Local woman charged with murdering boyfriend

A local woman is in jail after a fight with her boyfriend led to

Martha Jean Williams, 37, has been charged with murder for allegedly stabbing her boyfriend, Rafael Benson. Williams is currently in jail

in Big Lake. Her charge is a firstdegree felony, which is punishable up to 99 years in prison and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

Benson, 47, died in Shannon Hospital on June 25.

EMS transported Benson by ambulance, Hawthorne said.

Benson was immediately taken into surgery and was in the intensive care unit under critical condition after surgery, Hawthorne said. He died later that day.

Hawthorne said Benson had a stab wound in the middle of his stomach, and that when EMS arrived on scene Benson was not responsive.

After being treated, Hawthorne said Benson was very disoriented

Williams was arrested at the scene of the crime.

Hawthorne said the sheriff's office is still collecting information and evidence, and that the evidence will be sent to the Texas Department of Public Safety Crime Lab in Austin.

Commissioner's pleads guilty to DWI

Timothy Joe (T.J.) Tobar pled guilty Monday to his second driving while intoxicated charge during a hearing at the Crockett County Courthouse.

Tobar, 27, was sentenced to two years probation and 80 hours of community service by District Judge Dick Alcala. He is also ordered to serve three days in the Crockett County Jail, which will begin July 7, and pay court costs.

Tobar was originally indicted for a third-degree felony of intoxicated assault and two second-degree felonies of aggravated assault, which stemmed from an automobile accident involving Lyndsie Crawford, Nick Perez and Rocky Munoz on July 28, 2006.

Charges from the accident also involved Tobar's father, Commissioner Alfredo Tobar, who was recently found not guilty for two counts of obstruction and a count of unlawful restraint by a Pecos County Jury after a four-day June trial in Fort Stockton.



High court rulings draw comments from top state officeholders

In another case, Kennedy v. Lou- provision." isiana, the state of Louisiana charged a man with the aggravated rape of his then-8-year-old stepdaughter.

He was convicted and sentenced to death under a state law authorizing capital punishment for the rape of a child under 12. The Supreme Court ruled on June 25 that the law violates the Eighth Amendment prohibition of cruel and unusual punishment, because the crime did not result, and was not intended to result, in the victim's death.

Gov. Perry and Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst commented in opposition to the ruling.

"In my opinion," Perry said, "laws should be strong enough to deter these unspeakable offenses or, in the least, prevent these lowest of criminals from harming any child

Dewhurst said he was disappointed with the decision.

"I believe, and the vast majority of Texans agree, that the death penalty is an appropriate form of punishment for repeat child molesters. Our top priority remains protecting our most precious resource: our children.

Fortunately, our law here in Texas was carefully crafted to give prosecutors the option of seeking life in prison without parole in the event a court invalidated the death penalty

ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unicorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand.

This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.




