. The fourth charge is a class A misdemeanor, which is punishable up to one year in jail and a fine not to exceed \$4,000.

According to the Texas Local Government Code, the conviction of a county officer by a jury for any felony or for a misdemeanor involving official misconduct operates as an immediate removal from office of that officer.

"I invite everyone to participate and have a patriotic float in the parade," Tambunga said.

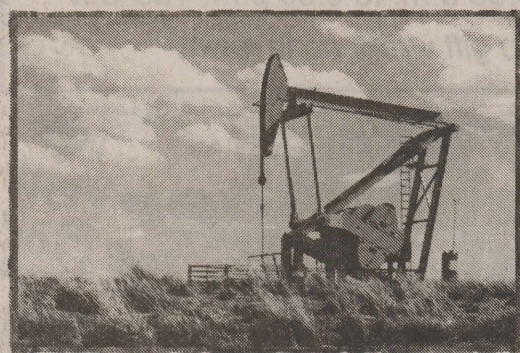
As soon as it gets dark enough the Knights of Columbus will have a Fourth of July fireworks display to end our great Patriotic Day.

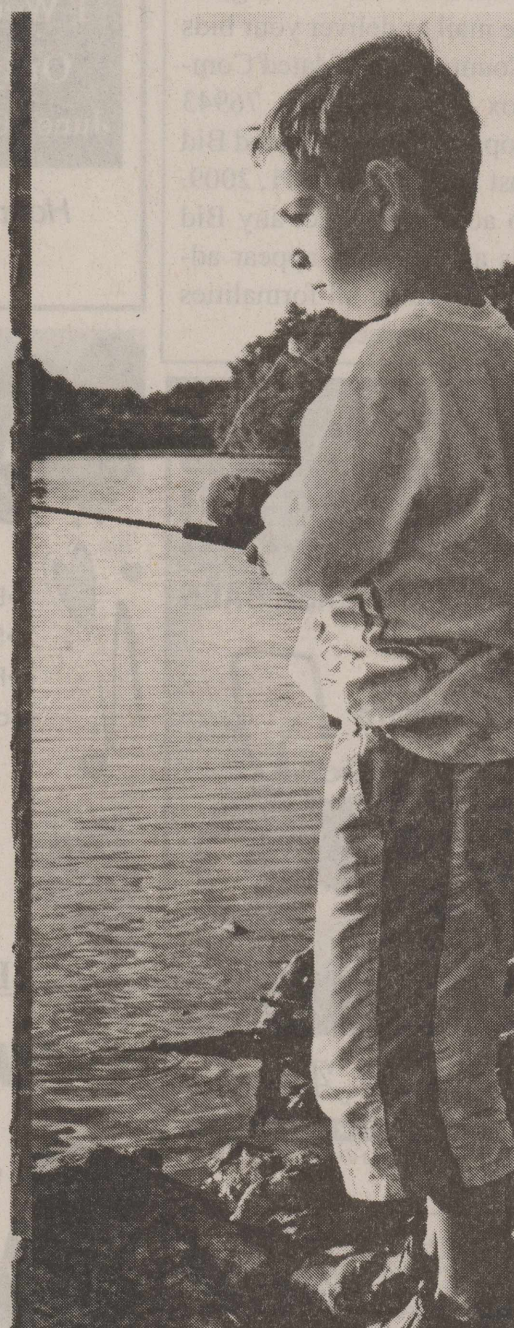

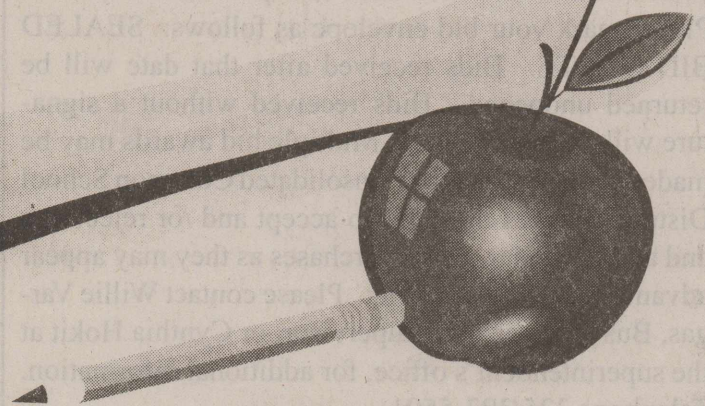

'The Butterfly Project:' Remember the Children

Mrs. McWilliams' English classes participated in the Butterfly Project this year as part of a Holocaust Unit.

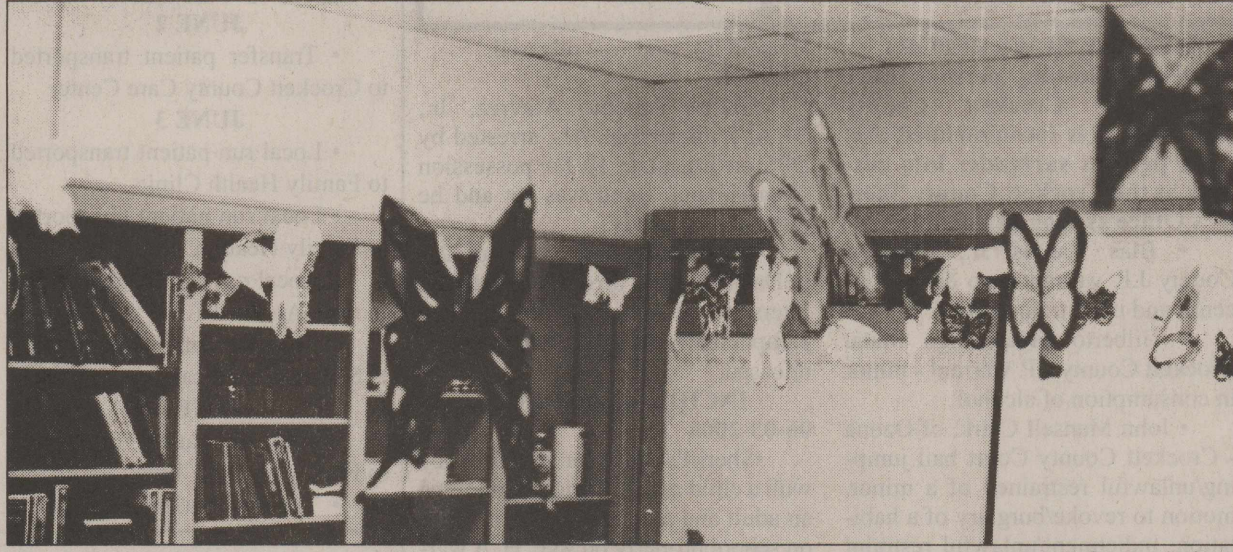
The Butterfly Project, sponsored by the Holocaust Museum Houston, is an effort to remember the 1.5 million children who perished during the Holocaust.

The museum is collecting 1.5 million handcrafted butterflies for display in the museum - one for each child. Mrs. McWilliams' students each made a butterfly to represent a victim of the Holocaust; the butterflies hung in her classroom during the study.

Students also read the novel "Night," written by survivor Elie Wiesel and read poetry written by children in the Terezin Concentration Camp.

Each student was assigned a poem to read and discuss with the class.

The Butterfly Project asks that after each poem is read, then the teacher reads the fate of the young poet.

ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, National Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand.

This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081(h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

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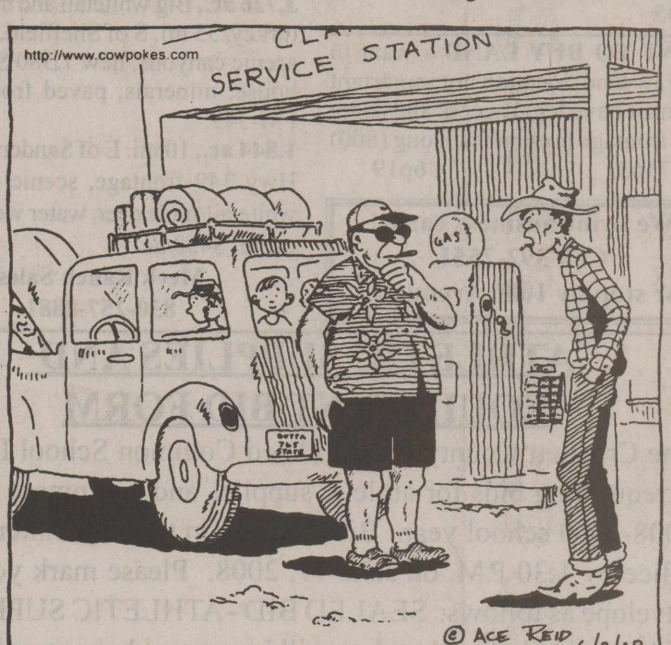
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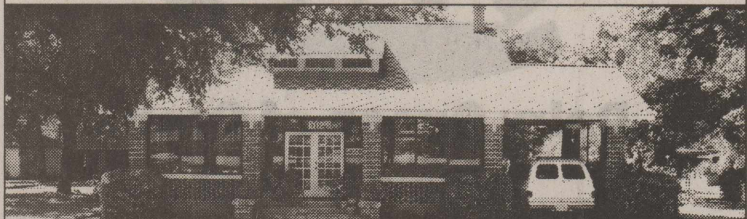

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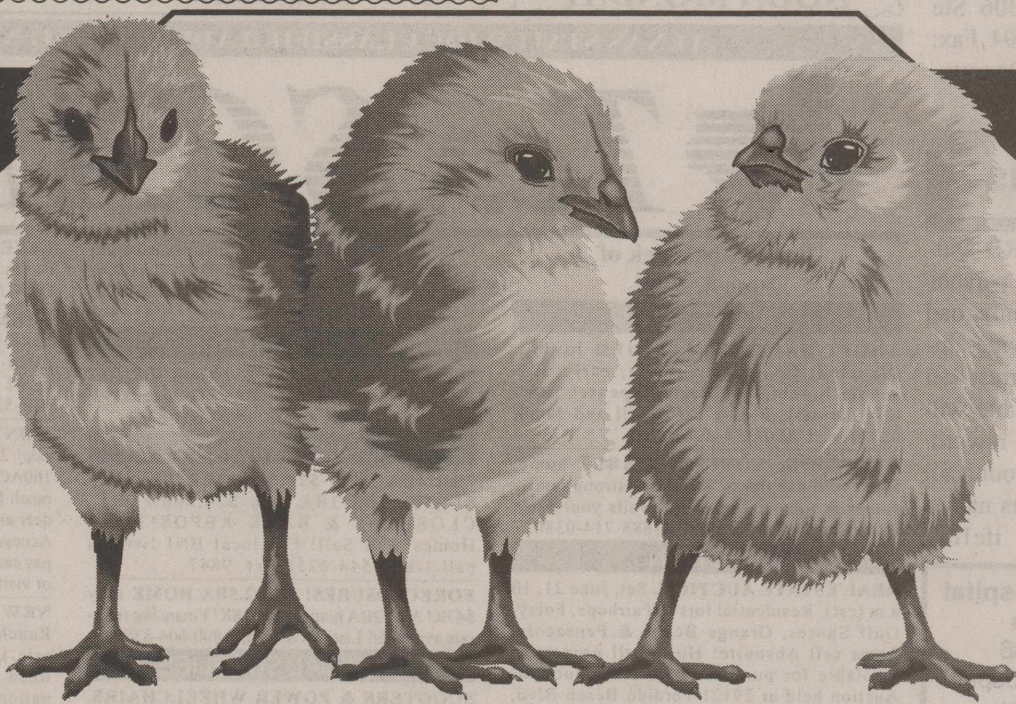
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
