

TOBARNOT GUILTY

Pecos County jury acquits local commissioner

FORT STOCKTON - Tears of joy, hugs of relief and a feeling of happiness hit the Tobar family as District Judge Dick Alcala read the verdicts of not guilty.

After deliberating for two hours, a Pecos County Jury of 11 men and one woman returned the three not guilty verdicts for Crockett County Commissioner Alfredo Tobar, after a week-long trial in Fort Stockton.

Tobar was charged with two counts of obstruction and one count of unlawful restraint.

"We are just happy it's over," Tobar said on the steps of the district court with building with his family surrounding him.

As the members of the jury left, Tobar and his family thank all of them and spoke to some of them signed to do." about the case.

"They didn't believe he (Tobar) liberating the case around 3 p.m. did it," said J.W. Johnson, Tobar's attorney about the jury. "This was sent to Alcala with a question from the first time in two years we were able to tell our side of the story."

When Tobar showed up at the accident scene, Crawford said she asked him to take them to the emergency room.

Instead of taking them to the emergency room, Crawford said Tobar took them to his house to get "cleaned up first."

Crawford said that while Tobar did not physically restrain them, he refused to take them to the hospital until an hour after the accident hap-

School board to approve fencing bids for **Lion Stadium**

The Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees will look at approving bids for a new fence at Lion Stadium, during tonight's, June 18, regular meeting.

The meeting will be at 6:30 p.m. at the Administration Building on 797 Avenue D.

During the May 21 meeting, the board approved a motion to seek bids for a limestone rock and rot iron fence at Lion Stadium.

The fence will be built at the north end zone of the stadium. It will consist of 6-foot limestone pillars with rot iron poles in between the pillars. Cost is estimated around \$40,000.

'We do not want a fence to block people's view. We just want a nice fence on the north end zone of the stadium," said Superintendent Abe Gott.





CORRIDOR PLAN

The state's idea of building new rural toll roads in East Texas has been shelved after months of public hearings and input including 28,000 comments from citizens.

The Texas Department of Transportation announced June 11 it will recommend that the Interstate 69/ Trans-Texas Corridor Project be developed using existing highway facilities wherever possible. If additional travel lanes are added to existing highways, only the new lanes would have tolls.

"After a dozen town hall meetings, nearly 50 public hearings and countless one-on-one conversations, it is clear to us that Texans want us to use existing roadways to start building the Texas portion of Interstate 69," explained Texas Transportation Commissioner Ted Houghton.

TxDOT Executive Director Amadeo Saenz, in a letter to the Federal Highway Administration, said the overwhelming sentiment of those 28,000 comments focused on the need to improve the existing transportation network rather than

Saenz said TxDOT would continue to talk to the public about the project. He encouraged Texans to ask questions and share their transportation ideas at www.keeptexasmoving.

SECRETARY OF STATE **BIDS FAREWELL**

Phil Wilson, Texas' 106th secretary of state, on June 11 announced his resignation.

The Brownwood native is the fifth Texan to serve as secretary of state under Gov. Rick Perry. Wilson's four predecessors include Henry Cuellar, Gwen Shea, Geoff Connor and Roger Williams.

Dallas-based power producer Luminant announced Wilson will join the company as senior vice president of public affairs and start work on July 7.

Luminant is a subsidiary of Energy Future Holdings, formerly TXU Corp. The company bills itself as the largest purchaser of wind- generated electricity in Texas.

ROADCHECK RESULTS

ARE REPORTED Highway patrol officers conduct a Roadcheck inspection blitz annually in states ranging from Mexico to Canada to reduce commercial vehicle highway fatalities.

3 through 5. During it, Texas Department of Public Safety troopers inspected 5,824 commercial vehicles. Of those, 1,435 were put out of service for equipment violations, the DPS reported.

The execution followed a ninemonth moratorium on executions observed by Texas and others states awaiting a U.S. Supreme Court ruling on a Kentucky case. Plaintiffs in that case argued that a three-injection regimen used to administer the death penalty is cruel. The court found for the defendant.

TEXAS GOP MEETS IN HOUSTON

An estimated 12,000 delegates, alternates and guests attended the Republican Party of Texas convention in Houston, June 12-14. Tina Benkiser, a Houston lawyer, was reelected as chair of the state party. U.S. Sen. John McCain of Arizona was confirmed as the Republican party nominee for president.





Foster Grandparents also help by offering emotional support to child victims of abuse and neglect, tutoring children with low literacy skills, mentoring troubled teenagers and young mothers, and caring for premature infants and children with physical disabilities and severe ill-

The local program requires that our volunteers work a minimum of 20 hours a week, but may work up to 40 hours a week. Foster Grandparents are not substitute teachers, babysitters, or custodians. They are trainings. there to assist children, teachers, and make the classroom more efficient.

The program services 14 counties: Coke, Concho, Crockett, Irion, Kimble, Mason, Menard, Mc-Culloch, Reagan, Runnels, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton and Tom Green. A Foster Grandparent must be 60 years of age or older, meet income eligibility guidelines and thrive on direct interaction with children and believe they can make a difference staff available for assistance.

The Foster Grandparent Program also reimburses our volunteers for mileage to and from their work sites. Besides a bi-monthly check, volunteers receive a free, annual physical, paid vacation and sick days, paid holidays, paid training, Volunteers are there to provide along with paid meals at their site

Foster Grandparents receive are mostly special needs children one paid sick day and one paid vacation day for every 80 hours they work. These benefits are to relieve any costs to our volunteers for being in the program. The income volunteers receive for being in the Foster Grandparent Program will not affect any government benefits they receive, such as Social Security or Food Stamps.

> Volunteers also receive accident and liability insurance while on duty at no cost.

There is pre-service training to help volunteers understand the program and its rules and make sure they are comfortable with all its components. There are also monthly trainings and socials. The program provides a meal at all trainings and volunteers are paid for their time at

Volunteer sites consist of churches, Elementary schools, Boys' and Girls' Clubs, Head Starts and libraries. Volunteers are assigned to a site based on where they live.

TOBAR: 'I did not restrain, intimidate or threaten those kids'

"I do not recall any concern he (Tobar) had for us," she said. "I wasn't thinking about calling 9-1-1. I wasn't going leave Nick. My primary concern was Nick because he was acting like he was really hurt."

At the accident scene, Crawford tried to call Sandra Perez from a cell phone, but no one picked up.

Sandra Perez said if she had been able to understand Crawford's static message or if she had picked up the phone when Crawford called, she would have called 9-1-1 first and then gone wherever she needed to go.

At the Tobar house, Tobar said Perez wanted to get into the shower and Crawford began washing her face.

Tobar said Perez kept saying how he needed to "sober down." Tobar also said he kept telling the teenagers they needed to go to the hospital, but that Perez didn't want to go to the hospital.

During his testimony, Perez said he remembered Tobar's pickup coming to pick them up at the accident scene and then waking up in a bathtub at the Tobar household.

"I could hear him (Tobar) telling Lyndsie we need to get this story straight. That we need to tell them I was driving because I was hurt the worst, so he (Tobar)

could save his own son's ass."

In cross-examination, Johnson, asked why Perez had refused to talk to the Tobar family since the accident.

"What he (Tobar) did to me, I thought was wrong. I'm disappointed in him and I blame him for what happened," Perez said. "I wouldn't call what he did saving us. He picked us up. He had to because his car was on fire and someone was going to get in trouble. We (Perez and Crawford) weren't driving, so I guess it was going to be T.J. (Tobar). I don't think he cared about us from his actions."

At 1:20 a.m., Tobar took Crawford and Perez to the emergency room at the Family Health Center in Ozona.

"I did not restrain, intimidate or threaten those kids. I wouldn't do that," Tobar said. "I was trying real hard to get them to the hospital."

At the clinic, DPS Trooper Michael Johnson asked Tobar who all was involved in the accident. Tobar said he told them the names of all four people, including Munoz who didn't want to be involved.

"I can't lie to the officer. I had to tell him about Rocky," Tobar said. "I did everything I could to get the kids to the hospital."

the accident, Tobar said he was cooperative with Johnson in going to pick up his son T.J. Tobar and bringing him and Munoz back to the clinic. T.J. Tobar was eventually arrested for driving while intoxicated and Munoz was cited with minor in consumption.

Neither Perez nor Crawford was issued citations.

In his testimony, Johnson said Perez and Crawford were busy being attended to by the emergency room staff.

"I do not feel like I discriminated. I feel like it was a very busy night and I might have overlooked a couple of things," Johnson said.

Crockett County Sheriff's Deputy Andrew Sanchez said he heard Tobar tell Johnson that Tobar didn't know where the accident vehicle was.

Moments later, Tobar told Sanchez in Spanish that if Sanchez had seen the vehicle he would have thought everyone in it would have been killed.

"They are very lucky they received the treatment they did when they did," English said about Crawford and Perez.

Dr. Marcus Sims said both Perez and Crawford were evasive about the details of the accident.

ries and concentrated on getting Perez transferred to a San Angelo hospital.

Perez needed a cat scan or an MRI scan to make sure his spleen was not damaged, Sims said. If a spleen is ruptured internal bleeding can occur, which, if not treated, can lead to death, Sims said.

Sims also said he thought Perez had bruising on his lungs, but that a regular x-ray would not show this.

In San Angelo, the doctors there diagnosed Nick with pulmonary contusions, or bruising on the lungs. Perez also had fractures in two ribs and suffered a minor concussion, Sims said.

"I felt like he (Nick Perez) was suffering serious bodily injuries that night, which is why I worked to try and get him immediately transferred to San Angelo," Sims said. "As a physician there is certain signs and symptoms you relay on to lead you to certain conclusions.'

In cross-examination, Johnson asked several questions about the bruising and insisted the San Angelo doctors did not put on their reports that Nick had contusions or bruising on an ambulance is different than behis lungs.

In closing arguments, Johnson said Perez and Crawford were only delayed treatment while being at the Tobar house for about 15 minutes.

"This man is not honest. He denied them medical treatment for the good of his son," Smith

Johnson said, at the Tobar house, Lyndsie could have used the phone or walked to the Perez house, but she wanted to clean up and sober up.

"I don't know how we can make any sense of what Lyndsie was trying to do and what Nick was trying to do, but Mr. Tobar didn't do the things they are saying about him," Johnson said.

USDA announces deadline for livestock disaster program

BIG LAKE, Texas - Jed W. Hruska, executive director for USDA's Farm Service Agency in Reagan-Upton-Irion-Crockett counties, has announced that livestock producers have until July 18, 2008, to enroll in the 2005-2007 Livestock Compensation Program (LCP) and Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP).

Signup began on Sept. 10, 2007, for the two programs that provide aid to livestock producers who suffered eligible livestock or livestock feed losses between Jan. 1, 2005, and Dec. 30, 2007, because of a natural disaster.

The LIP provides payments to eligible livestock owners and contract growers who incurred the death of livestock because of a natural disaster.

The LCP provides payments to eligible livestock owners and cash lessees who suffered feed losses or increased feed costs because of a natural disaster.

ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unicorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand.

This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

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
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
